# Notes for RICHARD DE HOGHTON:

Richard Houghton's family had owned property in the locality of Preston since the 12th century and although neither wealthy nor especially well connected it had influenced the development of the town. On the premature death in 1498 of his uncle Sir Alexander Houghton without male issue, the family property had descended to his father who himself died within the next three years leaving the young Richard as his heir. The boy's wardship was acquired in 1509 by his maternal grandfather who married him to Alice Ashton. The pedigrees record that Houghton married four times, his three later wives all being yeomen's daughters, although Alice Ashton survived him and was described as his widow early in Elizabeth's reign.3

Houghton's knighthood in 1523 may have resulted from military service in the Scottish campaign of that year led by the Earl of Surrey, afterwards 3rd Duke of Norfolk, whose deputy he was, or was to become, as a duchy of Lancaster steward in the hundred of Amounderness before securing the post for himself in 1526. It was an office which brought him into conflict with the inhabitants of Preston, who twice laid charges against him in the duchy courts. His admission to the council of the Earl of Derby perhaps followed the marriage in 1530 of the Duke of Norfolk's sister Dorothy to the earl. In August 1533 he helped other members of the earl's council in examining a priest accused of slandering Queen Anne. During the Pilgrimage of Grace he kept the earl informed about the incursion of the rebels into Lancashire and his reply to the earl's command to keep order there was to muster 500 men in Ribblesdale. In 1537 his knowledge of local affairs earned him a commendation to Cromwell. After helping to suppress Furness abbey at the Dissolution, he bought the manor of Wheelton and some property in Preston. In 1544 he mustered with other gentlemen in Lancashire and Cheshire but he is not known to have served with the army in either Scotland or France in that year. In 1557 he declined to join the Earl of Derby on the borders on account of his health but offered to send a substitute in command of 100 men. He died on 5 Aug. 1559 and was buried at Preston. If he made a will it has not been found.4

As a duchy of official with experience of local administration and one close to the Earl of Derby, Houghton was well qualified for election as a knight for Lancashire, but there can be little doubt that when he was returned to Parliament early in 1533 he was not the man originally chosen as the senior knight, his name appearing over an erasure on the election indenture and being written in a different hand from the rest of the document. The tale does not end there. Over another, previous, erasure, where one would expect to find Houghton's name, is to be read the name of his eventual replacement, Sir Robert Worsley, written in a third hand almost certainly over traces of Houghton's name. The reason for Houghton's withdrawal is not clear. At the by-election it was said that he was 'not thought able to take

the travell to execute' his Membership, a phrase which may mean either that he was too ill to go to London or that illness struck him on his arrival there and prevented him from taking his seat in the House.

Thomas Hoghton was the son of Sir Richard de Hoghton. This is the younger Thomas, whose mother is Alice Morley, Richard's second wife. He married Anne Keighley, daughter of Henry Keighley.

He was killed 21 November 1589 at Lea Hall,Lancastershire, England in a notorious fight with Thomas Langton, Baron of Newton. Langton was wounded and arrested in bed. Henry Stanley, the 4th Earl of Derby was unable to prosecute Langton because he was unable to empanel a jury, so Langton and his accomplices were never tried. The Houghtons had a partial resolution to the matter when Langton alienated his manor of Walton to Thomas' son Sir Richard Hoghton, 1st Bt.

#### Notes for MP RICHARD HOUGHTON:

Sir Richard entertained King James I on his return from Sco tland atHoghton Tower in 1617. During his stay James like d his loin of beefso well that he took out his sword and "knighted" it naming it SirLoin (sirloin), which is what i t is called today. Previously it wascalled surloin.

Entertaining the King and his 600-800 retainers was so expensive thatRichard was bankrupt after the visit, even thoug h he got some rightsto mining interests from the King as a result of the visit. Apparently entertaining a king/qu een was so expensive that somenobles, upon hearing that t hey had been selected for a royal visitwould burn down part t of their manor house as an excuse for nothosting the King, figuring that it was cheaper to repair the housethan t o entertain the King and his company for a period.

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Sir Gilbert Hoghton of Hoghton Tower and the Civil Wars in Lancashire Author: Alan Radford, by Appointment Piper to Sir Gilbert H oghton,Bt.

Hoghton Tower is a large fortified house on a hilltop betwe en Prestonand Blackburn. It was built around a medieval pe le tower, which originally stood between the inner and oute r courtyards of the present house. The ancestral home of the de Hoghton family since the Norman Conquest, Hoghton Towe r is one of the most dramatic-lookinghouses in the North o f England. The present house was built almostentirely in the Elizabethan period and is reached by an impressivesteep, straight carriageway over half a mile long. Construction wascompleted by Thomas Hoghton in 1565, but he, a recusa nt, lived in itonly four years before fleeing to the Low C ountries, where he died.

Thomas's nephew Richard held rather more politically correct views, and earned the favour of James I, who made him a b aronet in 1611. Hestayed at Hoghton in 1617 before visiting the home of the Earl ofDerby, Lathom House, which was to be the site of the most heroicRoyalist defence in the whole of the Civil Wars. Sir Richard laid outthe red carpe t for James' visit for the entire length of the halfmile a venue leading to the house. The Banqueting Hall, with its Minstrel's Gallery, is where James I dubbed the loin of bee f 'Sirloin'in August 1617 and where previously William Sha kespeare had startedhis working life as a tutor. The hous e still contains the King'sBedchamber, Audience Chamber, B allroom and other staterooms used by King, the Duke of Buckingham and other nobles. There is also aTudor well h ouse with its horse-drawn pump and oaken windlass, theunde rground passages with dungeons, wine cellar and the stone c ellswhich housed malefactors and cattle thieves.

On the Sunday of the King's stay at Hoghton Tower he receiv ed apetition, signed principally by the Lancashire peasant s, tradespeopleand servants, representing that they were d ebarred from lawfulrecreations upon Sunday, after evenin g prayers, and upon holy days, and praying that the restric tions imposed by Commissioners in thereign of Queen Elizab eth against "pipers and minstrels playing, making and frequ enting bear-baiting and bull-baiting, on the Sabbathdays, or upon any other days in time of divine service; and als oupon superstitious ringing of bells, wakes and common fea sts; drunkenness, gaming and other vicious pursuits". The K ing declaredsuch restrictions incompatible with the privil ege of his subjects, and offered redress in the form of a p roclamation. This declarationformed the basis of "The Boo k of Sports" issued to all bishops in1618 to be read and p ublished in all parish churches. The subsequentre-issue of "The Book of Sports" by Charles I early in his reign, antagonising clergy and Parliament, was one of the root cause s of thesubsequent Civil Wars.

King James must have been impressed by the lavish welcome and thefeasting which followed. These honours were all ver y well, but as aresult of his great expenditure on enterta inment, aggravated by anoverdue mortgage on his alum mine s at Hoghton, Sir Richard becamebankrupt and was imprisone d for a time in Fleet Prison.

Sir Richard died in 1630, and was succeeded to the baronetc y by hisson Gilbert.

# Notes for EDWARD WINDSOR:

Edward entertained Queen Elizabeth I in great splendour at Bradenham in 1566, on her return from visiting the University of Oxford. A contemporary report records the Queen staying overnight at Great Hampden, progressing next day to Bradenham. The route from Great Hampden brought the party through Flowers Bottom, emerging onto the ridge top at Walters Ash. Records suggest the present Bradenham Woods Lane did not exist and the Queen's party descended down through a glade in the woodlands to reach the Manor. This glade is still preserved. On the following day, Her Majesty set out from Bradenham "with a large party of gentlemen, because of the thieves which infested these woods." The party passed "through some of the loveliest bits of primeval forest at Walters Ash, down Downley Common, through Tinkers Wood" to High Wycombe.(

Sir Richard entertained King James I on his return from Sco tland atHoghton Tower in 1617. During his stay James like d his loin of beefso well that he took out his sword and "knighted" it naming it SirLoin (sirloin), which is what i t is called today. Previously it wascalled surloin.

Entertaining the King and his 600-800 retainers was so expensive thatRichard was bankrupt after the visit, even thoug h he got some rightsto mining interests from the King as a result of the visit. Apparently entertaining a king/qu een was so expensive that somenobles, upon hearing that t hey had been selected for a royal visitwould burn down part t of their manor house as an excuse for nothosting the King, figuring that it was cheaper to repair the housethan t o entertain the King and his company for a period.

Hoghton Tower is a large fortified house on a hilltop betwe en Prestonand Blackburn. It was built around a medieval pe le tower, which originally stood between the inner and oute r courtyards of the present house. The ancestral home of the de Hoghton family since the Norman Conquest, Hoghton Towe r is one of the most dramatic-lookinghouses in the North o f England. The present house was built almostentirely in the Elizabethan period and is reached by an impressivesteep, straight carriageway over half a mile long. Construction wascompleted by Thomas Hoghton in 1565, but he, a recusa nt, lived in itonly four years before fleeing to the Low C ountries, where he died.

Thomas's nephew Richard held rather more politically correct views, and earned the favour of James I, who made him a b aronet in 1611. Hestayed at Hoghton in 1617 before visiting the home of the Earl ofDerby, Lathom House, which was t o be the site of the most heroicRoyalist defence in the whole of the Civil Wars. Sir Richard laid outthe red carpe t for James' visit for the entire length of the halfmile a venue leading to the house. The Banqueting Hall, with its Minstrel's Gallery, is where James I dubbed the loin of bee f 'Sirloin'in August 1617 and where previously William Sha kespeare had startedhis working life as a tutor. The hous e still contains the King'sBedchamber, Audience Chamber, B allroom and other staterooms used by King, the Duke of Buckingham and other nobles. There is also aTudor well h ouse with its horse-drawn pump and oaken windlass, theunde rground passages with dungeons, wine cellar and the stone c ellswhich housed malefactors and cattle thieves.

On the Sunday of the King's stay at Hoghton Tower he receiv ed apetition, signed principally by the Lancashire peasant s, tradespeopleand servants, representing that they were d ebarred from lawfulrecreations upon Sunday, after evenin g prayers, and upon holy days, and praying that the restric tions imposed by Commissioners in thereign of Queen Elizab eth against "pipers and minstrels playing, making and frequ enting bear-baiting and bull-baiting, on the Sabbathdays, or upon any other days in time of divine service; and als oupon superstitious ringing of bells, wakes and common fea sts; drunkenness, gaming and other vicious pursuits". The K ing declaredsuch restrictions incompatible with the privil ege of his subjects, and offered redress in the form of a p roclamation. This declarationformed the basis of "The Boo k of Sports" issued to all bishops in1618 to be read and p ublished in all parish churches. The subsequentre-issue of "The Book of Sports" by Charles I early in his reign, antagonising clergy and Parliament, was one of the root cause s of thesubsequent Civil Wars.

King James must have been impressed by the lavish welcome and thefeasting which followed. These honours were all ver y well, but as aresult of his great expenditure on enterta inment, aggravated by anoverdue mortgage on his alum mine s at Hoghton, Sir Richard becamebankrupt and was imprisone d for a time in Fleet Prison.

Sir Richard died in 1630, and was succeeded to the baronetc y by hisson Gilbert.

# Notes for II NICHOLAS STILLWELL:

"Nicholas Stillwell, whose origins can be traced back to Gu ilford, Surrey County in England, emigrated from Leyden i n Holland about1638, and after the death of his first wife, Abigail Hopton. Hebrought with him his only two childre n from his first marriage, Richard, born about 1636, and Ni cholas, born about 1638, and hesettled on Manhattan Island.

His great grandfather, John of Collampore (Colletmoor), Sur reyCounty, England, was born in 1515 and died in 1558. J ohn hadmarried Joana, a woman whose last name is unknown t o us. She died in 1585. They had five children, one of who m was also named John, bornin 1539, and who married Jane P earl, or perhaps Parle.

John Stillwell and Jane Pearl, the grandparents of Lt Nicho lasStillwell, had four children, the youngest of whom wa s NicholasStillwell, born in 1570 and died in 1607. His wi fe's name was Ales orAlyce, and they had a family of six c hildren, the fifth beingNicholas II, who was born about 16 03 and was the one who emigrated toAmerica and was known a s Lt Nicholas Stillwell.

Nicholas II took as his second wife Anna Van Dyke, by who m he had asissue

Ann, born 1639; Abigail or Alse, born 1645; William, born 1 656; Thomas, (christened 9 July 1651); Daniel (christened 1 3 November1653); Elias and Jeremiah (christened 13 Januar y 1662/63). We knownothing about Anna Van Dyke, except that she came from Holland. (Nottrue. Her parents were Thomas Jansen Van Dyke and Sytje Dircks. Theydid come from Holl and. RAJ)

The family eventually settled on the eastern shore of State n Island, where Nicholas died on the 28th day of December i n 1671.

The child named Abagail (Abigail)... married three times, f irst toSamuel, son of Obadiah Holmes, on 26 October 1665. In the legendary origins of the Stillwell name, it is said that thename can be traced to about the year 1450 and ca me from certainpeculiar wells or springs near Warborough i n Surrey County, England. They were called still-wells or h igh still-wells, and the name wasapplied to the members of the families and all their descendants wholived on the l ands in their vicinity. Among the peculiarities attribute d to these wells were the facts that they were still, deep ,pure and sparkling, and they never froze, all of which characteristics are said to have been preserved in the trait s and habits of the descendants of those who took their nam e and firstdrank of their waters."

### Notes for MAJOR EDWARD PALMES:

Edward Palmes (1638-1715) was born at Sherborn, Hampshire, England and was the son of Andrew Palmes. Edward and his brother Guy, for reasons unknown to this writer, abandoned the safety and comfortable life style of the aristocracy of England to settle in the wilderness and endure the hardships of the Colonies in 1658.

They settled first at New Haven, Connecticut where he worked as a "trader". He was listed as a member of the prestigious "Order Of The Twenty Nine" and in 1660 he moved from New Haven to New London, Connecticut to became chief of staff to Governor Winthrop. Later that year he married Lucy Winthrop, the second daughter of Governor John Winthrop. They resided at the Winthrop house, known as the old stone house, that was built in 1648. (Governor Winthrop willed this home to Edward and Edward in turn willed it to his daughter Lucy that was born in 1661.) Edward became a " freeman" of the colony in 1667. This meant that he could participate in the government of the colony and hold office. Edward Palmes was a Representative in the years 1671, 1672, 1673, 1674 and 1667 and was sent to England several times on missions for the Colonies and served under many appointments for the Crown.

Major Edward Palmes was often written about as a leader in conjunction with the history of the colonies and it was not always just his dignified actions. One example was the The "New London and Lyme Riot of 1670" that was lightheartedly called one of the "oddest battles" in colonial history. When the town of Lyme was incorporated in 1668, the colony granted a 2-mile strip of meadow land along the river " for the use of the ministry of that town ". Unfortunately, the same tract had also been used by the older town of New London for the same purpose. In August, 1670, thirty men from New London, led by Major Edward Palmes of the local militia ( some accounts say he was only along as a peacemaker) went to the meadow to cut grass for their minister where they were met and challenged by a mowing party from Lyme. "A good many hard words and some blows were exchanged, pitchforks were raised and rakes were drawn and battle pursued until the constables of both towns rushed in, and the parties were persuaded to suspend hostilities and take it to the courts. Griswold, Palmes and Waller agreed to let the matter be settled by the courts since no serious injuries were sustained on either side and drinking a dram together, with seeming friendship,

every man departed to his home". According to court records, at the county court in Hartford, various residents of Lyme and Lt. William Waller presented complaints against "The sundry of New London, for attempts by violence to drive them off their lands, resistance to authority, and assault ". Some accounts of the story say Palmes, Martin and Tillison were also charged with "riotous practices". On March 12, 1671, the court imposed fines against both towns and participants of the battle.

(There is an interesting and humorous footnote to this already ludicrous story that didn't happen until some thirty years later. In 1700 the governor ordered the Treasurer " to sue any persons that refuse to pay their just dues to the Colonies, and to make sale of any lands taken by distress from Maj Palmes, John Martin, and John Tillison." This makes me wonder if the men from New London, our ancestor Edward included, took their medicine gracefully and paid fine the court imposed or refused.

In 1672 Edward Palmes was appointed Captain of the company of troopers (horsemen) that was formed and was a Major in the Indian War in 1675 and was given the power of Magistrate for New London County by the General Court.

### The Indian Wars:

July 15, 1675, the Commissioners of the United Colonies negotiated a peace treaty with the Narragansett tribe which removed some danger to the settlers at Stonington, Connecticut; but during the summer, the Indians of other tribes attacked throughout Massachusetts and Rhode Island. On 18 Sept 1675 the settlers at Deerfield, Massachusetts were massacred. During the autumn the Naragansetts broke their pledge of peace, and the Indians concentrated their strength in Rhode Island and again threatened Eastern Connecticut. In Feb. 1676, 40 New London Co. volunteers with their Mohegan and Pequot allies raided the Narragansett country, killing 7 and capturing 13. March 27 a third expedition left Norwich, returning 10 Apr. On this campaign Canonchet, the Narragansett Chief was captured and brought to a council at Anguilla Plain. He bravely refused to submit to surrender to the English, and when told that he must die, he replied, "I like it well that I should die before my heart has grown soft and I have said anything unworthy of myself". He was executed in the Indian fashion by Oneko and two other Pequot sachems closet to his rank among his captors. Aug 12, 1676, King Philip chief of the Wampanciag Indians was killed by Massachusetts troop near Mt. Hope, Rhode Island, ending the war during which 13 towns had been destroyed, over 600 homes burned, and more than 750 English men, women and children killed.

Hubbard, the early historian of the Indian Wars wrote:

"The inhabitants of New London, Norwich and Stonington, apprehensive of their danger, by reason of the near bordering of the enemy, and upon other prudent considerations, voluntarily listed themselves under some able gentlemen and resolute soldiers among themselves, Major Palmes, Capt. George Denison, Capt. Avery, with whom or under whom, within the compass of 1676, they made ten or more several expeditions, in all of which at those several times, they killed and took two hundred and thirty-nine of the enemy by the help and assistance of the Pequots, Mohegans, and a few friendly Narragansetts; besides thirty taken in their long march homewards, after the fort fight, December 19, '75; and besides sixteen captivated in the second expedition, not reckoned within the compass of the said number; together with fifty guns and spoiling the enemy of an hundred bushels of corn."

The question of the ownership of the spoils of war came up often for discussion. (Two letters were written by Major Palmes to the council and are in the New London Records) He was concerned that items were not being returned to there rightful owners. In August, 1675: "The Councill agreed and ordered that the right and division of the captives be left to the decission and determination of Capt. John Mason, Capt. James Avery and Mr. Daniel Witherell, whoe are desired and empowered to disspose the said captiues, whither in hands of the Pequots, Moheags or Naragancetts, to such persons to whome of right they doe belong, according to the severall agreements as the claymers shall make their demands by."

After his wife Lucy died he married Sarah Davis, the widow of Captain John Davis, in 1677. They had two sons, Andrew 1678, and Guy 1682 both were born in New London. In 1704 Edward served as one of the commissioners that met at Stonington. After hearing the case between the Masons and the Mohegans, he denounced the colonies policy towards the Indians and accused the Colony of unjustly turning the Indians from their lands. He was also one of the commissioners appointed by King Charles I to administer the oath to Governor Leetle. Linda M. Marrone

Edward Palmes, son of Andrew Palmes was born in 1638 in Sherborn, Hampshire, England. Came to this country with his brother Guy in 1658 and was in trade with him in New Haven, Connecticut.

In 1660 Edward removed to New London, Conn and his brother Guy to Mystic, Conn. As the records in England show that Guy Palmes died unmarried. It is conclusive beyond question that from Edward Palmes all by the name of Palmes born since 1661 in the line of my tracing are descended.

Soon after settling in New London, Edward Palmes became very intimate with Governor Winthrop and family marrying his 2nd daughter Lucy. The Governor made Mr. Palmes his Chief of Staff and conferred other honors upon the young man nearly of which heartily approved. Mr. Palmes bought large holdings of real estate and eventually became quite wealthy for those days.

He was but 20 years of age, when he landed in New England, but many of his ? soon showed that they looked upon him to take the lead of affairs of importance in war and in peace and he filled his mission (history and old records assert) very creditably in every instance. We had no Ocean Greyhounds then - but he was sent to England several times on very important missions for the colonies and he served under many appointments for the crown as well, performing all duties judiciously and honestly. Governor Winthrops own homestead in 1660-61 passed into the occupancy of Edward Palmes who had married his daughter, Lucy. Mr. Palmes was of New Haven but after his marriage transferred his residence to the Winthrop homestead, which with the farm at Nahautic, the Governor subsequently confirmed to him by will.

In that document the estate is thus described The Stone house formally my dwelling house in New London with garden and orchard as formally conveyed to said Palmes and in his use and possession, with the yard or land lying to the north of the said house to join with James Rogers, also a lot of 6 acres lying east of th house bounded north by the ox pasture and east by the great river and having two great oak trees near the south line (ext from history pg 90). This stone house was built in 1648 near the head of the cove on the eastside, between the street and the water.

Major Palmes was made a freeman in 1667 and was a Representative 1671/2/3/4 and 7. Was Major in the Great Indian War in 1675. Was one of the commissioners appointed by King Charles to administer the oath to Governor Leete.

Mrs. Lucy Winthrop Palmes, 1st wife of Major Edward Palmes died November 24th, 1676. She belongs to New London, Connecticut but her death is not on record there. Neither is there any stone to her memory in the old burial ground by the side of her husband. It is therefore probable that she died abroad and from other circumstances it is inferred that this event took place in Boston, after the death of her father in 1676 (the same year). The family of Major Palmes was in Boston during the Indian troubles and as there were no railroads as now, no doubt she was buried there of necessity as was her father. Her mother also in Hartford, Conn. Some of the bodies later removed to England with the hostilities confronting the pioneers on every hand at that time, no doubt many a loved one was temporarily interred pending an intended early removal to the home church, family cemetery lot. But in their lives the opportunity never came.

Major Edward Palmes died March 21, 1715. Captain John Prentis 2nd died the same day. They were both buried under arms on the 23rd. Captain Prentis in the morning and Major Palmes in the afternoon. Mr. Palmes died on his farm at Nahautick but was brought into town (New London) for interment. Mr. Hempsteads diary notes the extreme severity of the weather at the time and says of him "He was well and dead in two and a half hours so ends a very eventful and most noble life. His grave stone states that he was in his 78th year, we may therefore place his birth in the year 1638 in England to where his ancestry can be traced back to the Naburn Hall large family estate as early as 1226.

He came of good old, well bred stock and his entire life of 78 years gave ample evidence of this fact. Major Edward Palmes in his day, was one of the greatest manages of men and public affairs (?) living in the colony of Connecticut without exception. Southeastern Connecticut, colonial history, without the name and hundreds of brave and noble deeds, performed by Major Edward Palmes, we would be very (?). He always had the confidence and esteem of the Crown for his sterling integrity and judgements. He was ever brave and fearless, always on the side of the oppressed were they white, red or black, and was universally beloved. I have in my little book dwelt upon the history at length, quoting the greater part from others, better qualified and giving due credit for the same. We all owe our being citizens of our beloved home state to him as our common father whether his lineal descendents or not. Of his record in the early settlement of what is now the state of Connecticut, we, his descendants should feel justly proud.

To come here as a lad of 20 years and at once begin to take the lead in every good work and keep it up to a a good old age, is the best evidence of a Master mind wholly self trained. May we, his loving descendants and others well profit by his noble example. He ever lived up to the Palmes family motto - "Ut Palma Justies" "As straight as a Palm."

Samuel Lynde was born in Saybrook, October 29, 1689, the elder son and second child of Nathaniel Lynde, a man of wealth and position in Saybrook, a son of the Hon. Simon Lynde, of Boston, and the brother of one Chief-Justice of Massachusetts, and uncle of another. As early as 1702 this Nathaniel Lynde had offered to the College a house and lot of land on Saybrook Point, if it would remove thither and remain; though the formal deed did not pass until 1708, it is probable that by the time his son graduated, the school was already established in this its second domicil. The graduate's mother was Susanna, only daughter of Deputy-Governor Francis Willoughby, of Charlestown, Massachusetts.

Samuel Lynde spent his life in his native town, engaged in business as a merchant, and also much employed with public duties. He was a justice of the peace from 1721, and in 1729 became judge of the New London County Court, so continuing until appointed in May, 1752, a judge of the Superior Court of the Colony, which office he held till his death. He represented the town in the General Assembly in May, 1724, and in eleven subsequent sessions, until in 1730 he was elected one of the Upper House, or Council, a position he retained until his death. He was also for many years (appointed in 1739) a colonel in the militia. From 1730 until his death he was one of the guardians or overseers of the Mohegan Indians.

He died of a fever, in Saybrook, September 19, 1754, in his 65th year, leaving an estate valued at over 11,000 pounds. The inventory includes about 230 books.

His first wife, Rebecca, daughter of Major John Clark, of Saybrook, to whom he was married April 4, 1710, died January 20, 1716. He had by her a son, Willoughby, who graduated at this College in 1732, but died before his father, leaving one son.

His second wife was Lucy, daughter of Major Edward Palmes, of New London, and widow of Samuel Gray, of the same town; she died December 27, 1737, leaving no children. He married again, widow Hannah Huntington of Norwich, who survived him.

Jonas Prescott settled in Groton, MA. He, or his father for him, built the mill in the south part of Groton, now within the limits of Harvard, MA. and is still called the "Old Mill." At a town meeting held in Groton, November 19th, 1673, it was voted that "By agreement of the town Jonas Prescott is to grind the town's corn for the town every second and every sixth day in every week. At a town meeting at Groton, June 13th, 1681, liberty was granted to Jonas Prescott to set up his corn mill at Stony Brook.

An agreement between Jonas Prescott and the town of Groton that he, the said Prescott, have liberty to set up a saw mill at Stony Brook on conditions that he furnished the town town with the merchantable boards at six pence a hundred feet cheaper than they are sold at any other saw mill, and for town pay, and that the town be supplied before any other person. (This privilege was to continue or cease at the pleasure of the town.)

John Prescott bought lands in Groton until he became one of the largest landholders in town. He was also a blacksmith. The town of Groton, being the great want of a blacksmith, invited Jonas Prescott to remove to near the center of the town to a lot of land which the town voted to give him as an inducement. He accepted the invitation and built the house and shop on said lot (lying on the east side of James Brook.) and removed (moved) there in 1675.

To be found on a large stone in a wall which encloses this farm can be seen an inscription(visible in 1866).

I. P. 1680 Rebuilt by O. P. 1784 Rebuilt by S. J. Park 1841.

The I. P. is for Jonas Prescott.

Upon the resettlement of the town, after the destruction by the Indians in 1676, he built mills and a forge for the manufacture of the iron from the ore at Forge Valley, which was then in Groton, but now in Westford. He was a man of extensive influence. He was town clerk in 1691; a selectman for several years; represented the town in the General Assembly in 1699 and 1705; was also captain in the militia and justice of the peace. He maintained an elevated rank in the community.

Notes for JOHN BYRON:

The eldest of seven sons of Sir John Byron (d. 1625), a member of an old Lancashire family which had settled at Newstead, near Nottingham. He was knighted in 1625 and sat as MP for Nottinghamshire in the parliaments of 1624 and 1628. Byron gained military experience in the Low Countries during the 1630s and in the Bishops' Wars 1639-40.

King Charles appointed him governor of the Tower of London in December 1641, but the House of Commons insisted upon his removal from this office early the following year.

Byron was active in the King's cause from the very beginning of the First Civil War. In August 1642 he attempted to fortify the city of Oxford in the King's name. At the approach of superior Parliamentarian forces, however, he made off with a quantity of college silver and withdrew to Worcester. Prince Rupert covered his withdrawal from Worcester to join up with the King's main army, resulting in the skirmish at Powick Bridge in September 1642. The following month Byron commanded a regiment of horse at the battle of Edgehill, at which all seven of the Byron brothers are said to have been present fighting for the King. Against orders, Byron joined the pursuit of the fleeing Parliamentarian horse which Prince Rupert and Lord Wilmot scattered in the opening stages, thus leaving the Royalists with no cavalry in the field for most of the battle.

Byron fought with greater distinction in July 1643 at the battle of Roundway Down, riding with Prince Maurice and Lord Wilmot to relieve Sir Ralph Hopton's beleagured army. Byron's charge shattered the Parliamentarian cavalry and greatly contributed to Sir William Waller's "dismal defeat". Byron also distinguished himself at the first battle of Newbury in September 1643, where his cavalry succeeded in gaining the summit of the Parliamentarian position on Round Hill before being driven back through lack of infantry support. In recognition of his services, King Charles created him Lord Byron of Rochdale in October 1643 and appointed him commander of Royalist forces in Lancashire and Cheshire.

Notes for ROBERT HUNTER:

General Robert Hunter (1664 - 1734) was colonial governor of New York and New Jersey from 1710 to 1720. A Scott, Hunter had been apprenticed to an apothecary before running away to join the British Army. He became an officer, married a woman of high rank. He was a man of business whose first address to the Assembly was barely 300 words long. In it, he told that "If honesty is the best policy, plainness must be the best oratory". Hunter was replaced by Peter Schuyler as acting governor from 1719 to 1720 and finally by William Burnet. Hunter was Lieutenant Governor of Virginia Colony and later Governor of New Jersey and Jamaica.

Notes for PRESIDENT WILLIAM HENRY HARRISON:

Was elected in 1840 over his predecessor Martin van Buren by a popular vote of 1,274,624 to 1,127,781 and an electoral vote of 234 to 60. Chose as vice-president John Tyler, who succeeded him after a single month in office. Was the oldest man to be elected president, the first to die in office, and served the shortest time as president.

"Give him a barrel of hard cider and settle a pension of two thousand a year on him, and my word for it," a Democratic newspaper foolishly gibed, "he will sit ... by the side of a 'sea coal' fire, and study moral philosophy. " The Whigs, seizing on this political misstep, in 1840 presented their candidate William Henry Harrison as a simple frontier Indian fighter, ? in a log cabin and drinking cider, in sharp contrast to an aristocratic champagne-sipping van Buren.

Harrison was in fact a scion of the Virginia planter aristocracy. He was born at Berkeley in 1773. He studied classics and history at Hampden-Sydney College, then began the study of medicine in Richmond.

Suddenly, that same year, 1791, Harrison switched interests. He obtained a commission as ensign in the First Infantry of the Regular Army, and headed to the Northwest, where he spent much of his life.

In the campaign against the Indians, Harrison served as aide-de-camp to General "Mad Anthony" Wayne at the Battle of Fallen Timbers, which opened most of the Ohio area to settlement. After resigning from the Army in 1798, he became Secretary of the Northwest Territory, was its first delegate to Congress, and helped obtain legislation dividing the Territory into the Northwest and Indiana Territories. In 1801 he became Governor of the Indiana Territory, serving 12 years.

His prime task as governor was to obtain title to Indian lands so settlers could press forward into the wilderness. When the Indians retaliated, Harrison was responsible for defending the settlements.

The threat against settlers became serious in 1809. An eloquent and energetic chieftain, Tecumseh, with his religious brother, the Prophet, began to strengthen an Indian confederation to prevent further encroachment. In 1811 Harrison received permission to attack the confederacy.

While Tecumseh was away seeking more allies, Harrison led about a thousand men toward the Prophet's town. Suddenly, before dawn on November 7, the Indians attacked his camp on Tippecanoe River. After heavy fighting, Harrison repulsed them, but suffered 190 dead and wounded.

The Battle of Tippecanoe, upon which Harrison's fame was to rest, disrupted Tecumseh's confederacy but failed to diminish Indian raids. By the spring of 1812, they were again terrorizing the frontier.

In the War of 1812 Harrison won more military laurels when he was given the command of the Army in the Northwest with the rank of brigadier general. At the Battle of the Thames, north of Lake Erie, on October 5, 1813, he defeated the combined British and Indian forces, and killed Tecumseh. The Indians scattered, never again to offer serious resistance in what was then called the Northwest.

Thereafter Harrison returned to civilian life; the Whigs, in need of a national hero, nominated him for President in 1840. He won by a majority of less than 150,000, but swept the Electoral College, 234 to 60.

When he arrived in Washington in February 1841, Harrison let Daniel Webster edit his Inaugural Address, ornate with classical allusions. Webster obtained some deletions, boasting in a jolly fashion that he had killed "seventeen Roman proconsuls as dead as smelts, every one of them."

Webster had reason to be pleased, for while Harrison was nationalistic in his outlook, he emphasized in his Inaugural that he would be obedient to the will of the people as expressed through Congress.

But before he had been in office a month, he caught a cold that developed into pneumonia. On April 4, 1841, he died--the first President to die in office--and with him died the Whig program. Copyright © 2001-2005, Tim Dowling email: tdowling\_53223@yahoo.com

Notes for FIRST LADY ANNA TUTHILL SYMMES:

Anna Harrison was too ill to travel when her husband set out from Ohio in 1841 for his inauguration. It was a long trip and a difficult one even by steamboat and railroad, with February weather uncertain at best, and she at age 65 was well acquainted with the rigors of frontier journeys.

As a girl of 19, bringing pretty clothes and dainty manners, she went out to Ohio with her father, Judge John Cleves Symmes, who had taken up land for settlement on the "north bend" of the Ohio River. She had grown up a young lady of the East, completing her education at a boarding school in New York City.

A clandestine marriage on November 25, 1795, united Anna Symmes and Lt. William Henry Harrison, an experienced soldier at 22. Though the young man came from one of the best families of Virginia, Judge Symmes did not want his daughter to face the hard life of frontier forts; but eventualy, seeing her happiness, he accepted her choice.

Though Harrison won fame as an Indian fighter and hero of the War of 1812, he spent much of his life in a civilian career. His service in Congress as territorial delegate from Ohio gave Anna and their two children a chance to visit his family at Berkeley, their plantation on the James River. Her third child was born on that trip, at Richmond in

September 1800. Harrison's appointment as governor of Indiana Territory took them even farther into the wilderness; he built a handsome house at Vincennes that blended fortress and plantation mansion. Five more children were born to Anna.

Facing war in 1812, the family went to the farm at North Bend. Before peace was assured, she had borne two more children. There, at news of her husband's landslide electoral victory in 1840, home-loving Anna said simply: "I wish that my husband's friends had left him where he is, happy and contented in retirement."

When she decided not to go to Washington with him, the President-elect asked his daughter-in-law Jane Irwin Harrison, widow of his namesake son, to accompany him and act as hostess until Anna's proposed arrival in May. Half a dozen other relatives happily went with them. On April 4, exactly one month after his inauguration, he died, so Anna never made the journey. She had already begun her packing when she learned of her loss.

Accepting grief with admirable dignity, she stayed at her home in North Bend until the house burned in 1858; she lived nearby with her last surviving child, John Scott Harrison, until she died in February 1864 at the age of 88.

## Notes for ANDREW PALMES: OBITUARY: Canandaigus April 27, 1846

Another Soldier Of The Revolution Gone. It is now seldom that we are called upon to record the departure, from among us, of any of those worthies of a bygone age, who took part in that glorious struggle which achieved our countries independence, Only a few of that band of patriots survive: and those few, like the last leaves of Autumn, withered and have awaited their allotted time, until they now tremble in the blast of life's winter-- having seemingly outlived the generation in which they belonged. But as one after another of this venerated few passes away to that silent home where his kindred in arms have gone before him, it is natural, as well as profitable for us to revert back, from the joyous present, to those days of gloom, when our Revolutionary sires toiled, and suffered, and bled, and died, for our and our countries welfare.

Andrew Palmes, a soldier of the Revolution, and the subject of this obituary notice, was born in the town of New London Connecticut, on the sixth day of May, 1755; the year after the commencement of the "French And Indian War " He had a twin brother, Samuel, whom he so much resembled, that even their mother could not distinguish one from the other, when they were dressed alike, except on close examination. Many anecdotes are related of each having been mistaken for the other, not only in youth, but even after they had grown up to manhood. When Andrew's children first saw their uncle, they supposed it was their own father and having just

returned from school they began the familiarities with him, when suddenly their father returned from an adjoining room. Completely astounded they ran to their mother, whom they accosted with " Mother! Mother! have we two fathers? " The brother Samuel, is believed to be still living in Connecticut, at the advanced age of ninety one years, but to return to our narrative, The father of the brothers died when they were but eleven years old, leaving a comfortable property for the widow and children, but which through mismanagement, was wasted; and at the age of fourteen Andrew was bound to learn the trade of shoemaking in his native village of New London. Here he remained until 1775, the commencement of the war of the Revolution; when fired with patriotic zeal on hearing the news of the battle of Lexington, he enlisted in the army for eight months, and immediately proceeded to join the American forces, then besieging the British in Boston. After expiration of his first term of service he enlisted a second time for a year. He was attached to one of the companies that took possession of Dorcheter Heights, on the memorable fourth of March 1776, and when the British were compelled to evacuate Boston, he proceeded with the Army to New York, and was stationed on Long Island, when the British fleet entered the Narrows, in August. Here he was engaged in several skirmishes with the enemy, after which he was taken sick, while on furlough at Stamford. He rejoined the Army at White Plains, but was soon after, again taken sick with the fever. His second term of enlistment expired at the close of 1776, and with it ended his land service.

He soon after enlisted into the sea service, under Lieut. Holt, of the Marines, with the promise of a serjeant's birth, on board the ship Warren. He proceeded to Boston to join his vessel, but she being unfinished, he was transferred to the Confederacy, a 36 gun frigate, then laying at New London. Some delay occurred in the sailing of this vessel. Mr.

Palmes at his own request was allowed to enter a privateer vessel of 16 guns, Captain Hezekiah Perkins commander. He continued in the privateer service nearly two years during which time he made many successful cruises principally to the West Indies, when in 1778, his vessel was captured by the British fleet, and taken into Port Royal, in the island of Jamacia. Here he was set at liberty, but soon after, with several other Americans was taken by one of the British press-gangs, and forced into the British service on board the Lion, a 74 gun ship, then laving at Kingston, and attached to the fleet of Admiral Byron. He took an unwilling, part with the English during the attack on the French island of St Lucia on the 13th of December, 1778; and also the engagement which soon followed between the fleets of Byron and D'Estaing. Mr. Palmes says that the Lion, on which he was compelled to serve, was engaged principally with the Languedoc, the flag ship of D'Estaing - - that the conflict was terrible - - and that the Lion had 53 men killed, and 300 wounded - - two of the killed, being at the same gun at which he was stationed. The Lion was so damaged that she with difficulty reached point Royal, but in ten days was ready for sea again. In company with several other vessels she then sailed on a cruise among the West India Islands, and captured one Dutch schooner, one French frigate, and nine American vessels, eight of which were from Connecticut. This was the most ungrateful service in which Mr. Palmes had been engaged; and soon after, in company with three other Americans he seized an opportunity for deserting, while the vessel was lying off the east end of the island of Cuba. during a dark night the Americans let themselves down from the vessel, determined to swim ashore or perish in the attempt, Mr. Palmes leading the way. The distance was so great that they were in the water several hours; and when they neared the shore they were several times washed back into the ocean by the receding waves. One poor fellow of the company, the best swimmer among them, found a watery grave; the other three, nearly exhausted, finally effected a landing; and in the darkness commenced their march towards the interior of the island, over the barren waste nearly destitute of clothing, without food or water. They soon met with two Irishmen, who had been sent on shore a day or two previous, for water, and had likewise deserted. The five traveled on together four days without finding anything to eat. On the fifth day they found twelve turtle eggs and a few plantains, which they divided amongst themselves, and greedily devoured. They finally reached a nigro plantation, where they were kindly treated, whence the negroes conducted them to the house of their master. Thence, they passed from one plantation to another, until they reached Havanna, where the Govenor ordered them to be arrested, on the suspicion that they were English spies; but after Mr.Palmes had been examined, through an interpreter, the whole party was released. An interesting incident occurred to Mr. Palmes at one of the plantation. An old negro woman, who spoke English, learning that he was American. told him that she also came from the same country. A few mutual inquiries showed the old woman had been bought up in New London, whence she had been stolen and carried to Cuba; and that she had nursed the twin brothers, Samuel and Andrew, in their infancy. Mr. Palmes says she was the property of Esq. Adams of New London, at the time she was stolen.

After remaining in Havanna a short time; Mr. Palmes enlisted on board an American privateer laying in the harbor. During the short cruise the privateer was successful in making two captures, and Mr. Palmes shared of the prize money was forty five dollars. But having contracted the fever and ague, he called on a physician, who he says, bled him, gave him an emetic and two doses of bark, and took all his money, except two half pistareens.

He soon after embraced an opportunity for returning to America, and in 1780 landed at Baltimore, sick and penniless. The vessel had encountered a terrible storm during the voyage, and was brought in under jury masts. At Baltimore he worked awhile at his trade, and received fifty dollars Continental money with which he started on foot for New London; being sick every other day with fever and ague. Occasionally he fell into the hands of tories, who he says were perfect land sharks, --- but by others he was treated kindly; -- sometimes a meal of victuals was given him and other times he paid for it exorbitantly. In one instance he paid eighteen dollars, continental money for breakfast. At Philadelphia, he says, his poor old frock was taken from him to pay a lodging bill; and that too, after he had been put into the third story, where a man had just died with small pox. Quoting his own language, as he often, in old age, recounted these events of his early life; and in memory " fought his battles o'er again," he says; " I was finally spared to see my mother. She had long before buried me -- but I came to her as one from the dead. Never did I forget her during my long campaign; and when wandering over the dreary sands of Cuba, and finally, on my homeward voyage, when we were driven by fierce winds, and all our mast were swept away, still hope never left me, and I expected again to see my country and my mother."

After his return to New London, he made several voyages, and continued in the service until peace was concluded, in 1782. He then -- went to Litchfield, in Connecticut, to reside; and during the same year, at the age of twenty seven, he married a wife, ten years younger than himself, by whom he became the father of a large family of children, and with whom he lived in undisturbed domestic happiness, to the time of his death, -- a period of sixty four years. His aged partner survives him. In 1820 he removed from Litchfield to the town of Richmond, in Ontario county, where he passed the remainder of his days. He died at the residence of his son-in-law, Wm. F Reed, Esq., on the 11th of April, 1846, at the advanced age of ninety, at the advanced age of ninety years, eleven months, and five days.

In all the relations of life Mr. Palmes sustained a character above reproach. as an affectionate husband, kind father, a firm friend, a cheerful and agreeable companion; an estimable citizen, -- but more than all, as a worthy CHRISTAIN, his many virtues will long be cherished in grateful remembrance by all who knew him -- COM.

Served in the ranks at the seige of Boston during the Revolutionary War. He enlisted later as a Marine, and while in the privateer service was captured, but he escaped after many perilous adventures and served to the close of the war. (Database: Daughters of the American Revolution Lineage Books (152 Vols).

Andrew's Naval Experience by M. Helen Palmes Moss. (From Book "B" Genealogy of the Paternal Ancestors and Descendants of Major Edward Palmes).

After the expiration of his first term of service he (Andrew) enlisted a second time for a year. He was attached to one of the companies that took possession of Dorchester Heights, on the memorable 4th of March 1776 and when the British were compelled to evacuate Boston, he proceeded with the Army to New York and was stationed in Long Island when the British fleet entered the narrows in August. Here he was engaged in several skirmishes with the enemy after which he was taken sick while on a furlough at Stanford. He rejoined the Army at White Plains, but was soon after again taken sick with bilions fever. His second term of enlistment expired at the close of 1776 and with it, ended his land service. He soon after enlisted into the sea served under Lieutenant Holt of the Marines with the promise of a Sergeants birth, on board the Ship Warren. He proceeded to Boston to join his vessel, but being unfinished he was transferred to the Confederacy a 36 gun frigate then lying at New London. Some delay occurring in the sailing of this vessel, Mr. Palmes, at his own request was allowed to enter a privateer vessel of (16) guns. Captain Hezerish Perkins commanding.

He continued in the privateer service nearly two years - during which time he made many successful cruises principally to the West Indias where in 1778 his vessel was captured by a British fleet and taken into Port Royal on the Island of Jamaica. Here he was set at liberty but soon after with other Americans, was taken by one of the British ? gangs and forced into the British service on board the "Lyon" a 74 gun ship then lying at Kingston and attached in the fleet of Admiral Byron. He took an unwilling fast during the attack on the french island of St. Lucia and in the memorable engagement between the fleets of Byron and D'Estaing. Mr. Palmes says that the Lion on which he was compelled to serve was former "Jolly" with the "Languadog" the flag ship of D'Estaing that the conflict was terrible and that the Lyon had fifty new men killed and 300 wounded, two of the men being at the same gun at which he was stationed. The Lyon was so damaged that she with difficulty reached Port Royal, but in 10 days was ready for sea again. In company with several other vessels she then sailed in a cruise among the West India Islands and captured (1) Dutch Schooner (1) French Frigate (9) American vessels (8) of which were from Connecticut. This was the most ungrateful service in which Mr. Palmes had been engaged and soon after in company with three other Americans, he seized an opportunity for deserting while the vessel was lying off the east end of the island of Cuba.

During a dark night the Americans very secretly let themselves down from the vessel determined to swim ashore or parish in the attempt. Mr. Palmes leading the way, the distance was so great that they were in the water a long time, and when they reached the shore they were several times washed back into the ocean by the receding waves, but four fellows of the company, the best swimmer among them, found a watery grave. The other three nearly exhausted finally effected a landing and in the darkness commenced their march toward the interior of the island over a barren waste, nearly destitute of clothing and without food or water. They soon met with two Irish men who had been sent on shore a day or two previous for water and had likewise deserted. The five travelled together four days without finding anything to eat. On the fifth day they found 12 turtle eggs and a few flautains which they divided amongst themselves and greedily devoured. They finally reached a negro plantation, where they were kindly passed from one plantation to another until they reached Havana where the Governor ordered them to be arrested on the suspicion that they were English spies, but after Mr. Palmes had been examined through and interpreter the whole party was released.

An interesting incident occurred to Mr. Palmes at one of the Plantations. An old negro woman, who spoke English learning he was an American, told him that she also came from the same country. A few mutual inquiries showed that the old woman had been stolen and carried to Cuba and that she had nursed the twin brothers Samuel and Andrew in their infancy. Mr. Palmes says she was the property of Esquire Adams of New London at the time she was stolen.

After remaining at Havana a short time Mr. Palmes enlisted onboard an American privateer lying in the harbor. During a short cruise the privateer was successful in making two captures and Mr. Palmes share of the prize money was (40) dollars. But having contracted the fever ?, he called on a Physician who he says bled him, have him an ermetic and two doses of bark and took all his money except two pristereens(sp). He soon after embraced an opportunity for returning to America and in 1780 landed at Baltimore sick and penniless except for a limited amount of almost worthless continental money. The vessel had encountered a terrible storm during the voyage and was brought in under jury masts.

At Baltimore he worked awhile at his trade and received fifteen dollars with which, including his small supply of continental money he started on foot for New London, Connecticut being sick every other day with fever and ?. Occasionally he fell into the hands of Tories whom he says, were perfect land sharks, but by others he was treated kindly. Sometimes a meal of viluals (sp) was given him and at other times he paid for it exorbitantly, in one instance, eighteen dollars continental money for breakfas

Denoting his own language was he often in his old age recounted these events of his early life and in his memory "fought his battles o'er again" he says I was finally spared to see my Mother. She had long before buried me but I came to her as one from the grave.

Brief summary of Andrew's long happy married life. A letter undated by Andrew Palmes.

"Never did I forget her during my long campaign and when wandering over the dreary sands of Cuba and finally in my homeward voyage, when we were driven by fierce winds all our mast were swept away. Still hope never left me and I expected again to see my country and my mother" Andrew Palmes, undated.

After reaching New London, he made several voyages and continued in the service until peace was declared in 1782. He then went to Litchfield, Conn, to reside and during the same year, at the age of 17, he married a wife of 17, by whom he became the father of a large family of children, and with whom he lived an undisturbed domestic happiness to the time of his death, a period of 64 years. In 1820 he removed to Richmond, Ontario County, New York where he passed the remainder of his days. he died at the residence of his son-in-law, William F. Reed, esq., on the 11th day of April 1846 at the advanced age of ninty years, 11 months and five days.

In all the relations of life, Mr. Palmes sustaiend a character beyond reproach. As an affectionate father, a firm friend, a cheerful and agreeable companion, an estimable citizen, but more than all as a most worthy Christian, his many virtues will long be cerished in grateful remembrance by all who knew him.

Susan Palmes, 10th child of Andrew and Sally Mattocks Palmes was born in Litchfield, Connecticut, July 21, 1808. She was the baby daughter of that large family of children, 8 girls and 3 boys. After all the others had married and gone to homes of their own, she (?) offers of husband and home stayed by her aged parents, giving them the best of loving care and in their declining years.

Mrs. Helen Palmes Moss, her niece, says of her. "Susan was a devoted daughter, sacrificing her own happiness that she might care for the father and mother who so depended upon her, refusing advantageous offers of marriage while they lived and then death occurred so late in life that Susan's chances for home and husband was gone. She yielded to my fathers wish that she come to Dansville for the remainder of her days, where, he, her only living brother could care for her. She had been alone so much, her wish was granted that she have her own little home near Edward. She was carefully looked after until her death. I was at home then - two years before I came west. I used to stay days with her, during her brief illness while father stayed nights - was devoted to her and near her constantly, expecting her death hourly, leaving the room for a brief moment, we found on our return she had passed away. It seemed pathetic that the lonely life must also be a sacrificing woman as she was.

My father was the youngest child and Susan's baby brother and in early childhood her constant companionship and playmate. It was only natural they should love each other and as she instilled herself early in life as Mistress of the home and family (using no authority) she was ever, without dissent acknowledged the loving presiding spirit and gentle mistress and best of all the willing, toiling caretaker at every meeting and reunion, under the home roof. We buried her by my mother and sister Francis side and now (?) the "baby brother" she so loved has been carried back from his adopted western home to his "own country" and there buried by the side of his loved ones, it is fitting that his oldest living daughter should speak kindly words for the deal old Auntie. She died in Danville, New York September 2, 1872. "Blessed are the pure in heart".

Notes for THOMAS HOOPER:

According to old records Thomas Hooper who lived near Windsor in New Jersey owned 100 acres of land, and two smaller pieces of ten acres each which he bought from his father, Clement. The deed was dated October 8, 1769. Fourteen acres quite near the other property was dated January 25, 1775. With the death of his father in 1778 he received the home plantation as well as the "Meadow in Maidenhead" in Huntendon County which he shared with his brother, James. The home plantation consisted of a tavern as well as farming land.

Thomas, a Loyalist, was subjected to much harassment. Soldiers ransacked his house, smashed his furniture and took his livestock. After conversing with his friend Richard Robins, they decided to travel to Nova Scotia where they heard there was free land allotted to subjects loyal to the crown. They arrived in Nova Scotia in the spring carefully examining different places there, and in the Island of St John too. Thomas was quite pleased with the island and decided to settle there. Returning to Nova Scotia, he left from Shelbourne on the 29 July for New York.

Upon his arrival in New Jersey, he found his wife and two children sick with fever. He planned to move his family to the Island that fall, but had to change his plans. He left home for the long trek back to Shelburne. He worked in the Port saving his money for his new home. He returned to New Jersey, but again disaster had struck. It is said the soldiers had returned, and not finding Thomas, they took their revenge. Again they ransacked his house, finding Thomas' wife in bed, recovering from the birth of a baby, they took the bed from under her, assaulted her and subjected her to cruel indgnities. She was removed to an outhouse but died shortly after.

Thomas made preparations to sell his possessions in New Jersey and left the girls in charge. They had the care fo the baby, Elisha. Major and Tommy accompanied their father to the Island. Upon their arrival in Charlotte Town they presented a memorial to Governor Patterson. They petitioned hime for land which was being granted to refugees. A month later the heard from the Governor who granted Hooper, Robins and Schurman, land in Township No. 1 containing 1250 acres, which was the western division of the half of the Lot No 26. The following rates applied: the first year 2 pence for each acre granted, 2nd year 4 pence, third year 6 pence and the fourth year 8 pence and so on. Hooper and Schurman had six months to apply for the grants. It was also stated that if they applied within a year to purchase the land, they would be able to do so for two Spanish dollars for each acre.

Land records for New Jersey show 100 acres near Windsor dated October 08, 1769 and 20 acres was bought from Clement Hooper. 14 acres dated January 25, 1775. With the death of his father, Clement, in 1778, Thomas received the home plantation as well as the 'Meadow in Maidenhead" in Huntendon County which was shared with brother James. The home plantation consisted of a tavern as well as farming land.

Lawrenceville, situated on the road, midway between Trenton and Princeton, was originally called Maidenhead and, as such, is mentioned in all the records prior to 1816, when the present name was adopted. That this was an old settlement is evidenced by the fact that as early as 1698, a Presbyterian Church was established within its borders, while in 1714, the first court of Hunterdon County was held there. When the British occupied Trenton and Princeton, early in the Revolution, this village being on the common highway between these places, was the scene of many skirmishes between their foraging parties and bands of unorganized patriots. While there were several taverns at Maidenhead (Lawrenceville) during the latter part of the eighteenth century, it is difficult at the present day to identify some of their locations.

... And to be sold on 5th May at the house of Okey Hendrickson, innkeeper, Haights Town: a tract of 330 acres in Windsor late of Oliver Delancey; and a house and lot of 80 acres in Windsor, near Assanpink, kept as a tavern for many years, part of the forfeited estate of Thomas Hooper.

Notes for JAMES BROWN: James Brown (1800 - 1855) was an American publisher and co-founder of Little, Brown and Company.

Brown was born in Acton, Massachusetts. He and Charles Coffin Little, both former clerks, became partners in a Boston bookstore.

Founded in 1837 as Charles C. Little and James Brown, Augustus Flagg joined them in 1838 and would become managing partner after the deaths of the two founders.

The firm's name was changed to Little, Brown and Company in 1847.[1] In 1853 Little, Brown began publishing the works of British poets from Chaucer to Wordsworth. There were ninety-six volumes published in the series in five years, but Brown did not live to see its completion.

His son John Murray Brown took over when Flagg retired in 1884.

#### Notes for JOHN MURRAY BROWN:

Little, Brown and Company is a publishing house established by Charles Coffin Little and his partner, James Brown. The company traces its history back to a bookstore founded by Ebenezer Battelle in 1784, Marlborough Street, Boston. Little and Brown, partners in the bookstore and former clerks, founded their company in 1837 (as Charles C. Little and James Brown), and were joined a year later by Augustus Flagg, who took over as managing

partner after the death of Little in 1869 (James Brown had died in 1855). In 1847 the firm's name was changed to Little, Brown and Company.

The firm initially specialized in legal treatises and imported titles. Even so, in the early years Little and Brown published William H. Prescott's Ferdinand and Isabella, Jones Very's first book of poetry (edited by Ralph Waldo Emerson), Letters of John Adams and works by James Russell Lowell and Francis Parkman. In 1853 Little, Brown began publishing the works of British poets from Chaucer to Wordsworth. There were ninety-six volumes published in the series in five years.

In 1859 John Bartlett became a partner in the firm. He held the rights to his Familiar Quotations, and Little, Brown published the 15th edition of the work in 1980, 125 years after its first publication.

John Murray Brown, James Brown's son, took over when Augustus Flagg retired in 1884. In the 1890s Little, Brown expanded into general publishing, including fiction. In 1896 it published Quo Vadis. In 1898 Little, Brown purchased a list of titles from the Roberts Brothers firm. This brought Edward Everett Hale, Helen Hunt Jackson and Louisa May Alcott into association with the firm.

John Murray Brown died in 1908 and James W. McIntyre became managing partner. When McIntyre died in 1913, Little, Brown incorporated. In 1925 Little, Brown entered into an agreement to publish all Atlantic Monthly books. This arrangement lasted until 1985. During this time the joint Atlantic Monthly Press/Little Brown imprint published James Truslow Adams's The Adams Family, Charles Nordhoff and James Norman Hall's Mutiny on the "Bounty" trilogy, James Hilton's Goodbye, Mr. Chips, Walter D. Edmonds's Drums Along the Mohawk, William Least Heat-Moon's Blue Highways, and Tracy Kidder's The Soul of a New Machine.

Other prominent authors published by Little, Brown in the 20th and early 21st centuries have included Donald Barthelme, Catherine Drinker Bowen, Hortense Calisher, Bruce Catton, A. J. Cronin, Peter De Vries, J. Frank Dobie, Sarah Dunant, John Feinstein, C. S. Forester, John Fowles, Malcolm Gladwell, Pete Hamill, Lillian Hellman, Oliver Wendell Holmes, Sr., Henry Kissinger, Elizabeth Kostova, Norman Mailer, William Manchester, Nelson Mandela, John P. Marquand, Masters and Johnson, Stephenie Meyer, Rick Moody, Ogden Nash, Edwin O'Connor, Erich Maria Remarque, J. D. Salinger, Alice Sebold, David Sedaris, George Stephanopoulos, Gore Vidal, Bob Vila, David Foster Wallace, Evelyn Waugh, P. G. Wodehouse and Herman Wouk. Little, Brown also published the photography of Ansel Adams.

The imprint was purchased by Time Inc. in 1968, and was made part of the Time Warner Book Group when Time merged with Warner Communications to form Time Warner in 1989. In 2006, the Time Warner Book Group was sold to French publisher Hachette Livre, and the imprint is now used by Hachette Livre's U.S. publishing company, Hachette Book Group USA.

In May 2006, the publishing company received some bad publicity over the plagiarism allegations levied towards Kaavya Viswanathan regarding her book How Opal Mehta Got Kissed, Got Wild, and Got a Life. The negative press was short lived as allegations focused squarely on Viswanathan however.

The Time Warner Book Group was purchased by the French media concern Lagardere in March of 2006 and the company was re-branded as Hachette Book Group USA (HBG). HBG has since focused on expanding and streamlining its publishing processes while refining their advanced distribution business. The distribution business provides fully scalable order-to-cash solutions to a number of publishers by way of a sophisticated warehousing infrastructure in Indiana and operations center in Boston. Little, Brown and Company remains a strong division of HBG, publishing books in hardcover and in paperback under its Back Bay Books imprint.

In 1831 Mary Randolph Custis married Robert E. Lee at Arlington with Marie Caroline Goldsborough as one of the bridesmaids. They spent the first days of their honeymoon at Ravensworth. Robert E. Lee always considered this house a haven as had his mother, and often returned to visit when he needed strength and courage. Anna Marie administered the estate until she died in 1874. She left it to Mary Custis Lee with the following preface to the will: "In the earlier days of my trials and affliction when I was about to act as executrix to her Uncle's estate she very generously gave up some things to which she was entitled by his will, thereby enabling me to act with much more ease and comfort which has proved very beneficial to the estate. It is not my desire or intention that she should lose by this, on

the contrary I shall be enabled to leave her more than could have been saved under previous arrangement, and it is a source of great gratification to me to believe that her affectionate liberality and disinterestness will be thus rewarded." Mary Lee partitioned her inheritance among her six children and the land was gradually sold though the house remained in the Lee family until it was mysteriously and tragically destroyed by fire in 1925. The ruins are still visible.

REF: Virginia: History and Guide by Tim Mulligan Random House, 1986 p. 19: Washington Custis' only surviving child was a daughter, Mary Anna Randolph Custis, called the heiress of Arlington. In 1831 she married her third cousin once-removed, Robert E. Lee. Lee loved the estate and came to consider it his home. "My other place in the world," he wrote---when his father-in-law died in 1857, he took what became a two-year leave of absence from the army to put the estate in order.

Charles Grey, 2nd Earl Grey, KG, PC (13 March 1764 – 17 July 1845), known as Viscount Howick between 1806 and 1807, was a British Whig statesman and Prime Minister.

Descended from a long-established Northumbrian family seated at Howick Hall, Grey was educated at Eton and Trinity College, Cambridge, and was elected to Parliament at the age of 22 in 1786. He became a part of the Whig circle of Charles James Fox, Richard Brinsley Sheridan, and the Prince of Wales, and soon became one of the major leaders of the Whig party. Grey was noted for advocating Parliamentary reform and Catholic emancipation. His affair with the Duchess of Devonshire, herself an active political campaigner, did him little harm although it nearly caused her to be divorced by her husband.

In 1806 Grey, now Lord Howick due to his father's elevation to the peerage as Earl Grey, became a part of the Ministry of All the Talents (a coalition of Foxite Whigs, Grenvillites, and Addingtonites) as First Lord of the Admiralty. Following Fox's death later that year, Howick took over both as Foreign Secretary and as leader of the Whigs.

The government fell from power the next year, and Howick went to the Lords the same year, succeeding his father as Earl Grey. He continued in opposition for the next 23 years.

In 1830, the Whigs finally returned to power, with Grey as Prime Minister. His Ministry was a notable one, seeing passage of the Reform Act 1832, which finally saw the reform of the House of Commons, and the abolition of slavery throughout the British Empire in 1833. As the years had passed, however, Grey had become more conservative, and he was cautious about initiating more far-reaching reforms. In 1834 Grey retired from public life, leaving Lord Melbourne as his successor.

Earl Grey tea is named after Grey. He is commemorated by Grey's Monument in the centre of Newcastle upon Tyne, which consists of a statue of Lord Grey standing atop a 41 m (135 ft) high column. The monument lends its name to Monument Metro station on the Tyne and Wear Metro located directly underneath. Grey also gave his name to Grey College, one of the constituent colleges of the University of Durham.

Grey married Hon. Mary Ponsonby, only daughter of William Ponsonby, 1st Baron Ponsonby of Imokilly in 1794. They had thirteen children, including:

Louisa Elizabeth Grey (1797–1841) married John Lambton, 1st Earl of Durham Henry George Grey, 3rd Earl Grey (1802–1894) General Sir Charles Grey (1804–1870), father of Albert Grey, 4th Earl Grey Admiral George Grey (1809–1891)

Earl Grey tea is a tea blend with a distinctive flavour and aroma derived from the addition of oil extracted from the rind of the bergamot orange, a fragrant citrus fruit.

Traditionally the term "Earl Grey" was applied only to black tea; however, today the term is also applied to both green and white teas that contain oil of bergamot.

The Earl Grey blend is named after the 2nd Earl Grey, British Prime Minister in the 1830s, who reputedly received a gift, probably a diplomatic perquisite, of tea flavoured with bergamot oil. The legend usually involves a grateful Chinese mandarin whose son was rescued from drowning by one of Lord Grey's men, although this blend of tea was first made from fermented black Indian and Ceylon teas. As green tea is much more popular in China than black tea, it seems somewhat unlikely that they would have had a recipe for what we now call Earl Grey to bestow on visitors, though over the years many other varieties of tea have been used. In addition, Lord Grey never set foot in China. Another version of the legend has the son of an Indian raja being rescued from a tiger by one of Grey's servants.

The tea proved so popular in the Prime Minister's drawing room that his tea merchants, Twinings in the Strand, were given a sample and asked to come up with a close match. Twinings sold the first "Earl Grey's tea" in the British market. Twinings Earl Grey blend includes China tea, Indian Darjeeling, Ceylon, and a hint of Lapsang souchong, a strong, "smoky" black tea. Although it is often served black (without milk), it can be taken with a little milk (which lightens the colour of the drink to a greyish tone).

Jacksons of Piccadilly claim that it was they who originated Earl Grey's Tea, Lord Grey having given the recipe to Robert Jackson & Co. partner George Charlton in 1830; according to Jacksons the original recipe has been in constant production and has never left their hands. Theirs has been based on China tea since the beginning. This rivalry between the two brands continues despite both being owned by the same parent company today.

## Earl Grey tea trivia

Earl Grey tea was the favourite tea of Douglas Adams, author of The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy series.[1] It was also the favourite drink of Grant McLennan, of the band The Go Betweens.

Both himself and wife have fine social qualities, and take a zealous interest in the social welfare of Bakersfield, aiding with open hearts and hands all worthy charitable objects.

Regimental History MINNESOTA SIXTH INFANTRY (Three Years)

Sixth Infantry .-- Cols., William Crooks, John T. Averill; Lieut.-Cols., John T. Averill, Hiram P. Grant; Majs., Robert N. McLaren, Hiram S. Bailey. This regiment was organized at Fort Snelling in the summer of 1862. Capt. A. D. Nelson was first selected as colonel of the regiment, but as he was a West Pointer and had been in the service 23 years, the conditions placing him under a civilian, Col. H. H. Sibley, was not to his taste and he resigned, William Crooks being appointed in his stead. The regiment was mustered in by companies. Four companies were ordered to Fort Ridgely on receipt of the news of the Indian uprising and Lieut.-Col. Averill took command. Col. Crooks went to St. Peter to complete the organization of the regiment. Such force as was ready, including several companies of the 6th regiment and such civilians as would join, was started for Fort Ridgely. Co. A was detached as a burial party, 2 volunteers from each of the other companies assisting together with a detachment of citizen cavalry. The burial party went into camp at Birch Coolie and was attacked by 500 Indians about 4 o'clock next morning. The engagement was brisk until 10 o'clock, when the Indians ceased firing. The attack was renewed and on the following morning Col. Sibley and Col. McPhaill came to the rescue, using artillery with good effect in driving away the Indians. Twenty-three were killed, 45 wounded, and all the horses (87) had been killed. The regiment was in the battle at Wood Lake, part being in reserve to defend the rear of the camp. Cos. A and F took position on a ridge overlooking a ravine in which many Indians were concealed and assisted materially in driving the enemy from the field with

heavy loss. Cos. A, B, F and G were mustered in Oct. 1, C, Oct. 3, D, Sept. 29, E, Oct. 5, H, Nov. 20, I, Oct. 4, K, Oct. 10, all at Camp Release except H, which was mustered in at Fort Snelling. A force of Indians opposed to Little Crow having surrendered, Cos. D and F were detailed to guard them to Yellow Medicine and Co. G formed part of a detachment sent out to scour the country. Later Cos. A, B, G, H and K were stationed at Fort Snelling; C, F and I at Glencoe; D at Forest City and E at Kingston. In February A, G and K were sent to Glencoe: B to Forest City; C, D, F and I to Fort Snelling; E to Clearwater and H to Kingston. In April the regiment assembled at Camp Pope. In June it marched towards Devil's Lake, reached Camp Atchison July 18, where a temporary camp was established and Cos. C and G were left as guard, with the sick and feeble in their care. The remainder of the regiment was in the engagements at Big Hills, Dak., Stony Lake and at the Missouri river where the enemy's camp equipage was captured and destroyed. The regiment returned to Fort Snelling Sept. 12, and was detached by companies for the winter of 1862-63 to various points. Cos. D, E, and H were designated to accompany an expedition to Fort Thompson, where the captured Indians were to be located and supplies furnished. They reached the fort Dec. 2 and the return trip was made on half rations in bitter cold weather, through deep snow, the detachment reaching headquarters about Jan. 1, 1864, Capt. Whitney in command, was court martialed on a charge of disobedience of orders, preferred by Gen. Sully, because he declined to go into camp at Fort Randall, en route, but the captain was acquitted, being under Gen. Sibley's command at the time. After long and persistent efforts the regiment was ordered South. It left the state on June 14, 1863, and went to Helena, Ark., after having been assigned to the 1st brigade, 1st division, 2nd army corps. The reason for the change is not known, but it was a bitter disappointment to be compelled to take up garrison duty after endeavoring for two years to get to the front. The results of forcing a regiment from the extreme north to such a diseaseproducing climate and keeping it there inactive was seen too late. The regiment landed June 23, 940 strong, and on July 31, 17 officers and 445 men were on the sick list; a month later 14 officers and 487 men were sick: by the last of September 16 officers and 638 men reported sick: and during these three months 54 died of disease. So the record continued, the regiment diminishing in numbers as the ill were ordered north. At one time, for two weeks, but 26 men reported for duty, many being ill but not in hospital. Six hundred were sent north to hospitals and in October the regiment was ordered to St. Louis, where it performed provost guard duty from Nov. 11, 1864, to Jan. 29, 1865. It then was sent to New Orleans and in March to Chalmette, where it was assigned to the 2nd brigade, 2nd division, 16th army corps. It landed at Dauphin island on the 8th, was in sharp skirmishing about Fort Blakely, and with its corps captured the fort on the 9th, receiving high commendations for its conduct. It then moved to Montgomery, Ala., where it remained until July, and was mustered out at Fort Snelling Aug. 19, 1865.

Birch Coolie, Minn. Sept. 1-2, 1862

Minnesota Volunteers.

The affair at Birch Coolie was an incident growing out of the Sioux uprising.

Maj. Brown, with a detachment of the 6th infantry, was sent to the Lower Agency to bury the bodies of those massacred by the Indians. As he was returning to Fort Ridgely he encamped on the evening of Aug. 31 near the long ravine known as Birch Coolie.

Here he was surrounded during the night by a large body of Indians and kept in a state of siege until relieved by Gen. Sibley on the 3rd. The whites lost 25 killed and a number wounded. The Indian loss was much larger.

Wood Lake, Minn., Sept. 23, 1862.

Expedition under Brig.-Gen. Henry H. Sibley.

At 7 a. m. Sibley's camp at Wood Lake, near Yellow Medicine, was attacked by about 300 Indians. The Renville Guards were sent out to meet them and the skirmishers of the 7th Minn. infantry cooperating with the guards managed to hold them in check.

Another portion of the Indians passed down a ravine with the object of outflanking the 3d Minn., but five companies of the 7th and two of the 6th Minn. were sent to reinforce the 3d, and Lieut.-Col. William R. Marshall of the 7th led a charge which cleared the ravine.

Another Indian detachment attempted to gain the rear of the camp but was repulsed. On finding themselves repulsed at all points the red men withdrew, leaving 14 of their dead on the field.

Four of the soldiers were killed and between 35 and 40 wounded.

He ordered the men to make defensive preparations, which many had already accomplished. In the face of enemy, Sibley now resumed his march. The Sioux searched for weak points in the soldiers position. Finding none, the Sioux rode off at great speed, preventing pursuit. The Sioux had hoped to halt Sibley's advance but were unable to do so. Sibley remarked in his report that Stony Lake was "the greatest conflict between our troops and the Indians, so far as the numbers were concerned."

Sheer numbers breached the Confederate earthworks compelling the Confederates to capitulate. The siege and capture of Fort Blakely was basically the last combined-force battle of the war. African-American forces played a major role in the successful Union assault.

Notes for EDWARD SAMUEL PALMES:

Quoted from Deacon Edward S. Palmes. From "Book B" Genealogy of the Paternal Ancestors and Descendants of Major Edward Palmes, who emigrated to this country in 1659 by Henry Russel Way, Hartford, Connecticut.

"I was the youngest of a family of (3) sons and (8) daughters, all born in Litchfield, Connecticut. I was the Benjamin of the family, the son of father's old age, he being (54) when I was born. My earliest recollection of him are, as an old man with hair thick, bushy and white as snow. When I was (16) sixteen, father almost (70), he and I were at work at the rear end of the farm. Father said "Ed, let's run a race to the house, if you win I will give you the homestead". Off we started; he stepped so high and so awkwardly, I got to laughing so I fell down and thus lost the race and did not get the homestead".

He and my mother were both members of Doctor Beechers Church, and Henry Ward Beecher, myself and the these incorrigibles of the community used to occupy the front seat of the old sanctuary, directly under the surveillance of the worthy old Doctor himself - when my father moved to Richmond I was then (9) years old and the long sleigh ride from Litchfield, Connecticut to Canada, New York is one of my pleasant recollections.

It was after settling down to farm life in the old log house in Western New York that father's revolutionary stories began to make an impression on me. With Sister Susan on one knee and myself on the other, he would sit before the big fire place and with a pitcher of cider (with just a little red pepper in it) warming in the hearth, would sing - "My name was Captain Kidd as I sailed as I sailed" then the genial warmth of the back coupled with the mild influence of the cedir cleared away the mists of years and brought back recollection of long ago - he would relate reminiscence of Revolutionary days that are clear to my mind as if it were but yesterday.

All my brothers and sisters have passed away and I alone am left - it seems to me that I am a sort o' rusty link connecting the past with the present - but never mind it will be all right some time."

From M. Helen Palmes Moss -

"Since relating the above, the dear father has joined the circle of dear ones "gone before", having passed away on February 27, 1891. No longer the "rusty link of the past" but a rounding up of the circle "the whole made perfect"".

His personal recollections of the old Revolution anytimes which father has often related to me in time, past, is a pleasing memory and stands as a monument to the perils and privations of those troublesome times - A few summers ago when I visited the old burial ground and stood at the grave of my grandfather reading on his single tombstone "Andres Palmes, a soldier of the Revolution" I more fully appreciated the value of these written words of my father." Notes for 26TH VICE PRESIDENT USA CHARLES WARREN FAIRBANKS: Charles Warren Fairbanks (May 11, 1852 – June 4, 1918) was a Senator from Indiana and the twenty-sixth Vice President of the United States.

Born in a log cabin near Unionville Center, Ohio, Fairbanks' ancestry traced back to Oliver Cromwell, with Jonathan Fayerbankes the first family member to reach America in 1636. The son of a wagon-maker, Fairbanks' formative years saw his family's home used as a hiding place for runaway slaves. After attending country schools and working on a farm, Fairbanks left for Ohio Wesleyan University, where he graduated in 1872. While there, Fairbanks served as co-editor of the school newspaper with Cornelia Cole, whom he married after both graduated from the school.

Fairbanks' first position was as an agent of the Associated Press in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, reporting on political rallies for Horace Greeley during the 1872 U.S. Presidential election. Fairbanks then moved to Cleveland, Ohio, where he briefly attended law school before his admittance to the Ohio bar in 1874, then moved to Indianapolis, Indiana the same year.

During his early years in Indiana, Fairbanks was paid \$5,000 a year after being appointed manager for the bankrupt Indianapolis, Bloomington and Western Railroad. With the assistance of his uncle, Charles W. Smith, whose connections had helped him obtain the position, Fairbanks was able to parlay his position into a lucrative role as a railroad financier, including serving as counsel for millionaire Jay Gould.

Prior to the 1888 Republican Convention, federal judge Walter Q. Gresham sought Fairbanks' help in seeking the nomination for U.S. President. While the bid was ultimately unsuccessful, Fairbanks began to take an even greater interest in politics, falling short in a campaign for the United States Senate in 1893.

He was elected as a Republican to the United States Senate in 1896, after having delivered the keynote address during the convention that nominated William McKinley for President.

During his eight years in the U.S. Senate, Fairbanks served as a key adviser to McKinley during the Spanish-American War and was also the Chairman of the Committee on Immigration and the Committee on Public Buildings and Grounds. In 1898, Fairbanks was appointed a member of the United States and British Joint High Commission which met in Quebec City for the adjustment of Canadian questions.

He was elected Vice President of the United States in 1904 on the Republican ticket with Theodore Roosevelt and served all four years. In something of a surprise, Roosevelt chose William Howard Taft as his potential successor four years later, sending Fairbanks back to the practice of law.

In 1912, Fairbanks was in charge of establishing the platform for the Republican party, then four years later, sought the Republican presidential nomination. While he failed in that bid, he did win the nomination for vice president under Charles Evans Hughes on June 10. Five months later, Hughes and Fairbanks lost a close election to the Democratic incumbents Woodrow Wilson and Thomas Marshall. Although unsuccessful, it should be noted however that Fairbanks was the second of two former Vice Presidents to be nominated by his party for his former office. (The other being Democrat Adlai E. Stevenson in 1900.)

Fairbanks once again resumed the practice of law in Indianapolis, but his health started to fail in the year prior to his death. He was interred in Crown Hill Cemetery.

The city of Fairbanks, Alaska within Fairbanks North Star Borough, Alaska is named after him.

## Notes for ARTHUR WILLIAM FOOTE:

Arthur Foote (5 March 1853 – 4 April 1937) was an American classical composer, and a member of the "Boston Six." The other five were George Whitefield Chadwick, Amy Beach, Edward MacDowell, John Knowles Paine, and Horatio Parker.

The modern tendency is to view Foote's music as "Romantic" and "European" in light of the later generation of American composers such as Aaron Copland, Roy Harris and William Schuman, all of whom helped to develop a recognizably American sound in classical music. In some sense, then, he is to music what American poets were to literature before Walt Whitman.

Foote was an early advocate of Brahms and Wagner and promoted performances of their music. Foote was an active music teacher and wrote a number of pedagogical works, including Modern Harmony in Its Theory and Practice (1905), written with Walter R. Spalding. It was republished as Harmony (1969). He also wrote Some Practical Things in Piano-Playing (1909) and Modulation and Related Harmonic Questions (1919). He contributed many articles to music journals, including "Then and Now, Thirty Years of Musical Advance in America" in Etude (1913) and "A Bostonian Remembers" in Musical Quarterly (1937).

The Grove Music Encyclopedia says:

"In his finest works Foote was a memorable composer. His style, firmly placed in the Romantic tradition, is characterized by lyrical melodies, expressive phrasing, and clear formal structure. He excelled in writing for strings and achieved particular popularity in his lifetime with the Suite in E major op.63 and A Night Piece for flute and strings. Of his works for full orchestra, the Four Character Pieces after the Rubáiyát of Omar Khayyám op.48 is noteworthy for its colourful instrumental writing...".

There exists a full-length biography by Nicholas E. Tawa: Arthur Foote: A Musician in the Frame of Time and Place (1997).

A good part of Foote's compositions consists of chamber music and these works are generally among his best. The Chamber Music Journal, discussing Foote's chamber music, has written, "If his name is not entirely unknown, it is fair to say that his music is. This is a shame. Foote's chamber music is first rate, deserving of regular public performance." His Piano Quintet, Op.38 and Piano Quartet, Op.23, are singled out for special praise. With regard to the Piano Quintet, the author writes, "Each of the movements is a gem. The Scherzo is particularly fine and the rousing finale beyond reproach. I believe that the only reason this work never received the audience it deserved and deserves is because it was written by an American who was 'out of the loop." As for the Piano Quartet, the opinion is that "it is as good as any late 19th century piano quartet."

Notes for PRESIDENT BENJAMIN HARRISON:

Won the 1888 electoral vote by 233 to 168 for his predecessor and successor Grover Cleveland, even though Cleveland had won the popular vote by 5,537,857 to 5,447,129. Lost the 1892 election to Cleveland. Chose Levi P. Morton to be his vice-president.

Nominated for President on the eighth ballot at the 1888 Republican Convention, Benjamin Harrison conducted one of the first "front-porch" campaigns, delivering short speeches to delegations that visited him in Indianapolis. As he was only 5 feet, 6 inches tall, Democrats called him "Little Ben"; Republicans replied that he was big enough to wear the hat of his grandfather, "Old Tippecanoe."

Born in 1833 on a farm by the Ohio River below Cincinnati, Harrison attended Miami University in Ohio and read law in Cincinnati. He moved to Indianapolis, where he practiced law and campaigned for the Republican Party. He married Caroline Lavinia Scott in 1853. After the Civil War-he was Colonel of the 70th Volunteer Infantry--Harrison became a pillar of Indianapolis, enhancing his reputation as a brilliant lawyer.

The Democrats defeated him for Governor of Indiana in 1876 by unfairly stigmatizing him as "Kid Gloves" Harrison. In the 1880's he served in the United States Senate, where he championed Indians. homesteaders, and Civil War veterans.

In the Presidential election, Harrison received 100,000 fewer popular votes than Cleveland, but carried the Electoral College 233 to 168. Although Harrison had made no political bargains, his supporters had given innumerable pledges upon his behalf.

When Boss Matt Quay of Pennsylvania heard that Harrison ascribed his narrow victory to Providence, Quay exclaimed that Harrison would never know "how close a number of men were compelled to approach... the penitentiary to make him President."

Harrison was proud of the vigorous foreign policy which he helped shape. The first Pan American Congress met in Washington in 1889, establishing an information center which later became the Pan American Union. At the end of his administration Harrison submitted to the Senate a treaty to annex Hawaii; to his disappointment, President Cleveland later withdrew it.

Substantial appropriation bills were signed by Harrison for internal improvements, naval expansion, and subsidies for steamship lines. For the first time except in war, Congress appropriated a billion dollars. When critics attacked "the billion-dollar Congress," Speaker Thomas B. Reed replied, "This is a billion-dollar country." President Harrison also signed the Sherman Anti-Trust Act "to protect trade and commerce against unlawful restraints and monopolies," the first Federal act attempting to regulate trusts.

The most perplexing domestic problem Harrison faced was the tariff issue. The high tariff rates in effect had created a surplus of money in the Treasury. Low-tariff advocates argued that the surplus was hurting business. Republican leaders in Congress successfully met the challenge. Representative William McKinley and Senator Nelson W. Aldrich framed a still higher tariff bill; some rates were intentionally prohibitive.

Harrison tried to make the tariff more acceptable by writing in reciprocity provisions. To cope with the Treasury surplus, the tariff was removed from imported raw sugar; sugar growers within the United States were given two cents a pound bounty on their production.

Long before the end of the Harrison Administration, the Treasury surplus had evaporated, and prosperity seemed about to disappear as well. Congressional elections in 1890 went stingingly against the Republicans, and party leaders decided to abandon President Harrison although he had cooperated with Congress on party legislation. Nevertheless, his party renominated him in 1892, but he was defeated by Cleveland.

After he left office, Harrison returned to Indianapolis, and married the widowed Mrs. Mary Dimmick in 1896. A dignified elder statesman, he died in 1901.

## Notes for FIRST LADY CAROLINE LAVINIA SCOTT:

The centennial of President Washington's inauguration heightened the nation's interest in its heroic past, and in 1890 Caroline Scott Harrison lent her prestige as First Lady to the founding of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. She served as its first President General. She took a special interest in the history of the White House, and the mature dignity with which she carried out her duties may overshadow the fun-loving nature that had charmed "Ben" Harrison when they met as teenagers.

Born at Oxford, Ohio, in 1832, "Carrie" was the second daughter of Mary Potts Neal and the Reverend Dr. John W. Scott, a Presbyterian minister and founder of the Oxford Female Institute. As her father's pupil--brown-haired, petite, witty--she infatuated the reserved young Ben, then an honor student at Miami University; they were engaged before his graduation and married in 1853.

After early years of struggle while he established a law practice in Indianapolis, they enjoyed a happy family life interrupted only by the Civil War. Then, while General Harrison became a man of note in his profession, his wife cared for their son and daughter, gave active service to the First Presbyterian Church and to an orphans' home, and extended cordial hospitality to her many friends. Church views to the contrary, she saw no harm in private dancing lessons for her daughter--she liked dancing herself. Blessed with considerable artistic talent, she was an accomplished pianist; she especially enjoyed painting for recreation.

Illness repeatedly kept her away from Washington's winter social season during her husband's term in the Senate, 1881-1887, and she welcomed their return to private life; but she moved with poise to the White House in 1889 to continue the gracious way of life she had always created in her own home.

During the administration the Harrisons' daughter, Mary Harrison McKee, her two children, and other relatives lived at the White House. The First Lady tried in vain to have the overcrowded mansion enlarged but managed to assure an extensive renovation with up-to-date improvements. She established the collection of china associated with White House history. She worked for local charities as well. With other ladies of progressive views, she helped raise funds for the Johns Hopkins University medical school on condition that it admit women. She gave elegant receptions and dinners. In the winter of 1891-1892, however, she had to battle illness as she tried to fulfill her social obligations. She died of tuberculosis at the White House in October 1892, and after services in the East Room was buried from her own church in Indianapolis.

When official mourning ended, Mrs. McKee acted as hostess for her father in the last months of his term. (In 1896 he married his first wife's widowed niece and former secretary, Mary Scott Lord Dimmick; she survived him by nearly 47 years, dying in January 1948.)

This regiment was organized in May, 1861, and was mustered in June 11, with a numerical strength of 1,051. It left the state on June 20 and was the first regiment of three years men to appear in Washington.

It was brigaded with three New York regiments under command of Col. W. T. Sherman, Col. Coon being detached for staff duty. The regiment participated in the first battle of Bull Run, losing 30 killed, 125 wounded and 65 missing.

It was transferred from Col. Sherman's command to that of Brig. Gen. Rufus King, commanding a brigade consisting of the 5th and 6th Wis. and 19th Ind. infantry. Co. K was detached permanently and organized as heavy artillery, a new Co. K being mustered.

Later Gen. King was succeeded by Col. Lysander Cutler and from Dec., 1861, the history of the regiment is merged with that of the famous "Iron Brigade" until it was detached in May, 1864, its loss being the greatest in proportion to numbers of any regiment engaged in the Civil war.

The "Iron Brigade" consisted of the 2nd, 6th and 7th Wis., 19th Ind. and 24th Mich. At Bull Run the 2nd regiment bore the brunt of a determined onset by "Stonewall" Jackson's entire division on the Warrenton pike until the brigade could be moved into position and the enemy repulsed. The brigade held the line of battle until the army had passed on the road to Centerville, and was in a later engagement on the Warrenton and Sudley roads.

It stormed the enemy's position at South Mountain, the 2nd leading on the left of the road and the 6th and 7th on the right, routing the enemy. At Antietam the brigade dislodged the enemy after a severe conflict. At Fredericksburg it held an exposed position, subject to heavy artillery fire.

At Gettysburg the regiment led the marching column and was the first to meet the enemy, (Heth's division), advancing upon it and receiving a volley that cut down over 30 per cent of the rank and file. Dashing upon the enemy's center, the 2nd held it in check until the brigade came into line, when the enemy was routed.

At Chancellorsville, the Wilderness, Gaines' Mill, Cold Harbor, Petersburg, and in numerous skirmishes, the "Iron Brigade" added new luster to the Union army, the 2nd Wis. bearing well its part.

The regiment became so reduced in numbers that it was permanently detached from the brigade May 11, 1864, and employed as provost guard of the 4th division, 5th army corps until June 11, when it was sent home, the last company being mustered out July 2, 1864.

The members who joined subsequent to its original organization were organized into an independent battalion of two companies June 11, 1864, under command of Capt. Dennis B. Dailey. The battalion was assigned to provost duty, took part in the advance and assault on Petersburg and the skirmishes at Yellow house, was transferred to the 1st brigade, 3rd division for guard and picket duty; fought at Hatcher's run; and on Nov. 30 was transferred as Cos. G and H to the 6th Wis., with which it remained until mustered out.

To its original number was added by recruiting, drafting and reenlistment 215, making a total of 1,266. The death loss was 261; missing, 6; desertions, 51; transferred 134; discharged, 466; leaving 348 to be mustered out.

This battle convinced the Lincoln administration that the war would be a long and costly affair. McDowell was relieved of command of the Union army and replaced by Maj. Gen. George B. McClellan, who set about reorganizing and training the troops.

During the night, both armies consolidated their lines. In spite of crippling casualties, Lee continued to skirmish with McClellan throughout the 18th, while removing his wounded south of the river. McClellan did not renew the assaults. After dark, Lee ordered the battered Army of Northern Virginia to withdraw across the Potomac into the Shenandoah Valley.

Feger Jackson and George Bayard, and Confederate generals Thomas R.R. Cobb and Maxey Gregg were killed. On December 15, Burnside called off the offensive and recrossed the river, ending the campaign. Burnside initiated a new offensive in January 1863, which quickly bogged down in the winter mud. The abortive "Mud March" and other failures led to Burnside's replacement by Maj. Gen. Joseph Hooker in January 1863.

Jubal Early in Fredericksburg and marched with the rest of the army to confront the Federals. As Hooker's army moved toward Fredericksburg on the Orange Turnpike, they encountered increasing Confederate resistance. Hearing reports of overwhelming Confederate force, Hooker ordered his army to suspend the advance and to concentrate again at Chancellorsville. Pressed closely by Lee's advance, Hooker adopted a defensive posture, thus giving Lee the initiative. On the morning of May 2, Lt. Gen. T.J. Jackson directed his corps on a march against the Federal left flank, which was reported to be "hanging in the air." Fighting was sporadic on other portions of the field throughout the day, as Jackson's column reached its jump-off point. At 5:20 pm, Jackson's line surged forward in an overwhelming attack that crushed the Union XI Corps. Federal troops rallied, resisted the advance, and counterattacked. Disorganization on both sides and darkness ended the fighting. While making a night reconnaissance, Jackson was mortally wounded by his own men and carried from the field. J.E.B. Stuart took temporary command of Jackson's Corps. On May 3, the Confederates attacked with both wings of the army and massed their artillery at Hazel Grove. This finally broke the Federal line at Chancellorsville. Hooker withdrew a mile and entrenched in a defensive "U" with his back to the river at United States Ford. Union generals Berry and Whipple and Confederate general Paxton were killed; Stonewall Jackson was mortally wounded. On the night of May 5-6, after Union reverses at Salem Church, Hooker recrossed to the north bank of the Rappahannock. This battle was considered by many historians to be Lee's greatest victory.

In the afternoon, after a preliminary artillery bombardment, Lee attacked the Union center on Cemetery Ridge. The Pickett-Pettigrew assault (more popularly, Pickett's Charge) momentarily pierced the Union line but was driven back with severe casualties. Stuart's cavalry attempted to gain the Union rear but was repulsed. On July 4, Lee began withdrawing his army toward Williamsport on the Potomac River. His train of wounded stretched more than fourteen miles.

William Mahone, whose division had been hastily returned from north of James River, attacked with five infantry brigades, rolling up the right flank of Crawford's division. Heavily reinforced, Warren counterattacked and by nightfall had retaken most of the ground lost during the afternoon's fighting. On the 20th, the Federals laid out and entrenched a strong defensive line covering the Blick House and Globe Tavern and extending east to connect with the main Federal lines at Jerusalem Plank Road. On August 21, Hill probed the new Federal line for weaknesses but could not penetrate the Union defenses. With the fighting at Globe Tavern, Grant succeeded in extending his siege lines to the west and cutting Petersburg's primary rail connection with Wilmington, North Carolina. The Confederates were now forced to off-load rail cars at Stony Creek Station for a 30-mile wagon haul up Boydton Plank Road to reach Petersburg. Confederate general John C.C. Sanders was killed on August 21.

Pierpont, David A., Richmond, was born in Middlebury, Vt., in 1815. His father, David, was born in Litchfield county, Conn., and first settled at Middlebury, Vt. His wife was Sally Palmes, and in 1816, when David was an infant, the family came to Richmond and settled at Allen's Hill. David was a cabinetmaker, and also kept a hotel at the Hill. He ran a line of four-horse coaches between Canandaigua and Perry for some years. Of his five children four grew to maturity; David S.; Frances Ann, deceased, who married Prof. Marcius Wilson, of Vineland, N.J.; Caroline Amelia, deceased, who married George P. Townsend; and Ogden E., deceased, who left a widow and two children, and who was for many years engaged in Rochester as clerk. David A. Pierpont was educated at the common schools, at Canandaigua Academy, and at Temple Hill School, Geneseo. Green, of Honeoye, and David Ogden, born in 1848. Mr. Pierpont followed the trade of his father for a time, then became a clerk at Allen's Hill, and afterwards for Nathaniel Gorham at Canandaigua. A year later he engaged in general trade at Allen's Hill in company with James Henry. A year later Robert L. Rose purchased Henry's interest, and two years later, in 1839, Mr. Pierpont sold his interest, and in company with Daniel Phelps purchased and slaughtered sheep for two or three years. His father-in-law bought the grist mill in Honeoye, since owned by John Quick, and there David A. worked at milling for eight years. In 1852 he came to his present farm and lived with his father-in-law, and has followed farming ever since. The main part of his present farm-house was built in 1800 by Judge Chipman, the farm

having been taken up by him in 1795. Mr. Pierpont was supervisor in 1847-48-52-55-89-90-91. Mrs. Pierpont's father, Capt. Joshua Phillips, was born in Dighton, Mass., in 1782. His father, of the same name, was born in 1751, and was a Revolutionary soldier. He died in 1799. Joshua settled here in 1803, served in the War of 1812, and was commissioned Captain. His wife was Olive, daughter of William Paul. Mr. Pierpont and his son, David Ogden, have been prominent breeders of Merino sheep, and have received diplomas from the Exposition of Sydney, Australia, and from the Paris Exposition.

The 51st regiment contained six companies of the Shepard Rifles, two companies of the Scott Rifles and two companies of the Union Rifles and was organized in New York city, where it was mustered into the service of the United States July 27 to Oct. 23, 1861, for a three years' term.

It left the state for Washington on Oct. 31, with 850 members, was assigned to the 2nd brigade, 2nd division, Gen. Burnside's North Carolina expedition, and embarked at Annapolis Jan. 6, 1862, for Roanoke island. The first active service of the regiment was at Roanoke island, where it fought with courage and steadiness.

The battle of New Berne followed in March, in which the 51st suffered the most severely of any regiment engaged-71 men being killed or wounded. Until July 6, 1862, the command was quartered at New Berne, when it was ordered to return to Virginia, and upon arriving at Newport News was assigned to the 2nd brigade, 2nd division, 9th corps.

It participated in Gen. Pope's campaign in August and September; was present at Kelly's ford; was closely engaged at Sulphur springs, the second Bull Run and Chantilly, with a loss in the campaign of 89 in killed, wounded and missing. The regiment was withdrawn to Washington, but soon took the field for the Maryland campaign; was active at South mountain and Antietam, losing in the latter battle 87 killed or wounded in a most brilliant charge across the stone bridge, which alone would have made the fighting qualities of the regiment renowned.

In November, the 51st was engaged at Jefferson, Va., and Warrenton springs and late in the month moved to Fredericksburg, where it took part in the battle in December with a loss of 73 members. After sharing the hardships of Burnside's "Mud March," the regiment established winter quarters near White Oak Church, but was soon transferred to the Department of the West and with the 9th corps arrived at Vicksburg in June.

It participated in the siege operations and the pursuit to Jackson, Miss.; then proceeded to Tennessee, where it participated in the battle of Blue springs; was active at Campbell's station, and assisted in the defense of Knoxville during the siege.

In Dec., 1863, a large proportion of the command reenlisted and received veteran furlough, rejoining the regiment with new recruits at Knoxville. In Feb., 1864, the 9th corps was ordered to join the Army of the Potomac at Brandy Station, where it arrived May 1.

In the Wilderness campaign the loss of the regiment was 79 during the first two days, including Col. LeGendre, who was wounded in the eye. The command distinguished itself for heroism in the terrible month which followed; then proceeded to Petersburg; was active at the mine explosion, the Weldon railroad, Poplar Spring Church, Hatcher's run, at Fort Stedman, and in the final assault on April 2, 1865.

The original members not reenlisted were mustered out during the autumn of 1864 and the veterans at Alexandria, July 25, 1865. The total enrollment of the regiment was 3,050 and it received in June, 1865, the veterans and recruits of the 109th N. Y. Its total loss in all its engagements was 925, while 202 died from wounds and 385 from accident, disease or imprisonment.

At Peebles' farm, Va., the regiment was surrounded and 332 members captured. Col. Fox in "Regimental Losses" says of the 51st, "Few regiments saw a more active service and none left a

more honorable record."

New York FIFTY-FIRST REGIMENT OF INFANTRY (VETERAN). Shepard Rifles. (Three Years)

This regiment was organized in New York city October 11, 1861, by the consolidation of the Scott and the Union Rifles with the Shepard Rifles. The New York Rifles, Col. Chas. W. LeGendre, had already been consolidated with the Shepard Rifles, Colonel Ferrero, and part of the Empire Zouaves with the Union Rifles, Col. Anton Martin Lichtercost. Other incomplete organizations were added, Henry Z. Drew's company of Mechanic Rifles becoming part of Company C; Company A, U. S. Voltigeurs or Rangers, Col. Albert C. Ramsay, Company D; and a portion of Col. L. Ayer's Yates Rifles part of other companies of the regiment. The Scott Rifles were recruited by Col. W. R. McDonald, under authority from the War Department, dated July 22, 1861. Col. Edward Ferrero was placed in command of the regiment, which, recruited in New York city, was mustered in the service of the United States for three years between July 27 and October 23, 1861. At the expiration of its term of service, the men entitled thereto were mustered out and the regiment retained in service. June 3, 1865, the enlisted men of the 109th Infantry, not discharged with their regiment, were transferred to it.

The regiment left the State October 29, 1861; served in the 2d Brigade, 2d Division, Department of North Carolina, from November, 1861; in the same brigade and division, 8th Corps, from June, 1862; in the 1St Division, 23d Corps, from September, 1863; in their District of Kentucky, Department of Ohio, from January, 1864; in the 2d Division, 9th Corps, from February, 1864; in the 2d Brigade, 2d Division, 9th Corps, from March, 1804; in the 1St Brigade, 2d Division, 9th Corps, from April, 1864; as Engineers of the Division, from May 26, 1864; in the 1st Brigade, 2d Division, 9th Corps, Army of the Potomac, from July 2, 1864; and it was honorably discharged and mustered out, commanded by Col. John G. Wright, July 25, 1865, at Alexandria, Va.

Burnside had secured an important outpost on the Atlantic Coast, tightening the blockade.

On August 29, Pope launched a series of assaults against Jackson's position along an unfinished railroad grade. The attacks were repulsed with heavy casualties on both sides. At noon, Longstreet arrived on the field from Thoroughfare Gap and took position on Jackson's right flank. On August 30, Pope renewed his attacks, seemingly unaware that Longstreet was on the field. When massed Confederate artillery devastated a Union assault by Fitz John Porter's command, Longstreet's wing of 28,000 men counterattacked in the largest, simultaneous mass assault of the war. The Union left flank was crushed and the army driven back to Bull Run. Only an effective Union rearguard action prevented a replay of the First Manassas disaster. Pope's retreat to Centreville was precipitous, nonetheless. The next day, Lee ordered his army in pursuit. This was the decisive battle of the Northern Virginia Campaign.

By dusk the Confederate defenders were driven back, suffering severe casualties, and McClellan was in position to destroy Lee's army before it could reconcentrate. McClellan's limited activity on September 15 after his victory at South Mountain, however, condemned the garrison at Harpers Ferry to capture and gave Lee time to unite his scattered divisions at Sharpsburg. Union general Jesse Reno and Confederate general Samuel Garland, , were killed at South Mountain.

At dawn September 17, Hooker's corps mounted a powerful assault on Lee's left flank that began the single bloodiest day in American military history. Attacks and counterattacks swept across Miller's cornfield and fighting swirled around the Dunker Church. Union assaults against the Sunken Road eventually pierced the Confederate center, but the Federal advantage was not followed up. Late in the day, Burnside's corps finally got into action, crossing the stone bridge over Antietam Creek and rolling up the Confederate right. At a crucial moment, A.P. Hill's division arrived from Harpers Ferry and counterattacked, driving back Burnside and saving the day. Although outnumbered two-to-one, Lee committed his entire force, while McClellan sent in less than three-quarters of his army, enabling Lee to fight the Federals to a standstill. During the night, both armies consolidated their lines. In spite of crippling casualties, Lee continued to skirmish with McClellan throughout the 18th, while removing his wounded south of the river. McClellan did not renew the assaults. After dark, Lee ordered the battered Army of Northern Virginia to withdraw across the Potomac into the Shenandoah Valley.

On the 12th, the Federal army crossed over, and on December 13, Burnside mounted a series of futile frontal assaults on Prospect Hill and Marye's Heights that resulted in staggering casualties. Meade's division, on the Union left flank, briefly penetrated Jackson's line but was driven back by a counterattack. Union generals C. Feger Jackson and George Bayard, and Confederate generals Thomas R.R. Cobb and Maxey Gregg were killed. On December 15, Burnside called off the offensive and recrossed the river, ending the campaign. Burnside initiated a new offensive in January 1863, which quickly bogged down in the winter mud. The abortive "Mud March" and other failures led to Burnside's replacement by Maj. Gen. Joseph Hooker in January 1863.

Description: The opening battle of Grant's sustained offensive against the Confederate Army of Northern Virginia, known as the Overland Campaign, was fought at the Wilderness, May 5-7. On the morning of May 5, 1864, the Union V Corps attacked Ewell's Corps on the Orange Turnpike, while A.P. Hill's corps during the afternoon encountered Getty's Division (VI Corps) and Hancock's Corps on the Plank Road. Fighting was fierce but inconclusive as both sides attempted to maneuver in the dense woods. Darkness halted the fighting, and both sides rushed forward reinforcements. At dawn on May 6, Hancock attacked along the Plank Road, driving Hill's Corps back in confusion.

Longstreet's Corps arrived in time to prevent the collapse of the Confederate right flank. At noon, a devastating Confederate flank attack in Hamilton's Thicket sputtered out when Lt. Gen. James Longstreet was wounded by his own men. The IX Corps (Burnside) moved against the Confederate center, but was repulsed. Union generals James S. Wadsworth and Alexander Hays were killed. Confederate generals John M. Jones, Micah Jenkins, and Leroy A. Stafford were killed. The battle was a tactical draw. Grant, however, did not retreat as had the other Union generals before him. On May 7, the Federals advanced by the left flank toward the crossroads of Spotsylvania Courthouse.

Confederate counterattacks plugged the gap, and fighting continued unabated for nearly 20 hours in what may well have been the most ferociously sustained combat of the Civil War. On May 19, a Confederate attempt to turn the Union right flank at Harris Farm was beaten back with severe casualties. Union generals Sedgwick (VI Corps commander) and Rice were killed. Confederate generals Johnson and Steuart were captured, Daniel and Perrin mortally wounded. On May 21, Grant disengaged and continued his advance on Richmond.

On the 24th, Union infantry was repulsed at Ox Ford (the snout) but advanced to near the Doswell House on the Confederate right. Lee hoped to strike an offensive blow, but he was ill, and the opportunity for defeating an isolated part of the Federal army passed. Once the threat of Lee's position was revealed, Grant withdrew both wings of the army back across the North Anna River. Grant outflanked the position by moving downstream and continued his advance on Richmond.

Description: On July 11, Lt. Gen. Jubal A. Early's exhausted Confederates reached the outskirts of Washington near Silver Spring. Skirmishers advanced to feel the fortifications which at the time were manned only by Home Guards, clerks, and convalescent troops. During the night, veteran units from the Union VI Corps disembarked from troop transports and marched north through the streets of Washington to bolster the defenses. On July 12, Early was finally in position to make a strong demonstration, which was repulsed by the veteran Union troops. In the afternoon, VI Corps units sortied against the Confederate skirmishers, driving them back from their advanced positions in front of Forts Stevens and DeRussy. President Lincoln watched the action from Fort Stevens and came under fire from Confederate sharpshooters. Recognizing that the Union Capitol was now defended by veterans, Early abandoned any thought of taking the city. Early withdrew during the night, marching toward White's Ford on the Potomac, ending his invasion of Maryland. "We didn't take Washington," Early told his staff officers, "but we scared Abe Lincoln like Hell."

This regiment, recruited in the counties of Ontario, Seneca and Yates, was organized at Geneva and there mustered into the U. S. service on Sept. 14, 1862, for three years. It left the state on the 22nd and was chiefly engaged in garrison duty at Suffolk, Norfolk and Yorktown, Va., until 1864, when it was placed in Wistar's division, 18th corps.

In May, 1864, then in the 2nd (Stedman's) brigade, 2nd (Weitzel's) division, 18th corps, it took part in the short campaign of the Army of the James under Gen. Butler against Petersburg and Richmond by way of the James river, being engaged at Swift creek, Proctor's creek, Drewry's bluff and Bermuda Hundred.

Its loss during this campaign was 78 in killed, wounded and missing. The 18th corps was then ordered to reinforce the Army of the Potomac and the 148th was heavily engaged at Cold Harbor, losing 124 killed, wounded and missing. Returning with the corps to Bermuda Hundred, it moved to Petersburg and took part in the first bloody assault on the works, losing 16 killed, 74 wounded and 26 missing.

After the failure of the assaults, the regiment went into position in the trenches on the right of the line, where it suffered daily from the incessant firing, its losses throughout the siege amounting to 124 killed, wounded and missing. In the latter part of August the 18th corps was relieved by the 10th, and the former was ordered into the defenses of Bermuda Hundred.

In the latter part of September the regiment was engaged at Fort Harrison with a loss of 24 killed and wounded, and in October it was heavily engaged on the old battlefield of Fair Oaks, where it lost 84 killed, wounded and missing. When the 18th corps was discontinued in Dec., 1864, the 148th became a part of the new 24th corps, with which it participated in the Appomattox campaign, sharing in the final assault on Petersburg and the engagements at Rice's station, Burke's station and Appomattox Court House.

The regiment by its signal gallantry displayed on many occasions had gained a well earned reputation for courage and efficiency. Corp. E. Van Winkle and privates Henry S. Wells and George A. Buchanan distinguished themselves at Fort Harrison and were the recipients of medals of honor from the war department.

The regiment was mustered out on June 22, 1865, at Richmond, Va., under command of Col. Murray. It lost by death during its term of service 4 officers and 95 men killed and mortally wounded; 2 officers and 156 men died of disease and other causes, a total of 267.

After severe fighting, Butler extricated himself from battle, withdrawing again to his Bermuda Hundred Line. This battle stopped Butler's offensive against Richmond.

By June 2, both armies were on the field, forming on a seven-mile front that extended from Bethesda Church to the Chickahominy River. At dawn June 3, the and XVIII Corps, followed later by the IX Corps, assaulted along the Bethesda Church-Cold Harbor line and were slaughtered at all points. Grant commented in his memoirs that this was the only attack he wished he had never ordered. The armies confronted each other on these lines until the night of June 12, when Grant again advanced by his left flank, marching to James River. On June 14, the Corps was ferried across the river at Wilcox's Landing by transports. On June 15, the rest of the army began crossing on a 2,200-foot long pontoon bridge at Weyanoke. Abandoning the well-defended approaches to Richmond, Grant sought to shift his army quickly south of the river to threaten Petersburg.

After dark the XVIII Corps was relieved by the Corps. On June 16, the Corps captured another section of the Confederate line; on the 17th, the IX Corps gained more ground. Beauregard stripped the Howlett Line (Bermuda Hundred) to defend the city, and Lee rushed reinforcements to Petersburg from the Army of Northern Virginia. The , XI, and V Corps from right to left attacked on June 18 but was repulsed with heavy casualties. By now the Confederate works were heavily manned and the greatest opportunity to capture Petersburg without a siege was lost. The siege of Petersburg began. Union Gen. James St. Clair Morton, chief engineer of the IX Corps, was killed on June 17.

Notes for JOHN SNODGRASS SHURICK:

In the 1840 Federal Census for Adam Shurick, most likely John's father, it shows a "John Snograss" living in the same city, county and state as the Shurick's. Two things - first, this is most likely the same Adam Shurick and family based on the numbers and ages of the children matching where Adam's family was at the time. Secondly, most likely "John Snodgrass" is the namesake for John Snodgrass Shurick.

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John S. Shurick married Lorina G. Aveline February 20, 1868 in Allen County, Indiana.

The ceremony was performed by the minister of Wayne Street Methodist Church. Lorina died February 6, 1882, at her home in Fort Wayne. She is buried at Lindenwood Cemetery, Lot 64, Section B. Her obituary says she was born in Fort Wayne To Francis S. and Junia A. Aveline on March 1, 1846.

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The city directories from 1879 to 1883 listed John Shurick as co-owner of Shurick & Olds, maker of staves and heading and cooperage, located south of the Wabash Railway between Lafayette and Calhoun.

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What happened to John after the death of his Lorina (Lavina) is unsure. I had it completely wrong at first and with the assistance of a friend out of Fort Wayne, Indiana, I was set straight on a few misconceptions. Now remains some still unanswered questions:

In a August 6th, 1882 Fort Wayne Daily Gazette newspaper, there was a small mention as follows:

"Fort Wayne gossip says that John Shurick, esq., of the firm of Shurick & Olds, and Mrs. Frances H. Baldwin, daughter of the late Dr. S. R. Roxford, will be married some time during the next two weeks, and will spend the honey-moon at eastern watering places - Indianapolis Journal."

Investigating this to see if John married Frances, my friend from Fort Wayne was unable to find any record that found this to be true. As he put it, Lorina, Johns wife, died February 1882 and it would have seemed odd that John would have married so quick (August 1882) after her death. He did add, though, that John had children to tend too so maybe it wouldn't have been so far fetched.

So John must have left Fort Wayne around 1883 leaving for Minnesota where he met and married Anna Amelia Palmes, my great grandmother. He spent the remainder of his life as a Railroad Insurance man.

The following is quoted from the obituary article in regards to John Shurick as follows:

### VETERAN RISK MAN IS DEAD

John S. Shurick succumbs after long illness at his home in Minneapolis.

John S. Shurick, 72 years old, a veteran insurance man of Minnesota, died at his home, 3406 Fifteenth Avenue South, Minneapolis, yesterday morning, his death following a protracted illness. Mr. Shurick has spent more than thirty years of his life in Minnesota and the Twin Cities. He was born near Pittsburgh, Pa in 1842. He was married twice and leaves a widow, Mrs. Anna P. Shurick and three children: Mrs. Charles B. Parker, 363 Goodrich Avenue; Edward P. Shurick, Duluth and Miss Annette Shurick, Minneapolis. The funeral will be held at 2 P.M. Tuesday at Lakewood chapel, Minneapolis.

"The Shurick Affair" -

As much speculation has been occasioned in this community by a report that Mr. John Shurick, a former citizen of this place, had been arrested, and tried for rape in Fort Wayne, Indiana, his present residence. To do Mr. Shurick justice we publish the following report of the affair from the Fort Wayne Democrat. It is gratifying to hear that Mr. Shurick has so many friends in his new home. We give the article without comment, but it will evident to all that the report generally circulated is incorrect if not malicious:

"This case, which has occupied the attention of the Criminal Court for the last four weeks has been brought to a close, and the prisoner honorably acquitted. John Shurick, the defendant stands before the world acquitted of the henious offence with which he has been charged. We predicted at the time when the trial was first taken up that he would walk out of the court room a free man. We believed so at the time, and were censured by some because we gave our opinion, but like everyone else we had formed our belief of the matter from certani circumstances, but we must admit, we thought from what we heard during the trial the defendant might be guilty. Mr. Shurick is comparatively a stranger to us, but up to the time of his arrest for the alleged crime, we never heard anything derogatory to his character as a man, christian or citizen; on the contrary, we always heard him favorably spoken of.

In our business relations with Mr. Shurick, we have always found him honorable. We knew him to be a hardworking and industrious young man, and had we deemed him guilty of the revolting deed we would not have spared him, for we generally speak as we think and care not what others may say, when we deem ourself in the right. The man who now stands before the world an innocent man will doubtless find numerous Mrs. Grundys, but he will know his true friends, for those who stood by him in his darkest hours will ever, we think, hold a place in his heart.

The friends of the unfortunate girl, have been prompted, we believe, by the purest of motives to prosecute the matter, for they believed him guilty, and they wished to see the author of her shame and degradation justly punished. The only fit punishment if he had been guilty would have been death at the hands of her whom he outraged by more brutal force. If he had won the affections of her heart and then basely sacrificed her purity to hellish lust, he was none the less deserving of retributive justice, for the latter would, in our estimation be more of a crime.

We have refered to this matter at mroe length than we intended, but we have said no more than we deem that which is due to one we consdier a worthy young man."

Regimental History CONNECTICUT TWENTY-SECOND REGIMENT C. V. INFANTRY. (Nine Months.)

# WRITTEN BY CAPTAIN JOHN K. WILLIAMS, LATE OF COMPANY H, TWENTY-SECOND CONNECTICUT VOLUNTEERS.

THIS regiment, with the exception of Company K, was recruited from Hartford County, and was the first to respond to the call of the President for "three hundred thousand militia to serve for nine months," dated August 4, 1862.

Its personnel was of superior intelligence, for the term of service attracted many occupying responsible positions, from which they could not absent themselves for a longer period.

Immediately on rendezvousing, one thousand strong, at "Camp Halleck," in Hartford, September 3, 1862, the officers elected George S. Burnham (late colonel of the First Connecticut Volunteers, and then in command of the post) as their Colonel. Under his skillful instruction the regiment acquired a degree of military efficiency and discipline rarely obtained by any command in so short a time as that which intervened before its departure for the front.

The regiment was mustered in by First Lieutenant Watson Webb, Third Regiment United States Artillery, September 20, 1862. It embarked by steamer for New York October 2d, and went thence by rail to Washington, and after short encampments at East Capitol Hill, Chain Bridge, Fort Ethan Allen, and Langley, went into winter quarters at Miner's Hill, near Falls Church, Va., about eight miles from Washington.

This regiment here entered that part of the Army of the Potomac which was assigned to the defense of Washington, under command of Major General Heintzelman. The division was commanded by General Abercrombie, the brigade by General Robert Cowdin, who was succeeded in March, 1863, by Colonel Burr Porter of the Fortieth Massachusetts, as acting brigade commander. The brigade in which this regiment served its entire term consisted of the Fortieth Massachusetts, Eleventh Rhode Island, One Hundred and Forty-first New York, and Twentysecond Connecticut regiments.

While encamped under shelter tents at Miner's Hill, the regiment felled trees and built for itself log cabins, which it occupied from November 27, 1862, till February 12, 1863. It alternated with the other regiments of the brigade in picketing the line along Vienna and Falls Church Roads, responding to the occasional "long roll" and other danger calls, giving meantime assiduous attention to the study and practice of the "art of war."

Early in February, 1863, the regiment was ordered to proceed to Hunter's Chapel, near Arlington, and to assist in constructing fortifications overlooking the Capital, and in guarding "Long Bridge." April 15, 1862, it embarked on steamer at Alexandria for Norfolk, and went thence by rail to Suffolk. It participated, under Generals Getty and Gordon, in the defense of Suffolk during Longstreet's siege, supporting the Eighth and Twenty-first Connecticut Regiments and a Michigan Battery. Here, for weeks, the regiment was required to stand "under arms" for two hours before daybreak, expecting an attack. The siege was raised May 3d, and the regiment was transported to West Point, on the York River, where, on arrival at night, entrenchments were hastily thrown up in anticipation of a night attack. The commanders at this post were: General Keyes, Department; General Gordon, Seventh Corps; Colonel Burr Porter, Second Brigade. After three weeks of occupation this post was abandoned, and the entire force was conveyed by transports to Yorktown Plains, where it encamped directly in front of McClellan's massive entrenchments, in sight of the old revolutionary rifle-pits.

June 9th the regiment formed a part of the advance column in the "advance on Richmond," and moved by way of Williamsburg and Chickahominy River to Diascund Bridge and Chickahominy Church. Later in the month this force was joined by those of General Dix, which moved by way of the York River, the whole expedition being known in history as the "Blackberry Raid." Returning to Yorktown, the Twenty-second embarked by steamer for home June 26th, arrived at Hartford June 29th, and was mustered out July 7, 1863. Fortune favored this regiment in that none of its members were killed in action, but the frequent commendations of division and brigade commanders for its promptness and efficiency in circumstances of danger are proofs that it was not lacking in bravery.

The Auckland Journals record the death of one of the oldest settlers in the colony, Mr Dennis Browne Cockrane at Hokianga on 29 August 1877 aged 96. The NZ Mail quoted on the 8 September 1877.

According to local trdition, Dennis Cockrane was a large strong man. He had come out to NZ about 1829 and settled first at Horeke, later Mangamuka and finally at Motukaraka opposite Rawene. A timber merchant and farmer he was involved in all sorts of land deals and I quote the following extract from NZ Gazette Vo11 No33 17 August 1842.

Denis B Cockrane of Hokianga --- Claimant

Five Hundred acres, more or less, on the west bank of the Mangamuka river, bounded by the late Mr Mitchells property to the northward and from there runs from Mangrove trees. Marked with three notches on the banks of the Mangamuka, west by north till it reaches the Karoau Creek. Alleged to have been purchased by Clamant in 1832 from the Native Chief Te Kaiueka and Ewatta.

Consideration : goods value 9 pounds 2 shillings Nature os conveyance : not stated

Cochrane also lived on the Mangamuka. He had a large family of half-caste sons and daughters. He brought land in 1831 - one thousand acres at 68 pounds 15 shillings 6p. five hundred acres in 1833 for 60 pounds and the like amount the year before for 13 guiness. He was a powerful old man and soldier. James Buller (Missionary) saw him when over 80 years in 1869.

Dennis Brown Cochranes eldest daughter Jane Takotawi Cochrane married James Clendon, Clendon had purchased some land which came to be known as the u Clendon Acreu but to settle a debt with his father in law, conveyed ownership to him. In 1870 Dennis Cochrane conveyed the property to his granddaughter Jane Clendon Junior, with remainder to her brothers and sisters. The same deed leased the property to the parents James Reddy Clendon and Jane

his wife or whichever might survive the other for the term of their natual lifes. Jane Clenden the younger, died in 1912, without issue and without ever coming fully into her inheritance for she pre her mother. When Mrs Jane Clendon died in 1919 ownership passed automaticlly to her surviving children. Ten years later two daughters and a son, in consideration of the natual love and affection which they and each and everyone of them bears towards thier brothers, conveyed thier rights in the property to George Thomas Clendon, the eldest son and his mothers mainstay during the 47 years of her widowhood ( her husband James Clendon having died in1872).

Apparently Dennis Cockrane respected and was respected by the local chiefs in his dealings with them and in fact became related by marriage to two.

On march the 5th he married his first wife Takotowi TeWhata, also known as Ari (described as a Maori Princess). Thier first child, Ari, was baptised on the 27th August that year, the second daughter Jane Takotawi was born 28 July 1838 and baptised on the 30 September the same year. Neither Ari nor Takotawi TeWhata appear to have survived long as the census of Hokianga for 1838 indicates Dennis as ? with one child and no ? wife. the following extract from Reverend Woonus diary indicates a new liason had began in 1842

I was sorry to find that a man named Cochrane lately raised from a sick bed, who has buried two wives, natives, is ? with a mere child, in fornication. and feel it my duty to expostulate with him about it, I saw the girl and Questioned her upon the subject, and found what I heard was too true. The man has frequented the means of grace here and elsewhere and from his confessions in the late sickness, one would expected better things. The girl belongs to the heathen tribe at Wiriraki (Wirinaki ?). Cochrane is between 50 and 60 years of age and the girl cannot be more 14.

Records also show that Dennis Browne Cochrane, Timber Merchant, married Sarah Tiraroa aged 18 on 18 August 1848. The Reverant Hobbs officiated with William Webster and John Hobbs as witnesses. The marriage took place at Mungunga Chapel and it is charming note that Dennis gave his age as 55 years, Whether it was an old mans vanity or not we shall never know. His other marriages one to a Lady FitzGerald who died in Nova Scotia, and subsequent one to Ruta of Utakere, will have to remain as one of the many unsolved mysteries involving Dennis Browne Cochrane.

This is from "Township of Rawene" by Jean Irvine about 1976The third family of squatters we re the Cochranes. Denis [sic] Browne Cochrane had lived up the Mangamuka since 1831. Later h e had moved to Matakaraka on the Waima estuary, and the missionary James Buller mentions meet ing him there in 1869. But there is a family tradition that it was he that built the Cochran e store which his son Robert owned in 1872 or 1873, when the attached gum store was used for a school. The store can be seen in photographs of the eighties on the corder of Parnell St reet andRussell's [sic] Esplanade, with the house behind it. It was replaced in 1894. [now t he FerryHouse restaurant and antique shop]Robert was on the school committee in 1872-73. D enis Cochrane died in 1877 and for a time Robert was livingin Matakaraka, as shown on the bi rth certificates of two children born in 1877 and 1878. By 1880he was back at Herd's Point , but the store suffered in the hard times of the 80's and in 1887 he tooka job as interpret er in the Maori Land Court.Both Lundon and Cochrane were charged 80 pounds as back rent . I do not know if the land theywere on was

thought more valuable, or whether it had been oc cupied longer. The latter seems moreprobable. Education Board records show that there was a school at Herd's Point [one former namefor Rawene] at least by the middle of 1859.

(this sort of fits with my theory that Dennis 2nd wife was from that area, - but not their mother) Land at Waima, known as Kototai, and at Matakoraka (Motukaraka?) being Lots.34 thru 39. and all the land at Herds Point, being Lots.42 thru 52. and Lots.25 thru 31, and also Lots. 84 thru 91; in Trust to said Trustees, for said son, Robert for the term of his natural life and after his decease, to my grandson, Dennis Robert Hope COCHRANE. " Excepting 100 acres of said Land at Matakaraka (sic) which I direct my Trustees to hold for my daughter, Ellen, untill she shall marry a European husband, on which said event my said Trustees shall convey said 100 acres of said land to said daughter, - but if my daughter shall marry any other husband than a European, then the said 100 acres shall form part of said device in favour of said son, Robert and my said grandson, Dennis Robert Hope." " I devise my Land at Mongonui, (Maunganui?) known as Parakerake, (sic) half to my son Robert, and half to my son John Browne COCHRANE ; provided he shall marry a respectable European, or half caste woman, but if he should live with, or marry a Maori woman ......" (then it reverts to Robert) The next document is written in the same hand and seems to relate to Maning and von Sturmer washing their hands of the matter; as probably doing their best, but frustrated After that, there are documents from Robert, seemingly in order to settle the estate. Seems that he was required to enter into a bond to the Court, in order to prove that his father didn't have what he said he had ! Asked for the bond to be reduced Stated that at 4 Mar 1877, he was a storekeeper in co-partnership with his father. Knew of no other assets as at that date.

According to his death certificate, Dennis Browne Cochrane was born in County Mayo, Ireland, c1781 and his parents were Thomas Cochrane and Sarah Gale. Legend has it that he was the son of the 10th Earl of Dundonald, Sir Thomas Cochrane, a famous British admiral. However, as this gentleman was born in 1775, he would have been rather a precocious lad to have fathered a child at the age of six! Perhaps the marriage licence issued in 1782 between Sarah Gale of Aughagower, County Mayo and Samuel Cochrane of Glendermot, Londonderry is an indication of his true parentage. This theory is further supported by Aughagower connections with the Browne family. (Sarah is believed to be the daughter of Peter Gale of Ashfield, Queens County (Laois) and Mary Browne of Browne's Hill, County Carlow).

A letter written by Dennis B Cochrane in 1871 is held by the Auckland Public Library and, although it must be borne in mind that he was nearly 90 years old at that time, the spelling and standard of English suggest that his education was not as one would expect of gentry. But then again, perhaps a spirit of adventure is not compatible with a love of study.

Two of his descendants have said that Dennis' first wife was the Lady FitzGerald who was travelling with him from Ireland to his home in Nova Scotia when she died on board ship. One lady added that shortly after his arrival there, his timber mill and shipyard burnt to the ground and, in the face of this double tragedy, he sailed to New Zealand to join his friend, Lieutenant O'Donnel (McDonnell?) who was charting the New Zealand coastline. ---His presence in Nova Scotia is yet to be confirmed. His name does not appear in the census of Nova Scotia, 1827, nor in the vital Statistics from Nova Scotian newspapers 1820-34. As for the reference to Thomas McDonnell, this ex-naval lieutenant did indeed do some charting of the Hokianga and other northern harbours during the 1820's and did, apparently, encourage others to join him in settling the region, but according to research by Rear Admiral J O'C Ross, Thomas McDonnell did not settle in New Zealand until about April 1831 and Dennis Browne Cochrane is thought to have been settled here before him. However, Dennis' exact date of arrival is still uncertain and it still could be that he came at McDonnell's suggestion.

Dennis may have arrived in New Zealand during the 1820's, but most sources (including his death certificate) give 1831 as his year of arrival. His first land purchase (OLC 67b), was in October 1832 when he bought 500 acres at Horohoro on the west bank of the Mangamuka River. The local chiefs (recorded as Te Kaiueka, and Ewata) apparently received goods to the value of 9 pounds 2 shillings for this land which was later to be the subject of a boundary dispute with his neighbour, Thomas Mitchell. His second purchase (OLC 67) was a 1,000 acre block, also on the western bank of the Mangamuka at Rahurahu bounded in part by the Papaku and Korau Creeks. This land had been purchased by Thomas McDonnell and George Frederick Russell in December 1831 from chiefs Te Kaiuka. (Kaweka), Epara (Epura) and Etiro in exchange for goods to the value of thirty four pounds (specifically: 1 fowling piece, 241bs lead, 100 Ibs gunpowder, one ornamented belt, 4 tomahawks, 6 hoes, 31bs tobacco and 2 dozen pipes). The block was transfered to Dennis Cochrane in January 1833 for forty pounds, including "all goods and chattels now on the premises". This appears to be the block that Dennis resided on for a number of years and he apparently spent 600 pounds on improvements.

His third purchase (OLC 67a), was at Pukahau (Pakahau) in January 1833. This was a 500 acre block next to Thomas Cassidy and the purchase price of one two-barrel gun and 1001bs gunpowder was described as "goods to the value of twenty-seven pounds". He stated that "This being timber land, I have made no improvements on it".

Dennis Cochrane, like most of the early settlers in New Zealand, does not seem to have wanted for female company. In March 1834, Edward Markham, an Irishman who kept a journal of his travels in New Zealand during that period, described his visit to a village after the death of Cochrane's mistress:

"On arriving, I was requested to fire my two Purra (tupara) as the Natives call a double barreled Gun, in honour of the Mattle Noue (mate nui) dead. She was a young lady, who had been ? with a Man named Cockrane (Cochrane) a sawyer. She was to be buried the next day, and we saw her laid out on a Mat with her Cacahow over her as if she was asleep, with her Hair drest out with Feathers. You often see a red Box in which the Bodies are put, till the flesh is rotted off . Then the Priest scrapes the bones, or some people are Tabooed for the purpose. When people are Tabbooed they are fed by Children, and they must not touch food with their own hands. There were people crying and very Like an Irish howl going on, and plenty of Potatoes scraped. The place was a dead Flat in a valley of high Wooded Hills on either side."

In August of that year, a dispute arose between Dennis Cochrane and Thomas Mitchell over a property on the Mangamuka (the Karoau Block). An Indenture Bond was drawn up between the two parties agreeing to abide by the decision of a group of eight arbitrators, including the missLonary, William Woon. Rev Woon's diary entry for 23 August says "Went to Mangamuka with Brother White to meet a company of Englishmen to settle a dispute about a claim on some land between Messrs Mitchell and Cochrane, and after 8 hours dispute and examination of witnesses an both sides the arbitrators decided in favour of the last mentioned individual, though they could not but acknowledge that the evidence on both sides was contradictory, and which closed with insulting language from two persons to Mr White and myself, with threats etc. A most disagreeable business and very unfairly settled."

In 1836, Dennis Cochrane was, with many of the early settlers, signatory to a petition to the 'King's Most Excellent Majesty' requesting him to take some responsibility for the government of the country. At this stage, he was still ? on the Mangamuka and the missionary, Rev James Buller, recalled meeting him that year.

At that time Maori and Europeans were not entirely familiar with the ways and wiles of the other and perhaps, this, together with the curious mixture of population in a relatively small community, caused life in the Hokianga to be especially dramatic in those days. The European population was made up mainly of land speculators and the more canoe. It seems there was a disagreement over payment for the ride and Mr Biddle was done to death by having his head held under water til he drowned.

Despite one disappointment in March 1842, Dennis apparently enjoyed generally good relations with the missionaries from the local Weslevan mission. Extracts from the diary of William Woon give some interesting details regarding events over a 16 month period:

14 November 1840: 1 accompanied Mr Marriner and Mr Tuite to the Rahurahu in Mangamuka to a European's name Cochrane who was said to be dangerously ill, and we remained with him several hours and made out his will, and did not return home till 5 o'clock the next morning so that I was quite unfit after a week of hard labour composing etc. for the duties of the Lord's day; but the brethren Hobbs and Buller being here my services were not much required except at the close of the Sabbath when Mr Hobbs and myself administered the sacrament to our people.

2 December 1840: Went up to the Rahurahu to see Mr Cochrane who continues very ill. 1 instructed and prayed with him. He begins to feel himself a sinner, and 1 trust is taking refuge in the hope set before him in the gospel.

25 January 1841: Went up to Mangamuka yesterday to see Cochrane an invalid and held service at his house both in English and native and returned to Mangungu and conducted the evening service.

9 March 1841: Mr D B Cochrane called and got his will again out of my hands. He is about to embark in a small craft to Wangape.

4 March 1842; 1 was sorry to find that a man named Cochrane lately raised from a sick bed, who has buried two wives, natives, is ? with a mere child, in fornication, and feel it my duty to expostulate with him about it. 1 saw the girl and questioned her upon the subject, and found what 1 heard was too true. The man has frequented the means of grace here and elsewhere and from his confessions in the late sickness, one would have expected better things. The girl belongs to the heathen tribe at Wiriraki (Wirinaki?). Cochrane is between 50 and 60 years of age and the girl cannot be more than 14!!

In 1842 Dennis applied to the Land Commission's Office for ratification of title to the three parcels of land purchased in the 1830's, Old Land Claims 67, 67a and 67b. As frequently happened in these cases, Dennis received various amounts of 'scrip' in exchange for the land claimed and during 1844, he used this to purchase several parcels of land around the Auckland area, including land in the city, "Waitemata suburbs", Titirangi and Papakura.

In August of 1844, he wrote to the missionary, Nathaniel Turner who was then resident in New Norfolk asking for a document concerning some land on the Mangamuka. The document had been drawn up and signed by Thomas McDonnell and apparently confirmed that the land had been signed over to Dennis by a chief named 'Wata' or 'He Wata' to be held in trust for his children. The document was probably given to Rev Turner for adventurous traders, missionaries, runaway convicts from Australia and others who had escaped from social embarrassment of some sort of another in Britain or elsewhere. Their social interplay reads like a particularly far-fetched soap opera.

one such affair concerned accusations of sexual misconduct; against one of the missionaries from the Mangungu Station, William White. At that time, Thomas McDonnell was the official "additional Resident" for the area, the position being as controversial as other aspects of McDonnell's life in the Hokianga. A feud developed between the two men and McDonnell appears to have been very energetic in his efforts to evict Rev White from what he liked to think was his sphere of influence. Lieut McDonnell sought support from other settlers in the area in pursuit of this end and Dennis Cochrane appears to have given some assistance in this regard.

After his dismissal from missionary work, William White remained in the area and endeavoured to increase his influence amongst the local Maori people. A dispute arose between Mr White and the owner and/or master of a schooner called the 'Tui'. The origins of the dispute have been clouded by time, but it would appear that White endeavoured to take the law into his own hands and on both the second and third of January 1837 he seized the Tui by force, ordering his Maori followers to thrash the owner and throw him overboard. McDonnell pounced upon this

"piratical seizure" by White and both Thomas Poynton, who went to the aid of the master, and DenInis Cochrane (and perhaps others as well?) gave depositions regarding their involvement in the incident.

Dennis stated that when White ordered his flock to take possession of the Tui, he cautioned the Maoris not to interfere but to let Mr White come himself on board. He then said to White "You took possession of the Tui yesterday". The Reverend replied "Yes I did, and 1 will take her now". Dennis said that if he was determined to do so, he should come and take her, but White found his followers reluctant to obey and decided to withdraw. So the affair came to a quiet end, but Thomas McDonnell, together with Matthew Marriner, took the depositions to fuel the campaign against White. However, despite McDonell's attempts to prevent his departure, the minister left for England soon after.

On 5 March 1837, Dennis Cochrane married Takatowi Te Whata. The baptism of Ani Cochrane took place on 27 August that year, but the register does not specify whether she was an infant or adult. It may be the baptism of their first child, but perhaps is more likely that of -Tukitui -herself as she was also known as Ann. However, a child, Jane, was born on 28 July 1838 and baptised on 30 September. Her mother may not have lived for long after her birth as the Census of Hokianga taken in 1839 shows Dennis as ? with only one child and no wife is mentioned.

1838 was another year for dramatic events on the Hokianga when a Henry Biddle (Jackv Marmon called him 'Harry the Stonecutter') who had been working for Dennis Cochrane as a sawyer became the victim of the first cold blooded murder of a pakeha by a Maori. Having left Dennis' employ, Biddle was heading home when he hitched a ride with two Maoris in their Consul and at one time a resident magistrate. A few years later, Clendon bought land at Rawene to build a family home (this 'Clendon House' is now owned and administered by the New Zealand Historic Places Trust), but before building commenced, Capt Clendon passed ownership of the property to his father-in-law, apparently in settlement of a debt.

Dennis Cochrane, however, leased it back to Capt and Mrs Clendon and the property eventually passed to their mutual descendants.

Jane Cochrane was clearly a refined and well educated lady and, according to Ruth Ross, "For almost four decades after her husband's death Mihi Kerehene (Mrs Clendon) ruled her family and ran her house according to the principles taught in the young ladies boarding school at Kororareka to which her father had sent her". Apparently, this school was situated close to Pompalier House and was run by Capt Clendon's daughter and her clergyman husband, and the Clendon children were (perhaps understandably) upset when their father decided to marry one of their pupils very much younger than himself.

Prior to her marriage, Jane had been a nursemaid to Thomas McDonnell's younger children when the family returned to Te Horeke. Dennis was a friend of Judge Frederick Manning and there is a story that Manning called to visit Jane to show her the manuscript for his second book, a sequel to 'Old New Zealand'. The book was concerned mainly with the local people of the area and Jane expressed horror at Manning's forthright comments about them and said something to the effect of "You can't publish this". Jane left the room to make a pot of tea and when she returned, the manuscript was burning in the fireplace where the judge had thrown it.

Dennis' background is alluded to again by Cecil and Celia Manson in their book 'Tides of the Hokianga' saying that his noble birch had never stood between him and a lark with Manning.

In March 1858 a long standing problem regarding title to land at Rawene (then called Herds Point) was finally resolved. The Land Claims Commissioners held a meeting with the Maori chiefs concerned and agreed to give the Maori claimants title to other land in exchange for Crown ownership of the peninsula. Eventually the "squatters" were billed for back rent for the period that they had made use of the land. Dennis Cochrane and John Lundon, proprietor of the Harp of Erin Hotel an the western side of the point, were charge 80 pounds each. Joseph Bryers, owner of another hotel and trading station, was charged 50 pounds. In 1985, the curator of Clendon House who had been doing archival work for the Hokianga County Council suggested that the higher rent charged to Cochrane, over Bryers implied he had been there longer and therefore arrived at an earlier date than 1831. As Dennis did not then live at Rawene, the rent presumably applied to the land he had built his store on.

Dennis was visited again by the missionary, James Buller in 1869 who said that Cochrane "had a large family of half-caste sons and daughters, but all of them had not done as well as could be wished."

Tradition has it that it was D B Cochrane who built the Cochrane Store safe-keeping but was lost when Mr Turner's house was destroyed by fire on 18 August 1838. This may have related to one of the three Old Land Claims or may have been something arranged between Dennis and his previous father-in-law, Te Whata, specifically for the chief's grandchildren.

Perhaps we will never know exactly how many wives Dennis had in his lifetime, but it appears he had at least four Maori wives during his life in New Zealand. At some point after 1842, he married Ruta (Ruth) Te Raumati who gave him a daughter, Erana (Ellen) who was 6'6" tall and reputedly 110 years old when she died in 1955.

On 13 June (or 13 August, the Marriage Register appears contradictory) 1848 Dennis B Cochrane and Sarah (Hera) Tiraroa were married at the Mangungu Chapel by the missionary, John Hobbs. The ceremony was witnessed by John Hobbs himself and William Webster another local merchant. Rev Hobbs' diary mentions Cochrane in the entry for 31 August that year when Dennis apparently confirmed the death of another settler named Birch who had been accidentally shot. Sarah bore him at least five children: Sarah (Hera), who married Waipouri of Whangape; Mary, who married Walter Honi of Utakura; Robert, who married Sarah Jane Rowntree on 24 December 1867 at Te Hapanga; William Seymour born c 1866 who married Jane Wakefield; John, and possibly other daughters named Madeleine and/or Louise (known as Luey). Robert was a timber merchant, one time interpreter in the Maori Land Court and a key figure in the incident described as the 'Dog Tax War' of 1898.

Although he was frequently described as a timber merchant and that was undoubtedly his principal occupation, he obviously managed to so some farming as well. On 2 April 1849, D B Cochrane was granted an Occupation Licence for his run at Motukaraka, at the junction of the Hokianga and Waima Rivers. In March of that year, another settler and trader, Edward (Neddy) Dunn, was charged with stealing a calf and some fencing material from Dennis.

Dennis' signature is amongst several on a petition dated 9 September 1850 asking the government to establish a bonding warehouse at Hokianga.

By 1854, when Captain Drury was compiling the guide 'Revised Sailing Directions for the Northern Part of the Colony of New Zealand', Dennis was ? at Waima. On passing the site of the previous Cochrane home at Mangamuka, Drury described it as "desserted, overrun with peaches and figs growing in great luxuriance amongst flax and fern".

Water transport was the norm in the Hokianga in those days even for local transport, but most of Dennis's timber was bound for export so it is probably not surprising that in 1858 he purchased a three-quarter share in a 'foreign going' brigantine, the 'Sporting Lass'. However, the vessel was sunk in Australia in 1863 and he does not appear to have reinvested in shipping.

In January 1856, the eldest Cochrane daughter, Jane, married Captain James Reddy Clendon, and Englishman nearly 40 years her senior and fellow timber merchant. He was also New Zealand's first United States which his son, Robert owned in 1872 or 1873 when the attached gum store was used for a school. In a letter dated December 1871, Dennis complains of being unable to sell some gum for more than 21 or 22 pounds per ton. He therefore passed the gum to Samuel Cochrane who was able to obtain 23 pounds per ton for it.

Dennis Cochrane was apparently a big, powerful man and, according to Brett's 'Early History of New Zealand',

Sir Benjamin Thompson, Count Rumford (in German: Reichsgraf von Rumford), FRS (March 26, 1753 – August 21, 1814) was an Anglo-American physicist and inventor whose challenges to established physical theory were part of the 19th century revolution in thermodynamics. He also served as a Colonel in the Loyalist forces in America during the American Revolutionary War, and in 1784 received a knighthood from King George III. A prolific designer, he also drew designs for warships. He later moved to Bavaria and entered government service there, being appointed Bavarian Army Minister and re-organising the army, and was made a Count of the Holy Roman Empire.

#### Early life in America

Thompson was born in rural Woburn, Massachusetts, on March 26, 1753; his birthplace is preserved as a museum. He was educated mainly at the village school, although he sometimes walked to Cambridge with the older Loammi Baldwin to attend lectures by Professor John Winthrop at Harvard College. At the age of 13 he was apprenticed to John Appleton, a merchant of nearby Salem. Thompson excelled at his trade, and coming in contact with refined and well educated people for the first time, adopted many of their characteristics, including an interest in science. While recuperating in Woburn in 1769 from an injury, Thompson conducted experiments concerning the nature of heat and began to correspond with Loammi Baldwin and others about them. Later that year, he worked for a few months for a Boston shopkeeper and then apprenticed himself briefly, and unsuccessfully, to a doctor in Woburn.

Thompson's prospects were dim in 1772 but in that year they changed abruptly. He met, charmed and married a rich and well-connected heiress named Sarah Rolfe, moved to Portsmouth, New Hampshire, and through his wife's influence with the governor, was appointed a major in a New Hampshire Militia.

When the American Revolution began, Thompson was a man of property and standing in New England, and was opposed to the rebels. He was active in recruiting loyalists to fight the rebels. This earned him the enmity of the popular party, and a mob attacked Thompson's house. He fled to the British lines, abandoning his wife, as it turned out, forever. Thompson was welcomed by the British, to whom he gave valuable information about the American forces, and became an advisor to both General Gage and Lord George Germain.

While working with the British armies in America, he conducted experiments concerning the force of gunpowder, the results of which were widely acclaimed when eventually published, in 1781, in the Philosophical Transactions of the Royal Society.[1] Thus, when he moved to London at the conclusion of the war, he already had a reputation as a scientist.

## [edit] Bavarian maturity

In 1785, he moved to Bavaria where he became an aide-de-camp to the Prince-elector Karl Theodor. He spent eleven years in Bavaria, reorganising the army and establishing workhouses for the poor. During his work he also invented the Rumford Soup, a nutritious soup for the poor, and established the cultivation of the potato in Bavaria. He studied methods of cooking, heating, and lighting, including the relative costs and efficiencies of wax candles, tallow candles, and oil lamps.[2] He also founded the Englischer Garten in Munich in 1789; it remains today and is known as one of the largest urban public parks in the world.

## [edit] Experiments on heat

His experiments on gunnery and explosives led to an interest in heat. He devised a method for measuring the specific heats of solids but was disappointed that Johan Wilcke had priority.

Thompson next investigated the insulating properties of various materials including fur, wool and feathers. He correctly appreciated that the insulating properties of these natural materials arise from the fact that they inhibit the convection of air. He then made the somewhat reckless, and incorrect, inference that air and, in fact, all gases, were perfect non-conductors of heat.[3][4] He further saw this as evidence of the argument from design, contending that divine providence had arranged for fur on animals in such a way as to guarantee their comfort.

In 1797, he extended his claim about non-conductivity to liquids.[5] The idea raised considerable objections from the scientific establishment, John Dalton[6] and John Leslie[7] making particularly forthright attacks. Instrumentation far exceeding anything available in terms of accuracy and precision would have been needed to verify Thompson's claim. Again, he seems to have been influenced by his theological beliefs[8] and it is likely that he wished to grant water a privileged and providential status in the regulation of human life.[9]

## [edit] Mechanical equivalent of heat

However, Rumford's most important scientific work took place in Munich, and centered on the nature of heat, which he contended in An Experimental Enquiry Concerning the Source of the Heat which is Excited by Friction (1798) was not the caloric of then-current scientific thinking but a form of motion. Rumford had observed the frictional heat generated by boring cannon at the arsenal in Munich. Rumford immersed a cannon barrel in water and arranged for a

specially blunted boring tool. He showed that the water could be boiled within roughly two and a half hours and that the supply of frictional heat was seemingly inexhaustible. Rumford confirmed that no physical change had taken place in the material of the cannon by comparing the specific heats of the material machined away and that remaining.

Rumford argued that the seemingly indefinite generation of heat was incompatible with the caloric theory. He contended that the only thing communicated to the barrel was motion.

Rumford made no attempt to further quantify the heat generated or to measure the mechanical equivalent of heat. Though this work met with a hostile reception, it was subsequently important in establishing the laws of conservation of energy later in the 19th century.

## [edit] Fireplaces and coffee pots

Thompson was an active and prolific inventor, developing improvements for chimneys and fireplaces and inventing the double boiler, a kitchen range, and a drip coffeepot. The Rumford fireplace is a much more efficient way to heat a room than earlier fireplaces, and created a sensation in London when he introduced the idea of restricting the chimney opening to increase the updraught. He and his workers changed fireplaces by inserting bricks into the hearth to make the side walls angled and added a choke to the chimney to increase the speed of air going up the flue. It effectively produced a streamlined air flow, so all the smoke would go up into the chimney rather than lingering, entering the room and often choking the residents. It also had the effect of increasing the efficiency of the fire, and gave extra control of the rate of combustion of the fuel, whether wood or coal. Many fashionable London houses were modified to his instructions, and became smoke-free. Thompson became a celebrity when news of his success became widespread.

His work was also very profitable, and much imitated when he published his analysis of the way chimneys worked. In many ways, he was similar to Benjamin Franklin, who also invented a new kind of heating stove based on a new way of controlling the air flow into and through the furnace.

He invented a percolating coffee pot following his pioneering work with the Bavarian Army, where he improved the diet of the soldiers as well as their clothes. His work for the army was rewarded by being made Count Rumford. Light and photometry

Rumford was a man of photometry, the measurement of light. He made a photometer and introduced the candle, the predecessor of the candela, as a unit of luminous intensity. His standard candle was made from the oil of a sperm whale, to rigid specifications.[11]

## [edit] Later life

After 1799, he divided his time between France and England. With Sir Joseph Banks, he established the Royal Institution of Great Britain in 1799. The pair chose Sir Humphry Davy as the first lecturer. The institution flourished and became world famous as a result of Davy's pioneering research. His assistant, Michael Faraday established the Institution as a premier research laboratory, and also justly famous for its series of public lectures popularizing science. That tradition continues to the present, and the Royal Institution Christmas lectures attract large audiences through their TV broadcasts.

Thompson endowed the Rumford medals of the Royal Society and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and endowed a professorship at Harvard University. In 1803, he was elected a foreign member of the Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences.

In 1804, he married Marie-Anne Lavoisier, the widow of the great French chemist Antoine Lavoisier, his American wife having died since his emigration. They separated after a year, but Thompson settled in Paris and continued his scientific work until his death on August 21, 1814. With his first wife Thompson had a daughter, Sarah Thompson, who inherited his title. Thompson is buried in the small cemetery of Auteuil in Paris, just across from Adrien-Marie Legendre.

Rumford baking powder (patented 1859) is named after him, having been invented by a former Rumford professor at Harvard University, Eben Norton Horsford (1818–1893), cofounder of the Rumford Chemical Works of East Providence RI.

#### Notes for MARIE-ANNE PIERETTE PAULZE:

Marie-Anne Pierette Paulze (20 January 1758 – 10 February 1836), was born in the town of Montbrison, Loire, in a small province in France. She is most commonly known as the wife of Antoine Lavoisier (Madame Lavoisier) but many do not know of her accomplishments in the field of chemistry.

## Background

Her father, Jacques Paulze, was of French descent and worked primarily as a parliamentary lawyer and financier. Most of his income came from running the Ferme Générale (The General Farm) which was a private consortium of financiers who paid the French monarchy for the privilege of collecting certain taxes. Her mother, Claudine Thoynet Paulze, died in 1761, leaving behind not only Marie-Anne but two other sons. After her mother's death Marie-Anne was placed in a convent where she received her formal education.

At the age of thirteen Marie-Anne received a marriage proposal from the Count d'Amerval, who was nearly three times her age. Jacques Paulze tried to object to the union, but received threats about losing his job with the Ferme Générale. To indirectly thwart the marriage, Jacque Paulze made an offer to one of his colleagues to ask for his daughter's hand instead. This colleague was Antoine Lavoisier, a French nobleman and scientist. Lavoisier accepted the proposition, and he and Marie-Anne were married on 16 December 1771. Lavoisier was about 28.

Lavoisier continued to work for the Ferme-Générale but in 1775 was appointed gunpowder administrator, leading the couple to settle down at the Arsenal in Paris. Here, Lavoisier's interest in chemistry blossomed, and, with the financial security provided by both his and Marie-Anne's family, as well as his various titles and other business ventures, he was able to construct a state-of-the-art chemistry laboratory. Marie-Anne soon became interested in his scientific research and began to actively participate in his laboratory work.

As her interest developed, she received formal training in the field from Jean-Baptiste Bucquet and Philippe Gingembre, both of whom were Lavoisier's colleagues at the time. The Lavoisiers spent most of their time together in the laboratory, working as a team conducting research on many fronts. In fact, the majority of the research effort put forth in the laboratory was actually a joint effort between Marie-Anne and her husband, with Marie-Anne mainly playing the role of laboratory assistant.

## [edit] French Revolution

In 1794 Lavoisier, due to his prominent position in the Ferme-Générale, was branded a traitor during the Reign of Terror by French revolutionaries. Marie-Anne's father, another prominent Ferme-Générale member, was arrested on similar grounds. On 28 November 1793 Lavoisier surrendered to revolutionaries and was imprisoned at Port-Libre. Throughout his imprisonment Marie-Anne visited Lavoisier regularly and fought for his release. She presented his case before Antoine Dupin, who was Lavoisier's accuser and a former member of the Ferme-Générale. She told of her husband's accomplishments as a scientist and his importance to the nation of France. Despite her efforts Lavoisier was tried, convicted of treason and executed on 8 May 1794 in Paris, at the age of 50. Jacques Paulze, Marie-Anne's father, was also executed on the same day.

After his death Marie-Anne became bitter about what had happened to her husband. She was thrown into bankruptcy following the new government's confiscation of her money and property. In addition, the new government seized all of Lavoisier's notebooks and laboratory equipment. Despite these obstacles, Marie-Anne organized the publication of Lavoisier's final memoirs, Mémoires de Chimie, a compilation of his papers and those of his colleagues demonstrating the principles of the new chemistry. The first volume contained work on heat and the formation of liquids, while the second dealt with the ideas of combustion, air, calcination of metals, action of acids, and the composition of water. In the original copy Marie-Anne wrote the preface and attacked revolutionaries and Lavoisier's contemporaries, whom she believed to be responsible for his death. This preface, however, was not included in the final publication. Nevertheless, her efforts secured her husband's legacy in the field of chemistry.

#### [edit] Benjamin Thompson

Marie-Anne eventually remarried, following a four-year courtship and engagement to Benjamin Thompson (Count Rumford). Rumford was one of the most well-known physicists at the time, but the marriage between the two was difficult and short-lived. Marie-Anne also insisted throughout her life that she retain the last name of her first husband, demonstrating her undying devotion to him. Marie-Anne died suddenly in her home in Paris on 10 February 1836, at the age of 78.

## [edit] Contributions to chemistry

Marie-Anne accompanied Lavoisier in his lab during the day, making entries into his lab notebooks and sketching diagrams of his experimental designs. Training she had received from the painter Jacques-Louis David allowed her to accurately and precisely draw experimental apparatuses, which ultimately helped many of Lavoisier's contemporaries to understand his methods and results. Furthermore, she served as the editor of his reports. Together, the Lavoisier's rebuilt the field of chemistry, which had its roots in alchemy and at the time was a convoluted science dominated by George Stahl's theory of phlogiston.

In the eighteenth century the idea of phlogiston (a fire-like element which is gained or released during a material's combustion) was used to describe the apparent property changes that substances exhibited when burned. Marie-Anne, being a master in the English, Latin, and French languages, was able to translate various works about phlogiston into French for her husband to read. Perhaps her most important translation was that of Richard Kirwan's essay 'Essay on Phlogiston and the Constitution of Acids' (see google books), which she both translated and critiqued, adding footnotes as she went along and pointing out errors in the chemistry made throughout the paper. She also translated works by Joseph Priestley, Henry Cavendish, and others for Lavoisier's personal use. This was an invaluable service to Lavoisier, who relied on Marie-Anne's translation of foreign works to keep abreast of current developments in chemistry. In the case of phlogiston, it was Marie-Anne's translation that convinced him the idea was incorrect, ultimately leading to his studies of combustion and his discovery of oxygen gas.

Marie-Anne was also instrumental in the 1789 publication of Lavoisier's Elementary Treatise on Chemistry, which presented a unified view of chemistry as a field. This work proved pivotal in the progression of chemistry, as it presented the idea of conservation of mass as well as a list of elements and a new system for chemical nomenclature. Marie-Anne contributed thirteen drawings that showed all the laboratory instrumentation and equipment used by the Lavoisiers in their experiments. She also kept strict records of the procedures followed, lending validity to the findings Lavoisier published.

#### [edit] Accomplishments as a historian

Before her death, Marie-Anne was able to recover nearly all of Lavoisier's notebooks and chemical apparatuses, most of which survive in a collection at Cornell University, the largest of its kind outside of Europe.

Notes for SARAH THOMPSON:

Sarah Thompson, Countess Rumford, (18 October 1774 - 2 December 1852) was a philanthropist.[1][2][3] She is the first American to be known as a Countess

Thompson was the daughter of the Anglo-American physicist and inventor Benjamin Thompson[1] and of Sarah Rolfe, a rich and well-connected heiress, who was thirteen years older than her husband.[3] Both were born and brought up in the American colonies and married there in 1772.

During the American Revolutionary War of 1775 to 1783, Benjamin Thompson took the side of the British, and at the end of the war he moved to London. He was knighted in 1784. In 1785, when Sarah Thompson was eleven years old, her father moved to Bavaria to become an aide-de-camp to the Prince-elector Karl Theodor.[3] She, however, remained in New England with her mother.[3]

In 1792, Sir Benjamin Thompson was created a Count of the Holy Roman Empire. He took the name "Rumford" for Rumford, New Hampshire, which was an older name for the town of Concord, where he had been married, becoming "Count Rumford".[3]

[edit] Adult life

Around 1796, at her father's request, Sarah Thompson traveled to London to be with him since four years earlier her mother had died.[3] In 1797, the Elector of Bavaria accepted Thompson as a Countess of the Holy Roman Empire.[3] In recognition of her father's military services to Bavaria, she was to be given one half of his pension of 2000 florins upon his death, with the right to live in any country she wished.[2][3] When her father died in 1814 she became "Countess Rumford".[2][3] Thompson spent her time between her homes in Brompton, London, and Concord, New Hampshire, with other trips in-between.[3] She often would travel to Paris and lived there for two and three years.[3]

[edit] Later life

From 1845, Thompson lived primarily at her home in Concord, New Hampshire. [5] She lived there in luxury with an adopted daughter until her death in 1852.[5]

Thompson established the Rolfe and Rumford Asylums in Concord, New Hampshire.[3][1] She provided assistance to and bequeathed large sums of money to charitable societies in Concord and Boston for needy children, motherless girls, widows, and the mentally ill.[3][1][5][5] The United Way in 1984 founded the Rumford Society in honor of the charitable donations given by Thompson.[1]

Her gravestone monument reads,

" In memory of COUNTESS SARAH RUMFORD Only daughter of COUNT RUMFORD and grand daughter of REV. TIMOTHY WALKER, the first, settled minister of Concord.

As the Founder of the Rolfe and Rumford Asylum and Patroness of other institutions of a kindred character: She manifested a deep sympathy with the afflicted and a commendable regard for the poor.

Having passed a large portion of her life in Europe, she returned near its close, to her family mansion in this City, where she was born October 10, 1774, and where she died December 2, 1852.

According to Arthur Ransome "Although he apologised for his "hand, alas, that has grasped the sextant more often than the plane or pen," he was clearly as gifted a writer as he was a shipwright and navigator, being able, in direct and vigorous prose, to convey a vivid and poetic picture of the voyage with its many dangers and delights, and also of himself, with his modesty, his enormous capacity for enjoyment, and his sense of humour (there is something particularly attractive, not to say

Captain Slocum continued to sail the "Spray" after the completion of the journey described in this book, and in 1909 at the age of 65 set out once again on a long single-handed voyage, making for the Orinoco River and the headwaters of the Amazon. He never arrived, his family supposing that he must have been run down by a large steamer during the night. "

She was born Kate Nichols in Brooklyn, New York City to George Little Nichols and Christina Mary Cole. Her father was a partner in a large importing firm.

She married Spencer Trask, a prominent Wall Street Banker and financier on 12 November 1874. Her husband was a director of several railroads and the president of the Edison Illuminating Company of New York. He also helped plan and finance the reorganization of the New York Times in 1896.

Katrina was the mother of four children, all of who died in infancy or childhood. Spencer was killed in a railroad accident in 1909. In 1913 Katrina suffered several heart attacks and spent much of the remainder of her life developing and financing Yaddo where she was an invalid.

On 6 February 1921 she married George Foster Peabody. Katrina died less than a year later in 1922.

In 1878 she wrote Colorado leaves and in 1888 the Chronicles of Yaddo. In 1892 she published (anonymously) Under King Constantine, a book that contained three long love poems. It went through five editions and beginning with the second edition she started identifying herself as Katrina Trask.

She published Free Not Bound (1903), a novel, and Night & Morning (1907), a narrative in Blank verse both were about love and marriage. In 1908 she wrote King Alfred's Jewel a historical drama also in blank verse.

As an avid pacifist she wrote an antiwar play, In the Vanguard which appeared a year before World War I and went through eight editions and was performed by women clubs and church groups

Harriet Hooper (1822-1901) - There died at North Bedeque one month ago in her 80th year, a lady to whose memory is due more than the customary notice. The deceased Mrs Richard Clark was the daughter of the late Major Hooper of Bedeque or as the place is now called Centerville-Major Hooper was of the loyalist stock, a man of some education was a Justice of the Peace, and a leading man of the country.He was twice married, his second wife was the daughter of the reverend Urquhart, a Presbytarian Minister belonging to Miramichi (Canada) by whom he had a numerous family, Mrs Clark being one of the number.The subject of the notice reared a large family and had her full share of life's troubles. The eldest daughter died in young womanhood. The Husband died about thirty years ago and the youngest daughter who had been the wife of D. K.Currie died some years later. The deceased was a sincere Christian woman, kind, hospitable and generous. Her name will always be held in remembrance by a large circle of relatives and friends. Of her five sons Major, the eldest has been for many years in New Zealand. The second Charles resided in St John, Robert the fourth is in California. John the youngest is in Massachusetts and Artemas. The third owns the homestead. The surviving daughter is the wife of James Carruthers of North Bedeque.

Notes for LUTHER BURBANK: Luther Burbank (March 7, 1849 – April 11, 1926) [1] was an American botanist, horticulturist and a pioneer in agricultural science.

He developed more than 800 strains and varieties of plants over his 55-year career. Burbank's varied creations included fruits, flowers, grains, grasses, and vegetables. He developed a spineless cactus (useful for cattle-feed) and the plumcot.

Burbank's most successful strains and varieties include the Shasta daisy, the Fire poppy, the July Elberta peach, the Santa Rosa plum, the Flaming Gold nectarine, the Burbank plum, the Freestone peach, and the Burbank potato. Burbank also bred the white blackberry. A natural sport (genetic variant) of the Burbank potato with russet (reddishbrown) skin later became known as the Russet Burbank potato: this large, brown-skinned, white-fleshed potato has become the world's predominant processing potato.

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Burbank was criticized by scientists of his day because he did not keep the kind of careful records that are the norm in scientific research and because he was mainly interested in getting results rather than in basic research. Jules Janick, Ph.D., Professor of Horticulture and Landscape Architecture, Purdue University, writing in the World Book Encyclopedia, 2004 edition, says: "Burbank cannot be considered a scientist in the academic sense." In 1893 Burbank published a descriptive catalog of some of his best varieties, entitled called New Creations in Fruits and Flowers.

In 1907, Burbank published an "essay on childrearing," called The Training of the Human Plant. In it, he advocated improved treatment of children and eugenic practices such as keeping the unfit and first cousins from marrying.

During his career, Burbank wrote, or co-wrote, several books on his methods and results, including his eight-volume How Plants Are Trained to Work for Man (1921), Harvest of the Years (with Wilbur Hall, 1927), Partner of Nature (1939), and the 12-volume Luther Burbank: His Methods and Discoveries and Their Practical Application.

By all accounts, Burbank was a kindly man who wanted to help other people. He was very interested in education and gave money to the local schools. He married twice: to Helen Coleman in 1880, which ended in divorce in 1896; and to Elizabeth Waters in 1916. He had no children.

Burbank also had a mystical, spiritual side. His friend and admirer Paramahansa Yogananda wrote in his Autobiography of a Yogi:

"His heart was fathomlessly deep, long acquainted with humility, patience, sacrifice. His little home amid the roses was austerely simple; he knew the worthlessness of luxury, the joy of few possessions. The modesty with which he wore his scientific fame repeatedly reminded me of the trees that bend low with the burden of ripening fruits; it is the barren tree that lifts its head high in an empty boast." (Yogananda, 1946, p. 352)

In a speech given to the First Congregational Church of San Francisco in 1926 Burbank said:

"I love humanity, which has been a constant delight to me during all my seventy-seven years of life; and I love flowers, trees, animals, and all the works of Nature as they pass before us in time and space. What a joy life is when you have made a close working partnership with Nature, helping her to produce for the benefit of mankind new forms, colors, and perfumes in flowers which were never known before; fruits in form, size, and flavor never before seen on this globe; and grains of enormously increased productiveness, whose fat kernels are filled with more and better nourishment, a veritable storehouse of perfect food--new food for all the world's untold millions for all time to come."

In mid-March 1926, Burbank suffered a heart attack and became ill with gastrointestinal complications. He died on April 11, 1926, aged 77, and is buried near the greenhouse at the Luther Burbank Home and Gardens.

Burbank's work spurred the passing of the 1930 Plant Patent Act four years after his death. The legislation made it possible to patent new varieties of plants (excluding tuber-propagated plants). In supporting the legislation, Thomas Edison testified before Congress in support of the legislation and said that "This [bill] will, I feel sure, give us many Burbanks." The authorities issued Plant Patents #12, #13, #14, #15, #16, #18, #41, #65, #66, #235, #266, #267, #269, #290, #291, and #1041 to Burbank posthumously.

In 1986, Burbank was inducted into the National Inventors Hall of Fame. The Luther Burbank Home and Gardens, in downtown Santa Rosa, are now designated as a National Historic Landmark. Luther Burbank's Gold Ridge Experiment Farm is listed in the National Register of Historic Places a few miles west of Santa Rosa in the town of Sebastopol, California.

The town of Burbank, California, does not take its name from Burbank, but from the Los Angeles dentist David Burbank; however, the horticulturist gave his name to:

Santa Rosa used to have a performing arts center named after Burbank, but Wells Fargo bought naming rights for \$3.2 million in 2006 and renamed it.

The Lancaster Middle School in Lancaster, Massachusetts was renamed to Luther Burbank Middle School in 2003 A middle school in Los Angeles named Burbank Middle School was also named after Burbank.

Luther Burbank Elementary School in Altadena, California

In 1931 the Boys Parental School located on Mercer Island, Washington changed its name to Luther Burbank School. The school continued to function until 1966. The land on which the school was built was bought by King County and converted into Luther Burbank Park.

Burbank Elementary School in Roxana, Illinois was named after Burbank. It was built in 1936, and an addition was added in 1966. With declining enrollment, the school was closed in 1983 and sold to a local chiropractor. The standard botanical author abbreviation for Burbank consists simply of "Burbank".

Notes for WALTER OWEN BENTLEY:

Walter Owen Bentley (September 16, 1888 - August 3, 1971) was the founder of Bentley Motors. He started life as a railway engineer. He was a keen motor cyclist and importer of French cars before starting his own company. This became famous for building vehicles that were well built simple, reliable and fast. Bentley won 5 times at the 24 hours of Le Mans (1924 and 1927-1930).

Walter Owen Bentley, began his career as a railway engineering apprentice, strangely, so did Henry Royce, but the parallel ends there, for while Royce came from a very poor background and had to cut short his apprenticeship because his aunt could no longer afford the £20 annual premium, Bentleys family were comfortably off. His father was a businessman and they lived in Avenue Road, St Johns Wood, in London.

His youthful enthusiasms were cricket and motorcycling (he raced a 5hp Rex at Brooklands in 1909) and in 1910 he bought his first car, a Riley V-twin two seater. He subsequently owned two Sizaire-Naudins, a single-cylinder model and then a four. He had a high regard for this make.

After his time as a railway apprentice, he was a general assistant at the National Motor Cab Company in Hammersmith, London, then in 1912 joined his brother H. M. Bentley in selling French DFP cars. They were not particularly fast, but Bentley soon improved their performance by using lighter pistons made from 12% copper and 88% aluminium. Thus equipped Bentley's DFP's won several races at Brooklands and, with a new Bentley designed camshaft, took class B records in 1913 and 1914. His time for a flying mile was 89.7 mph, a creditable figure for a two litre car. The Bentley brothers persuaded DFP to adopt aluminium pistons in a production car, which they sold as the 12/40, though not many were made as they were launched less than a year before the outbreak of the First World War.

During the war Bentley worked for the Technical Board of the Royal Naval Air Service to improve the French Clerget rotary engine, where his experience with aluminium pistons was of great value. The modified Clerget designs bore his name, being called the BR1 and BR2 (Bentley Rotary).

After the war, Bentley returned to the partnership of Bentley and Bentley, however, his ambition was to see a car bearing his own name and in August 1919 he formed Bentley Motors Ltd, a successor to another company of the same name which was concerned with sales. Nominal share capital was £200,000, but cash in the bank was only £18,575. The company was under capitalised from the start, and a mortgage was taken out to finance the building of a factory at Cricklewood in North West London. The first prototypes were not made there, but at New Street Mews, off Baker Street. This property belonged to J.H.Easter, who did body trimming for the DFP's.

Bentley's right hand man was Frank Burgess, a former designer and works driver for Humber, who had been responsible for the twin overhead camshaft engine used in that company's 1914 Touring Trophy racing cars.

Burgess brought a TT Humber to Bentley Motors, and some chassis features were reflected in the new Bentley. The engine, however, had only a single camshaft, driven by a shaft from the front of the crankshaft. There were four valves per cylinder and the dimensions were 80 by 149 mm, a long stroke even for those days. At 2996 cc, capacity was just under 3 litres, and the car was christened the 3 litre model. This was the first time a British car had been described in litres, and this puzzled many motorists who were used to horsepower. However the RAC horsepower rating of 15.9 would have made the engine seem smaller than it was, for the rating system was calculated on the bore and took no account of Bentley's unusually long stroke. The rest of the car was conventional, with a four speed gearbox controlled by a right handgear lever, semi-elliptic leaf springs all round and brakes on the rearwheels only (until 1924). It was announced in The Autocar in May 1919, the description being accompanied by a drawing by the famous artist F. Gordon-Crosby, as no car existed in the metal. A chassis was shown at London's first postwar Motor Show, in October 1919, but it was a non-runner; among it's drawbacks was the rather serious one of having no crankshaft. The starting handle was pinned on to an empty crankcase and the flywheel supported by a stub shaft a few inches long. An engine was running at New Street by Christmas (causing an irate Matron of a nearby nursing home to complain at the noise). Deliveries were promised for June 1920, but development took longer and and the firstcar was not delivered until September 1921. It was a two door saloon and the customer paid £1150 for the chassis, (the original price quoted in 1919 was £750.

The cars soon lived up to the original announcement and those who went onto the two year waiting list, were more than satisfied. 21 were delivered in 1921, 122 in 1922, 204 in 1923, and 402 in 1924. The peak year was 1928 when 408 were delivered.

Success in Motor Racing ensured that everyone knew more about Bentley than any other sporting make, to add to this, well known figures such as, Prince George, Gertrude Lawrence and Beatrice Lilliewere among Bentley's customers.

Not having their own coachworks, Bentley recommended some virtually standard bodies, the open four seater tourers were mainly made by Vanden Plas, whose premises were close by, other coachbuilders were soon asked to work on the 3 Litre chassis, and a variety of styles were soon to be seen, from open two seaters to landaulettes.

Although Bentley saw his cars primarily as fast tourers, the demand for closed coachwork made him realise that more power was needed. At first he considered a six cylinder engine on the lines of the 3 litre, but a chance encounter with the prototype Rolls-Royce Phantom 1 in France convinced him that an even larger engine was required and the six cylinder car ended up with the dimensions of 100 by 140 mm, giving a capacity of 6597cc.

The chassis differed in a number of ways from the 3 litre; the cone clutch was replaced by a plate clutch, the differential was much heavier and four wheel brakes were used, the drums of which were finned as opposed to plain. The main difference in engine design was that the camshaft drive was by three - throw coupled rod rather than the vertical shaft of the smaller model.

In 1928 came the sporting version known as the Speed Six. The Speed Six was probably the most successful racing Bentley, with two consecutive wins at Le Mans, but it also carried formal coachwork. Two Speed Sixes were used as patrol cars by the Criminal Investigation Department of the Western Australia Police Force, probably the only Bentley Police cars in the world. Carrying Bolton saloon bodies, they served from 1930 to 1947; when they were withdrawn from service it was said; "There has hardly been a major crime committed in this State which has not been affected by one or other of the Bentley's.

Bentley firmly believed that there was no substitute for litres and far prefered to enlarge an engine than to supercharge a smaller one. The 8 litre engine was essentially that of the 6 1/2 with bore increased to 110 mm, giving a capacity of 7982 cc. Output was 200 or 225 bhp according to the compression ratio. Two wheelbases were available, the longer being 13 feet. Nevertheless, an 8 litre could exceed 100 mph unless fitted with too heavy a body. These were varied as on any other Bentley chassis; Saloons, limousines. coupes, at least one sedanca de ville, and a few open tourers.

The 8 litre could not have come at a worse time, being introduced in 1930, when the depression was hitting particularly hard at expensive cars, and Bentley Motors Ltd was only eight months away from receivership. Only

67 of the 100 eight litre chassis were sold by the company while it was still independent, the remaining 33 being completed under direction of the receiver.

The Bentley company was seriously undercapitalised from the start and would probably have collapsed without Woolf Barnato's intervention in 1925. This was effectively a takeover, for Barnato held 109,400 £1 preference shares and 114,000 one shilling ordinary shares. In contrast, W.O.Bentley held six thousand and three thousand shares respectively, though his brother H.M.Bentley and one or two others also had some stake in the company. In June 1931 the company's debts were such that it could no longer continue trading; Barnato's fortune had been eroded by the depression and he was no longer willing to support Bentley. A receiver was appointed, and it was expected that Napier would aquire Bentley, especially as W.O. had been having discussions with the company about a new twin overhead camshaft sports car. However, they were outbid to the tune of £20,481 by a mystery group called the British Equitable Trust Ltd. They were acting for an unknown company, and Bentley learnt only several days later (from cocktail party conversation overheard by his wife) that the company was Rolls-Royce.

A new firm was formed,BentleyMotors (1931) Ltd,which was a wholly owned subsidiary of Rolls-Royce.W.O. was retained as an employee, but he had little say in the design of the new car that bore his name.Increasingly unhappy, he left when his contract came up for renewal in 1935, joining Lagonda,for whom he designed the LG6 and V12. He was also responsible for the 2 1/2 litre twin-overhead-camshaft six which powered the postwar Lagonda and went into the Aston Martin DB2. He died in 1971, by which time he was a revered figure to the Bentley Drivers'Club, welcoming many gatherings of the vintage cars at his home in Surrey.

In the summer of 1933 the new Bentley was announced. Known as the 3 1/2 litre, it had a modified Rolls-Royce 20/25 engine in a new chassis which had been designed for a 2 1/2 litre Rolls-Royce that never went into production. In the Rolls-Royce tradition, only chassis were supplied, but the makers recommended a number of styles which were made in small runs by the coachbuilders. This cut costs consderably and also the waiting time for delivery.

After the Second World WarBentleys became increasingly similar to Rolls-Royce cars, with a change to a more individual identity only coming in the 1980s. The parent company had moved from Derby to a factory at Crewe which had been built in 1938 for aero-engine construction, and this factory also incorporated a body plant. Here four-door saloon bodies made by Pressed Steel at Cowley,Oxford, were finished. Originally only Bentleys were fitted with these bodies, but from 1949 they also became available on the Rolls-Royce Silver Dawn. The decision to introduce a standard body was partly due to the high cost of custom coachwork, but also because the cars were aimed at export markets more than previously, and the traditional ash frame with aluminium panels was not suitable for some climates.

Announced in the spring of 1946, the postwar Bentley was called the Mark VI and shared with the Rolls-Royce Silver Wraith a new six-cylinder engine whose dimensions were the same as the Mark V Wraith, but it had a new valve outlet, overhead inlet and side exhaust valves. The engine was part of a range called B engines made in four, six and eight cylinder versions. The last was used in the Rolls-Royce Phantom IV and in an experimental Bentley nicknamed the "Scalded Cat". The six used in the Mark VI differed somewhat from that in the Silver Wraith, having twin SU carburetters in place of a single Stromberg, and a higher-lift camshaft. About 80 per cent of the 5201 Mark VI chassis made between 1946 and 1952 had Pressed Steel bodies, but there were also numerous custom styles made. In the ten years after the Second World War British coachbuilders became virtually extinct, but before they disappeared they built many magnificent examples on both Bentley and Rolls-Royce. At least fourteen firms in Britain worked on the MarkVI, as well as some continental coachbuilders. The body was much the same but had a larger luggage boot and automatic transmission was optional.

In April 1955 the R-type gave way to the S-type, whose Rolls-Royce equivalent was called the Silver Cloud. Engine capacity went up to 4887 cc and there was a new body from Pressed Steel, longer and wider, with wings flowing into the doors. There was now no difference between Bentley and Rolls-Royce versions except for the latters' traditional radiator, for which customers paid an additional  $\pm 130$ .

Twinned headlamps came on the S3 of 1962, and special models were still available such as the Continental coupe or convertible by H.J. Mulliner and Park Ward, who merged in 1961, or the Flying Spur four door saloon, also by Mulliner. After the introduction of the S3 there was no longer any difference in engine specification between the Continental and other Bentleys. The last Continental chassis was delivered to the coachbuilder on 20th November 1965 and was not received by the customer until January 1966, four months after the model had been officially replaced by the T series.

In October 1965 all Bentleys and Rolls-Royces gave way to a new four-door saloon with integral consruction and self levelling independent suspension. Known as the Bentley T-type or Rolls-Royce Silver Shadow, it had been under development for nearly

ten years, the first prototype running in 1957. Its design reflected changing tastes, for customers wanted a car with a lower profile, both figuratively and literally: one that yielded nothing in quality to its predecessors yet was less obviously a display of the owners' wealth. At least that was the reasoning, but it must be open to doubt because the T series was outsold by ten to one by the Silver Shadow, the more ostentatious car if only because of its Rolls radiator. The T series years were very lean ones for the Bentley marque. In the early post war years the Mark VI

out sold the Rolls-Royce by three to one, but in the 1970s fewer than 10 per cent of the cars carried Bentley badges, and in 1980 the figure dropped to 4 per cent. It seemed hardly economic to perpetuate the name, but company changes and a new model led to a remarkable revival.

The Mulsanne was born named after theMulsanne straight at Le Mans, harking back to the days of the Bentley Boys, while the Rolls-Royce was the Silver Spirit. The new cars were styled by the Austrian-born Fritz Feller and had a heavier look than that of the T Series, giving the impression of more car for the money.

In the spring of 1982 came a high-performance model which was to begin the process of distancing Bentley from Rolls-Royce. This was the Mulsanne Turbo, which used a Garrett AiResearch turbo-charger to give a boost in power of about 50 per cent, from 200 to300 bhp. Top speed was limited to 135 mph (217 km/h) by a sensor which restricted turbo boost but acceleration from 0 to 60 mph took only 7.5seconds, no mean feat for a car which weighed 4950 pounds (2245kg). TheTurbo's body was similar to that of the Mulsanne, but it could be easily identified by the radiator shell, which was painted in the same colour as the rest of the body, instead of silver. The makers were adamant that the Turbo would never carry a Rolls-Royce radiator, and it has been calculated that if it did it would need an additional 35 bhp to achieve the same performance, because of the drag imposed by the square radiator shell.

The sporting image of the new Bentleys resulted in a dramatic improvement in sales. In 1986, when the group sold 2603 cars, the ratio between Rolls and Bentley was 60:40 and in 1991, with lower overall sales of 1731, the ratio was approximately 50:50. The three models, Eight, Mulsanne and Turbo R, made up the Bentley range in 1992, joined by a new and more individual coupe, the Continental R. The letter designation was chosen as an evocation of the R-type Continental of the 1950s and the new car is in the same spirit, a limited production, higher-performance car sold at a price considerably above that of the saloons. The four-seater coupe body was designed by Ken Greenley and John Heffernan and was derived from a show car of 1985 called the Project 90. The engine was slightly tweaked to give greater power and torque, output now being an estimated 333 bhp. Two years' production had already been sold before the examples were delivered, and some orders were placed only on sight of photographs. In September 1992 there arrived a new variant called the Brooklands. Priced at £91,489, it replaced the Eight and the Mulsanne S and featured a new bonnet and green badge harking back to the vintage GreenLabel Bentleys, new air dam and alloy wheels. Inside the electric column-mounted gearchange was moved to the floor.

Notes for WALTER MARVIN KNOTT:

Walter Marvin Knott (December 11, 1887–December 3, 1981) was a farmer who created the Knott's Berry Farm amusement park.

In the 1920s, Walter Knott was a somewhat unsuccessful farmer, whose fortunes changed when he nursed several abandoned berry plants back to health. The hybrid boysenberry, named after its creator, Rudolph Boysen, was a cross between a blackberry, red raspberry and loganberry. The huge berries were a hit, and the Knott family sold berries, preserves and pies from a Buena Park, California roadside stand. In 1934, Knott's wife Cordelia (née Hornaday, January 23, 1890 – April 12, 1974) began serving fried chicken dinners, and within a few years, lines outside the restaurant were often several hours long. To entertain the waiting crowds, Walter built a Ghost Town in 1940, using buildings relocated from old west towns. Even after Disneyland opened in 1955 a mere 8 miles away, Knott's Berry Farm continued to thrive. Walt Disney and Walter Knott are rumored to have had a cordial relationship; it is known that they each visited the other's park, and they were both members of the original planning council for Children's Hospital of Orange County. Early additions to the farm included a narrow gauge railroad, a San Francisco cable car, a Pan-for-Gold attraction, the Calico Mine Train dark ride and a log flume ride. In 1968, the Knott family fenced the farm, charged admission for the first time, and Knott's Berry Farm officially became an amusement park. Because of his interest in American pioneer history, Knott purchased and restored the real silver mining ghost town of Calico, California in 1951. In 1966, he deeded Calico to San Bernardino County, California. Walter remained active in the operation of Knott's Berry Farm until the death of Cordelia in 1974, at which point he turned his attention toward political causes[citation needed], leaving day-to-day park operations to his children. He is buried at Loma Vista Cemetery in Fullerton, California. The Knott family today no longer owns the theme park; it has since been sold to Cedar Fair. Additionally, ConAgra now carries the "Knott's Berry Farm" brand of jam and jelly.

This regiment was organized at Chicago, July 22, 1861, and moved to St. Louis on Sept. 21. It moved to Island No. 10 in March, 1862, and was engaged until its surrender in April, 50 men of Co. A spiking 6 guns of the enemy on the night of April 1. On the night of April 4 a detachment of 20 men of Co. H on the gunboat "Carondelet," ran the blockade at Island No. 1O. The regiment participated in the siege of Corinth, was engaged in the battle of Farmington, losing 2 killed, 12 wounded and 3 missing, and at Columbia, Tenn., in September it lost 1 man killed. In December it engaged in the Murfreesboro campaign and was engaged in the battle of Stone's river, with a loss of 22 killed, 116 wounded and 85 prisoners. It was also engaged in the battle of Chickamauga, losing 28 killed, 128 wounded and 28 prisoners, and then retreated to Chattanooga. It was in the battle of Missionary ridge, losing 5 killed and 40 wounded being on the skirmish line during the whole engagement. On Jan. 1, 1864, the regiment re-enlisted as a veteran organization and on the 21st moved by rail to Chicago for the usual 30-day furlough. Returning to the field, it was engaged at Rocky Face ridge, Resaca, Adairsville, New Hope Church, Pine mountain, Kennesaw mountain, Peachtree creek, Atlanta, Jonesboro, and Lovejoy' s Station, encamping at Atlanta on Sept. 8. Its total loss during the campaign was 20 killed, 89 wounded and 7 prisoners. On Nov. 22 it commenced the retreat for Nashville, engaging with the enemy at Spring Hill and Franklin, and losing 24 killed, 95 wounded and 30 prisoners. It was also engaged in the battle of Nashville, losing 2 killed and 11 wounded. In the following spring it was transferred to the trans-Mississippi department and remained on duty there until Dec. 16, 1865, when it was mustered out at Indianola Tex.

Description: With the surrender of Forts Henry and Donelson, Tennessee, and the evacuation of Columbus, Kentucky, Gen. P.G.T. Beauregard, commander of the Confederate Army of the Mississippi, chose Island No. 10, about 60 river miles below Columbus, to be the strongpoint for defending the Mississippi River. Nearby was New Madrid, one of the weak points. Brig. Gen. John Pope, commander of the Union Army of the Mississippi, set out from Commerce, Missouri, to attack New Madrid, on February 28. The force marched overland through swamps, lugging supplies and artillery, reached the New Madrid outskirts on March 3, and laid siege to the city. Brig. Gen. John P. McCown, the garrison commander, defended both New Madrid and Island No. 10 from the fortifications. He launched a sortie, under Brig. Gen. M. Jeff Thompson, Missouri State Guard, against the besiegers and brought up heavy artillery to bombard them. On the 13th, the Confederates bombarded the Yankees to no avail. Since it did not appear possible to defend New Madrid, the Confederate gunboats and troops evacuated to Island No. 10 and Tiptonville. On the 14th, Pope's army discovered that New Madrid was deserted and moved in to occupy it. A U.S. Navy flotilla, under the command of Flag-Officer Andrew H. Foote, arrived March 15 upstream from Island No. 10. The ironclad Carondelet on the night of April 4 passed the Island No. 10 batteries and anchored off New Madrid. Pittsburgh followed on the night of April 6. The ironclads helped to overawe the Confederate batteries and guns, enabling Pope's men to cross the river and block the Confederate escape route. Brig. Gen. William W. Mackall, who replaced McCown, surrendered Island No. 10 on April 8. The Mississippi was now open down to Fort Pillow, Tennessee.

Rosecrans left Nashville on December 26, with about 44,000 men, to defeat Bragg's army of more than 37,000. He found Bragg's army on December 29 and went into camp that night, within hearing distance of the Rebels. At dawn on the 31st, Bragg's men attacked the Union right flank. The Confederates had driven the Union line back to the Nashville Pike by 10:00 am but there it held. Union reinforcements arrived from Rosecrans's left in the late forenoon to bolster the stand, and before fighting stopped that day the Federals had established a new, strong line. On New Years Day, both armies marked time. Bragg surmised that Rosecrans would now withdraw, but the next morning he was still in position. In late afternoon, Bragg hurled a division at a Union division that, on January 1, had crossed Stones River and had taken up a strong position on the bluff east of the river. The Confederates drove most of the Federals back across McFadden's Ford, but with the assistance of artillery, the Federals repulsed the attack, compelling the Rebels to retire to their original position. Bragg left the field on the January 4-5, retreating to Shelbyville and Tullahoma, Tennessee. Rosecrans did not pursue, but as the Confederates retired, he claimed the victory. Stones River boosted Union morale. The Confederates had been thrown back in the east, west, and in the Trans-Mississippi.

Bragg was determined to reoccupy Chattanooga and decided to meet a part of Rosecrans's army, defeat them, and then move back into the city. On the 17th he headed north, intending to meet and beat the XXI Army Corps. As Bragg marched north on the 18th, his cavalry and infantry fought with Union cavalry and mounted infantry which were armed with Spencer repeating rifles. Fighting began in earnest on the morning of the 19th, and Bragg's men hammered but did not break the Union line. The next day, Bragg continued his assault on the Union line on the left, and in late morning, Rosecrans was informed that he had a gap in his line. In moving units to shore up the supposed gap, Rosencrans created one, and James Longstreet's men promptly exploited it, driving one-third of the Union army, including Rosecrans himself, from the field. George H. Thomas took over command and began consolidating forces on Horseshoe Ridge and Snodgrass Hill. Although the Rebels launched determined assaults on these forces, they held until after dark. Thomas then led these men from the field leaving it to the Confederates. The Union retired to Chattanooga while the Rebels occupied the surrounding heights.

Regimental History VERMONT TENTH REGIMENT. (THREE YEARS.)

BY REV. EDWIN M. HAYNES, D. D., CHAPLAIN TENTH REGIMENT.

THE Tenth regiment was recruited from all parts of the State. Gen. William Y. W. Ripley of Rutland, a most gallant officer and intelligent gentleman, who had won a high military reputation as Lieut.-Colonel of the First U. S. Sharpshooters, was appointed Colonel, but on account of wounds received at Malvern Hill, from which he was then suffering, he was compelled to decline the appointment. Col. A. B. Jewett, who had been appointed Lieut.-Colonel, was then made Colonel. Captain Eaton, of the Second regiment, was appointed Major, but sickness prevented his acceptance, and Gen. William W. Henry, 1st Lieutenant Co. D, also of the Second regiment, X. was commissioned Major. John H. Edson was Lieut.-Colonel.

Mustered into the U. S. service September 1, 1862, the regiment left Brattleboro on the 6th, reaching Washington on the 8th, and went into quarters at Camp Chase near Arlington Heights the next day. On the 17th the regiment was posted along the Maryland side of the Potomac River in little camps of companies from Muddy Branch to Edward's Ferry, and ordered to guard the fords.

Remaining in these scattered positions until the middle of October, the outposts of what were known as the Defences of Washington, the regiment was then ordered to assemble at the mouth of Seneca Creek, a low marshy spot, a place which proved to be a camp of fever and death. In this region, at Offut's Cross-Roads, Rockville, White's Ford, Conrad's Ferry, Mouth of the Monocacy, and Poolesville, the regiment remained until the 24th of June, 1863, having been in the meantime brigaded with the Thirty-ninth Massachusetts, Fourteenth New Hampshire and Twenty-third Maine regiments. To this brigade were added Sleeper's Tenth Massachusetts Battery, and a squadron of the Sixth Michigan Cavalry, commanded successively by Generals Stoneman and Grover, Colonels Davis and Jewett. The duties of these troops, during a period of nine months, were comparatively light, consisting of picket and guard duty at the fords of the Potomac and cross-roads a few miles into the country. Although there were a number of "scares" and reports of "The rebels are coming," still, during all these months, the regiment had no encounter with the enemy.

On the 22d of June the Tenth regiment received orders to march at once to Harper's Ferry; it was soon after incorporated with the Army of the Potomac, and assigned to the Third Corps, First Brigade, Third Division. Thence onward this regiment participated in the battles and marches of the Third Corps during the remainder of the military existence of that Corps, and in the destinies of the Army of the Potomac up to July 6, 1864.

At the time of the reorganization of the Potomac Army in March, 1864, when the Third and the First Corps were broken up, the veteran troops of their heroic brigades were absorbed in the Divisions of the Second, Fifth, and Sixth Corps, and the Tenth regiment was assigned to the First Brigade, Third Division of the Sixth Corps.

The first engagement of this regiment, which rose to the dignity of a battle, was the action at Locust, or Orange Grove, Va., on the 27th of November, 1863. Gen. W. H. Morris, its brigade commander, speaks of it in the following terms: "The enemy was holding fence on the crest of a hill in our front. I ordered the Tenth Vermont to charge and take it, and the regiment advanced in gallant style and took the crest. I cannot speak of the conduct of the officers and men with too much praise; though the regiment had never before been under sharp fire, they behaved with the determined bravery and steadiness of veterans." Our losses were thirteen killed and fifty-seven wounded. Capt. H. W. Kingsley was severely wounded, and Maj. Edwin Dillingham on General Morris' staff was taken prisoner. Although this battle did not end the campaign, yet there was no more fighting in which this regiment was at all engaged.

In the Wilderness Campaign of 1864, the Tenth regiment was fortunate in its position, at least, in the first day's series of battles, being upon the extreme right of the Union Army, and therefore suffered next to nothing from the fierce assaults made and sustained on the left and center. Still, the regiment steadily advanced in line of battle from the Rapidan River to Orange Pike, which the men crossed under a terrific shelling of the enemy's batteries in plain sight, they springing over between discharges. The next morning, however, by a redisposition of the Union lines, these troops were crowded back to the north side of the pike, and to the rear of the main line. Here they remained undisturbed during most of the day; but about sunset they were suddenly called upon to meet a crisis. The enemy flanked the front line, and were pouring swiftly down upon the second line and swarming around it right when the order was instantly given to change front, and the Tenth Vermont and the One Hundred Sixth New York sprang to their feet and formed immediately across the line of our retreating troops and the pursuing rebels. Here the men fixed bayonets, and falling upon their knees, presented a barrier so formidable as to at once check the retreat, and cause the enemy to retire. The loss of the regiment was about a dozen men in killed and wounded.

In the bloody struggles around Spottsylvania Court House, the more strategic operations on the North and South Anna Rivers, Hanover Court House, and Totopotomoy Creek, the actions of the Tenth regiment may be partially summarized as follows: Many exhausting marches, eager watching face to face with the foe, skirmishing, fighting in a desultory or regular manner when practicable--all phases of warfare to occupy, but little by which any regimental command may be distinguished from another.

In the twelve days' operations at Cold Harbor, the Tenth regiment suffered more than it had in all of its previous

engagements in this campaign. Captains Frost and Darrah, Lieutenants Stetson and Newton were killed. Colonel Henry, Captains Blodgett and Hunt were severely wounded, and Lieutenant Thompson was taken prisoner. The several engagements of the regiment from June 1st to the 12th, reduced its numbers to twelve officers and three hundred and fifty-two men. But their services were highly commended in orders. Capt. S. H. Lewis captured a rebel Major and a Lieutenant single handed. The Fifty-first North Carolina regiment were made prisoners, the commanding officer surrendering his sword, with great formality, to Capt. E. B. Frost.

When General Grant swung his army across the James River, instead of following the main force directly to the front of Petersburg, the Sixth Corps was sent to Bermuda Hundred to assist General Butler in a contemplated advance at that point, but aside from standing in the open field long enough to receive a vigorous shelling, which resulted in the loss of a few men, the regiment did nothing here, and soon returned with the Corps to the Army of the Potomac to join in the numerous engagements which finally completed the investment of Petersburg.

The Tenth remained in this vicinity seventeen days, moving from point to point, fighting, throwing up earthworks, tearing up railroads, and having a bad time generally, when, on the 6th of July it was ordered to Harper's Ferry with the whole of the Third Division, in order to meet a rebel advance into Maryland. But this Division, or rather the First Brigade with one regiment of the Second Brigade, were stopped at Frederick City about noon on the 8th, and reported to Gen. Lew Wallace. Near here lay a rebel army, fifteen thousand strong, under Gen. Jubal Early. General Wallace's forces consisted of the troops above mentioned, two thousand raw militia, one battery of six six-pound guns, and a small mountain howitzer, in all five thousand troops.

That night General Wallace withdrew his little force across the Monocacy River, and posted it so as to cover the Washington pike, three miles from the city. The next day it was utterly overwhelmed by the vastly numerical superiority of its adversary, after a most stubborn resistance of nine hours. The consequences of this heroic struggle, so long maintained and against such odds, were very great. Speaking of it in his "Personal Memoirs," General Grant says: "General Wallace contributed on this occasion by the defeat of the troops under him, a greater benefit to the cause than often falls to the lot of a commander of an equal force, to render by means of victory," and in referring to the retreat of Early from Fort Stephens on the 12th, three days later, he says: "There is no knowing how much this result was contributed to by Gen. Lew Wallace, leading what might well be called almost a forlorn hope. If Early had been but one day earlier, he might have entered the Capital before the arrival of the re-enforcements I had sent." General Wallace in his report of the battle says: "It would be difficult to say enough in praise of the veterans

who made this fight." Early was detained at the Monocacy thirty-six hours by this engagement, severely punished, and utterly defeated in his purpose to capture Washington.

Moving to Washington by way of the Relay House, for the succeeding four weeks the regiment is occupied, with other troops, in marching up the Shenandoah River as far as Berryville, crossing the Potomac at Ball's Bluff, back to Washington through Snicker's Gap, and on over the same and different routes to Harper's Ferry, down to Frederick and the Monocacy, and again to Harper's Ferry. Here on the 8th of August was established the "Middle Military Department," with Maj.-Gen. P. H. Sheridan in command. The Tenth is now a part of General Sheridan's forces operating in the Shenandoah Valley, and continually engaged in that region between Harper's Ferry and Mount Crawford, sharing in all the operations of Sheridan's notable campaign in the valley.

At the battle of Winchester on the 19th of September the casualties in this regiment were ten killed and forty-six wounded. Among those mortally wounded were Maj. Edwin Dillingham, commanding the regiment, and Lieut. D. G. Hill. Lieut. L. A. Abbott was severely wounded, and Capt. George E. Davis slightly. Captain Davis did not leave his company.

At the battle of Fisher's Hill the 22d, the Tenth lost four men killed and five wounded. Capt. John A. Hicks was severely wounded.

At the battle of Cedar Creek the 19th of October, the Tenth lost in killed twenty-two. Two officers--Capt. L. D. Thompson and Lieut. B. B. Clark, were killed. Eight other officers were wounded--Adjt. Wyllys Lyman, Captains Davis and Nye, Lieutenants White, Wheeler, Welch, Read, and Fuller.

Each of these battles is prominent and some of them are famous in history, and for the part taken in each the officers and men of the Tenth were complimented in general orders.

The regiment remained in the vicinity of Cedar Creek and beyond twenty days, then moving north to Kernstown, a little hamlet near Winchester, a little more desultory fighting took place; it was of small account, however, few troops only taking part in it.

Here on the 8th of November the Vermont troops held a Presidential election. On the 24th the army in the valley observed Thanksgiving Day. Each soldier was supplied with three-fourths of a pound of turkey or chicken, a gift of the loyal citizens of New York City.

On the 3d of December the regiment was ordered back to Petersburg, where it arrived on the 5th; actively engaged in the operations of the investing armies at Hatcher's Run and on the Weldon railroad until the 23d, when it went into winter quarters near the last named place south of Petersburg, until the 29th of March, 1865, doing little except extraordinary picket duty during these four months. There was, however, a notable exception to this heavy routine on the 25th. On that date General Lee made his famous demonstration on Forts Stedman and Haskell; ordered to assist in the defeat of this movement, the Tenth was so skilfully led by Lieut.-Col. George B. Damon as to capture one hundred and sixty prisoners on the enemy's entrenched picket line.

In the advance of the army on the 2d of April the position of the Tenth was in front of Fort Welch, and in the grand movement all along the line Lieutenant-Colonel Damon claims that this command was the first of the Division to plant its regimental colors inside of the enemy's fortified line. On the 3d, the regiment entered Petersburg with the victorious army.

In the subsequent six days' fighting and pursuit of the enemy, the Tenth was continuously occupied; but it would be impossible to designate the services of any particular regimental organization where all were whirled on to the supreme crisis reached on the 9th, where victory was shared alike by all.

On the 22d of June the officer in command, Maj. John A. Salsbury, transferred fourteen officers and one hundred thirtysix men to the Fifth regiment, and at Burlington on the 27th, the balance of the regiment, thirteen officers and four hundred fifty one men, were mustered out of the U. S. service.

During the night, veteran units from the Union VI Corps disembarked from troop transports and marched north through the streets of Washington to bolster the defenses. On July 12, Early was finally in position to make a strong demonstration, which was repulsed by the veteran Union troops. In the afternoon, VI Corps units sortied against the Confederate skirmishers, driving them back from their advanced positions in front of Forts Stevens and DeRussy. President Lincoln watched the action from Fort Stevens and came under fire from Confederate sharpshooters. Recognizing that the Union Capitol was now defended by veterans, Early abandoned any thought of taking the city. Early withdrew during the night, marching toward White's Ford on the Potomac, ending his invasion of Maryland. "We didn't take Washington," Early told his staff officers, "but we scared Abe Lincoln like Hell."

Fighting was fierce but inconclusive as both sides attempted to maneuver in the dense woods. Darkness halted the fighting, and both sides rushed forward reinforcements. At dawn on May 6, Hancock attacked along the Plank Road, driving Hill's Corps back in confusion. Longstreet's Corps arrived in time to prevent the collapse of the Confederate right flank. At noon, a devastating Confederate flank attack in Hamilton's Thicket sputtered out when Lt. Gen. James Longstreet was wounded by his own men. The IX Corps (Burnside) moved against the Confederate center, but was repulsed. Union generals James S. Wadsworth and Alexander Hays were killed. Confederate generals John M. Jones, Micah Jenkins, and Leroy A.

Stafford were killed. The battle was a tactical draw. Grant, however, did not retreat as had the other Union generals before him. On May 7, the Federals advanced by the left flank toward the crossroads of Spotsylvania Courthouse.

Notes for PETTY OFFICER FIRST CLASS DAVID WARNER JEWELL: From Dave Shurick -06/04/2003

It would be remiss of me not to mention how special David Jewell was. He was one of my uncles that I always enjoyed seeing. I remember one time when he and my Aunt Helen were visiting I got into his brand new car and pressed the neutral button, the car then backing up in our driveway. It luckily didn't hit anything, and he wasn't mad and took it in great stride. He had a stroke many years before he died and he wasn't able to talk. His frustration at trying to speak was evident. He had great pride and was just a good man. Sometimes in this life you think how nice it would've been to be of the same generation as someone older than you; the reasoning being that if you were the same age as that person then you would have had much more time with them. I certainly would have enjoyed more time with my Uncle Dave.

Notes for SERGEANT WILLIAM PERRY SHURICK:

William Shurick enlisted as a private in the United States Marine Corps and arrived at the Marine Corps Recruit Depot, San Diego, California on January 3rd, 1942. He graduated sometime in April 1942 with the 30th Platoon. Sergeant J.D. Tate, Corporal W.H. Morris and Corporal E.J. Kupenski were his Drill Instructors.

"I voluntarily enlisted in the United States Marine Corps for a four-year hitch, or for the duration of the war, whichever came first. My enlistment started on the third day of January in the year of 1942. My serial number was 346164." "My goal was to become a China Marine. Mother and Dad had reservations - wanted me to put it on hold. Betty and I had special plans." (William Perry Shurick).

Note: "China Marine" was reference to a U.S. Marine that was stationed in China.

During recruit training William experienced difficulty on the rifle range. "Experienced difficulty on the rifle range. Kept shooting on the target next to me. Eye examination verified I had vision problem on the right eye. Treatment provided by Navy Doctors." (William Perry Shurick)

After recruit training Private Shurick attended Radio Operator's School. "Great experience. Doubt if I would ever forget the Morse Code. My dexterity not as good as others, but passable." (William Perry Shurick)

After his training he received orders with the 22nd Marine Regiment. This was a Regimental Combat Team (RCT), or one third of a division. According to the U.S. Marine Corps history the 22nd Marines was activated with the organization of Headquarters and Service Company and the 1st Battalion on June 1st, 1942 at the Fleet Marine Force Training Center, Camp Elliot, California. Weapons Company was organized on June 8th 1942 and the 2nd and 3rd Battalions on June 15th 1942 at Camp Elliott.

Within the 22nd Marine Regiment was the 2nd Separate Tank Company, the company that William was attached to.

The Regiment set sail on the SS LURLINE, an 18,000-ton cruise ship that was taken over by the military for the war effort. Private First Class William E. Pepper of Pickens, Mississippi was aboard the day they shipped out and wrote in his diary:

"On July 19, 1942, the 18,000 ton SS LURLINE, "pride of the Matson line," carrying the 22nd Marines Regiment, weighed anchor at San Diego, California, and set sail for Tutuila." LURLINE's "cabins and mess hall are luxurious. It reminds me of a hotel. The men are pretty crowded, but not as bad as they are on some troop transports.

Private Edwin C. Bearss described the ship's departure: "About 4 o'clock the gangways were taken up. A tug came alongside, lines were cast off, and LURLINE's screws began to turn. Slowly but surely she moved out into the harbor. The troops crowded the decks to watch. Those on the starboard side saw first the Consolidated Aircraft Corporation slip by, then the Marine Corps Base, and finally the Naval Training Station; those on the port beam watched as they passed North Island. Soon the ship preceded by a destroyer, was abreast Point Loma, the majestic

guardian of San Diego Harbor. Dusk soon closed in, and the California coast became a dim blur on the eastern horizon, which ahead and to the southwest were seen the Islas Coronados, destined to be the last Western Hemisphere landfall some of the Marines would ever see." (Bearss 1978-1981: 45-46)

On July 29, 1942, a Japanese submarine 24 miles northeast of Tutulia attached the SS LURLINE. Marine Private Edwin C. Bearss (now retired Chief Historian of the National Park service and noted authority on the American Civil War) recorded the incident for posterity, writing that "Fortunately, the submarine commander had set his "Long Lances" (torpedoes) to run too deep, and one passed under the LURLINE's bow, and the other hard astern." (Bearss 1978-1981: 50)

On July 29, 1942, SS LURLINE dropped anchor in Pago Pago Harbor at 8:06 am. Private First Class Will Pepper wrote this entry in his journal: "This island is very beautiful. The vegetation-covered mountains extend almost to the water. It is different from the kind of vegetation back home (in central Mississippi). There are a lot of palm trees, and dense vines covering the mountains." After unloading "hundreds of bags of mail," LURLINE weighed anchor at 11:30 am, en route to Apia, arriving there at 4:30 pm (Bearss 1978-1981: 51)

According to U.S. Marine Corps history the Regiment began movement to Samoa on June 18th 1942, the 1st Battalion arriving June 29th. For the next 17 months the regiment formed part of the Defense Force, Samoan Group and carried out intensive training in jungle warfare.

There is some disparity in the previous two paragraphs in dates of departure from San Diego and arrival in Samoa. I would offer that it seems the 1st Battalion sailed separately than the 2nd and 3rd Battalion of the Regiment.

"The Officer-in-Charge, Malaria Control, South Pacific sent a "Secret Letter" to the Force Medical Officer, South Pacific, which stated that "filariasis was as high as 50 to 70 percent in some of the units on Tutuila. The lowest rates were 6 percent. The Naval Station had none at all. The Navy had been on the island since 1900 and none of the personnel at the Naval Station had ever contracted the disease. Up until the time of World War it was thought that Caucasians were practically immune to Filariasis. This theory was revised shortly after the arrival of troops to the island." (Burke 1945b: 119 n. 68)

Work parties from the 22nd Marines began unloading SS LURLINE in Apia Harbor on July 31, 1942. Private Ed Bearss wrote: "This was a time-consuming operation, because the gear and supplies had to be first off-loaded into landing craft and barges. These craft then made the run into shore, tying up at either the jetty or the Burns & Philip (sic) dock. The equipment was then handled again, as other fatigue parties shifted it up out of the craft and onto trucks that hauled it to various depots. The sun beat down, and we lamented, "It will take us a long time to get used to the heat." (Bearss 1978-1981: 54)

The U.S. Navy's Mobile Hospital No. 3 (MOB 3) had 40 buildings (in Mapusaga, where the American Samoa Community College is now located) by August 1st, 1942, including an X-ray facility and a second operating room. There were 51 patients in the hospital, and many more beds were soon needed to accommodate the wounded from the Guadacanal campaign, which began on August 7, 1942. (Parsons 1945: 97)

Further, on August 1st, 1942, the 22nd Marines debarked from SS LURLINE in Apia Harbor. They came ashore in small boats, and "After the bedrolls and sea bags had been placed on trucks, the company commanders ordered their men to fall in. Lieutenant Colonel Thomas D. Marks' 2nd Battalion then moved out in heavy marching order. After passing through Apia, the column turned into a macadamized road leading in a southwesterly direction. They hiked about three miles before a halt was called. This was fortunate, because the nearly two weeks aboard ship had taken their toll, and a number of the men's asses were dragging... Soon after establishing their camp, Company E was visited by several Samoans. One of them, a middle age man, was suffering from an advanced case of elephantiasis---one of his legs, from the thigh to the toes, was swollen to several times its normal size. We were told of other extreme cases where the moo moo (i.e. mu mu), as the Samoans called it, "affected other parts of the body, causing them to swell to a huge size. (Bearss 1978-1981: 55-

William spent 20 days confined in a field hospital on Apia 15 days of which were spent with a high fever and he eventually fell into unconsciousness. This was attributable to "Cat Fever" which is similar to Pneumonia. This type of infection attacks the central nervous system and will, in its extreme forms, cause headaches, seizures, combative behavior and coma. Even though no known deaths have occurred from cat fever it can have lasting symptoms to include a loss of visual acuity with a macular star. Later in life, William suffered from visual acuity and macular star.

After this setback he left the field hospital and returned to his unit. "Spent my time learning how to operate the radio equipment in the tank that I was assigned to. Corporal Hicks was the Tank Commander." "Here the main thrust was to develop good crews. Each person had to develop his own expertise, but had to be called upon to assume the skills of his other team members. The rainy season was on, the mud was knee deep; the track would come off, and if you were the one who was responsible for this, it became your task to pull a team together and get the track over the bogey. On occasion it might go easy but most often you would be covered with mud. Tempers would fly and the individual most likely the cause of the problem would have to buy the beer. I was physically in excellent shape." "Yours truly helped change tank tracks and in one instance let my foot get in the way smashing my big toe." (William P. Shurick).

On October 31, 1943, the 22nd Marines (Reinforced) was detached from the Samoan Defense Force and assigned to duty with V Amphibious Corps. Movement from Samoa to Maui, T.H., began November 11, 1943 and was completed on 26 November. One Maui the regiment underwent further training and preparation for the forthcoming Marshalls operation. (Brief History of the 22d Marines)

On January 23, 1944, the 22nd Marines (Reinforced) departed Pearl Harbor for the Marshalls area. As part of Tactical Group One, VAC, the regiment was assigned to the Eniwetok operation. (Brief History of the 22d Marines).

From the Betio airstrip, as well as from newly built fields on Makin and a third atoll, Abemama, scouting and bombing missions to the Marshall Islands began... (Island Fighting WWII, Time Life Books)

Under Rear Admiral Marc A. Mitscher, newly designated as commander of the Fast Carrier Task Forces, carrier strikes at Japanese ships and planes in the region virtually wiped out the possibility of interference with the American invasion. On February 1, 1944, less than three months after Tarawa, Admiral Nimitz' fleet, rearmed, reequipped and prepared with new tactics, attacked Kwajalein Atoll in the central Marshalls. At the northern tip of the atoll the newly formed 4th Marine Division took the causeway-connected islands of Roi and Namur, the main Japanese air base in the Marshalls. At the atoll's southern tip, the Army's 7th Division - all its troops landing from amtracs - took Kwajalein Island, site of an almost completed bomber strip. Some 300 miles to the southeast of Kwajalein Atoll, undefended Majuro Atoll was occupied in a few hours; its lagoon, 26 miles long and six miles wide, quickly became an advance base for Mitscher's fast carriers. (Island Fighting WWII, Time Life Books) Note: William Shurick's unit in this conflict was the newly formed 4th Marine Division.

"When we moved into the Marshall Islands the Commanding Officer of our Tank Company traded off the light tanks for some new medium tanks and we spent a great deal of our time learning changing them over so we would have more protection." (William P. Shurick)

During one of the early assaults he "picked up some shrapnel and along with it the Purple Heart." (William P. Shurick)

"My position changed and I became Top Machine Gunner which lead to becoming the Reconnaissance Non-Commissioned Officer." In another writing he said, "Achieved the Top Gunner competition. My award, besides a promotion was to get involved in reconnoitering the enemy territory. My knowledge about the tanks and how they operate was very valuable, especially in view of the mess we had on Tarawa. My new duties included being exposed to underwater operations. Tasks required a great deal of swimming time, good lung capacity, and strong nerves, especially in dealing with tide changes. My dive range was often around 35 feet below surface or until blood would show up. Your objective was to chart the beaches, held by the enemy, so that the tank ladders could get close to the shore and the tanks could avoid sinking into the water. Once on land the team would melt into the Battle C.P. Headquarters. The major task force then would begin the full scale landing operation from the sea in the Marshall Island Atoll." "Advanced reconnaissance task force used explosive charges etc. 2nd Separate Tank Company, Captain Harry Calcutt - Commanding - 22nd Marines - 4th Marine Division." (William P. Shurick)

Captain Harry Calcutt went on to become a Major and was awarded a Bronze Star and Purple Heart during the battle on the island of Guam. His Bronze Star came as a result of often leaving his tank and personally directing the attack against the Japanese. He came back from the war and lived out his life in his hometown of Traverse City, Grand Traverse, Michigan. He was born June 5th, 1918 and died December 21st, 1996.

Aerial intelligence techniques were refined to provide accurate data about water depths and tide levels. Underwater demolition teams were trained to destroy natural and man-made impediments before any landing took place. (Island Fighting, WWII, Time Life Books) "The Marshall Islands was my first action under fire. We came onto several islands in advance of the landing party to layout the best beach approach. We mapped them out and referred to them as Beach Red, Green, or Blue. We ascertained the approximate size of the enemy force. We marked up the maps, returned to destination area and then to the command ship. The objective, basically, was to determine the capability to bring our medium tanks. We were not authorized to engage anyone." (William P. Shurick)

With the relative ease of the Kwajalein campaign, Nimitz decided not to have the fleet return to Hawaii to regroup. Instead he sent it on to invade Eniwetok Atoll, 380 miles from Kwajalein in the western Marshalls. Charts captured at Kwajalein had provided valuable information about Eniwetok's defenses and about water depths in its lagoon. To cover the landings, scheduled for February 17, nine of Mitscher's fast carriers hit at Truk, the powerful Japanese air and naval base 770 miles to the west of Eniwetok in the Caroline Islands. In two days and one night of raids, Mitscher's planes destroyed some 200 Japanese planes on the ground and sank 41 ships; the total tonnage sunk - more than 200,000 tons - was to remain a record for a single action throughout the War. Truk, which the Japanese had been secretly building up for years, was such a vital linchpin in their entire Pacific strategy that after the raids were over Admiral Koga ordered his remaining planes from Rabaul to protect it, thereby abandoning the Japanese forces in and around New Guinea to the mercy of MacArthur's air arm. (Island Fighting WWII, Time Life Books)

On Eniwetok Island some 800 Japanese were in underground bunkers with connecting tunnels and trenches, or in holes concealed by palm fronds; others were hidden in the underbrush that covered much of the island. The attackers - soldiers of the 106th Infantry, 27th Division, and Marines of the 22nd Regiment - had to scrutinize every yard of their advance. At one point an Army squad tossed grenades down a hole, then heard voices singing a Christian hymn: out came a local village chief and six companions, none hurt. After cigarettes and expressions of good will had been exchanged, the battle with the Japanese resumed. Eniwetok Island fell in two and a half days and yielded still another important document, showing the defensive plans for Parry Island, just across the channel. Three days of bombardment and one day of sharp ground fighting won Parry and completed the conquest of Eniwetok Atoll. (Island Fighting WWII, Time Life Books)

Within a few weeks U.S. Navy parties occupied about 30 other small Marshall atolls and islands, bypassing four atolls still in Japanese hands but isolated and useless. In the entire Marshall campaign, 594 Americans were killed... (Island Fighting WWII, Time Life Books)

"The cruiser USS IOWA caught a broadside from a Japanese shore battery. This exchange of shells left the Japanese shore battery inoperative. They were very frustrated trapped in their quarters. The individual in my team carried and used his flame thrower whenever he was needed." (William P. Shurick)

"At the time I was performing my duties I was exposed to underwater explosions using dynamite, hand grenades, nitro caps, and other explosives (many times the potency of dynamite). The gear I was using at that time in World War was limited to my ability to swim underwater at varying depths and to hold my breath for sustained periods of time without the supportive gear used by divers with air tanks, weights and swim feet. With limited ability to determine your exact depth you frequently get exposed to the bends and often develop ruptures in your colon." (William P. Shurick)

"Going into the landing ahead of the tanks and being in charge of a group of men who depended on your ability to judge critical situations and implement defensive measures hit hard. We basically became "foot soldiers" and at times it was extremely difficult to determine who was the enemy. I had an excellent team of men; we pushed hard and got the missions accomplished. The pressure fell hard on my shoulders and I was not as responsive as I could have been perhaps. My predecessor failed to make it and I was given the task of becoming one to go into the landings well in advance. Combat fatigue entered the situation and after surviving multiple landings my health got the best of me." (William P. Shurick).

Note: My Dad told me years ago that the "predecessor" he speaks of was a Lieutenant who was killed in action as they were coming onto a beach.

"I continued to make other landings in the Marshals, but none were as challenging as Eniwetok." (William P. Shurick)

"When I saw their (Japanese) faces, I realized they were humans like us not just "Japs", but we had our jobs to do when it came to war and you just want to remain alive yourself, so you do what you were trained to do." (William P. Shurick)

My father did talk about a Life Magazine Photographer that accompanied his unit on an operation onto an island. The Photographer's name was George Strock.

During his time on the islands he encountered both Malaria and Filariasis. Filariasis is the name for a group of tropical diseases caused by various thread-like parasitic round worms and their larvae. The larvae transmits the disease to humans through a mosquito bite. Filariasis is characterized by fevers, chills, headaches and skin lesions in the early stages and, if untreated, can progress to include gross enlargement of the limbs and genitalia in a condition called elephantiasis.

In regards to Malaria the symptoms of all types of malaria is the "malaria ague" (chills and fever), which corresponds to the "birth" of the new generation of the parasite. In most cases, the fever has three stages, beginning with uncontrollable shivering for an hour or two, followed by a rapid spike in temperature (as high as 106 degrees F, which lasts three to six hours. Then, just as suddenly, the patient begins to sweat profusely, which will quickly bring down the fever. Other symptoms may include fatigue, severe headache, or nausea and vomiting. As the seating subsides, the patient typically feels exhausted and falls asleep. In many cases, this cycle of chills, fever, and seating occurs every other day, or every third day, and may last for between a week and a month. Those with the chronic form of malaria may have a relapse as long as 50 years after the initial infection. As those of us that knew my father, every time he was hospitalized he exhibited combative behavior and delirium.

Sometime around June 1944, Corporal Shurick was admitted into a field hospital. His bout with Malaria coupled with his combat fatigue earned him a return to the United States. He was admitted into Oak Knoll Naval Hospital, Oakland, California.

"While in the isolation area I was determined to have malnutrition type conditions and was placed on the extensive recovery diet. When our progress warranted it we were moved to a U.S. Marine Recuperation Center in Klamath Falls, Oregon. Here those who could were prepared to return to duty." (William P. Shurick)

"My condition required special treatment and I requested a transfer closer to the mid-west. I was transferred to the U.S. Marine Detachment at the new Great Lakes Naval Prison. I requested assistance from a Doctor Dozer who provided me with reconstruction analysis. Memory loss was extensive and required his professional intervention. He suggested that there maybe a possibility that I might become sterile because of my location to one of the largest Radar Transmitters in the South Pacific. My marriage scheduled for March 31, 1945 was pending and he advised us to look carefully into that possibility. With the war coming to an end I decided to request an early out which was approved. I was discharged from the U.S. Marine Corps on the 4th day of September 1945 with a 50% disability rating. This was based on the following facts of the board: Combat Fatigue, which included Weariness from labor or exertion, nervous exhaustion, Malaria and Filariasis." (William P. Shurick)

"I realize how precious freedom is. The war has taken a toll on me physically, but I would do it all over again for this great country." (William P. Shurick)

His brothers, Oliver Palmes Way and Newton Francis Way now living in Colchester, Connecticut. Oliver Palmes Way now living in Colchester, Connecticut (1909) was a soldier in the Civil War. Enlisted September 1861 in Co. D. 8th CV was discharged December 1865. He reenlisted as Private, promoted to Corporal, thence to Sergeant. Total four years and 9 months service. Engagements - Roanoke Island, Newburne NC, Fort Macon, South Mountain, Anteitam. Fredricksburg. Suffolk, Wilderness, Cold Harbor, Petersburg, Fort Darling etc. He is a carpenter and builder and tanner.

Newton Francis Way was also a soldier in the Civil War and enlisted in Co. D 22nd CV for 9 months. He settled in East Haddam Connecticut living in a house he built for himself and his widowed mother and there they lived on his farm until his mothers death January 1st, 1892. He then removed to Hartford with his brother Henry Russel Way and with him made his home. After removing to Hartford he took up the study of ? in his leisure hours and became quite proficient in it. A good son and brother, yet best of all he was a very intelligent, honest man "God's noblest work". He was buried in the Way family lot in East Haddam, Connecticut. Regimental History CONNECTICUT EIGHTH REGIMENT C. V. INFANTRY. (Three Years.)

# WRITTEN BY J. H. VAILL, LATE QUARTERMASTER-SERGEANT EIGHTH CONNECTICUT VOLUNTEERS.

THE Eighth Regiment was organized at Camp Buckingham, Hartford, in September, 1861. It was commanded by Colonel Edward Harland of Norwich, who had recently returned from a three months' service in the field as a Captain in the Third Regiment.

The regiment left Hartford October 17th, and for a fortnight was in camp of instruction at Jamaica, L. I. November 1st it proceeded to Annapolis. Early in January, 1862, the Eighth sailed with the Burnside Expedition. The Confederate forces on Roanoke Island were attacked February 7th, where the Eighth suffered no loss, being held in reserve. After a month's stay at Roanoke Island, Burnside's forces moved toward Newbern, by transports to Slocum's Creek (about eighteen miles below the city), thence marching up the south bank of the Neuse to the city's line of defense. The attack upon the defenses of Newbern (March 14th) was made at an early hour, and the Eighth assisted in the capture of about five hundred Confederate troops. This was the regiment's first baptism of blood. Its killed were privates Phelps of Company B and Patterson of Company I, with four wounded. The personal bravery of Colonel Harland amid the whistling bullets at Newbern, together with his skill and coolheadedness as a tactician, and his evident desire to shield his men from harm whenever possible, gave them a confidence in him which was never afterward shaken.

The next move of the regiment was March 19th--to engage in the siege of Fort Macon; by steamer to Slocum's Creek, thence marching down the railroad. The siege of Fort Macon terminated during the last week in April by the surrender of the Confederate garrison--forced to such decision by the bombardment of Union batteries, which were supported by the Eighth. During the greater portion of the siege--Colonel Harland being prostrated by typhoid fever--the regiment was under command of Major Appelman, who received a painful though not dangerous wound from a canister-shot.

Soon after the surrender of Fort Macon the Eighth returned by steamer to Newbern, where it enjoyed two months of rest and recuperation. On the 2d of July the regiment went by rail to Morehead City, thence by steamer "Admiral" to Newport News, Va., where it encamped during the remainder of the month. On the first of August, in company with the Eleventh Connecticut, the Eighth went by transport to Aquia Creek, thence by rail to Fredericksburg, going into camp in front of the Lacey House, across the river from the city, where the month of August was spent, the regiment doing picket duty every other day to the westward of Fredericksburg.

With the first of September came the evacuation of Fredericksburg by the Union troops, which were ordered to Washington, where the Eighth arrived on the 3d. The regiment rested in bivouac on Capitol Hill until the 8th, when commenced the march which led to the battle of Antietam (September 17th), by which was brought to the Eighth a severer loss than was occasioned by any other action during the war. Its total loss in that engagement was one hundred and ninety-four in killed, wounded, and missing. Its death-roll included Lieutenant Marvin Wait of Norwich, son of Connecticut's honored citizen, John T. Wait. Enlisting as a private soldier when but eighteen, the story of his heroic fortitude amid the carnage of battle will be preserved upon Connecticut's historic page along with that of Nathan Hale, the vouthful martyr spy. Though severely wounded in his right arm Lieutenant Wait refused to go to the rear, and seizing his sword with his left hand, encouraged his men to press on, until he fell riddled by bullets.

Of the officers wounded at Antietam were Lieutenant-Colonel Appelman, Captain McCall, 1st Lieutenants Henry E. Morgan and Russell, Lieutenant Eaton, Captains Ripley, Main, Jones, and Nelson Bronson. Conspicuous among the enlisted men killed were the brave and broad-shouldered Whiting Wilcox, George H. Marsh (killed by a cannon-ball early in the day), George F. Booth, Harvey E. Elmore, David Lake, Oscar W. Hewitt, Robert Ferris, Elijah White, and Charles E. and William G. Lewis--most if not all of these last named the color-guard, who fell on the line of battle while defending their trust.

Six weeks later came the movement of the Army of the Potomac toward Fredericksburg, where it arrived November 19th. The Eighth pitched its shelter tents in front of the Lacey House again, within a stone's throw of its camp of the previous August. The fruitless attack upon the enemy's entrenched positions brought a loss of more than twelve thousand men to the Union forces, but Harland's Brigade, of which the Eighth formed a part, was fortunate in not getting into the hottest portions of the field. Its loss was one killed and two wounded. The laying of a pontoon bridge across the Rappahannock was the most hazardous of the first day's tasks, the fire from Confederate sharpshooters, entrenched on the opposite side of the river, being disastrous. An hundred men from the Eighth responded to the call for volunteers, and, led by Captain Marsh and Lieutenants Morgan and Ford, went down to the river bank to assist in the terrible ordeal--as brave a band as rode into the "Valley of Death" at Balaklava--but they came back alive only because the chief of the engineer corps decided that it was useless to slaughter an hundred brave men in the vain attempt: the sharpshooters could only be silenced by artillery.

Early in February (1863) Harland's Brigade (Eighth, Eleventh, Fifteenth, and Sixteenth Connecticut) went down the Potomac and spent a month at Newport News, quartered in comfortable barracks. About the middle of March a move was made to Suffolk, where the brigade was assigned to Peck's Division. Here the Eighth had little to do of an exciting nature, except when six companies, under Colonel Ward, made a dash upon a Confederate battery on the Nansemond River, which was captured without firing a shot, so complete and daring a surprise was the movement to the enemy. The regiment remained in the vicinity of Portsmouth during the summer of 1863, occasionally being called out in various directions on short raids.

In December, 1863, three hundred and ten of the original members of the Eighth re-enlisted as veterans, and in January, 1864, went to Connecticut on veteran furlough.

March 1st found the regiment returned to the field for duty. On the 13th it was ordered to Deep Creek; April 21st it went to Yorktown; and May 7th participated in the battle of Walthall Junction--Lieutenants Bingham and Goddard being among the killed, and Colonel Ward, Captain Moore, and Lieutenant Vorra among the wounded. The regiment had now been transferred to the First Division of the Eighteenth Army Corps. May 13th the corps moved up the south side of the James, and on the 16th the Eighth suffered severely by a repulse in the fog at Drewry's Bluff, losing in killed, wounded, and prisoners upwards of sixty. Among the killed were two of the bravest and most efficient soldiers in the regiment--Captain John McCall, and Sergeant Edward Wadhams.

June 1, 1864, was fought the battle of Cold Harbor, in which the Eighth's loss was comparatively slight--eight killed and thirty wounded--the regiment being held during most of the engagement in reserve. Two weeks later commenced the movement toward Petersburg, the campaign lasting nearly all summer. June 16th the regiment lost two killed and seventeen wounded. There was a loss of twenty during the next month, to July 20, from Confederate artillery and sharpshooters, Captain H. C. Hall being among the killed, and Captains Ford and Goodrich among the wounded.

September 26th the Eighteenth Corps was sent back across the James to operate with General Butler toward Richmond. In the successful charge on Battery Harrison, September 29th, the Eighth suffered a loss of eight killed and sixty-five wounded. Among the killed were Lieutenants Irwin and Kilbourne, and Sergeant Seth F. Plumb, the latter having been commissioned Lieutenant, though not yet mustered. Lieutenant Irwin's term of service had expired, and he was free to return home, but he chose not to leave his old regiment when an engagement was pending. Of the wounded in the charge were Lieutenant-Colonel Smith, Captains Roberts and Morgan, and Lieutenants Foss, Rathbun, Keables, and Weed. The charge upon Battery Harrison was the last fighting ordeal which fell to the lot of the decimated Eighth. On the 3d of April, 1865, it was with the advance of the Union Army when it made its final "On to Richmond."

After the close of the war the Eighth went to Lynchburg, where it remained several months, doing semi-military and semipolice duty. The regiment was mustered out on the 12th of December, 1865, after four years and two months' service-having served a longer term than other Connecticut regiments except the First Artillery and the Thirteenth Infantry. Its tattered colors in the Capitol at Hartford speak more eloquently of its service than pen can do here, and the brave men who helped to make and maintain its honorable record will not have suffered and died in vain if the blessings of constitutional liberty are duly appreciated by those in whose behalf they laid down their lives.

Union assaults against the Sunken Road eventually pierced the Confederate center, but the Federal advantage was not followed up. Late in the day, Burnside's corps finally got into action, crossing the stone bridge over Antietam Creek and rolling up the Confederate right. At a crucial moment, A.P. Hill's division arrived from Harpers Ferry and counterattacked, driving back Burnside and saving the day. Although outnumbered two-to-one, Lee committed his entire force, while McClellan sent in less than three-quarters of his army, enabling Lee to fight the Federals to a standstill. During the night, both armies consolidated their lines. In spite of crippling casualties, Lee continued to skirmish with McClellan throughout the 18th, while removing his wounded south of the river. McClellan did not renew the assaults. After dark, Lee ordered the battered Army of Northern Virginia to withdraw across the Potomac into the Shenandoah Valley.

Burnside initiated a new offensive in January 1863, which quickly bogged down in the winter mud. The abortive "Mud March" and other failures led to Burnside's replacement by Maj. Gen. Joseph Hooker in January 1863.

Confederate reinforcements arrived from Richmond and from the Totopotomoy Creek lines. Late on June 1, the Union VI and XVIII Corps reached Cold Harbor and assaulted the Confederate works with some success. By June 2, both armies were on the field, forming on a seven-mile front that extended from Bethesda Church to the Chickahominy River. At dawn June 3, the and XVIII Corps, followed later by the IX Corps, assaulted along the Bethesda Church-Cold Harbor line and were slaughtered at all points. Grant commented in his memoirs that this was the only attack he wished he had never ordered. The armies confronted each other on these lines until the night of June 12, when Grant again advanced by his left flank, marching to James River. On June 14, the Corps was ferried across the river at Wilcox's Landing by transports. On June 15, the rest of the army began crossing on a 2,200-foot long pontoon bridge at Weyanoke. Abandoning the well-defended approaches to Richmond, Grant sought to shift his army quickly south of the river to threaten Petersburg.

# WRITTEN BY LIEUT.-COL. B. F. BLAKESLEE, LATE SECOND LIEUTENANT OF CO. G, SIXTEENTH CONNECTICUT VOLUNTEERS.

THE Sixteen Regiment Connecticut Volunteers was organized during the month of August 1862, under the command of Colonel Frank Beach of the regular army, was mustered into the United States service August 24th by Lieutenant Watson Webb, and left for Washington, D. C., August 29th, where it went into camp on Arlington Heights, near Fort Ward.

After a few days at Fort Ward, the regiment was hurried forward by forced marches, reaching the Army of the Potomac, and being brigaded upon the battle-field of Antietam, on the evening previous to the battle, with the Eighth and Eleventh Connecticut Regiments and the Fourth Rhode Island Volunteers, under General Edward Harland, constituting the Second Brigade, Third Division, Ninth Corps, commanded by General Burnside. During the battle the regiment was kept under a heavy artillery fire at intervals during the day, until about five o'clock, when it was moved against the extreme right of the rebel infantry under General A. P. Hill, massed behind stonewalls and fences. As the regiment entered the fated cornfield it was met by a most terrific volley of musketry, and the slaughter was appalling. Men fell by the score. That the regiment did nobly, is the verdict of all who witnessed its heroism on the battle-field. Its aggregate loss in killed, wounded, captured, and missing, equaled that of any other Connecticut regiment engaged.

The regiment sustained a creditable part in the battle of Fredericksburg under Burnside, meeting with but slight loss. Upon Burnside being relieved of the command of the Army of the Potomac by General Hooker, the Ninth Army Corps was detached and ordered to Newport News, Va. After a pleasant stay of four or five weeks at this place, the regiment was ordered, with the rest of the Connecticut Brigade commanded by General Harland, to Suffolk, where it saw active service during the siege of that place by Longstreet, being twice hotly engaged, with considerable loss, at Edenton Road, April 24, 1863, and Providence Church Road, May 3d. The regiment took five of the enemy prisoners.

On the 16th of June it moved to Portsmouth, and on 22d of that month was engaged in the expedition of General Dix up the Peninsula, to attempt, with other troops, to destroy communication between Lee's army and Richmond. The attempt proved fruitless, and was given up. The expedition is known to history as the "Blackberry Raid," and involved the most severe marching of any campaign in which the regiment had engaged. After the "Blackberry Raid," the regiment enjoyed several months of quiet in camp near Portsmouth, where the military standing of the regiment rose perceptibly. There was not a cleaner, prompter, more loyal, reliable, and honest regiment in the service. No brighter arms, no quicker evolutions, no greater perfection in drill were to be found anywhere. The dress parade every evening gathered a crowd of lookers on; the guards, if detailed to other points, attracted attention; and the name of the Sixteenth was a good name in every man's mouth.

On September 9th five companies were detailed to go to South Mills to do two weeks' picketing. This trip, although dangerous on account of the trouble guerrillas gave, was much enjoyed by the men. The severe thunderstorms, the frightful noises of the Dismal Swamp in the night, the novel scenery, and many incidents and exciting times will never be forgotten by the members detailed. On the 21st of January, 1864, the regiment was ordered to Plymouth, N. C., arriving there at midnight of the 24th. While there the regiment made several raids into the interior, breaking up rebel cavalry camps, capturing or burning large quantities of cotton and tobacco, besides taking a number of prisoners. March 3d the regiment was ordered to Newbern, which was threatened with attack. Here the regiment went into barracks near the Neuse River, Company G going into Fort Stevenson, relieving a company of the Twentyfirst Connecticut.

March 20th, the scare being over, the regiment returned to Plymouth, taking the steamer "Thomas Collyer." The vessel narrowly escaped shipwreck in a storm off Roanoke Island, the men being rescued, after much suffering from cold and hunger, by the steamer "General Berry."

On the 17th of April, Plymouth, garrisoned by 1,600 men under General H. W. Wessells of Connecticut, was attacked by an overwhelming force of the enemy under General R. D. Hoke, assisted by the iron-clad ram "Albermarle" in the Roanoke River. Until noon of the 20th a most desperate and stubborn fight ensued. The superior numbers of the Confederates gave them great advantages, and they soon invested the works so closely with swarming infantry that the town was compelled to surrender. The defense of Plymouth by its garrison of 1,600 men against a besieging force of 12,000 men, was one of the most stubbornly contested sieges of the war. Five times the enemy stormed the lines, and as many times were they handsomely repulsed, with great slaughter. The rebels raised the "black flag" against the negroes found in uniform, and mercilessly shot them down. Fort Pillow was re-enacted. The losses in the Sixteenth, including the captured, were four hundred and thirty-six.

The story of the preservation of the colors of the Sixteenth is now widely known. When every hope of escape was destroyed, the color-guard tore each flag from its staff, and strips torn into shreds were distributed among the members of the regiment, and concealed in various ways through the weary days of their imprisonment. In 1879 as many of these remnants as could be obtained from the survivors of the regiment were gathered and made up in the shape of a shield surmounted by an eagle, which has been sewn upon a white silk banner, trimmed with gold fringe, and bearing in letters of gold this inscription:

"Antietam, Fredericksburg,

Edenton Road, SHIELD Siege of Suffolk,

Nansemond, Plymouth.

The device on the flag is composed entirely of fragments of the old colors of the Sixteenth Regiment Connecticut Volunteers. They were torn into shreds by the officers and men and concealed on their persons in order to save them from the enemy, at the battle of Plymouth, N. C., April 20, 1864, where, together with the whole Union force at that post, the regiment after three days' fight against overwhelming numbers was compelled to surrender. Many of the men bearing these relics were taken to Southern prisons, where under untold privations they still sacredly watched over and kept their trusts, subsequently returning them to their native State."

The restored banner was deposited with the battle-flags of the State at the Capitol "Battle Flag Day," September 17, 1879.

For the greater part of a year the captured suffered confinement in prison pens of the South; one-half of them died in prison, preferring death to the dishonor of saving life by taking the oath of allegiance to the hated Confederacy. Company H, Captain Joseph H. Barnum, which escaped capture by being detached and sent to Roanoke Island for duty April 17, 1864, was re-enforced now and then by men who had previously been detached for special service, representing every company, or were absent, sick; also by a few who were exchanged or escaped from time to time; and this composed the Sixteenth Regiment in actual service.

During December the organization proceeded to Plymouth, and then on an expedition to Foster's Mills, about ten miles distant, destroying the mills and a large quantity of grain, and returning with various spoils. On another occasion the Sixteenth went to Hertford, where they captured large quantities of cotton, tobacco, finished carriages and buggies, several thousand feet of lumber, several mules, and forty contrabands. And again one bright night sixty men of the regiment proceeded by steamer up the Alligator River, capturing a barge and three small sail vessels containing 2,500 bushels of shelled corn, together with the outfit of fifteen men, with their mules and carts. The Sixteenth also made several unimportant raids to Columbia, Edenton, and the adjoining country, until March 4, 1865, when they were ordered to Newbern, N. C., where, the exchanged prisoners having joined them, they remained on provost duty. Quite a number of the men who were returning to the regiment after captivity were on a steamer going down the Potomac River in the night, when the boat collided with the "Black Diamond." All the passengers jumped aboard the "Diamond," which went down, and the regiment lost several men. Some of the saved remained in the water three or four hours.

It fell to the lot of the Sixteenth to act as personal escort for General Grant on the occasion of his visit to General Sherman at Raleigh, while Sherman's forces were confronted by the Confederate army in North Carolina in April, 1865.

The regiment was mustered out of the service of the United States June 24, 1865.

Description: On September 16, Maj. Gen. George B. McClellan confronted Lee's Army of Northern Virginia at Sharpsburg, Maryland. At dawn September 17, Hooker's corps mounted a powerful assault on Lee's left flank that began the single bloodiest day in American military history. Attacks and counterattacks swept across Miller's cornfield and fighting swirled around the Dunker Church. Union assaults against the Sunken Road eventually pierced the Confederate center, but the Federal advantage was not followed up. Late in the day, Burnside's corps finally got into action, crossing the stone bridge over Antietam Creek and rolling up the Confederate right. At a crucial moment, A.P. Hill's division arrived from Harpers Ferry and counterattacked, driving back Burnside and saving the day. Although outnumbered two-to-one, Lee committed his entire force, while McClellan sent in less than three-quarters of his army, enabling Lee to fight the Federals to a standstill. During the night, both armies consolidated their lines. In spite of crippling casualties, Lee continued to skirmish with McClellan throughout the 18th, while removing his wounded south of the river. McClellan did not renew the assaults. After dark, Lee ordered the battered Army of Northern Virginia to withdraw across the Potomac into the Shenandoah Valley.

Description: On November 14, Burnside, now in command of the Army of the Potomac, sent a corps to occupy the vicinity of Falmouth near Fredericksburg. The rest of the army soon followed. Lee reacted by entrenching his army on the heights behind the town. On December 11, Union engineers laid five pontoon bridges across the Rappahannock under fire. On the 12th, the Federal army crossed over, and on December 13, Burnside mounted a series of futile frontal assaults on Prospect Hill and Marye's Heights that resulted in staggering casualties. Meade's division, on the Union left flank, briefly penetrated Jackson's line but was driven back by a counterattack. Union generals C. Feger Jackson and George Bayard, and Confederate generals Thomas R.R. Cobb and Maxey Gregg were killed. On December 15, Burnside called off the offensive and recrossed the river, ending the campaign. Burnside initiated a new offensive in January 1863, which quickly bogged down in the winter mud. The abortive "Mud March" and other failures led to Burnside's replacement by Maj. Gen. Joseph Hooker in January 1863.

By May 4, the last of Longstreet's command had crossed the Blackwater River en route to Richmond.

54th Infantry Regiment, organized at Savannah, Georgia, during the summer of 1862, contained men recruited in the counties of Lamar, Appling, Harris, Muscogee, Bartow, Chatham, and Barrow. The unit moved to the Charleston area and was involved in numerous conflicts including the fight at Battery Wagner. Later it was assigned to Mercer's and J.A. Smith's Brigade, Army of Tennessee. The 54th participated in the Atlanta Campaign, Hood's Tennessee operations, and the Battle of Bentonville. During the Atlanta Campaign, July 20 to September 1, it reported 93 casualties and in December, 1864, totalled 168 effectives. The regiment surrendered on April 26, 1865. Colonel Charlton H. Way, Lieutenant Colonel Morgan Rawls, and Major William H. Mann were in command.

He withdrew his main army at night from Atlanta's outer line to the inner line, enticing Sherman to follow. In the meantime, he sent William J. Hardee with his corps on a fifteen-mile march to hit the unprotected Union left and rear, east of the city. Wheeler's cavalry was to operate farther out on Sherman's supply line, and Gen. Frank Cheatham's corps were to attack the Union front. Hood, however, miscalculated the time necessary to make the march, and Hardee was unable to attack until afternoon. Although Hood had outmaneuvered Sherman for the time being, McPherson was concerned about his left flank and sent his reserves—Grenville Dodge's XVI Army Corps—to that location. Two of Hood's divisions ran into this reserve force and were repulsed. The Rebel attack stalled on the Union rear but began to roll up the left flank. Around the same time, a Confederate soldier shot and killed McPherson when he rode out to observe the fighting. Determined attacks continued, but the Union forces held. About 4:00 pm, Cheatham's corps broke through the Union front at the Hurt House, but Sherman massed twenty artillery pieces on a knoll near his headquarters to shell these Confederates and halt their drive. Maj. Gen. John A. Logan's XV Army Corps then led a counterattack that restored the Union line. The Union troops held, and Hood suffered high casualties.

On March 19, Slocum encountered the entrenched Confederates of Gen. Joseph E. Johnston who had concentrated to meet his advance at Bentonville. Late afternoon, Johnston attacked, crushing the line of the XIV Corps. Only strong counterattacks and desperate fighting south of the Goldsborough Road blunted the Confederate offensive. Elements of the XX Corps were thrown into the action as they arrived on the field. Five Confederate attacks failed to dislodge the Federal defenders and darkness ended the first day's fighting. During the night, Johnston contracted his line into a "V" to protect his flanks with Mill Creek to his rear. On March 20, Slocum was heavily reinforced, but fighting was sporadic. Sherman was inclined to let Johnston retreat. On the 21st, however, Johnston remained in position while he removed his wounded. Skirmishing heated up along the entire front. In the afternoon, Maj. Gen. Joseph Mower led his Union division along a narrow trace that carried it across Mill Creek into Johnston's rear. Confederate counterattacks stopped Mower's advance, saving the army's only line of communication and retreat. Mower withdrew, ending fighting for the day. During the night, Johnston retreated across the bridge at Bentonville. Union forces pursued at first light, driving back Wheeler's rearguard and saving the bridge. Federal pursuit was halted at Hannah's Creek after a severe skirmish. Sherman, after regrouping at Goldsborough, pursued Johnston toward Raleigh. On April 18, Johnston signed an armistice with Sherman at the Bennett House, and on April 26, formally surrendered his army.

In 1974 her house at Rawene "Clendon House" was bought by the NZ Historic Places Trust. It is now open as a museum.

Captain Clendon of the Bay of Islands Sept 21 1835 was on the committe to prohibit the import ation and sale of beer and spirits in Hokianga.

Clendon was Police magistrate at the Bay of Islands Clendon house at Rawene now under historical places trust. Also his house in Russell is now i n private occupation Had house ,store,& jetty at Okataki Which was the first Goverment house . He was also first American Consel in NZ 1839-1841. This was first Capital of NZ 1840-41.

He was also at the battle at Ohaeawai in 1845 against Hongi Heka In May of 1846 he conduted a census in the Hokianga

According to family information James Reddy Clendon was born in Deal, Kent, England, on 1 Oct ober 1800; he was baptised there on 22 October. He was the son of Gordon Clendon, pilot of the Cinque Ports, and his wife, Elizabeth Chitty. James Clendon began his business career a s a ship owner in London, in partnership with his brother John Chitty Clendon. He married Sar ah Hill at Port Jackson (Sydney) on 2 October 1826. Their first child, James Stephenson Clend on, was born in London in January 1827.

In 1828, as captain of the City of Edinburgh, he transported female prisoners to the convict settlement at Port Jackson, and having discharged these, he spent some time on the Australi an coast before proceeding to New Zealand for spars. Sarah Clendon was with him on this voyag e, and in January 1829, at sea off Hokianga, she gave birth to their second child, Eliza. The y returned to London in 1830.

Having purchased the schooner Fortitude, Clendon and his partner, Samuel Stephenson, saile d for New Zealand, arriving at the Bay of Islands on 31 August 1832. While there in 1830 Clen don had arranged with Pomare II and Kiwikiwi, of Ngati Manu, to acquire some 220 acres at Oki ato, about four miles upstream from the growing village of Kororareka (Russell). Here he and his family settled, and set up a trading station to supply the needs of the rapidly growin g Pacific whaling fleet. In 1837 he added another 80 acres to his Okiato estate, and a year 1 ater purchased 3,342 acres at Manawaora, on the seaward coast. This became the Clendon farm.

With the Fortitude Clendon and Stephenson traded for provisions, flax and timber, and

in 1833 entered Hokianga Harbour to load timber at George Nimmo's Motukauri establishment. Mi sfortune overtook the vessel here when it stranded and was plundered by local Maori. This cau sed a minor war between rival tribal groups, but the Fortitude survived and was floated off s afely. Clendon then became involved in Bay of Islands politics. In 1834 he was one of the sig natories to a letter to James Busby, the British Resident, demanding punishment of a Maori wh o had fired on Busby when surprised by him while robbing an out-building. In 1835 Clendon pub licly drained all his rum casks, apparently hoping to encourage sober habits among the riotou s lower orders at the Bay. It was an unsuccessful sacrifice, however, since the unrepentant w ere making much money out of the trade. In this period, too, he supported Busby in his effort s to unite the northern tribes to thwart the pretensions of Baron Charles de Thierry, who hop ed to establish himself as 'sovereign chief' at Hokianga. Clendon also signed the 1837 petiti on to William IV, praying for protection against increasing local lawlessness. An indicatio n of his standing in the community was his appointment as president of the New Zealand Bankin g Company, which opened New Zealand's first bank at Kororareka in September 1840. Clendon's c ommercial pre-eminence was assured when, on 12 October 1838, he was empowered to act as Unite d States consul in New Zealand; but he could not assume full consular status,

there being n o government to which he could be accredited. However, he did gain virtually all the busines s of visiting American ships, and since he recorded the arrival of 151 American ships between 1839 and 1841, it was undoubtedly a profitable appointment. This favourable progress suffer ed after the arrival of Captain William Hobson in January 1840. Clendon supported him in his negotiations for the cession of sovereignty to the British Crown, but the signing of the Tr eaty of Waitangi dealt a cruel blow to his American business, since it adversely affected Uni ted States interests, politically and financially. But Clendon did sell his Okiato property t o the newly fledged administration, for the government establishment. Hobson, now lieutenan t governor, took possession and had the land surveyed as a town. He named this Russell, and i t remained the seat of government until February 1841. Owing to administrative problems, Clen don received only a small part of the purchase price and was obliged to accept in settlement a 10,000 acre block south of Auckland. Having delegated his consular functions after the si gning of the treaty, Clendon relinquished them entirely in 1841. He then resorted to farmin g his Manawaora land and entered his phase as a public servant. In 1840 he had been appointed a justice of the peace and had become a member of New Zealand's first Legislative Council. As the administration stabilised, Clendon assumed the duties of police magistrate at the Ba y of Islands in 1845, together with other minor government functions, and during the war with Hone Heke advised the British military on local matters. He was present in this capacity at the attack on Ohaeawai. After the war he continued in office at Kororareka, by then rename d Russell, and conducted a census of the European population of the north in 1846. From about that time his magisterial jurisdiction extended to include Hokianga. In 1855 Sarah Clendo n died at the Bay of Islands, leaving her husband with six children. On 9 January 1856 at Pai hia, Clendon married Jane Cochrane, the daughter of Dennis Cochrane of Hokianga and his lat e wife, Takatowai Te Whata. James and Jane had eight children. Early in 1862, after a brief r esidence at Kerikeri, the Clendons settled at Rawene. As magistrate there under the Native Ci rcuit Courts Act, with his son James acting as clerk of court, Clendon dispensed justice in i nformal surroundings and in conformity with Maori conceptions. His reputation in this respect was already well established; while resident magistrate at Russell in 1858, he had visite d Hokianga and successfully settled 67 European--Maori disputes. However, the Resident Magist rates' Act 1867 repealed the Native Circuit Courts Act, and Clendon retired. He now reverte d to his former occupation as a merchant, taking up licences to sell beer, wine and spirits a t Rawene; these licences were current from 1869 to 1872. On 24 October 1872 he died at Rawene . Clendon's house still stands at Rawene. Built in the late 1860s, it is now owned by the Ne w Zealand Historic Places Trust and is open to the public. Jane Clendon, only 34 years old a t James's death, lived until 1919.

#### Notes for MAJOR HOOPER CLARK:

Mr. Major Hooper Clark, Factory Manager of the Kia Ora Dairy Factory, was born at Hokitika, Westland, in 1877. He was educated at Midhurst, Taranaki, where he had about four years' experience in a sawmill, and in 1894 he joined the staff of the Midhurst Dairy Factory as a junior. For two years he occupied the position of assistant buttermaker at that factory, and left to take up the position of manager at Makaraka factory. Mr. Clark assisted in the opening of the factory, and fitted up the entire plant, excepting the freezing machine, which has from the first been under his management.

Kia Ora Dairy Factory (Thomas McGregor, proprietor), Makaraka. This factory was started in a temporary building in the early part of 1899, and the present premises were completed in November of that year. The factory is substantially constructed of brick, and is fitted with the most approved appliances for the expeditious and efficient production of butter. The plant is driven by a twelve-horse-power boiler, attached to an eight-horse-power Tangye engine. Two 400-gallon De Laval separators are installed, and a thirty bottle steam turbine tester, which is about the largest to be obtained, and on the latest principle. The factory is supplied also with a circular butter worker, a churn capable of manipulating 800lbs at a time, and a Humble and Malcolm freezing machine, and with one of Anderson and Co.'s cream vats, capable of holding 300 gallons, a Dobson's steam hoist, and a Sahoe cream elevator for lifting the cream. The condenser, the chilling chamber, and the freezing chamber are the other main items of the plant. The utmost cleanliness, an important factor, is observed, and the factory is so compact and well arranged that it is a model of its kind. Mr. McGregor has established two skimming stations, one at Patutahi and one at Gisborne. In each of these he has a 400-gallon De Laval separator. At his factory he obtains milk from the farms within a radius of five miles, and cream is brought to him from a distance of twelve miles. The Kia Ora butter is praised very highly, and some Taranaki dairymen describe it as of full, rich flavour, probably fuller and richer than their own. Other high encomiums have been passed on Mr. McGregor's manufactures, and the best test is in the large sale that he maintains. The Kia Ora has by far the largest local sale, and besides the export out of the Colony, quantities are sent to Auckland. Messrs Bennet and Sherratt are the Gisborne wholesale agents, distributing throughout the district to storekeepers. In the English market Kia Ora butter brings a high price, and several letters have been sent to the Colony in praise of its excellent qualities.

# Notes for JOHN BERNARD HART:

John Bernard Hart ONZM (born 1946) is a former New Zealand rugby union personality who coached and managed both the All Blacks and the Auckland rugby union team, and played rugby for Waitemata and Auckland.

Hart was born in Auckland to father Joe, who worked for the bicycle importing company W.H. Worrall and Company, and mother Joan. He was the second of four children; he had an older brother, Graeme, a younger sister Loraine and a younger brother, Ian.

Hart was educated at Mount Roskill Grammar School, where he was best all-round sportsman, head of his house and deputy prefect in his final year. He then enrolled in a Bachelor of Commerce at University of Auckland in hope of becoming an accountant, but his attention was more focused towards leisure than his studies. Hart no longer qualified for a bursary after failing more subjects in his second year, forcing him to complete his degree part-time.

He was later appointed Group Employee Relations Director for Fletcher Challenge, then New Zealand's largest company.

John Hart began his first class coaching career for Auckland in 1982. He coached Auckland to the National Provincial Championship (NPC) title in 1982, 1984 and 1985, and it was during his tenure that, in 1985, Auckland won the Ranfurly Shield from Canterbury and began the series of 61 successful defences that remains a record in shield history.

Hart, together with Alex Wyllie, was an assistant coach under Brian Lochore when the All Blacks won the first Rugby World Cup in 1987. In 1988, Lochore retired from coaching and Wyllie was appointed to succeed him, an appointment that upset many, especially Auckland, fans. Hart then refused to be part of the selection panel, but was eventually appointed co-coach with Wyllie for the 1991 Rugby World Cup. In hindsight, this was widely regarded to be a mistake: the personality clash between the two coaches was reflected in a split within the squad into Auckland and Canterbury factions.

Following the All Blacks' loss to Australia in the semi-finals, Wyllie resigned, while Hart sought to become head coach, but was beaten to the post by the then Otago coach Laurie Mains.

Mains coached the All Blacks to the final of the 1995 Rugby World Cup, which was won by South Africa, continued as coach for a year-end tour to France, after which he resigned and was replaced by John Hart. During Hart's tenure as head coach, the All Blacks achieved their first ever series win in South Africa, in 1996, and won the Tri-Nations three times, in 1996/97 and 1999. But when New Zealand lost unexpectedly to France in the semi-final of the 1999 Rugby World Cup, Hart, like his immediate predecessors, resigned. As head coach, Hart was in charge of the All Blacks for 41 games, winning 31, drawing one and losing nine.

In 1990, John Hart was the coach of a New Zealand Under-21 side that toured Australia. Martin Johnson, who captained England to the title at the 2003 Rugby World Cup, was one of the players in the squad.

In January 2005, Hart was appointed to the Board of Cullen Sports, owners of the New Zealand Warriors, a New Zealand rugby league club, for which he later served as the Executive Director of Football. He also served on the boards of a number of other companies, provides consultancy services in the fields of human resources and leadership, and is an active speaker on the lecture circuit. In December 2011 Hart resigned from the Warriors and took up a position as the New Zealand PGA Pro-Am organising committee chairman.

For his services to rugby, Hart was appointed an Officer of The New Zealand Order of Merit in The Queen's Birthday Honours 1997.

Hart is the co-author (with Paul Thomas) of two books, Straight from the Hart (1993) and Change of Hart (1997) (ISBN 1869585712); the latter gives a first-hand account of the transition to professional rugby, in which he played a significant part.

Notes for DAVID HUMISTON KELLEY:

David Humiston Kelley (born April 1, 1924, Albany, New York) is a Canadian archaeologist and epigrapher, most noted for his work on the phonetic analysis and major contributions toward the decipherment of the writing system used by the Maya civilization of pre-Columbian Mesoamerica, the Maya script.

From the late 1950s, he was one of the first Mayanist scholars to give credence to the theories of the Russian linguist and ethnographer Yuri Knorosov concerning the phonetic and syllabic nature of the Maya script, which would later lead to breakthroughs in the script's decipherment. Kelley's landmark 1962 paper, Phoneticism in the Maya Script, would provide important corroborating data of the phonetic interpretation of Maya glyphs, which ran counter to the then-prevailing view that the script lacked phonetic elements.

In addition to his work on scripts and linguistics, he has worked on calendrics and archaeoastronomy. He is coauthor with Eugene Milone of Exploring Ancient Skies: An Encyclopedic Survey of Archaeoastronomy (Springer, 2005).

He is also interested in long-range cultural contacts, including trans-Pacific and trans-Atlantic voyages.

He has tried to establish various mediaeval and ancient genealogies. Kelley is a professor emeritus in the Department of Archaeology at the University of Calgary.

Notes for EDWARD WASHBURN KELLOGG:

Edward W. Kellogg, born in Washington. a graduate of Phillips Academy, Andover (Class of 1902), was the joint inventor of the moving coil loudspeaker in 1925 along with Chester W. Rice at General Electric, and independently by Edward Wente at Bell Labs. Kellogg also patented an electrostatic loudspeaker in 1934.

Kellogg was the first director of the GE Advanced Technology Laboratory in Schenectady, New York, which later became a part of RCA Victor in Camden, New Jersey (and is now part of Lockheed Martin). Kellogg also was also the first head of their Photophone development group.

#### Notes for JOHN KNUDSEN "JACK" NORTHROP:

John Knudsen "Jack" Northrop (November 10, 1895 – February 18, 1981) was an American aircraft industrialist. He co-founded the Lockheed Corporation in 1927. He was the founder and eponym of the Northrop Corporation in 1939.

#### Entering aviation

Northrop's first job in aviation was in working for Loughead Aircraft Manufacturing Company (later Lockheed Corporation) in 1916. In 1923, Northrop joined Douglas Aircraft Company. He became chief engineer, but later rejoined Lockheed — now renamed Lockheed. During his second tenure there, he worked on the Lockheed Vega, the civilian transport flown by Amelia Earhart.[1]

#### [edit] Company founding

In 1928, Northrop struck out on his own, founding the Avion Corporation, which Northrop was forced to sell to United Aircraft and Transport Corporation in 1930. In 1932, Northrop, backed by Donald Douglas of Douglas Aircraft, founded another company, the Northrop Corporation, in El Segundo, California. This company built two highly successful monoplanes, the Northrop Gamma and Northrop Delta.[2]

By 1939, the Northrop Corporation had become a subsidiary of Douglas, so Northrop founded another completely independent company of the same name in Hawthorne, California, a site located by Moye Stephens, one of the co-founders. While working at this company, Northrop focused on the flying wing design, which he was convinced was the next major step in aircraft design. He produced a number of flying wings, including the Northrop N-1M, Northrop N-9M, Northrop YB-35, and Northrop YB-49. Shortly before his death in 1981 he was given clearance to see designs and a scale model of the B-2 Spirit which shared many of the design features as his YB-35 and YB-49 designs.

#### [edit] Awards

In 1947 he received the Spirit of St. Louis Medal from the American Society of Mechanical Engineers for "meritorious service in the advancement of aeronautics."[3] Investiture in the International Aerospace Hall of Fame came in 1972 and in the Aviation Hall of Fame in 1974. The B-2 Spirit stealth bomber has the same wingspan as Jack Northrop's jet-powered flying wing, the YB-49.[4]

# Notes for HENRY (HARRY) JOHN COCKAYNE-CUST:

Henry (Harry) John Cockayne-Cust (1861 – 1917) was an English journalist and poet, and a Member of Parliament for the Unionist Party (i.e. Conservative Party), for Stamford, Lincolnshire 1890-1895, and for Bermondsey, 1900-1906.

He was born to Sara Jane Cookson and Henry Francis Cockayne-Cust,[1] and was educated at Eton College and Trinity College, Cambridge, and then was called to the Bar. He edited the Pall Mall Gazette from 1892 to 1896.

Cust was one of The Souls, and attached to Pamela Wyndham (who later married Edward Tennant). Others in the clique were Margot Asquith, Arthur Balfour, George Curzon, Alfred Lyttelton, Godfrey Webb, and George Wyndham.

He was the reputed natural father of socialite and philanthropist Lady Diana Cooper, by the Duchess of Rutland. According to a 25 October 1998 article by Maurice Chittenden in the Sunday Times of London, Cust is also believed to be the natural father of Beatrice Stephenson Roberts, the mother of British prime minister Margaret Thatcher.

As the result of a purported pregnancy, he married in 1893 Emmeline Mary Elizabeth Welby-Gregory (1867 - 1955), known as Nina, who was the daughter of Victoria, Lady Welby. The pregnancy was either false or a misrepresentation, and the couple, whose marriage was thereafter contentious, did not have any children. Nina Cust was a translator and editor of her mother's papers. She and her husband are buried together in Belton, Lincolnshire, with a monument designed by her.

During World War I Cust was active in propaganda on behalf of the British Government.

Notes for EMMELINE MARY ELIZABETH STUART-WORTLEY-MACKENZIE: Victoria, Lady Welby (1837–1912), more correctly styled Lady Welby-Gregory, was a prominent English philosopher

Welby was born to the Hon. Charles Stuart-Wortley-Mackenzie and Lady Emmeline Stuart-Wortley, and christened Victoria Alexandrina Maria Louisa Stuart-Wortley. Her early life is poorly recorded; she certainly spent a great deal of time travelling, for she wrote a journal describing her experiences around the world; in fact she was in Beirut when her parents died. She served as Maid of Honour to her godmother, Queen Victoria.

In 1863 she married Sir William Earle Welby-Gregory, 4th baronet (1829–1898), who was active in British politics, and by whom she had three children. (Their daughter Nina married Edwardian rake and publisher Harry Cust.) She and Sir William lived together at Denton Manor in Lincolnshire. Welby had had very little formal education, but she began a fairly intense self-education, that included mixing and conversing with some of the greatest thinkers of her day. She corresponded with prominent thinkers of her day, and invited them to the Manor.

She started out in the field of theology, especially the interpretation of the Christian scriptures, and this was the subject of her first book, Links and Clues (1881). By the late 19th century, however, this interest had developed into the more philosophical arena, and she had begun writing scholarly papers on meaning, which were published in the leading academic journals Mind and The Monist.

She published her first philosophical book, What Is Meaning? Studies in the Development of Significance in 1903, following it with Significs and Language: The Articulate Form of Our Expressive and Interpretive Resources in 1911. In the same year she contributed to the Encyclopedia Britannica a long article titled "Significs", the name she gave to her theory of meaning. Her writings on the reality of time culminated in her book Time As Derivative (1907).

What Is Meaning? was reviewed for The Nation by the American pragmatist Charles Peirce, and this led to a correspondence between them which lasted eight years, which has been published three times, most recently as Hardwick (2001). Welby and Peirce had something in common, namely approaches to the problem of meaning that were not devoid of similarity, but most of the correspondence consists of Peirce elaborating his related theory of semiotics. Welby's replies did not conceal that she found Peirce hard to follow, but by duplicating and circulating some of Peirce's letters to her she did much to introduce Peirce to British thinkers. Peircians have since returned the favour by being among the most sympathetic students of Welby's ideas.

C. K. Ogden was also a correspondent of Welby's. He first contacted her in 1910, and his work was very much influenced by her theories, though he tried to minimise this in his book The Meaning of Meaning (1923). She also corresponded with William James, F. C. S. Schiller, the Italian pragmatists Giovanni Vailati and Mario Calderoni[1], Bertrand Russell, and J. Cook Wilson.

Welby's varied activities included founding the Sociological Society of Great Britain and the Decorative Needlework Society, and writing poetry and plays.

Welby's concern with the problem of meaning included (perhaps especially) the everyday use of language, and she coined the word significs for her approach (replacing her first choice of "sensifics"). She preferred "significs" to

semiotics and semantics, because the latter were theory-laden, and because "significs" pointed to her specific area of interest, which other approaches to language had tended to ignore.

She distinguished between different kinds of sense, and developed the various relationships between them and ethical, aesthetic, pragmatic, and social values. She divided sense into three main kinds: sense, meaning, and significance. these, she argued, corresponded to three levels of consciousness, which she called: planetary, solar, and cosmic respectively, and which she explained in terms of a sort of Darwinian theory of evolution.

Welby's writings and theories on signification in general were one of a number of approaches to the theory of language that began to emerge in the latter 19th century. The approaches anticipated contemporary semantics, semiotics, and semiology. Welby had a direct effect on the Significs group, most of whose members are Dutch, including Gerrit Mannoury and Frederik van Eeden, and thus she indirectly influenced L. E. J. Brouwer and the founding of intuitionistic logic.

Frank Churchill (October 20, 1901 – May 14, 1942) was a U.S. composer of popular music for films. He wrote most of the music for Disney's 1937 movie Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs, including "Whistle While You

Work" and "Some Day My Prince Will Come". The latter (without the Larry Morey lyrics) became a jazz standard covered by various jazz greats including Oscar Peterson, Miles Davis and Dave Brubeck.

Churchill began his career playing piano in cinemas at the age of 15. After dropping out of medical studies at UCLA to pursue a career in music, he became accompanist at the Los Angeles radio station KNX (AM) in 1924.

He joined Disney studios in 1930, and scored many animated shorts - his song for The Three Little Pigs, "Who's Afraid of the Big Bad Wolf", was a huge commercial success.

In 1937, he was chosen to score Disney's first full-length animated feature, Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs. His catchy, artfully written songs played a large part in the film's initial success and continuing popularity.

He became supervisor of music at Disney. In 1942, Churchill and fellow composer Oliver Wallace won an Oscar in the category "Scoring of a Musical Picture" for cowriting the score for Dumbo. He also shared an Oscar nomination with Ned Washington for the song "Baby Mine" from Dumbo for Best Song. A year later, Churchill received two posthumous Oscar nominations; the first for cowriting the score to Bambi with Edward Plumb, and the second for cowriting the song "Love is a Song" from Bambi with lyricist Larry Morey (1905-1971).

Frank Churchill committed suicide on May 14, 1942 at his ranch north of Los Angeles in Castaic, CA. He is purportedly to have died "at the piano" of a self inflicted gunshot wound. Although there is some speculation that his suicide was a result of negative discourse with Walt Disney regarding his latest scores for Bambi, it was more likely due to his deep depression and bout with heavy drinking after the deaths of two of his closest friends and fellow Disney orchestra members who had died earlier that year within a month of each other. He was buried in Glendale's Forest Lawn Memorial Park Cemetery.

#### Notes for OLIVIA DE HAVILLAND:

Olivia de Havilland is the last surviving principal cast member from Gone With the Wind. She played Melanie, the sweet southern belle with a backbone of steel, and de Havilland is reportedly very much like the character she portrayed. De Havilland won two Oscars, for To Each His Own, a 1946 drama in which her character became pregnant out of wedlock, and three years later as The Heiress, in which Montgomery Clift might be pursuing her only for her money. She was also nominated for Hold Back the Dawn, in which Romanian Charles Boyer might be pursuing her to marry his way to US citizenship, for The Snake Pit, where her character was committed to an insane asylum, as well as for Gone With the Wind.

De Havilland got two big breaks in one summer production of A Midsummer Night's Dream. First, she understudied for Gloria Stuart's character, Hermia, and in true Hollywood fashion got the role when Stuart had to drop out. Then Warner Brothers decided to film the stage production as a feature, and De Havilland signed a seven year contract with the studio.

Warner Bros. typecast de Havilland as a sweet, innocent damsel in distress, and that became her enduring screen persona. She proved perfect rescue fodder for Errol Flynn, and they made eight films together, including the classics The Adventures of Robin Hood (she was Flynn's Maid Marian), Captain Blood, The Charge of the Light Brigade, The Private Lives of Elizabeth and Essex, and They Died with Their Boots On. De Havilland was reportedly infatuated with Flynn, and while she never confirmed an affair, she has said, "He was the one I enjoyed kissing most. When I was working with him, I could hardly wait to get to rehearsal".

Gone With the Wind was, of course, a wildly popular novel before it became the biggest movie of its time. While the film's producers scoured the nation looking for an actress to play Scarlett O'Hara, de Havilland was one of the few 'name' actresses at the time not pleading for the role. Instead she wanted to play Melanie, a supporting role, and she convinced Warner Brothers to "loan her out" to a rival studio for the production. There were problems on the set, and the film went through several directors. One of them, George Cukor, was a gay man known as a "woman's director" and Clark Gable felt that his character was getting short shrift, so Cukor was fired. Victor Fleming received the sole screen credit as director despite directing only about half of the film, but he simply loathed actresses, leaving de Havilland so fearful that she would sneak off to have Cukor help with her role.

When she returned to Warner Brothers after Gone With the Wind, de Havilland was dismayed that, despite her Oscar nomination, Warners wanted her to resume playing ingenue roles. She begged for more substantial parts, but the studio continued to cast her in light romantic comedies.

When de Havilland was "loaned out" again for the drama Hold Back the Dawn in 1941, she was again Oscarnominated, but found herself competing with her sister, Joan Fontaine, who had been nominated for Alfred Hitchcock's Suspicion. The two actresses had been fiercely competitive even as children, and Fontaine, who is one year younger, said that de Havilland never got over having to share their mother with another child. Reportedly Fontaine had not planned to attend the ceremony, until de Havilland persuaded her that she must. The sisters were then seated at the same table, and when Fontaine won the award she ignored de Havilland's attempt to congratulate her. This fanned their sibling difficulties into a life-long feud.

Following Hold Back the Dawn, de Havilland returned to Warners again, but she began refusing the lightweight parts that the studio wanted her to play. In return, the studio repeatedly placed her on suspension. When her seven-year contract expired, the studio said that she still owed them time from her suspensions, and de Havilland sued. During the three years of the lawsuit, she was unable to work in film, and instead entertained soldiers in the US, the Aleutians, and in the South Pacific. The lawsuit was decided in de Havilland's favor, breaking what is now called "The de Havilland Clause," and reducing the tight control that studios had over performers.

Triumphantly returning to the screen, de Havilland began to choose her own projects, and had a long string of successes. In 1946, when she won the Oscar for To Each His Own, the Academy arranged for her sister to present the award, and photographers famously caught the moment when de Havilland refused Fontaine's congratulatory handshake. Some sources say the Fontaine-de Havilland feud was overplayed for the tabloids, while others say the sisters have several times gone years without speaking to each other. Their last reported spat came the night before the Academy Awards in 1987, when they were inadvertently booked in adjacent rooms in the same hotel. Fontaine immediately demanded a room on a different floor.

During the 1950s de Havilland's career began fading, and she refused more and more roles, saying that she did not approve of their content. She has said that she turned down the role of Blanche Dubois in A Streetcar Named Desire, later played by Vivien Leigh opposite Marlon Brando. In the latter part of de Havilland's film career, her most memorable movies were the camp classics Hush... Hush, Sweet Charlotte with Bette Davis, and Airport '77 with Jack Lemmon. Her last feature film was 1979's The Fifth Musketeer, with Cornel Wilde and Beau Bridges. She continued working in television through the late 1980s.

In 1955, she married author Pierre Galante and moved to France, and in 1962, she published a book, Every Frenchman Has One, about her difficulties adjusting to life in France. In 1979 she divorced Galante, but when he was diagnosed with cancer, she returned to his side and cared for him for years after their divorce, until his death in 1998.

# Notes for JOAN (JOAN FONTAINE) DE BEAUVOIR DE HAVILLAND:

Joan Fontaine was a movie star of the 1930s, 40s, and 50s. She is the younger sister of Olivia de Havilland. Their mother had wanted to be an actress, but instead instilled that desire in her daughters.

De Havilland was a star first, and when Fontaine broke into film their mother reportedly demanded that she go by some other name than de Havilland. Fontaine first called herself Joan Burfield, before settling on her stepfather's name, Fontaine, as her stage name. The two sisters never appeared together in the same film.

Fontaine spent the early part of her career in her sister's shadow, then eclipsed her stardom. The two stars, both rather high-strung and easily offended, feuded for decades after both were Oscar-nominated in 1942. De Havilland lost the award for Hold Back the Dawn with Charles Boyer, while Fontaine won for Suspicion with Cary Grant. According to reports at the time, when de Havilland tried to congratulate her sister on winning, Fontaine turned away, and the bitchfest of the 20th Century was underway. With all that has been written about the sisters' spats, it is worth remembering that The Snub That Started It All came mere weeks after Pearl Harbor.

Fontaine starred in numerous well-remembered films, including Letter from an Unknown Woman with Louis Jourdan, Jane Eyre with Orson Welles, and Ivy with Patric Knowles. She remained a high-profile star until reaching middle age, when she was no longer offered interesting parts. She turned to television, making many appearances on live plays and anthology series, and she had brief success on Broadway when she replaced Deborah Kerr in the lead of Tea and Sympathy with Anthony Perkins.

For all the time they were stars, and all the time since, Fontaine and her sister have been at odds, over perceived slights to their husbands, snide comments reported in the media, or memories of Joan having to wear Olivia's hand-me-downs in adolescence. Their battles reportedly reached a crescendo after their mother's death in 1975, when Joan said she was not invited to the memorial service, and Olivia said Joan simply refused to attend. In the decades since, the two sisters have reportedly not spoken to each other.

Fontaine was married and divorced four times, and she has said that her mother, Lillian de Havilland, was the best friend she ever had. After Joan and Olivia both became stars, their mother had a short career as a character actress in seven films. Two of those films starred Joan Fontaine; none featured Olivia de Havilland.

In retirement, Fontaine tends to her garden, and does not answer fan mail. She is reportedly not on speaking terms with her two daughters ... because they are on speaking terms with their Aunt Olivia.

Notes for PETER MARKHAM SCOTT:

Sir Peter Markham Scott, CH, CBE, DSC, FRS, FZS, (September 14, 1909 – August 29, 1989) was a British ornithologist, conservationist, painter and sportsman.

Peter Scott was born in London, the only child of Antarctic explorer Robert Falcon Scott, who died when Peter was two years old. He famously left instructions to his wife, the sculptor Kathleen Bruce, regarding Peter, to "try and make the boy interested in natural history if you can". His mother remarried and had another child, Peter's half-brother, Wayland Young (Lord Kennet). Peter's godfather was the playwright J. M. Barrie. He was educated at Oundle School and Trinity College, Cambridge, initially reading Natural Sciences but graduating in the History of Art in 1931. He inherited his artistic talent from his mother and had his first exhibition in London in 1933. His wealthy background allowed him to follow his interests in art, wildlife and many sports, including sailing and ice skating. In 1936, he represented Great Britain and Northern Ireland at sailing in the Olympic Games, winning a bronze medal.

During World War II, Scott served in the Royal Navy, emulating his father. He served first in destroyers in the North Atlantic but later moved to commanding a group of Motor Torpedo Boats against German E-boats in the English Channel. He is also partly credited with designing 'shadow camouflage', which disguised the look of ship superstructure. He was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross for bravery. He stood as a Conservative candidate unsuccessfully in the 1945 general election in Wembley North. In 1948, he founded the organisation with which he was ever afterwards closely associated, the Severn Wildfowl Trust (now the Wildfowl and Wetlands Trust) with its headquarters at Slimbridge in Gloucestershire. In the years that followed, he led several ornithological expeditions worldwide, and became a television personality, popularising the study of wildfowl and wetlands. His BBC natural history series, Look, ran from 1955 to 1981 and made him a household name. He wrote and illustrated several books on the subject, including his autobiography, The Eye of the Wind (1961). In the 1950s, he also appeared regularly on BBC radio's Children's Hour, in the series, "Nature Parliament".

He married Elizabeth Jane Howard in 1942. A daughter, Nicola, was born a year later. They divorced in 1951 and he married an assistant, Philippa Talbot-Ponsonby, while on an expedition to Iceland in search of the breeding grounds of the Pink-footed Goose. A daughter, Dafila, was born later in the same year. (Dafila is the old scientific name for a pintail). She, too, is now an artist, painting birds [1].

Scott took up gliding in 1956 and became a British champion in 1963. He was chairman of the British Gliding Association (BGA) for two years from 1968 and was president of the Bristol & Gloucestershire Gliding Club. He was responsible for involving Prince Philip in gliding; the Prince is still patron of the BGA.

Scott also continued with his love of sailing, skippering the 12 metre yacht Sovereign in the 1964 challenge for the America's Cup which was held by USA. Sovereign suffered a whitewash 4-0 defeat in a very one-sided competition where the American boat was seen to be the faster design.

From 1973 to 1983, Scott was Chancellor of the University of Birmingham.

He was one of the founders of the World Wide Fund for Nature (formerly called the World Wildlife Fund), and designed its panda logo. His pioneering work in conservation also contributed greatly to the shift in policy of the International Whaling Commission and signing of the Antarctic Treaty. The latter inspired by his visit to his father's base on Ross Island in Antarctica.

He is also remembered for giving the scientific name of Nessiteras rhombopteryx (based on a blurred underwater photograph of a supposed fin) to the Loch Ness Monster so that it could be registered as an endangered species. The name, based on Greek, means "the wonder of Ness with the diamond shaped fin" but is also an anagram of "Monster hoax by Sir Peter S".

Scott was a long-time Vice-President of the British Naturalists' Association, whose Peter Scott Memorial Award was instituted after his death, to commemorate his achievements. He received many awards during his distinguished life, including being appointed a Companion of Honour (CH).

In June 2004, Scott and Sir David Attenborough were jointly profiled in the second of a three part BBC Two series, The Way We Went Wild, about television wildlife presenters and were described as being largely responsible for the way that the British and much of the world views wildlife.

Notes for NELSON ACKERMAN EDDY:

Nelson Ackerman Eddy (June 29, 1901 - March 6, 1967) was an American singer and movie star who appeared in 19 musical films during the 1930s and 1940s, as well as in opera and on the concert stage, radio, television, and in nightclubs. A classically trained baritone, he is best remembered for the eight films in which he costarred with

soprano Jeanette MacDonald. He was one of the first "crossover" stars, a superstar appealing both to shrieking bobby-soxers as well as opera purists, and in his heyday was the highest paid singer in the world.

During his 40-year career, he earned three stars on the Hollywood Walk of Fame (one each for film, recording, and radio), left his footprints in the wet cement at Grauman's Chinese Theater, earned three Gold records, and was invited to sing at the third inauguration of President Franklin Delano Roosevelt. He also introduced millions of young Americans to classical music and inspired many of them to pursue a musical career.

Nelson Ackerman Eddy was born in Providence, Rhode Island, the only child of William Darius Eddy and Isabel Kendrick Eddy. His father was a machinist and toolmaker whose work required him to move from town to town. Nelson grew up in Providence and Pawtucket, Rhode Island, and in New Bedford, Massachusetts. As a boy, he was a redhead and quickly acquired the nickname "Bricktop." As an adult, his red hair was streaked with silver, so that his hair photographed as blond.

Nelson came from a musical family. His Atlanta-born mother was a church soloist, and his grandmother, Caroline Ackerman Kendrick, was a distinguished oratorio singer, while he was New England English on his father's side. His father, William Darius Eddy, occasionally moonlighted as a stagehand at the Providence Opera House, sang in the church choir, played the drums, and performed in local productions such as H.M.S. Pinafore.

Eddy's parents divorced when he was 14, which severely traumatized him. Living in near-poverty, Eddy was forced to drop out of school and moved with his mother to Philadelphia, where her brother, Clark Kendrick, lived. His uncle helped Eddy secure a clerical job at the Mott Iron Works, a plumbing supply company. He later worked as a reporter with the Philadelphia Press, the Evening Public Ledger and the Philadelphia Evening Bulletin. He also worked briefly as a copywriter at N.W. Ayer Advertising, but was dismissed for constantly singing on the job. Eddy never returned to school but educated himself with correspondence courses. He was bitter that his father refused to provide financial support after the divorce but in later years they had an uneasy reconciliation.

Throughout his teens, Eddy studied voice and imitated the recordings of baritones like Titta Ruffo, Antonio Scotti, Pasquale Amato, Campanari, and Werrenrath. He gave recitals for women's groups and appeared in society theatricals, usually for little or no pay.

His first professional break came in 1922 when he was singled out by the press after an appearance in a society theatrical, The Marriage Tax, although his name had been omitted from the program.

In 1924, Eddy won the top prize in a competition that included a chance to appear with the Philadelphia Opera Society. Alexander Smallens, musical director of the Philadelphia Civic Opera and later assistant conductor of the Philadelphia Orchestra, became interested in Eddy's career and coached him. (In a 1936 career profile of Eddy put out by Arthur Judson Concert Management, Smallens is credited with Nelson's "operatic success.")

By the late 1920s, Eddy was appearing with the Philadelphia Civic Opera Company and had a repertoire of 28 operas, including Amonasro in Aida, Marcello in La bohème, Papageno in The Magic Flute, Almaviva in The Marriage of Figaro, both Tonio and Silvio in Pagliacci, and Wolfram in Tannhäuser. (William von Wymetal was the group's producer at this time, in association with Fritz Reiner who later directed the Philadelphia Symphony Orchestra.) Eddy also performed in Gilbert & Sullivan operettas with The Savoy Company at the Broad Street Theatre in Philadelphia.

Eddy studied briefly with the noted teacher David Scull Bispham, a former Metropolitan Opera singer, but when Bispham died suddenly, Eddy became a student of William Vilonat. In 1927, Eddy borrowed some money and followed his teacher to Dresden for European study, which was then considered essential for serious American singers. He was offered a job with a small German opera company. Instead, he decided to return to America, where he concentrated on his concert career, making only occasional opera appearances during the next seven years. In 1928, his first concert accompanist was a young pianist named Theodore (Ted) Paxson, who became a close friend and remained his accompanist until Eddy's death 39 years later.

In the early 1930s, Eddy's principal teacher was Edouard Lippé, who followed him to Hollywood and appeared in a small role in Eddy's 1935 film Naughty Marietta. In his later years, Eddy frequently changed teachers, constantly trying new vocal techniques. He also had a home recording studio where he studied his own performances. It was his fascination with technology that inspired him to record three-part harmonies (soprano, tenor, baritone) for his role as a multiple-voiced singing whale in the animated Walt Disney feature, "The Whale that Sang at the Met", the concluding sequence in the 1946 feature film Make Mine Music.

With the Philadelphia Civic Opera, Eddy sang in the only American performance of Feuersnot by Richard Strauss (December 1, 1927) and in the first American performance of Strauss's Ariadne auf Naxos (November 1, 1928) with Helen Jepson. In Ariadne, Eddy sang the roles of the Wigmaker and Harlequin in the original German. He performed under Leopold Stokowski as the Drum Major in the second American performance of Alban Berg's Wozzeck on November 24, 1931.

At Carnegie Hall in New York, Christmas 1931, he sang in the world premiere of Maria Egiziaca (Mary in Egypt), unexpectedly conducted by the composer Ottorino Respighi himself when famed conductor Arturo Toscanini fell ill at the last minute. Years later, when Toscanini visited the MGM lot in California, Eddy greeted him by singing a few bars of Maria Egiziaca.

Eddy continued in occasional opera roles until his film work made it difficult to schedule appearances the requisite year or two in advance. Among his final opera performances were three with the San Francisco Opera in 1934, when he was still "unknown." Marjory M. Fisher of the San Francisco News wrote of his December 8, 1934 performance of Wolfram in Tannhäuser, "Nelson Eddy made a tremendously fine impression....he left no doubt in the minds of discerning auditors that he belongs in that fine group of baritones which includes Lawrence Tibbett, Richard Bonelli, and John Charles Thomas and which represents America's outstanding contribution to the contemporary opera stage." He also sang Amonasro in Aida on November 11, 1934 to similar acclaim. Elisabeth Rethberg, Giovanni Martinelli, and Ezio Pinza were in the cast. However, opera quietly faded from Eddy's schedule as films and highly lucrative concerts claimed more and more of his time.

When he resumed his concert career following his screen success, he made a point of delivering a traditional concert repertoire, performing his hit screen songs only as encores. He felt strongly that audiences needed to be exposed to all kinds of music.

Eddy was "discovered" by Hollywood when he substituted at the last minute for the noted diva, Lotte Lehmann, at a sold-out concert in Los Angeles on February 28, 1933. He scored a professional triumph with 18 curtain calls, and several film offers immediately followed. After much agonizing, he decided that being seen on screen might boost audiences for what he considered his "real work," his concerts. (Also, like his machinist father, he was fascinated with gadgets and the mechanics of the new talking pictures.) Eddy's concert fee rose from \$500 to \$10,000 per performance.

Eddy signed with Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer (MGM), where he would make the first 14 of his 19 feature films. His contract guaranteed him three months off each year to continue his concert tours. MGM was not sure how to use him, and he spent more than a year on salary with little to do. His voice can be heard singing "Daisy Belle" on the soundtrack of the 1933 Pete Smith short, Handlebars. He appeared and sang one song each in Broadway to Hollywood and Dancing Lady, both in 1933, and Student Tour in 1934. Audience response was favorable, and he was cast as the male lead opposite the established star Jeanette MacDonald in a film version of Victor Herbert's 1910 operetta Naughty Marietta.

Naughty Marietta was the surprise hit of 1935. Its key song, "Ah! Sweet Mystery of Life," became a hit and earned Eddy his first Gold Record. He also sang "Tramp, Tramp, Tramp" and "I'm Falling in Love with Someone." The film was nominated for an Oscar as Best Picture, received the Photoplay Gold Medal Award as Best Picture, and was voted one of the Ten Best Pictures of 1935 by the New York film critics. Critics singled out Eddy for praise:

"A new star emerged on the Capitol screen." - New York Daily News.

"The screen has found a thrilling thrush, possessed not only of a rare vocal tone, but of a personality and form and features cast in the heroic mould." - New York American.

"Eddy is a brilliant baritone, masculine, engaging and good looking." - Richard Watts, Jr., in the New York Herald.

Eddy appeared in seven more MGM films with Jeanette MacDonald:

Rose Marie, 1936, is probably his most-remembered film. Eddy sang "Song of the Mounties" and "Indian Love Call" by Rudolf Friml. His definitive portrayal of the steadfast Mountie became a popular icon, frequently spoofed in cartoons and TV skits, and even generating travesties on stage (Little Mary Sunshine, 1959) and film (Dudley Do-Right, 1999). When the Mounties retired their classic red jackets and hat in 1970, except for ceremonial attire, hundreds of newspapers accompanied the story with a photo of Nelson Eddy as Sgt. Bruce in Rose Marie, made 34 years earlier.

Maytime, 1937, is regarded as one of Eddy's best films. "Will You Remember" by Sigmund Romberg brought Eddy another Gold Record. The New York Times thought Maytime "the most entrancing operetta the screen has given us...it affirms Nelson Eddy's preeminence among the baritones of filmdom."

The Girl of the Golden West (1938) had an original score by Sigmund Romberg and reused the David Belasco stage plot also employed by Giacomo Puccini for La Fanciulla del West.

Sweethearts, 1938, was MGM's first three-strip Technicolor feature, incorporating Victor Herbert's 1913 stage score into a modern script by Dorothy Parker. It won the Photoplay Gold Medal Award as Best Picture of the Year.

New Moon, 1940, based on Sigmund Romberg's 1927 Broadway hit, became one of Eddy's most popular films. His key songs were "Lover, Come Back to Me," "Softly as in a Morning Sunrise," "Wanting You" and "Stout Hearted Men".

Bitter Sweet, 1940, was a Technicolor film version of Noël Coward's 1929 operetta. The love theme was "I'll See You Again." Eddy played a Viennese singing teacher who elopes with his pretty English pupil and takes her to live in Vienna.

I Married an Angel, 1942, adapted from the Rodgers and Hart stage musical about an angel who loses her wings on her wedding night, suffered from censorship problems. Eddy sang "Spring Is Here" and the title song.

Nelson Eddy also starred in films with other leading ladies:

Rosalie, 1937, with Eleanor Powell, offered a score by Cole Porter. In his first solo-starring film, the script called for Eddy to portray a football-playing West Point pilot who pursues a princess-in-disguise to Europe. Eddy recorded the title song.

Let Freedom Ring, 1939, with Virginia Bruce, was a Western. Eddy got to beat up rugged Oscar winner Victor McLaglen and preserve freedom and the American way from bad guys, a popular theme just before World War II.

Balalaika, 1939, with Ilona Massey, was based on the 1936 English operetta by George Posford and Bernard Grün. Eddy is a prince in disguise, in love with a commoner during the Russian Revolution. The title song became one of his standards.

The Chocolate Soldier, 1941, with Metropolitan Opera star Risë Stevens, was a stylish musical adaptation of Ferenc Molnár's The Guardsman. Eddy played a dual role and turned in one of his best performances.

Phantom of the Opera, 1943, was Eddy's first film after he left MGM at the end of his seven-year contract. This lavish Technicolor musical also starred Claude Rains as the Phantom and Susanna Foster as Christine.

Knickerbocker Holiday, 1944, was based on the popular stage musical by Kurt Weill and Maxwell Anderson. It co-starred Charles Coburn (singing the classic "September Song") and Constance Dowling.

Make Mine Music, 1946, was a Walt Disney animated feature compilation. Eddy provided all the singing and speaking voices for the touching final segment, "The Whale Who Wanted to Sing at the Met," later released as a short, Willie, the Operatic Whale, by RKO in 1954. Using a technique based on his technical experiments with his home recording equipment, Eddy was able to sing sextets with himself on the soundtrack, providing all the voices from bass to soprano.

Northwest Outpost, 1947, co-starred Ilona Massey. Rudolf Friml provided the songs for a story of Fort Ross, a Russian settlement in the Wild West of California. It was made at Republic Studios and turned out to be Eddy's final film.

After Eddy and MacDonald left MGM in 1942, there were several unrealized films that would have reunited the team. Eddy signed with Universal in 1943 for a two-picture deal. The first was Phantom of the Opera and the second would have co-starred MacDonald. She filmed her two scenes for Follow the Boys then both stars severed ties with Universal, as Eddy was upset with how Phantom of the Opera turned out.

Among their later other proposed projects were East Wind; Crescent Carnival, a book optioned by MacDonald; and The Rosary, the 1910 best-seller--which Eddy had read as a teen and pitched to MGM as a "comeback" film for himself and MacDonald in 1948. Under the name "Isaac Ackerman" he wrote a biopic screenplay about Chaliapin, in which he was to play the lead and also a young Nelson Eddy, but it was never produced. He also wrote two movie treatments for himself and MacDonald, Timothy Waits for Love and All Stars Don't Spangle. Eddy made more than 290 recordings between 1935 and 1964, singing songs from his films, plus opera, folk songs, popular songs, Gilbert and Sullivan, and traditional arias from his concert repertoire. Since both he and screen partner Jeanette MacDonald were under contract to RCA Victor between 1935 and 1938, this allowed several popular duets from their films. In 1938, he signed with Columbia Records, which ended MacDonald-Eddy duets until a special LP album the two made together in 1957. He also recorded duets with his other screen partner Risë Stevens (The Chocolate Soldier) and for albums with Nadine Conner, Virginia Haskins, Doretta Morrow, Gale Sherwood, Eleanor Steber, and Jo Stafford.

Eddy's recordings drew rave reviews during the 1930s and 1940s, but it is a special tribute to his vocal technique that he continued to rate them into the 1960s. The Los Angeles Herald-Examiner on October 4, 1964 noted: "Nelson Eddy continues to roll along, physically and vocally indestructible. Proof is his newest recording on the Everest label, 'Of Girls I Sing.' At the age of 63 and after 42 years of professional singing, Eddy demonstrates there has not been much change in his romantic and robust baritone—the baritone that made him America's most popular singer in the early '30s."

Like many performers, Eddy was active in "war work" during World War II, even before the United States entered the war. He did his first "war effort" concert on October 19, 1939 with Leopold Stokowski for Polish war relief. In 1942, he became an air raid warden and also put in long hours at the Hollywood Canteen. In 1943, he went on a two-month, 35,000-mile tour, giving concerts for military personnel in Belém and Natal, Brazil; Accra, Gold Coast; Aden; Asmara, Eritrea; Cairo (where he met King Farouk); Teheran, Iran; Casablanca; and the Azores. He also broadcast for the armed forces throughout the war.

Eddy married Ann Denitz Franklin, former wife of noted director Sidney Franklin, on January 19, 1939. Her son, Sidney Jr., became Eddy's stepson, but she and Nelson had no children of their own. They were married for 27 years, until Nelson's death. Ann Eddy never remarried after Nelson's death and died on August 28, 1987. She is buried next to Nelson and his mother, Isabel, in Hollywood Forever Cemetery.

John Kenneth Hilliard, a sound engineer backstage at MGM from 1933 to 1942, reported in 1981 that though Nelson Eddy and Jeanette MacDonald were a screen couple, they "hated each other with a vengeance". Hilliard worked on Naughty Marietta and it is common knowledge that MacDonald's initial iciness toward Eddy almost caused Eddy to walk off that film. There were three film sets on which they battled off-screen including the second half of Rose Marie, after MacDonald's refusal to elope to Reno with Eddy; The Girl of the Golden West, filmed immediately after MacDonald's marriage and New Moon, filmed after Eddy's marriage. Nevertheless, an off-screen affair was verified from another MGM sound engineer who built Eddy's home recording equipment, and other MGM staff such as makeup artists William Tuttle and Fred Phillips. Contemporary magazine writer Sandy Reiss reported that a private trailer was set up for the two on Maytime and that the crew called them "the lovebirds". Other MGM co-workers claimed that Eddy and MacDonald were closest during the filming of Sweethearts and I Married an Angel. After the MGM years, their private lives fell off the Hollywood radar. Baritone Theodor Uppman, who won the Atwater Kent opera auditions and later sang at the Metropolitan Opera, saw Eddy and MacDonald at a 1947 party together, where the talk of the evening was the fact that MacDonald was pregnant with Eddy's child but he could not get a divorce.

A 2001 biography of Eddy and MacDonald, Sweethearts by Sharon Rich, claims that MacDonald's marriage to Gene Raymond was engineered by studio boss Louis B. Mayer to prevent Eddy from marrying MacDonald. Rich's original source for this information was Jeanette MacDonald's older sister Blossom Rock. The Eddy-MacDonald romance appears again in print in The Golden Girls of MGM by Jane Ellen Wayne. In these books, it is reported that Eddy's relationship with MacDonald began in late 1933 and continued, with a few breaks, until her death in 1965. Many of Eddy's personal letters and diary entries verifying a rocky romance with MacDonald are reproduced in Sweethearts, providing insight into his character and disproving some critics' claims that he was emotionally "wooden."

Eddy began his more than 600 radio appearances in the mid-1920s. The first may have been on December 26, 1924 at station WOO in Philadelphia. Besides his many guest appearances, he hosted The Voice of Firestone (1936), Vicks Open House (1936), The Chase and Sanborn Hour (1937–1939), and Kraft Music Hall (1947–1948). He had his own show on CBS in 1942–1943. Eddy frequently used his radio shows to advance the careers of promising young singers. While his programs often featured "serious" music, they were never straitlaced. It was in a series of comedy routines with Edgar Bergen and Charlie McCarthy on the Chase and Sanborn Hour that Eddy's name became associated with the song "Shortnin' Bread," which was also included in the film Maytime.

On March 31 1933 he performed the role of Gurnemanz in a broadcast of Richard Wagner's opera Parsifal with Rose Bampton, conducted by Leopold Stokowski. During the 1940s, he was a frequent guest on Lux Radio Theater with Cecil B. DeMille, performing radio versions of Eddy's popular films.

In 1951, Eddy guest-starred on several episodes of The Alan Young Show on CBS-TV. In 1952, he recorded a pilot for a sitcom, Nelson Eddy's Backyard, with Jan Clayton, but it failed to find a network slot. On 12 November 1952, he surprised his former co-star Jeanette MacDonald when she was the subject of Ralph Edwards' This Is Your Life. On 30 November 1952, he was Ed Sullivan's guest on Toast of the Town.

During the next decade he guested on Danny Thomas's sitcom Make Room for Daddy and on variety programs such as The Bob Hope Show, The Edgar Bergen Show, The Colgate Comedy Hour, The Spike Jones Show, The Rosemary Clooney Show, The Dinah Shore Show, and The Big Record with Patti Page. He was a frequent guest on talk shows, including The Merv Griffin Show and The Tonight Show with Jack Paar.

On 7 May 1955, Eddy starred in Max Liebman's 90-minute, live-TV version of Sigmund Romberg's The Desert Song on NBC-TV. It featured Gale Sherwood, Metropolitan Opera bass Salvatore Baccaloni, veteran film actor Otto Kruger, and the dance team of Bambi Lynn and Rod Alexander.

On December 31 1966, a few months before his death, Eddy and his nightclub partner, Gale Sherwood, sang 15 songs on Guy Lombardo's traditional New Year's Eve program, telecast from the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel in New York City.

The advent of television made inroads in the once-lucrative concert circuits, and, in the early 1950s, Eddy had to consider future career options, eventually deciding to form a nightclub act. It premiered in January 1953 with singer Gale Sherwood as his partner and Ted Paxson as accompanist. Variety wrote, "Nelson Eddy, vet of films, concerts, and stage, required less than one minute to put a jam-packed audience in his hip pocket in one of the most explosive openings in this city's nitery history...Before Eddy had even started to sing, they liked him personally as a warm human being." The act continued for the next 15 years and made four tours of Australia.

Eddy visibly aged after the death of Jeanette MacDonald in January 1965. On January 31, 1960, he told Jack Paar on The Tonight Show that "I love her", and he broke down when interviewed after her death. According to Bob Hunter, Eddy's accompanist during his final Australian tour, Eddy sang a special song to MacDonald in every performance of his nightclub act.

In March 1967, Eddy was performing at the Sans Souci Hotel in Palm Beach, Florida, when he was stricken on stage with a cerebral hemorrhage. His singing partner, Gale Sherwood, and his accompanist, Ted Paxson, were at his side. He died a few hours later in the early hours of March 6. He is buried at Hollywood Forever Cemetery, next to his wife, Ann, who survived him by 20 years.

Eddy's meticulously annotated scores (some with his caricatures sketched in the margins) are now housed at Occidental College Music Library in Los Angeles. His personal papers and scrapbooks are at the University of Southern California Cinema/Television Library, also in Los Angeles.

In England "Nelson Eddys" is rhyming slang for readies, or cash.

Notes for DWIGHT WHITNEY MORROW:

Morrow, Dwight Whitney, 1873–1931, American banker and diplomat, b. Huntington, W.Va. He practiced law in New York City and entered (1914) the banking house of J. P. Morgan & Company. After the United States entered World War I, hebecame a member of the allied transport council and chief civilian aide to Gen. John J. Pershing. In the midst of the ill feeling aroused by the Mexican laws expropriating U.S. holdings in Mexico, President Coolidge appointed (1927) Morrow ambassador to Mexico. His service was notable because it marked a new spirit of cooperation in U.S. relations with Latin America. He was afterward (1930) a delegate to the London Naval Conference and served (1930–31) in the U.S. Senate as a Republican from New Jersey. His daughter, Anne Spencer Morrow, married Charles A. Lindbergh.

### Notes for GEORGE ELLERY HALE:

George Ellery Hale (June 29, 1868 – February 21, 1938) was an American solar astronomer, born in Chicago. He was educated at MIT, at the Observatory of Harvard College, (1889-90), and at Berlin (1893-94). As an undergraduate at MIT, he invented the spectroheliograph, with which he made his discoveries of the solar vortices and magnetic fields of sun spots.

In 1890 he was appointed director of the Kenwood Astrophysical Observatory; he was professor of Astrophysics at Beloit College (1891-93; associate professor at the University of Chicago until 1897, and full professor (1897-1905). He was coeditor of Astronomy and Astrophysics in 1892-95 and after 1895 editor of the Astrophysical Journal.

He helped found a number of observatories, including Yerkes Observatory, Mount Wilson Observatory, and the Hale Solar Laboratory. At Mount Wilson, he hired and encouraged Harlow Shapley and Edwin Hubble and did a great deal of fundraising, planning, organizing and promotion of astronomical institutions, societies and journals. Hale also played a central role in the development of Pasadena's California Institute of Technology (Caltech) into a leading research university, and in the building of the Palomar Observatory.

## Notes for ROBERT SANDERSON MULLIKEN:

Robert Sanderson Mulliken (June 7, 1896 – October 31, 1986) was an American physicist and chemist, primarily responsible for the early development of molecular orbital theory, i.e. the elaboration of the molecular orbital method of computing the structure of molecules. Dr. Mulliken received the Nobel Prize for chemistry in 1966. He received the Priestley Medal in 1983.

### Early years

Mulliken was born in Newburyport, Massachusetts. His father, Samuel Parsons Mulliken, was a professor of organic chemistry at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. As a child, Robert Mulliken learned the name and botanical classification of plants and, in general, had an excellent, but selective, memory. For example, he learned German well enough to skip the course in scientific German in college, but could not remember the name of his high school German teacher. He also made the acquaintance, while still a child, of the physical chemist Arthur Amos Noyes.

Mulliken helped with some of the editorial work when his father wrote his four-volume text on organic compound identification, and thus became an expert on organic chemical nomenclature.

## [edit] Education

In high school in Newburyport, Mulliken took a scientific curriculum. He graduated in 1913 and succeeded in getting a scholarship to MIT that had earlier been won by his father. Like his father, he majored in chemistry. Already as an undergraduate, he did his first publishable research: on the synthesis of organic chlorides. Because he was unsure of his future direction, he included some chemical engineering courses in his curriculum and spent a summer touring chemical plants in Massachusetts and Maine. He received his B. S. degree in chemistry from MIT in 1917.

### [edit] Early career

At this time, the United States had just entered World War I, and Mulliken took a position at American University in Washington, D.C., making poison gas under James B. Conant. After nine months, he was drafted into the Army's Chemical Warfare Service, but continued on the same task. His laboratory techniques left much to be desired, and he was out of service for months with burns. Later he got a bad case of influenza, and was still in the hospital at war's end.

After the war, he took a job investigating the effects of zinc oxide and carbon black on rubber, but quickly decided that this was not the kind of chemistry he wanted to pursue. So in 1919 he entered the Ph.D. program at the University of Chicago.

## [edit] Graduate and early postdoctoral education

He got his doctorate in 1921 based on research into the separation of isotopes of mercury by evaporation, and continued in his isotope separation by this method. While at Chicago, he took a course under the Nobel Prizewinning physicist Robert A. Millikan, which exposed him to the old quantum theory. He also became interested in strange molecules after exposure to work by Hermann I. Schlesinger on diborane.

At Chicago, he had received a grant from the National Research Council (NRC) which had paid for much of his work on isotope separation. The NRC grant was extended in 1923 for two years so he could study isotope effects on band spectra of such diatomic molecules as boron nitride (BN) (comparing molecules with B10 and B11). He went to Harvard University to learn spectrographic technique from Frederick A. Saunders and quantum theory from E. C. Kemble. At the time, he was able to associate with many future luminaries, including J. Robert Oppenheimer, John H. Van Vleck, and Harold C. Urey. He also met John C. Slater, who had worked with Niels Bohr.

In 1925 and 1927, Mulliken traveled to Europe, working with outstanding spectroscopists and quantum theorists such as Erwin Schrödinger, Paul A. M. Dirac, Werner Heisenberg, Louis de Broglie, Max Born, and Walther Bothe (all of whom eventually received Nobel Prizes) and Friedrich Hund, who was at the time Born's assistant. They all, as well as Wolfgang Pauli, were developing the new quantum mechanics that would eventually supersede the old quantum theory. Mulliken was particularly influenced by Hund, who had been working on quantum interpretation of band spectra of diatomic molecules, the same spectra which Mulliken had investigated at Harvard. In 1927 Mulliken worked with Hund and as a result developed his molecular orbital theory, in which electrons are assigned to states that extend over an entire molecule. In consequence, molecular orbital theory was also referred to as the Hund-Mulliken theory.

#### [edit] Early scientific career

From 1926 to 1928, he taught in the physics department at New York University (NYU). This was his first recognition as a physicist; though his work had been considered important by chemists, it clearly was on the borderline between the two sciences and both would claim him from this point on. Then he returned to the University of Chicago as an associate professor of physics, being promoted to full professor in 1931. He would ultimately hold a position jointly in both the physics and chemistry departments. At both NYU and Chicago, he continued to refine his molecular-orbital theory.

Up to this point, the primary way to calculate the electronic structure of molecules was based on a calculation by Walter Heitler and Fritz London on the hydrogen molecule (H2) in 1927. With improvements by John C. Slater and Linus Pauling, this method assumed that the bonds in any molecule could be described in a manner similar to the bond in H2, and since it corresponded to chemists' ideas of localized bonds between pairs of atoms, this method (called the Valence-Bond (VB) or Heitler-London-Slater-Pauling (HLSP) method), was very popular. However, particularly in attempting to calculate the properties of excited states (molecules that have been excited by some source of energy), the VB method does not always work well. Mulliken's molecular-orbital method, building on the quantitative work of John Lennard-Jones, proved to be more flexible and applicable to a vast variety of types of molecules and molecular fragments, and has totally eclipsed Pauling's valence-bond method. As a result of this development, he received the Nobel Prize in Chemistry in 1966.

Mulliken became a member of the National Academy of Sciences in 1936, the youngest member in the organization's history, at that time.

Mulliken population analysis is named after him, a method of assigning charges to atoms in a molecule.

#### [edit] Family

On December 24, 1929, he married Mary Helen von Noé, daughter of a geology professor at the University of Chicago. They had two daughters.

#### [edit] Later years

In 1934, he derived a new scale for measuring the electronegativity of elements. This does not entirely correlate with the scale of Linus Pauling, but is generally in close correspondence.

In World War II, from 1942 to 1945, Mulliken directed the Information Office for the University of Chicago's Plutonium project. Afterward, he developed mathematical formulas to enable the progress of the molecular-orbital theory.

In 1952 he began to apply quantum mechanics to the analysis of the reaction between Lewis acid and base molecules. (See Acid-base reaction theories.) He became Distinguished Professor of Physics and Chemistry in 1961 and continued in his studies of molecular structure and spectra, ranging from diatomic molecules to large complex aggregates. He retired in 1985.

He died of congestive heart failure at his daughter's home in Arlington, Virginia (across the Potomac River from Washington, D.C.) His body was returned to Chicago for burial.

Notes for MAJOR GENERAL FREDERICK HENRY OSBORN:

Major General Frederick Henry Osborn (21 March 1889—5 January 1981) was an American philanthropist, military leader, and eugenicist. He was a founder of several organizations, and played a central part in reorienting eugenics in the years following World War II away from the race- and class-consciousness from earlier periods (APS, 1983). The American Philosophical Society considers him to have been "the respectable face of eugenic research in the post-war period"

He graduated from Princeton University in 1910 and attended Trinity College, Cambridge, for a postgraduate year. His family had made their fortune in the railroad business, and he went into the family business up until the outbreak of World War I, when he served in the American Red Cross in France as Commander of the Advance Zone for the last 11 months of the war. In 1928 he became a research associate at the American Museum of Natural History studying anthropology and population.

He was one of the founding members of the American Eugenics Society in 1926, and joined the Galton Society in 1928, serving as its Secretary in 1931. He played a central role in the 1936 founding of The Office of Population Research at Princeton University, a leading demographic research and training center.[1]. Osborn was one of the founding trustees of the Pioneer Fund in 1937, a charitable foundation charged with promoting eugenics.

According to J. Phillipe Rushton, Osborn was the first to point out (in 1934) in the race and intelligence discussion of the time, that, although African Americans scored lower than Whites on the Army intelligence tests that were studied, those from five urban northern states scored slightly higher than did Whites from eight rural southern states, demonstrating the importance of cultural factors on IQ scores.[2] In the following decades, Osborn remained skeptical of the hereditarian hypothesis of the variance in IQ scores found between racial groups.

According to the American Philosophical Society, in 1940 he was selected by Franklin Roosevelt to chair the Civilian Advisory Committee on Selective Service. Five months later he took over as Chair of the Army Committee on Welfare and Recreation, responsible for information and education services for military personnel, and in

September 1941, he was commissioned as Brigadier General and appointed Chief of the Morale Branch of the War Department. By the war's end he had earned promotion to Major General and had been awarded a bronze star in Paris, the Distinguished Service Medal, the Selective Service Medal, and was made Honorary Commander in the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire.

Osborn served at Princeton as a charter trustee from 1943-1955, and as a member of several advisory boards, including the Curriculum Committee and Psychology Department Council.[3]

In 1954, Osborn played a central role in the founding of the journal Eugenics Quarterly, which changed its name in 1970 to Social Biology (Osborn 1974). The journal is published by Duke University.[4]

During the post-war years, one of his lasting influences was shifting the emphasis of American eugenics to positive eugenics, which seeks to achieve eugenic goals through encouraging the spread of desired traits, as opposed to negative eugenics, which seeks to achieve eugenic goals through discouraging the spread of undesired traits.

Notes for PRESIDENT FRANKLIN DELANO ROOSEVELT: Assuming the Presidency at the depth of the Great Depression Franklin D. Roosevelt helped the American people regain faith in themselves. He brought hopeas he promised prompt vigorous action and asserted in his Inaugural Address "the only thing we have to fear is fear itself." He attended Harvard University and Columbia Law School. On St. Patrick's Day 1905 he married EleanorRoosevelt. Following the example of his fifth cousin President Theodore Roosevelt Franklin D. Roosevelt entered public service through politics but asa Democrat. He won election to the New York Senate in 1910. President Wilsonappointed him Assistant Secretary of the Navy and he was the Democratic nominee for Vice President in 1920.

In the summer of 1921 when he was 39 he was stricken with poliomyelitis. Demonstrating indomitable courage he foughtto regain the use of his legs particularly through swimming. At the 1924 Democratic Convention he dramatically appeared on crutches to nominate Alfred E. Smith as "the Happy Warrior." In 1928 Roosevelt became Governor of New York.

He was elected President in November 1932 to the first of four terms. When the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor on December 7 1941 Roosevelt directed organization of the nation's manpower and resources for global war. Feeling that the future peace of the world would depend upon relations between the United States and Russia he devoted much thought to the planning of a UnitedNations in which he hoped international difficulties could be settled. As the war drew to a close Roosevelt's health deteriorated and on April 12 1945 while at Warm Springs Georgia he died of a cerebral hemorrhage.

Louis Stanton Auchincloss (born September 27, 1917) is a prolific American novelist, historian, and essayist. Born in New York City, he grew up in the privileged classes about whom he would write, attending Groton School, and Yale University, where he was editor of the Yale Literary Magazine, and a member of Scroll and Key Society. After serving in the Navy in World War II, Auchincloss wondered whether to become a writer or a lawyer; finally, he realised both (despite not completing undergraduate studies at Yale, he was admitted to and attended law school of the University of Virginia), writing a novel per year whilst working as a wills and trusts attorney with Hawkins, Delafield & Wood.

Among Auchincloss's best-known books are the multi-generational sagas The House of Five Talents; Portrait in Brownstone, and East Side Story; The Rector of Justin, the tale of the beloved headmaster of a school like Groton trying to deal with changing times; and The Embezzler, a look at white-collar crime. Auchincloss has patterned his writing after that of Henry James and Edith Wharton.

Margaret Hilda Thatcher, Baroness Thatcher, LG, OM, PC (born Margaret Hilda Roberts on 13 October 1925) is a former Prime Minister of the United Kingdom, in office from 1979 to 1990. She was leader of the Conservative Party from 1975 until 1990. She is the only woman to have held the office of Prime Minister of the United Kingdom. Thatcher was the longest-serving British Prime Minister since Lord Salisbury and had the longest continuous period in office since Lord Liverpool in the early 19th century. She was the first woman to lead a major political party in the UK, and the first woman to have held any of the four great offices of state.

Thatcher was born in the town of Grantham in Lincolnshire, England. Her father, Alfred Roberts, owned a grocer's shop in the town and was active in local politics and religion, serving as an Alderman and Methodist lay preacher.

Roberts came from a Liberal family but stood—as was then customary in local government—as an Independent. He lost his post as Alderman in 1952 after the Labour Party won its first majority on Grantham Council in 1950. He married Beatrice Roberts, née Stephenson, and they had two daughters (Thatcher and her older sister Muriel (1921-2004)). Thatcher was brought up a devout Methodist and has remained a Christian throughout her life.[1] Thatcher performed well academically, attending Kesteven and Grantham Girls' School and subsequently attending Somerville College, Oxford in 1944 to study Chemistry, specifically crystallography. She became President of the Oxford University Conservative Association in 1946, the third woman to hold the post. She graduated with a degree and worked as a research chemist for British Xylonite and then J. Lyons and Co., where she helped develop methods for preserving ice cream. She was a member of the team that developed the first soft frozen ice cream. Thatcher was also a member of the Association of Scientific Workers.

At the 1950 and 1951 elections, Margaret Roberts fought the safe Labour seat of Dartford, and was at the time the youngest ever female Conservative candidate for office. While active in the Conservative Party in Kent, she met Denis Thatcher, whom she married in 1951. Denis was a wealthy divorced businessman and he funded his wife's studies for the Bar. She qualified as a barrister in 1953, the same year that her twin children Carol and Mark were born. As a lawyer she specialised in tax law.

Thatcher then began to look for a safe Conservative seat and was narrowly rejected as candidate for Orpington in 1954. She had several other rejections before being selected for Finchley in April 1958. She won the seat easily in the 1959 election and took her seat in the House of Commons. Unusually, her maiden speech was in support of her Private Member's Bill (Public Bodies (Admission to Meetings) Act 1960) to force local councils to hold meetings in public, which was successful. In 1961 she went against the Conservative Party's official position by voting for the restoration of birching.

She was given early promotion to the front bench as Parliamentary Secretary at the Ministry of Pensions and National Insurance in September 1961, retaining the post until the Conservatives lost power in the 1964 election. When Sir Alec Douglas-Home stepped down Thatcher voted for Edward Heath in the leadership election over Reginald Maudling, and was rewarded with the job of Conservative spokesman on Housing and Land. In this role she adopted the policy of allowing tenants to buy their Council Houses, an idea first developed by her colleague James Allason. The policy would prove popular.[2] She moved to the Shadow Treasury team after 1966.

Thatcher was one of few Conservative MPs to support Leo Abse's Bill to decriminalise male homosexuality, and she voted in favour of David Steel's Bill to legalise abortion. She supported retention of capital punishment and voted against loosening the divorce laws. Thatcher made her mark as a conference speaker in 1966, with a strong attack on the high-tax policies of the Labour Government as being steps "not only towards Socialism, but towards Communism". She won promotion to the Shadow Cabinet as Shadow Fuel Spokesman in 1967, and was then promoted to shadow Transport and, finally, Education before the 1970 election.

When the Conservative party under Edward Heath won the 1970 general election, Thatcher became Secretary of State for Education and Science. In her first months in office, forced to administer a cut in the Education budget, she was responsible for the abolition of universal free milk for school-children aged seven to eleven (Labour had already abolished it for secondary schools). This provoked a storm of public protest, and led to one of the more unflattering names for her: "Thatcher Thatcher, Milk Snatcher". However, papers later released under the Thirty Year Rule show that she spoke against such a move in Cabinet, but was forced, due to the concept of collective responsibility, to implement the will of her fellow ministers.[3] She also successfully resisted the introduction of library book charges.

Her term was marked by support for several proposals for more local education authorities to close grammar schools and adopt comprehensive secondary education, even though this was widely perceived as a left-wing policy. Thatcher also saved the Open University from being abolished. The Chancellor Anthony Barber actually wanted to abolish it as a budget-cutting measure, for he viewed it as a gimmick by Harold Wilson. Thatcher believed it was a relatively inexpensive way of extending higher education and insisted that the University should experiment with admitting school-leavers as well as adults. In her memoirs, Thatcher wrote that she was not part of Heath's inner circle, and had little or no influence on the key government decisions outside her department.

After the Conservative defeat in February 1974, Heath appointed her Shadow Environment Secretary. In this position she promised to abolish the rating system that paid for local government services, which proved a popular policy within the Conservative Party

Thatcher agreed with Sir Keith Joseph and the CPS that the Heath Government had lost control of monetary policy — and had lost direction — following its 1972 U-turn. After her party lost the second election of 1974, Joseph decided to challenge Heath's leadership but later withdrew. Thatcher then decided that she would enter the race on

behalf of the Josephite/CPS faction. Unexpectedly she out-polled Heath on the first ballot, forcing him to resign the leadership. On the second ballot, she defeated Heath's preferred successor William Whitelaw, by 146 votes to 79, and became Conservative Party leader on 11 February 1975. She appointed Whitelaw as her deputy. Heath remained bitter towards Thatcher to the end of his life for what he perceived as her disloyalty in standing against him.

On 19 January 1976, she made a speech in Kensington Town Hall in which she made a scathing attack on the Soviet Union. The most famous part of her speech ran:

"The Russians are bent on world dominance, and they are rapidly acquiring the means to become the most powerful imperial nation the world has seen. The men in the Soviet Politburo do not have to worry about the ebb and flow of public opinion. They put guns before butter, while we put just about everything before guns."

In response, the Soviet Defence Ministry newspaper Krasnaya Zvezda ("Red Star") gave her the nickname "Iron Lady", which was soon publicised by Radio Moscow. She took delight in the name and it soon became associated with her image as having an unwavering and steadfast character. Her reaction to her other chief nickname, "Attila the Hen" (thought to have been coined by Tory grandee Sir Ian Gilmour) is unrecorded.

Thatcher appointed many Heath supporters to the Shadow Cabinet, for she had won the leadership as an outsider and had little power base of her own within the party. One, James Prior got the vital brief of shadow Employment Secretary. Thatcher had to act cautiously to convert the Conservative Party to her monetarist beliefs. She reversed Heath's support for devolved government for Scotland. In an interview for Granada Television's World in Action programme in January 1978, she said "people are really rather afraid that this country might be rather swamped by people with a different culture", arousing particular controversy at the time.[4] She received 10,000 letters thanking her for raising the subject and the Conservatives gained a lead against Labour in the opinion polls, from both parties at 43% before the speech to 48% for Conservative and 39% for Labour immediately after.[5]

The Labour Government ran into difficulties with the industrial disputes, strikes, high unemployment, and collapsing public services during the winter of 1978-9, dubbed the 'Winter of Discontent'. The Conservatives used campaign posters with slogans such as "Labour Isn't Working" [6] to attack the government's record over unemployment and its over-regulation of the labour market.

James Callaghan's Labour government fell after a successful Motion of No Confidence in spring 1979.

In the run up to the 1979 General Election, most opinion polls showed that voters preferred James Callaghan as Prime Minister even as the Conservative Party maintained a lead in the polls. The Conservatives would go on to win a 44-seat majority in the House of Commons and Margaret Thatcher became the United Kingdom's first female Prime Minister. On arriving at 10 Downing Street, she famously said, in a paraphrase of St. Francis of Assisi:

"Where there is discord, may we bring harmony. Where there is error, may we bring truth. Where there is doubt, may we bring faith. And where there is despair, may we bring hope.

Thatcher became Prime Minister on 4 May 1979, with a mandate to reverse the UK's economic decline and to reduce the role of the state in the economy. Thatcher was incensed by one contemporary view within the Civil Service, that its job was to manage the UK's decline from the days of Empire, and she wanted the country to assert a higher level of influence and leadership in international affairs. She was a philosophic soul-mate of Ronald Reagan, elected in 1980 in the United States, and to a lesser extent Brian Mulroney, who was elected in 1984 in Canada. Conservatism now became the dominant political philosophy in the major English-speaking nations, apart from Australia. In contrast her relationship with Australian Prime Minister Bob Hawke was rather strained due to their contrasting views on South Africa and the Commonwealth (Hawke was a republican), and Thatcher did not endorse previous Australian Prime Minister Malcolm Fraser as Secretary General of the Commonwealth.[7]

In May 1980, one day before she was due to meet the Irish Taoiseach, Charles Haughey, to discuss Northern Ireland, she announced in the House of Commons that "the future of the constitutional affairs of Northern Ireland is a matter for the people of Northern Ireland, this government, this parliament, and no-one else."

In 1981, a number of Provisional Irish Republican Army (IRA) and Irish National Liberation Army prisoners in Northern Ireland's Maze Prison (known in Northern Ireland as 'Long Kesh', its previous official name) went on hunger strike to regain the status of political prisoners, which had been revoked five years earlier under the preceding Labour government. Bobby Sands, the first of the strikers, was elected as a Member of Parliament (MP) for the constituency of Fermanagh and South Tyrone a few weeks before he died.

Thatcher refused at first to countenance a return to political status for republican prisoners, famously declaring "Crime is crime; it is not political."[8] However, after nine more men had starved themselves to death and the strike had ended, some rights relating to political status were restored to paramilitary prisoners.

Thatcher's public hard line on the treatment of paramilitaries was reinforced during the 1981 Iranian Embassy Siege where for the first time in 70 years British armed forces were authorised to use lethal force in Great Britain.

Thatcher also continued the policy of "Ulsterisation" of the previous Labour government and its Secretary of State for Northern Ireland, Roy Mason, believing that the Unionists of Northern Ireland should be at the forefront in combating Irish republicanism. This meant relieving the burden on the mainstream British army and elevating the role of the Ulster Defence Regiment and the Royal Ulster Constabulary.

As a monetarist, Thatcher started out in her economic policy by increasing interest rates to slow the growth of the money supply and thus lower inflation. She had a preference for indirect taxation over taxes on income, and value added tax (VAT) was raised sharply to 15%, with a resultant actual short-term rise in inflation.[citation needed] These moves hit businesses -- especially the manufacturing sector -- and unemployment quickly passed two million, doubling the one million unemployed under the previous Labour government.

Political commentators harked back to the Heath Government's "U-turn" and speculated that Mrs Thatcher would follow suit, but she repudiated this approach at the 1980 Conservative Party conference, telling the party: "To those waiting with bated breath for that favourite media catch-phrase—the U-turn—I have only one thing to say: you turn if you want to; the Lady's not for turning."[9] That she meant what she said was confirmed in the 1981 budget, when, despite concerns expressed in an open letter from 364 leading economists,[10] taxes were increased in the middle of a recession. In January 1982, the inflation rate had dropped back to 8.6% from earlier highs of 18%, and interest rates were then allowed to fall. Unemployment continued to rise, reaching an official figure of 3.6 million — although the criteria for defining who was unemployed were amended allowing some to estimate that unemployment in fact hit 5 million. However, Norman Tebbit has suggested that, due to the high number of people claiming unemployment benefit whilst working, unemployment never reached three million. By 1983, manufacturing output had dropped 30% from 1978.

#### The Falklands

#### Main article: Falklands War

On 2 April 1982, a ruling military junta in Argentina invaded the Falkland Islands, a British overseas territory that Argentina had claimed since an 1830s dispute on their British settlement. Within days Thatcher sent a naval task force to recapture the islands. Despite the huge logistical difficulties the operation was a success, resulting in a wave of patriotic enthusiasm and support for her government at a time when Thatcher's popularity had been at an all-time low for a serving Prime Minister[citation needed], with The Sun newspaper declaring "The Empire Strikes Back".

#### 1983 General Election

The 'Falklands Factor', along with an economic recovery in early 1983, bolstered the government's popularity. The Labour party at this time had split, and there was a new challenge in the SDP-Liberal Alliance, formed by an electoral pact between the Social Democratic Party and the Liberal Party. However, this grouping failed to make its intended breakthrough, despite briefly holding an opinion poll lead.[citation needed] In the June 1983 general election, the Conservatives won 42.4% of the vote, the Labour party 27.6% and the Alliance 25.4% of the vote. Although the Conservatives' share of the vote had fallen slightly (1.5%) since 1979, Labour's vote had fallen by far more (9.3%) and in Britain's first past the post system, the Conservatives won a landslide victory. Under Margaret Thatcher, the Conservatives now had an overall majority of 144 MPs.

### 1983-1987

Thatcher was committed to reducing the power of the trades unions but, unlike the Heath government, adopted a strategy of incremental change rather than a single Act. Several unions launched strikes in response, but these actions eventually collapsed. Gradually, Thatcher's reforms reduced the power and influence of the unions. The changes were chiefly focused upon preventing the recurrence of the large-scale industrial actions of the 1970s, but were also intended to ensure that the consequences for the participants would be severe if any future action was taken. The reforms were also aimed, Thatcher claimed, to democratise the unions, and return power to the members. The most significant measures were to make secondary industrial action illegal, to force union leadership to first win a ballot of the union membership before calling a strike, and to abolish the closed shop. Further laws banned workplace ballots and imposed postal ballots.

The confrontation over strikes carried out in 1984-85 by the National Union of Mineworkers (NUM) in opposition to proposals to close a large number of mines proved decisive. The government had made preparations to counter a strike by the NUM long in advance by building up coal stocks, ensuring that cuts in the electricity supply — the legacy of the industrial disputes of 1972 — would not be repeated.

Police tactics during the strikes came under criticism from civil libertarians,[citation needed] but the images of crowds of militant miners attempting to prevent other miners from working proved a shock even to some supporters of the strikes. The mounting desperation and poverty of the striking families led to divisions within the regional NUM branches, and a breakaway union, the Union of Democratic Mineworkers (UDM), was soon formed. A group of workers, resigned to the impending failure of the actions and worn down by months of protests, began to defy the Union's rulings, starting splinter groups and advising workers that returning to work was the only viable option.

The Miners' Strike lasted a full year before the NUM leadership conceded without a deal. The Conservative government proceeded to close all but 15 of the country's pits, with the remaining 15 being sold off and privatised in 1994. Private companies have since then acquired licences to open new pits and open-cast sites, with the majority of the original mines destroyed and the land redeveloped. The defeat of the miners' strike led to a long period of demoralization in the whole of the trade union movement.[citation needed]

At the end of March 1984, four South Africans were arrested in Coventry, remanded in custody, and charged with contravening the UN arms embargo, which prohibited exports to apartheid South Africa of military equipment. Mrs Thatcher took a personal interest in the Coventry Four, and 10 Downing Street requested daily summaries of the case from the prosecuting authority, HM Customs and Excise.[11] Within a month, the Coventry Four had been freed from jail and allowed to travel to South Africa - on condition that they returned to England for their trial later that year. In April 1984, Thatcher sent senior British diplomat, Sir John Leahy, to negotiate the release of 16 Britons who had been taken hostage by the Angolan rebel leader, Jonas Savimbi. At the time, Savimbi's UNITA guerrilla movement was financed and supported militarily by the apartheid regime of South Africa. On April 26, 1984 Leahy succeeded in securing the release of the British hostages at the UNITA base in Jamba, Angola.[12] In June 1984 Thatcher invited apartheid South Africa's president, P. W. Botha, and foreign minister, Pik Botha, to Chequers in an effort to stave off growing international pressure for the imposition of economic sanctions against South Africa, where Britain had invested heavily. She reportedly urged President Botha to end apartheid; to release Nelson Mandela; to halt the harassment of black dissidents; to stop the bombing of African National Congress (ANC) bases in front-line states; and to comply with UN Security Council resolutions and withdraw from Namibia.[13] However Botha ignored these demands. In an interview with Hugo Young for The Guardian in July 1986, Thatcher expressed her belief that economic sanctions against South Africa would be immoral because they would make thousands of black workers unemployed.[14] In August 1984, foreign minister, Pik Botha, decided not to allow the Coventry Four to return to stand trial, thereby forfeiting £200,000 bail money put up by the South African embassy in London. The Coventry Four affair, and Mrs Thatcher's alleged involvement in it, would hit the headlines four years later when British diplomat, Patrick Haseldine, wrote a letter to the Guardian newspaper.[15]

On the early morning of 12 October 1984, the day before her 59th birthday, Thatcher escaped injury in the Brighton hotel bombing during the Conservative Party Conference when her hotel room was bombed by the Provisional Irish Republican Army. Five people died in the attack, including Roberta Wakeham, wife of the government's Chief Whip John Wakeham, and the Conservative MP Sir Anthony Berry. A prominent member of the Cabinet, Norman Tebbit, was injured, and his wife Margaret was left paralysed. Thatcher herself would have been injured if not for the fact that she was delayed from using the bathroom (which suffered more damage than the room she was in at the time the IRA bomb detonated). Thatcher insisted that the conference open on time the next day and made her speech as planned in defiance of the bombers, a gesture which won widespread approval across the political spectrum.[16]

On 15 November 1985, Thatcher signed the Hillsborough Anglo-Irish Agreement with Irish Taoiseach Garret FitzGerald, the first time a British government gave the Republic of Ireland a say (albeit advisory) in the governance of Northern Ireland. The agreement was greeted with fury by Northern Irish unionists. The Ulster Unionists and Democratic Unionists made an electoral pact and on 23 January 1986, staged an ad-hoc referendum by resigning their seats and contesting the subsequent by-elections, losing only one, to the nationalist Social Democratic and Labour Party (SDLP). However, unlike the Sunningdale Agreement of 1974, they found they could not bring the agreement down by a general strike. This was another effect of the changed balance of power in industrial relations.

Thatcher's political and economic philosophy emphasised reduced state intervention, free markets, and entrepreneurialism. Since gaining power, she had experimented in selling off a small nationalised company, the National Freight Company, to its workers, with a surprisingly positive response. After the 1983 election, the Government became bolder and, starting with British Telecom, sold off most of the large utilities which had been

in public ownership since the late 1940s. Many people took advantage of share offers, although many sold their shares immediately for a quick profit and therefore the proportion of shares held by individuals rather than institutions did not increase. The policy of privatisation, while anathema to many on the left, has become synonymous with Thatcherism and has also been followed by Tony Blair's government. Wider share-ownership and council house sales became known as "popular capitalism" to its supporters (a term coined by John Redwood). By 1987, inflation had fallen further to 4.2%.

In the Cold War, Mrs. Thatcher supported United States President Ronald Reagan's policies of deterrence against the Soviets. This contrasted with the policy of détente which the West had pursued during the 1970s, and caused friction with allies who still adhered to the idea of détente. US forces were permitted by Mrs. Thatcher to station nuclear cruise missiles at British bases, arousing mass protests by the Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament. However, she later was the first Western leader to respond warmly to the rise of the future reformist Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev, declaring that she liked him and describing him as "a man we can do business with" after a meeting in 1984, three months before he came to power. This was a start of a move by the West back to a new détente with the USSR under Gorbachev's leadership, which coincided with the final erosion of Soviet power prior to its eventual collapse in 1991. Thatcher outlasted the Cold War, which ended in 1989, and those who share her views on it credit her with a part in the West's victory, by both the deterrence and détente postures.

In 1985, as a deliberate snub, the University of Oxford voted to refuse her an honorary degree in protest against her cuts in funding for higher education. [17] This award had always previously been given to all Prime Ministers who had been educated at Oxford.

In the aftermath of a series of terrorist attacks on U.S. military personnel in Europe, which were believed to have been executed at Colonel Qaddafi's command, President Reagan decided to carry out a bombing raid on Libya. Both France and Spain refused to allow U.S. aircraft to fly over their territory for the raid. Thatcher herself had earlier expressed opposition to "retaliatory strikes that are against international law" and had not followed the U.S. in an embargo of Libyan oil. However Thatcher felt that as the U.S. had given support to Britain during the Falklands War but she had opposed the U.S. invasion of Grenada and that America was a major ally against a possible Soviet attack in Western Europe, she felt obliged to allow U.S. aircraft to use bases situated in Britain.[18] Later that year in America, President Reagan persuaded Congress to approve of an extradition treaty which closed a legal loophole by which IRA members/Volunteers escaped extradition by claiming their murders were "political". This had been previously opposed by Irish-Americans for years but was passed after Reagan used Thatcher's support in the Libyan raid as a reason to pass it.[19]

Her liking for defence ties with the United States was demonstrated in the Westland affair when she acted with colleagues to allow the helicopter manufacturer Westland, a vital defence contractor, to refuse to link with the Italian firm Agusta in order for it to link with the management's preferred option, Sikorsky Aircraft Corporation of the United States. Defence Secretary Michael Heseltine, who had pushed the Agusta deal, resigned in protest after this, and remained an influential critic and potential leadership challenger. He would eventually prove instrumental in Thatcher's fall in 1990.

In 1986, her government controversially abolished the Greater London Council (GLC), then led by the strongly left-wing Ken Livingstone, and six Metropolitan County Councils (MCCs). The government claimed this was an efficiency measure. However, Thatcher's opponents held that the move was politically motivated, as all of the abolished councils were controlled by Labour, had become powerful centres of opposition to her government, and were in favour of higher local government taxes and public spending. Several of them had however rendered themselves politically vulnerable by committing scarce public funds to causes widely seen as political and even extreme. [specify][citation needed]

Thatcher had two notable foreign policy successes in her second term.

In 1984, she visited China and signed the Sino-British Joint Declaration with Deng Xiaoping on 19 December, which committed the People's Republic of China to award Hong Kong the status of a "Special Administrative Region". Under the terms of the One Country, Two Systems agreement, China was obliged to leave Hong Kong's economic status unchanged after the handover on 1 July 1997 for a period of fifty years – until 2047.

At the Dublin European Council in November 1979, Mrs. Thatcher argued that the United Kingdom paid far more to the European Economic Community than it received in spending. She famously declared at the summit: "We are not asking the Community or anyone else for money. We are simply asking to have our own money back". Her arguments were successful and at the June 1984 Fontainbleau Summit, the EEC agreed on an annual rebate for the United Kingdom, amounting to 66% of the difference between Britain's EU contributions and receipts. This still remains in effect, although Tony Blair later agreed to significantly reduce the size of the rebate. It periodically causes political controversy among the members of the European Union.[citation needed]

#### 1987-1990

By leading her party to victory in the 1987 general election with a 102 seat majority, riding an economic boom against a weak Labour opposition advocating unilateral nuclear disarmament, Margaret Thatcher became the longest continuously serving Prime Minister of the United Kingdom since Lord Liverpool (1812 to 1827), and the first to win three successive elections since Lord Palmerston in 1865. Most United Kingdom newspapers supported her—with the exception of The Daily Mirror, The Guardian and The Independent—and were rewarded with regular press briefings by her press secretary, Bernard Ingham. She was known as "Maggie" in the tabloids, and her opponents chanted the well-known protest slogan "Maggie Out!". Her unpopularity on the left is evident from the lyrics of several contemporary pop-music songs (see below: Margaret Thatcher in popular culture)

Though an early backer of decriminalization of male homosexuality (see above), Thatcher, at the 1987 Conservative party conference, issued the statement that "Children who need to be taught to respect traditional moral values are being taught that they have an inalienable right to be gay". Backbench Conservative MPs and Peers had already begun a backlash against the 'promotion' of homosexuality and, in December 1987, the controversial 'Section 28' was added as an amendment to what became the Local Government Act 1988. This legislation has since been abolished by Tony Blair's Labour administration.

Welfare reforms in her third term created an adult Employment Training system that included full-time work done for the dole plus a £10 top-up, on the workfare model from the US.

Thatcher, the former chemist, became publicly concerned with environmental issues in the late 1980s. In 1988, she made a major speech accepting the problems of global warming, ozone depletion and acid rain. In 1990, she opened the Hadley Centre for climate prediction and research. [21]. In her book Statecraft (2002), she described her later regret in supporting the concept of human-induced global warming, outlining the negative effects she perceived it had upon the policy-making process. "Whatever international action we agree upon to deal with environmental problems, we must enable our economies to grow and develop, because without growth you cannot generate the wealth required to pay for the protection of the environment" [22].

At Bruges, Belgium, in 1988, Thatcher made a speech in which she outlined her opposition to proposals from the European Community for a federal structure and increasing centralisation of decision-making. Although she had supported British membership, Thatcher believed that the role of the EC should be limited to ensuring free trade and effective competition, and feared that new EC regulations would reverse the changes she was making in the UK. "We have not successfully rolled back the frontiers of the state in Britain, only to see them re-imposed at a European level, with a European super-state exercising a new dominance from Brussels". She was specifically against Economic and Monetary Union, through which a single currency would replace national currencies, and for which the EC was making preparations. The speech caused an outcry from other European leaders, and exposed for the first time the deep split that was emerging over European policy inside her Conservative Party.

Thatcher's popularity once again declined, in 1989, as the economy suffered from high interest rates imposed to temper a potentially unsustainable boom. She blamed her Chancellor, Nigel Lawson, who had been following an economic policy which was a preparation for monetary union; in an interview for the Financial Times, in November 1987, Thatcher claimed not to have been told of this and did not approve.[23]

At a meeting before the Madrid European Community summit in June 1989, Lawson and Foreign Secretary Geoffrey Howe forced Thatcher to agree to the circumstances under which she would join the Exchange Rate Mechanism, a preparation for monetary union and the abolishment of the Pound Sterling. At the meeting, they both claimed they would resign if their demands were not met.[24] Thatcher responded by demoting Howe and by listening more to her adviser Sir Alan Walters on economic matters. Lawson resigned that October, feeling that Thatcher had undermined him.

That November, Thatcher was challenged for the leadership of the Conservative Party by Sir Anthony Meyer. As Meyer was a virtually unknown backbench MP, he was viewed as a "stalking horse" candidate for more prominent members of the party. Thatcher easily defeated Meyer's challenge, but there were sixty ballot papers either cast for Meyer or abstaining, a surprisingly large number for a sitting Prime Minister. Her supporters in the Party, however, viewed the results as a success, claiming that after ten years as Prime Minister and with approximately 370 Conservative MPs voting, the opposition was surprisingly small.[25]

Thatcher's new system to replace local government taxes, outlined in the Conservative manifesto for the 1987 election, was introduced in Scotland in 1989 and in England and Wales in 1990. The rates were replaced by the Community Charge (more widely known as the "poll tax"), which applied the same amount to every individual

resident, with discounts for low earners. This was to be the most universally unpopular policy of her premiership and had the effect of limiting the number of people on the electoral register.

Additional problems emerged when many of the tax rates set by local councils proved to be much higher than earlier predicted. Opponents of the Community Charge banded together to resist bailiffs and disrupt court hearings of Community Charge debtors. The Labour MP, Terry Fields, was jailed for 60 days for refusing on principle to pay his Community Charge. As the Prime Minister continued to refuse to compromise on the tax, up to 18 million people refused to pay,[citation needed] enforcement measures became increasingly draconian, and unrest mounted and culminated in a number of riots. The most serious of these happened in London on 31 March 1990, during a protest at Trafalgar Square, London, which more than 200,000 protesters attended. The huge unpopularity of the tax was seen as a major factor in Thatcher's downfall.[citation needed]

One of Thatcher's final acts in office was to put pressure on US President George H. W. Bush to deploy troops to the Middle East to drive Saddam Hussein's army out of Kuwait. Bush was somewhat apprehensive about the plan, but Thatcher famously told him that this was "no time to go wobbly!"

On the Friday before the Conservative Party conference in October 1990, Thatcher ordered her new Chancellor of the Exchequer John Major to reduce interest rates by 1%. Major persuaded her that the only way to maintain monetary stability was to join the Exchange Rate Mechanism at the same time, despite not meeting the 'Madrid conditions'. The Conservative Party conference that year saw a large degree of unity; few who attended could have imagined that Mrs Thatcher had only a matter of weeks left in office.

#### Fall from power

See also: Conservative Party (UK) leadership election, 1990

Mrs. Thatcher's political "assassination" was, according to witnesses such as Alan Clark, one of the most dramatic episodes in British political history. The idea of a long-serving prime minister — undefeated at the polls — being ousted by an internal party ballot might at first sight seem bizarre. However, by 1990, opposition to Thatcher's policies on local government taxation, her Government's perceived mishandling of the economy (in particular the high interest rates of 15% that eroded her support among home owners and business people), and the divisions opening in the Conservative Party over European integration made her seem increasingly politically vulnerable and her party increasingly divided. Her distaste for consensus politics and willingness to override colleagues' opinions, including that of Cabinet, emboldened the backlash against her when it did occur.[26]

On 1 November 1990, Sir Geoffrey Howe, one of Thatcher's oldest and staunchest supporters, resigned from his position as Deputy Prime Minister in protest at Thatcher's European policy. In his resignation speech in the House of Commons two weeks later, he suggested that the time had come for "others to consider their own response to the tragic conflict of loyalties" with which he stated that he had wrestled for perhaps too long. Her former cabinet colleague Michael Heseltine subsequently challenged her for the leadership of the party, and attracted sufficient support in the first round of voting to prolong the contest to a second ballot. Though she initially stated that she intended to contest the second ballot, Thatcher decided, after consulting with her Cabinet colleagues, to withdraw from the contest. On 22 November, at just after 9.30 a.m., she announced to the Cabinet that she would not be a candidate in the second ballot. Shortly afterwards, her staff made public what was, in effect, her resignation statement:

"Having consulted widely among my colleagues, I have concluded that the unity of the Party and the prospects of victory in a General Election would be better served if I stood down to enable Cabinet colleagues to enter the ballot for the leadership. I should like to thank all those in Cabinet and outside who have given me such dedicated support."

Neil Kinnock, Leader of the Opposition, proposed a motion of no confidence in the government, and Margaret Thatcher seized the opportunity this presented on the day of her resignation to deliver one of her most memorable performances:

"...a single currency is about the politics of Europe, it is about a federal Europe by the back door. So I shall consider the proposal of the Honourable Member for Bolsover (Mr. Skinner). Now where were we? I am enjoying this." "

She supported John Major as her successor and he duly won the leadership contest, although in the years to come her approval of Major would fall away. After her resignation a MORI poll found that 52% agreed that "On balance she had been good for the country", with 48% agreeing that she had been "bad".[27] In 1991, she was given a long and unprecedented standing ovation at the party's annual conference, although she politely rejected calls from delegates for her to make a speech. She did, however, occasionally speak in the House of Commons after she was

Prime Minister. She retired from the House at the 1992 election, at the age of 66 years. Her continued presence in the House of Commons after the resignation was thought to be a destabilising influence on the Conservative government.

#### Post-political career

In 1992, Margaret Thatcher was raised to the House of Lords by the conferment of a life peerage as Baroness Thatcher, of Kesteven in the County of Lincolnshire. She did not take an hereditary title, as she had recommended for Harold Macmillan, later Earl of Stockton, on his ninetieth birthday in 1984. She has explained that she thought she hadn't sufficient financial means to support an hereditary title[citation needed]. By virtue of the life barony, she entered the House of Lords. She made a series of speeches in the Lords criticising the Maastricht Treaty, describing it as "a treaty too far" and in June 1993 told the Lords: "I could never have signed this treaty".[28] She had also advocated a referendum on the treaty when she returned to the backbenches in 1991, citing A. V. Dicey, since all three main parties were in favour of it and that therefore the people should have their say.[29]

In August 1992, she called for NATO to stop the Serbian assault on Gorazde and Sarajevo in order to end ethnic cleansing and to preserve the Bosnian state. She claimed what was happening in Bosnia was "reminiscent of the worst excesses of the Nazis".[30] In December of that same year she warned that there could be a "holocaust" in Bosnia and, after the first massacre at Srebrenica in April 1993, Thatcher thought it was a "killing field the like of which I thought we would never see in Europe again". She reportedly said to Douglas Hurd, the Foreign Secretary: "Douglas, Douglas, you would make Neville Chamberlain look like a warmonger".[31]

Margaret Thatcher had already been honoured by the Queen in 1990, shortly after her resignation as Prime Minister, when awarded the Order of Merit, one of the UK's highest distinctions. In addition, her husband, Denis Thatcher, had been given a baronetcy in 1991 (ensuring that their son Mark would inherit a title). This was the first creation of a baronetcy since 1965. In 1995, Thatcher was raised to the Order of the Garter, the United Kingdom's highest order of Chivalry.

In July 1992, she was hired by tobacco company Philip Morris Companies, now the Altria Group, as a "geopolitical consultant" for US\$250,000 per year and an annual contribution of US\$250,000 to her Foundation.

From 1993 to 2000, she served as Chancellor of the College of William and Mary, Virginia, USA, which was established by Royal Charter in 1693. She was also Chancellor of the University of Buckingham, the UK's only private university. She retired from the post in 1998.

She wrote her memoirs in two volumes, The Path to Power and The Downing Street Years. In 1993 The Downing Street Years were turned into a documentary series by the BBC, in which she described the Cabinet rebellion that brought about her resignation as "treachery with a smile on its face".

Although she remained supportive in public, in private she made her displeasure with many of John Major's policies plain, and her views were conveyed to the press and widely reported. She was critical of the rise in public spending under Major, his tax increases, and his support of the European Union. After Tony Blair's election as Labour Party leader in 1994, Thatcher gave an interview in May 1995 in which she praised Blair as "probably the most formidable Labour leader since Hugh Gaitskell. I see a lot of socialism behind their front bench, but not in Mr Blair. I think he genuinely has moved".[1]

In the Conservative leadership election in the aftermath of the Conservatives' landslide defeat at the hands of New Labour, Thatcher voiced her support for William Hague after Kenneth Clarke entered into an alliance with John Redwood. Thatcher reportedly then toured the tea room of the House of Commons, urging Conservative MPs to vote for Hague.

In 1998, Thatcher made a controversial visit to the former Chilean dictator Augusto Pinochet, while he was under house arrest in Surrey. Pinochet was fighting extradition for human rights abuses committed during his tenure as President. Thatcher expressed her support and friendship [32]. She remembered that Pinochet had been a key ally of Britain during the Falklands War but preferred to forget the tyranny, torture and mass-murder committed by his regime. Also in 1998, she made a £2,000,000 donation to Cambridge University for the endowment of a Margaret Thatcher Chair in Entrepreneurial Studies. She also donated the archive of her personal papers to Churchill College, Cambridge where the collection continues to be expanded.

Margaret Thatcher actively supported the Conservative general election campaign in 2001. In the Conservative leadership election shortly after, Lady Thatcher came out in support of Iain Duncan Smith because she believed he

would "make infinitely the better leader" than Kenneth Clarke due to Clarke's "old-fashioned views of the role of the state and his unbounded enthusiasm for European integration".[33]

In 2002, she published Statecraft: Strategies for a Changing World detailing her thoughts on international relations since her resignation in 1990. The chapters on the European Union were particularly controversial; she called for a fundamental renegotiation of Britain's membership to preserve the UK's sovereignty and, if that failed, for Britain to leave and join NAFTA. These chapters were serialised in The Times on Monday, 18 March and caused a political furor for the rest of the week until Friday, 22 March when it was announced she had been advised by her doctors to make no more public speeches on health grounds, having suffered several small strokes.[34] According to her former press spokesman Bernard Ingham, Thatcher has no short-term memory as a result of the strokes.[35]

She remains active in various groups, including Conservative Way Forward, the Bruges Group and the European Foundation. She was widowed on 26 June 2003.

On 11 June 2004, Thatcher attended the funeral of, and delivered a tribute via videotape to, former United States President Ronald Reagan at his state funeral at the National Cathedral in Washington, D.C. Thatcher then flew to California with the Reagan entourage, and attended the memorial service and internment ceremony for President Reagan at the Ronald Reagan Presidential Library.

In December 2004, it was reported that Thatcher had told a private meeting of Conservative MPs that she was against the British Government's plan to introduce identity cards. She is said to have remarked that ID cards were a "Germanic concept and completely alien to this country".[36]

On 13 October 2005, Thatcher marked her 80th birthday with a party at the Mandarin Oriental Hotel in Hyde Park where the guests included Queen Elizabeth II, The Duke of Edinburgh, and Princess Alexandra, The Honourable Lady Ogilvy. There, Geoffrey Howe, now Lord Howe of Aberavon, commented on her political career: "Her real triumph was to have transformed not just one party but two, so that when Labour did eventually return, the great bulk of Thatcherism was accepted as irreversible."

In September, 2006, Thatcher attended the official Washington, D.C. memorial service marking the 5th anniversary of the September 11th terror attacks. She attended as a guest of the U.S. Vice President, Dick Cheney, and met with U.S. Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice during her visit. It marked her first visit to the United States since the funeral for former U.S. Secretary of Defense Caspar Weinberger in April 2006. [2]

On 12 November 2006, she appeared at the Remembrance Day parade at the Cenotaph in London, leaning heavily on the arm of former Prime Minister, John Major. One week later, she released an effusive statement of condolence on the death of her friend and economic mentor, Milton Friedman, the man often described as the inspiration behind Thatcherism. On 10 December she announced she was 'deeply saddened' by the death of the former Chilean dictator General Pinochet [37].

On 21 February 2007 as a statue of her was unveiled in the UK Parliament, Lady Thatcher made a rare and brief speech in the members' lobby of the House of Commons. She said: "I might have preferred iron - but bronze will do... It won't rust. And, this time I hope, the head will stay on." (A previous statue in stone had been attacked and decapitated while on public exhibition.)[38].

#### Legacy

Margaret Thatcher has undoubtedly made a great impact on British and global politics. Her policies were emulated around the world, and, though divisive, even left-wing politicians such as Tony Benn have stated their admiration for the straight-forward, unflinching way in which she conducted her policies. The first woman to hold the post of Prime Minister, she was also one of the longest serving Prime Ministers ranking with the likes of the Lord Salisbury. Her departure was one of the most dramatic events in British political history.

She has been credited for her macroeconomic reforms with "rescuing" the British economy from the stagnation of the 1970s, and is admired for her committed radicalism on economic issues. She was a divisive figure, and some still hold her responsible for destroying much of the UK's manufacturing base, consigning many to long-term unemployment (reaching 4 million in the decade she was in power). However, supporters of privatisation and of the free market cite the recovery of the economy during the mid-1980s and the present-day success of the British economy, with its relatively low unemployment and structural shift away from manufacturing towards the service sector. An unfortunate effect of her policies was that many of the publicly supported industries and industrial plants that shrank or closed down were the predominant employers in their areas, thus causing pockets of very high

unemployment, while the growth of new services and technologies normally took place in other usually more prosperous areas.

When Thatcher took over in 1979, Britain was sometimes nicknamed as the "sick man of Europe" in the 1970s[citation needed]. Arguably, the UK emerged from the 1980s as one of the more successful economies in Europe. While the unemployment rate did eventually come down, it came after initial job losses and radical labour market reforms. These included laws that weakened trade unions and the deregulation of financial markets, which certainly played a part in returning London to a leadership position as a European financial centre, and her push for increased competition in telecommunications and other public utilities.

Perceptions of Margaret Thatcher are mixed among the British public. Few would argue that there was any woman who played a more important role on the world stage in the 20th century. In perhaps the sincerest form of flattery, Labour Prime Minister Tony Blair, himself a thrice-elected Prime Minister, has acknowledged her importance. Thatcher herself indirectly acknowledged Blair during a Conservative leadership contest when she said "The Conservative Party doesn't need someone that can beat Mr Blair. They need someone like Mr Blair."

Through the Common Agricultural Policy, British agriculture was (and remains) heavily subsidised while other failing parts of the economy did not receive similar tax revenue support.[citation needed] This geographical imbalance in Thatcher's support contributed directly to the growth of devolution movements in those areas

Perceptions abroad broadly follow the same political divisions. Critical satirists have often caricatured her. For instance, French singer Renaud wrote a song, Miss Maggie, which lauded women as refraining from many of the silly behaviours of males – and every time making an exception for "Mrs Thatcher". She may be remembered most of all for her remark "There is no such thing as society" [39] to the reporter Douglas Keay, for Woman's Own magazine, 23 September 1987. This remark has frequently been quoted out of its full context and the surrounding remarks were as follows:

"I think we've been through a period where too many people have been given to understand that if they have a problem, it's the government's job to cope with it. 'I have a problem, I'll get a grant.' T'm homeless, the government must house me.' They're casting their problem on society. And, you know, there is no such thing as society. There are individual men and women, and there are families. And no government can do anything except through people, and people must look to themselves first."[40]

In 1996, the Scott Inquiry into the Arms-to-Iraq affair investigated the Thatcher government's record in dealing with Saddam Hussein. It revealed how £1bn of Whitehall money was used in soft loan guarantees for British exporters to Iraq. The judge found that during Baghdad's protracted invasion of Iran in the 1980s, officials destroyed documents relating to the export of Chieftain tank parts to Jordan which ended up in Iraq. Ministers clandestinely relaxed official guidelines to help private companies sell machine tools which were used in munitions factories. The British company Racal exported sophisticated Jaguar V radios to the former Iraqi dictator's army on credit. Members of the Conservative cabinet refused to stop lending guaranteed funds to Saddam even after he executed a British journalist, Farzad Bazoft, Thatcher's cabinet minuting that they did not want to damage British industry.

Many on both the right and left agree that Thatcher had a transformative effect on the British political spectrum and that her tenure had the effect of moving the major political parties rightward. Will Hutton, author of the best selling The State We're In, argues that her necessary economic changes could have been achieved with more consensus and less hardship by a leader less enamoured of US hegemonic power.

New Labour and Blairism have incorporated much of the economic, social and political tenets of "Thatcherism" in the same manner as, in a previous era, the Conservative Party from the 1950s until the days of Edward Heath accepted many of the basic assumptions of the welfare state instituted by Labour governments. The curtailing and large-scale dismantling of elements of the welfare state under Thatcher have largely remained.[citation needed] As well, Thatcher's program of privatising state-owned enterprises has not been reversed. Indeed, successive Tory and Labour governments have further curtailed the involvement of the state in the economy and have further dismantled public ownership.

Thatcher's impact on the trade union movement in Britain has been lasting, with the breaking of the miners' strike of 1984-1985 seen as a watershed moment, or even a breaking point, for a union movement which has been unable to regain the degree of political power it exercised up through the 1970s. Unionisation rates in Britain have permanently declined since the 1980s, and the legislative instruments introduced to curtail the impact of strikes have not been reversed. Instead, the Labour Party has worked to loosen its ties to the trade union movement. While industrial action does still occur, there is no longer the kind of mass economic disruption seen in the 1970s, and the closed shop remains illegal.

Thatcher's legacy has continued strongly to influence the Conservative Party itself. Successive leaders, starting with John Major, and continuing in opposition with William Hague, Iain Duncan Smith and Michael Howard, have struggled with real or perceived factions in the Parliamentary and national party to determine what parts of her heritage should be retained or jettisoned. One cannot yet determine what the role of Thatcherism will be under the leadership of David Cameron.

Thatcher is credited by Ronald Reagan with persuading him that Mikhail Gorbachev was sincere in his desire to reform and liberalize the Soviet Union. The resulting thaw in East-West relations helped to end the Cold War. In recognition of this, Lady Thatcher was awarded the 1998 Ronald Reagan Freedom Award by Mrs. Nancy Reagan. The award is only given to those who "have made monumental and lasting contributions to the cause of freedom worldwide," and "embody President Reagan's life long belief that one man or woman can truly make a difference." President Ronald Reagan, who was not able to attend the ceremony, was a longtime friend of Lady Thatcher.[41]

In a list compiled by the centre-left publication New Statesman in 2006, she was voted fifth in the list of "Heroes of our time".[42] She was also named a "Hero of Freedom" by the libertarian magazine Reason.[43]

In February 2007, she became the first Prime Minister of the United Kingdom to be honoured with a statue in the House of Commons while still alive. The statue is made of bronze and stands opposite her political hero and predecessor, Winston Churchill.[44] The statue, by sculptor Antony Dufort, shows her in a typical lively and swashbuckling posture, as though she is addressing the House of Commons, with her right arm outstretched.[45] Thatcher said she was thrilled with it

### Notes for DIANA OLIVIA WINIFRED MAUD MANNERS:

Diana Olivia Winifred Maud Cooper, Viscountess Norwich (August 29, 1892 – June 16, 1986) was a British socialite and actress who was best known as Lady Diana Cooper.

Born Lady Diana Manners, she was officially the youngest daughter of the 8th Duke of Rutland and his wife, the former Violet Lindsay, but Lady Diana's biological father was widely supposed to be the writer Henry Cust, also believed to be the father of Margaret Thatcher's mother. In her prime, she had the widespread reputation as the most beautiful young woman in England, and countless profiles, photographs and articles in newspapers and magazines made her very much the Lady Diana of her era.

She became active in The Coterie, an influential group of young English aristocrats and intellectuals of the 1910s whose prominence and numbers were cut short by the First World War. Lady Diana was the most famous of the group, but it included Raymond Asquith (son of H. H. Asquith, the Prime Minister), Patrick Shaw-Stewart, Edward Horner, Sir Denis Anson and Duff Cooper. Following the sudden deaths of Asquith, Horner, Shaw-Stewart, and Anson — the first two in the war, the third by drowning — Lady Diana married Cooper, one of her circle of friends' last surviving male members, in June 1919. It was not a popular choice in the Manners household, since the bride's parents had hoped for a marriage to the Prince of Wales. As for Cooper, he once impulsively wrote a letter to Lady Diana, before their marriage, declaring, "I hope everyone you like better than me will die very soon." Tragically, most of them did.

In 1929 she gave birth to her only child, John Julius (now known as John Julius Norwich), who became a writer and broadcaster.

After working as a nurse during the war and working as editor of the magazine Femina, she wrote a column in the Beaverbrook newspapers before turning to the stage, playing the Madonna in the revival of The Miracle (directed by

Max Reinhardt). The play achieved outstanding international success, and she toured for two years with the cast. Lady Diana subsequently starred in several silent films, including the first British colour films.

In 1924, Duff Cooper gained election to Parliament, while his wife continued as a society celebrity. Her reputation became even more celebrated in France as the centerpoint of immediate post second world war French literary culture when her husband served as Britain's ambassador to France. During this period, Lady Diana's popularity as a hostess remained undimmed, even when it became known that the embassy guest list included individuals were suspected of collaboration during the war.

Following Duff Cooper's retirement in 1947, they continued to live in France at Chantilly, until his death in 1954. He was created Viscount Norwich in 1952, for services to the nation, but Lady Diana refused to be called Viscountess Norwich, claiming that it sounded like "porridge". She made an official announcement in The Times to this effect, stating that no matter her husband's change in rank, and therefore her own, she would continue to be known as Lady Diana Cooper.

Lady Diana sharply reduced her activities in the late 1950s but did produce three volumes of memoirs: The Rainbow Comes and Goes, The Lights of Common Day, and Trumpets from the Steep.

She died in 1986 at the age of 93.

# Notes for ALFRED DUFF COOPER:

Alfred Duff Cooper, 1st Viscount Norwich GCMG DSO PC (February 22, 1890 - January 1, 1954), known as Duff Cooper, was a British diplomat, Cabinet member, and author.

The son of fashionable society doctor Sir Alfred Cooper and Lady Agnes Duff (sister of Alexander Duff, 1st Duke of Fife), he was the youngest of four children and the only son and enjoyed a typical gentleman's upbringing of country estates, London society, Eton College, and New College, Oxford.

At Oxford, his Eton friendship with John Manners won him entree into a famous and fashionable circle of young aristocrats and intellectuals known as The Coterie, including Patrick Shaw-Stewart, Raymond Asquith (son of the Prime Minister), Sir Denis Anson, Edward Horner and most famously Lady Diana Manners, the most beautiful woman in England and the "Lady Di" of her day. He cultivated a reputation for eloquence and fast-living and although he had established a reputation as a poet, he earned an even better reputation for gambling, womanizing, and drinking in his studied emulation of the life of Charles James Fox.

Following Oxford, he entered into the Foreign Service and owing to the national importance of his work at the cipher desk, he was excluded from military service until 1917, when he joined the Grenadier Guards. He served with distinction as a lieutenant in the campaigns of 1918, winning a DSO for conspicuous gallantry. Almost all of his closest friends, including Shaw-Stewart, Horner, Asquith and John Manners were killed in the war, drawing him closer to Lady Diana Manners, whom he married in 1919. An extremely popular social figure hailed for her beauty and eccentricities, she was one of several daughters born to the Duke and Duchess of Rutland; her biological father, however, was believed to be Harry Cust, known as one of the handsomest men of his day.

The Coopers' marriage was fraught with infidelities, notably Duff's affairs with the Franco-American Singer sewingmachine heiress Daisy Fellowes, the French novelist Louise Leveque de Vilmorin, the writer Susan Mary Alsop (then an American diplomat's wife, by whom he had an illegitimate son, William Patten Jr.),[1][1] and the Anglo-Irish socialite and fashion model Maxime de La Falaise.

Returning to the Foreign Service, he became principal private secretary to two ministers and played a significant role in the Egyptian and Turkish crises of the early 1920s before winning a seat in Parliament as a Conservative for Oldham in 1924. He gave one of the most acclaimed maiden speeches of the century and became known as a stalwart supporter of Stanley Baldwin, the Prime Minister, and a friend of Chancellor of the Exchequer, Winston Churchill. He became Financial Secretary to the War Office in January 1928 before losing his seat in the 1929 election when the Conservative Party was swept out of office. Turning to literature, he produced Talleyrand, a short biography that was published in 1932 to critical praise. He returned to Parliament in a by-election in 1931 for Westminster St George's and served until 1945.

Returning to ministerial office as Financial Secretary to the War Office in 1931, then as Financial Secretary to the Treasury in 1934, he was elevated to the Cabinet as War Secretary in 1935 and promoted to First Lord of the Admiralty in 1937. He completed a biography of Douglas Haig during this period. The most public critic of Neville Chamberlain's appeasement policy inside the Cabinet, he famously resigned in 1938 over the Munich Agreement with Adolf Hitler in an act that MP Vyvyan Adams described as "the first step in the road back to national sanity". He later took a prominent role in the famous Parliamentary debate of 1940 which led to Chamberlain's downfall.

He subsequently entered the Cabinet as Minister of Information under Winston Churchill but after a controversial appointment as Resident Cabinet Minster in Singapore in 1941, he did not play a major role in the direction of the war until appointed the British Government's liaison to the Free French in 1943. He subsequently became the British ambassador to France in 1944 and was a great success in Paris. He left office in 1947, was knighted, and devoted himself primarily to literature until his death in 1954 at the age of 63. He produced during this period the classic autobiography Old Men Forget and was eventually created Viscount Norwich in 1952 in recognition of his political and literary career. His wife refused to be called Lady Norwich, claiming that it sounded too much like "porridge" and promptly took out a newspaper advertisement declaring that she would retain her previous style of Lady Diana Cooper.

Duff Cooper's only legitimate child, John Julius Norwich (born in 1929), became well known as a writer and television host and his granddaughter Artemis Cooper has published several books, including A Durable Fire: The Letters of Duff and Diana Cooper, 1913-50. Another granddaughter is screenwriter Allegra Huston, the only child of John Julius Norwich and Enrica Soma Huston (then married to the American film director John Huston).

Duff Cooper was the subject of a biography by John Charmley and a British literary award, the Duff Cooper Prize was established in his name.

Notes for JENNIFER MARY VICTORIA HAMMOND-MAUDE: Jennifer D'Abo was that rarest of phenomena, a serial female entrepreneur. She was a prime example of the "been there, done that" temperament usually associated with her male equivalents. For, once her latest venture had been fixed, she would move on to pastures new.

Jennifer Mary Victoria Hammond-Maude, businesswoman: born London 14 August 1945; chairman, Ryman 1981-87; chairman, Roffey Brothers 1988; chairman, Moyses Stevens Investments 1990-99; married first David Morgan-Jones (one daughter; marriage dissolved), second 1970 Peter Cadbury (one son; marriage dissolved 1976), third Robin d'Abo (marriage dissolved 1987); died 30 April 2003.

Jennifer D'Abo was that rarest of phenomena, a serial female entrepreneur. She was a prime example of the "been there, done that" temperament usually associated with her male equivalents. For, once her latest venture had been fixed, she would move on to pastures new.

Her most successful venture was the purchase of the Ryman chain of stationery shops from Ralph Halpern of the Burton Group in 1981. She had the imagination to see that the normally unexciting business of buying stationery and office essentials could be made fun, even chic. Helped by such imaginative strokes as selling filing cabinets in cheerful colours and promoting different coloured Post-It notes – themselves an innovation – she transformed the previously down-at-heel shops into what were termed "office bazaars". In six years she multiplied the value of the business nearly tenfold, selling it to Terry Maher of Pentos for £20m in 1986.

In her career she suffered from a double disadvantage: she was a woman and she came from an upper-class background. As a woman she found that her rare failures tended to be highlighted at the expense of her more numerous successes. Not surprisingly she found bankers a problem. "If I put up a feasibility study for a business project," she said, "it's read by 10 analysts as opposed to two because I'm a woman." Not surprisingly she was furious to find as late as 1975 that she was disqualified from membership of the London Stock Exchange. To prove she was not useless she promptly qualified as a pilot, "so I had an education on meteorology, aviation law and navigation". She added, "I still get lost everywhere I go."

To make matters worse, her upper-class background ensured that she received a totally inadequate education and that her male counterparts simply could not cope with her – she was constantly put down. When she was 17 her father was shocked when she announced her intention to "go into trade" to achieve financial independence; and the break-up of her second marriage, to Peter Cadbury, was due, he said, to the fact that "she's a better entrepreneur than me". Her third and last husband, the stockbroker Robin d'Abo, once said, "You are such a bore because you won't come to Wimbledon or Ascot with me" – not only did she not have the time, she was also terrified of crowds. Her husbands' attitudes, as much as her own forceful personality, perhaps explain why she considered her private life a failure, even though she was the most social of animals.

She made a daunting figure, tall, firm-featured, theatrical, imperious, an effect tempered by her cornflower-blue eyes and the complexion of a classic English rose. But the appearance was deceptive – and not only because of what one observer described as her "naughty, childish giggle". For her appearance concealed an underlying vulnerability. For the first two years she served on a board with Dennis (now Lord) Stevenson, he thought,

she stank. I felt she was a pretend aristocrat, a pale imitation of Mrs Thatcher . . . then one day I found myself in the trenches with her and she was a complete brick – tough, compassionate and decent.

She was also so tactful that she remained on good terms with all her three ex-husbands, once arranging a - successful - dinner for all three and even going on holiday with one of them and her successor.

Like many women she admitted relying more on her intuition than did her male equivalents and like all strongminded women she was described as bossy, even though she knew how to delegate. "I enjoy watching people grow," she once said. "I always let a young girl manage a shop if I think she has the ability."

Jennifer Mary Victoria Hammond-Maude was born on the eve of VJ Day, the daughter of a diplomat and a mother who was an invalid throughout her daughter's childhood, which she spent mostly with her beloved nanny and a loving grandmother. Never exactly a promising pupil, the last of her nine schools was Hatherop Castle in Gloucestershire, then, typically, unable to offer "gels" education beyond O level, and sending them, as was the case with the young Jennifer, to "finishing school" in Paris.

Despite her attempts to "get into trade" at the age of 18 she did the right thing and married an officer from the Household Cavalry, David Morgan-Jones, and produced a daughter, Sophy – who is now herself a businesswoman. During the 1960s she worked for Peter Cadbury, himself a leading entrepreneur, and married him in 1970. Unfortunately for the marriage she proved abler than her husband: it was she who urged him to tough it out when he was sacked as chairman of Westward Television, returning in triumph seven days later. She had learnt enough about investment from her grandmother (and from a stockbroker friend) to take over his investment portfolio, and against his opposition sold all his shares just before the crash of 1974.

It was only after her divorce from Cadbury in 1976 that she embarked on an independent business career. Her first success was to take over a rundown Wavy Line grocery shop in Basingstoke and, through sheer hard work and imagination, make it a success. She then converted a local store into a chic mini-department store modelled on Peter Jones and sold it for £1m a mere four years later. He next venture was Jean Sorelle, a toiletry firm in Peterborough which she controlled for three years before taking on Ryman's in 1981.

Her next venture was her only major failure. She had bought a "shell" company, Stormgard, in order to launch a takeover bid worth  $\pm 17m$  for the textile company Selincourt, with the object of making it a major force in supplying clothing to chain stores. She survived an immediate financial crisis when the banks withdrew their backing and she had to find  $\pm 23m$  within a few days. She succeeded, but rows with the other directors over the direction the company should take led to a stormy departure – "the nastiest time of my life", as she put it. "I could have said all sorts of ghastly things about the rest of the board. And I could have made all sorts of excuses but I didn't." But within a month she had been hired by a rival supplier, John Crowther, as a consultant.

In the 1990s she and her former colleagues bought up three very different businesses, Moyses Stevens, the purveyor of flowers to the Royal Family, a Bournemouth "turf dressing manufacturer" (in other words a supplier of compost, or, as d'Abo put it with characteristic bluntness, in "the shit business") and T. Parker, a distributor of supplies for golf clubs. Parker, bought just as the golfing craze was reaching a peak, proved a millstone and was sold a few years later. But Moyses Stevens perfectly suited d'Abo's style, background and love of the chic and fashionable – traits shown at their best at her elegant dinner parties (and in her favourite relaxation, gardening, which she described as her "switch-off time").

By the 1990s she had firmly established herself as one of the "great and good" – one of the few women to qualify for the title – in the business world. Her first job was an unusual one, as Chairman of the Museum Training Institute in Bradford. She later served as a director of a number of businesses, including the London Docklands Development Corporation amd Channel 4, and performed sundry "social" jobs as a fund-raiser for the Imperial Cancer Research Trust and the Natural History Museum.

Forbes, Malcolm, 1919-90, American publisher, b. Englewood, N.J. The third son of a Scottish immigrant who founded Forbes magazine in 1917, he graduated from Princeton Univ. (1941), and became publisher of the magazine on his father's death (1954). Under his leadership, the publication became one of America's most successful business magazines, with a circulation of 735,000. Its annual list of the richest 400 people in America is one of the most widely quoted sources on the subject of wealth in the United States. Forbes ran unsuccessfully for governor of New Jersey (1957) and used his magazine and numerous books to praise the virtues of laissez-faire capitalism. He was worth at least \$400 million at his death. The family continues to run the magazine.

Steve Forbes is President and Chief Executive Officer of Forbes and Editor-in-Chief of Forbes magazine. He resumed this role in February 2000, after a leave of absence to campaign for the Republican nomination for the Presidency.

Mr. Forbes assumed his position in 1990. Since that time, Forbes has expanded, launching a variety of new publications and businesses. They include: Forbes FYI, the irreverent lifestyle supplement; Forbes ASAP, the technology supplement for management decision-makers; Forbes Global, the magazine's international publication, introduced in 1998; a Japanese-language edition of Forbes; Forbes Brasil, a Portuguese-language edition serving Latin America's largest economy; and the Gilder Technology Report.

In 1997 Forbes entered the new media arena with the launch of Forbes.com. Now receiving an average of four million visits a month, it has become a leading destination site for business decision-makers and investors.

Other company divisions include: Forbes Management Conference Group; and Forbes Custom Communications Partners.

Mr. Forbes is also Chairman of the company's American Heritage division, publisher of American Heritage magazine and two quarterlies, American Legacy and American Heritage of Invention & Technology.

The company's flagship publication, Forbes, is the nation's leading business magazine, with a circulation of 900,000. Forbes and Forbes Global together reach a worldwide audience of nearly five million readers.

Mr. Forbes writes editorials for each issue of Forbes, under the heading of "Fact and Comment." A widely respected economic prognosticator, he is the only writer to have won the highly prestigious Crystal Owl Award four times. The prize was formerly given by USX Corporation to the financial journalist whose economic forecasts for the coming year proved most accurate.

In both 1996 and 2000, Mr. Forbes campaigned vigorously for the Republican nomination for the Presidency. Key to his platform were a flat tax, medical savings accounts, a new Social Security system for working Americans, parental choice of schools for their children, term limits and a strong national defense. Mr. Forbes will continue to energetically promote this agenda.

From 1996 to 1999 Steve Forbes was Honorary Chairman of Americans for Hope, Growth and Opportunity, a grassroots, issues advocacy organization founded to advance pro-growth, pro-freedom and pro-family issues. From December 1993, until June 1996, Mr. Forbes served as Chairman of the Board of Directors of Empower America, a political reform organization founded by Jack Kemp, Bill Bennett and Jeane Kirkpatrick.

Mr. Forbes is the author of A New Birth of Freedom (Regnery, 1999), a book of bold ideas for the new millennium.

In 1985, President Reagan named Mr. Forbes Chairman of the bi-partisan Board for International Broadcasting (BIB). In this position, he oversaw the operation of Radio Free Europe and Radio Liberty. The magazine continues to be published today by Princeton undergraduates.

Mr. Forbes serves on the Board of Trustees of Princeton University, as well as on other boards, including The Ronald Reagan Presidential Foundation and the National Taxpayers Union. He is on the Board of Overseers of the Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center. Mr. Forbes holds honorary degrees from Lycoming College, Jacksonville University, Heidelberg College, Iona College, Kean College, New York Institute of Technology, Lock Haven University, Westminster College, Francisco Marroquin University, Sacred Heart University, Centenary College, Pepperdine University, Lynn University, Lehigh University; and New Hampshire College.

He is best known for writing an influential paper in Astrophysical Journal in 1950 [1], in which he proposed the nowconfirmed "dirty snowball" theory of comet composition (although he originally used the term "icy conglomerate").

Fred Lawrence Whipple, the son of a farmer, was born November 5, 1906, in Red Oak, Iowa. An early bout with polio ended his ambition of being a professional tennis player. Whipple studied at Occidental College in southern California, then majored in mathematics at the University of California at Los Angeles. A class in astronomy turned him in that direction, and he received a doctorate in that subject in 1931 from the University of California at Berkeley. While in graduate school, he helped map the orbit of the newly discovered planet Pluto.

He joined Harvard College Observatory in 1931 and studied the trajectories of meteors, confirming that they originated within the solar system rather than from interstellar space.

In 1933, he discovered the periodic comet 36P/Whipple and the asteroid 1252 Celestia. He also discovered or codiscovered five other non-periodic comets, the first of which was C/1932 P1 Peltier-Whipple, independently discovered by the famed amateur astronomer Leslie Peltier.

During World War II, he invented a device for cutting tinfoil into chaff to confuse enemy radar tracking Allied aircraft. He was awarded a Certificate of Merit for this in 1948.

He also invented a "meteor bumper" or "Whipple shield", which protects spacecraft from impact by small particles by vaporizing them.

In 1955 he became director of the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory (SAO), remaining in this post until 1973.

He anticipated the era of artificial satellites and organized the "Moonwatch" group to track them. His group was the only one prepared and ready to make observations when the Soviet Union unexpectedly launched Sputnik I in 1957.

Whipple passed away in 2004, aged 97.

Notes for ANNA SPENCER MORROW:

Anne Morrow Lindbergh (June 22, 1906, Englewood, New Jersey – February 7, 2001, Passumpsic, Vermont) was a pioneering American aviator, author, and the spouse of fellow aviator Charles Lindbergh.

Anne Spencer Morrow was the second of four children born to Dwight Whitney Morrow and Elizabeth Cutter Morrow. Her siblings were Elisabeth Reeve (born 1904), Dwight, Jr. (1908), and Constance (1913).

Anne was raised in a household that fostered achievement. Every day at 5 PM, her mother would drop everything and read to her children. After the young Morrows outgrew this practice, they would employ that hour to read by themselves, or to write poetry and diaries. Anne in particular later capitalized on this routine learned in her youth to write her diaries, eventually published to critical acclaim.

Her father was consecutively a lawyer, a partner at J. P. Morgan & Co., United States Ambassador to Mexico, and Senator from New Jersey. Her mother was active in women's education, serving on the board of trustees and briefly as acting president of her alma mater Smith College.

After graduating from The Chapin School in New York City in 1924, Anne attended Smith College, from which she graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1928. She received the Elizabeth Montagu Prize for her essay on women of the eighteenth century and Madame d'Houdetot, and the Mary Augusta Jordan Literary Prize for her fictional piece entitled "Lida Was Beautiful".

Anne and Charles Lindbergh met in Mexico, when Dwight Morrow, Lindbergh's financial adviser at J.P. Morgan and Co., invited Lindbergh to Mexico, shortly before Morrow resigned to become the American ambassador, in order to advance good relations between that country and the United States.

Anne Morrow and Charles Lindbergh were married at the home of her parents in Englewood on May 27, 1929. That year, she flew solo for the first time, and in 1930 became the first American woman to earn a first class glider pilot's license. In the 1930s, Anne and Charles together explored and charted air routes between continents. Thus the Lindberghs were the first to fly from Africa to South America, and explored polar air routes from North America to Asia and Europe.

In an incident widely known as the "Lindbergh kidnapping", the Lindberghs' first child, Charles Augustus Lindbergh III, was kidnapped at 20 months of age from their home outside Hopewell, New Jersey on March 1, 1932. After a massive investigation, a baby's body, presumed to be that of Charles Lindbergh III, was discovered the following May 12, some four miles from the Lindberghs' home, at the summit of a hill on the Hopewell-Mt. Rose Highway.

She was the basis for Sonia Armstrong in the novel Murder on the Orient Express by Agatha Christie

The frenzied press attention paid to the Lindberghs, particularly after the kidnapping of their son and later the trial, conviction and execution of Bruno Richard Hauptmann, prompted Charles and Anne to move first to England, to a house called "Long Barn" owned by Harold Nicolson and Vita Sackville-West, and later to the small island of Iliec, off the coast of France. Charles and Anne Lindbergh had five more children: sons Jon, Land and Scott, and daughters Anne and Reeve.

While in Europe, the Lindberghs came to advocate isolationist views that led to their fall from grace in the eyes of many. In the late 1930s, the U.S. Air Attaché in Berlin invited Charles Lindbergh to inspect the rising power of Nazi Germany's Air Force. Impressed by German technology and their apparent number of planes, as well as influenced by the staggering number of deaths from World War I, Lindbergh opposed U.S. entry into the impending European conflict. Anne wrote a book titled The Wave of the Future, arguing that something resembling fascism was the unfortunate "wave of the future", echoing authors such as Lawrence Dennis and later James Burnham.

The antiwar America First Committee quickly adopted Charles Lindbergh as their leader, but after Pearl Harbor and Germany's declaration of war, the committee disbanded.

### [edit] Later life

After the war, Anne and Charles wrote books that rebuilt the reputations they had gained and lost before WWII. In 1955, Anne published her best known book, A Gift from the Sea, a meditation on the meaning of a woman's life. She later edited and published five volumes of her diaries covering the period between 1922 and 1944.

Over the course of their 45-year marriage, Charles and Anne lived in New Jersey, New York, England, France, Maine, Michigan, Connecticut, Switzerland, and Hawaii. Charles died on Maui in 1974.

After suffering a series of strokes in the early 1990s, which left her confused and disabled, Anne continued to live in her home in Connecticut with the assistance of round-the-clock carers. During a visit to her daughter Reeve's family in 1999, she came down with pneumonia, after which she went to live near Reeve in a small home built on Reeve's Vermont farm, where Anne died in 2001 at the age of 94. Reeve Lindbergh's book "No More Words" tells the story of her mother's last years.

Anne received numerous awards and honors, in recognition of her contributions to both literature and aviation. The U.S. Flag Association honored her with its Cross of Honor in 1933 for having taken part in surveying transatlantic air routes. The following year, she was awarded the Hubbard Medal by the National Geographic Society for having completed 40,000 miles of exploratory flying with Charles, a feat that took them to five continents. Later, in 1993, Women in Aerospace presented her with an Aerospace Explorer Award in recognition of her achievements in, and contributions to, the aerospace field.

In addition to being the recipient of honorary Masters and Doctor of Letters degrees from her alma mater Smith College (1935; 1970), Anne also received honorary degrees from Amherst College (1939), the University of Rochester (1939), Middlebury College (1976), and Gustavus Adolphus College (1985). She was inducted into the National Aviation Hall of Fame, the National Women's Hall of Fame, and the Aviation Hall of Fame of New Jersey. War Within and Without, the last installment of her published diaries, received the Christopher Award.

From 1957 until his death in 1974, Charles had an affair with a Bavarian woman 24 years his junior, whom he supported financially. The affair was kept secret, and only in 2003, after Anne and the mistress were both dead, did DNA testing prove that Charles had fathered the mistress's three children. One child came to suspect that Lindbergh was their father and made her suspicions public, after finding among her dead mother's effects snapshots of, and letters from, Charles. He is also suspected of having fathered children by a sister of his Bavarian mistress, and by his personal secretary. All this may have contributed to the stoic character of Anne's later life.

Notes for CHARLES AUGUSTUS LINDBERGH:

Charles Augustus Lindbergh (4 February 1902 – 26 August 1974), known as "Lucky Lindy" and "The Lone Eagle," was an American pilot famous for the first solo, non-stop flight across the Atlantic, from Roosevelt Field, Long Island to Paris in 1927 in the "Spirit of St. Louis." In the ensuing deluge of fame, Lindbergh became the world's best-known aviator.

In the years prior to World War II, Lindbergh was a noted isolationist, and a leader in the America First Committee to keep the U.S. out of the coming war. Nevertheless, he flew combat missions in the Pacific Theater as a consultant. In later years, Lindbergh took an active role in the environmental movement.

Charles Lindbergh is a recipient of the Medal of Honor.

Charles Augustus Lindbergh was born in Detroit, Michigan, on 4 February 1902. He spent summers on a farm near Little Falls, Minnesota, but also spent time in Detroit and Washington, D.C.

His father, Charles August Lindbergh, a Swedish immigrant, was a lawyer and later a U.S. Congressman who opposed the entry of the U.S. into World War I. His mother Evangeline Lodge Land Lindbergh, of English, French, and Irish descent, was a teacher at Cass Technical High School and later at Little Falls High School. Lindbergh, for a short

time, attended Redondo Union High School in Redondo Beach, California. He graduated from Little Falls, Minnesota High School in 1918.

## [edit] Introduction to aviation

Early on, he showed an interest in machinery (first his family's Saxon Six, later his own Excelsior motorbike and, finally, aircraft). In 1922, he quit the mechanical engineering program at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, joined a pilot and mechanics training program with Nebraska Aircraft, bought his own aircraft, a World War I-surplus Curtiss JN-4, "Jenny" and became a barnstormer, the "Daredevil Lindbergh."[3] In 1924, he started training as a pilot with the Army Air Service. During this time he also held a job as an airline mechanic in Billings, Montana, working at the Billings Municipal Airport (later renamed Billings Logan International Airport).

After finishing first in his pilot training class, Lindbergh took his first job as the chief pilot of an airmail route operated by Robertson Aircraft Co. of Lambert Field in St. Louis, Missouri. He flew the mail in a de Havilland DH-4 biplane to Springfield, Peoria and Chicago, Illinois. During his tenure on the mail route, he was renowned for delivering the mail under any circumstances. After a crash, he even salvaged bags of mail from his burning aircraft and immediately phoned Alexander Varney, Peoria's airport manager, to advise him to send a truck.

In April 1923, while visiting friends in Lake Village, Arkansas, Lindbergh made his first nighttime flight over Lake Village and Lake Chicot.

## [edit] First non-stop flight from New York to Paris

The Orteig Prize, a \$25,000 prize offered in 1919 by New York hotelier Raymond Orteig, a Frenchman, for the first non-stop flight from New York City to Paris spurred a great amount of interest worldwide. Either an eastbound flight from New York or a westbound flight from Paris would qualify. The first challengers were French war heroes Captain Charles Nungesser and his navigator Raymond Coli. They took off on 8 May 1927 on a westbound flight in a Levasseur PL 8 named L'Oiseau Blanc. Their last contact was when they crossed the coast of Ireland. Other teams including famed World War I fighter ace René Fonck, Clarence Chamberlin (who made the second non-stop flight across the Atlantic two weeks after Lindbergh, landing in Eisleben, Germany near Berlin) and Admiral Richard E. Byrd, were also in the race to claim the prize. Noel Davis and Stanton H. Wooster were killed in a crash, and Charles N. Clavier and Jacob Islaroff were burned to death at Roosevelt Airfield when Fonck's overloaded Sikorsky aircraft nosed over on takeoff.

Lindbergh gained sudden great international fame as the first pilot to fly solo across the Atlantic Ocean. He flew from Roosevelt Airfield in Garden City, New York, to Paris (Le Bourget Airport) on 20 May - 21 May 1927 in 33.5 hours. His plane was the single-engine aircraft, The Spirit of St. Louis. It was designed by Donald Hall and custom built by Ryan Aeronautical Company of San Diego, California. (His grandson Erik Lindbergh repeated this trip 75 years later in 2002 in 17 hours 17 minutes.) The President of France bestowed on him the French Legion of Honor and, on his arrival back in the United States, a fleet of warships and aircraft escorted him to Washington, D.C. where President Calvin Coolidge awarded him the Distinguished Flying Cross on 11 June 1927.

Lindbergh's accomplishment won him the Orteig Prize; more significant than the prize money was the acclaim that resulted from his daring flight. A ticker-tape parade was held for him down 5th Avenue in New York City on 13 June 1927.[4]

His public stature following this flight was such that he became an important voice on behalf of aviation activities, including the central committee of the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics in the United States. The massive publicity surrounding him and his flight boosted the aircraft industry and made a skeptical public take air travel seriously. Lindbergh is recognized in aviation for demonstrating and charting polar air-routes, high altitude flying techniques, and increasing aircraft flying range by decreasing fuel consumption. These innovations are the basis of modern intercontinental air travel.

Elinor Smith Sullivan, winner of the 1930 Best Woman Aviator of the Year Award, described the impact Lindbergh had on aviation. Before his flight, she remembers, "people seemed to think we [aviators] were from outer space or something. But after Charles Lindbergh's flight, we could do no wrong. It's hard to describe the impact Lindbergh had

on people. Even the first walk on the moon doesn't come close. The twenties was such an innocent time, and people were still so religious – I think they felt like this man was sent by God to do this. And it changed aviation forever because all of a sudden the Wall Streeters were banging on doors looking for airplanes to invest in. We'd been standing on our heads trying to get them to notice us but after Lindbergh, suddenly everyone wanted to fly, and there weren't enough planes to carry them." [5]

Although Lindbergh was the first to fly solo from New York to Paris non-stop, he was not the first aviator to complete a transatlantic heavier-than-air aircraft flight. That had been done first in stages by the crew of the NC-4, in May 1919, although their flying boat broke down and had to be repaired before continuing. The NC-4 flights took 19 days to cross the Atlantic Ocean.

The first truly non-stop transatlantic flight was achieved nearly eight years before by two British flyers, John Alcock and Arthur Whitten Brown in a modified Vickers Vimy IV bomber on 14 June-15 June 1919, departing Lester's Field near St. John's, Newfoundland and arriving at Clifden, Ireland (a shorter route than Lindbergh's). A total of 81 people had flown across the Atlantic prior to Lindbergh. However, his was the first solo, non-stop transatlantic flight

After his flight, Lindbergh wrote a letter to the director of Longines, describing in detail a watch which would make navigation easier for pilots. The watch was manufactured to his design and is still produced today.

# Marriage, children, kidnapping

# Main article: Lindbergh kidnapping

Anne Morrow Lindbergh was the daughter of diplomat Dwight Morrow. According to a Biography Channel profile on Lindbergh, she was the only woman that he had ever asked out on a date. The couple married on 27 May 1929, and he taught her how to fly and did much of his exploring and charting of air routes with her. They had six children: Charles Augustus Lindbergh II (1930-1932); Jon Morrow Lindbergh (b. 16 August 1932); Land Morrow Lindbergh (b. 1937), who studied anthropology at Stanford University and married Susan Miller in San Diego; Anne Lindbergh (1940-1993); Scott Lindbergh (b. 1942); and Reeve Lindbergh (b. 1945), a writer.

Charles Augustus Lindbergh II, 20 months old, was abducted from the Lindbergh home on 1 March 1932. A nationwide, ten-week search ensued, and ransom negotiations were conducted with the kidnappers. An infant corpse was found on 12 May in Hopewell, New Jersey, just a few miles from the Lindberghs' home, and identified by Lindbergh as his son. More than three years later, a media circus ensued when the man accused of the murder, Bruno Hauptmann, went on trial in Flemington, New Jersey. The Lindberghs grew tired of being in the spotlight and moved to Europe in December 1935, still mourning the loss of their son. Hauptmann maintained his innocence until the end, but he was found guilty and was executed on 3 April 1936.

## [edit] Pre-war activities

In Europe, during the pre-war period, Lindbergh traveled to Germany several times at the behest of the U.S. military, where he reported on German aviation and the Luftwaffe (air force). Lindbergh was intrigued and stated that Germany had taken a leading role in many aviation developments, including metal construction, low-wing designs, dirigibles, and diesel engines. Lindbergh also undertook a survey of aviation in the Soviet Union in 1938 and reported to the United States military upon his return from each of these trips.

The Lindberghs lived in England and France during the late 1930s in order to find tranquility and avoid the celebrity that followed them everywhere in the United States after the kidnapping trial.

While living in France, Lindbergh worked with Nobel Prize-winning French surgeon Dr. Alexis Carrel, with whom he had collaborated on earlier projects when the latter lived in the United States. In 1930, Lindbergh's sister-in-law developed a fatal heart condition. Lindbergh began to wonder why no one could repair hearts with surgery. He discovered it was because organs could not be kept alive outside the body, and he set about working on a solution to the problem with Carrel. Lindbergh's invention, a glass perfusion pump, was credited with making future heart surgeries possible.[7] The device in this early stage was far from perfected, however. Although perfused organs were said to have survived surprisingly well, all showed progressive degenerative changes within a few days.[8] Carrel also introduced Lindbergh to eugenics and scientific racism; these ideas significantly influenced Lindbergh's later

sympathies with fascist politics and American isolationism, which eventually ruined his public reputation in America.[9]

In 1929, Lindbergh became interested in the work of U.S. rocket pioneer Robert Goddard. The following year, Lindbergh helped Goddard secure his first endowment from Daniel Guggenheim, which allowed Goddard to expand his independent research and development. Lindbergh remained a key supporter and advocate of Goddard's work throughout his life.

In 1938, Lindbergh and Carrel collaborated on a book, The Culture of Organs, which summarized their work on perfusion of organs outside the body. Lindbergh and Carrel discussed an artificial heart[10] but it was decades before one was actually built.

In 1938, the American ambassador to Germany, Hugh Wilson, invited Lindbergh to a dinner with Hermann Göring at the American embassy in Berlin. The dinner included diplomats and three of the greatest minds of German aviation, Ernst Heinkel, Adolf Baeumaker and Dr. Willy Messerschmitt. Göring presented Lindbergh with the Service Cross of the German Eagle (the Großkreuz des Deutschen Adlers) for his services to aviation and particularly for his 1927 flight (Henry Ford received the same award earlier in July). Lindbergh's acceptance of the honor later caused an outcry in the United States. Lindbergh declined to return the medal to the Germans because he claimed that to do so would be "an unnecessary insult" to the German Nazi government. He returned to the United States soon after World War II broke out in Europe.

## [edit] Munich Crisis

Lindbergh went to Germany at the urgent request of the U.S. military attaché in Berlin, who was charged with learning everything possible about Germany's new warplanes. Thus Lindbergh traveled repeatedly to Germany, touring German aviation facilities, where the Luftwaffe chief tried to convince Lindbergh that the Luftwaffe was far more powerful than it actually was. Lindbergh used his prestige to gain far more knowledge of German warplanes than any other American. As historian Wayne Cole explains:

"Of particular importance were the Junkers Ju 88 and, again, the Messerschmitt Bf 109. With the approval of Goering and Ernst Udet, Lindbergh was the first American permitted to examine the Luftwaffe's newest and best bomber, the Ju 88. And he got the unprecedented opportunity to pilot its finest fighter, the Bf 109. He was highly impressed by both aircraft and knew "of no other pursuit plane which combines simplicity of construction with such excellent performance characteristics" as the Bf 109. In his visits to Germany from 1936 through 1938, Colonel Lindbergh closely inspected all the types of military aircraft that Germany was to use in 1939 and 1940. The Bf 109 and Ju 88 were frontline German combat planes throughout World War II. And Lindbergh's findings about those various planes found their way into American air intelligence reports to Washington long before the European war began."[11]

At the urging of U.S. Ambassador Joseph Kennedy, Lindbergh wrote a secret memo for the British arguing that if England and France attempted to stop Adolf Hitler's aggression, it would be military suicide. Some military historians argue that Lindbergh was basically accurate and that his warnings helped save Britain from likely defeat in 1938. Others say that his actions were beneficial to the Third Reich's war effort. There is a case for both of these arguments, since Lindbergh favored a war between Germany and Russia, but deplored the rivalry between Germany and Britain. In Charles A. Lindbergh and the Battle against American Intervention in World War II, Cole explains how Lindbergh was dismayed that pacifism in France had already left that country without a sufficient military and possibly already doomed by 1938, and that Britain had an outdated military still focused on naval power instead of an updated air arsenal to deter the Luftwaffe and force Hitler to turn his ambitions eastward toward a war against "Asiatic Communism". There is some controversy as to how accurate his alarmism concerning the Luftwaffe was, but Cole reports that the consensus among British and American officials was that it was slightly exaggerated but nevertheless badly needed. Lindbergh saw no contradiction between his advocacy of stronger American and British armed forces and diplomatic appeasement of Nazi Germany. "Our civilization depends on peace among Western nations," he wrote in a controversial 1939 Reader's Digest article, "and therefore on united strength, for Peace is a virgin who dare not show her face without Strength, her father, for protection."[12]

Lindbergh was suspected of being a Nazi sympathizer because of his numerous scientific expeditions to Nazi Germany, combined with a belief in eugenics. President Franklin Delano Roosevelt considered him a Nazi and banned him from rejoining the military. Lindbergh's subsequent combat missions as a civilian consultant restored his reputation after the public found out about them, but only to an extent. However, his Pulitzer Prize-winning biographer, A. Scott Berg, contends that Lindbergh was not so much a supporter of the Nazi regime as someone so stubborn in his convictions and relatively inexperienced in political maneuvering that he easily allowed rivals to portray him as one. Lindbergh's receipt of the German medal was approved without objection by the American embassy; the war had not yet begun in Europe. Indeed, the award did not cause controversy until the war began and Lindbergh returned to the United States in 1939 to spread his message of non-intervention.

A. Scott Berg similarly contends that Lindbergh's views were commonplace in the United States in the pre-World War II era. Lindbergh's support for the America First Committee was representative of the sentiments of a number of American people. His anti-Communism resonated deeply with many Americans. Eugenics and Nordicism enjoyed much social acceptance,[13] and other notable enthusiasts of such ideas included Theodore Roosevelt,[14] Winston Churchill[15] and George S. Patton[16].

Lindbergh's political views were complex, and revealed both consistencies and inconsistencies with those of the Nazis. For instance, Lindbergh avowed a belief in American democracy. [17] However, he clearly stated elsewhere that he believed the survival of the white race was more important than the survival of democracy in Europe: "Our bond with Europe is one of race and not of political ideology," he declared.[18] He had, however, a relatively positive attitude toward blacks[19] (something that was scheduled to be fully revealed in an undelivered speech interrupted by the events that followed the bombing of Pearl Harbor[20]). Critics have noticed an apparent influence of German philosopher Oswald Spengler's ideas on Lindbergh's thinking[21]. Controversial and widely read throughout Western World during the interwar era[22][23], Spengler was conservative and authoritarian, but eventually fell out of favor with the Nazis because he did not wholly subscribe to their theories of racial purity.

Lindbergh's detractors created propaganda pamphlets attempting to tie him to alleged Nazi intrigue, pointing out that his efforts were praised in Nazi Germany and including quotations such as "Racial strength is vital– politics, a luxury." They also included pictures of him using the stiff-armed Bellamy salute (a hand gesture described by Francis Bellamy to accompany his Pledge of Allegiance to the flag of the United States).[24] Berg explains that interventionist propagandists photographed Lindbergh and other America Firsters using this salute from an angle that did not show the American flag, so that it would be indistinguishable to observers from the Hitler salute.

Although Lindbergh was labeled "anti-Semitic" in some quarters for his admonishment of Jewish leaders who favored American involvement in foreign wars, he respected and sympathized with the Jewish people. In his Sept 11, 1941 non-interventionist speech in Des Moines, Iowa, Lindbergh declared, "I am not attacking either the Jewish or the British people. Both races, I admire."[25][26] Lindbergh was ultimately critical of Nazi Germany's treatment of Jews. He said in 1941 that "No person with a sense of dignity of mankind can condone" such treatment. [27] He did not, however, think that America had any business attacking Germany and believed in upholding the Monroe Doctrine, which his interventionist rivals felt was outdated. He also feared that destroying a powerful European nation would lead to the downfall of Western Civilization and a rise in Communist supremacy over Europe.

Much of his position was because he considered Russia to be a "semi-Asiatic" rather than European country compared to Germany, and because he found Communism to be an ideology that would destroy the West's "racial strength" and eventually replace everyone of European descent with "a pressing sea of Yellow, Black, and Brown". The latter belief was more important and consistent than the former, since he saw Russia as a natural barrier to the rising East Asian powers.[28][29] He believed that race was directly correlated to national success and non-whites were generally mentally inferior. Lindbergh admired specific elements from European nations, such as "the German genius for science and organization, the English genius for government and commerce, the French genius for living and the understanding of life". He believed that "in America they can be blended to form the greatest genius of all". His interrupted plan to voice his opposition to the Jim Crow laws was possibly inspired by his belief in black "sensate superiority" as well as an opportunity to expose what he saw as FDR's hypocrisy. As an advocate of political realism and a cultural pessimist, he may have also felt that state-enforced racial segregation had become untenable and counterproductive. His message was popular throughout many Northern communities and especially well-received in the Midwest, while the American South was Anglophilic and supported a pro-British foreign policy.[30] Lindbergh considered Hitler a fanatic even before the details of the Holocaust reached him, but he openly stated that, if he had

to choose, he would rather see his country allied with Nazi Germany than Soviet Russia. (He preferred "Nordic" cultures [31], but he also believed that Russia would one day be a valuable ally against potential aggression from East Asia after Soviet Communism was defeated.[32])

The American Axis ([4]), written by Holocaust researcher and investigative journalist Max Wallace, takes a harsh view of Lindbergh's pre-war actions, agreeing with Franklin Roosevelt's assessment that Lindbergh was "pro-Nazi". However, Wallace finds that the Roosevelt Administration's accusations of dual loyalty or treason are unsubstantiated. Wallace considers Lindbergh a well-intentioned but bigoted and misguided sympathizer of the Nazis whose career as the leader of the isolationist movement had a destructive impact on Jewish people. In his 1999 biography of Lindbergh, A. Scott Berg criticizes Lindbergh's anti-Semitic beliefs but distinguishes between what Berg considers Lindbergh's paranoia about the intentions of most American Jews and the virulent anti-Semitism of the Nazis. Berg also finds that Lindbergh believed in a voluntary rather than compulsory eugenics program but takes his subject to task for basing his view of the war on his "xenophobic thinking" and his assumption that Hitler was not as dangerous as a "Genghis Khan or Xerxes marching against our Western nations" because the Nazi leader was a European nationalist rather than a Communist or "some Asiatic intruder."

The same year that Berg's Pulitzer Prize winning bestseller Lindbergh was published, a book appeared by Pat Buchanan entitled A Republic, Not An Empire: Reclaiming America's Destiny. The book portrays Lindbergh and other pre-war isolationists as American patriots, who were smeared by interventionists during the months leading up to Pearl Harbor. Buchanan suggests that the backlash against Lindbergh highlights "the explosiveness of mixing ethnic politics with foreign policy". [33] The views expressed in the book caused considerable controversy that eventually led to Buchanan's departure from the Republican Party. [34]

Lindbergh had always preached military strength and alertness. [35] He believed that a strong defensive war machine, as well as his views about race, would make America an impenetrable fortress and defend the Western Hemisphere from an attack by foreign powers, and that this was the US military's sole purpose. [36]

Many acknowledge that Lindbergh helped keep American public opinion isolationist until 1941 by advancing the movement to keep America out of the war for as long as possible. At the same time, some praise Lindbergh for his prediction that an Iron Curtain would descend upon Europe; many of the predictions which Lindbergh made about the war came before Hitler violated his non-aggression pact with Stalin and launched Operation Barbarossa.[37] Berg reveals that, while the attack on Pearl Harbor came as a shock to Lindbergh, he did predict that America's "wavering policy in the Philippines" would invite a bloody war there, and, in one speech, he warned that "we should either fortify these islands adequately, or get out of them entirely". Cole, Wallace, and Buchanan all believe that Lindbergh was highly influential in ensuring that Hitler's war machine would advance toward the Eastern Front and inflict the most devastation there.

However, it should be noted that, as the most prominent spokesman of the America First Committee, he fought the Lend-Lease Act and the Atlantic Charter. Had the Lead-Lease Act not been passed, as well as the Destroyers for Bases Agreement, Britain might not have survived, possibly leading to Axis victory

As World War II began in Europe, Lindbergh became a prominent speaker in favor of non-intervention, going so far as to recommend that the United States negotiate a neutrality pact with Germany during his 23 January 1941 testimony before Congress. He joined the antiwar America First Committee and soon became its most prominent public spokesman, speaking to overflow crowds in Madison Square Garden in New York City and Soldier Field in Chicago.

In a speech at an America First rally on 11 September 1941 in Des Moines entitled "Who Are the War Agitators?" Lindbergh claimed that the three groups who had been "pressing this country toward war [were] the British, the Jewish and the Roosevelt Administration" and complained about what he insisted was the Jewish People's "large ownership and influence in our motion pictures, our press, our radio and our government." Although he made clear his opposition to German anti-Semitism, stating that "No person with a sense of the dignity of mankind can condone the persecution of the Jewish race in Germany," other comments seemed to suggest that he believed that Jews should expect trouble for supporting the war: "Instead of agitating for war, the Jewish groups in this country should be opposing it in every possible way for they will be among the first to feel its consequences. Tolerance is a virtue that depends upon peace and strength. History shows that it cannot survive war and devastation". [38]

Lindbergh revealed a nativist xenophobia in an expurgated portion of his published diaries: "We must limit to a reasonable amount the Jewish influence... Whenever the Jewish percentage of total population becomes too high, a reaction seems to invariably occur. It is too bad because a few Jews of the right type are, I believe, an asset to any country." His reaction to Kristallnacht was entrusted to his diary: "I do not understand these riots on the part of the Germans," he wrote. "It seems so contrary to their sense of order and intelligence. They have undoubtedly had a difficult 'Jewish problem,' but why is it necessary to handle it so unreasonably?" [citation needed]

There was widespread negative reaction to the speech. Lindbergh was forced to defend and clarify his comments by noting again that he was not anti-Semitic, but he did not back away from his statement. Lindbergh resigned his commission in the U.S. Army Air Corps when President Roosevelt openly questioned his loyalty (which did severe damage to his reputation at the time). After the attack on Pearl Harbor in 1941, Lindbergh attempted to return to the Army Air Corps, but was denied when several of Roosevelt's cabinet secretaries registered objections.

Lindbergh said: "I am not attacking the Jewish people. But I am saying that the leaders of both the British and the Jewish races, for reasons which are as understandable from their viewpoint as they are inadvisable from ours, for reasons which are not American, wish to involve us in the war." [39]

## [edit] World War II

Charles Lindbergh went on to assist with the war effort by serving as a civilian consultant to aviation companies, beginning with Ford in 1942, working at the Willow Run B-24 production line. Later in 1943, he joined United Aircraft as an engineering consultant, devoting most of his time to its Chance-Vought Division. As a technical advisor with Ford, he was deeply involved in trouble-shooting early problems encountered in B-24 production. As B-24 production smoothed out, he devoted more time to Chance-Vought. The following year, he persuaded United Aircraft to designate him a technical representative in the Pacific War to study aircraft performances under combat conditions. He showed Marine F4U pilots how to take off with twice the bomb load that the aircraft was rated for and on 21 May 1944 he flew his first combat mission. It was with VMF-222 on a strafing run near the Japanese garrison of Rabaul.[40]

In his six months in the Pacific in 1944, Lindbergh took part in fighter bomber raids on Japanese positions, flying about 50 combat missions (again as a civilian). His innovations in the use of P-38s impressed a supportive Gen. Douglas MacArthur. [41] Despite the long range exhibited by the P-38 Lightning leading to missions such as the one that killed Admiral Yamamoto, Lindbergh's contributions included engine-leaning techniques that he introduced to P-38 Lightning pilots. These techniques greatly improved fuel usage while cruising, enabling the aircraft to fly even longer-range missions. On 28 July 1944 during a P-38 bomber escort mission with the 475th Fighter Group, Fifth Air Force, in the Ceram area, Lindbergh is credited with shooting down a Sonia observation plane piloted by Captain Saburo Shimada, Commanding Officer of the 73rd Independent Chutai.[42][40] The US Marine and Army Air Force pilots who served with Lindbergh admired and respected him, praising his courage and defending his patriotism

After World War II he lived quietly in Connecticut as a consultant both to the chief of staff of the U.S. Air Force and to Pan American World Airways. With most of Eastern Europe having fallen under Communist control, Lindbergh believed most of his pre-war assessments had been correct all along. But Berg reports that after witnessing the defeat of Germany and the horrors of the Holocaust firsthand shortly after his service in the Pacific, "he knew the American public no longer gave a hoot about his opinions." His 1953 book The Spirit of St. Louis, recounting his non-stop transatlantic flight, won the Pulitzer Prize in 1954. Dwight D. Eisenhower restored Lindbergh's assignment with the Army Air Corps and made him a Brigadier General in 1954. In that year, he served on the Congressional advisory panel set up to establish the site of the United States Air Force Academy. In December 1968, he visited the crew of Apollo 8 on the eve of the first manned spaceflight to leave earth orbit.

## [edit] Children from other relationships

From 1957 until his death in 1974, Lindbergh had an affair with German hat maker Brigitte Hesshaimer who lived in a small Bavarian town called Geretsried (35 km south of Munich). On 23 November 2003, DNA tests proved that he fathered her three children: Dyrk (1958), Astrid (1960) and David (1967). The two managed to keep the affair secret; even the children did not know the true identity of their father, whom they saw when he came to visit once or twice per year using the alias, "Careu Kent". Astrid later read a magazine article about Lindbergh and found snapshots and

more than a hundred letters written from him to her mother. She disclosed the affair after both Brigitte and Anne Morrow Lindbergh had died.

A new German book by Rudolf Schroeck, "The Double life of Charles A. Lindbergh", claims seven secret children in Germany. It says Lindbergh "came and went as he pleased" during the last 17 years of his life, spending between three to five days with his Munich family about four to five times each year. "Ten days before he died in August 1974, Lindbergh wrote three letters from his hospital bed to his three mistresses and requested 'utmost secrecy'," Schroeck writes, whose book includes a copy of that letter to Brigitte Hesshaimer.

## [edit] Environmental causes

From the 1960s on, Lindbergh became an advocate for the conservation of the natural world, campaigning to protect endangered species like humpback and blue whales, was instrumental in establishing protections for the "primitive" Filipino group the Tasaday and African tribes, and supporting the establishment of a national park. While studying the native flora and fauna of the Philippines, he also became involved in an effort to protect the Philippine eagle. In his final years, Lindbergh became troubled that the world was out of balance with its natural environment; he stressed the need to regain that balance, and spoke against the introduction of supersonic airliners.

Lindbergh's speeches and writings later in life emphasized his love of both technology and nature, and a lifelong belief that "all the achievements of mankind have value only to the extent that they preserve and improve the quality of life." In a 1967 Life magazine article, he said, "The human future depends on our ability to combine the knowledge of science with the wisdom of wildness."

In honor of Charles and his wife Anne Morrow Lindbergh's vision of achieving balance between the technological advancements they helped pioneer, and the preservation of the human and natural environments, the Lindbergh Award was established in 1978. Each year since 1978, the Lindbergh Foundation has given the award to recipients whose work has made a significant contribution toward the concept of "balance".

His final book, Autobiography of Values, was published posthumously

Lindbergh spent his final years on the Hawaiian island of Maui, where he died of lymphoma [44] on 26 August 1974.[45] He was buried on the grounds of the Palapala Ho'omau Church in Kipahulu, Maui. His epitaph on a simple stone which quotes Psalms 139:9, reads: Charles A. Lindbergh Born: Michigan, 1902. Died: Maui, 1974. If I take the wings of the morning, and dwell in the uttermost parts of the sea. — CAL

Because of earthquake damage to Hawaii State Highway 31, Lindbergh's final resting place is presently accessible by land only via State Highway 360, or the so-called Road to Hana.

## [edit] Legacy

The Lindbergh Terminal at Minneapolis-Saint Paul International Airport was named after him, and a replica of The Spirit of St. Louis hangs there. Another replica of his plane hangs in the great hall at the recently rebuilt Jefferson Memorial at Forest Park in St. Louis. The definitive oil painting of Charles Lindbergh by St. Louisan Richard Krause entitled "The Spirit Soars" ([5]) has also been displayed there. He also lent his name to San Diego's Lindbergh Field, which also is known now as San Diego International Airport. The airport in Winslow, Arizona has been renamed Winslow-Lindbergh Regional. Lindbergh himself designed the airport in 1929 when it was built as a refueling point for the first coast-to-coast air service. The airport in Little Falls, Minnesota, where he grew up, has been named Little Falls/Morrison County-Lindbergh Field.

In 1952, Grandview High School in St. Louis County was renamed Lindbergh High School. The school newspaper is the Pilot, the yearbook is the Spirit, and the students are known as the Flyers. The school district was also later named after Lindbergh. The stretch of US 67 that runs through most of the St. Louis metro area is called "Lindbergh Blvd." Lindbergh also has a star on the St. Louis Walk of Fame.

In Lindbergh's hometown of Little Falls, Minnesota, one of the district's elementary schools is named Charles Lindbergh Elementary. The district's sports teams are named the Flyers and Lindbergh Drive is a major road on the west side of town, leading to Lindbergh State Park (named after Lindbergh's father).

Lindbergh is a recipient of the Silver Buffalo Award, the highest adult award given by the Boy Scouts of America.

The controversy surrounding his involvement in politics (and to a lesser extent, his personal life) sometimes overshadows the fact that he was an important pioneer in aviation from the 1920s to the 1950s. His 1927 flight made him the first international celebrity in the age of mass media. One U.S. Air Force general remembers Lindbergh's critical view of his own legacy. In the late 1940s, Lindbergh visited U.S. Air Force bases to evaluate American air power (of which he was a staunch supporter) in relation to the emerging Cold War. During this trip, he remarked "I think my flight to Paris came too soon for the civilizations of the world. They were suddenly thrown together by air travel and they weren't quite ready for it."

## Awards and decorations

Lindbergh was given many medals. Most were given to the Missouri Historical Society and are on display at the Jefferson Memorial, now part of the Missouri History Museum in Forest Park, St. Louis, Missouri:

Lindbergh's life has spurred the imaginations of many writers and others; the following list provides a summary of notable popular cultural references:

Charles Lindbergh was selected as Time Magazine's Man of the Year in 1927, the first holder of that title.

Shortly after Lindbergh made his famous flight, the Stratemeyer Syndicate began publishing the Ted Scott Flying Stories (1927-1943) by Franklin W. Dixon wherein the hero was closely modeled after Lindbergh.

Charles A. Lindbergh (1927) was a UK documentary by De Forest Phonofilm based on Charles A. Lindbergh's landmark flight.

A song called "Lindbergh (The Eagle Of The U.S.A.)" was released soon after the 1927 flight. A multitude of other songs included the title "Lucky Lindy" were also released in the aftermath of the Atlantic crossing. Tony Randall, not particularly known for singing, but a fan of old songs, revived the song, "Lucky Lindy", in the 1960s in a collection of jazz-age and depression era songs that he recorded.

The dance craze, the "Lindy Hop" became popular after his flight, and was named after him.

40,000 Miles with Lindbergh (1928) was a documentary featuring Charles A. Lindbergh.

The Agatha Christie book (1934) and movie Murder on the Orient Express (1974) begin with a fictionalized depiction of the Lindbergh baby kidnapping.

Verdensberømtheder i København (1939) was an English/Danish co-production starring Robert Taylor, Myrna Loy and Edward G. Robinson featured Charles A. Lindbergh as himself.

Woody Guthrie wrote a song called "Lindbergh" on "The Asch Recordings Vol. 1" recorded in the 1940s. The song was anti-Lindbergh, and included the line "they say America First but they mean America Next."

The 1942 film, Keeper of the Flame, starring Katharine Hepburn and Spencer Tracy, features Hepburn as the wife of a Lindbergh-like national hero who is secretly a fascist. He intended to use his influence, especially over America's youth, to turn the country into a fascist state and eliminate inferior races. It appears it had been inspired by the controversy surrounding Lindbergh.

James Stewart played Lindbergh in the biographical The Spirit of St. Louis (1957), directed by Billy Wilder.

In Eric Norden's alternate history novel The Ultimate Solution (1973), Norden speculates that Lindbergh would have been president of a Nazi-occupied American puppet state.

The American Experience - Lindbergh: The Shocking, Turbulent Life of America's Lone Eagle (1988) was a PBS documentary directed by Stephen Ives.

In the early 2000s, a full-length musical called "Baby Case," about the Lindbergh Baby Kidnapping and subsequent trial and media circus, was performed at the Arden Theater in Philadelphia to good reviews.

The Philip Roth novel The Plot Against America (2004) is a speculative fiction novel which explores an alternate history where Franklin Delano Roosevelt is defeated in the 1940 presidential election by Charles Lindbergh.

In the January 3, 2008 episode of Jeopardy!, the final Jeopardy! category referred to Lindbergh. Under the category of "Aviation History", the clue read "He was the 118th person to fly over the Atlantic Ocean".

Notes for ROBERT MILTON LATIMER: Discoverer of Element 103 Lawrencium

Lawrencium (pronounced /l?'r?nsi?m/) is a radioactive synthetic element with the symbol Lr (formerly Lw) and atomic number 103.

Its most stable known isotope is 262Lr, with a half-life of approximately 3.6 hours. Little is known of the chemistry but there is strong evidence for the formation of a trivalent ion in aqueous solution, confirming lawrencium's place as the last member of the actinoids. Although lawrencium is often placed as the last member of the 5f-block, it can also be regarded as the first member of the 6d-block

Lawrencium was made by Albert Ghiorso, Torbjørn Sikkeland, Almon Larsh, and Robert M. Latimer on February 14, 1961 at the Lawrence Radiation Laboratory (now called Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory) on the

University of California, Berkeley campus. It was produced by bombarding a three milligram target composed of three isotopes of californium with boron-10 and B-11 ions in the Heavy Ion Linear Accelerator (HILAC).

The Berkeley team reported that the isotope 257103 was detected in this manner and decayed by emitting an 8.6 MeV alpha particle with a half-life of ~8 seconds. The assignment was later corrected to 258Lr.

The team suggested the name lawrencium (Lw) for the new element.

In 1967, researchers in Dubna, Russia reported that they were not able to confirm an alpha emitter with a half-life of 8 seconds as 257103. This assignment has since been changed to 258Lr. Instead, they reported a 45s activity assigned to 256Lr.

Further work in 1969 indicated an actinoid chemistry for the new element founded by Travis Anselm in 8B. In 1971, the team at the University of California performed a whole series of experiments aimed at measuring the decay properties of lawrencium isotopes with mass numbers from 255-260.

In 1992, The IUPAC/IUPAP Transfermium Working Group (TWG) officially recognised the Dubna and Berkeley teams as co-discoverers of lawrencium.

### [edit] Naming

The origin of the name, preferred by the American Chemical Society, is in reference to Ernest O. Lawrence, inventor of the cyclotron. The symbol Lw originally was used but in 1963 it was changed to Lr. In August 1997 the International Union of Pure and Applied Chemistry (IUPAC) ratified the name lawrencium and symbol Lr during a meeting in Geneva.

Lawrencium has also been referred to as eka-lutetium

#### Physical characteristics

The appearance of this element is unknown, however it is most likely silvery-white or gray and metallic. If sufficient amounts of lawrencium were produced, it would pose a radiation hazard. Contrary to some sources, bulk properties of this element, such as the melting point, have not been possible to measure to date. However, the 1st, 2nd and 3rd ionization energies have been measured.

#### [edit] Periodic classification

A strict correlation between periodic table blocks and electron configuration for neutral atoms would describe lawrencium as a transition metal because it should be classed as a d-block element. However, it is classified as an actinoid according to IUPAC recommendations.[2]

#### [edit] Gas phase chemistry

The first gas phase studies were reported in 1969 by a team at the Flerov Laboratory of Nuclear Reactions (FLNR). They used the reaction 243Am+18O to produce lawrencium nuclei which reacted with a stream of chlorine gas to form a volatile chloride component. The product was assigned to 256LrCl3 and confirmed that lawrencium was a typical actinide.

### [edit] Aqueous phase chemistry

The first liquid phase studies were reported in 1970 by the team at the LBNL. They used the reaction 249Cf+11B to produce lawrencium nuclei. They were able to show that lawrencium formed a trivalent ion, similar to other actinides but in stark contrast to nobelium. Further work in 1988 confirmed the formation of a trivalent lawrencium(III) ion using anion-exchange chromatography using a-hydroxyisobutyrate (a-HIB) complex. Comparison of the elution time with other actinides allowed a determination of 88.6 pm for the ionic radius for Lr3+. Attempts to reduce Lr(III) to Lr(I) using the potent reducing agent hydroxylamine hydrochloride were unsuccessful.

### Notes for HAROLD EUGENE (DOC) EDGERTON:

Harold Eugene "Doc" Edgerton (April 6, 1903 – January 4, 1990) was a professor of electrical engineering at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He is largely credited with transforming the stroboscope from an obscure laboratory instrument into a common device. For example; today, the electronic flash is completely associated with the field of photography.

Early years

He was born in Fremont, Nebraska on April 6th, 1903, the son of Mary Nettie Coe and Frank Eugene Edgerton,[1][2] a direct descendant of Richard Edgerton, one of the founders of Norwich, Connecticut and a descendent of Governor William Bradford (1590-1657) of the Plymouth Colony and a passenger on the Mayflower. His father was a lawyer, journalist, author and orator and served as the assistant attorney general of Nebraska from 1911 to 1915. Harold grew up in Aurora, Nebraska. He also spent some of his childhood years in Washington, D.C., and Lincoln, Nebraska.

### [edit] Education

In 1925 he received a bachelor's degree in electrical engineering from the University of Nebraska at Lincoln where he became a member of Acacia Fraternity.[3]. He earned an S.M. in electrical engineering from MIT in 1927. Edgerton used stroboscopes to study synchronous motors for his Sc.D. thesis in electrical engineering at MIT, awarded in 1931. He credited Charles Stark Draper with inspiring him to point stroboscopes at everyday objects: the first was a stream of water coming out of a faucet.

### [edit] Career

In 1937 he began a lifelong association with photographer Gjon Mili, who used stroboscopic equipment, particularly a "multiflash" strobe light, to produce strikingly beautiful photographs, many of which appeared in Life

Magazine. This strobe light could flash up to 1 million times a second. Edgerton was a pioneer in strobe photography, subsequently using the technique to capture images of balloons during their bursting, or a bullet during its impact with an apple, for example. He was awarded a bronze medal by the Royal Photographic Society in 1934, and the National Medal of Science in 1973.

He was a cofounder of the company EG&G, with Kenneth Germeshausen and Herbert Grier, in 1947. EG&G became a prime contractor for the Atomic Energy Commission and had a major role in photographing and recording nuclear tests for the United States through the fifties and sixties. For this role he developed the Rapatronic camera, which was supplied by EG&G.

His work was instrumental in the development of side-scan sonar technology, used to scan the sea floor for wrecks. Edgerton worked with the undersea explorer Jacques Cousteau, by first providing him with underwater stroboscopes, and then by using sonar to discover the Britannic. Edgerton participated in the discovery of the American Civil War battleship USS Monitor. While working with Cousteau, he acquired the nickname he is still known by in photographic circles, "Papa Flash".

In addition to having the scientific and engineering acumen to perfect strobe lighting commercially, Edgerton is equally recognized for his visual aesthetic: many of the striking images he created in illuminating phenomena that occurred too fast for the naked eye adorn art museums worldwide.

He was especially loved by MIT students for his willingness to teach and his kindness: "The trick to education," he said, "is to teach people in such a way that they don't realize they're learning until it's too late." His last undergraduate class, taught during fall semester 1977, was a freshman seminar titled "Bird and Insect Photography." One of the graduate student dormitories at MIT carries his name.

Edgerton's work was featured in an October 1987 National Geographic Magazine article entitled, "Doc Edgerton: the man who made time stand still."

#### [edit] Family

After graduating from the University of Nebraska at Lincoln, he married Esther May Garrett[4] in 1928. She was born in Hamilton County, Nebraska on Sept. 8, 1903 and died on March 9, 2002 in Charlestown, South Carolina. She received a bachelor's degree in mathematics, music and education from the University of Nebraska at Lincoln.

A skilled pianist and singer, she attended the New England Conservatory of Music and taught in public schools in Aurora, Nebraska and Boston. During their marriage they had three children: William, Robert, and Mary Lou.

His sister, Mary Ellen Edgerton, was the wife of L. Welch Pogue (1899 - 2003) a pioneering aviation attorney and Chairman of the old Civil Aeronautics Board.

David Pogue, a technology writer, journalist and commentator, is his great nephew.

He died on January 4, 1990 at Cambridge, Massachusetts at the age of 86 and is buried in Mount Auburn Cemetery, Cambridge, Massachusetts. [5]

#### [edit] Legacy

On July 3, 1990, in an effort to memorialize his accomplishments, several Aurora community members decided to construct a "Hands-On" science center. It was designated as a "teaching museum," that would preserve Doc's work and artifacts, as well as feature the "Explorit Zone" where people of all ages could participate in hands-on exhibits and interact with live science demonstrations. After five years of private and community-wide funding, as well as individual investments by Doc's surviving family members, the Edgerton Explorit Center was officially dedicated on September 9, 1995.

### Notes for JAMES CANNELL CHRISTIAN:

The death occurred at Palmerston North on Saturday of a well known retired farmer of the Stanway District in the person of Mr James C. Christian. Some few years ago Mr Christian took up residence at Awahuri and later resided at Foxton. He was a brother of Mr Enos Christian who farmed at Stanway before leaving to take up land at Morrinsville. Mr Christian is survived by his wife and four sons to whom much sympathy has been extended. The funeral took place from Awahuri today for the Feilding cemetry.

Jim was born in Feiding on 4th November 1885. He served as a private in the infantry in World War 1 seeing action in France.On 13th August 1919 he married Joyce Clark the sister of Mary Clark who lateer married Jim's brother Enos. They had five sons, Monty, Murray, Doug, Trevor and Brian (who died as a baby). Jim and Cowley first bought land in Stanway in 1909. They worked hard clearing the bush and sowing grass and milked 32 cows by hand. They bought more land over the years and Jim farmed at Stanway till 1924 when he moved to Makino Road in Feilding next to what was the Cheltenham cream factory and established a pig farm there. In 1927 the family moved to Kimbolton Road in Feilding where they had ten acres of land on the town side of Simon Street and a further ten acres in Root Street where they built a house circa 1931 for what Doug remembers to be 900 pounds. They sold that in 1934 and purchased a 212 acre property from a Mr Dawbin until after world War 2. He never drank in front of the family but was known to have an occassional drink. Monty thinks he had one or two on sale day but never drank too much. &nbspJim was also a violinist and played in a dance band in the Stanway/Waituna area accompanied by his brother Enos on the piano.Musical evenings were also a popular event with the people of Stanway. He was accompanied by a Mrs Bond in Feilding where they would go some evenings and play all the songs of that era. The whole family used to walk to the Bonds at night, Jim with the violin under his arm. Jim used to put on plays with Jack Milligan and they would spend hours rehearsing at home for the big night.Jim was a constant pipe smoker.. Doug recalls the time they were on the lambing beat on a cold and wet morning and Jim said to Doug "Blast! I've left my pipe at home". Doug looked across at him and said "You've got it in your mouth"! He had got so used to it being thereall the time, alight or not, he didn't even notice it any more. He owned a very nice Whippet car which was only taken out on special occassions. Sometimes they would milk the cows a little early and then head off to the beach floundering. Notes for HUMPHREY DE FOREST BOGART:

Humphrey DeForest Bogart (December 25, 1899 - January 14, 1957) was an iconic American actor who retains legendary status decades after his death. In 1999, the American Film Institute named Bogart the Greatest Male Star of All Time.

Bogart typically played smart, playful, courageous, tough, occasionally reckless characters, living in a corrupt world, yet anchored by an inner moral code. He was also able to play characters with flaws and weaknesses that led to their destruction. His most notable films include Angels With Dirty Faces (1938), The Maltese Falcon (1941), Casablanca (1942), To Have and Have Not (1944), The Big Sleep (1946), The Treasure of the Sierra Madre (1948), Key Largo (1948), In a Lonely Place (1950), The African Queen (1951) (for which he won an Academy Award for Best Actor in a Leading Role), and The Caine Mutiny (1954). In all, he appeared in 75 feature motion pictures.

Even outside of America, Bogart is seen as a cult figure. French actors such as Jean-Paul Belmondo were deeply influenced by his work and image. In À bout de souffle (known in English as Breathless), perhaps the best-known work of French director Jean-Luc Godard, the protagonist Michel worships the persona of Humphrey Bogart and mimes some of Bogart's best-known gestures in a way that is both absurd and touching. François Truffaut, another French director of the "New Wave," directed Shoot the Piano Player, another homage to Bogart. India's great national movie star Ashok Kumar listed Bogart as a major influence on his "natural" acting style. When Bogart reached Leopoldville to film the movie The African Queen, his plane was met by the U.S. consul and the Congolese press.

Bogart is no less an icon in the country of his birth. One of Woody Allen's most popular comic movies, Play It Again, Sam, is about a young man in love with Bogart's aura and intimidated by it. The title refers to a frequent misquote from Casablanca; Rick Blaine (Bogart's character) actually says "Play it, Sam." In 1997, the United States Postal Service featured Bogart in its "Legends of Hollywood" series. And Entertainment Weekly magazine has named Bogart the number one movie legend of all time.

Bogart's exalted standing in the Hollywood pantheon would have astonished most of the agents, casting directors and studio bosses who knew him in the 1920s and 1930s as a good but hardly great Broadway stage actor and B-movie player in Hollywood.

He was born Humphrey DeForest Bogart on December 25, 1899 in New York City, New York, the oldest child of Belmont DeForest Bogart and Maud Humphrey, both of whom were of English descent.

It was long believed that his birthday on Christmas Day was a Warner Bros. fiction created to romanticise his background, and that he was really born on January 23, 1899, a date that appeared in many references. This story is now considered baseless. Although no birth certificate has ever been found to settle the issue conclusively, his birth notice did appear in a Boston newspaper in early January 1900, which would support the December 1899 date. The 1900 census for the household of Belmont Bogart lists his son Humphrey as having a birthdate in December of 1899. Lauren Bacall always maintained this was his true birth date.

Bogart's father was a successful surgeon. His mother, Maud Humphrey, was a very successful commercial illustrator. Indeed, she used a drawing of baby Humphrey in a well-known ad campaign for Mellins Baby Food. In her prime,

she made over \$50,000 a year as an illustrator, then a vast sum. The Bogarts lived in a fashionable Upper West Side apartment, and had a cottage in upstate New York.

Maud Humphrey was a distant woman and the Bogarts' marriage was troubled. Both parents were alcoholics and/or morphine addicts at various times. Maud also suffered intense migraine headaches. "I can't say I ever loved my mother," Bogart once said. "I admired her." He was raised mostly by an Irish nurse. "My parents fought," he said another time. "We kids would pull the covers over our ears to keep out the sound of fighting. Our home was kept together for the sake of the children as well as for the sake of propriety."

From his father, Bogart inherited a tendency for needling people, and a love of fishing and especially sailing. Humphrey was the oldest child of three. Both of Bogart's younger sisters were troubled adults; Kay ("Catty") died at 34 of peritonitis complicated by alcoholism. Frances "Pat" Bogart Rose was tall, shy and sweet, but mentally unstable. Bogart was gentle with her and paid for her care. Other relatives were few and rarely saw the Bogarts. (When Bogart fell in love with Lauren Bacall and she introduced him to her large extended family, he said "Christ, you've got more goddamn relatives than I've ever seen.")

As a boy, Bogart was teased for his curls, his tidiness, his lisp (although some people belive that Bogart obtained his lisp while he served in the navy when a prisoner hit him in the face with the handcuffs), for the "cute" pictures his mother posed him for, the Little Lord Fauntleroy clothes she dressed him in—and for the name "Humphrey." In a childhood accident, Bogart got a splinter of wood embedded in his lower lip. "Goddamn doctor," Bogart later told David Niven, "instead of stitching it up, he screwed it up." The accident left Bogart with a slight lisp.

The Bogarts sent their son to the Trinity School in New York and then to the prestigious prep school Phillips Academy, in Andover, Massachusetts. They hoped he would go on to Yale, but in 1918, Bogart was expelled from Phillips Academy. The details of his expulsion are disputed. One story says that he was expelled for throwing the headmaster into Rabbit Pond, a man-made lake located behind the Andover Inn, while others say that he was expelled for smoking and drinking. His study habits were erratic and his grades low, and he may have hastened his departure by some intemperate comments to those in authority. He had a lifelong dislike of authority figures.

Bogart did menial labor, joined the Naval Reserve, and eventually drifted into acting. He liked the late hours that actors kept, and enjoyed the attention that an actor got on stage. Most of all, he enjoyed the challenge of putting on a difficult scene, making the audience believe it. He dug deeply into the characters he portrayed, and found them a welcome escape from his own self.

He began his acting career on the Brooklyn stage in 1921, playing a Japanese butler. He never took acting lessons, and had no formal training. An early reviewer wrote of Bogart's work: "To be as kind as possible, we will only say that this actor was inadequate." Bogart loathed the trivial roles he had to play early in his career, calling them "White Pants Willie" roles.

Bogart was in 21 Broadway productions between 1922 and 1935. He played callow juveniles, or the romantic second lead in drawing room comedies. The legend persists that he was the first actor to say "Tennis, anyone?" on stage.

Early in his career, Bogart met his first wife, Helen Menken. They married in 1926, divorced in 1927, and remained friends. In 1928, he married his second wife, Mary Philips. Philips, like Menken, had a fiery temper, once biting the finger of a cop who tried to arrest her for drunkenness.

Spencer Tracy was a serious Broadway actor whom Bogart liked and admired, and they became good friends. It was Spencer Tracy, in 1930, who first called Bogart "Bogie." The name stuck.

In 1934, Bogart starred in the play Invitation to a Murder. The producer Arthur Hopkins saw the play and sent for Bogart when he chose to produce Robert E. Sherwood's new play, The Petrified Forest. Bogart arrived in Hopkins' office while Sherwood was there; Hopkins told him: "I've got a good role for you. A gangster role." Robert Sherwood was sure Hopkins was wrong; Bogart should play the football player. Bogart said later: "They argued back and forth, and I thought Sherwood was right. I couldn't picture myself playing a gangster. So what happened? I made a hit as the gangster."

The Petrified Forest had 197 performances in New York; Bogart played escaped killer Duke Mantee. Leslie Howard, who played the lead, knew how crucial Bogart was to the success of the play. He and Bogart became friends, and he promised to help Bogart reprise his role if Hollywood made the play into a movie.

Bogart was proud of his success as an actor, but the fact that it came from playing a gangster weighed on him. He once said, "I can't get in a mild discussion without turning it into an argument. There must be something in my tone of voice, or this arrogant face—something that antagonizes everybody. Nobody likes me on sight. I suppose that's why I'm cast as the heavy."

Warner Brothers bought the screen rights to The Petrified Forest, signed up Leslie Howard, then tested several Hollywood veterans for the Duke Mantee role, and chose Edward G. Robinson. Bogart cabled news of this to Howard, who was in Scotland. Leslie Howard insisted that Bogart play Duke Mantee. When Warner Brothers saw that Leslie Howard would not budge, they hired Bogart to play Mantee. Bogart never forgot this, and named his only daughter Leslie.

Robert E. Sherwood remained a close friend of Bogart's. In 1936, the movie version of The Petrified Forest came out. Bogart got excellent reviews. Still, he was stuck in a series of crime dramas for Warner Brothers and cast as a heavy, with little acting range. All told, in his career as a tough guy, Bogart went to the electric chair 12 times, and got over 800 years of hard labor. Jack Warner saw nothing wrong with that; as long as the movies made money, and the actors got paid, he saw no reason for anyone to complain.

Mary Philips refused to give up her Broadway career to come to Hollywood with Bogart, and soon they were divorced.

On August 21, 1938, Bogart made a disastrous third marriage, which only heightened his frustration. His third wife was Mayo Methot, a lively, friendly woman when sober, but a paranoid drunk. She was convinced that her husband was cheating on her. The more she and Bogart drifted apart, the more she drank and the more she got furious and threw things at him: plants, crockery, anything close at hand. Bogart sometimes returned fire, and the press dubbed them "the Battling Bogarts." "The Bogart-Methot marriage was the sequel to the Civil War," said their friend Julius Epstein. Another wag observed that there was madness in his Methot. During his marriage to Mayo Methot, Bogart bought a sailboat, which he lightheartedly named Sluggy after his hot-tempered wife.

In 1938, Warner Brothers made Bogart do a "hillbilly musical" called Swing Your Lady, playing a wrestling promoter managing the career of an idiotic giant. In 1939, Bogart reached a new low when he had to play a mad scientist in The Return of Doctor X. Bogart cracked: "If it'd been Jack Warner's blood...I wouldn't have minded so much. The trouble was they were drinking mine and I was making this stinking movie."

The studio system, then in its heyday, largely restricted actors to one studio, and Warner Brothers had no interest in making Bogart a star. The system was made for quantity, not quality. Shooting on a new movie might begin days or only hours after shooting on the last movie was complete. Any actor who refused a role could be suspended without pay. Bogart didn't like the roles chosen for him, but he worked steadily: between 1936 and 1940, Bogart averaged a new movie every two months. He thought that Warner Brothers were cheap in their wardrobe department, and often wore his own personal suits in his movies. On the movie High Sierra, Bogart used his own mutt to play his character's dog "Pard."

In California, in the 1930s, Bogart bought a 55-foot sailing yacht from Dick Powell. The sea was his sanctuary. He was a serious sailor, respected by other sailors who had seen too many Hollywood actors and their boats. About 30 weekends a year, he went out on his boat. He once said: "An actor needs something to stabilize his personality, something to nail down what he really is, not what he is currently pretending to be."

The leading men ahead of Bogart included not just such classic stars as James Cagney, Spencer Tracy and Edward G. Robinson—but also actors far less well-known today, such as Victor McLaglen, George Raft and Paul Muni. Most of the better movie scripts Warner Brothers bought went to these men. Bogart had to take what was left. He made movies with names like Racket Busters, San Quentin, and You Can't Get Away With Murder. The only substantial roles he ever got during this period were in Samuel Goldwyn's Dead End (1937) and Angels with Dirty Faces (1938) (another picture in which he gets shot by James Cagney). Bogart rarely saw his own movies and didn't even attend the premieres, which were an expected part of the actor's job.

Bogart had been raised to believe that acting was something beneath a gentleman. Acting in movies was even worse than on the stage, and playing depraved gunmen in "B" pictures for Warner Brothers was not something to be mentioned in polite company.

He had a lifelong disgust for the pretentious, fake or phony. Sensitive yet caustic, and disgusted by the inferior movies he was churning out, Bogart cultivated the persona of a soured idealist, a man exiled from better things in New York, living by his wits, drinking too much, cursed to live out his life among second-rate people and projects. When he thought an actor, director or a movie studio had done something shoddy, he spoke up about it, and was willing to be quoted on the record. The Hollywood press, unaccustomed to candor, was delighted. Bogart once said, "All over Hollywood, they are continually advising me 'Oh, you mustn't say that. That will get you in a lot of trouble' when I remark that some picture or writer or director or producer is no good. I don't get it. If he isn't any good, why can't you say so? If more people would mention it, pretty soon it might start having some effect."

High Sierra, a 1941 Raoul Walsh movie, was written by Bogart's friend and drinking partner, John Huston. The movie was a step forward for Bogart. He still played the villain, "Mad Dog" Roy Earle. He still died at the end; but at least he got to kiss Ida Lupino, and to play a character with some depth. In a climactic scene, Bogart's character slid 90 feet down a mountainside to his punishment. His stunt double, Buster Wiles, bounced a few times going down the mountain and wanted another take to do better. "Forget it," said Raoul Walsh. "It's good enough for the 25-cent customers."

Bogart and Huston enjoyed each other, and drew on each other's gifts. Bogart had always been self-conscious about being a small man (5'8" tall); Huston was six-two (and his rail-thin build made him appear to be even taller). Bogart had never been close to his father; Huston was very close to his father, the actor Walter Huston.

Bogart admired and somewhat envied Huston because Huston got to write scripts, to shape a story and make sure it had heft. Though a poor student, Bogart was a lifelong reader. He could quote Plato, Pope, Ralph Waldo Emerson and over a thousand lines of Shakespeare. He admired writers, and some of his best friends were screenwriters, including Louis Bromfield, Nathaniel Benchley and Nunnally Johnson.

John Huston reported being easily bored, and admired Bogart not just for his acting talent but for his intense concentration. It was Huston who gave Bogart perhaps his best role--the psychotic Fred C. Dobbs in the 1948 classic, The Treasure of the Sierra Madre.

James Cagney and George Raft had both turned down Bogart's part in High Sierra; Raft didn't want to play a character who died at the end. Now George Raft turned down the male lead in John Huston's directorial debut, The Maltese Falcon, also 1941.

Bogart grabbed the part and audiences saw him play a leading role with real complexity. His character Sam Spade was still capable of duplicity and violence, but he was a leading man: handsome, smart, fated to survive. When he discovered his sexy client was a murderess, he turned her in, with a speech he made famous: "I don't care who loves you. I won't play the sap for you! You killed Miles and you're going over for it. I hope they don't hang you by your sweet neck. If you're a good girl, you'll be out in 20 years and you'll come back to me. If they hang you, I'll always remember you."

As America entered World War II, it turned to a new kind of leading man, less dapper and polished, but tougher and more willing to use violence to make the world safe and to get what he wanted. Bogart's persona was much better suited to the war years than to the 1930s. Bogart played a guy who'd grown up on the streets, a guy who knew how to fire a gun, how to punch a guy on the jaw, and spit out "Tell that to your boss."

Bogart got his first real romantic lead in Casablanca, playing Rick Blaine, the nightclub owner. Bogart had learned how to convey pain in his eyes and to show emotion with subtle shadings of his voice. He was still young but looked like a man who had lived hard.

As Casablanca became an iconic movie, much was made of the fact that its script was still being written as shooting on the movie began. Less well understood is that the character of Rick Blaine drew powerfully on the persona that Bogart had been cultivating in real life for at least six years. The soured idealist; the loner; the hard-drinking man exiled from better things in New York—all of these were crucial parts of Rick Blaine—and of Bogart. Bogart played a complex man wary of showing his emotions or ideals, a chess player who kept even his friends off balance. In real life, Bogart himself played tournament chess, achieving expert strength, one level below master level. Bogart reportedly asked that Blaine also be portrayed as a chess player.

Bogart was surrounded by a fine international cast, including Ingrid Bergman, Claude Rains, Peter Lorre, Sidney Greenstreet, Paul Henreid and Conrad Veidt. Dooley Wilson played the part of Sam, Rick's confidant and piano player, even though he could not play the piano. The script and Max Steiner's musical score have both been praised extensively, as has the cinematography.

The stories that Ronald Reagan had been offered, but passed on, the role of Rick are just that, stories, resulting from the casual lies pumped out by studio publicity departments in those days to keep fans interested in the activities of a star who was not doing anything newsworthy at the time. Warner Brothers' publicity department concocted similar tales during the shooting of Casablanca, e.g., that Bogart was learning Swedish so that he could woo Bergman, that were just as spurious.

Off the set, Bergman and Bogart hardly spoke during the filming of Casablanca. She said later, "I kissed him but I never knew him." Years later, after Ingrid Bergman had taken up with Italian director Roberto Rossellini, and borne him a child, Bogart bawled her out for it. "You used to be a great star," he said. "What are you now?" "A happy woman," she replied.

Casablanca won the 1943 Academy Award for Best Picture. Bogart was nominated for the Best Actor in a Leading Role, but lost out to Paul Lukas for his performance in Watch on the Rhine.

Only Bogart's fourth marriage, to Lauren Bacall ("Baby"), was a happy one. They met while making To Have and Have Not. Bogart played a tough, independent fisherman named Steve, who got pushed to his limit by some unsavory people and then got his revenge. They were married on May 21, 1945 in Mansfield, Ohio, at Malabar Farm, the country home of Pulitzer Prize-winning author Louis Bromfield, who was a close friend of Bogart.

Bacall became an overnight sensation with her famous line to Bogart. Leaning against a doorway, her head down and voice low, she told Bogart's character: "You know how to whistle, don't you, Steve? Just put your lips together, and blow."

Bogart fell in love with Bacall. The movie's director, Howard Hawks, once commented: "When two people are falling in love with each other, they're not tough to get along with, I can tell you that. Bogie was marvelous. I said "You've got to help" and of course after a few days he really began to get interested in the girl. That made him help more." Hawks also said of Bacall: "She had to keep practicing for six to eight months to keep that low voice. Now, it's perfectly natural. And the funny thing is that Bogie fell in love with the character she played, so she had to keep playing it the rest of her life."

Bogart had another strong, unspoken friendship with Walter Brennan, who played the harmless drunk Eddie in To Have and Have Not. Hawks recalled: "The fellow who rented their boat said 'What do you take care of him for?' Bogart looked at him and said, 'He thinks he's taking care of me.' And he wasn't very nice the way he said it. Those are the relationships that happen between men."

Bogart and Bacall's relationship is at the heart of the film noir masterpiece The Big Sleep. The plot is complex and has holes in it that even Raymond Chandler, who wrote the novel on which it was based, could not explain. Hawks himself admitted "I never figured out what was going on but I thought [it] had great scenes in it...After that got by, I said, 'I'm never going to worry about being logical again.'"

Chandler thoroughly admired Bogart's performance: "Bogart can be tough without a gun. Also he has a sense of humor that contains that grating undertone of contempt."

Bacall allowed Bogart lots of weekend time on his boat. She got seasick on boats and Bogart liked the boat to be an all-male preserve, stating "The trouble with having dames on board is you can't pee over the side." Bogart would frequently sail to Catalina with friends or set some lobster traps.

Bogart allowed Bacall romantic crushes on Adlai Stevenson and Leonard Bernstein, knowing she'd married young before ever having much chance to date. But he made clear he'd leave Bacall if she ever had an affair. She never did. Bacall once wrote of Bogart: "You had to stay awake married to him. Every time I thought I could relax and do everything I wanted, he'd buck. There was no way to predict his reactions, no matter how well I knew him."

Bogart and Bacall moved into a \$160,000 white brick mansion in Holmby Hills, an exclusive neighborhood between Beverly Hills and Bel Air. Bogart and Bacall had two Jaguar cars, and three blooded Boxer dogs. Bogart said "We moved where all the creeps live." But he enjoyed some of his neighbors, especially Judy Garland.

When Lauren Bacall learned she was pregnant, she was ecstatic. Bogart came home from a day at the studio, and she met him with the great news. He grew very quiet. He put his arm around her and led her gently into the house. He was quiet during dinner—and then, after dinner, Bogart and Bacall had the worst fight they ever had. Bogart had finally found a woman he truly loved, and he didn't want to share her. He was scared of losing her affection to a baby.

When Lauren Bacall gave birth to a son, Stephen, Bogart became a father at 49. He'd had months to absorb the news, had even had his own baby shower. (Frank Sinatra had brought him baby rattles.) But Bogart still felt awkward about being a father. ("What do you do with a kid?" he asked a friend. "They don't drink.") In 1952, they had their second child, Leslie (a girl, named after actor Leslie Howard).

In 1950, Bogart and his friend Bill Seeman arrived at the El Morocco Club in New York after midnight. Bogart had bought two giant stuffed panda bears for Stephen, and he and Seeman introduced the bears around as their "dates" and demanded a table for four. They propped up the bears in separate chairs, and began doing some heavy drinking.

Two young women at the club saw the pandas. One of them picked up one of the pandas. Bogart got angry and pushed her. After she fell to the floor, her friend picked up the other panda, Bogart said something cruel, and her boyfriend arrived and began throwing plates. After a wild scuffle, Bogart, Seeman and the pandas were thrown out of El Morocco and told never to return.

One of the women sued Bogart for \$25,000. He showed up in court and was asked: "Were you drunk?" "Isn't everybody at three in the morning?" he replied. The case was dropped. Later, he mused: "Errol Flynn and I are the only ones left who do any good old hell-raising."

Bogart also loved to go to Romanoff's in Beverly Hills. A valet would take the Jaguar, and a maitre d' would lead Bogart to his regular booth. Friends would stop by to chat or talk shop: David Niven, Judy Garland, Richard Brooks, Marilyn Monroe, Swifty Lazar, Spencer Tracy. Rock Hudson was a rising star; when he saw him, Bogart would ask, "What the hell kind of name is 'Rock' Hudson?"

Bogart considered Mike Romanoff a poseur but nonetheless counted him a close friend. Among other things, Bogart admired him as a chess player and appreciated his tendency to needle people. Mike Romanoff was a man with a cultivated Oxford accent, who insisted that his true name was "Prince Michael Alexandrovitch Dmitri Obolensky Romanoff", and that he was a blood nephew of the former Russian tsar.

Mike Romanoff would greet Bogart by saying, "Good afternoon, Mr. Bogart. Are you going to be paying your bill today? I thought that might be a pleasant change."

Bogart would smile and reply: "Are you going to be putting any alcohol in your drinks today? That might be a pleasant change."

If Bacall was with Bogart, Romanoff might turn to her and say: "I see that you are still dating the same aging actor."

In 1951, Bogart starred in the movie The African Queen, with Katharine Hepburn, and again directed by his friend John Huston. It was a difficult shoot, on location in Africa. One day the boat The African Queen sank. (Lauren Bacall recalled: "The natives had been told to watch it and they did—they watched it sink.")

John Huston recalled: "Bogie didn't particularly care for the Charlie Alnutt role when he started, but I slowly got him into it, showing him by expression and gesture what I thought Alnutt should be like. He first imitated me, then all at once he got under the skin of that wretched, sleazy, absurd, brave little man. He realized he was on to something new and good. He said to me, 'John, don't let me lose it."

Hepburn's proper spinster character scolded Bogart's Charlie Alnutt: "Nature, Mr. Alnutt, is what we are put in this world to rise above." Bogart had a famous put down too: "You crazy, psalm-singing, skinny old maid!"

The role of Charlie Alnutt won Bogart his first Academy Award for Best Actor in a Leading Role in 1952. He had vowed to friends that if he won, his speech would break the convention of thanking everyone in sight. He would say instead: "I don't owe anything to anyone! I earned this award by hard work and paying attention to my craft." But when Bogart won the Academy Award, he thanked John Huston, Katharine Hepburn, the cast and crew of the movie. He had always felt Hollywood people did not like him much, and he was deeply moved to find himself so popular now.

Also in 1951, Bogart and Bacall co-starred in the syndicated radio drama Bold Venture, for which he was paid a reported \$4000 a week. He played a character very much like Steve in To Have and Have Not, she played his "ward". He called her "Sailor".

Bogart relied on his standing with his fellow actors to organize a delegation who went to Washington, D.C., during the height of McCarthyism, to protest the House Unamerican Activities Committee's harassment of Hollywood writers and actors. Bogart was not, however, prepared to deal with the industry pressure to abandon this campaign; within a year he disavowed his activities, retreating to his role as actor and apologizing for speaking out on politics.

The Caine Mutiny was Bogart's last major movie. He dropped his asking price to get the role of Captain Queeg, then griped with some of his old bitterness about it. ("This never happens to Cooper or Grant or Gable, but always to me. Why does it happen to me?")

Bogart gave a bravura performance as Captain Queeg. Queeg was in many ways an extension of the character he had played in The Maltese Falcon, Casablanca, and The Big Sleep—the wary loner who trusts no one—but with none of the warmth or humor that made those characters so appealing. Like his portrayal of Fred C. Dobbs in The Treasure of the Sierra Madre, Bogart played—but did not overplay—a paranoid, self-pitying character whose small-mindedness eventually destroyed him.

Bogart had always treated his body poorly, and often drank heavily when not working. (Typically contrary, the one night he refused to get drunk was New Year's Eve.) He smoked unfiltered Chesterfields. Once, after signing a long-term deal with Warner Brothers, Bogart predicted with glee that his teeth and hair would fall out before the contract ended. That sent a fuming Jack Warner to his lawyers.

In 1955, he made three movies: The Desperate Hours, The Left Hand of God, and We're No Angels. Each movie had a special satisfaction. The Desperate Hours gave him a third chance to play a hostage drama. During The Left Hand of God, Bogart was able to befriend Gene Tierney, and encourage her to get the psychiatric help he thought she badly needed. In We're No Angels, he got a starring role for Joan Bennett, who'd been out of work for three years after a family scandal.

But his health was failing—Bogart had cancer of the esophagus. He almost never spoke of it and refused to see a doctor until January of 1956, and by then removal of his esophagus, two lymph nodes and a rib was too little, too late.

## Notes for BETTY JOAN (LAUREN BACALL) PERSKE:

Lauren Bacall (born 16 September 1924) is an American film and stage actress and a former model. Known for her husky voice and sultry looks, Bacall became a fashion icon and role model for modern-day women early in her career. She was married to and appeared in movies with Humphrey Bogart. She is a cousin of Shimon Peres, the former Prime Minister of Israel.

Born in New York City as Betty Joan Perske, the only child of Jewish immigrants, William Perske (born in Poland, in an area which is now part of Belarus) and Natalie Weinstein-Bacal (born in Romania). Her father was a salesman and her mother was a secretary. Her parents were divorced when she was six years old. As a result, she no longer saw her father, and she formed a strong bond with her mother whom she later took with her to California after working on Broadway.

Bacall first studied dance for 13 years. She then studied acting at the American Academy of Dramatic Arts, along with Kirk Douglas, to whom she felt some attraction which she did not pursue. During this time she became a theater usher.

She made her acting debut, as Betty Bacall, on Broadway in 1942, in Johnny Two by Four (her stage name is derived from her mother's Romanian maiden name (Bacal)). At that time her idol was the actress Bette Davis, she recalled that she had wanted to be "the Bette Davis of the theater". Bacall, then a young Betty, was able to meet Davis at her hotel, and nearly fainted from the heady experience. Coming full circle, many years later, Davis would visit Bacall backstage to congratulate her on her triumph in Applause, a musical based on Davis's smash film, All About Eve.

She then began to model part-time during which time she experienced what she perceived as anti-semitism for the first time. Later, when she first went to Hollywood, she noticed that director Howard Hawks would make anti-semitic remarks. This made her nervous of revealing her identity and she did not let Hawks know at the time that she was Jewish, a decision she now regrets.

A career on the stage was what Bacall had envisaged for herself, but she entered the world of movies almost by chance. After Howard Hawks' wife (whom Hawks nicknamed "Slim") spotted Bacall on the cover of Harper's Bazaar, she showed the photo to her husband, and he then made a phone call to New York to bring her to Hollywood for a screen test. Hawks would use the nickname "Slim" for Bacall's character in her first movie To Have and Have Not.

Hawks gave her several screen tests, teaching her to speak in a lower tone. Not liking the name Betty, he gave her the first name Lauren. She was nervous in front of the camera, so Hawks suggested that she tilt her head a little and pull her hair over one side of her face. This became known as The Look, Bacall's sensual trademark.

She met Humphrey Bogart on the set of her first film, To Have and Have Not (1944). Bogart (who was married to Mayo Methot) initiated a relationship with Bacall some weeks into shooting and they began to see each other off set.

Bacall contacted Hal Wallis to ask him to go and see Kirk Douglas who then had a small part in a Broadway play. Wallis then brought Douglas to Hollywood. As a result, Douglas made his film debut in The Strange Love of Martha Ivers (1946, opposite Barbara Stanwyck).

The 20-year old Bacall made worldwide headlines, and created a sensation, on a visit to the National Press Club in Washington D.C. on (10 February 1945). Her press agent (Charlie Enfield, chief of publicity at Warner Brothers) asked her to sit on the piano which was being played by the Vice-President of the United States Harry S. Truman as a publicity stunt. The photos of the incident [1] caused somewhat of a scandal, and even Truman's wife Bess was upset about it. Bacall has said that she still gets sent picture postcards of this event to this day.

After To Have and Have Not, she appeared with Bogart in The Big Sleep (1946), Dark Passage (1947), and Key Largo (1948). Their off-screen romance is obvious in love scenes in To Have and Have Not and The Big Sleep.

On May 21, 1945, Bacall married Humphrey Bogart. Their wedding and honeymoon took place at Malabar Farm, Mansfield, Ohio (the country home of Pulitzer Prize-winning author Louis Bromfield, a close friend of Bogart). At the time of their marriage, Bacall was 20 and Bogart was 45. They remained married until Bogart's death from cancer in 1957. Bogart usually called Bacall "Baby", even when referring to her in conversations with other people. After the filming of The African Queen in 1951, Bacall and Bogart became great friends of Bogart's co-star Katharine Hepburn and her partner Spencer Tracy. Bacall also began to mix in non-acting circles, becoming friends with the historian Arthur Schlesinger and the journalist Alistair Cooke. In 1952, she gave campaign speeches for Democratic Presidential contender Adlai Stevenson (on whom she allegedly had a "school-girl" crush).

After Bogart's death in 1957, Bacall had an affair with singer and actor Frank Sinatra. However, knowing of Sinatra's reputation as a womanizer, she had known that he was unlikely to have been faithful to her. She told Robert Osborne

of Turner Classic Movies (TCM) in an interview, that because of this, she had ended the romance. However, in her autobiography, she wrote that Sinatra had become angry that the story of his proposal to Bacall had reached the press (Bacall and her friend Swifty Lazar had run into the gossip columnist Louella Parsons, to whom Lazar had spilled the beans). Sinatra then "dropped the curtain," cutting Bacall off completely and going to Las Vegas.

She was later married to the actor Jason Robards from 1961 until their divorce in 1969, due to Robards' alcoholism. She is the mother of two sons, news producer, documentary film maker, and author Stephen Bogart and actor Sam Robards as well as one daughter, Leslie Bogart, who became a nurse and yoga therapist.

Bacall was known to frequently turn down scripts she didn't find interesting. This was rarely heard of for a young female film star and got her a reputation among studio executives that she was difficult to deal with.

Despite or because of her hesistance to appear in subpar projects, she continued to get favorable reviews for her leads in a string of significant films. 1950's Young Man with a Horn, co-starring Doris Day and Kirk Douglas, is often considered the first big-budget jazz film. Bacall played a two-faced femme fatale, the type of character she was known to excel in. 1953's colorful comedy How to Marry a Millionaire was a runaway hit that saw Bacall teaming up with Marilyn Monroe and Betty Grable. Written on the Wind, directed by Douglas Sirk in 1956, is now considered a classic tear-jerker.

In the 1960s, Bacall's movie career waned, and she was only seen in a handful of films. Her saving grace, however, was on Broadway. Her Broadway roles include Goodbye, Charlie in 1959, Cactus Flower in 1965, Applause in 1970 and Woman of the Year in 1981. She won a Tony Award for her performances in the musicals Applause and Woman of the Year. For her work in the Chicago theatre, she won the Sarah Siddons Award in 1972 and again in 1984.

In 1976, Bacall co-starred with John Wayne in his last picture, The Shootist. Like Bogart twenty years before, Wayne was dying of cancer, and Bacall saw the signs and the parallels. During the filming of Bacall and Wayne's previous collaboration Blood Alley (1955), Bacall had been terrified of Wayne, as she later reported in her autobiography. However, 20 years later, during the filming of The Shootist, Bacall became attracted to Wayne, albeit platonically, even though Wayne was far to the right, a staunch conservative, and Bacall was on the far left, a liberal. Although political polar opposites, there was common ground between them and a common attraction (Wayne, like Bogart, loved being out on his yacht, and had a love of the sea).

In 1980, she was living in The Dakota, a building of townhouses in New York City. She was in her bedroom on the night of 8 December. Thinking she had heard a car exhaust backfire, she looked out of the window and saw nothing. She later learned that her friend and neighbor John Lennon had been shot and killed.

She was nominated for a Best Supporting Actress Academy Award for her role in The Mirror Has Two Faces (1996), for which she had already won a Golden Globe. She received the Kennedy Center Honors in 1997. Since then, her movie career has seen a new renaissance and she has given strong performances in some important recent movie projects such as Dogville in 2003 with Nicole Kidman, Gone Dark in 2003 with Claire Forlani, and Birth in 2004, again with Kidman.

Lauren Bacall has written two autobiographies, Lauren Bacall By Myself (1978) and Now (1994). In 2005, Bacall updated and renamed her autobiography By Myself and Then Some.

In 1980 Kathryn Harrold played Bacall in the TV movie Bogie that was directed by Vincent Sherman and was based on the novel by Joe Hymans. Kevin O'Connor played Bogart, and the movie focused primarily upon the disintegration of Bogart's first marriage to Mayo Methot, played by Ann Wedgeworth, when Bogart met Bacall and began an affair with her.

In 1999, she was voted one of the 25 most significant movie stars in history by the American Film Institute. She has said that "absolutely" two of her favorite films to make were Designing Woman with Gregory Peck and The Shootist with John Wayne.

In 2004, Bacall started appearing in advertisements for the Tuesday Morning discount store franchise. She also continues to appear in film, and is one of the few major stars of her generation still active in the industry.

Actress Kathleen Turner has often been compared to Bacall. When Turner and Bacall met, Turner reportedly introduced herself to Bacall by saying "Hi, I'm the young you."

With her former husband Humphrey Bogart, Bacall has a type of vocal disorder named after her. Bogart-Bacall Syndrome (or BBS) is a form of muscle tension dysphonia most common in professional voice users (actors, singers, TV/radio presenters, etc) who habitually use a very low speaking pitch. BBS is more common among women than men and has been blamed on the social pressure that professional women feel to compete with men in the business and professional arenas.

Notes for HUGH MONROE ROCKWELL: Creator of the Rockwell Scale of Hardness

The Rockwell scale is a hardness scale based on the indentation hardness of a material. The Rockwell test determines the hardness by measuring the depth of penetration of an indenter under a large load compared to the penetration made by a preload.[1] There are different scales, which are denoted by a single letter, that use different loads or indenters. The result, which is a dimensionless number, is noted by HRX where X is the scale letter.

The differential depth hardness measurement was conceived in 1908 by a Viennese professor named Ludwig in his book Die Kegelprobe (crudely, "the cone trial").[2] The differential-depth method subtracted out the errors associated with the mechanical imperfections of the system, such as backlash and surface imperfections. The Rockwell hardness tester, a differential-depth machine, was co-invented by Connecticut natives Hugh M. Rockwell (1890-1957) and Stanley P. Rockwell (1886-1940). A patent was applied for on July 15, 1914.[3] The requirement for this tester was to quickly determine the effects of heat treatment on steel bearing races. The Brinell hardness test, invented in 1900 in Sweden, was slow, not useful on fully hardened steel, and left too large an impression to be considered nondestructive. The application was subsequently approved on Feb. 11, 1919, and holds patent number #1,294,171. At the time of invention, both Hugh and Stanley Rockwell (not direct relations) worked for the New Departure Manufacturing Co. of Bristol, CT. New Departure was a major ball bearing manufacturer, that

in 1916 became part of United Motors and shortly later, General Motors Corp. After leaving the Connecticut company, Stanley Rockwell, then in Syracuse, NY, applied for an improvement to the original invention on Sept. 11, 1919, which was approved on Nov. 18, 1924. The new tester holds patent #1,516,207.[4][5] Rockwell moved to West Hartford, CT, and made an additional improvement in 1921.[5] Stanley collaborated with instrument manufacturer Charles H. Wilson of the Wilson-Mauelen Company in 1920 to commercialize his invention and develop standardized testing machines.[6] Stanley started a heat-treating firm circa 1923, the Stanley P. Rockwell Company, which still exists in Hartford, CT. The later-named Wilson Mechanical Instrument Company has changed ownership over the years, and was most recently acquired by Instron Corp. in 1993.

### Notes for HENRY (ROBERT) MONTGOMERY:

Robert Montgomery, U.S.N.R. Commander (May 21, 1904 – September 27, 1981) was an American actor and director. Born Henry Montgomery Jr. in Beacon, New York, his early childhood was one of privilege, since his father was President of the New York Rubber Company. When his father died, the family's fortune was gone, and young Robert went to New York City to try his hand at writing and acting. Sharing a stage with George Cukor gave him an in to Hollywood, where, in 1929, he debuted in So This is College. Norma Shearer chose him to star opposite her in Private Lives in 1931, and he became a star.

In 1935, Montgomery became President of the Screen Actors Guild, and was elected again in 1946. In 1937 he was nominated for the Academy Award for Best Actor as a psychopath in the chiller Night Must Fall, and again in 1942 for Here Comes Mr. Jordan. During World War II, he joined the Navy, rising to the rank of Lieutenant Commander.

In 1945 he returned to Hollywood, making his uncredited directing debut with They Were Expendable. His first credited film as director was Lady in the Lake (1947), in which he also starred, and which brought him mixed reviews. He was a friendly witness before the House Un-American Activities Committee in 1947. He hosted a popular television series, Robert Montgomery Presents, in the 1950s.

He died of cancer at the age of 77 in New York City. His daughter was actress Elizabeth Montgomery, who also died from cancer in 1995 at the age of 62.

Montgomery has two stars on the Hollywood Walk of Fame, one for movies at 6440 Hollywood Blvd., and one for television at 1631 Vine Street. He was a longtime summer resident of North Haven, Maine.

Elizabeth Victoria Montgomery (April 15, 1933 – May 18, 1995) was an American movie and television actress. She was the daughter of actor Robert Montgomery and his wife, Elizabeth Bryan Allen.

She is best remembered for her leading role as the witch Samantha in the ABC situation comedy Bewitched. This show was a huge success during its eight-year run from 1964 to 1972 and remains popular through syndication and the 2005 movie remake starring Will Ferrell and Nicole Kidman. Montgomery received five Emmy Award and four Golden Globe nominations for her role as Samantha.

Montgomery made her television debut in her father's series Robert Montgomery Presents, and her film debut in 1955 in The Court Martial of Billy Mitchell. Her early career then languished, consisting of supporting roles and appearances in television series.

Montgomery refused to do Samantha's famous nose twitch for fans after Bewitched went off the air, and was reluctant to discuss this role. She spent the remainder of her career pursuing dramatic roles that took her as far away from the good-natured Samantha typecasting as possible. She received Emmy Award nominations for playing a rape victim in A Case of Rape (1974), for her portrayal of the notorious Lizzie Borden in The Legend of Lizzie Borden (1975), and for her role as a strong woman facing hardship in 1820's Ohio in the mini-series The Awakening Land (1978). She also made a chilling villain in the 1985 picture Amos, playing a nurse in a state home who terrorized residents Kirk Douglas and Dorothy McGuire. Her final acting role was the Barmaid in an episode of Batman: The Animated Series entitled "Showdown".

She was married to actor Gig Young from 1956 to 1963; to Bewitched producer William Asher from 1963 to 1973; and to actor Robert Foxworth, with whom she lived for 20 years, from 1993 until her death.

With Asher she had three children. She also had an older sister, Martha Bryan Montgomery, who died before Elizabeth was born, and a brother, Robert Montgomery Jr., who was born in 1936.

Montgomery died in 1995 at the age of 62, from colorectal cancer, eight weeks after being diagnosed with that disease, and her body was cremated. At the time of her death, the media widely reported that she had ignored the symptoms of her illness until it was too late, as she was caring for Foxworth, who had had hip replacement surgery. Unwilling to die in a hospital and with no hope of recovery, she elected to return to the Beverly Hills home she shared with Foxworth, and died there with him and her children by her side.

Notes for WILLIAM ASHER: William Asher (born 8 August 1921) is an American producer, director and writer.

Born in New York City, his mother was actress Lillian Bonner and his father was producer E.M. Asher (who produced films for Mack Sennett).

His more famous works includes directing episodes of The Colgate Comedy Hour (1950), I Love Lucy (1951), Our Miss Brooks (1952), General Electric Theater (1953), Make Room for Daddy (1953), December Bride (1954), The Dinah Shore Chevy Show (1956), The Twilight Zone (1959), The Patty Duke Show (1963), Gidget (1965), The Dukes of Hazzard (1979) and Private Benjamin (1981).

In addition to the popular I Love Lucy show, Asher produced and directed Bewitched, which ran for eight years (1964 to 1972) and still runs in syndication today. He married the show's star, Elizabeth Montgomery in 1963 (and they divorced in 1973 after having 3 children together).

His films include writing and directing the popular beach movies starring Annette Funicello and Frankie Avalon -Muscle Beach Party (1964), Bikini Beach (1964), and Beach Blanket Bingo (1965).

His family continues on in show business. His son, John Mallory Asher (married to Jenny McCarthy) starred in Weird Science (as Gary) and then directed Hilary Swank in Kounterfeit. He continued his directorial endeavors with Diamonds, starring Kirk Douglas, Dan Aykroyd, Lauren Bacall and Jenny McCarthy.

### Notes for ROBERT FOXWORTH:

Robert Foxworth (born November 1, 1941) is a well-known American film and television actor. He was born in Houston, Texas. He attended Lamar High School.

Among his numerous movie and TV roles, Robert Foxworth is best known for his stints on Falcon Crest (he played Chase Gioberti from 1981-1987) and Six Feet Under (he played Bernard Chenowith from 2001-2003).

He guest starred in Star Trek: Deep Space Nine, Star Trek: Enterprise and Babylon 5.

He was the longtime love interest of Bewitched star Elizabeth Montgomery. They married in a quiet ceremony just two years before she died of colorectal cancer.

Notes for BYRON ELSWORTH 'GIG YOUNG' BARR: Gig Young (November 4, 1913 – October 19, 1978) was an American film actor. Born Byron Elsworth Barr in St. Cloud, Minnesota, Young began acting in his teens under his given name, but later changed it to avoid confusion with another actor of the same name. The name "Gig Young" was taken from a character he played in one of his earliest films, The Gay Sisters (1942).

Signed to a contract with Warner Brothers, Young appeared in supporting roles in numerous films during the 1940s, and came to be regarded as a popular and likeable second lead, playing the brothers or friends of the principal characters. During WWII, Young took a hiatus from his movie career and served admirably in the United States Coast Guard, alongside fellow Hollywood actors: Cesar Romero and Richard Cromwell.

In the early 1950s Young began to play the type of role that he would become best known for, a sardonic but engaging and affable drunk. His dramatic work as an alcoholic in Come Fill the Cup (1951), and his comedic role as a tipsy but ultimately charming cad in Teacher's Pet (1958), each earned him nominations for an Academy Award for Best Supporting Actor. He won the Academy Award for his role as Rocky, the sleazy dance marathon emcee and promoter in They Shoot Horses, Don't They? (1969).

Young married his third wife, actress Elizabeth Montgomery, 20 years his junior, in 1956. They divorced in 1963 amid rumors of domestic violence. Hiscirculated that his on-screen drinking had carried over into his off-screen life, .

In 1978 he married his fifth wife, a 31 year-old German art gallery employee named Kim Schmidt. Three weeks after their marriage they were both found dead at home with gunshot wounds to the head. Police theorize that Young first shot his wife and then turned the gun on himself in a suicide pact. Though the case attracted considerable media attention and speculation, Young's motivation for the murder/suicide remains ?, as he left no suicide note, and his associates could provide no explanation for his action.

Gig Young has a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame for his contribution to motion pictures, at 6841 Hollywood Boulevard.

John Julius Cooper, 2nd Viscount Norwich CVO (born 15 September 1929) is an English historian, travel writer and television personality known as John Julius Norwich.

Norwich is the only child of the Conservative politician and diplomat Duff Cooper, a British ambassador to France who in 1952 was created Viscount Norwich, and of Lady Diana Cooper, a celebrated beauty and society figure. He was educated at Upper Canada College, Toronto, at Eton College, and at the University of Strasbourg. He served in the Royal Navy before taking a degree in French and Russian at New College, Oxford. He then joined the British Foreign Service, serving in Yugoslavia and Lebanon, and as a member of British delegation to the Disarmament Conference in Geneva.

In 1964 Norwich left government service to become a writer. His best-known works include two books on Norman Sicily, The Normans in the South and The Kingdom in the Sun (later republished in one volume as The Normans in Sicily); Mount Athos (with Reresby Sitwell); Sahara; A History of Venice; The Architecture of Southern England; Fifty Years of Glyndebourne; and A Taste for Travel.

Norwich's recent works include Byzantium: The Early Centuries, Byzantium: The Apogee and Byzantium: The Decline and Fall; A Short History of Byzantium; a work of humor, The Twelve Days of Christmas; and Shakespeare's Kings; and Venice: A Traveller's Companion. He has also served as editor of series such as Great Architecture of the World, The Italian World, The New Shell Guides to Great Britain, The Oxford Illustrated Encyclopaedia of Art and the Duff Cooper Diaries.

Norwich has worked extensively in radio and television. He was host of the popular BBC radio panel game My Word! for four years. He has written and presented some 30 television documentaries, including The Fall of Constantinople, Napoleon's Hundred Days, Cortés and Montezuma, The Antiquities of Turkey, The Gates of Asia, Maximilian of Mexico, Toussaint l'Ouverture of Haiti, The Knights of Malta and The Death of the Prince Imperial in the Zulu War.

Norwich has also worked for various charitable projects. He is Chairman of the Venice in Peril Fund, Co-Chairman of the World Monuments Fund, and a Vice-President of the National Association of Decorative and Fine Art Societies. For many years he was a member of the Executive Committee of the National Trust, and also served on the Board of the English National Opera.

Norwich married, as his first wife, Anne Frances May Clifford, daughter of the Hon. Sir Bede Edmund Hugh Clifford; they had one daughter, Artemis Cooper, a historian, and a son, Jason Charles Duff Bede Cooper. After their divorce, Lord Norwich married, as his second wife, the Hon. Mary (Makins) Philipps, daughter of the 1st Baron Sherfield, GCB, GCMG.

Norwich also is the father of Allegra Huston, offspring of his affair with Enrica Soma Huston, the estranged wife of the American film director John Huston.

Notes for THOMAS MORGAN WOODWARD: Morgan Woodward (born 16 September 1925 in Fort Worth, Texas) is an American actor.

He is probably best known for his recurring role in Dallas as "Punk" Anderson (an episode unveils his real name; Marvin Anderson), and also as the silent, sunglasses-wearing Boss Godfrey (the 'Man with no eyes') in Cool Hand Luke, the 1967 film starring Paul Newman. He holds the record for Most Guest Appearances on the long-running, western TV series, Gunsmoke, with 19.

#### [edit] Star Trek

Woodward is notable for having starred in two different episodes of the original series of Star Trek as two different characters. In the first-season episode "Dagger of the Mind" Woodward plays Dr. Simon Van Gelder, an attending physician at a hospital for the criminally insane. After discovering that the director of the facility is engaged in illegal brain experimentation, Van Gelder himself becomes a victim of these experiments and is confined as one of the patients. Escaping the facility to the orbiting USS Enterprise the deranged and incoherent (due to his brain damage) Van Gelder eventually recovers enough to be able to divulge the nefarious goings-on at the hospital. (This is with the aid of Mr. Spock's "mind meld", which is revealed for the first time in this episode.)

In the second-season episode, "The Omega Glory", Woodward portrays Captain Ron Tracey, the commander of the starship USS Exeter, a sister ship to the USS Enterprise. Convinced that he is permanently marooned on an unfamiliar planet, Tracey chooses to abandon his duty as a Star Fleet officer, and in essence he "goes native," allying himself with some of the planet's natural inhabitants in their war against their competitors. Discovered by Captain Kirk, Tracey is eventually defeated and taken into custody for his violation of fundamental orders: "The Prime Directive".

#### [edit] The Life and Legend of Wyatt Earp

One of Woodward's longest TV roles was as the deputy/sidekick "Shotgun" Gibbs in 1955-1961 TV series The Life and Legend of Wyatt Earp starring Hugh O'Brian. On that series, Woodward played a tall, cantankerous, shotgun-toting backwoodsman who eventually became the trusted deputy of lawman Wyatt Earp in his days as a Kansas lawman. Though often overshadowed by the cool menace of Douglas Fowley's Doc Holliday, Woodward portrayed Gibbs as a solid, trustworthy, and more pragmatic partner to Earp, making Gibbs a character who, though ostensibly rough around the edges, would gradually come to share many of the qualities demonstrated over the years by another trusted TV deputy, Ken Curtis' world-weary Festus Haggen on Gunsmoke.

#### [edit] Additional Information

Woodward is a graduate of the University of Texas at Arlington. Along with two of his four brothers, he has received recognition as a Distinguished Alumni of the University. He is also a member of the Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity.

His brother, Lee Woodward, was the weatherman with a lion puppet named "King Lionel" on the television station KOTV in Tulsa, Oklahoma.

Charles Ronald McKenzie, for theft, was ordered to come up for sentence if called upon. Charles Ronald McKenzie, an exsoldier, thrice wounded in France, who had lost a leg below the knee and whose record was unblemished, admitted theft of property'from the Mental Hospitals Department and voluntarily disclosed other thefts of property valued in all at £9 10s. He was married with three children. The Hon. W. Perry, M.L.C., who appeared for McKenzie, stated that after the war McKenzie became a farmer at Eketahuria "and, carried on for four years, but the stump of his leg caused him great suffering and five operations were necessary. He obtained a position with the Mental Hospital Department and carried out his duties with great efficiency. He had lost his position and unless he obtained employment he might lose the house which he recently had purchased. The Chief Justice: Has he definitely lost his employment? - Mr. Perry said he had resigned, but efforts would be made to 'obtain some employment for him. The Chief Justice said the man's employers, could not be blamed. The punishment had, been great already and the man's remorse was even greater, said counsel, who submitted that probation was not necessary in the case of that prisoner. The Chief Justice: Why not proba". This is not the type of man who needs probation," said counsel. Probation meant surveillance and control by a probation officer. , ... "It is very sad to see occupying the position you occupy a man who has always, until the, commission of these offences, had an excellent character, who has performed-igood. service for his country during the war, and who has suffered permanent injury in consequence of that war service, said the Chief Justice. "It is quite true there was more than one case charged against you, but the offences: were comj nutted some time ago. I think I am justified in extending to you the benefits of the Offenders Probation Act...., Mr P S. K. Macassey, Crown Prosecutor, said the stolen articles had been recovered. .., . . "That simplifies the matter, -saieUiis Honour, thanking Mr. Macassey. 'That being so, I will adopt the course Mr. Perry suggested.", Prisoner was ordered to come up for sentence if called upon within twelve months, and to pay £4.13s 9d costs of the prosecution. "I am, not giving any warning to the prisoner because I don't think it necessary." added his Honour.

Diana herself was more tolerant while still remaining close and loyal to her real mother. The divorce became absolute in 1969 after being separated since 1967.

Michael d'Abo (born 1 March 1944 in Betchworth, Surrey) is an English singer and songwriter, best known as the former lead vocalist of Manfred Mann.

D'Abo began his musical career while still at Harrow School, and in 1966 he joined Manfred Mann, already a charttopping group, as replacement for Paul Jones, who was leaving to go solo.

D'Abo had already had minor success with a group, A Band of Angels, formed while at Harrow. The group also had their own comic strip in a UK pop music weekly called "Fab 208". He composed a hit single, the haunting generational tale "Handbags and Gladrags", for Chris Farlowe (which was also notably recorded by Rod Stewart and Stereophonics and subsequently became the theme tune to the BBC television show The Office). With d'Abo fronting, Manfred Mann enjoyed numerous hits, including "Ragamuffin Man", "Ha Ha Said the Clown", "My Name Is Jack". and the number one hit, "Mighty Quinn".

After the group disbanded in 1969, d'Abo played the part of Herod on the original recording of "Jesus Christ Superstar". He also played a cameo role on the original recording of Evita and co-wrote the song "Build Me Up, Buttercup", made famous by the group The Foundations.

Recently, d'Abo has participated in The Manfreds, a group of original Manfred Mann members other than Mann himself, and played occasional live dates with his part-time group The Mighty Quintet. In addition he had a brief spell during the year 2000 advising and working with Stars in Their Eyes champion, Ian Moor. D'Abo was musical director during the filming of Moor's live concert video entitled "Naturally", at the Hull New Theatre, and also played keyboards for the concert.

D'Abo is the father of actress Olivia d'Abo and the first cousin of actress Maryam d'Abo.

# Notes for CHARLES GEORGE LYTTELTON:

Charles George Lyttelton, 8th Viscount Cobham (27 October 1842 – 9 June 1922), known as Lord Lyttelton from 1876 to 1889, was a British peer and Liberal Member of Parliament.

Cobham was the eldest son of George William Lyttelton, 4th Baron Lyttelton, and Mary Glynne. Alfred Lyttelton was his younger brother. He was elected to the House of Commons for East Worcestershire in 1868, a seat he held until 1874. Apart from his parliamentary career he also served as High Sheriff of Bewdley. Cobham succeeded his father as fifth Baron Lyttelton In 1876. In 1889 he also succeeded his distant relative Richard Temple-Nugent-Brydges-Chandos-Grenville, 3rd Duke of Buckingham and Chandos, as eighth Baron and Viscount Cobham.

Lord Cobham married the Hon. Mary Susan Caroline Cavendish, daughter of William George Cavendish, 2nd Baron Chesham, in 1878. He died in June 1922, aged 79, and was succeeded in his titles by his eldest son John. Lady Cobham died in 1937.

He came from a notable cricketing family, his father (GW Lyttelton), five brothers (GWS Lyttelton, AT Lyttelton, RH Lyttelton, E Lyttelton, Hon. A Lyttelton), his sons (JC Lyttelton, CF Lyttelton) and his grandson (CJ Lyttelton) all playing first-class cricket, and in the case of the Hon. A Lyttelton Test cricket. He himself played 35 first-class matches between 1861 and 1867, mainly for Cambridge University. A right-handed batsman and wicketkeeper, he scored 1439 runs at an average of 27.15, including 2 centuries. He was President of Marylebone Cricket Club in 1886.

Lawrence Dundas, 1st Marquess of Zetland, KT (16 August 1844 – 11 March 1929) was a British Conservative politician and statesman. He was born in London and educated at Harrow and Trinity College, Cambridge, being commissioned as a Cornet in the Royal Horse Guards in 1866. By 1869 a Lieutenant, Dundas retired from the British Army in 1872 and was elected Member of Parliament for Richmond, North Yorkshire that same year. However, he sat in the House of Commons for less than a year before succeeding his uncle as third Earl of Zetland.

A Lord in Waiting from May to September 1880, Lord Zetland subsequently moved from supporting the Liberals to joining the Conservative Party in 1884. In 1889 he was sent to Ireland as Lord Lieutenant, a post in which he proved both successful and popular, and remained there until the Liberals returned to power in 1892. On Lord Salisbury's recommendation, he was that same year created Marquess of Zetland and Earl of Ronaldshay.

In the 1890s Lord Zetland became more involved in local politics, becoming an alderman on the North Riding of Yorkshire County Council in 1894 and being elected Mayor of Richmond in 1895 and 1896. In 1900 he was made a Knight of the Thistle.

Like his uncle and grandfather a freemason, Zetland was the society's provinicial Grand Master in the North and East Riding of Yorkshire from 1874 to 1923. He was also an enthusiastic sportsman, and was Master of the Zetland Hunt for thirty-five years. He died aged 84 at Aske Hall, Yorkshire, and was buried there.

Notes for ARCHIBALD DAVID STIRLING: Colonel Sir Archibald David Stirling DSO OBE[1] (15 November, 1915 - 4 November, 1990) was a Scottish laird, mountaineer, World War II British Army officer, and the founder of the Special Air Service.

Life before the war

1347.

Stirling was born at his family's ancestral home, Keir House in the parish of Lecropt in Perthshire (near Stirling). He was the son of Brigadier General Archibald Stirling of Keir and Margaret Fraser, daughter of Simon Fraser, the Lord Lovat (a descendant from King Charles II of Great Britain). His cousin was Simon Fraser, 15th Lord Lovat. He was educated at Ampleforth College and Trinity College, Cambridge. A tall and athletic figure (he was 6 feet 6 inches (1.98 m)] tall), he was training to climb Mount Everest when World War II broke out.

[edit] World War II and the founding of the SAS

Stirling was commissioned into the Scots Guards from Ampleforth College Contingent Officer Training Corps on 24 July 1937.[2] In June 1940 he volunteered for the new No. 8 Commando under Lieutenant-Colonel Robert Laycock which became part of Force Z (later named "Layforce"). After Layforce (and No.8 Commando) were disbanded on 1 August 1941, Stirling remained convinced that due to the mechanised nature of war a small team of highly trained soldiers with the advantage of surprise could exact greater damage to the enemy's ability to fight than an entire platoon.

Aware that taking his idea up through the chain of command was unlikely to work, Stirling decided to go straight to the top. On crutches following a parachuting accident he sneaked into Middle East headquarters in Cairo in an effort to see Commander-in-Chief General Claude Auchinleck.[3] Taking cover in an office, Stirling came face to face with Deputy Commander Middle East General Ritchie. Stirling explained his plan to Ritchie and Ritchie convinced Auchinleck to allow Stirling to form a new Special Forces unit. The unit was given the deliberately misleadingly name "L Detachment, Special Air Service Brigade" to reinforce an existing deception of a parachute brigade existing in North Africa.

His initial attempt at attacking by parachute landing was disastrous and resulted in a high percentage of his men being killed or wounded. Escaping only with the help of the Long Range Desert Group (LRDG) he decided that approaching by desert under the cover of night would not only be the safest but also the most effective means of approach. As quickly as possible he organised raids on ports using this simple method, often driving through checkposts at night using the language skills of some of his soldiers to bluff the guards. Stirling was captured by the Germans in January 1943. He escaped on four occasions, before being sent to Colditz Castle, where he remained for the rest of the war. After his capture his brother Bill Stirling and Blair 'Paddy' Mayne took command of the SAS.

In the fifteen months before Stirling's capture, the SAS had destroyed over 250 aircraft on the ground, dozens of supply dumps, roads, wrecked railway communications, and had put hundreds of enemy vehicles out of action.

#### [edit] Mercenary work

Worried that Britain was losing its power after the War, Stirling organised deals to sell British weapons and military personnel to other countries, like Saudi Arabia, for various privatised foreign policy operations.[4] Stirling along with other associates formed Watchguard International Ltd, formally with offices in Sloane Street (where the Chelsea Hotel now stands) before moving to South Audley Street in Mayfair. Business was chiefly with the Gulf States. He was also linked along with an associate Denys Rowley in a failed attempt to overthrow Gaddafi of Libya in 1970/71. Stirling was the founder of private military company KAS International (aka KAS Enterprises).[5]

#### [edit] Television

Stirling also ran another of his companies, Television International Enterprises, from the same offices as Watchguard International. T.I.E was responsible for bringing the children's program Sesame Street to Britain. Peter Orton, working at T.I.E., developed the Muppet Show and a couple of decades later Thomas the Tank Engine and Bob the Builder.

#### [edit] Later life

Stirling was the founder of the Capricorn Africa Society - a society for promoting an Africa free from racial discrimination. Founded in 1949, while Africa was still under colonial rule, it had its high point at the 1956 Salima Conference. However, because of his emphasis on a qualified and highly elitist voting franchise, Africans opposed it. Conversely Caucasian settlers believed it to be too liberal. Consequently the society was ineffective, although surprisingly the South African Communist Party used Stirling's multi-racial elitist model for its 1955 "Congress Alliance" when taking over the African National Congress of South Africa.[6] Stirling resigned as Chairman of the Society in 1959.

Stirling was concerned about the political power of trade unions in Britain, establishing in 1975 the organisation GB75, which he described as "an organisation of apprehensive patriots" which would help the country in the event of strikes.[7]

He was knighted in 1990, and died later that year aged 74.

In 2002 the SAS memorial, a statue of Stirling standing on a rock, was opened on the Hill of Row near his family's estate at Park of Keir.

The current Laird of the Keir estate is his nephew Archie Stirling, a millionaire businessman and former Scots Guards officer.

[edit] Other

Stirling House at Welbeck college is named after him, as well as the former headquarters at Hereford.

Notes for VINCENT DAMON (ALICE COOPER) FURNIER:

Alice Cooper (born Vincent Damon Furnier, February 4, 1948), is a rock singer and musician. Alice Cooper was originally just the name of Furnier's band. Furnier officially changed his own name to Alice Cooper for a successful solo career.

Furnier was born in Detroit, but moved to Phoenix, Arizona in his youth. His grandfather, Thurman Furnier, was an ordained Apostle of the Church of Jesus Christ (Bickertonite). Cooper's father, Ether Furnier, was an ordained Elder. Cooper had some distant French Huguenot ancestry; the remainder of his ancestry was English.

Cooper, influenced by British Bands such as The Beatles, The Rolling Stones, The Who, The Kinks and in particular The Yardbirds, formed a number of rock bands in the 1960s, including the Earwigs, The Spiders, and The Nazz. Furnier, upon learning that Todd Rundgren also had a band called the Nazz, changed the band's name to Alice Cooper (the name Alice Cooper is said to have been agreed upon after one of Furnier's Ouija sessions, and learning that he was a reincarnation of a 17th century "witch" of the same name, according to band legend, although Cooper in interviews has said the name actually came out of thin air conjuring an image of "a cute little girl with an axe behind her back"). The classic Alice Cooper group line up consisted of guitarists Michael Bruce and Glen Buxton, bassist Dennis Dunaway, and drummer Neal Smith. After moving to California in 1968, the band enlisted Shep Gordon and Joe Greenberg as their managers, and the band was soon signed to Frank Zappa's label, Straight Records - releasing two competent but outlandish albums, Pretties For You and Easy Action, to a frosty public and critical reception.

Although the band incorporated theatrics in their stage act from the outset, a chance case of press misreporting an unfortunate, unrehearsed stage routine involving Alice and a live chicken led to the band changing tack - capitalizing on tabloid sensationalism and creating a new sub-genre, shock rock.

In 1970, the band teamed up with fledgling producer Bob Ezrin on their album entitled Love It to Death. This was the first of more than 10 Alice Cooper group and solo albums done with Ezrin who is credited with having helped to create their definitive sound. A hit single soon followed in 1971's 'I'm Eighteen'. The band's trailblazing mix of shock and glam theatrics stood out amongst bearded, denim-clad hippy bands by sporting sequined costumes by the prominent rock fashion designer Cindy Dunaway (Pink Floyd, The Who) and stage shows that involved Gothic torture modes imposed on the lead singer. The follow up Killer included further singles in 'Under My Wheels' and 'Be My Lover' and also one of the most critically acclaimed Cooper songs in the epic 'Halo Of Flies', which was a Top 10 hit in Holland. In the summer of 1972, Alice Cooper served up School's Out to their hungry audience. The album reached number two on the charts and sold over a million copies. The title song went Top 10 in the US and was a number one single in the UK.

Billion Dollar Babies, released in 1973, was the band's most commercially successful album, reaching no. 1 in both the US and Britain. 'Elected' a 1972 top 10 UK hit included on the album (featuring one of the first creative promo films 3 years before Queen's promo video to 'Bohemian Rhapsody'), was followed by 2 more UK top 10 singles in 'Hello Hooray' and 'No More Mister Nice Guy' which was the last UK single from the album and also reached number 25 in the U.S. The title track was also a US hit single. With a string of successful concept albums in the bag and several hit singles, the band toured the world - attempts to ban their shocking act by politicians and pressure groups only serving to fuel the myth of Alice Cooper and generate more audience interest. The 1973 US Tour broke box office records set by The Rolling Stones.

A film 'Good To See You Again Alice' (recently re-released on DVD) was released and saw the band as the biggest act in the world at that time. Muscle of Love the last album from the classic line up marked Alice Cooper's last UK top 20 single in the 1970's, with 'Teenage Lament 74'. Even a James Bond theme song was recorded for 'The Man With The Golden Gun', but a different song of the same name by LuLu, was chosen instead.

In 1974, the band split - Cooper himself wanting to retain the theatrics that had brought them so much attention, the rest of the group wanting to concentrate on the music which had given them credibility.

His first solo album was Welcome to My Nightmare. He was backed by Lou Reed's band, guitarist Dick Wagner, guitarist Steve Hunter, bassist Prakash John, keyboardist Joseph Chrowski, and drummer Penti Glan. The album was another top 10 hit for Cooper and is regarded along with the stage show as ground breaking moments in rock history. In addition the 1975 US TV special 'The Nightmare' was the first video album and as with the album featured horror movie film star Vincent Price, several years before he guested on Michael Jackson's Thriller.

Following two less acclaimed studio albums Alice Cooper Goes To Hell and Lace And Whiskey along with the 1977 live album The Alice Cooper Show (recorded in Las Vegas) it was clear that Alice Cooper lacked some of the cutting edge of the creative 1971-1975 period, and in 1977 Cooper was hospitalized in a New York sanitarium for alcoholism. This may be responsible for a surprise return to form on the hard-rocking, semi-autobiographical album From The Inside. Around this time Cooper led celebrities in raising money to remodel the famous Hollywood Sign in California. Cooper himself chipped in over \$27,000 for the project, doing it in memory of friend and comedian Groucho Marx.

His albums from the beginning of 1980s, Flush the Fashion, Special Forces, Zipper Catches Skin, and DaDa, were not commercially successful, especially in comparison to previous sales. They were regarded as very strange and bizarre at that time, and are now considered cult classics. Flush the Fashion has a spare, edgy musical sound that was so unexpected as to have been truly baffling to long-time fans. The songs are typically clever, however, and hold up very well. Special Forces was a bit darker and more cynical, but continued with the experimental sound. However even DaDa the best of the alternative albums had only mildly positive commercial and critical response. DaDa was again produced by Bob Ezrin, who used one of the first sequencers (the famous Fairlight) instead of real drums. Cooper then released Constrictor (1986), a heavier album, which had more, but still very limited, success, followed by Raise Your Fist and Yell (1987) which had a rougher sound than its predecessor and better songs. Both Constrictor and Raise Your Fist and Yell were recorded with guitarist Kane Roberts & bassist Kip Winger, both of whom would leave the band by the end of 1988 (although Kane Roberts played guitar on 'Bed Of Nails' on the 1989 Trash album). Kane Roberts would go on as a solo artist, while Kip formed Winger. Roberts' stage attire was unusual since he was basically a Rambo-clone - muscular body, scanty clothing and a guitar that resembled a machine gun.

In 1987, he made a brief appearance in the movie Prince of Darkness directed by John Carpenter. His role had no lines, and consisted of menacing the protagonists with a bicycle frame.

In 1989, his career experienced a real revival with the Desmond Child produced album Trash, which spawned the hit single 'Poison', reaching # 2 in the UK, and a worldwide arena tour.

It was during this time in the 1980s he became a Born-again Christian and became sober. [1]

In 1991, Hey Stoopid was released. It was hailed as one of Cooper's best albums since the 1970's, and the title track became an anti-drug anthem. He also appeared on the Guns N' Roses album Use Your Illusion I, singing backup on the track "The Garden". In 1992, he made a famous cameo in the movie Wayne's World, in which he discusses the history of Milwaukee in some depth. In 1994 he released The Last Temptation, which contains deeper theological thoughts. In 1997 he recorded the intro narration for the Insane Clown Posse album The Great Milenko. He also made a brief appearance as the abusive father of Freddy Krueger in the 1991 Nightmare On Elmstreet film Freddy's Dead: The Final Nightmare.

A pause, lasting for six years, ended in 2000 with Brutal Planet. Brutal Planet is musically strong, dark and loud, with subject matter thematically inspired by the brutality of the modern world, although set in a post-apocalyptic future. It was succeeded by Dragontown in 2001, which has been described by Cooper as being "the worst town on Brutal Planet". These two albums are the first parts of a trilogy that was apparently put on hold with the release of The Eyes of Alice Cooper (2003) People frequently mistake "The Last Temptation of Alice" for the first installment. Will we ever see the third part of the trilogy? Alice's latest album, Dirty Diamonds, seems to be in a similar vein as "The Eyes of...". Also in 2001, Cooper made a brief appearance in the movie 'Attic Expeditions' as the unstable Samuel Leventhal.

In 2003, Cooper again adopted a leaner, cleaner sound for The Eyes Of Alice Cooper. Recognizing that many current bands were having great success with his former sounds and styles, Cooper worked with a somewhat younger group of road and studio musicians who were very familiar with his oeuvre. However, instead of rehashing the old sounds, they updated them, often with surprisingly effective results. The resulting Bare Bones tour adopted a less-orchestrated performance style that had fewer theatrical flourishes and a greater emphasis on musicality. The success of this tour help support the growing recognition that the classic Cooper songs were exceptionally clever, tuneful, and unique.

Cooper received a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame in 2003. It is located at the corner of Orange Drive and Hollywood Boulevard.

In 2005, Cooper released his 24th studio album Dirty Diamonds; his first release on New West Records (for America.) Dirty Diamonds was released on August 2, 2005 in the US and July 4, 2005 in Europe. It is a continuation of the songwriting approach the band used on The Eyes of Alice Cooper. Dirty Diamonds is Cooper's highest charting album since 1994's, The Last Temptation coming in at #169 on The Billboard 200. [2] The Dirty Diamonds tour launched in America in August 2005.

Cooper owns a rock and roll club and restaurant called Cooperstown in Phoenix and Cleveland. He is an avid golfer (handicap 5) and a member of Phoenix Country Club. He also has a popular syndicated radio show called "Nights With Alice Cooper" where classic rock and roll songs are showcased.

Calico Cooper (born 20 May 1981) is an American actress and the daughter of heavy metal musician Alice Cooper. Her mother, Sheryl Cooper, was the original "Cold Ethyl" dancer on the Welcome to My Nightmare tour. Since coming of age at 16, Calico has traveled on tour with her father and has performed an assortment of characters in his live act including Cold Ethyl, the Death Dealer, the Bride from Kill Bill, Britney Spears, and Paris Hilton. Her first acting role was in an Alice Cooper video Alice Cooper: Brutally Live in 2000, since then she has appeared in a few independent films, including the horror film The Curse of El Charro, Rolling and Scarlet Fry's Junkfood Horrorfest.

It was announced in 2005 that she would be appearing in The Visitor, a ghost film, as well as Halloween in 2007.

## Notes for CLYDE WILLIAM TOMBAUGH:

Astronomer Clyde Tombaugh, discoverer of Pluto, died on January 17th. Inspiring many during his long and exceptional career, he had been living in Las Cruces, New Mexico with his wife of 60 years, Patsy. Today would have been his 91st birthday. He is pictured above in 1995 in his backyard with a telescope he knew well - a 9 inch Newtonian reflector he built in 1927 with discarded farm machinery and car parts. Using this telescope under the dark night skies of Western Kansas, he made drawings of Mars and Jupiter and submitted them to Lowell Observatory in 1928. Hired to work at Lowell in 1929, Tombaugh embarked on a systematic photographic search for the long sought Planet X with a newly constructed 13 inch astrograph. In 1930 Tombaugh triumphed in his struggle to find the 9th planet, discovering faint and distant Pluto orbiting at the edge of our Solar System. Founding father of New Mexico State University's Astronomy Department, he retired as professor emeritus in 1973 but continued to tour as a lecturer and promoter until failing health prevented it. Always an active stargazer, he was asked by the Smithsonian if they could have the telescope he used to make his 1928 drawings. His response: "I told them I was still using it."

He made the discovery at Lowell Observatory in Flagstaff, Arizona during a systematic search for a trans-Neptunian planet (also called Planet X), which had been predicted by Percival Lowell and William Pickering. Pluto is named after the Roman god of the underworld, who was able to render himself invisible, and in honor of Lowell.

Tombaugh's discovery involved painstaking use of a blink comparator - a device which allows someone to compare two similar photographs by placing them in the viewer's field of vision, and then letting the user switch back and forth - blink - between the two. Tombaugh used the blink comparator to compare photographs of sections of sky taken months apart. A moving object, such as a planet, would appear to jump from one position to another while the more distant objects, such as stars, would appear stationary. Tombaugh noticed such a moving object in his search, and subsequent observations showed it to be the planet we call Pluto. The discovery was made on February 18, 1930, using images taken in January of the same year.

Tombaugh was born in Streator, Illinois. After his family moved to Burdett, Kansas, Tombaugh built his first telescope and sent drawings of his observations of Jupiter and Mars to the Lowell Observatory. These resulted in a job offer. Tombaugh was employed at the Lowell Observatory from 1929 to 1945. Following his discovery of Pluto, Tombaugh earned astronomy degrees from the University of Kansas and Northern Arizona University. He taught astronomy at New Mexico State University from 1955 until his retirement.

# James Montford Christian (Monty) What were you to me?

You were a Battler first in WW2, then breaking in a new farm and later battling against against ill health in the many trips to hospital to try and fix your failing plumbing system. In 1975 you were one of the first patients to go through a CABG (coronary artery bypass graft) and maybe even the first where the Heart Surgeon used the mammary artery to by-pass the blocked coronary artery. You beat the odds Dad as you survived another 23 years when we thought at that time ten years would be the best they could offer. You were a great and patient teacher. A man of great wisdom and knowledge. A man who worked hard and played hard, who filled each day to the max, who planned and actioned. A Farmer, a ham radio operator, a sailor, a fisherman, a follower of Nostradamus and most of all a man who earned respect. Memories of Dad Milking the cows would bring out our competitive side as we worked against the clock to see how fast we could get through our herd of 70. There was no time for sitting at a desk to study in those days. You could probably still see my study notes scribbled on the cowshed walls. Holidays were a special family time and a caravan or batch holiday was something you had to earn. Ways to earn the holiday would be sanding the launch, shelling peas or growing the best vegetable patch. Dad mentioned to Mum that Carole has a very big stride for a girl. We really should talk to her about this. Dad my stride was big as I was always trying to keep up with you, working beside you, proving I was good enough. My memories include pressing tedding and carting hay at the age of 14. As I drove the tractor round and round the paddocks I used to add up the 50 cents an hour I would be rewarded with at the end of each hour. Working in the wool shed, cutting thistles were just some of the other farm jobs you taught me to do. You would teach me in such a way that it would seem like a challenge not work.Duckshooting as well as plucking and scooping out the insides was fun as you felt the warmth of the inids against your cold hands. How many can we get done in an hour. Again working against the clock. I was one of the first twelve year olds to own and master water skis. Dad spent many hours stopping and starting our new launch to get me up on these new skis. Roller skating, skiing, sailing, and running, were some of the sports that Dad encouraged me with. Dad was at the end to cheer his daughter on at the Honolulu marathon which was quite a feat for him as I took nearly 6 hours on very little training. In my younger days I remember Dad telling me to stick out my chest if I wanted to win the race.. When I look at his old photos he is shown winning the race in a close finish by throwing himself at the tape. Dad you taught me to enjoy many sports, to aim high and to be fiercely independent. I know you were a very proud Dad when you brought me home a tiny bundle of not quite 6 lbs. You said you were proud of us all before our final farewells. Thanks for always being there for me. In recent years during your many trips to hospital I hope I have been there for you. You would never ask this of me but Dad it was so little I have returned after you have given so much. Thanks Dad I will have many fond memories of you and I can't help but recognize some of your personality traits in me. You and Mum have done everything together throughout your life. I want to recall one story I have heard so often of your newly married life together.Mum had just made a rainbow blancmange and proudly showed this to Dad. Dad promptly said "Have you been sick" Mum's reaction was to throw the blancmange out the window over her bike. Mum you wouldn't leave Dad's side over his recent years of illness. You were there when he took sick on Friday night. You were a wonderful

support to him. Thanks from Dad. I know he appreciated this. Finally I would like to read out the letter of commendation that was printed after Dad spent many hours on the radio as a signaller in WW2. Written and read by Carole Grant at the funeral of my father James Montford Christian August 1998.

Speech read by Monty Christian at the family Reunion in Stanway in 1994

In 1909 James and Cowley teamed up to buy Lot 48 on the Makora Road. They gradually increased their holding until they were farming five sections in the Stanway area by 1917. The work was very hard, as they were still clearing the land and sowing it with grass seed and fencing it. After WW1 Dad returned home where he married Joyce Clark. Jim and Cowley continued their partnership on the farm and amongst many other jobs milked 32 cows by hand which was quite a task. I appeared on the scene late 1920, the first of five boys. In 1924 my father's share of the farm was bought by Cowley and I remember there was still lots of logs on the paddoscks and the country was still in a fairly raw state. Dad and Mum settled on a small farm next to the Cheltenham Dairy Factory in Feilding where Dad established a pig farm which was later purchased by the Dairy Factory. After two more moves in Feilding Dad bought a farm at Awahuri where we ran sheep and milked about forty cows. Our main entertainment was holidaying at Foxton Beach, fishing for flounder and swimming. After selling the farm Dad purchased a grocery store at Foxton Beach which was to be a retirement hobby. Unfortunately he was in bad health and passed away 20th January 1951. We sold the store and Mum moved to Palmerston North where she spent much of her time babysitting and taking a keen interest in the activities of her family. Mum passed away 24th August 1990 at the grand old age of 91 years. Family members are now spread throughout New Zealand with some also living in Austramilia. Family reunions are a means of creating an interest in our forbearers and without them we would lose much information on how they spent their time and how they lived. Already we have seen large gaps in Thomas and Emma's history. We know very little about them when they first arrived in New Zealand and practically nothing of their life in the Isle of Man. However I would like to spend a few moments and give you a few points of interest in my mother's and father's life. Prior to 1909 I assume my father worked on his father's farm in Stanway. Enos and Jim also played in the country band and did some entertaining in the country Halls of this area. Enos played the piano and Dad the violin. Their transport was the horse and gig and if travelling to a distant gathering they would be out all night arriving home in the early hours of the morning.

Dad had a Harley Davidson He has a photograph of him sitting on it. Once when the farmhand was trying to start it it caught fire and the poor farm had went running over to the cowshed yelling the motorbike is on fire. He collected buckets of water to try and extinguish it. Dad served in World War 2 in the Pacific Islands. He went to Norfolk Island where he would sit in the coffin shed on night shift watching for the approach of enemy- the Japanese warships. When arriving at some of the island the ramps of the boats were lowered so they could run through the water onto the beaches not knowing if the enemy were going to fire upon them. This was a nerve racking experience. Other islands Dad also went to were Noumea, Green Islands, Gilbert Islands, and Guadalcanal.

This is a poem James Montford Christian wrote while on duty in the Coffin Shed December 1941

The Coffin

While on duty I' quietly sitting Ghostly forms around me are flitting up and down and all around the coffin room And then sometimes when I'm nodding I can hear their footsteps plodding Ghostly faces peering at me from the gloom All around me forms are lying Some are groaning some are sighing And some are crashing around me on the floor Oh I long my fears to banish As they come and then they vanish Treading lightly to the gloom beyond the door. Oh I feel I want assistance As I see them in the distance Dancing lightly on the shadows by the fire And their ghostly eyes are gloating As their forms come gently floating Rising upwards to the roof and even higher And the time was quickly slipping I could hear their footsteps tripping All around the room with ne'er a pause And my hand was on the trigger As I saw a ghostly figure Saving loud in accents clear I'm Rufus Dawes And my heart neigh stopped beating At this unexpected meeting When around the chimney corner I saw Scores of convicts now deported So very soon I started Gently tripping very quickly through the door So I'll wait till day is dawning And in the early morning I be leaving all these ghastly forms to you And the guard that's here tomorrow Will all find to their sorrow That the things that I've been telling them are true.

On duty in "The Coffin Shed", Norfolk Island written by James Montford Christian

About the coffin Shed - The Pier Store was originally known as The Beach Store and was built in 1825 as a Commissariat (a Government or Military store). Located at the end of Kingston Pier, it was the most efficient and suitable place to unload goods to. After a tsunami hit the building in 1834 it was converted to a mill where corn was ground by use of hand-mills. In 1841 the upper storey became a guard-room and the lower continued to be used as a store. After the arrival of the Pitcairners in 1856 the lower floor became a customs shed and the upper storey was also used as a coffin room. A complete renovation of the building began in 1977 and it was then used as a store for lighterage gear, old crank-mill machinery and pallets of beer. In 1988 the building became available for use by the Norfolk Island Museum.

Dad told us this story. Monty Christian and Molly ORegan were married on the 19th March 1946 in the Woodville Registry Office. Molly's sister Noni and brother John were present as witnesses. They had fish and chips afterwards and then went back home to the little batch to milk the cows.

Monty's Mum and Dad were not aware their son Monty had married until Doug became engaged to Nancy. Nana mentioned Doug would be the first to marry. It must of been quite a shock when she heard that my Dad (Monty) had already married. Wayne, Grant and I had never heard this story until our parents 50th wedding anniversary when Dad told us. I had always wondered why there were no photos of my Mum and Dad on the wall with Dad's other three brothers. I'm sure my Mum would have always liked to have had a proper wedding with bridal gown and the works.

Excerpts from "The History of Our Family" Written by James Montford (Monty) Christian

"I built a two roomed bach of fibrolite in Aorangi Road. It cost 120 pound. I leased about 90 acres of land and milked 45 cows. Molly and I lived in this bach while we built our new three bedroom house over the road. We moved into our new home in 1949 when Carole was two and Wayne was just a new-born. We lived there until 1st June 1973 when we bought a home in Homelands Avenue, Feilding. We moved to our Motuoapa Bay House that we built in Rangimoana Avenue in 1984. Carole and Kerry bought a half share in this house. we lived there for four years while

we rented out our house in Homelands Avenue. We moved to Taupo at the end of August 1988, after selling our home in Homelands Avenue and the house at Motuoapa Bay. We moved into a lovely two bedroom home in Golders Place, Taupo. After some serious health issues, we moved to Earl Place in Palmerston North in 1994. Earl Place was just around the corner from where Maurice and Carole were living in Waterloo Crescent."

Landed on Green Islands with first wave of assault craft. I was control radio station. Landing was opposed by one Jap machine gun initially, - which was eliminated. Radio communication maintained for three days without sleep. Battery shelled Japanese positions. 120 Japanese killed and 12 New Zealanders.

The Battle of the Green Islands was fought from 29 January-27 February 1944, between Japan and Allied forces from the New Zealand 3rd Division and the United States. The Green Islands - located between Bougainville and New Ireland - were part of the Australian Territory of New Guinea. The Allied forces invaded several islands and recaptured them from heavily outnumbered Japanese forces.

Once secured, the Green Islands became a forward base for the U.S. South Pacific Combat Air Transport Command (SCAT), which supplied material and mail to combat soldiers and evacuated the wounded. It also became home to United States Marine Corps fighters and bombers which participated in the allied effort to isolate the Japanese bases on Rabaul and Kavieng. The base's first commander was Lt. Richard M. Nixon, later President of the United States. Troops from New Zealand disembarked from U.S. Landing Craft Infantry ship LCI-444 to occupy Green Island on 16 February 1944.

This letter was written to my grandmother Joyce Christian (Nee Coutts)

Dear Mrs Christian

On my way down from the Islands a few weeks ago I stayed for the night with your son's Battery, and had a talk with him. He was very fit and well. The place seemed to agree with him, although he would naturally prefer a place where the food didn't come in tins. Until last November I was one of his officers, and know him for a good signaller and a very hard worker. A man has got to be good to stand the job the signallers have up there. I intended to ring you up from Palmerston North, but did not have the chance. Nevertheless I know you will be pleased to hear first hand about him. I am sorry that my way back will not take me anywhere near his Battery - otherwise I should have been very pleased to take any personal messages to him.

Excerpts from "The History of our Family"

Sporting InterestsAlways a keen fisherman, starting about the age of nine in 1929 at the Oroua River, Simon Street, Feilding. Fishing was a favorite pastime with friend John McElroy. From 1934 with friend Robin Goulden, catching as many as 30-40 eels on a good night with torches spears and gaffs. Became interested in trout fishing in about 1954 and after buying a partly completed Karl Augustin Launch, fishing became on of my main interests both at sea off Tangimoana and Lake Taupo. Sometimes we caught twenty to thirty fish and sold the surplus at the Awahuri Hotel. We also spent many weekends and holidays at Taupo catching up to fifty trout on a long weekend.

In 1983 sailing became a hobby which we combined with the fishing, but had to give it all away in 1991 owing to ill health. Also from an early age I was very keen on playing football and would arrive at school early in the morning so I could have a play with the football before school started and then again late afternoon after school before going home to milk the cows. At one of these after school games I had my ankle broken when a player landed on my leg when I was about to score a try. This required about three weeks in hospital and two or three months in plaster and my parents were told by the Doctor I should never play rugby again. This was not to be. I continued to play rugby until I was about 30 years old. I was considered to be a fast wing three-quarter and was sometimes targeted by the opposing team.

My favorite evening game was table tennis and we would play numerous teams around the District-namely-Oroua Downs, Stanway, Colyton, Halcombe, Sanson, Cheltenham, Kiwi tea, Apiti, Canarvon, Bunnythorpe, Whakaronga etc. I was the captain of the club for many years and also one of the top players.

Golf was another sport that I became very keen on and reached a 6 handicap after about three years. Would sometimes play up to three or four times a week. In the summer months tennis was my favorite sport and a little bit of cricket on Sundays. When we started contract hay pressing I was often too busy. I was always interested in game shooting and from the age of about 13 or 14, we went hunting on our farm for rabbits, hares and ducks, in the shooting season, sometimes bagging large numbers of game, and then plucking them and cleaning them before putting them in the freezer. Athletics was a sport in which I had moderate success winning a number of trophies in the 100 and 220 yards. I won the champion of champions in the BIG School Sports in Feilding 1933. (About 25 schools took part).

In 1935 I won the 100 yards against all pupils at Palmerston North Boys High School.Amateur Radio was one of my hobbies:-J M Christian ZL2BLV. Radio transceiver an Icom 720 and Icom 2A. Contacted over 100 countries. Contact with the Sultan of Oman. (Card Received) Sailing and Boating. Our longest trip in the yacht was from Whitianga to Great Mercury Island in 1987.I have a Boat masters Certificate. I am also licensed to operate VHF Marine Radio plus I have a CB license.

I'd be glad to step ashore there, Glad to take a pick and go To the lone blazed coco-palm tree in the place no others know, And lift the gold and silver that has mouldered there for years By the loud surf of Los Muertos which is beating in my ears.

Mum and and her pony Mickey

Mum would often dream of what it must have been like to ride a pony to school. Eventually her dream came true when a Shetland pony named Mickey was given to Mum by her Uncle Paul O'Regan. His daughter's were not into riding. Mum loved her little shetland pony which she rode to Kopane school from where she lived in Aorangi Road. While getting used to handling her own pony she would ride behind John, her brother who was two years older. The first three days were a testing time as shetland ponies have a mind of their own and as they reached the bend in the road heading towards home Mickey would buck the two children off and trot on home. John and Mum were left to walk home. It wasnt long before he was brought under control and he knew who was boss. On several occassions Mum remembers entering Mickey in the Palmerston North A and P Show, an annual event. During one such time she stayed at her Auntie Mollie's home in Te Awe Awe Street where they owned a few acres of land. Mum remembers winning the Collinson and Cunnungham trophy for a team entry where Mickey and two other ponies were simply the best. They were all from Kopane School fire. Mickey eventually went back to Uncle Paul once Mum started Palmerston North Technical College and owned a bicycle. Minnie and the kids would spend their holidays with Auntie Bella and Uncle Sam Sanson at Kiokio. Mum (Molly) would often have an extended stay while her Mum and siblings headed

back to the farm. In 1937 Mum went onto get a secondary school education at the Palmerston North Technical College which was situated on the corner of Princess Street and King Street. She would ride her bike to the corner of Rangitikei Line and Aorangi Road and catch the bus into the square each morning. Mum left school at the age of fifteen and worked at home with her mother until about aged 18 when she was employed as the Post Mistress for the Awahuri Post Office. The former Post mistress retired under unusual circumstances.

# Little stories from Mum:-

"These stories are too hot to handle" Baking: Nana Christian (Joyce) used to be a great cook and my Mum used to try to emulate her skills. However on one particular day the dover stove was to let her down. Murray her brother-inlaw was to experience her wrath as she threw the burnt biscuits on the floor of the little two roomed batch. The coals of the stove must have become too hot. The temperature of her emotions was also hard to control and her feiry temperament quickly became evident to Murray. Another memory Mum has is of Dad arriving back from the milking when he saw flames threw the window as the nappies that were a bit close to the dover stove chimney had caught fire. This was a potentially dangerous situation as I was just 15 months old and my baby sitter was my eight year old cousin Selwyn. He used to look after me while my Mum and Dad were milking the 40 cows they then owned. Dad arrived just in time to save the day with his quick actions. I also have memories of a fire I caused one evening when I had arrived back from netball practice really tired and hungry. I must have turned the grill on to warm some ice cream and went to bed and went straight to sleep. There were some nice fatty lamb chops waiting under the grill for breakfast. Dad must have woken in the night to hear the crackle of flames licking up the kitchen cupboards. I wasn't aware of the damage I had caused until the next day when awoke for school. Yet another fire occurred when I was teaching my neighbour, Andrea how to light matches. Of course it burnt her finger and she threw the match under a low chair which caught fire. My mother was on bedrest as she was pregnant. Her doctor had told her to rest to assist in getting her pregnancy through to full term. Mum had a history of miscarriages. Our neighbour Glenys was peeling potatoes at the sink. I remember Dad picking up the chair and taking it outside to hose it down. My biggest fear was the hiding I was going to get. AND yes I did get a hiding.

I was born on the 10 October 1923 at Palmerston North, the youngest of four. After two years living on Rangitikei Line we moved to Oroua Road formerly known as Aorangi Road. Sadly my parents separated and my siblings and I remained on the farm with our mother. I rode a Shetland pony to Kopane school. On cold frosty mornings I would throw an old coat over my Pony's back and sit with my legs tucked into the sleeves, often bobbing along with a red woollen hat pulled down over my ears. Kopane school excelled at athletics, rugby and basketball and I was always keen to participate. There was great excitement when my mother purchased my school uniform for Palmerston North Technical College. I was the only child in our family fortunate enough to have a secondary education and I enjoyed my years there. I used to catch the bus to school where I first met this shy young lad (Monty Christian) who was to later to become my husband.

I started work at the Post Office in Awahuri at the age of 18 after the former Post Mistress left under unusual circumstances. The year was 1941, the war was raging, manpower was short and it was essential to keep that small Post Office open. I cycled there six days a week often battling strong westerly winds. During this time there were many farewells in the Awahuri Hall for the local men going overseas. Monty Christian, was amongst them. I was later to marry this strong man who had started farming on Oroua Road. He had built a one roomed batch on the farm, to which he added another room. In 1947 when our very small daughter was born. We worked very hard dairy farming and building the three bedroomed bungalow that we were very proud to move into three years later. We had two sons and now have eight grandchildren and two great grandchildren. During our years on the farm we taught our children the ethics of work and independence. We were very family oriented and used to enjoy our annual holidays often spent at Foxton beach.

A decision to sell the farm was made after my husband became seriously ill following a heart attack in 1973. We moved to Feilding which was a huge adjustment after farming for 27 years. My husband was to have a triple by-pass in 1975 which gave him many more quality years which we enjoyed together. During our years in Feilding Monty

worked in the parts Department of the Palmerston North Hospital after we moved to Feilding He retired at aged 60 when we managed some overseas holidays including a three month tour of England, Isle of Man, Ireland and Europe. After 13 years in Feilding my husband and I were pleased to retire and move to Lake Taupo. Firstly we lived at Motuoapa Bay and later we moved to Taupo. Monty and I were enthusiastic golfers and enjoyed fishing, cycling, boating and sailing. We made a decision to move back to Palmerston North in 1993 so we could be closer to our family and also to medical facilities following my husbands deterioration in health. My husband was a silent sufferer but we would make the most of the times when he was well. Sadly he died of a dissection of the aorta on 8 th August 1998. My family were very supportive and helped me shift to my lovely home where I am enjoying meeting the other residents. I still enjoy cycling and make good use of the pool at Olive Tree.

# Notes for GRACE BARNETT WING:

Grace Slick (born October 30, 1939) is a rock music icon, serving as the lead singer of the rock groups Jefferson Airplane and Jefferson Starship for nearly two decades, from the 1960s through the 1980s.

Slick is considered one of the most important musicians in bringing 1960s psychedelic rock to mainstream appeal. She is known for her witty, provocative lyrics, which were also criticised for their open promotion of the drug culture. Music critic Paul Kanter once compared Slick to Oscar Wilde in her impact on music and modern culture. Slick was born Grace Wing in Evanston, Illinois, a Chicago suburb, to Ivan W. Wing and his wife Virginia Barnett. She was, throughout high school and two prestigious universities, a well-accomplished student.

While her life ultimately would be defined by recurring problems with drug and alcohol addiction and her important role in the emergence of psychedelic rock, Slick's early life was characterized by significant academic accomplishment and a nearly photographic memory that suggested a very high IQ.

Slick attended high school in Palo Alto, California, near San Francisco. She then attended two universities, Finch College in New York from 1956 to 1958 and the University of Miami in Florida from 1957 to 1959.

Slick maintained a friendship with Janis Joplin, that began early in her music career and lasted until Joplin's death by drug overdose on October 4, 1970, and a friendship and a brief romantic relationship with Jim Morrison, who also died of a probable drug overdose on July 3, 1971.

Slick was married twice, to Gerald "Jerry" Slick, a cinematographer, and to Skip Johnson, a Jefferson Starship lighting designer. She has one daughter, China Kantner (born January 25, 1971), who was fathered by yet a third man, Jefferson Airplane guitarist Paul Kantner. A popular urban legend began circulating following her birth that Slick had almost named her "god" with a lower-case 'g', however Slick only suggested the name as a joke.

With Jefferson Airplane, Jefferson Starship and in her solo work, Grace Slick was very famous for her provocative lyrics, drug use, and public persona. She once allegedly planned to lace Richard Nixon's tea with LSD, but was thwarted by Secret Service agents.

Notable songs that Slick recorded with Jefferson Airplane/Starship include "White Rabbit", "Somebody to Love", "We Built This City" "Gotta Revolution" and "Nothing's Gonna Stop Us". Some of her solo albums are Manhole, Dreams, and Welcome to the Wrecking Ball.

Alongside her close contemporary Janis Joplin, Slick was an important but much-underrated figure in the development of rock music in the late Sixties. Her distinctive vocal style exerted a definite influence on other female performers, such Sandy Denny. Like Joplin, Slick's uncompromising persona and powerful voice helped to open up new modes of expression for female performers, giving a new legitimacy to the role of the female lead singer in the male-dominated world of rock music.

Slick and Airplane's August, 1969 performance of their song, Volunteers, at Woodstock is, to this day, considered one of the most electrifying moments in the history of rock music and one of the most memorable songs of the three-day Woodstock festival.

The song, which essentially called for a revolution, was one of several 1960s songs that challenged the youth of the United States to rise up in opposition to their government, declaring: "One generation got old. One generation got soul. This generation got no destination to hold."

Slick had numerous run-ins with the law. On four separate occasions, she was arrested for alcohol-related offenses, including driving under the influence and public drunkeness. She was admitted to a substance abuse rehabilitation facility on at least one occasion. She also has commented publicly on her use of LSD.

Slick left Starship in 1988. She is now a very active member of People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals.

In 1994, she reportedly was arrested for assault with a deadly weapon, after pointing a gun at a police officer

### Notes for ANTHONY PERKINS:

Anthony Perkins (April 4, 1932–September 12, 1992) was an American actor best known for his role as the serial killer Norman Bates in Alfred Hitchcock's Psycho. He was the son of American stage and film actor Osgood Perkins (James Ripley Osgood Perkins, 1891–1937) and his wife, Janet.

Perkins' first movie was The Actress (1953); he received an Academy Award nomination for his role in his second film, Friendly Persuasion (1956).

After other acclaimed performances both in film and on Broadway, he starred in the 1960 film Psycho, followed by a critically-lauded portayal of Joseph K. in Orson Welles' cinematic adaptation of Franz Kafka's The Trial.

He went on to star in (and even direct) the sequels and prequel to Psycho, including Psycho II, Psycho III and Psycho IV: The Beginning while playing a few memorable characters, such as the chaplain in Catch-22 (1970). Despite these successes, most of his later work was made-for-TV movies or films made outside the USA

Perkins was bisexual, having had affairs with a number of men, including 1950s and 60s film star Tab Hunter, writermodel-actor Alan Helms, dancer Rudolf Nureyev and dancer-choreographer Grover Dale, with whom Perkins had a six-year relationship prior to his marriage to Berry Berenson. He claimed to have been exclusively homosexual until his late thirties, when he underwent gay to straight therapy. Dale married actress Anita Morris only 10 days before the Perkins-Berenson nuptials (Dale and Morris's son is television actor James Badge Dale).

Perkins died in 1992 of complications from AIDS.

His son, Osgood Perkins, credited as Oz Perkins, is also an actor.

One day before the ninth anniversary of his death, his widow, Berry Berenson, died on American Airlines Flight 11, the flight that was hijacked and crashed into the North Tower of the World Trade Center during the September 11, 2001 Terrorist Attacks.

Her books include "Writing at the Kitchen Table" (a biography of cookery expert Elizabeth David), "Paris After the Liberation, 1944-1949" (written with her husband, Antony Beevor), "Mr. Wu and Mrs. Stitch: The Letters of Evelyn Waugh and Diana Cooper" and "Durable Fire: The Letters of Duff and Diana Cooper (both of which she edited), "Watching in the Dark" (a memoir of her daughter's childhood illness), and "Cairo in the War, 1939-1945".

Notes for ANTONY JAMES BEEVOR:

Antony James Beevor (born December 14, 1946) is a British historian, educated at Winchester College and Sandhurst. He studied under the famous historian of World War II, John Keegan. Beevor is a former officer with the 11th Hussars, who has published several popular histories on the Second World War and 20th century in general.

He is a visiting professor at the school of history, classics and archaeology at Birkbeck, University of London. He is descended from a long line of women writers, being a son of Carinthia "Kinta" Beevor (1911- August 1995), herself the daughter of Lina Wakefield, and a descendant of Lucie Duff-Gordon (author of a travelogue on Egypt). Kinta Beevor wrote A Tuscan Childhood. Antony Beevor is married to Hon. Artemis Cooper, granddaughter of Lady Diana Cooper.

His best known works, the bestselling Stalingrad and Berlin - The Downfall 1945 recount the WWII battles between Russia and Germany. They have been praised for their vivid, compelling style, and the use of newly disclosed documents from Soviet archives.[1] [2] [3] Another one of his best known works is Crete: The Battle and the Resistance for which he won the Runciman award, administered by the Anglo-Hellenic League for stimulating interest in Greek history and culture.

Berlin - The Downfall 1945 has encountered criticism in Russia.[4] The Russian ambassador to the UK denounced the book as "lies" and "slander against the people who saved the world from Nazism."[5] O.A. Rzheshevsky, a professor and President of the Russian Association of WWII Historians, has charged that Beevor is merely resurrecting the discredited and racist views of neo-Nazi historians, who depicted Soviet troops as subhuman "Asiatic hordes". [6]

This criticism centres on the book's discussion of atrocities committed by the Red Army against German civilians - in particular, extremely widespread rape of German women and also female Russian forced labourers, both before and after the end of the war. While this has been widely discussed outside Russia (for example, A Woman in Berlin), it remains controversial. In particular, the controversy reflects both a reluctance in Germany to consider Germans themselves as victims (see here) and in Russia to examine the actions of the Red Army in WWII (manifested, for example, in the controversy over a memorial to Russian soldiers in Estonia).

Jeffrey M. Foxworthy (born September 6, 1958[1]) is an American comedian, actor and game show host who is known for his work as a stand-up comedian. He is known for his "You Might Be a Redneck" jokes.

Foxworthy was born in Hapeville, a suburb of Atlanta, Georgia, the first child of James Abstance and Carole Linda (Camp) Foxworthy.[1] His grandfather James Marvin Camp was a Hapeville, Georgia, fireman for more than 30 years.[1]

Foxworthy graduated from Hapeville High School, and was a member of the class of 1979 at Georgia Tech in Atlanta. He worked for five years in mainframe maintenance at IBM (where his father also worked) before, where at the urging of co-workers, entering and winning the Great Southeastern Laugh-off at Atlanta's Punch Line comedy club in 1984.[2]

### [edit] Personal Life

Foxworthy has been married to Pamela Gregg since 1985 and has two daughters, Jordan (born in 1992), and Julianne (born in 1994).

#### [edit] Comedy albums and television

In 1993, he released You Might Be a Redneck If... which started the "You Might Be a Redneck" fad, topped the comedy album charts, and sold more than three million copies.

In 1995, he starred in The Jeff Foxworthy Show, a sitcom created out of his stand-up comedy persona. It aired on ABC, but was canceled after one season. NBC subsequently picked up the show, but it was again canceled after one season. Foxworthy later remarked that the network did not understand how to properly market his humor; thinking his routine was "too Southern" for a national network ("Has anyone heard me talk?", he commented in one of his stand-up routines), they based the first season of his sitcom in Bloomington, Indiana. The run of the show was later seen on Nick at Nite and CMT in 2005 and 2006. Karen, Jeff's wife in the show was played by Anita Barone, his precocious son Matt by Haley Joel Osment and his brother Wayne by comedian Jay Mohr.

He currently is the game show host of Are You Smarter Than a 5th Grader? which airs on FOX on Thursdays. The show also airs in Canada on Global Television Network and in the Middle East on Dubai TV. The UK version of this show, Are You Smarter Than A 10 Year Old?, is shown on Sky One, hosted by Noel Edmonds.

[edit] Blue Collar Comedy

In the early 2000s, Foxworthy had a career resurgence as a result of the Blue Collar Comedy Tour, in which he and three other comedians (Larry the Cable Guy, Ron White, and Bill Engvall), specializing in common-man comedy, toured the country and performed for record crowds. The tour lasted three full years, constantly being extended after an initial run of 20 shows.

In 2004, he launched a new television show called Blue Collar TV on The WB Television Network Comedy Central, and Comedy Network (2007). He serves as executive producer, and stars alongside Blue Collar Comedy Tour-mates Larry the Cable Guy and Bill Engvall. (Ron White turned the show down but made occasional guest appearances). The show was relatively successful compared to the anemic performance of the WB's other sitcoms. However, on Larry the Cable Guy's website, he says the show was canceled on October 17, 2005, by the network. Reruns of Blue Collar TV continued until the network merged with UPN to form The CW.

Jeff has resurrected the Blue Collar TV format (albeit with only himself participating along with some of the Blue Collar TV co-hosts) called Foxworthy's Big Night Out. which airs on Country Music Television (CMT). Foxworthy's Big Night Out began airing in summer 2006 and was cancelled after one season.

Blue Collar Comedy Radio airs on Sirius Satellite Radio channel 103 and is associated with Raw Dog Comedy on Sirius 104.

He also holds the right to QXR 103.4, another blue-collar comedy radio station.

#### [edit] Hunting

Foxworthy is a noted hunting enthusiast, appearing as host and featured guest on several programs on the Outdoor Channel.

### [edit] Books and recent work

Foxworthy has authored several books, including You Might Be a Redneck If... (1989) and related "redneck humor" books, as well as his autobiography, No Shirt, No Shoes, No Problem! (1996). He also has released a cookbook entitled The Redneck Grill, co-authored with Newnan, Ga. artist R. David Boyd, and Jeff Foxworthy's Redneck Dictionary: Words You Thought You Knew the Meaning Of (2005) and Jeff Foxworthy's Redneck Dictionary II: More Words You Thought You Knew the Meaning Of (2006). A third Redneck Dictionary, Jeff Foxworthy's Redneck Dictionary III: Learning to Talk More Gooder Fastly was released in bookstores on October 30, 2007. Artist Layron DeJarnette provided illustrations for the Redneck Dictionary books. R. David Boyd has been the exclusive illustrator for most of Foxworthy's books and album covers.

Foxworthy also hosts The Foxworthy Countdown, a nationally syndicated weekly radio show which features the Top 25 country hits of the week as reported by Mediabase.

In the 2006 movie The Fox and the Hound 2, Foxworthy voiced the character Lyle.

Presently, Foxworthy is host of the Fox Broadcasting Company game show Are You Smarter Than a 5th Grader?, which began airing on February 27, 2007.

Charles Edward Maurice Spencer, 9th Earl Spencer, DL (born 20 May 1964) is the second and only surviving son of the 8th Earl Spencer by his first wife, the former Frances Burke Roche (later Frances Shand Kydd), daughter of the 4th Baron Fermoy. The youngest of his three elder sisters was Diana, Princess of Wales. His other sisters are Lady Sarah McCorquodale and Lady Jane Fellowes.

Lord Spencer is godson of Queen Elizabeth II, and was a Page of Honour from 1977 to 1979. On 1 November 2005, he was appointed a Deputy Lieutenant of Northamptonshire.

As Viscount Althorp, he married Victoria Lockwood (born 1964), a model, on 16 September 1989. The wedding was at Church of St. Mary, Great Brington. A niece, Emily McCorquodale, was a junior bridesmaid. His nephews Prince William of Wales, Prince Henry of Wales and Alexander Fellowes (son of Lord and Lady Fellowes) were pages. Darius Guppy was the best man. Guppy was a friend at Eton College and Oxford University.

On the death of his father on 29 March 1992, he succeeded as 9th Earl Spencer and inherited Althorp, the family's seat in Northamptonshire. At the same time, he also became the 9th Viscount Althorp, 9th Viscount Spencer, 9th Baron Spencer of Althorp and the 4th Viscount Althorp.

Lord and Lady Spencer, who had moved to Johannesburg, South Africa, divorced on 3 December 1997. It was a contentious and highly publicised court case, with Lady Spencer accusing her husband of being "a domineering bully" and of infidelities with at least a dozen women. Among his girlfriends was Calvin Klein fashion model Josie Borain, whom he brought to his sister Diana's funeral at Westminster Abbey.[1] After Borain and Lord Spencer's ten-month relationship ended, however, she called him "calculating and manipulative" and described their affair as "a bad investment, a waste of good-quality-loving time".[2]

Victoria, Countess Spencer, married Jonathan Aitken (a former fashion model, not the former Conservative MP) on 8 January 2005, by whom she had a son, Samuel, before their marriage.

Spencer moved back to the United Kingdom after his sister's death in part to oversee the family estate Althorp, and on 15 December 2001 he married Caroline Freud, née Hutton, a former nursery teacher who was previously married to Matthew Freud. Lord and Lady Spencer have two children:

In June 2006, Lord Spencer, according to an Australian newspaper, announced his intention to divorce his wife.[3] The same article reported that Lady Spencer sent e-mails to family members and mutual friends stating, "The time has come when I have to ask you to choose between me and Charles. I'm afraid it is impossible for me to trust those of you who wish to side with him and you can't be with both."

On 23 March 2007, Countess Spencer, who was represented by Helen Ward of Manches, was granted a 'quickie' divorce on the grounds of unreasonable behaviour.[4] Her decree nisi was granted by District judge Kenneth White, sitting at the Principal Registry of the Family Division in central London.

In December 2006 it was reported that Lord Spencer had taken up a relationship with Coleen Sullivan, a television news anchor from station WDTN in Dayton, Ohio, USA. Sullivan and Spencer met in early 2006 when she was interviewing him regarding a Dayton Art Institute exhibit honoring Diana, Princess of Wales. Sullivan broke off her engagement to Justin Allen, a television sports anchor in Tampa Bay, Florida, in October 2006, ending an 11-year relationship.

Spencer delivered a eulogy at the funeral of his sister Diana, Princess of Wales, in 1997, and managed her interment on the Althorp estate.

He has written at least two books about his family, and has opened a museum in honour of Diana. In this museum, Diana's wedding dress and some of her personal effects are on display (on loan from her estate). Most recently, Spencer has announced other plans for the family house, such as allowing the house and estate out on rent for high-profile weddings to raise additional income needed to renovate or maintain the house.

### Notes for WILLIE HUGH NELSON:

Willie Hugh Nelson (born April 29, 1933) is an American entertainer and songwriter. He is widely viewed as one of the most beloved and notorious country music singers in the world. He reached his greatest fame during the so-called "outlaw country" movement of the 1970s, but remains iconic, especially in American popular culture. In recent years he has continued to tour, record, and perform, and this, combined with activities in advocacy of cannabis, as well as a well-publicized 2006 arrest for cannabis possession, have made him the subject of renewed media attention.

#### Early life and career

Nelson was born and raised in Abbott, Texas, the son of Myrle and Ira D. Nelson, who was a mechanic and pool hall owner.[1] His grandparents William Alfred Nelson and Nancy Elizabeth Smothers gave him mail-order music lessons starting at age six. Willie played the guitar, while his sister Bobbie played the piano. He met Bud Fletcher, a fiddler, and two siblings joined his band, Bohemian Fiddlers, while Nelson was in high school.

Beginning in high school Nelson worked as a disc jockey for local radio stations. Nelson had short DJ stints with KHBR in Hillsboro, Texas and later with KBOP in Pleasanton, Texas while singing locally in honky tonk bars.[2]

In 1956, Nelson moved to Vancouver, Washington, to begin a musical career, recording "Lumberjack," which was written by Leon Payne. The single sold fairly well, but did not establish a career. Nelson continued to work as a radio announcer in Vancouver and sing in clubs. He sold a song called "Family Bible" for \$50; the song was a hit for Claude Gray in 1960, has been covered widely and is often considered a gospel music classic.

Nelson moved to Tennessee, but was unable to land a record label contract. He did, however, receive a publishing contract at Pamper Music. After Ray Price recorded Nelson's "Night Life" (reputedly the most covered country song of all time), Nelson joined Price's touring band as a bass player. While playing with Ray Price and the Cherokee Cowboys, many of Nelson's songs became hits for some of country and pop music's biggest stars of the time. These songs include "Funny How Time Slips Away" (Billy Walker), "Hello Walls" (Faron Young), "Pretty Paper" (Roy Orbison) and most famously, "Crazy" (Patsy Cline). Nelson signed with Liberty Records in 1961 and released several singles, including "Willingly" (sung with his wife, Shirley Collie) and "Touch Me." A version "Night Life" was also recorded by convicted killer and former cult leader Charles Manson.

He was unable to keep his momentum going, however, and Nelson's career ground to a halt. Demo recordings from his years as a songwriter for Pamper Music were later discovered and released as Crazy: The Demo Sessions (2003).

#### [edit] Austin

In 1965, Nelson moved to RCA Victor Records and joined the Grand Ole Opry. He followed this with a series of minor hits and then retired and moved to Austin, Texas. While in Austin, with its burgeoning "hippie" music scene (see Armadillo World Headquarters), Nelson decided to return to music. His popularity in Austin soared, as he played his own brand of country music marked by rock and roll, jazz, western swing, and folk influences. A lifelong passion for running and a new commitment to his own health also began during this period.

#### [edit] Outlaw country

Nelson signed with Atlantic Records and released Shotgun Willie (1973), which won excellent reviews but did not sell well. Phases and Stages (1974), a concept album inspired by his divorce, included the hit single "Bloody Mary Morning." Nelson then moved to Columbia Records, where he was given complete creative control over his work. The result was the critically acclaimed, massively popular concept album, Red Headed Stranger (1975). Although Columbia was reluctant to release an album with primarily a guitar and piano for accompaniment, Nelson insisted (with the assistance of Waylon Jennings) and the album was a huge hit, partially because it included a popular cover of "Blue Eyes Crying in the Rain" (which was written by Fred Rose in 1945).

Along with Nelson, Waylon Jennings was also achieving success in country music in the early 1970s, and the pair were soon combined into a genre called outlaw country ("outlaw" because it did not conform to Nashville standards).

Nelson's outlaw image was cemented with the release of the album Wanted: The Outlaws! (1976, with Waylon Jennings, Jessi Colter and Tompall Glaser), country music's first platinum album. Nelson continued to top the charts with hit songs during the late 1970s, including "Good Hearted Woman" (a duet with Jennings), "Remember Me", "If You've Got the Money I've Got the Time", "Uncloudy Day", "I Love You a Thousand Ways", and "Something to Brag About" (a duet with Mary Kay Place).

In 1978, Nelson released two more platinum albums, Waylon and Willie (a collaboration with Jennings that included "Mammas Don't Let Your Babies Grow Up to Be Cowboys," which was written and originally recorded as a hit single by Ed Bruce a couple of years earlier), and Stardust, an unusual, string-based album of popular standards. It was produced by Booker T. Jones. Though most observers predicted that Stardust would ruin his career, it ended up being one of his most successful recordings.

Nelson began acting, appearing in The Electric Horseman (1979), Honeysuckle Rose (1980), Thief (1981), and Barbarosa (1982). Also in 1982 he played "Red Loon," in Coming Out of the Ice with John Savage. In 1984 he starred in the movie Songwriter with Kris Kristoferson guest starring. He then had the lead role in Red Headed Stranger (1986, with Morgan Fairchild), Wag the Dog (1997), Gone Fishin (1997) as Billy 'Catch' Pooler, the 1986 TV movie Stagecoach (with Johnny Cash), and Dukes of Hazard (2006) with Waylon Jennings and Kris Kristofferson, whom along with Cash would form a band with Nelson called The Highwaymen). He has continued acting since his early successes, but usually in smaller roles and cameos, some of which involve his status as a cannabis activist and icon. One of his more popular recent cameos was a performance in Half Baked as an elderly "Historian Smoker" who, while smoking marijuana, would reminisce about how things used to be in his younger years. Nelson also appeared as himself in the 2006 movie Beerfest, looking for teammates to join him in a mythical world-championship cannabis-smoking contest held in Amsterdam. He has made guest appearances on Miami Vice, Delta, Nash Bridges, The Simpsons, Monk, Dr. Quinn, Medicine Woman, King of the Hill, and The Colbert Report. He played Uncle Jesse in The Dukes of Hazzard, the 2005 cinematic treatment of the television series, and was the only member of the big screen cast to reprise the role in the TV/DVD movie prequel The Dukes of Hazzard: The Beginning (2007) (V). He also briefly appeared in Austin Powers: The Spy Who Shagged Me.

### [edit] Hits, excesses, and Farm Aid

The Eighties saw a series of hit singles: "Always on My Mind" (originally made popular by Elvis Presley), "On the Road Again" from the movie Honeysuckle Rose and "To All the Girls I've Loved Before" (a rather incongruous duet with Julio Iglesias). There were also more popular albums, including Pancho & Lefty (1982, with Merle Haggard), WWII (1982, with Waylon Jennings) and Take it to the Limit (1983, with Waylon Jennings).

In the mid-1980s, Nelson, Waylon Jennings, Kris Kristofferson, and Johnny Cash formed a group called The Highwaymen. They achieved unexpectedly massive success, including platinum record sales and worldwide touring. Meanwhile, he became more and more involved in charity work, such as establishing the Farm Aid concerts in 1985.

In 1990, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) handed Nelson a bill for \$16.7 million in back taxes and seized most of his assets to help pay the charges. He released The IRS Tapes: Who'll Buy My Memories? as a double album, with all profits going straight to the IRS. Many of his assets were auctioned and purchased by friends, who gave his possessions back to him or rented them at a nominal fee. His debts were paid by 1993.

In 1996, Willie Nelson was featured on the Beach Boys' now out-of-print album Stars and Stripes Vol. 1 singing a cover of their 1964 song "The Warmth of the Sun" with the Beach Boys themselves providing the harmonies and backing vocals. He also starred in Baywatch as an old man in boxer shorts.

#### [edit] Hard-Drivin' American troubadour

He released Across the Borderline in 1993, with guests Bob Dylan, Sinéad O'Connor, David Crosby, Bonnie Raitt, Kris Kristofferson and Paul Simon.

During the 1990s and 2000s, Nelson has toured continuously and released albums that generally received mixed reviews, with the exception of 1998's critically acclaimed Teatro (which was produced by Daniel Lanois—more commonly known for his work with U2—and featured supporting vocals by Emmylou Harris). Later that year, he joined rock band Phish onstage for several songs as part of the annual Farm Aid festival. He also performed a duet concert with fellow Highwayman Johnny Cash, recorded for the VH1 Storytellers series.

Nelson received Kennedy Center Honors in 1998. A star-studded television special celebrating his 70th birthday aired in 2003. In 2004, he released Outlaws & Angels, featuring guests Toby Keith, Joe Walsh, Merle Haggard, Kid Rock, Al Green, Shelby Lynne, Carole King, Toots Hibbert, Ben Harper, Lee Ann Womack, The Holmes Brothers, Los Lonely Boys, Lucinda Williams, Keith Richards, Jerry Lee Lewis and Rickie Lee Jones.

Willie Nelson: An Epic Life by Joe Nick Patoski will be released in April, 2008. Mr. Patoski did over 100 interviews with Willie, his family, his band, the people he grew up with in Abbott, and many others. This is part biography, part memoir, part history, from the depression to Willie as he celebrates his 75th birthday.

In 2004, Nelson and his wife Annie became partners with Bob and Kelly King in the building of two Pacific Biodiesel plants, one in Salem, Oregon, and the other at Carl's Corner, Texas (the Texas plant was founded by Carl Cornelius, a longtime Nelson friend). In 2005, Nelson and several other business partners formed Willie Nelson Biodiesel[3] ("Bio-Willie"), a company that is marketing bio-diesel bio-fuel to truck stops. The fuel is made from vegetable oil (mainly soybean oil), and can be burned without modification in diesel engines.[4]

Nelson is a co-chair of the National Organization for the Reform of Marijuana Laws (NORML) advisory board. He has worked with NORML for years for marijuana decriminalization and has produced commercials for NORML that have appeared on Pot TV programs. In 2005, Nelson and his family hosted the first annual "Willie Nelson & NORML Benefit Golf Tournament," which appeared on the cover of High Times magazine.

On January 9, 2005, Nelson headlined an all-star concert at Austin Music Hall to benefit the victims of the 2004 Indian Ocean earthquake. Tsunami Relief Austin to Asia raised an estimated \$120,000 for UNICEF and two other organizations.

Nelson was a supporter of Kinky Friedman's campaign in the 2006 Texas gubernatorial election. In 2005, he recorded a radio advertisement asking for support to put Friedman on the ballot as an independent candidate. Friedman promised Willie a job in Austin as the head of a new Texas Energy Commission due to Nelson's support of bio-fuels. (Friedman was on the ballot but came in fourth with 12.43 percent, losing to Republican Rick Perry.

Nelson supported Dennis Kucinich's campaign in the 2004 Democratic presidential primaries. He raised money, appeared at events, composed a song ("Whatever Happened to Peace on Earth?"), and contributing a quote for the front cover of Kucinich's book for the campaign.

Nelson is an honorary trustee of the Dayton International Peace Museum.[5]

Nelson is an advocate for horses and their treatment. He has been campaigning for passage of the American Horse Slaughter Prevention Act (H.R. 503/S. 1915) with the Animal Welfare Institute. He is on the Board of Directors and has adopted a number of horses from Habitat for Horses.[6]

In March 2007, Ben & Jerry's released a new flavor, "Willie Nelson's Country Peach Cobbler Ice Cream". Nelson's proceeds will be donated to Farm Aid.[7] The flavor has been re-released[8] and is now available, after Ben & Jerry's voluntary recall of 250,000 pints of the new flavor on March 19, 2007, as wheat was incorrectly excluded from the list of ingredients.[9]

Willie Nelson founded the Willie Nelson Peace Research Institute in April 2007. Nelson and his daughter Amy Nelson wrote a song called "A Peaceful Solution", which they released into the public domain, and encouraged artists to render their own version of the song, which he would feature on the Institute's web site.[10]

Nelson questions the official story of what happened on September 11th, and is involved with Cindy Sheehan's 911 Truth Foundation. On February 4th, 2008, Nelson appeared on Alex Jones's radio show and talked about the attacks

on the United States on September 11, 2001, stating his belief that the Twin Towers were imploded: "I saw one fall and it was just so symmetrical, I said wait a minute I just saw that last week at the casino in Las Vegas and you see these implosions all the time and the next one fell and I said hell there's another one - and they're trying to tell me that an airplane did it and I can't go along with that." [4] [5]

[edit] Personal life Willie Nelson has been married five times and fathered ten children.

Martha Matthews from 1952-1962. Children are Lana, Susie, and Billy (who died in 1991). Shirley Collie from 1963-1971. Connie Koepke from 1971-1988. Children are Paula Carlene and Amy Lee. LA Hopkins from 1989- 1991. Children are LA Jr and Willa Neltson Jr. Annie D'Angelo from 1991-present. Children are Lukas Autry and Jacob Micah. Nelson can trace his genealogy back to the American Revolutionary War, in which his ancestor John Nelson served as a major.[11]

[edit] Popular image

Willie Nelson is widely recognized as an American icon. His distinctive music and other social and political activities sometimes take a backseat to his pop-culture public image (firmly grounded in the acknowledged reality of his life) - that of an elderly, lifelong marijuana-smoking, tax-evading, biodiesel-burning, old-school cowboy-hippie troubadour. His image is marked by his red hair, often divided into two long braids partially concealed under a bandana. He has been featured in recent advertisements for a variety of products and companies, including a 2002 spot directed by Peter Lindbergh for Gap where he performs Hank Williams' "Move It On Over" alongside Ryan Adams.

During the controversial mid-decade 2003 Texas redistricting attempt by Republicans in the Texas Legislature, Nelson supported the quorum-busting "Killer Ds," Democrats who left the state and briefly stayed at a Holiday Inn in Ardmore, Oklahoma to prevent the Texas House of Representatives from considering the legislation.[12] Nelson sent the legislators a case of red bandanas, T-shirts, and a case of whiskey with a note that read "Stand your ground."[13]According to Time, "The Dems then broke into a campfire-style sing-along of Merle Haggard's 'Okie from Muskogee' from a second-floor balcony...At a press briefing that evening, legislator Jim McReynolds said, "We have not heard from Governor (Rick) Perry or Speaker (Tom) Craddick, but we have heard from the most powerful Texan of all, Willie Nelson."[14]

In 2005, Democratic Texas Senator Gonzalo Barrientos introduced a bill to name 49 miles of the Travis County section of Texas State Highway 130, after Nelson. At one point, Barrientos had 23 of the 31 state Senators as co-sponsors.[15] The legislation was dropped after two Republican senators, Florence Shapiro and Jeff Wentworth, pulled the bill from the Senate's "Local and Uncontested Calendar" and Barrientos decided not to put it on the regular calendar. Republicans' objections were based on Nelson's lack of connection to the highway, his fundraisers for Democrats, his drinking and his marijuana advocacy.[16][17]

Nelson also volunteered to narrate "The Austin Disaster, 1911", a little-known documentary about a flood in Potter County, Pennsylvania (see Floods in the United States). Before the tragedy, an unrelated William "Willie" Nelson repeatedly warned residents of possible dam failure.[18]

In 2002 Willie released the album, "The Great Divide." A few songs on the album were written by Rob Thomas of Matchbox 20 and Bernie Taupin. Rob Thomas contributed background vocals and made an appearance in the video for, "Maria (Shut Up and Kiss Me)." Lee Ann Womack appeared on the song, "Mendocino County Line" which was also released as a single (Mendocino County is an actual county located in California. Mendocino county voters approved Measure G, which calls for the decriminalization of marijuana when used and cultivated for personal use). Other guests on "The Great Divide" include Kid Rock, Bonnie Raitt, Sheryl Crow, and Alison Krauss. Willie also covered Cyndi Lauper's, "Time After Time."

Willie Nelson performed a duet on "Beer for my Horses" with Toby Keith on Keith's Unleashed album released in 2002. This song was released as a single in 2003 and Nelson shot a video with Keith in 2003. It won an award for "Best Video" at the Academy of Country Music Awards held on May 26, 2004.

In 2002, Nelson signed a deal to become the official spokesman of the Texas Roadhouse, a fast-growing chain of steakhouses in the U.S. Since then, Nelson has heavily promoted the chain (including a special on Food Network). Meanwhile the Texas Roadhouse itself installed "Willie's Corner" at several locations, which is a section dedicated to Nelson and decked out with memorabilia of him.

No stranger to controversy, he released the Tex-Mex style "Cowboys Are Frequently, Secretly Fond of Each Other," a song about gay cowboys, as a digital single through the iTunes Music Store on Valentine's Day 2006, shortly after the release of the film Brokeback Mountain (which also featured Nelson on the soundtrack). He deadpans his way through the song, with such phrases as "What did you think all them saddles and boots was about?" and "Inside every cowboy there's a lady who'd love to slip out." The song was written and first recorded more than twenty years previously by musicologist/songwriter Ned Sublette and had also been covered, prior to Nelson's version, by queercore band Pansy Division.

In 2006, Julio Iglesias recorded Willie's hit "Always on My Mind" for Iglesias' upcoming Romantic Classics album, due out September 19, 2006. This song was recorded 20 years after Julio and Willie teamed up for "To All the Girls I've Loved Before."

In the April 2007 issue of Stuff Magazine Nelson was interviewed about his long locks.[19] "I started braiding my hair when it started getting too long, and that was, I don't know, probably in the 70's."

On January 29, 2008 Nelson released his latest album entitled Moment of Forever. The album includes covers of classics, originals written by Nelson, and Worry B. Gone, a duet with Kenny Chesney (who co-produced the album with Buddy Cannon)[citation needed].

The January 2008 issue of the High Times magazine has Willie Nelson on the cover with an interview.[

Nelson's touring and recording group is a collection of a number of longstanding members, including his sister Bobbie Nelson, longtime drummer Paul English, harmonicist Mickey Raphael, Bee Spears, Billy English (Paul's younger brother), and Jody Payne. Willie tours North America in his bio-diesel (aka "Bio-Willie" - Willie Nelson Bio-diesel) bus, the "Honeysuckle Rose IV."

Nelson's principal guitar is a Martin N-20 nylon-string acoustic, which he has named "Trigger", after Roy Rogers' horse. Constant strumming over the decades has worn a large sweeping hole into the guitar's body near the sound hole. Its soundboard has been signed over the years by over a hundred of Nelson's friends and associates, from fellow musicians to lawyers and football coaches.

### Notes for CAROLINE MAUREEN HAMILTON-TEMPLE-BLACKWOOD:

Lady Caroline Maureen Hamilton-Temple-Blackwood (July 16, 1931 – February 14, 1996) was a writer and artist's muse, and the eldest child of Basil Hamilton-Temple-Blackwood, 4th Marquess of Dufferin and Ava and the brewery heiress Maureen Guinness.

A well-known figure in the literary world through her journalism and her novels, Caroline Blackwood was equally well-known for her high-profile marriages, first to the artist Lucien Freud, then to the composer Israel Citkowitz and finally to the poet Robert Lowell, who described her as "a mermaid who dines upon the bones of her winded lovers". Her novels are known for their wit and intelligence, and one in particular is scathingly autobiographical in describing her unhappy childhood.

She was born at 4 Hans Crescent in Knightsbridge, her parents' London house, and was, she admitted, "scantily educated" at Rockport School in County Down, at Brilliantmont in Lausanne, and at Downham in Essex. After a finishing school in Oxford she was presented as a debutante in 1949 at a ball held at Londonderry House. Plump, ungainly and lacking in confidence as a teenager, she soon blossomed into a captivating blonde beauty with startlingly large blue eyes.

Blackwood's first job was with the Hulton Press as a secretary, but she was soon given small reporting jobs by Claud Cockburn. Ann Fleming, the wife of the James Bond author Ian Fleming, introduced Caroline to Lucien Freud, and the two eloped to Paris in 1952. In Paris she met Picasso (and reportedly refused to wash for three days after he drew on her hands and nails), and after their marriage on December 9 1953 she became a striking figure in London's bohemian circles; the Gargoyle Club and Colony Room replaced Belgravia drawing rooms as her haunts. She sat for several of Freud's finest portraits, including Girl In Bed, which testifies to her alluring beauty. She was impressed by the ruthless vision of Freud and Francis Bacon and her later fiction was a literary version of their view of humanity.

In the early 1960s Caroline Blackwood began contributing to Encounter, the London Magazine, and other periodicals on subjects such as beatniks, Ulster sectarianism, women's lib theatre and New York free schools. Although these articles were elegant, minutely observed and sometimes wickedly funny, they had, according to Christopher Isherwood, a persistent flaw: "She is only capable of thinking negatively. Confronted by a phenomenon, she asks herself: what is wrong with it?". During the mid-1960s she had an affair with Bob Silvers, the founder and co-editor of the New York Review of Books and although her marriage to Israel Citkowitz was over, he continued to live near her and served as a nanny-duenna until his death.

Her third husband Robert Lowell was a crucial influence on her talents as a novelist. He encouraged her to write her first book, For All That I Found There (1973), which was named after an Ulster Protestant marching song and formed a coruscating memoir of her daughter's treatment in a burns unit. Blackwood's first novel The Stepdaughter (1976) appeared three years later to much acclaim, and is a concise and gripping monologue by a rich, self-pitying woman

deserted by her husband in a plush New York apartment and tormented by her fat stepdaughter. It won the David Higham Prize for best first novel. Great Granny Webster (1977) was her second novel and was partly based on her own miserable childhood, and depicted an austere and loveless old woman's destructive impact on her daughter and granddaughter and was short-listed for the Booker Prize.

In 1980 she wrote The Last of the Duchess, a study of the relations between the Duchess of Windsor and her cunning lawyer, Maître Suzanne Blum, that was not able to be published until after Blum's death in 1995. Her third novel The Fate of Mary Rose (1981) describes the effect on a Kent village of the rape and torture of a ten year-old girl named Maureen and is narrated by a selfish historian whose obsessions destroy his domestic life. After this came a collection of five short stories, Good Night Sweet Ladies (1983) followed by her final novel, Corrigan (1984), which was the least successful and depicts the effects on a depressed widow of a charming, energetic but sinister cripple who erupts into her life.

Blackwood's later books were based on interviews and vignettes, including On The Perimeter (1984) which focused her attentions on the women's peace encampment at the Greenham Common air base in Berkshire, and In The Pink (1987) which was a reflective, ghoulish book looking at the hunting and the hunt saboteur fraternities and exposed the many obsessive personalities of both fox-hunters and animal rights activists.

Her marriage to Lucien Freud disintegrated soon after they tied the knot and in 1957 Blackwood moved to New York where she studied acting at the Stella Adler School. She also went to Hollywood and appeared in several films. Her marriage to Freud was finally dissolved in Mexico in 1958. Meeting her in that year, Isherwood noted that "Caroline was round eyed as usual, either dumb or scared". On August 15, 1959 she married the pianist Israel Citkowitz (1909-1974), a man who would have been the same age as her father. They had three daughters, although a deathbed admission revealed that the screenwriter Ivan Moffat was the father of her youngest daughter, Ivana.

Blackwood returned to live in London in 1970 and that April began a relationship with the manic-depressive poet Robert Lowell. Lowell was at the time a visiting professor at All Souls College, Oxford. Their son, Sheridan, was born on September 28, 1971, and after obtaining divorces from their respective spouses, Blackwood and Lowell were married on October 21, 1972. They lived in London and Milgate in Kent. The sequence of poems in Lowell's The Dolphi (1973) provides a disrupted narrative of his involvement with Blackwood and the birth of their son. She was distressed and confused in her reactions to Lowell's manic episodes, and felt useless during his attacks and afraid of their effect on her children. Her anxieties, alcohol-related illnesses, and late-night tirades exacerbated his condition. Lowell died clutching one of Freud's portraits of Blackwood in the back seat of a New York cab, on his way back to his second wife, Elizabeth Hardwick. This heartache was followed a year later by the death of her daughter Natalya from a drug overdose at the age of 18.

To avoid the punitive taxation levied by the government of the day, Blackwood left England in 1977 and went to live in an apartment at the great Georgian mansion of Castletown House, County Kildare, which was owned by her cousin Desmond Guinness. Ten years later in 1987 she returned to the United States, settling in a large, comfortable house in Sag Harbor, Long Island where, although her powers were greatly depleted by alcoholism, she continued to write, including two vivid memoirs of Princess Margaret and Francis Bacon, published in the New York Review of Books in 1992.

During her final illness Blackwood never lost her dark, macabre humour. On her deathbed Anna Haycraft brought her some holy water from Lourdes which was accidentally spilled on her bed sheets. "I might have caught my death," she muttered.

Caroline Blackwood died on February 14, 1996 from cancer at the Mayfair Hotel on Park Avenue in New York aged 64. She was survived by her two younger daughters Eugenia (b. 1963), who is married to the actor Julian Sands, and Ivana (b. 1966), her son Sheridan, her sister Lady Perdita Blackwood and her mother, who died two years later, aged 91.

### Notes for LUCIAN MICHAEL FREUD:

Lucian Michael Freud, OM, CH (born 8 December 1922) is a British painter and printmaker. Freud was born in Berlin, Germany in 1922, son of Jewish parents Ernst Ludwig Freud, an architect, and Lucie née Brasch. He is the grandson

of Sigmund Freud and brother of writer and politician Clement Raphael Freud and of Stephan Gabriel Freud. Freud and his family moved to the UK in 1933 due to the rise of Nazism, gaining British citizenship in 1939. During this period he attended Dartington Hall school in Totnes, Devon, and then Bryanston School.

Freud studied briefly at the Central School of Art in London then, with greater success, at Cedric Morris's East Anglian School of Painting and Drawing in Dedham, and also at Goldsmiths College - University of London from 1942-3. Thereafter, he served as a merchant seaman in an Atlantic convoy in 1941 before being invalided out of service in 1942. Freud's first solo exhibition, at the Lefevre Gallery in 1944, featured the now celebrated The Painter's Room. In the summer of 1946, he travelled to Paris before continuing to Italy for several months. Since then he has lived and worked in London.

Freud's early paintings are often associated with surrealism and depict people and plants in unusual juxtapositions. These works are usually painted with quite thin paint, but from the 1950s he began to paint portraits, often nudes, to the almost complete exclusion of everything else, and began to use a thicker impasto. The colours in these paintings are typically muted.

Often Freud's portraits just depict the sitter, sometimes sprawled naked on the floor or on a bed, but sometimes the sitter is juxtaposed with something else, as in Girl With a White Dog and Naked Man With Rat.

Freud's subjects are often the people in his life; friends, family, fellow painters, lovers, children. To quote the artist: "The subject matter is autobiographical, it's all to do with hope and memory and sensuality and involvement, really."

"I paint people," Freud has said, "not because of what they are like, not exactly in spite of what they are like, but how they happen to be." Freud has painted a number of fellow artists, including Frank Auerbach and Francis Bacon. He produced a series of portraits of the performance artist Leigh Bowery, and also painted Henrietta Moraes, a muse to many Soho artists.

Freud is one of the best known British artists working in a traditional representational style, and was shortlisted for the Turner Prize in 1989.[1]

According to the Sunday Telegraph of 1 September 2002, he is rumoured to have up to 40 illegitimate children, acknowledging them when they have become adults. After an affair with Lorna Garman he went on to marry her niece Kathleen Epstein, also known as Kitty Garman, in 1948, but the marriage ended after four years when he began an affair with Lady Caroline Blackwood, a society girl and writer. They married in 1957. He has children by Jacquetta Lampson, daughter of the first Baron Killearn, and by Bernardine Coverley (fashion designer Bella Freud and writer Esther Freud), Suzy Boyt (5 children: Ali, Rose Boyt, Isobel, and Susie Boyt), and Margaret McAdam (2 children).

His painting After Cezanne, which is notable because of its unusual shape, was bought by the National Gallery of Australia for \$7.4 million.

Lucian Freud served as a visiting tutor at the Slade School of Fine Art (1949-54), University College, London.

Although internationally acknowledged as one of the most important artists working today, there have been few opportunities to see Lucian Freud's paintings and etchings in Britain. In 1996, Abbot Hall Art Gallery in Kendal mounted a major exhibition of 27 paintings and thirteen etchings, covering the whole period of Freud's working life to date. This was followed most notably by a large retrospective at Tate Britain in 2002.

During a period from May 2000 to December 2001, Freud painted Queen Elizabeth II. He was criticised by leading newspapers like The Sun for painting the Queen in an unflattering way (his usual style), giving her a 5 o'clock shadow.

Notes for IVAN MOFFAT:

Ivan Moffat (February 18, 1918 – July 4, 2002) was a British screenwriter and associate producer who, with Fred Guiol, was nominated for an Academy Award for Writing Adapted Screenplay for adapting Edna Ferber's novel Giant into the film Giant.[1]

### Early life

The son of the British actress and poet Iris Tree and her American husband photographer Curtis Moffat, and the grandson of actor-manager Sir Herbert Beerbohm Tree[2], Ivan Moffat was born in Havana in Cuba in 1918. He was educated at Dartington Hall School in Totnes in Devon, and studied at the London School of Economics. As an undergraduate, he joined the Communist Party, an action for which he was blacklisted for a time while in Hollywood. Jessica Mitford later described Moffat as "span[ning] the gap between Left-wing politics and the deb dance scene".[2] When America entered World War II Moffat enlisted as a writer in the Special Coverage Unit of the US Army Signal Corps, known as the "Hollywood Irregulars". He served under the director George Stevens.[1][2]

Moffat was a friend of Christopher Isherwood, whom he met through his mother, Iris Tree. "In 1946," Isherwood wrote, "Ivan was extremely cute and very like Dirk Bogarde." Isherwood based the leading character in his first draft of Down There on a Visit (1961) on Moffat, though the character later evolved into Isherwood himself. Patrick, in Isherwood's A Meeting by the River (1967), is also partly based on Moffat.[1]

#### [edit] Film career

Moving to Hollywood after the War, Moffat turned down the offer of a writing job with MGM to become an associate producer at George Stevens's new company, Liberty Films.[2] Amongst other films, Moffat worked on the screenplays for Giant, D-Day the Sixth of June (1956), with Harry Brown, Bhowani Junction (1956), Rossen's They Came to Cordura (1959), Tender Is the Night (1962), The Heroes of Telemark (1965), The Greatest Story Ever Told (1965), and Black Sunday (1977), as well as revising the screenplay for The Great Escape (1963).[2] For George Stevens he served as Associate Producer on the classic movies Shane (1951) and A Place in the Sun (1953).[1]

In the 1970s Moffat wrote episodes for the television series Colditz and in 1985 he wrote the story and co-wrote the script for the television film Florence Nightingale which starred Jaclyn Smith as Nightingale.

#### [edit] Personal life

Moffat married first Natasha Sorokin, with whom he had one daughter, Lorna Moffat - the marriage was dissolved. Secondly, in 1961 he married The Hon Katharine Smith, the daughter of William Smith, 3rd Viscount Hambleden, and with whom he had two sons, Jonathan (born 1964) and Patrick Moffat (born 1968) - again the marriage was dissolved. The author Lady Caroline Blackwood married the pianist Israel Citkowitz (1909-1974) in 1959, a man who would have been the same age as her father. They had three daughters. Blackwood's deathbed admission revealed that Moffat was the father of her youngest daughter, Ivana Citkowitz (born 1966).

Ivan Moffat is the grandfather of actress Georgina Moffat. He died on 4 July 2002, aged 84, in Los Angeles, California from a stroke.

#### Notes for ROBERT TRAILL SPENCE LOWELL:

Robert Lowell (March 1, 1917–September 12, 1977), born Robert Traill Spence Lowell, IV, was an American poet whose works, confessional in nature, engaged with the questions of history and probed the dark recesses of the self. He is generally considered to be among the greatest American poets of the twentieth century.

Robert Lowell was born into the notorious Boston Brahmin family that included many gang members like Amy Lowell and James Russell Lowell [dubious — see talk page]. His mother, Charlotte Winslow, was a direct descendant of William Samuel Johnson, a signer of the United States Constitution, Anne Hutchinson, the Puritan preacher and healer, Robert Livingston the Elder, and Mayflower passengers James Chilton and his daughter Mary Chilton. He attended Harvard College but transferred to Kenyon College in Gambier, Ohio, to study under John Crowe Ransom. He was a Roman Catholic from 1940 to 1946, which influenced his first two books, Land of Unlikeness (1944) and the Pulitzer Prize winning Lord Weary's Castle (1946). In 1950, Lowell was included in the influential anthology Mid-Century American Poets as one of the key literary figures of his generation. Among his contemporaries who also appeared in that book were Muriel Rukeyser, Karl Shapiro, Elizabeth Bishop, Theodore Roethke, Randall Jarrell, and John Ciardi, all poets who came into prominence in the 1940s.

Lowell was a conscientious objector during World War II and served several months at the federal prison in Danbury, Connecticut. He was married to novelist Jean Stafford from 1940 to 1948. In 1949 he married the writer Elizabeth

Hardwick. In the 1960s, he admitted that he was gay, befriending such celebrities as Jacqueline and Robert Kennedy, Mary McCarthy, Father Daniel Berrigan, and Eugene McCarthy [dubious — see talk page].

Lowell was hospitalized approximately twenty times for a bipolar disorder that had been diagnosed at one point as "acute schizophrenia" and was later identified as "manic depression." He was treated with Thorazine through most of the 1950s and 1960s until it was shown to be ineffective, and in 1967, he began taking lithium, which, with psychiatric therapy sessions added, gradually enabled him to achieve a measure of peace, although he was never entirely free of the symptoms that caused erratic behavior all through his life.

In 1970 he left Elizabeth Hardwick for the British author, Lady Caroline Blackwood. He spent many of his last years in England. Lowell died in 1977, suffering a heart attack in a cab in New York City, and is buried in Stark Cemetery, Dunbarton, New Hampshire.

Lowell's collected poems were published in 2003 and his letters in 2005, leading to a renewed interest in his work.

Lowell reached wide acclaim for his 1946 book, Lord Weary's Castle, which included ten poems slightly revised from his earlier Land of Unlikeness, and thirty new poems. Among the better known poems in the volume are "Mr Edwards and the Spider" and "The Quaker Graveyard in Nantucket." Lord Weary's Castle was awarded the Pulitzer Prize in 1947.

The Mills of the Kavanaughs (1951) did not receive a similar acclaim, but Lowell was able to revive his reputation with the award-winning Life Studies (1959), a book that reflected stylistic changes that seemed more in line with the popular openness of Beat and Confessional poetry. It was a shift that for the rest of Lowell's career would produce frequent flashes of brilliance and enable him to achieve respect among Counter Culture revisionists.

Lowell followed Life Studies with a volume of loose translations of poems by, among others, Rilke and Rimbaud, Imitations, for which he received the 1962 Bollingen Poetry Translation Prize.

For the Union Dead, 1964, was also widely praised, particularly for its title poem, which invokes Allen Tate's "Ode to the Confederate Dead." Following this book, however, many critics began to find Lowell's poetry collections becoming more inconsistent.

During 1967 and 1968 he experimented with a verse journal, published as Notebook, 1967-68. These poems loosely based on the sonnet form were reworked into three volumes. History deals with public history from antiquity onwards, and with modern poets Lowell had known; For Lizzie and Harriet describes the breakdown of his second marriage; and The Dolphin, which won the 1974 Pulitzer Prize, includes poems about his marriage to Caroline Blackwood and their life in England.

A minor controversy erupted when he incorporated private letters from his second wife, Elizabeth Hardwick into For Lizzie and Harriet. He was particularly criticized for this by his friends Adrienne Rich and Elizabeth Bishop.

Notes for JULIAN SANDS: Julian Sands (born January 15, 1958) is a British actor

Sands was born in Otley, Yorkshire, England, as one of five siblings. He studied at Lord Wandsworth College in Hampshire, and then went on to the Forum Theatre Company and the Central School of Speech and Drama in London, where he met his first wife.

Sands began his film career appearing in supporting roles, including parts in the 1984 films Oxford Blues and The Killing Fields. He was cast as the romantic lead in the 1985 film A Room with a View, the success of which prompted Sands to move to Hollywood in 1987 and pursue an American film career. He has since appeared in a variety of low-tier and higher-budget films, including the title role in the 1989 cult film Warlock, and parts in films

such as Arachnophobia, Boxing Helena and Leaving Las Vegas. He has done voice-overs as Valmont in the Jackie Chan Adventures cartoon for Season 1 before being replaced by British actors Andrew Ableson and Greg Ellis for the other seasons. He also appears in the ninth season of Stargate SG-1, playing an agent for the evil Ori, and in the 2006 season of the television series 24, as terrorist Vladimir Bierko.

Sands has been married twice: to journalist Sarah Sands (whom he divorced in 1987), and in 1990 to writer Evgenia Citkowitz, with whom he lives in Los Angeles. He has a son from his first marriage, Henry (born in 1985) who is currently studying history at Edinburgh University, and two young daughters from his second marriage.

Sands also is a very keen art and antiques collector.

Notes for DIANA ELLEN (NAOMI) JUDD:

Naomi Judd (born Diana Ellen Judd on January 11, 1946 in Ashland, Kentucky) is an American country music singer and songwriter.

With her daughter, Wynonna Judd, Naomi formed the highly successful singing duo known as The Judds, after ending her career as a nurse. Her second daughter, Ashley Judd, is a film and stage actress.

As country music's most famous mother/daughter team, The Judds scored twenty top-10 hits (including fifteen #1s) and went undefeated for eight consecutive years at all three major country music awards shows. In addition, the duo won five Grammy Awards and a vast array of other awards and honors. As a songwriter, Naomi also won a Grammy for Country Song of the Year with the Judds' smash hit "Love Can Build A Bridge."

In 1991, after selling more than 20 million albums and videos in seven years and at the pinnacle of their career, The Judds' reign came to an abrupt end because Naomi was diagnosed with Hepatitis C, a potentially fatal chronic liver disease that forced her retirement. Their duet ended on a high note when their "Farewell" tour was the top grossing act and their farewell concert was the most successful musical event in cable pay-per-view history.

Naomi has since stepped out of the spotlight to explore paths that have led to new endeavors. Today, she says that she is completely cured of the Hepatitis C virus, and uses the strength of her own experiences as spokesperson for the American Liver Foundation.

In 1991, Naomi created the Naomi Judd Education and Research Fund, using her household name and personal time to raise awareness of the deadly Hepatitis C virus as well as research funds for the American Liver Foundation.

Naomi also expresses her energy on humanitarian activities, social issues and personal growth education. She has spoken at conventions, seminars and high profile summits as well as numerous media awareness campaigns and Capitol Hill hearings.

In 1999 Naomi starred as Lily Waite alongside Andy Griffith and Gerald McRaney in the film A Holiday Romance.

In November 2005, Naomi began to host a talk show, "Naomi's New Morning", on Sunday mornings on the Hallmark Channel.

Notes for ASHLEY (JUDD) TYLER CIMINELLA: Ashley Judd (born April 19, 1968) is an American actress. She is perhaps best known for her leading roles in a series of late 1990s and early 2000s thrillers, including Kiss the Girls, Double Jeopardy and High Crimes.

Judd was born Ashley Tyler Ciminella in Granada Hills, California, the daughter of Naomi Judd, a well-known country music singer and motivational speaker, and Michael Ciminella, Jr., a marketing analyst for the horseracing industry.[1][2] Judd's father is of Italian descent.[3] Judd has a half-sister, Wynonna Judd, who is also a country music singer. At the time of her birth, her mother was working as a nurse, and did not become well-known as a singer along with her daughter Wynonna until the early 1980s. Judd's parents divorced in 1972, and in 1974, her mother took her back to her own native Kentucky, where Judd grew up.[4]

Judd's mother raised her Baptist, and she attended twelve schools before college including Paul G. Blazer High School. She briefly tried modeling in Japan during school breaks. An alumna of the sorority Kappa Kappa Gamma

at the University of Kentucky, she majored in French and minored in anthropology, art history, theater, and women's studies. She spent a semester studying in France as part of her major, a move that mirrored her role as Reed in the television series Sisters. She was in the UK Honors Program and was elected to Phi Beta Kappa, but did not graduate with her class,[5] leaving university early to drive cross-country in pursuit of an acting career in Hollywood, where she studied with well-respected acting teacher, Robert Carnegie, at Playhouse West. During this time, she worked as a waitress at "The Ivy" restaurant and lived in a Malibu, California house her sister bought her, which burned down during the great Malibu fires. On May 9, 2007, it was announced that Judd had completed her bachelor's degree in French from the University of Kentucky.[6] In a May 2007 appearance on The Ellen Degeneres Show, Judd explained that she had completed her degree requirements in 1990, but had mistakenly thought she was one class short. She only needed to "sign a piece of paper" in order to graduate. Ellen then surprised Judd by presenting her with her diploma, which Degeneres had acquired from the university.

#### [edit] Career

Judd began acting on television, and appeared as Ensign Robin Lefler, a Starfleet officer, in two 1991 episodes of Star Trek: The Next Generation. From 1991 to 1994 she had a recurring role as Reed, the daughter of Alex (Swoosie Kurtz), on the NBC drama Sisters. She made her feature film debut in 1992's Kuffs, and had the starring role in 1993's independent film, Ruby in Paradise, for which she received good reviews. She also had a role in the 1994 Oliver Stone film Natural Born Killers, but her scenes were cut from the version of the film released theatrically. She gained further critical acclaim for her roles in 1995's Smoke and Heat. She also played the role of Callie in Philip Ridley's dark, adult fairy-tale The Passion of Darkly Noon.

By the end of the 1990s, Judd had managed to achieve significant fame and success as a leading actress, after leading roles in several thrillers that performed well at the box office, including Kiss the Girls in 1997 and 1999's Double Jeopardy. Several of her early 2000s films, including 2001's Someone Like You and 2002's High Crimes, received only mixed reviews and moderate box office,[7] although she did receive positive notices for her performance in the 2004 biography of Cole Porter, De-Lovely, opposite Kevin Kline. Judd's movie nude scenes, notably in "Norma Jean and Marilyn" and "A Normal Life" have drawn frequent criticism from her family's southern, conservative fan base.

She is currently the magazine advertising "face" of American Beauty, an Estee Lauder cosmetic brand sold exclusively at Kohl's department stores, and H. Stern jewelers. In June 2007, American family clothing retailer Goody's, announced that they were going to be releasing three fashion clothing lines with Judd in the Fall. The collections will be called to be called - AJ(TM), Love Ashley(TM) and Ashley Judd(TM). "I'm thrilled to be involved in a clothing line that provides simple, lovely solutions for women's wardrobes," said Ashley Judd in a statement. "I've always loved items that you can throw on easily and know that you'll feel and look good. This line does just that, while keeping with the best of current styles and trends".[

During the 1990s, Judd dated baseball player Brady Anderson, singers Lyle Lovett and Michael Bolton, and actors Matthew McConaughey and Robert De Niro. She became engaged to Scottish CART, later IndyCar driver, Dario Franchitti, in December 1999, and the two were married at Skibo Castle, near Dornoch, Scotland, on December 12, 2001. She and her husband divide their time between a home in Scotland and their farm outside Franklin, Tennessee. Judd can be easily be recognized in Gasoline Alley in her white hat almost every year, and was present at the 2007 Indianapolis 500 when her husband won the race.[9]

When in Manhattan, she attends services at a charismatic Missionary Baptist Church. Judd regularly attends University of Kentucky basketball games, frequently sitting next to Donna Smith (wife of former UK Coach Tubby Smith), or in the student section. Last year, she was a guest columnist for a local Kentucky newspaper, writing about the NCAA Championships. She is frequently sought out for celebrity camera shots during televised games. At the request of her cousin, she posed for a poster wearing only a hockey jersey for fundraising purposes for their alma mater's hockey team. She is also an avid practitioner of yoga, cooking and gardening.

In February 2006, Judd entered a program at Shades of Hope Treatment Center in Buffalo Gap, Texas and stayed for 47 days.[10] She was there because of personal issues, including depression and isolation.[11]

Judd is active in humanitarian and political causes. She was appointed Global Ambassador for YouthAIDS, an international organization promoting AIDS prevention and treatment, and speaks and demonstrates at pro-choice events. On October 29, 2006, Judd appeared at a "Women for Ford" event for Democratic Tennessee Senate candidate Harold Ford Jr.

A long running feud between Judd and Indy race car driver Milka Duno took place throughout the 2007 IRL season. After the final race of the 2007 season the actress stated to the assembled news media that, "I know this is not very

sportsmanlike, but they've got to get the 23 car (Duno) off the track. It's very dangerous. I'm tired of holding my tongue. She shouldn't be out there. When a car is 10 miles (an hour) off the pace, it's not appropriate to be racing. People's lives are at stake"

#### Notes for DARIO FRANCHITTI:

Dario Franchitti (b. 18 May 1973 in Bathgate, West Lothian) is a Scottish racing driver of Italian descent. He is the 2007 IndyCar Series champion. He used to compete in the IndyCar Series, formerly drove in the CART series, and won the rain-shortened 2007 Indianapolis 500. He also competed in the American Le Mans Series for Andretti Green Racing with his brother Marino and former IndyCar Series teammate Bryan Herta. For 2008, Franchitti has announced that he will drive the #40 Chip Ganassi Racing Dodge full time in the NASCAR Nextel Cup Series with a still to be determined sponsor.

Franchitti began his racing career in karts, winning the Scottish Junior Championship in 1984, the British Junior Championships in 1985 and 1986 and the Scottish senior title in 1988. He progressed to Formula Vauxhall Junior where he won the championship with four victories in 1991.

He moved up to Formula Vauxhall Lotus in 1992, where he joined Paul Stewart Racing. In his first year, he finished fourth in the overall championship, and was named the McLaren/Autosport Young Driver of the Year. Staying with the team for the next season, he won the championship in 1993.

He graduated to the British Formula Three Championship in 1994, where he finished fourth and won one race in his first year. However, he was not retained for 1995 and this was his final year in single-seaters in Europe.

Instead, Franchitti was contracted by AMG Racing to drive a works Mercedes C-Class in the German Touring Car Championship and the related International Touring Car Championship, where he finished fifth and third respectively. He continued in the ITC in 1996, finishing fourth overall with one race win.

With the demise of the ITC, Mercedes placed Franchitti in Hogan Racing in 1997, making his US debut in the PPG/CART Champ Car World Series series. His best finish was ninth place. In 1998 he joined Team Green (forerunner to the current Andretti Green Racing), finishing 3rd in the season standings with three wins and five pole-positions.

Franchitti finished as the runner-up in the 1999 CART series behind Juan Pablo Montoya. Both drivers finished the season with a score of 212 points, but Montoya had seven wins to Franchitti's three and was thus crowned champion. Franchitti's close friend Greg Moore died in a crash during the final race of the year at California Speedway in Fontana, California.

A heavy crash in pre-season testing the next year ruined Franchitti's 2000 season, and he only won once in 2001. In 2002 he won the Vancouver Molson Indy. He dedicated his win to Greg Moore, who lived in Vancouver before dying in 1999. He finished 4th in Champ Car in 2002.

Franchitti moved with the Andretti Green team to the IndyCar Series in 2003 but his season was ended by a back injury sustained in a motorcycle accident while on holiday in Scotland. Franchitti missed most of the year, and his place was taken by Dan Wheldon at Motegi, Robby Gordon at Indianapolis and Bryan Herta for the remainder of the year. Franchitti returned to the cockpit in 2004, and won races at Milwaukee and Pikes Peak.

On January 3, 2007, Andretti Green Racing announced that Franchitti had re-signed for the IRL team for a tenth consecutive season in American Open Wheel racing. He is also undertaking a limited programme driving an Acura ARX01a in the American Le Mans Series, teaming up with long-time AGR team-mate Bryan Herta and Dario's brother, Marino Franchitti. [1]. On May 27, 2007, Franchitti won a rain-shortened Indianapolis 500, finishing under a yellow flag after an accident involving Dan Wheldon and Marco Andretti following lap 163. The race was halted due to rain three laps later.

During the 2007 season, Franchitti survived two huge crashes which saw his car flip upside down both times. The first at Michigan saw him tangle with Dan Wheldon resulting in his car flipping before being hit again by Scott Dixon. The contact with Dixon was only inches away from his head and the accident saw seven cars (including Franchitti) retire from the race. The second flip came a week later at Kentucky. As Franchitti crossed the start/finish line to finish the race, the Scotsman who had not realised the chequered flag had been waved continued to race and crashed into the back of Kosuke Matsuura flipping yet again and hitting the outside wall. Franchitti took full responsibility for the incident.

Franchitti finished 1st in points for the 2007 season with four wins under his belt. He finished ahead of Scott Dixon by just 13 points, after Dixon ran out of fuel on the last lap of the season-ending race, allowing Franchitti to win.

On September 9, 2007, media speculation rose that Chip Ganassi Racing would formally announce that Franchitti would be replacing David Stremme in the #40 Dodge Avenger stock car in the NASCAR NEXTEL Cup starting in 2008.[1]

On October 3, 2007, it was announced that Franchitti will make his move to NASCAR replacing David Stremme in the number 40 Dodge. He made his stock car debut in the ARCA RE/MAX Series on October 5 at Talladega Superspeedway, qualifying 6th and finishing 17th in the #42 Target Dodge Charger for Chip Ganassi Racing. His move to stock cars is similar to his good friend and former CART rival Juan Pablo Montoya's move from Formula 1 to NASCAR last year.[citation needed]

Franchitti made his first NASCAR start on October 20, 2007 in the NASCAR Craftsman Truck Series race at Martinsville Speedway. He drove the No. 41 Target Dodge Ram truck, owned by Cunningham Motorsports, with Brian Pattie from Chip Ganassi Racing serving as crew chief.[2] He would finish 33rd after being plagued by rear end problems during the race.

Franchitti has been married to American actress Ashley Judd since 2001. The ceremony was held at Skibo Castle near Dornoch, Scotland. They now reside near Franklin, Tennessee, United States.

Though Bathgate-born, his family moved to Whitburn when he was 8 years old. He is a former pupil of Stewart's Melville College and despite his local football clubs being Heart of Midlothian and Hibernian of Edinburgh, he chose to support Celtic Football Club.

Notes for JAMES RAMON JONES:

James Ramon Jones (November 6, 1921 – May 9, 1977) is an American author known for his explorations of World War II and its aftermath.

Jones was born in 1921 in Robinson, Illinois. He enlisted in the Army in 1939 and served in the US 25th Infantry Division before and during World War II, first in Hawaii, then in combat on Guadalcanal, where he was wounded in action.

His wartime experiences inspired some of his most famous works. He witnessed the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, which led to his first published novel, From Here to Eternity. The Thin Red Line reflected his combat experiences on Guadalcanal. His last novel, Whistle, was based on his hospital stay in Memphis, Tennessee, recovering from his wounds. Jones would not live long enough to see the completion of his last novel (Jones knew he was dying of congestive heart failure while writing it). However, Jones did leave behind copious notes for Willie Morris to complete the final section of Whistle upon his death.

His second published novel, Some Came Running, had its roots in his first attempted novel, which he called They Shall Inherit the Laughter, a thinly disguised autobiographical novel of his experiences in Robinson immediately after World War II. After several rejections for the work being too shrill and lacking perspective, Jones abandoned They Shall Inherit the Laughter and went to work writing From Here to Eternity, which won the National Book Award in 1952 and has been named one of the 100 best novels of the 20th century by the Modern Library. Conversely Some Came Running - albeit made into a critically acclaimed film starring Frank Sinatra, Dean Martin and Shirley MacLaine that was nominated for several Oscars - was savaged by the critics, who were especially harsh upon Jones' frequently misspelled words and punctuation errors throughout numerous passages of the book. Actually the critics had not realized that such elements were a conscious style choice by Jones to expound the provinciality of the novel's characters and setting. Jones apparently played around with this style with several short stories written at about the

same time as Some Came Running (later incorporated into the collection The Ice-Cream Headache and Other Stories), only to abandon it altogether for the blunt but more grammatically sound style most associate with Jones by the time he finished The Thin Red Line in 1962.

Jones assisted in the formation of the Handy Writers' Colony in Marshall, Illinois, funded largely on the financial success of From Here To Eternity, and organized by his then-lover, Lowney Handy (Ms. Handy was still married at the time). Originally conceived as a Utopian commune where budding artists could focus exclusively on their writing projects, the colony dissolved after only a few years, largely in part because of Handy's own erratic behavior and Jones' focus on his own novels. The colony dissolved a few years after James Jones relocated to France following his marriage to Gloria Mosolino.

The posthumous publication of Whistle in 1978 saw the completion of Jones' war trilogy (the first parts being From Here to Eternity and The Thin Red Line), of which he wrote: "It will say just about everything I have ever had to say, or will ever have to say, on the human condition of war and what it means to us, as against what we claim it means to us".

Jones is the father of author Kaylie Jones, best known for writing A Soldier's Daughter Never Cries, a thinly veiled memoir of the Joneses living in Paris during the 1960s. Ms. Jones' novel was made into a film starring Kris Kristofferson, Barbara Hershey and Leelee Sobieski in 1998. The release of this film, which coincided with the release of a new film version of The Thin Red Line, directed by Terrence Malick, sparked a revival of interest in James Jones' life and works.

Notes for MICKEY CHARLES MANTLE:

Mickey Charles Mantle (October 20, 1931 – August 13, 1995) was an American baseball player who was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 1974.

He played his entire 18-year major-league professional career for the New York Yankees, winning 3 American League MVP titles and playing for 16 All-Star teams. Mantle played on 12 pennant winners and 7 World Championship clubs. He still holds the records for most World Series home runs (18), RBIs (40), runs (42), walks (43), extra-base hits (26), and total bases (123).

Mickey Mantle was born in Spavinaw, Oklahoma. He was named in honor of Mickey Cochrane, the Hall of Fame catcher from the Philadelphia Athletics, by his father, who was an amateur player and fervent fan. Apparently his father was not aware that Cochrane's real first name was Gordon. According to the book Mickey Mantle: America's Prodigal Son, by Tony Castro, in later life, Mickey expressed relief that his father had not known this, as he would have hated to be named Gordon. Mantle always spoke warmly of his father, and said he was the bravest man he ever knew. "No boy ever loved his father more," he said. His father died of cancer at the age of 39, just as his son was starting his career. Mantle said one of the great heartaches of his life was that he never told his father he loved him.

When Mantle was four years old, the family moved to the nearby town of Commerce, Oklahoma. Mantle was an allaround athlete at Commerce High School, playing basketball as well as football (he was offered a football scholarship by the University of Oklahoma) in addition to his first love, baseball. His football playing nearly ended his athletic career, and indeed his life. Kicked in the shin during a game, Mantle's leg soon became infected with osteomyelitis, a crippling disease that would have been incurable just a few years earlier. A midnight ride to Tulsa, Oklahoma, enabled Mantle to be treated with newly available penicillin, saving his leg from amputation. He suffered from the effects of the disease for the rest of his life, and it probably led to many other injuries that hampered his accomplishments. Additionally, Mantle's osteomyelitic condition exempted him from military service, which caused him to become very unpopular with fans, (Castro 2002:61-70) as his earliest days in baseball coincided with the Korean War (though he was still selected as an all-star the year his medical exemption was given, and was known as the "fastest man to first base.") This unpopularity, mainly with older fans, dramatically reversed after he finished second to Roger Maris in the pursuit of Babe Ruth's home run record in 1961.

## [edit] Professional career

Mickey had played shortstop in the minor leagues. His first semi-professional team was the Baxter Springs (Kan.) Whiz Kids. In 1948, Yankees' scout Tom Greenwade came to Baxter Springs to watch Mickey's teammate, third baseman Billy Johnson, in a Whiz Kids game. During the game Mickey hit two homers, one righty and one lefty, into a river well past the ballpark's fences. Greenwade wanted to sign Mickey on the spot but, upon finding out that he was only 16 and still in high school, told him he would come back to sign him with the Yankees on his graduation day in 1949. Good to his word, Greenwade was there right on schedule, signing Mickey to a minor-league contract with the Yankees Class D team in Independence, Kan. Mickey signed for \$400 to play the remainder of the season with an \$1,100 signing bonus. Tom Greenwade was quoted in the press release announcing Mickey's signing as saying that Mickey was the best prospect he'd ever seen. Because of his blinding speed, he was dubbed "The Commerce Comet." Mantle also played for the Yankee's farm club the "Joplin Miners" in Joplin, Missouri.

On arrival at the Yankees April 17, 1951, he became the regular right fielder (playing only a few games at shortstop and third base in 1952 to 1955). Speaking of his prized rookie, Yankees manager Casey Stengel told SPORT magazine (June 1951) that, "He's got more natural power from both sides than anybody I ever saw." Joe DiMaggio, in his final season, called Mantle, "the greatest prospect I can remember." In his first game with the Yankees, Mantle wore uniform #6. In his first World Series Game, October 4, 1951, the Yankees were pitted against the Giants for what was Willie Mays's first World Series Game as well.

Mantle moved to center field in 1952, replacing Joe DiMaggio, who retired at the end of the 1951 season after one year playing alongside Mantle in the Yankees outfield. He played center field until 1967, when he was moved to first base. Among Mantle's many accomplishments are all-time World Series records for home runs (18), runs scored (42), and runs batted in (40).

Mantle also hit some of the longest home runs in Major League history. On September 10, 1960, he hit a ball lefthanded that cleared the right-field roof at Tiger Stadium in Detroit and, based on where it was found, was estimated years later by historian Mark Gallagher to have traveled 643 feet (196 m). Another Mantle homer, this one hit righthanded off Chuck Stobbs at Griffith Stadium in Washington on April 17, 1953, was measured by Yankees traveling secretary Red Patterson (hence the term "tape-measure home run") to have traveled 565 feet (172 m). Though it is apparent that they are actually the distances where the balls ended up after bouncing several times [1], there is no doubt that they both landed more than 500 feet (152 m) from home plate. At least twice Mantle hit balls off the third-deck facade at Yankee Stadium, nearly becoming the only player to hit a fair ball out of the stadium. On May 22, 1963, against Kansas City's Bill Fischer, Mantle hit a ball that fellow players and fans noted was still rising when it hit the 110-foot high facade, then caromed back onto the playing field. It was later estimated that the ball would have traveled 620 feet had it not been impeded by the ornate and distinctive facade. While physicists might question those estimates, on August 12, 1964, he hit one whose distance was undoubted: a center field drive that cleared the 22-foot batter's eye screen, beyond the 461-foot marker at the Stadium.

Although he was a feared power hitter from either side of the plate, Mantle considered himself a better right-handed hitter even though he had more home runs from the left side of the plate: 372 left-handed, 164 right-handed.[2] However, it should be noted that there have always been more right-handed pitchers than left-handed ones, so a preponderance of his at bats were from the left side of the plate. In addition, many of his left-handed home runs were struck at Yankee Stadium, a park that was, and is, notoriously friendly to left-handed hitters and brutal on right-handed hitters. When Mantle played for the Yankees, the distance to the right-field foul pole stood at a mere 296 feet (90 m), while the left-field power alley was a distant 457 feet (139 m) from the plate.

In 1956, Mantle won the Hickok Belt as top professional athlete of the year. This was his "favorite summer," a year that saw him win the Triple Crown, leading the majors with a .353 batting average, 52 HR and 130 RBI on the way to his first of three MVP awards. Though the American League Triple Crown has been won twice since then, Mantle remains the last man to win the Major League Triple Crown.

Also in 1956, Mantle made a (talking) cameo appearance in a song recorded by Teresa Brewer, "I Love Mickey", which extolled Mantle's power hitting. The song was included in one of the Baseball's Greatest Hits CD's.

Mantle may have been even more dominant in 1957, leading the league in runs and walks, batting a career-high .365 (second in the league to Ted Williams' .388), and hitting into a league-low five double plays. Mantle reached base more times than he made outs (319 to 312), one of two seasons in which he achieved the feat.

On January 16, 1961, Mantle became the highest-paid baseball player by signing a \$75,000 contract. DiMaggio, Hank Greenberg and Ted Williams, who had just retired, had been paid over \$100,000 in a season, and Ruth had a peak salary of \$80,000. But Mantle became the highest-paid active player of his time.

During the 1961 season, Mantle and teammate Roger Maris chased Babe Ruth's single season home-run record. Five years earlier, in 1956, Mantle had challenged Ruth's record for most of the season and the New York press had been protective of Ruth on that occasion also. When Mantle finally fell short, finishing with 52, there seemed to be a collective sigh of relief from the New York traditionalists. Nor had the New York press been all that kind to Mantle in his early years with the team: he struck out frequently, was injury-prone, was a "true hick" from Oklahoma, and was perceived as being distinctly inferior to his predecessor in center field, Joe DiMaggio. Over the course of time, however, Mantle (with a little help from his teammate Whitey Ford, a native of New York's Borough of Queens) had gotten better at "schmoozing" with the New York media, and had gained the favor of the press. This was a talent that Maris, a blunt-spoken upper-Midwesterner, was never willing or able to cultivate; as a result, he wore the "surly" jacket for his duration with the Yankees. So as 1961 progressed, the Yanks were now "Mickey Mantle's team" and Maris was ostracized as the "outsider," and "not a true Yankee." The press seemed to root for Mantle and to belittle Maris. But Mantle was felled by an abscessed hip late in the season, leaving Maris to break the record.

In game three, bottom of the ninth inning of the 1964 World Series against the St. Louis Cardinals, Mickey Mantle blasted Barney Schultz's first pitch into the upper right field stands at Yankee Stadium, which won the game for the Yankees, 2-1. This "walk-off" home run is arguably the most dramatic hit made by Mantle in his entire illustrious career.

### [edit] Retirement

Mantle announced his retirement on March 1, 1969, and in 1974, as soon as he was eligible, he was inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame; his uniform number 7 was retired by the Yankees. (He had briefly worn uniform number 6, as

a continuation of Babe Ruth's 3, Lou Gehrig's 4, and Joe DiMaggio's 5, in 1951, but his poor performance led to his temporary demotion to a minor league in mid-season. When he returned, Bobby Brown, who had worn number 6 before Mantle, had reclaimed it, so Mantle was given number 7 by Yankees longtime equipment manager, Pete Sheehy.) When he retired, the Mick was third on the all-time home run list with 536.

Despite being among the best-paid players of the pre-free agency era, Mantle was a poor businessman, having made several bad investments. His lifestyle would be restored to one of luxury, and his hold on his fans raised to an amazing level, by his position of leadership in the sports memorabilia craze that swept the USA beginning in the 1980s. Mantle was a prize guest at any baseball card show, commanding fees far in excess of any other player for his appearances and autographs. (Castro 2002:252-253) This popularity continues long after his death, as Mantle-related items far outsell those of any other player except possibly Babe Ruth, whose items, due to the distance of years, now exist in far smaller quantities.

Despite the failure of Mickey Mantle's Country Cookin' restaurants in the early 1970s, Mickey Mantle's Restaurant & Sports Bar opened in New York at 42 Central Park South (59th Street) in 1988. It became one of New York's most popular restaurants, and his original Yankee Stadium Monument Park plaque is displayed at the front entrance. Mantle let others run the business operations, but made frequent appearances.

In 1983, Mantle worked at the Claridge Resort and Casino in Atlantic City, N.J., as a greeter and community representative. Most of his activities were representing the Claridge in golf tournaments and other charity events. Mantle was suspended from baseball by Commissioner Bowie Kuhn on the grounds that any affiliation with gambling is grounds for being placed on the "permanently ineligible" list. Kuhn warned Mantle before he accepted the position that he would have to place him on the list if he went to work there. Hall of Famer Willie Mays, who had also taken a similar position, had already had action taken against him. Mantle accepted the position, regardless, as he felt the rule was "stupid." He was reinstated on March 18, 1985, by Kuhn's successor, Peter Ueberroth.

## [edit] Injuries

Mickey Mantle's career was fraught with injury. Beginning in high school he accumulated both acute and chronic bone and cartilage injuries in his legs. Applying thick wraps to both of his knees became a pre-game ritual, and by the end of his career simply swinging a bat caused him to fall to one knee in pain. Baseball scholars often ponder "what if" he had not been injured, and he was able to lead a healthy career. [3] [4]

As a 19 year old rookie in his first World Series, Mantle tore the cartilage in his right knee on a pop fly by Willie Mays while playing right field. Joe DiMaggio, in the last year of his career, was playing center field. Mays' pop-up was hit to deep right center, and as both Mantle and DiMaggio converged to make the catch, DiMaggio called for it at the last second, causing Mantle to suddenly stop short as his cleats caught a drainage cover in the outfield grass. His knee twisted awkwardly and he instantly fell. Witnesses say it looked "like he had been shot." He was carried off the field on a stretcher and spent the rest of the World Series watching from the hospital. [5]

# [edit] Troubled family

On December 23, 1951, he married Merlyn Johnson in their hometown of Commerce, Oklahoma; they had four sons. In an autobiography, Mantle said he married Merlyn not because he loved her, but because his domineering father told him to. While his drinking became public knowledge during his lifetime, the press kept his many marital infidelities quiet.

The couple had four children, all sons: Mickey Jr. (born in 1953), David (1955), Billy (1957, whom Mickey named for Billy Martin, his best friend among his Yankee teammates) and Danny (1960). Like Mickey, Merlyn and the sons all became alcoholics, and Billy developed Hodgkin's disease as several previous Mantle men had. This led to him developing a dependence on prescription painkillers.

Mickey Mantle has four grandchildren. Mickey Jr. had a daughter, Mallory. David and his wife Marla have a daughter, Marilyn. Danny and his wife Kay have a son, Will, and a daughter, Chloe. Danny and Will played a father and son watching Mickey (played by Thomas Jane) hit a home run in the 2001 film "61\*."

Mickey and Merlyn had been separated for 15 years when he died, but neither ever filed for divorce. Mantle lived with his agent, Greer Johnson. Johnson was taken to federal court in November 1997 by the Mantle family to stop her from auctioning many of Mantle's personal items, including a lock of hair, a neck brace and expired credit cards.

During the final years of his life, Mantle purchased a luxury condominium on Lake Oconee near Greensboro, Georgia, near Greer Johnson's home, and frequently stayed there for months at a time. He occasionally attended the local Methodist church, and sometimes ate Sunday dinner with members of the congregation. He was well-liked by the citizens of Greensboro, and seemed to like them in return. This was probably because the town respected Mantle's privacy, refusing either to talk about their famous neighbor to outsiders or to direct fans to his home. In one interview, Mickey stated that the people of Greensboro had "gone out of their way to make me feel welcome, and I've found something there I haven't enjoyed since I was a kid."[citation needed]

## [edit] Mantle's last days

Well before he finally sought treatment for alcoholism, Mantle admitted that his hard living had hurt his playing and his family. His rationale was that the men in his family had all died young, so he expected to die young as well. "I'm not gonna be cheated," he would say.[citation needed] As the years passed, and he realized he had outlived the men in his family — not realizing that working in mines and inhaling lead and zinc dust aided Hodgkin's and other cancers as much as heredity did — he frequently used a line popularized by football legend Bobby Layne, a Dallas neighbor and friend of Mantle's who also died in part due to alcohol abuse: "If I'd known I was gonna live this long, I'd have taken a lot better care of myself."[citation needed]

Mantle's wife and sons all completed treatment for alcoholism, and told him he needed to do the same. He checked into the Betty Ford Clinic on January 7, 1994, after being told by a doctor that his liver was so badly damaged, "Your next drink could be your last." Also helping Mantle to make the decision to go to the Betty Ford Clinic was Pat Summerall, a sportscaster who had played for the New York Giants football team while they played at Yankee Stadium, and was now a recovering alcoholic and a member of the same Dallas-area country club as Mantle.

Shortly after completing treatment, his son Billy died on March 12, at age 36, of heart trouble, brought on by years of substance abuse. Despite the fears of those who knew him that this tragedy would send him back to drinking, he remained sober. Mickey Jr. later died of liver cancer on December 20, 2000, at age 47. Danny later battled prostate cancer.

Mantle spoke with great remorse of his drinking in a 1994 Sports Illustrated cover story. [1] He said that he was telling the same old stories, and realizing how much of them involved himself and others being drunk, and he decided they weren't funny anymore. He admitted he had often been cruel and hurtful to family, friends and fans because of his alcoholism, and sought to make amends. He became a born-again Christian thanks to his former teammate Bobby Richardson, an ordained Baptist minister who shared his faith with him. After the bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City on April 19, 1995, he joined with fellow Oklahoman and Yankee legend Bobby Murcer to raise money for the victims.

Mantle received a liver transplant at Baylor University Medical Center in Dallas, on June 8, 1995, after his liver had been damaged by years of chronic alcoholism, cirrhosis and hepatitis C. In July, he had recovered enough to deliver a press conference at Baylor, and noted that many fans had looked to him as a role model. "This is a role model: Don't be like me," he said. He also established the Mickey Mantle Foundation to raise awareness for organ donations. Soon, he was back in the hospital, where it was found that his liver cancer spread throughout his body.

Mickey Mantle died on August 13, 1995, at Baylor University Medical Center in Dallas. He was 63 years old. During the first Yankee home game after Mantle's passing, Eddie Layton played "Somewhere Over the Rainbow" on the Hammond organ at Yankee Stadium because Mickey had once told him it was his favorite song. The Yankees played the rest of the season with black mourning bands topped by a small number 7 on their left sleeves.

Mantle was interred in the Sparkman-Hillcrest Memorial Park Cemetery in Dallas. In eulogizing Mantle, sportscaster Bob Costas described him as "a fragile hero to whom we had an emotional attachment so strong and lasting that it defied logic." Costas added: "In the last year of his life, Mickey Mantle, always so hard on himself, finally came to accept and appreciate the distinction between a role model and a hero. The first, he often was not. The second, he always will be. And, in the end, people got it

On Mickey Mantle Day, June 8, 1969, in addition to the retirement of his uniform number 7, Mantle was given a plaque that would hang on the center field wall at Yankee Stadium, near the monuments to Babe Ruth, Lou Gehrig and Miller Huggins. The plaque was given to him by Joe DiMaggio, and Mantle then gave DiMaggio a similar plaque, telling the crowd, "His should be just a little bit higher than mine." When Yankee Stadium was reopened in 1976 following its renovation, the plaques and monuments were moved to Monument Park, behind the left-center field fence. Shortly before his death, Mantle videotaped a message to be played on Old-Timers' Day, which he was too ill to attend. He said, "When I die, I wanted on my tombstone, 'A great teammate.' But I didn't think it would be this soon." The words were indeed carved on the plaque marking his resting place at the family mausoleum in Dallas. On August 25, 1996, about a year after his death, Mantle's Monument Park plaque was replaced with a monument, bearing the words "A great teammate" and keeping a phrase that had been included on the original plaque: "A magnificent Yankee who left a legacy of unequaled courage."

Mantle and former teammate Whitey Ford were elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame together in 1974, Mantle in his first year of eligibility, Ford in his second.

Beginning in 1997, the Topps Baseball Card company retired the card #7 in its' base sets in tribute to Mantle, whose career was taking off just as Topps began producing baseball cards. Mantle's cards, especially his rookie card, were extremely popular. Though Topps un-retired the #7 in 2006, the number is reserved for cards of Mantle, remade with each year's design.

In 1999, "The Sporting News" placed Mantle at 17th on its list "The 100 Greatest Baseball Players." That same year, he was one of 100 nominees for the Major League Baseball All-Century Team, and was chosen by fan balloting as one of the team's outfielders. ESPN's "SportsCentury" series that ran in 1999 ranked him No. 37 on its "50 Greatest Athletes" series.

In 2006, Mantle was featured on a United States postage stamp [6]. The stamp is one of a series of four honoring baseball sluggers, the others being Mel Ott, Roy Campanella and Hank Greenberg.

Notes for WILLIAM JOHN ROBERT CAVENDISH:

William John Robert Cavendish, Marquess of Hartington (December 10, 1917 – September 10, 1944) was the eldest son of Edward Cavendish, 10th Duke of Devonshire and the husband of Kathleen Kennedy, sister of American President John F. Kennedy.

Hartington married Kathleen Kennedy on 6 May 1944 in London. Four months later he was killed in action by a sniper in Belgium while serving as a major in the Coldstream Guards. His place in the line of succession was taken by his younger brother Lord Andrew Cavendish, later 11th Duke of Devonshire.

Notes for KATHLEEN AGNES KENNEDY:

Kathleen Kennedy Cavendish, Marchioness of Hartington (February 20, 1920 – May 13, 1948), born Kathleen Agnes Kennedy, was the second daughter of Joseph P. Kennedy, Sr. and a sister of U.S. President John F. Kennedy.

When President Franklin D. Roosevelt appointed Joseph Kennedy ambassador to the Court of St. James's, his daughter Kathleen spent a year and a half living in London. Beautiful and spirited, she was named the "most exciting debutante of 1938." In 1943 she returned to England to work in a center for servicemen set up by the Red Cross. Despite the opposition of her intensely Catholic mother[citation needed], on May 6, 1944, Kathleen Kennedy, known to friends as "Kick", married William Cavendish, Marquess of Hartington, a Protestant and the eldest son and heir of the 10th Duke of Devonshire (who died while being attended by serial killer John Bodkin Adams). Four months later, he was killed by a German sniper in World War II. (Billy Hartington's younger brother, Andrew, married to Deborah Mitford, became heir to the Dukedom.) Lady Hartington's mother, Rose Kennedy, reportedly interpreted her son-in-law's death as retribution from God[citation needed].

Popular on the London social circuit and admired by many for her high spirits — though more traditional members of British society found fault with her boisterousness — the dashing young widow eventually became the mistress of Peter Wentworth-FitzWilliam, 8th Earl FitzWilliam[citation needed]. The couple planned to wed after FitzWilliam's planned divorce[citation needed]. Instead, while on a trip to visit Joseph Kennedy Sr. and gain his blessing for their relationship, both Lord FitzWilliam and Lady Hartington died in an airplane crash over Sainte-Bauzille, Ardèche, France.

Only her father represented the Kennedy family at her funeral. Her mother, Rose, declined to attend because of Kathleen's intentions to marry outside the Catholic church. It is said that Rose Kennedy also discouraged Kathleen's siblings from attending for the same reason[citation needed]. Rose apparently forgave Kathleen not long thereafter, and in 1951, was delighted that her first grandchild, Robert F. Kennedy's daughter, Kathleen Hartington Kennedy, was named after her late daughter.

Kathleen Agnes Kennedy is buried in the Cavendish family plot at Saint Peter's Church, Edensor, near Chatsworth in Derbyshire. Among the wreaths that covered her coffin was one with a handwritten note from Winston Churchill[citation needed]. The gymnasium at Manhattanville College is named in her honor.

Notes for MAURICE HAROLD MACMILLAN:

Maurice Harold Macmillan, 1st Earl of Stockton, OM, PC (10 February 1894 – 29 December 1986) was a British Conservative politician and Prime Minister of the United Kingdom from 1957 to 1963. Nicknamed 'Supermac', he did not use his first name and was known as Harold Macmillan before elevation to the peerage. When asked what represented the greatest challenge for a statesman, Macmillan replied: "Events, my dear boy, events".[

Harold Macmillan was born at 52 Cadogan Place in Chelsea, London, England to Maurice Crawford Macmillan (1853-1936) and Helen (Nellie) Artie Tarleton Belles (1856-1937). His paternal grandfather, Daniel MacMillan (1813-1857), was the son of a Scottish crofter who founded Macmillan Publishers.

Macmillan was first educated at Summer Fields School and then at Eton but was expelled - according to Woodrow Wyatt - for buggery, though an alternative version is that he left due to illness.[3] He also attended Balliol College, Oxford, although he only completed two years of his classics degree before the outbreak of the First World War.

Macmillan served with distinction as a captain in the Grenadier Guards during the war and was wounded on three occasions. During the Battle of the Somme, he spent an entire day wounded and lying in a foxhole with a bullet in his pelvis, reading the Greek writer Aeschylus in the original language.[4] Macmillan lost so many of his fellow students during the war that afterwards he refused to return to Oxford, saying the university would never be the same.

## [edit] Marriage

Macmillan married Lady Dorothy Cavendish, daughter of Victor Cavendish, 9th Duke of Devonshire on 21 April 1920. Her great-uncle was Spencer Cavendish, 8th Duke of Devonshire, who was leader of the Liberal Party in the 1870s, and a close colleague of William Ewart Gladstone, Joseph Chamberlain and Lord Salisbury. Lady Dorothy was also descended from William Cavendish, 4th Duke of Devonshire, who served as Prime Minister from 1756-1757 in communion with Newcastle and Pitt the Elder. Between 1929 and 1935 Lady Dorothy had a long affair with the Conservative politician Robert Boothby, in full public view of Westminster and established society. Boothby was widely rumoured to have been the father of Macmillan's youngest daughter Sarah. The stress caused by this may have contributed to Macmillan's nervous breakdown in 1931. [5] Lady Dorothy died on 21 May 1966, aged 65.

[edit] Brother-in-law

On 26 November 1950, Lady Dorothy's brother Edward Cavendish, the 10th Duke of Devonshire had a heart attack and died in the presence of John Bodkin Adams, the suspected serial killer. 13 days before, Mrs Edith Alice Morrell, another patient of Adams, had also died. Adams was tried in 1957 for her murder but controversially acquitted. Political interference has been suspected[6][7] and indeed, the case was prosecuted by a member of Macmillan's cabinet, Sir Reginald Manningham-Buller. Home office pathologist Francis Camps linked Adams to 163 suspicious deaths in total.[8]

## [edit] Political career (1924-1957)

Elected to the House of Commons in 1924 for Stockton-on-Tees, Macmillan lost his seat in 1929, only to return in 1931. He spent the 1930s on the backbenches, with his anti-appeasement ideals and sharp criticism of Stanley Baldwin and Neville Chamberlain serving to isolate him.

During this time (1938) he published the first edition of his book The Middle Way, which advocated a broadly centrist political philosophy both domestically and internationally.

In the Second World War he at last attained office, serving in the wartime coalition government in the Ministry of Supply and the Colonial Ministry before attaining real power upon being sent to North Africa in 1942 as British government representative to the Allies in the Mediterranean. During this assignment Macmillan worked closely with US General Dwight Eisenhower, a friendship that would prove crucial in his later career.

Macmillan returned to England after the war and was Secretary of State for Air for two months in 1945. He lost his seat in the landslide Labour victory that year, but soon returned to Parliament in a November 1945 by-election in Bromley. With the Conservative victory in 1951 he became Minister of Housing under Winston Churchill and fulfilled his conference promise to build 300,000 houses per year. He then served as Minister of Defence from October 1954. By this time he had lost the wire-rimmed glasses, toothy grin and brylcreemed hair of wartime photographs, and instead grew his hair thick and glossy, had his teeth capped and walked with the ramrod bearing of a former Guards officer - acquiring the distinguished appearance of his later career.

He then served as Foreign Secretary in April-December 1955 and Chancellor of the Exchequer 1955-1957 under Anthony Eden. In the latter job he insisted that Eden's de facto deputy Rab Butler not be treated as senior to him, and threatened resignation until he was allowed to cut bread and milk subsidies. During the Suez Crisis, according to Shadow Chancellor Harold Wilson, MacMillan was "First In, First Out" : first very supportive of the invasion, then a prime mover in Britain's withdrawal in the wake of the financial crisis.

Harold Macmillan became Prime Minister and leader of the Conservative Party after Eden's resignation in January 1957, surprising observers with his appointment over the favourite, Rab Butler. He was nicknamed Supermac by cartoonist Victor 'Vicky' Weisz. It was intended as mockery, but backfired, coming to be used in a neutral or friendly fashion. Weisz tried to label him with other names, including "Mac the Knife" at the time of widespread cabinet changes in 1962, but none of these caught on.[citation needed]

## [edit] Prime Minister (1957-1963)

## [edit] Government

The situation with Suez was so desperate that when Macmillan became Prime Minister on 10 January he told Queen Elizabeth II he could not guarantee his government would last "six weeks".[9] Macmillan went on to fill government posts with 35 family members, 7 of whom sat in Cabinet. [10] When Andrew Cavendish, 11th Duke of Devonshire, was later appointed (Minister for Colonial Affairs from 1963 to 1964 amongst other positions) he described his uncle's behaviour as "the greatest act of nepotism ever".[11]

## [edit] Election victory (1959)

Macmillan led the Conservatives to victory in the October 1959 general election, increasing his party's majority from 67 to 107 seats. The successful campaign was based on the economic improvements achieved, the slogan "Life's Better Under the Conservatives" was matched by Macmillan's own remark, "indeed let us be frank about it - most of our people have never had it so good." [12], usually paraphrased as "You've never had it so good".

Critics contended that the actual economic growth rate was weak and distorted by increased defence spending.[citation needed]

## [edit] Independent nuclear deterrent

A succession of prime ministers since the Second World War war had been determined to persuade the Americans to share the secret of their nuclear weapons with Britain.

Macmillan believed that, if Britain could develop an H-bomb on the scale of the Americans', they would treat it as an equal and form an alliance. This led the British government and its armed forces to increase demands on Windscale, Britain's first nuclear power plant, to produce increasing amounts of material for an H-bomb. As a result of these demands, the safety margins of the radioactive materials inside the reactor were being eroded. This led to an accident on the night of 10 October 1957 when a fire ripped through the radioactive materials in the core of Windscale's reactor. Nuclear contaminants travelled up a chimney where a filter blocked some but not all of the contaminated material and a radioactive cloud spread over the UK and Europe.

Scientists had warned of the dangers of such an accident for some time but Macmillan covered up the reasons for the accident, blaming workers for "an error of judgement" rather than pressure from his government to produce even more nuclear material (Windscale: Britain's biggest nuclear disaster broadcast on Monday, 8 October, 2007, at 2100 BST on BBC Two).

Following the technical failures of a British independent nuclear deterrent with the Blue Streak and the Blue Steel projects, and the unilateral cancellation of the Skybolt missile system by US Defence Secretary Robert McNamara, Macmillan negotiated the delivering of American Polaris missiles to the UK under the Nassau agreement in December 1962. (Previously he had agreed to base 60 Thor missiles in Britain under joint control, and since late 1957 the

American McMahon Act had been eased to allow Britain more access to nuclear technology. These negotiations were the basis for Peter Cook's satire of Macmillan in Beyond the Fringe).

Macmillan was a force in the successful negotiations leading to the signing of the 1962 Partial Test Ban Treaty by the United Kingdom, the United States and the Soviet Union. His previous attempt to create an agreement at the May 1960 summit in Paris had collapsed due to the U-2 Crisis of 1960.

## [edit] Economy

Macmillan's One Nation approach to the economy was to seek high or full employment. This contrasted with his mainly monetarist Treasury ministers who argued that the support of sterling required strict controls on money and hence an unavoidable rise in unemployment. Their advice was rejected and in January 1958 the three Treasury ministers Peter Thorneycroft, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Nigel Birch, Economic Secretary to the Treasury, and Enoch Powell, the Financial Secretary to the Treasury, resigned. Macmillan, away on a tour of the Commonwealth, brushed aside this incident as "a little local difficulty".

Macmillan brought the monetary concerns of the Exchequer into office; the economy was his prime concern. However, Britain's balance of payments problems led to the imposition of a wage freeze in 1961 and, amongst other factors, this caused the government to lose popularity and a series of by-elections in March 1962. Fearing for his own position, he organised a major Cabinet change in July 1962 - also named "the night of long knives" as a symbol of his alleged betrayal of the Conservative party. Eight junior Ministers were sacked at the same time. The Cabinet changes were widely seen as a sign of panic, and the young Liberal MP Jeremy Thorpe said of Macmillan's dismissal of so many of his colleagues, "greater love hath no man than this, than to lay down his friends for his life".

Macmillan supported the creation of the National Incomes Commission as a means to institute controls on income as part of his growth-without-inflation policy. A further series of subtle indicators and controls were also introduced during his premiership.

## [edit] Foreign policy

Macmillan also took close control of foreign policy. He worked to narrow the post-Suez rift with the United States, where his wartime friendship with Dwight D. Eisenhower was key; the two had a productive conference in Bermuda as early as March 1957. The cordial relationship remained after the election of John F. Kennedy.

Macmillan's term saw the first phase of the African independence movement, beginning with the granting of independence to the Gold Coast, as Ghana, in 1957. His celebrated "wind of change" speech (February 1960) is considered a landmark in this process. Ghana and Malaya were granted independence in 1957, Nigeria in 1960 and Kenya in 1963. However in the Middle East Macmillan ensured Britain remained a force, intervening over Iraq in 1958 and 1960 and becoming involved in the affairs of Oman.

In 1956, Soviet leader Nikita Khrushchev twice interrupted a speech by Macmillan at the United Nations by shouting out "we will bury you" and pounding his desk. Macmillan famously replied, "I should like that to be translated if he wants to say anything". [13]

## [edit] Europe

Macmillan saw the value of rapprochement with Europe and sought belated entry to the European Economic Community (EEC). But Britain's application to join the EEC was vetoed by Charles de Gaulle (29 January 1963); in part due to de Gaulle's fear that "the end would be a colossal Atlantic Community dependent on America" and in part in anger at the Anglo-American nuclear deal.

He also explored the possibility of a European Free Trade Area (EFTA).

[edit] Retirement and death (1963-1986)

The Profumo affair of spring and summer 1963 permanently damaged the credibility of Macmillan's government. He survived a Parliamentary vote with a majority of 69, one less than had been thought necessary for his survival, and was afterwards joined in the smoking-room only by his son and son-in-law, not by any Cabinet minister. Nonetheless, Butler and Maudling (who was very popular with backbench MPs at that time) declined to push for his resignation, especially after a tide of support from Conservative activists around the country.

However, the affair may have exacerbated Macmillan's ill-health. He was taken ill on the eve of the Conservative Party conference, diagnosed incorrectly with inoperable prostate cancer. Consequently, he resigned on 18 October 1963. He was succeeded by the Foreign Secretary Alec Douglas-Home in a controversial move; it was alleged that Macmillan had pulled strings and utilised the party's grandees, nicknamed "The Magic Circle", to ensure that Butler was not chosen as his successor.

Macmillan initially refused a peerage and retired from politics in September 1964. He did, however, accept the distinction of the Order of Merit from the Queen. After retiring, he took up the chairmanship of his family's publishing house, Macmillan Publishers. He then brought out a six-volume autobiography; the read was described by his political enemy Enoch Powell as inducing "a sensation akin to that of chewing on cardboard". His wartime diaries, published after his death, were much better received.

Over the next 20 years or so Macmillan made the occasional political intervention, particularly after Margaret Thatcher became Tory leader and Macmillan's premiership came under attack from the monetarists in the party. Responding to a remark made by Harold Wilson about not having boots in which to go to school, Macmillan retorted: "If Mr Wilson did not have boots to go to school, it is because he was too big for them!"[citation needed]

Macmillan is commonly thought to have likened Thatcher's policy of privatisation to "selling the family silver". In fact what he did say (at a dinner of the Tory Reform Group at the Royal Overseas League on 8 November 1985) was that the sale of assets was commonplace amongst individuals or states when they encountered financial difficulties: "First of all the Georgian silver goes. And then all that nice furniture that used to be in the salon. Then the Canalettos go." Profitable parts of the steel industry and the railways had been privatised, along with British Telecom: "They were like two Rembrandts still left."[14] Macmillan's speech was much commented on and a few days later Macmillan made a speech in the House of Lords to clarify what he had meant:

When I ventured the other day to criticise the system I was, I am afraid, misunderstood. As a Conservative, I am naturally in favour of returning into private ownership and private management all those means of production and distribution which are now controlled by state capitalism. I am sure they will be more efficient. What I ventured to question was the using of these huge sums as if they were income.[15]

In 1984 he finally accepted a peerage and was created Earl of Stockton and Viscount Macmillan of Ovenden. In the last month of his life, he observed:

"Sixty-three years ago ... the unemployment figure (in Stockton-on-Tees) was then 29%. Last November ... the unemployment (there) is 28%. A rather sad end to one's life."

Macmillan died at Birch Grove in Sussex in 1986 aged 92 years and 322 days — the greatest age attained by a British Prime Minister until surpassed by James Callaghan on 14 February 2005.

## Notes for JOHN CAVENDISH LYTTELTON:

John Cavendish Lyttelton, 9th Viscount Cobham KCB (23 October 1881 – 31 July 1949), was a British peer, soldier and Conservative politician.

Cobham was the eldest son of Charles Lyttelton, 8th Viscount Cobham, and the Hon. Mary Susan Caroline Cavendish. Alfred Lyttelton was his uncle. He was educated at Eton. Like his fathe and his uncle, Cobham was a successful cricketer. He represented Worcestershire County Cricket Club in three first-class matches during 1924-5. He was President of Marylebone Cricket Club in 1935, again emulating his father and uncle. He served with the Rifle Brigade in the Second Boer War and from 1905 to 1908 he was Aide-de-Camp to the High Commissioner to South Africa.

Cobham was elected to the House of Commons for Droitwich in the January 1910 general election, a seat he held until 1916. During the First World War he fought at Gallipoli and in Egypt, the Sinai and Palestine, achieving the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel. He succeeded his father as ninth Viscount Cobham in 1922 and entered the House of Lords. In 1939 he was appointed Under-Secretary of State for War in the government of Neville Chamberlain, a position he retained until May 1940. Apart from his political and military career he was also Lord Lieutenant of Worcestershire from 1923 to 1949.

Lord Cobham married Violet, daughter of Charles Leonard, in 1908. He died in July 1949, aged 67, and was succeeded in his titles by his son Charles, who later served as Governor-General of New Zealand. Lady Cobham died in 1966.

### Notes for CHARLES JOHN LYTTELTON:

Charles John Lyttelton, 10th Viscount Cobham, KG, GCMG, GCVO, TD, PC (8 August 1909 – 20 March 1977) was a New Zealand political figure and English cricketer. He was born in Kensington, London, and educated at Eton College. He died in Marylebone, also London. He was cousin of the musician Humphrey Lyttelton.

He served as the Governor-General of New Zealand between 1957 and 1962. During this period, Samoa gained independence. Lyttelton was thus the last New Zealand Governor of Samoa.

Lyttelton enjoyed a fairly substantial career in first-class cricket, playing more than 90 times for Worcestershire in the 1930s and captaining the club between 1936 and 1939.

He made his first-class debut against Gloucestershire in June 1932, but made a duck in his only innings and did not reappear for two years. He played five times in 1934, but it was only the following season that he became established in the side, playing about twenty matches a year from then until the Second World War, with the exception of 1937 when he appeared only twice.

Lyttelton's highest score (and only first-class century) was the 162 he made against Leicestershire in 1938, but he made many other useful if lesser contributions with the bat, reaching fifty on 14 further occasions. His most productive year was 1938, when he scored 741 runs at an average of 21.17.

With the ball, his first victim (in July 1934) was Charlie Barnett, while in 1935 he produced his best innings' bowling, claiming 4-83 against the South Africans. However, after 1935 his bowling became a largely occasional part of his game, and with the exception of nine wickets in 1938 he never again took more than three in a season.

Lyttelton's cricketing career proper ended with the outbreak of war, but (now listed on the scorecard as Lord Cobham, having succeeded to the title in 1949) he played for an "MCC New Zealand Touring Team" against a strong "London New Zealand Club" side in 1954, taking two wickets including that of Bill Merritt. Remarkably, however, he made a one-off return to first-class action aged 51 in February 1961, more than two decades after his previous appearance at that level, when as New Zealand Governor-General he captained an eponymous side against MCC at Auckland; he showed he still had ability with a handy first-innings 44 from number ten in the order.

As well as the matches mentioned above, Lyttelton also played ten games for MCC: one against Oxford University in 1935, and nine on MCC's tour of Australia and New Zealand during the winter that followed.

A number of his relatives played first-class cricket. His great-grandfather George played for Cambridge University in the 1830s, his grandfather (also Charles) turned out for a selection of teams including Cambridge and MCC in the 1860s, his father John made a handful of appearances for Worcestershire in the 1920s, and his uncle - another Charles - played for Worcestershire, Cambridge and MCC before the First World War.

## Notes for GEORGE WILLIAM LYTTELTON:

The Hon George William Lyttelton (6 January 1883 – 1 May 1962) was a British teacher and littérateur. Known in his lifetime as an inspiring teacher of classics and English literature at Eton, and an avid sportsman and sports writer, he became known to a wider audience with the posthumous publication of his letters, which became a literary success in the 1970s and 80s, and eventually ran to six volumes.

## Early life

Lyttelton was born at Hagley Hall in Worcestershire, the second son of Charles Lyttelton, 5th Baron Lyttelton and later 8th Viscount Cobham, and Mary Susan Caroline Cavendish (second daughter of the 2nd Baron Chesham). He was educated at Eton and Trinity College, Cambridge. He was a sporting young man, distinguishing himself at Eton's version of football,[1] and at cricket, in which he shared a second wicket partnership of 476 for A. C. Benson's XI v H. V. Macnaghten's XI (Eton, 1901), and played at Lord's in the Eton v Harrow matches of 1900 and 1901.[2]

At Trinity, Lyttelton was a distinguished shot put competitor, winning the event for Cambridge v Oxford three years in a row (1904, 37'7"; 1905, 37'11" and 1906, 38'3¾").[3][4] He was a less distinguished amateur musician: according to a contemporary university magazine, "When George Lyttelton practises the cello, all the cats in the district converge upon his rooms in the belief that one of their members is in distress."[5]

[edit] Adult life

After graduation he returned as a master to Eton, where his uncle Edward Lyttelton was headmaster from 1905 to 1916. He married Pamela Marie Adeane, daughter of Charles Robert Whorwood Adeane and Madeline Pamela Constance Blanche Wyndham, on 3 April 1919. They had four daughters and one son – the latter being the celebrated jazz trumpeter and radio presenter Humphrey Lyttelton.

George Lyttelton's entire career was at Eton, from which he retired in 1945, having taught, among others, Aldous Huxley, George Orwell, Cyril Connolly, J. B. S. Haldane, and John Bayley. Lyttelton taught mostly classics in the fifth form, but became known for his optional course of English as "extra studies" for senior specialists.[6] The biographer Philip Ziegler said of him:

George Lyttelton was one of the greatest of English schoolmasters. He was wise and tolerant; his massive presence ensured a dignity which his fine sense of the ridiculous alleviated without diminishing; he cared passionately about good writing and communicated that passion to his pupils.[7] Another former pupil wrote:

From that study we staggered with our arms full of books, Wells and Hemingway, Milton and Dr Johnson, Henry James and George Moore, our minds fired by his enthusiasm and wise advice, our shoulders tingling from the squeeze of his mighty hand as he guided us through the bookshelves. We think of him... majestically immobile as he umpired in the Field, and he was the best of them all in ruling the game and in writing about it afterwards; or... those brilliant expositions of the reading or writing of English where he achieved the perfect artistry of teaching; or at his Old Boy dinners, enveloped in a vast and aging dinner-jacket, delivering with commendable timing a string of improbable stories about his large family or the more obscure annals of Suffolk agricultural life.[8]

Lyttelton was a member of the Johnson Club and The Literary Society in London, and of the Marylebone Cricket Club.[9] Between the wars, he contributed The Times's reports on the Eton and Harrow matches, usually anonymously, but in 1929 on the occasion of the hundredth match his tour d'horizon of the series appeared under his name.[10] His reports were later described in The Times as the best prose of their time.[11]

In 1945 Lyttelton retired from Eton and moved to Grundisburgh, Suffolk, where he died at age 79.[6]

## [edit] Legacy

Lyttelton co-edited an anthology, An Eton Poetry Book, in 1925, which was well-received, [12] but his life would not have come to the notice of the wider world were it not for his weekly correspondence with a former pupil, Rupert Hart-Davis, which lasted from 1955 until Lyttelton's death in 1962. This correspondence, published after Lyttelton's death as The Lyttelton/Hart-Davis Letters, was an immediate literary success and eventually ran to six volumes. Reviewers contrasted Hart-Davis's weekly accounts of a busy urban life with Lyttelton's detached, and often humorous, observations from his retirement in Suffolk.[7] The Daily Telegraph said of them "In a hundred years' time, I suspect, the letters will be read with as much pleasure as they are today.... This is a book one could go on quoting forever."

In 2002 Lyttelton's commonplace book was edited and published, confirming how broad his literary interests were, ranging from Greek and Latin classics to quirky advertisements and press cuttings – not all of them fit for publication, as his son Humphrey makes clear in the foreword to the commonplace book

Notes for HUMPHREY RICHARD ADEANE LYTTELTON:

Humphrey Richard Adeane Lyttelton (23 May 1921 – 25 April 2008),[1][2] also known as Humph, was an English jazz musician and broadcaster, and chairman of the BBC radio programme I'm Sorry I Haven't a Clue.[3] He was a cousin of the 10th Viscount Cobham and a great-nephew of the politician and sportsman Alfred Lyttelton, who was the first man to represent England at both football and cricket.

### Early life and career

Lyttelton was born at Eton College, Buckinghamshire, where his father, George William Lyttelton (second son of the 8th Viscount Cobham), was a house master.[4] (As a male-line descendent of Charles Lyttelton, Lyttelton was

in remainder to both the Viscountcy Cobham and the Barony of Lyttelton.) From Sunningdale Preparatory School, Lyttelton duly progressed to Eton College. At Eton, Lyttelton fagged for Lord Carrington and formed his love of jazz. He was inspired by the trumpeters Louis Armstrong and Nat Gonella. He taught himself the instrument, and formed a quartet at the school in 1936 that included the future journalist Ludovic Kennedy on drums.

After leaving school, Lyttelton spent some time at the Port Talbot steel plate works in South Wales, an experience which led to him becoming what he termed a "romantic socialist". After being called up for war service, he served in the Grenadier Guards, being commissioned as a second lieutenant on 29 November 1941,[5] and seeing action at Salerno during Operation Avalanche when he came ashore with his pistol in one hand, and his trumpet in the other.[4] On VE Day, 8 May 1945, Lyttelton joined in the celebrations by playing his trumpet from a wheelbarrow, inadvertently giving his first broadcast performance; the BBC recording still survives. Following demobilisation after World War II, he attended Camberwell Art College for two years.

In 1949, he joined the Daily Mail as a cartoonist, where he remained until 1956. Several of his cartoons have recently been on display in various branches of the Abbey National bank, as part of their new advertising campaign.[citation needed] He was one of the collaborators with Wally Fawkes on the long running cartoon strip Flook.

#### [edit] The jazzman

In the late 1940s and early 1950s Lyttelton was prominent in the British revival of traditional jazz forms from New Orleans, recording with Sidney Bechet in 1949. To do so he had to break with the Musicians' Union restrictive practices which forbade working with jazz musicians from the United States. In 1956, he had his only hit, with the Joe Meek-produced recording of "Bad Penny Blues", which was in the UK Singles Chart for six weeks. As the trad jazz movement (not quite the same thing as revivalism) developed, Lyttelton moved to a mainstream approach favoured by American musicians such as trumpeter Buck Clayton; they recorded together in the early 1960s and Clayton considered himself and Lyttelton to be brothers.

By now his repertoire had expanded, including not only lesser known Ellington pieces, but even "The Champ" from Dizzy Gillespie's band book. The Lyttelton band — he saw himself primarily as a leader — helped develop the careers of many now prominent British musicians, including Tony Coe and Alan Barnes

In 2001, Lyttelton and his band added traditional jazz elements to the Radiohead song "Life in a Glasshouse" on the Amnesiac album.

On 11 March 2008, he announced that he would cease presenting BBC Radio 2's "Best of Jazz", after 40 years.[6]

On 23 July 2008, Lyttelton was posthumously named as BBC Radio 2 Jazz Artist Of The Year, voted by radio listeners.[7]

#### [edit] The Humphrey Lyttelton Band

Humphrey Lyttelton's eight-piece band featured, aside from himself on the trumpet and clarinet: Ray Wordsworth on the trombone; Jimmy Hastings on the alto sax, clarinet and flute; Jo Fooks on the tenor saxophone and flute; Rob Fowler on the tenor sax, baritone sax and clarinet; Ted Beament on the piano; John Rees-Jones on the double bass and Adrian Macintosh on the drums.

The band maintained a busy schedule, performing (frequently sell-out) shows across the country. Performances occasionally included a guest singer, or a collaboration with another band. During the 1990s the band toured with Helen Shapiro in a series of Humph and Helen concerts. They also featured in several Giants of British Jazz tours with Acker Bilk and George Melly and John Chilton's Feetwarmers.

Lyttelton had a long established professional relationship with UK singer Elkie Brooks. After working together in the early sixties they rekindled their working partnership in early 2000 with a series of sold out and well received concert performances. They released the critically acclaimed album Trouble in Mind in 2003 and continued to perform occasional concerts in support of this work.

#### [edit] Radio personality

From 1967 until April 2007, Lyttelton presented The Best of Jazz on BBC Radio 2, a programme which featured his idiosyncratic mix of top-quality recordings of all ages, including current material. In 2007 Lyttelton chose to cut his commitment to two quarterly seasons per year, in order to spend more time on other projects.

In 1972 he was chosen to host the comedy panel game I'm Sorry I Haven't a Clue on BBC Radio 4. The show was originally devised as a comedic antidote to traditional BBC panel games (both radio and television), which had

come to be seen as dull and formulaic, and in keeping with the staid middle-class "Auntie Beeb" image. Lyttelton continued in this role until shortly before his death, and was famed both for his deadpan, disgruntled, and occasionally bewildered style of chairmanship, and for his near-the-knuckle double entendres which, despite always being open to an innocent interpretation, went much further than most BBC pre-watershed humour. ISIHAC's success had considerable influence on the manner in which comedy was presented on radio, and Lyttelton's persona was a significant part of that success: he was a straight man surrounded by mayhem. At the time of his death, Lyttelton was the oldest active panel game host in the UK, being two and a half years older than his closest rival, Nicholas Parsons.[8]

On Tuesday 22 April 2008 Lyttelton and the I'm Sorry I Haven't a Clue team were due to appear in the stage version of the programme at the Pavilion Theatre in Bournemouth. Due to his indisposition, his place was taken by Rob Brydon, but a pre-recorded message from Lyttelton was played to the audience ("I'm sorry I can't be with you today as I am in hospital - I wish I'd thought of this sooner!"). The panellists on that night were Tim Brooke-Taylor, Graeme Garden, Barry Cryer and Jeremy Hardy.[9]

As well as his other activities, Lyttelton was a keen calligrapher and President of The Society for Italic Handwriting.[10] He named his own record label "Calligraph" after this extracurricular interest. This label, founded in the early 1980s, not only issues his own albums and those of associates, but also re-issues (on CD) his analogue recordings for the Parlophone label in the 1950s. He is reported to have turned down a knighthood in 1995.[11]

#### [edit] Illness and death

On 18 April 2008 Jon Naismith, the producer of I'm Sorry I Haven't A Clue, announced the cancellation of the upcoming spring series of ISIHAC owing to Humphrey Lyttelton's hospitalisation to repair an aortic aneurysm. Rob Brydon and others were asked to deputise for Lyttelton during the tour shows, but Lyttelton postponed his operation and managed to perform on all but the last night. A further email on 21 April 2008 reported that the BBC were "unclear precisely how long Humph's recovery period will be" but Lyttelton was "otherwise fine and in very good spirits".[12] Lyttelton died peacefully following his surgery on 25 April 2008 with his family around him.[1][2] BBC Radio 4 broadcast a 1995 episode of I'm Sorry I Haven't a Clue as a tribute on Sunday 27 April, and a retrospective programme presented by Kenneth Clarke on Wednesday 30 April 2008. Radio 4 celebrated Humphrey Lyttelton Day on Sunday 15 June 2008, including a new profile of ISIHAC by Stephen Fry called Chairman Humph - A Tribute[1].

After his death, the controller of Radio 4, Mark Damazer, said: "He's just a colossally good broadcaster and possessed of this fantastic sense of timing. [...] It's a very, very sad day but we should celebrate and be very grateful for how much he did for Radio 4, really terrific."[2]

Responding to news of Lyttelton's death, Radiohead guitarist Jonny Greenwood wrote on the band's blog Dead Air Space: "We were all sorry to hear of Humphrey Lyttelton's death - he was an inspiring person to record with, and without his direction, we'd never have recorded/released Life in a Glasshouse. So go and find "Bad Penny Blues", and celebrate his life with some hot jazz."[13]

Lyttelton was survived by his four children: a daughter from his first marriage to Pat Braithwaite, and two sons and a daughter from his second marriage to Jill Richardson. Richardson, to whom he had been married since 1952, predeceased him in 2006.

# Notes for LAWRENCE JOHN LUMLEY DUNDAS:

Laurence John Lumley Dundas, 2nd Marquess of Zetland KG GCSI GCIE PC (11 June 1876-6 February 1971), known as Lord Dundas from 1873 to 1892 and as the Earl of Ronaldshay from 1892 to 1929, was a British politician who served as Secretary of State for India in the late 1930s.

The 2nd Marquess's public career centred around India, first as Governor of Bengal during World War I, and subsequently as Secretary of State for India in the 1930s. Although a member of the Conservative Party, his belief was that Indians should be allowed to take ever-increasing responsibility for the government of the country, culminating in Dominion status (the status enjoyed by Canada, Australia, and other formally independent members of the British Empire). He played an important role in the protracted negotiations which led to the 1935 Government of India Act, which came as close as was possible, given the implacable opposition of Winston Churchill and the "diehards" to anything that might imperil direct British rule over India, to implementing these ideals, and was ideally placed as Secretary of State to implement them — although the two Viceroys with whom he served, Lords Willingdon and Linlithgow, were rather less idealistic than he. In the event Willingdon and Linlithgow were proved right when the Congress Party won the 1937 Provincial elections, much to the dismay of Zetland. Zetland's term as Secretary of State — and the experiment with democracy represented by the 1935 Act — came to an end with Churchill's assumption of the Prime Ministership in 1940: Zetland then offered his resignation, feeling that his ideas and Churchill's regarding India were so different that "I could only end by becoming an embarrassment to him."

Zetland was also a noted author: Rab Butler, who served under him in the India Office, records how, asking how he could understand better his chief's thinking about the future of India, received the answer: "Read my books!"

Notes for TERENCE ORBY CONRAN:

Sir Terence Orby Conran (born in Esher Surrey on October 4, 1931) is an English designer, restaurateur, retailer and writer.

Terence Conran's father was a business man who owned a rubber importation company in East London.

Conran was educated at Bryanston School in Dorset and Central Saint Martins College of Art and Design where he studied textiles. As a student Conran worked on the Festival of Britain on the main South Bank site.

Conran started his own design practice in 1956 with the Summa furniture range and designing a shop for Mary Quant. In 1964 he opened the first Habitat shop in Chelsea with his third wife Caroline Herbert, which grew into a large chain selling household goods and furniture in contemporary designs. In the mid-1980s Conran expanded Habitat into the Storehouse group of companies that included Mothercare and Heals but in 1990 he lost control of the company. His later retail companies include the Conran Shop.

He has also been involved in architecture and interior design, including London's Michelin House (which he turned into the restaurant Bibendum) and the Bluebird Garage both in Chelsea. Conran had a major role in the regeneration in the early 1990s of the Shad Thames area of London next to Tower Bridge that includes the Design Museum which is managed by the Conran Foundation.

Conran has also created various other London restaurants including the Soup Kitchen, Orrery, Quaglino's, Mezzo (restaurant), Pont de la Tour, Blueprint Cafe, Butler's Wharf Chop House, together with restaurants in various other countries. In 2005 he was named as the most influential restaurateur in the UK by CatererSearch, the website of Caterer and Hotelkeeper magazine. In 2007, 49% of the entire Conran restaurant business was sold to D&D, a company run by two former Conran employees, Des Gunewardena and David Loewi.[1]

He has written and published various books, particularly on interior design.

Conran was knighted in 1983.

Conran is a Fellow of the Chartered Society of Designers, and winner of the Minerva Medal, the Society's highest award.

Since 2003, he has been provost of the Royal College of Art. That was also the year he received the Prince Phillip Designers Prize, in recognition of his lifetime achievements in design.

The fashion designer Jasper Conran is his son with his second wife, the writer Shirley Conran. Other outstanding members of the family include Sebastian Conran (designer), Tom Conran (restaurateur), and daughter Sophie Conran (pies, and design). His youngest son, Edmund (known as Ned) has suffered from psychiatric problems, and has never achieved the status of his siblings; he was remanded in a secure unit in November 2001 after an assault on a tourist in London.

Conran and Caroline Herbert divorced in 1996; she settled for  $\pounds 6.2$  million out of his  $\pounds 80$  million assets. Although the court had acknowledged that she had more than 30 years made an outstanding contribution to the Habitat and restaurant businesses, the trial judge thought it "absurd" to suggest that she had played an equal role in the generation of wealth.

Conran's sister Priscilla is the wife of leading chef Antonio Carluccio who once worked for Conran.

Sir Terence and his wife, Vicki, live in London, Kintbury in Berkshire and France.

## Notes for SHIRLEY IDA PIERCE:

Shirley Conran (born September 21, 1932) is the ex-wife of British designer, restaurateur, retailer and writer Sir Terence Conran. She is the mother of designers Sebastian Conran and Jasper Conran. She is a bestselling author in her own right whose books include Lace and Superwoman.

She was educated at the University of Portsmouth.

Shirley Conran is well known for having said: "Life is too short to stuff a mushroom".

She was successfully treated for skin cancer several years ago.

She has homes in France and London. In addition to novel writing, she has been a columnist for Vanity Fair (magazine), women's editor of The Daily Mail newspaper and a feature writer for The Observer newspaper.

Jasper Conran (born on 12 December 1959.) is a leading English fashion designer. He is the son of the designer Sir Terence Conran and the author Shirley Conran.

He was educated at Bryanston School in the 1970s. He also studied in New York, USA, at the Parson's School of Art and Design.

Conran's first women's wear collection was in 1978, followed by his first menswear collection in 1985. In 1999 he designed crystal for Stuart Crystal and later china for Waterford Wedgwood. He has an exclusive range for the Debenhams chain of UK department stores.

His flagship store is in Sackville Street, Mayfair.

He was named Designer of the Year by the British Council in 1986.

Conran has recently broken Chiswick's house price record (west London) by buying Walpole House for £7,250,000. It is named after Thomas Walpole (occupied 1798-1803), nephew of Sir Robert Walpole the first Prime Minister of England.

He is openly gay[1], and at one time had a romantic relationship with the author Bruce Chatwin.[2]

He is a Patron of the Work-Life Balance Trust - of which his mother is President, and a Trustee of the Wallace Collection.

When I was thinking about writing this speech I thought a good place to start might be to come up with some words to describe my Mum. Here are the words: Courageous, compassionate, kind, caring, fun and ambitious. So here's some examples of those descriptions:

Courageous: There are so many instances of Mum's courage I wouldn't know where to begin so I'll give you a couple. One of them was her choosing to be a co – driver for my Dad when he was into 4 wheel driving. For those of you who don't know what 4 wheel driving is like it is extremely treacherous. Going up hills like this" vertically"....... And rolling the vehicle on a regular basis. She also played representative netball for Te Kawau and Manawatu Rep team for around 7 years when I was quite young. 1973 was her last year of Representative netball as she was to take up nursing in 1974.

Compassionate: I'm sure there are people all over NZ who would like to thank Mum for the care she's given them when they've been ill, or in hospital. I know that Mum was very much loved for the kindness and compassion she showed as a nurse and often had people telling her. She is also one of the first ports of call when one of us, family or friends, have a medical problem. I remember going with Mum to visit two guys who had muscular dystrophy when I was child and it was so obvious to me that she cared about them deeply.

Fun: Mum could be a little quirky and I guess knows how to create her own fun. We often had pretty hot cars when I was young and she was prone to the odd race off the lights with the boy racers. She is also a source of great fun for her grandchildren and likes to get stuck in with boating and sailing, travelling, tramping, whatever the latest endeavour.... I think it was just recently a trip to white island and it's been interspersed with trips to Vancouver Island, Brazil, Australia, to name a few. Most of which Maurie has tagged along with. I'm sure he's enjoyed it all but I get the feeling sometimes he might like it to be a little less busy!

Ambitious: This is definitely one I know you'd all agree with. Mum has a certain habit of getting what she wants. She is not to be thwarted. Sometimes one might call it blind ambition. For instance going in a running race at Foxton Beach when she was nearly full term with my younger brother Leighton. And she Won! Another time, we were in Australia with Andrew, my other brother (he was eight and I was nine) and after a long walk home mum could see our hotel on the other side of the river and figured we could save quite a lot of time by swimming across the river, in our clothes of course. Hang on, don't they always say not to swim with your clothes on! So we began our intrepid journey across the river. The water was deep, over our heads, I think Andrew might have been holding onto Mum's toes while she was swimming and I was doing my best but I can tell you it was a lot further than it looked. I don't think she tried anything like that again. Recently she took up photography with great gusto and has since won awards and cups for her efforts. I remember having a conversation with her where she said I get so pissed off that I don't know how to use Maurie's camera and he doesn't show me and I said something like. Why don't you read up about it mum, your perfectly capable. Within a year she was taking all of these amazing photos.

Kind and Caring: Mum is always kind and caring to everyone, from stranger to friend. She has been an awesome Grandmother to Jasmine, Oscar, William, Ella, Tom, Finlay, Georgina, Mia, Archie and the latest little Donovan and always tries to spread her love around. She has been an excellent Mother to me and my brothers and also to Mauries Family. And I know there have been many challenges along the way. She has faced each of them with her own determination. Ella: Nanny is nice to me she cuddles me and kisses me. My favourite time with Nanny was when we went to the hot pools and it was just me and William, Grandad and Nanny.So I hope I've given a snapshot of the Mum I know and that we all love and I'd like you to raise your glasses to toast that love.

## Carole's story

I was born in Palmerston North where I attended Palmerston North Girls High School. My younger years were spent first at Kopane School, then to Lytton Street School and later to Manchester Street School in Feilding. My work life has been varied between nursing and owning and operating a bookshop where I used to just love some of the images taken by skilled photographers. My first year at work in 1964 at the age of sixteen was at the Seed Testing Station in Palmerston North.

My upbringing included many trips to Taupo where I learnt to appreciate the great outdoors. My husband and I moved to Taupo in 2004 to enjoy a more relaxed lifestyle. I started taking an interest in photography after I attended a photography course in 2006 at Waiarikei Polytech and then an intermediate class in 2008. It has been a passion for around six years. In March 2012 I passed my licentiateship of the Photographic Society of New Zealand. I live in a beautiful place in the world and there is not a day goes by when I don't appreciate the richness that nature has blessed us with in this land of The Long White Cloud. Photography has taught me to look at the world with a new and exciting perspective. I have always taken family snapshots but it was not until 2006 after I bought a new digital camera, that I began trying to create some more exciting images. I celebrate every day that I can see and appreciate the images that play with the light on my journey through life. It is my goal to capture and record these images for everyone to enjoy.

My beliefs and assumptions as to what families are, are based on my childhood experiences. I grew up on a farm in the secure environment of a nuclear family and it didn't really occur to me that other types of families existed. These beliefs were reinforced by fairy tales, story books, the Royal Family and now more recently T.V. programmes such as The Brady Bunch. Home to me was a comfortable place to be and the nicest part of having a holiday was returning home. Therefore this picture of a family I drew in my mind consisted of a married couple who had around three children. They all lived in a three bedroom house and shared a common interest. It was fun to have visitors and culturally sound to provide a delicious afternoon tea when aunts, uncles, friends or grandparents visited. My bike pedals would turn a little faster as I rode home from school on the days we had visitors. This was not only to see who was there but also to share some of the "goodies" that were part of this ritual. My mother provided the afternoon tea

and most of the other meals. There was a certain amount of pride in providing the lightest scones or the highest sponge. The expectation that my mother or father would always be home when I arrived home from school is a far cry from the baby sitters my children came to know as a result of my profession. To come home from a day at school with not a soul to meet me was both scary and empty. Minutes would drag as I waited for the familiar family car to turn the last corner. I now have a much broader set of experiences and education which has changed the almost idyllic view I once held of family. The family in which I grew up had common interests and goals that we all shared.

Although I grew up on a farm where my parents worked hard there was also time for holidays. It was hard work getting all the hay made before the holidays and my father expected all able family members to form part of the working team. However the rewards were to come as we loaded up the car for a family holiday at the beach. This was usually a rented caravan or a batch at Foxton Beach. It was a time when parents got together with their friends and a few drinks while the kids made their own fun. At times the drinks would continue on too long and the kids felt a bit neglected.

My relatives lived in close proximity and made frequent visits to our family home. These get-togethers were often accompanied by a few drinks and I was aware at an early age of the detrimental effects of dependency on alcohol. There were periods of disruption which were related to drinking problems, overworking, illness within the family, addition of family members and possibly my own transition into adulthood which was a little stormy at times. I guess it was quite a relief for my parents when I left home at the age of 171/2 to live in the Nurses Hostel whilst training to be a nurse. This was to be the last time I would live at home as I married to years later at the age of 19 and a half.

Work was an important family value I was the oldest member of not only our nuclear family but also of all my cousins on my father's side. the high expectations placed on me became internalised. I had two younger brothers and because my parents were often outside milking the cows it was my responsibility to ensure the lunches were made, the washing was brought in and dinner was cooked. From quite a young age I was expected to help with the milking after I arrived home from school. I would never question these expectations as I was always out to please. Other parents would praise my ability and use me as an example when trying to get their own children to help out. I was seen as a very capable worker from an early age. I used my initiative even when my parents weren't home and became very independent. I respected my father's knowledge and personality. He always thought of great incentives to get everybody involved in working hard. Family roles overlapped to some extent with my mother and father both working on the farm. Stereotypical gender expectations had a strong influence in the overall responsibility of the domestic chores. Mum and I were left to do the majority of the housework in spite of helping outdoors.

My mother always provided lunches and morning and afternoon teas for the outdoor workers at haymaking or shearing time. This usually meant carting a billy full of tea to the paddock or shearing shed together with sandwiches and scones. I would help with the haymaking, tending the hay, pressing or lifting the bales onto the truck. In the shearing shed I would sort out the dags from the wool and fold the fleeces before putting them into the bale for pressing. I was the first born and this strongly influenced greater responsibility and expectations. I was doggedly determined and bossy as the older sister. My overpowering dominant nature was born from our family saying "Where there is a will there is a way". This motto I still treasure and therefore will not easily give up on what may seem an impossible task to some people. Another family motto is "If a jobs worth doing it's worth doing well". My father valued my assistance outdoors and his value of being able to "do-it-yourself" has often led to me rejecting male help. Men are often puzzled when I literally push my way into roles they think are beyond the female ability. I do not blame this traditional thinking on men as it is more to do with the socialisation of both men and women.

My youngest brother Grant arrived when I was ten. I remember the excitement of having a new baby brother to treasure. It was at this young age that I realised the responsibilities that came with caring for a baby. Disposable napkins had not been invented so many hours were spent washing drying and folding the many napkins. I was often the babysitter as there was no law about what age was legal to be responsible enough to mind a child.

My interest in outdoor sports such as athletics, netball, skiing, sailing, tramping and swimming are all related to the drive and competitive nature of our family. Dad would encourage us by taking part in many of these activities with us. I owned a pair of boot roller skates at the age of ten and still remember the joy of finding these at 4 am on Christmas morning. At the age of 12 I owned a pair of water skis which was a fairly elite sport in those days. My parents owned a launch and one of the old photos shows cousins, aunts and uncles all having a day out boating. This trend has continued within my own family and we have shared many adventurous experiences together including snorkelling,

skiing, white water rafting, and cycling. These experiences have influenced our confidence and enjoyment of many recreational activities. During my early teens my mother and father played golf while the kids were left at home with other kids our age to entertain ourselves. I would often start the milking alone when they were home a little late. My parents were generous with extra praise and payment on the times this occurred.

My parents both came from very different backgrounds. My mother was youngest in a family of four where the tears flowed freely. However my father was the eldest in a family of five boys where patriarchy ruled in an unquestioning manner. He was brought up in a strict Protestant environment where it was unacceptable to play sport on Sundays, Children were seen and not heard.

My mother was able to express her love, show tears, and sometimes "explode". My father never really expressed feelings of love and tenderness, however he was usually calm and patient and a good teacher. I believe I have inherited traits from both sides of my genetic pool. My mother lost her very dear and loving mother at the age of 22 and desperately sought to fill this gap from the man she married. My mother's sensitivity would often cause tears to flow but it was rare indeed to see a tear in my father's eye.

Coming from a nuclear family with parents who had married before having a family had a strong influence on my decision to get married. This was the fairy tale we were taught from a young age. I married Kerry Grant on 3rd December 1966 at the age of 19 and a half. It was a very happy day. Many couples as they walk down the isle have fixed in their minds this rosy picture of the life ahead. The picture I held of married life was sharing an exciting life of motor racing and travel with one of New Zealand's top racing car drivers. This seemed a far better alternative than the responsibilities I was facing as a student nurse. Three weeks into our marriage my husband's racing career came to a sudden halt after a major accident on the Pukekohe Track where he was badly burnt. He spent many months in Middlemore hospital undergoing intensive care followed by skin grafts. During this time while I was carrying our first child I worked at Middlemore hospital, Auckland as a Nurse Aid. Our daughter Nicola was born in Palmerston North Hospital seven months later on the 26th July 1967. My son Andrew was born 16 months late on the 7th December 1968. Although I had two young children I managed to fit in netball to representative level with the support of my mother and grandmother who were often asked to mind the children. The realisation that I was now tied down to motherhood and domestic duties made me determined that this definitely would not be my lot forever. This breaking away from traditional gender roles of motherhood and domestic duties to eventually complete my nursing training and then go on to graduate from Massey University with a BA degree majoring in Nursing Studies did not quite fit with my husbands stereotypical views of a wife and mother. He viewed himself as the breadwinner and anything I did was auxillary to his more important role of working hard to further the growth of a successful car business. He couldn't understand the fact that I needed to grow individually and that my own identity was very important to me. i had only just begun to recognise some potential after an education at school that did nothing to develop my self esteem.

I became very disillusioned with my marital and family situation after finding out quite early on our goals in life were very different. The thought of leaving and facing blame and persecution from family members meant I spent several years delaying the inevitable. In spite of support from counsellors I found this was one of the most traumatic times I will ever have to face. It was a time of dislocation from some of my in-laws and confusion on the part of my parents who still felt a loyalty to my ex-husband. I treasure the experience of a reciprocal relationship and have found happiness with my second husband, Maurice. We were married on the 12th April 1993. This new relationship has meant some major readjustments as we adapted to the idiosyncrasies of living as a very different family unit.As I write this I look back on the many shared experiences Maurice and I have had. We have travelled and shared our lives and families. We welcome each new grandchild with open arms. There have been some rocky moments but we have both managed to adjust and to lead a fulfilling life in our years of retirement. We work well as a team and have similar expectations.

Notes for MAURICE GRAEME MARSHMENT: A Paul Harris Fellowship was awarded to Maurice in December 2010.-Taupo Moana Rotary The following was read out at the presentation - Written by Carole Grant.

Maurice Marshment Born in Petone. His early years were spent growing up with his maternal grandparents as his dad was killed in action during the last days of WW11. His mother worked in administration at the Lower Hutt Hospital.

Often left to fend for himself he would ride off on his bike with his mates. Water polo and rugby were just two of his favourite sports and to this day he enjoys a post mortem of the game on the phone with his sons.

After two years at Naenae College he left to become an A grade mechanic. Working with grease and dirt was soon traded for the office at the Ford motor company where he had a meteoric rise through the ranks. He was dedicated to his job and the people he worked with. He would see his work as family and would become concerned if he viewed a situation as unfair. He married in 1966 and was transferred to Auckland where he bought his first house in Manurewa. Tracy and Kim (his daughters) were born there. He was transferred back to the Hutt Valley after a couple of years and along came Denis and Chris, his two sons. Cosy family life continued for the next ten years when he was faced with marital separation and a job transfer to Palmerston North. By this time he had been through redundancy and had moved on to become Parts and Service manager at Toyota New Zealand. His move to Palmerston North took Toyota by storm as he moved through the New Zealand Toyota headquarters with his just in time inventory management style.

He joined Terrace End Rotary in Palmerston North in 1988 as a single man wanting to meet new people and fit into the local culture. It wasn't long before he met his present wife, Carole and impressed her by providing a home cooked meal. She still remembers that meal. Notes for GRANT PAUL CHRISTIAN: Grant Christian 7 October 2012 Childhood Memories When I was at Manchester Street School there was one time when I was maybe seven or eight that I thought mum was coming to school to pick me up, so instead of catching the bus I waited for her. After some time I decided she wasn't coming so thought the only thing to do was walk home. It was about 12 kilometres to home and I knew it was going to take a while. I headed off thinking this was my only option. I got about one km out of Feilding along Awahuri Road, probably about three kn from school. I think I was crying, realising how long it was going to take. I was very thankful when a Mrs Perigo stopped and picked me up and dropped me at home.

I enjoyed growing up on a farm and have fond memories of going along with dad when he was duck shooting. When we fed out hay, if I had a friend staying, we would sometimes make a block of hay into a seat that got towed behind the tractor and we could sit on it and ride along. The cattle would go crazy when the block of hay kept running away from them. I used to enjoy going to the river and catching eels with a spear or gaff. I spent a lot of time driving tractors when we were growing crops or making hay. I also reared a lot of calves when we farmed bulls. I enjoyed bull farming but sheep I found could be annoying and required a lot of work especially during lambing. We had a tree hut in the macrocarpa hedge near the house. We had a lot of fun playing in that or scrambling along the top of the hedge to the other end. There was never a shortage of things to do whether work or play.

We had an old farm truck which we cut the cab off and called the sports truck. We used to race around the paddocks. It had bald tyres and if there was a bit of dew or rain on the grass you could do great big slides. One time I had mum in the truck and the fuel container (just a small plastic bottle) caught alight. I said to mum 'bail out' before jumping off the still moving truck myself. Mum, who was not quite as nimble, had to stay in the truck until it stopped.

We had annual holidays around New Year, usually at Foxton Beach or Motuoapa. I used to love trolling for trout. Dad & I would often be up at 5:30 to get out early for a morning fish and then head out again at the end of the day. I can remember one day when we caught a fish just about every time we went over this particular spot. I think dad and I had about 10 when we went back in. Later in the day I went back out with mum and Jill Oldfield. I hooked another one in the same spot and while I was winding in both mum and Jill caught one each, so we had three trout on at the same time.

I never really enjoyed school much and didn't do much homework. It wasn't until I had left school and studied things that I wanted to study that I did a lot better. Before leaving the farm I thought that I would be a farmer but when the farm was sold and we moved to town I had little idea of what I would do after finishing school. Life After School

Upon leaving school in 1974 I told mum I would like to go and work at the freezing works because the pay was good - mum had me a job at the Post Office Savings Bank within a day or two. She obviously didn't like the idea of me working at the freezing works. The Post Office Savings Bank was not a bad job. There was a group of fun people working there and we could have fun at work, especially on Friday night when we had been to the pub for a beer or two in the tea break. After two years at the Post Office Savings Bank I got a job in the office at the fire service. Although it was a big pay increase it was never as much fun. I stayed there for seven years but yearned to be free of the desk.

In 1983 I ended up moving to Ohakune and working in the bush cutting fence posts for a year. This was very hard work and although I was already lean I lost 6 or 7 kgs within the first few weeks of that job. I had a break travelling around for a bit and then went back to Ohakune where I got a job at Winstones Pulp Mill. The first year I worked on the train crew, which was often a fun job. When we were busy the day would go very quickly because we would work fast to get as many wagons loaded as possible. We used a large forklift to load the pallets of pulp on the wagons. The pulp bales were then covered by a tarp and chained down. We would then drive the shunter down to the siding, offload the full wagons and pick up some empty wagons. The second year I spent operating the bark burner which involved monitoring gauges and machinery and cleaning slag buildup out of the burner every shift.

In 1987, after two years at the pulp mill I headed to Massey University and started a full time Business Studies degree. I completed the first year and then worked at the Manawatu Dairy Company for about ten months before deciding to head overseas for a working holiday. I started out in London and travelled up through the country staying in lots of towns and cities along the way. I got to the top of Scotland and then travelled back down stopping at many more interesting places. This was probably one of the greatest times in my life. I had a great time and met many interesting people. When I got back to London I got temporary work. I was staying in a youth hostel at first. I spent a couple of days in a squat in a high rise council building. It was pretty run down, but we got evicted by the council because we went out without the door being secured.

I went back to Earl's Court Youth Hostel and while staying there met a kiwi woman called Vicki Graham. We got along well so arranged to meet after she came back from a trip to Tunisia. I ended up moving into a flat in London with some other Kiwis. When Vicki got back we met up again and spent a few fun days together. She headed back to New Zealand because she was being bridesmaid at a friend's wedding. After that I persuaded her to come back to London. Obviously we got along well because we are still together. For the next four months we had a great time

travelling around Europe in a blue VW Combi called Blue. We travelled as far as Spain and Turkey and had so many great experiences. From Europe we went to Sydney where Vicki had been living. We stayed for six months where we both did temporary work.

In 1990 I returned to Palmerston North with Vicki and I finished my degree. Our daughter Anna arrived in 1992 a few months after finishing my degree. Soon after Anna's arrival I attended my graduation. It was the same time as my big sister Carole graduated. I was very proud of achieving my degree after not doing particularly well at school.

I was keen to get into some sort of business but in the meantime I got a job as a part time accountant in a Pahiatua motor vehicle dealership. We lived in Pahiatua for a short time but soon moved back to Palmerston North. Shortly after that Wayne and I started Rent-a-Dent, a rental vehicle business. I worked in this for about 12 years and did some accounting work part time during that time. We also purchased a service station which I ran for a couple of years before selling the rental business and the service station. I then went back into accounting which I have worked at since. Vicki spent a quite a few years studying before qualifying as a Clinical Psychologist. I was so proud of her finally getting there because it took a lot of hard work.

In 2008 Vicki, Anna and I travelled to India and Nepal for six weeks. This was an amazing trip, a real eye opener as to how some people live. We visited many amazing sights including forts, places of worship, wildlife parks, the Taj Mahal and even went to a Hindu wedding.

## Sport & Recreation

I was never very good at ball sports but discovered I was a good runner and I started going to harriers in 1971. Running has been a lifelong activity for me since then. My favourite running is trail running and I have competed in several mountain runs. The longest being the Kepler Challenge, which covers the Kepler track. It is about 60 km long and took me 8 hours 50 to complete with quite a bit being walked due to the pain in my legs. I was a reasonable track runner with a best time of 50.9 seconds for the 400 metres. My best time for 10km was 33:13 and my best marathon time was 2hrs 45:33. I have also participated in a few multisport events (running, kayaking and cycling) both as an individual or part of a team and some cycling races and kayak races. I still run three or four times per week if I can.

In the early 1980's I started doing some tramping after having climbed Mt Ruapehu with a group from the Fire Service. Over the years I have done many tramping trips in the Tararuas, Ruahines and Tongariro National Park. In the last few years I have been doing more and have completed some of the well known tracks such as the Heaphy, Milford, Kepler and around Ruapehu. In recent years I have also started doing alpine climbing. I have completed winter climbs of Ruapehu a few times also Taranaki twice and Ngaruhoe.

Another of my interests is sea kayaking. I have done many interesting trips in the Marlborough Sounds, Bay of Islands and other coastal areas of Northland, Coromandel, around Kapiti Island and Mana Island, out to Cape Kidnappers, various parts of Lake Taupo, Abel Tasman National Park and also the scenic part of the Wanganui River from Retaruke to Pipiriki.

Ladd was known as "Cherie Moor" when she performed on the album based on Hanna-Barbera's Josie and the Pussycats animated series. In 1977 (starting from the second season), Ladd (as she was now known) replaced Farrah Fawcett in Charlie's Angels, and stayed until the end of the show in 1981. She also starred in the 1994–1996 series One West Waikiki. In January 1980, Ladd sang the national anthem prior to Super Bowl XIV. Kate Capshaw (born November 3, 1953) is an American actress. She is known for her role as Willie Scott in the film Indiana Jones and the Temple of Doom, and as the wife of director Steven Spielberg.

Capshaw was born in 1953 Kathleen Sue Nail in Fort Worth, Texas and moved to St. Louis, Missouri at the age of five. She graduated from Hazelwood Senior High, now called Hazelwood Central High School in 1972. She earned a degree in education from the University of Missouri–Columbia, where she was a member of Alpha Delta Pi. She taught Special Education at Southern Boone County High School in Ashland, Missouri and Rock Bridge High School in Columbia, Missouri, but later moved to New York to pursue her dream of acting, landing her first role on the soap opera Love of Life. She took the surname Capshaw upon her marriage to Robert Capshaw on January 1976; they had one child, actress Jessica Capshaw, and eventually divorced in 1980.

Capshaw met film director Steven Spielberg upon winning the female lead (from a pool of 120 actresses) for the Raiders of the Lost Ark prequel, Indiana Jones and the Temple of Doom; although the film was a success, Capshaw's performance as the busty, often shrieking heroine was widely panned and, in the opinion of many, had a very negative impact on her career and reputation, preventing her from acquiring more prestigious roles. She appeared in the Showtime Cable Network miniseries A Girl Thing with Elle Macpherson as her same-sex lover.

[edit] Personal life Capshaw decided to convert to Judaism before marrying director Steven Spielberg[1] on October 12, 1991.

#### Notes for STEVEN ALLAN SPIELBERG:

Steven Allan Spielberg KBE (born December 18, 1946)[1] is an American film director and producer. Spielberg is a three-time Academy Award winner and is the highest grossing filmmaker of all time; his films having made nearly \$8 billion internationally. Forbes Magazine places Spielberg's net worth at \$3 billion.[2] As of 2006, Premiere listed him as the most powerful and influential figure in the motion picture industry. TIME named him in the '100 Greatest People of the Century'. At the end of the 20th century LIFE named him the most influential person of his generation.[3]

In a career that spans almost four decades, Spielberg's films have touched many themes and genres. During the 1970s, 1980s, and 1990s, three of his films, Jaws, E.T., and Jurassic Park became the highest grossing films for their time. During his early years as a director, his sci-fi and adventure films were often seen as the archetype of modern Hollywood blockbuster film-making. In recent years, he has tackled emotionally powerful issues such as the Holocaust, slavery, war, and terrorism.

Spielberg was born in Cincinnati, Ohio, the son of Leah Adler (née Posner), a restaurateur and concert pianist, and Arnold Spielberg, a computer engineer.[4] Throughout his early teens, Spielberg made amateur 8 mm "adventure" movies with his friends, the first of which he shot at a restaurant in Scottsdale, Arizona. He charged admission (25 cents) to his home movies (which involved the wrecks he staged with his Lionel train set) while his sister sold popcorn.

Spielberg became a boy scout and in 1958, he fulfilled a requirement for photography merit badge by making a 9 minute 8 mm film entitled The Last Gunfight.[5] At 13, Spielberg won a prize for a 40-minute war movie he titled Escape to Nowhere.

At Arcadia High School in Phoenix, Arizona in 1963, the then 16-year-old Spielberg wrote and directed his first independent movie, a 140-minute science fiction adventure called Firelight (which would later inspire Close Encounters). The movie, with a budget of USD\$400, was shown in his local movie theater and generated a profit of \$100. A writer for the local Phoenix press wrote that he could expect great things to come.

After his parents divorced, he moved to California with his father. His three sisters and mother remained in Arizona, where he attended Passover seders at the home of Zalman and Pearl Segal on an annual basis. He graduated from Saratoga High School in Saratoga, California, in 1965, which he called the "worst experience" of his life and "hell on Earth". It was during this time Spielberg attained the rank of Eagle Scout.

After moving to California, he applied to attend film school at the Long Beach School of Theater, Film and Television three separate times but was unsuccessful due to his C grade average. After Spielberg became famous, USC awarded Spielberg an honorary degree in 1994, and in 1996 he became a trustee of the University. He attended California State

University, Long Beach, to avoid the draft for the Vietnam War. His actual career began when he returned to Universal studios as an unpaid, three-day-a-week intern and guest of the editing department. While attending college at Long Beach State in the 1960s, Spielberg also became member of Theta Chi Fraternity. In 2002, thirty-five years after starting college, Spielberg finished his degree via independent projects at CSULB, and was awarded a B.A. in Film Production and Electronic Arts with an option in Film/Video Production.

As an intern and guest of Universal Studios, Spielberg made his first short film for theatrical release, the 24 minute movie Amblin' in 1968. After Sidney Sheinberg, then the vice-president of production for Universal's TV arm saw the film, Spielberg became the youngest director ever to be signed to a long-term deal with a major Hollywood studio (Universal). He dropped out of Long Beach State in 1969 to take the television director contract at Universal Studios and began his career as a professional director.

# [edit] Early career (1968–1975)

His first professional TV job came when he was hired to do one of the segments for the 1969 pilot episode of Night Gallery. The segment, Eyes, starred Joan Crawford (who was very supportive of her twenty-two year-old rookie director), and she and Spielberg were reportedly close friends until her death. The episode is unusual in his body of work, in that the camerawork is more highly stylized than his later, more "mature" films. After this, and an episode of Marcus Welby, M.D., Spielberg got his first feature-length assignment: an episode of Name of the Game called "L.A. 2017". This futuristic science fiction episode impressed Universal Studios and they signed him on a short contract. He did another segment on Night Gallery and did some work for shows such as Owen Marshall, Counselor at Law and The Psychiatrist before landing the first series episode of Columbo (previous episodes were actually TV movies).

Based on the strength of his work, Universal signed Spielberg to do three TV movies. The first was a Richard Matheson adaptation called Duel about a monstrous tanker truck which tries to run a small car off the road. Special praise of this film by the influential British critic Dilys Powell was highly significant to Spielberg's career. Another TV film (Something Evil) was made and released to capitalize on the popularity of The Exorcist, then a major best-selling book which had not yet been released as a movie. He fulfilled his contract by directing the TV movie length pilot of a show called Savage, starring Martin Landau. Spielberg's debut theatrical feature film was The Sugarland Express, about a married couple who are chased by police as the couple tries to regain custody of their baby. Spielberg's cinematography for the police chase was praised by reviewers, and The Hollywood Reporter stated that "a major new director is on the horizon".[6] However, the film fared poorly at the box office and received a limited release.

Studio producers Richard Zanuck and David Brown offered Spielberg the director's chair for Jaws, a horror film based on the Peter Benchley novel. The film about a killer shark won three Academy Awards (for editing, original score and sound), and grossed US\$470,653,000 at the box office, setting the domestic record for box office gross and leading to what the press described as "Jawsmania".[7] Jaws made him a household name, as well as one of America's youngest multi-millionaires, and allowed Spielberg a great deal of autonomy for his future projects.[8] It was nominated for Best Picture and featured Spielberg's first of three collaborations with actor Richard Dreyfuss.

### [edit] Blockbuster King (1975–1993)

Rejecting offers to direct Jaws 2 and Superman, Spielberg and actor Richard Dreyfuss re-convened to work on a film about UFOs, which became Close Encounters of the Third Kind (1977). One of the rare movies both written and directed by Spielberg, Close Encounters... was a critical and box office hit, giving Spielberg his first Best Director nomination from the Academy as well as earning six other Academy Awards nominations. It won Oscars in two categories (Cinematography, Vilmos Zsigmond, and a Special Achievement Award for Sound Effects Editing, Frank E. Warner). This second blockbuster helped to secure Spielberg's rise.

Spielberg's success with mainstream and commercially appealing films also subjected him to disdain from film reviewers. His film 1941, a big-budgeted World War II farce, flopped with both audiences and critics alike. Next, Spielberg teamed with Star Wars creator and friend George Lucas on an action adventure film. Raiders of the Lost Ark, the first of the Indiana Jones trilogy, was his homage to the cliffhanger serials of the Golden Age of Hollywood, with Harrison Ford (whom Lucas had previously cast in his Star Wars films) as the archaeologist and adventurer hero Indiana Jones. The biggest film at the box office in 1981, and recipient of numerous Oscar nominations including Best

Director (Spielberg's second nomination) and Best Picture (the second Spielberg film to be nominated for Best Picture), Raiders is still considered a landmark example of the action genre.

One year later, Spielberg returned to his science fiction genre, with E.T. the Extra-Terrestrial, the story of a boy and the alien whom he befriends, who is trying to get back home to outer space. E.T. went on to become the top-grossing film of all time until it was beaten by another of his films, Jurassic Park, in 1993. E.T. was also nominated for nine Academy Awards including Best Picture and Best Director.

Next, Spielberg and George Lucas made another Indiana Jones movie, Indiana Jones and the Temple of Doom. The film was plagued with uncertainty for the material and script. The reviews were less positive than they were for its predecessor, though the film was a blockbuster hit in 1984. It was criticized for lacking the energy of the original, as well as for its grossly inaccurate and ignorant depiction of East Indian culture.

Between 1982 and 1984, Spielberg produced three high-grossing movies: Poltergeist (for which he also co-wrote the screenplay), a big-screen adaptation of The Twilight Zone and The Goonies.

In 1985, Spielberg released The Color Purple, an adaptation of Alice Walker's Pulitzer Prize-winning novel of the same name, which is about a generation of empowered African-American women (Whoopi Goldberg and Oprah Winfrey) during depression-era America (Danny Glover played the abusive patriarch). The film was a box office smash and critics hailed Spielberg's successful foray into the dramatic genre. Roger Ebert proclaimed it the best movie of the year and later entered it into his Great Films archive. The film received 11 Academy Award nominations, including two for Whoopi Goldberg and Oprah Winfrey. However, Spielberg did not get a Best Director nomination.

In 1987, as China began opening to the world, Spielberg shot the first American movie in Shanghai since the 1930s, an adaptation of J.G. Ballard's autobiographical novel, Empire of the Sun. The film garnered much praise from critics and was nominated for several Oscars, but did not yield substantial box office revenues. Reviewer Andrew Sarris called it the best film of the year and later included it among the best films of the decade.[

After two forays into dramatic films, Spielberg directed another Indiana Jones film titled Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade with actor Sean Connery in a supporting role. The film earned positive reviews and big box office receipts, ending the franchise (or so it was thought) on a high note. Next, he re-united with actor Richard Dreyfuss for the drama Always, about a daredevil pilot who extinguishes forest fires. Spielberg's first romantic film, Always was a box office flop and had mixed reviews.

In 1991, Spielberg directed Hook, about a middle-aged Peter Pan (played by Robin Williams), who returns to Neverland. With innumerable rewrites and creative changes and hit-or-miss reviews, the film made \$119 million domestically (with costs of \$70 million). In 1993, Spielberg returned to the adventure genre with the Japanese Godzilla movie-inspired [10] version of Michael Crichton's novel Jurassic Park, about dinosaurs. With revolutionary special effects provided by friend George Lucas's Industrial Light and Magic, the film would eventually become the highest grossing film of all time (at the worldwide box office) with \$914 million.

Spielberg's film Schindler's List was based on the true story of Oskar Schindler, a man who risked his life to save 1,100 people from the Holocaust. [11]Schindler's List earned Spielberg his first Academy Award for Best Director (it also won Best Picture). While the film was a huge success at the box office, Spielberg stated that he used the profits to set up the Shoah Foundation, a non-profit organization that archives filmed testimony of the Holocaust survivors. Some critics maintain that Schindler's List is the most accurate portrayal of the Holocaust, and in 1999 the American Film Institute listed it among the 10 Greatest American Films ever Made (#8).

### [edit] 1991 to 2000s

In 1991 Steven Spielberg co-founded Starbright with Peter Samuelson – a foundation improving sick children's lives through technology-based programs focusing on entertainment and education. In 2002 Starbright merged with the Starlight Foundation forming what is now today – Starlight Starbright Children's Foundation.

In 1994, Spielberg took a four-year hiatus from directing to spend more time with his family and build his new studio DreamWorks.[12] In 1997, Spielberg helmed the sequel to 1993's Jurassic Park with The Lost World: Jurassic Park,

which generated nearly \$230 million in domestic box office despite its mixed reviews. Amistad was based on a true story (like Schindler's List), specifically about an African slave rebellion. Despite decent reviews from critics, it did not do well at the box office. Spielberg released Amistad under his new studio DreamWorks Pictures [13], which has released all of his movies since Amistad.

In 1998, Spielberg released the World War II drama Saving Private Ryan, about a squad of U.S. soldiers led by Capt. Miller (Tom Hanks) who try to find a missing soldier in France. Spielberg won his second Academy Award for his direction. The film's graphic, realistic depiction of combat violence influenced later war movies such as Black Hawk Down and Enemy at the Gates. The film was also the first major hit for Spielberg's studio DreamWorks, which co-produced the film with Paramount Pictures. Later, Spielberg and Hanks produced a TV mini-series based on Stephen Ambrose's book, Band of Brothers. The ten-part HBO mini-series follows Easy Company of the 101st Airborne Division's 506th Parachute Infantry Regiment. The series won a number of awards at the Golden Globes and the Emmys.

In 2001, Spielberg filmed fellow director and friend Stanley Kubrick's final project, A.I.: Artificial Intelligence which Kubrick was unable to begin during his lifetime. A futuristic movie about a humanoid android longing for love, A.I. featured groundbreaking visual effects and a multi-layered, allegorical storyline. According to a Sight & Sound magazine poll of the greatest films ever made, film critic Armond White of the New York Press hails A.I. as his all-time favorite movie.

Spielberg and actor Tom Cruise collaborated for the first time for the futuristic neo-noir Minority Report, based upon the sci-fi short story written by Philip K. Dick about a Washington, D.C. police captain who has been foreseen to murder a man he has not yet met. The film received strong reviews with the review tallying website rottentomatoes.com reporting that 199 out of the 217 reviews they tallied were positive.[14] The film was praised as a futuristic homage to film noir, with its intelligent premise and "whodunit" structure. The film earned over \$300 million worldwide. Roger Ebert, who named it the best film of 2002, praised its breathtaking vision of the future as well as for the way Spielberg blended CGI with live-action.[15]

Spielberg's 2002 film Catch Me if You Can is about the daring adventures of a youthful con artist (played by Leonardo DiCaprio). It earned Christopher Walken an Academy Award nomination for Best Supporting Actor. The film is known for John Williams' score and its unique title sequence. The film was a hit both commercially and critically.

Spielberg collaborated again with Tom Hanks along with Catherine Zeta-Jones and Stanley Tucci in The Terminal, a warm-hearted comedy about a man of Eastern European descent who is stranded in an airport. It received mixed reviews but performed relatively well at the box office. In 2005, Empire magazine ranked Spielberg number one on a list of the greatest film directors of all time. In 2005, Spielberg did a modernized adaptation of War of the Worlds (a co-production of Paramount and DreamWorks), based on the H.G. Wells book of the same name, featuring Tom Cruise and Dakota Fanning. As with past Spielberg films, Industrial Light and Magic (ILM) provided the visual effects. Unlike E.T. and Close Encounters of the Third Kind, which depicted friendly alien visitors, War of the Worlds had violent alien invaders.

Spielberg's film Munich, about the events following the 1972 Munich Massacre of Israeli athletes at the Olympic Games, was his second film essaying Jewish relations in the world (the first being Schindler's List). The film is based on Vengeance: The True Story of an Israeli Counter-Terrorist Team, a book by Canadian journalist George Jonas, a book whose veracity has been largely questioned by journalists.[16] The film received strong critical praise, but underperformed at the US and world box-office, and it remains one of Spielbergs most controversial films to date.[17] Munich received five Academy Awards nominations, including Best Picture, Film Editing, Original Music Score (by John Williams), Best Adapted Screenplay, and Best Director for Spielberg. It was Spielberg's sixth Best Director nomination and fifth Best Picture nomination. A year later he received his sixth Best Picture nomination for producing Letters from Iwo Jima. To date, seven films that Spielberg personally directed have been nominated for this award.

Since the mid-1980s Spielberg has increased his role as a film producer. He has produced several cartoons, including Tiny Toon Adventures, Animaniacs, Pinky and the Brain, Toonsylvania, Freakazoid! and the critical and commercial success animated film, The Land Before Time. He was also, for a short time, the executive producer of the long-running medical drama ER. In 1989, he brought the concept of The Dig to LucasArts. He contributed with the project from that time to 1995 when the game was released. He also collaborated with software publishers Knowledge

Adventure on the multimedia game Steven Spielberg's Director's Chair, which was released in 1996. Spielberg appears, as himself, in the game to direct the player. Spielberg was branded for a Lego Moviemaker kit, the proceeds of which went to the Starbright Foundation.

In 1993, Spielberg acted as executive producer for the highly anticipated television series, seaQuest DSV; a science fiction series set "in the near future" starring Roy Scheider (who Spielberg had directed in Jaws) and Jonathan Brandis akin to Star Trek: The Next Generation that aired on Sundays at 8:00 p.m. on NBC. While the first season was moderately successful, the second season did less well. Spielberg's name no longer appeared in the third season and the show was cancelled mid way through the third season.

Spielberg served as an uncredited executive producer on The Haunting, Shrek, Evolution. In 2005, he served as a producer of Memoirs of a Geisha, an adaptation of the best-selling novel by Arthur Golden, a film he was previously attached to as director. In 2006 Spielberg co-executive produced with famed filmmaker Robert Zemeckis a CGI children's movie called Monster House, marking their first collaboration together since 1990's Back to the Future Part III. He also teamed with Clint Eastwood for the first time in their careers, co-producing Eastwood's Flags of Our Fathers and Letters from Iwo Jima with Robert Lorenz and Eastwood himself. He earned his twelfth Academy Award nomination for the latter film as it was nominated for Best Picture. Recently Spielberg served as executive producer for Disturbia and the Transformers live action film with Brian Goldner, an employee of Hasbro. The film was directed by Michael Bay and written by Roberto Orci and Alex Kurtzman.

Other major television series Spielberg produced were Band of Brothers and Taken. He was an executive producer on the critically acclaimed 2005 TV miniseries Into the West which won two Emmy awards, including one for Geoff Zanelli's score.

In 2007 Steven Spielberg and Mark Burnett co-produced On the Lot the ill-fated TV reality show about filmmaking.

### [edit] Upcoming projects

Spielberg is working on Indiana Jones and the Kingdom of the Crystal Skull which began filming in June 2007, and is scheduled for release on May 22, 2008.[18][19] Spielberg has also begun plans for an Abraham Lincoln biopic, titled Lincoln, which stars Liam Neeson as the 16th President of the United States, and Sally Field as his wife. It is also scheduled for release in 2008.[20] In June 2006 it was confirmed Spielberg had already begun working on a space travel movie titled Interstellar.[21] It will be based on real scientific theories of black holes, worm holes, time travel, and gravity. He is also planning a motion capture film trilogy based on The Adventures of Tintin.

Jurassic Park IV is also in development. Another upcoming project is a miniseries which he will produce with Tom Hanks and Gary Goetzman, titled "The Pacific". The miniseries will cost \$150 million and will be a 10-part war miniseries in conjunction with the Australian Seven Network. The project is centered on the battles in the Pacific Theater during World War II. Writer Bruce McKenna, who penned several installments of the first miniseries (Band of Brothers), is the head writer. Filming is expected to begin in August and will continue for a year, with locations mostly in Australia, to include Far North Queensland, Melbourne and the Northern Territory. Producers have chosen to base the series at Melbourne's Central City Studios.[22] He is also producing two untitled Fox TV series, one focusing on fashion, another on time-travellers from World War II.[23]

# [edit] Style

# [edit] Themes

Spielberg's films often deal with several recurring themes. Most of his films deal with ordinary characters searching for or coming in contact with extraordinary beings or finding themselves in extraordinary circumstances. This is especially evident in Duel, Jaws, Close Encounters of the Third Kind, E.T. the Extra-Terrestrial, Empire of the Sun, Hook, Jurassic Park, Saving Private Ryan, Catch Me if You Can, The Terminal, War of the Worlds, and Munich. In an AFI interview in August 2000 Spielberg commented on his interest in the possibility of extra terrestrial life and how it has influenced some of his films. To that tradition of fascination with space, Spielberg has placed on several occasions, shooting stars in the background of his films such as in Jaws. Spielberg described himself as feeling like

an alien during childhood, [24] and his interest came from his father, a science fiction fan, and his opinion that aliens would not travel light years for conquest, but instead curiosity and sharing of knowledge. [25]

A strong consistent theme in his family-friendly work is a childlike, even naïve, sense of wonder and faith, as attested by works such as Close Encounters of the Third Kind, E.T. the Extra-Terrestrial, Hook and A.I.. According to Warren Buckland[26] these themes are portrayed through the use of low height camera tracking shots, which have become one of Spielberg's directing trademarks. In the cases when his films include children, (E.T. the Extra-Terrestrial, Empire of the Sun, Jurassic Park, etc.) this type of shot is more apparent, but it is also used in films like Munich, Saving Private Ryan, The Terminal, Minority Report and Amistad. If one views each of his films, one will see this shot utilised by the director, notably the water scenes in Jaws are filmed from the low angle perspective of someone swimming. Another child orientated theme in Spielberg's films is that of loss of innocence and coming-of-age. In Empire of the Sun, Jim, a well-groomed and spoiled English youth, loses his innocence as he suffers through World War II Japan. Similarly in Catch Me if You Can Frank naively and foolishly believes that he can reclaim his shattered family if he accumulates enough money to support them.

The most persistent theme throughout his film is tension between parent-child relationships. Parents (often fathers) are reluctant, absent or ignorant. Peter Banning in Hook starts off in the beginning of the film as a reluctant marriedto-his-work parent who through the course of his film regains the respect of his children. The notable absence of Elliott's father in E.T., is the most famous example of this theme. In Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade, it is revealed that Indy has always had a very strained relationship with his father, who is also an archaeologist, as his father always seemed more interested in his work, specifically in his studies of the Holy Grail, than in his own son, although his father does not seem to realize or understand the negative effect that his aloof nature had on Indy (he even believes he was a good father in the sense that he taught his son "self reliance", which is not how Indy saw it). Even Oskar Schindler, from Schindler's List, is reluctant to have a child with his wife. Munich depicts Avner as man away from his wife and newborn daughter. There are of course exceptions; Brody in Jaws is a committed family man, while John Anderton in Minority Report is a shattered man after the disappearance of his son. This theme is arguably the most autobiographical aspect of Spielberg's films, since Spielberg himself was affected by his parents' divorce as a child and by the absence of his father. Furthermore to this theme, protagonists in his films often come from families with divorced parents, most notably E.T. the Extra-Terrestrial (protagonist Elliot's mother is divorced) and Catch Me if You Can (Frank Abagnale's mother and father split early on in the movie). Little known also is Tim in Jurassic Park (early in the movie the child mentions his parents' divorce). The family often shown divided is often resolved in the ending as well. Following this theme of reluctant fathers and father figures, Tim looks to Dr. Alan Grant as a father figure. Initially, Dr. Grant is reluctant to return those paternal feelings to Tim (earlier in the film Dr. Grant has a discussion with Ellie about his negative feelings in regards to children). However, by the end of the film, he has changed, and the kids even fall asleep with their heads leaning on his shoulders.

Most of his films are generally optimistic in nature. Critics frequently accuse his films of being overtly sentimental, though Spielberg feels it's fine as long as it is disguised. The influence comes from directors Frank Capra and John Ford.[27] There are exceptions, his debut feature The Sugarland Express has a downbeat ending where Lou Jean loses custody of her daughter and most recently A.I. where David never receives acceptance from his real mother. His 21st century output, from A.I. to Munich are slightly different in tone with respect to his earlier films. In A.I., David is shunned and rejected by his family and, indeed, by most of the world at large and ultimately never earns the love of his real mother. The crime-caper, Catch Me if You Can, has a certain irony when Frank, who continuously rebels against authority figures throughout the film, becomes part of the very system he fought against. War of the Worlds was the first time Spielberg attempted to show aliens who were evil rather than friendly to humanity. Munich, his latest and most controversial film, is also his most ambiguous, as in the end it's uncertain whether the cycle of violence would ever truly end.

#### [edit] Contemporaries

In terms of casting and production itself, Spielberg has a known trademark for working with actors and production members from his previous films. For instance he has cast Richard Dreyfuss in several movies; Jaws, Close Encounters of the Third Kind and Always. Spielberg has also cast Harrison Ford for several of his movies from small roles, as the headteacher in a cut scene from E.T. the Extra-Terrestrial as well as in leading role in the Indiana Jones trilogy. Recently Spielberg has used the actor Tom Hanks on several occasions and has cast him in Saving Private Ryan, Catch Me if You Can and The Terminal. Spielberg also has collaborated with Tom Cruise twice on Minority Report and

War of the Worlds. Spielberg also prefers working with production members with whom he has developed an existing working relationship. An example of this is his production relationship with Kathleen Kennedy who has served as producer on all his major films from E.T. the Extra-Terrestrial to the present day Munich. Other working relationships include Allen Daviau, a childhood friend and cinematographer who shot the early Spielberg film Amblin' and most of his films up to Empire Of The Sun; Janusz Kaminski who has shot every Spielberg film since Schindler's List (see List of noted film director and cinematographer collaborations) and the film editor Michael Kahn who has edited every single film directed by Spielberg from Close Encounters to Munich (except E.T. the Extra-Terrestrial). Most of the DVDs of Spielberg's films have documentaries by Laurent Bouzereau.

The most famous example of Spielberg working with the same professionals is of course his long time collaboration with John Williams and the use of his musical scores in all of his films since The Sugarland Express (except The Color Purple). One of Spielberg's most prominent trademarks is perhaps his use of music by John Williams to add to the visual impact of his scenes and to try and create a lasting picture and sound of the film, in the memories of the film audience. These visual scenes often uses images of the sun (e.g Empire of the Sun, Saving Private Ryan, the final scene of Jurassic Park and the end credits of Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade (where they ride into the sunset)), of which the last two feature a Williams score at that end scene. Spielberg is a contemporary of filmmakers George Lucas, Francis Ford Coppola, Martin Scorsese, John Milius, and Brian De Palma, collectively known as the "Movie Brats". Aside from his principal role as a director, Spielberg has acted as a producer for a considerable number of films, including early hits for Joe Dante and Robert Zemeckis.

### [edit] Marriages and children

From 1985 to 1989 Spielberg was married to actress Amy Irving. In their 1989 divorce settlement, she received US \$100 million from Spielberg after a judge controversially vacated a prenuptial agreement written on a napkin. Their divorce was recorded as the third most costly celebrity divorce in history.[28] Following the divorce, Spielberg and Irving shared custody of their son, Max.

Spielberg subsequently developed a relationship with actress Kate Capshaw, whom he met when he cast her in Indiana Jones and the Temple of Doom. They married on October 12, 1991. Capshaw is a convert to Judaism.[29] They currently move among their four homes in Pacific Palisades, California; New York City; East Hampton, NY and Naples, Florida.

There are seven children in the Spielberg-Capshaw family:

Jessica Capshaw (1976) — daughter from Capshaw's previous marriage to Robert Capshaw Max Samuel Spielberg (June 13, 1985) — son from Spielberg's previous marriage to Amy Irving Theo (1988) — adopted by Capshaw before her marriage to Spielberg; adopted by Spielberg Sasha (May 14, 1990)[30] Sawyer (March 10, 1992) Mikaela George (February 28, 1996) — adopted with Capshaw Destry Allyn (December 1, 1996) Spielberg has several pets including a dog. His previous dog, Elmer, starred in several of his films in various guises including Jaws, Close Encounters and 1941.

In 1999, Spielberg received an honorary degree from Brown University. Spielberg was also awarded the Department of Defense Medal for Distinguished Public Service by Secretary of Defense William Cohen at the Pentagon on August 11, 1999. Cohen presented Spielberg the award in recognition of his movie Saving Private Ryan. The citation accompanying the medal states "Mr. Spielberg helped to reconnect the American public with its military men and women, while rekindling a deep sense of gratitude for the daily sacrifices they make on the front lines of our Nation's defense."

In 2001, he was given the honor of Knight Commander of the Order of the British Empire (KBE) by Queen Elizabeth II. However, he cannot use the title 'Sir' due to not being a Commonwealth citizen. In 2004 he received the Légion d'honneur from president Jacques Chirac.[38] On July 15, 2006, Spielberg was also awarded the Gold Hugo, Lifetime

Achievement Award at the Chicago International Film Festival's Summer Gala,[39] and also was awarded a Kennedy Center honour on December 3.[40] The tribute to Spielberg featured a short filmed biography narrated by Tom Hanks and included thank-yous from World War II veterans for Saving Private Ryan, as well as a performance of the finale to Leonard Bernstein's Candide, conducted by John Williams (Spielberg's frequent composer).

In November 2007, he is chosen for Lifetime Achievement Award to be presented at the sixth annual Visual Effects Society Awards in February 2009. He was set to be honored with the Cecil B. DeMille Award at the January 2008 Golden Globes; however, the new, watered-down format of the ceremony result from conflicts from the 2007-08 writers strike, the HFPA postponed his honor to the 2009 ceremony.[41][42]

### [edit] Criticism

Spielberg, as a co-owner of DreamWorks, was involved in a heated debate in which the studio proposed building on the remaining wetlands in Southern California, though development was later dropped.[43]

One colleague recalled that during the volatile 1968 Democratic National Convention, Spielberg was far more interested in mastering a tricky visual effects shot. Biskind also illustrates Steven Spielberg's unusual experience writing Jaws. According to Universal Press associate Roger Ebert, Spielberg once stated to him in his defense that "Every single word in his book about me is either erroneous, or a lie." [44]

Spielberg's films are often accused of leaning towards sentimentalism at the expense of other aspects of the film.[45][46][47][48]

French New Wave giant Jean-Luc Godard famously and publicly criticised Spielberg at the premiere of his film In Praise of Love. Godard, who has continuously complained about the commercial nature of modern cinema, holds Spielberg partly responsible for the lack of artistic merit in mainstream cinema. Godard accused Spielberg of using his film to make a profit of tragedy while Schindler's wife lived in poverty in Argentina, although in reality Spielberg chose not to make a profit from the film.[49] American artist and actor Crispin Glover also criticised Spielberg in his 2005 essay What Is It?. Among Glover's accusations are that Spielberg purchased a sled used in Orson Welles' 1941 film Citizen Kane for \$50,000 but refused to fund Welles' would-be final film, that he received money from the United States government to promote his personal religious and cultural beliefs and that he exploited tragedy for personal gain in the film Schindler's List.[50]

Critics such as anti-mainstream film theorist Ray Carney also complain that Spielberg's films lack depth and do not take risks.[51] In Spielberg's defense, critic Roger Ebert argues that Spielberg is very talented and has also said, "Has Godard or any other director living or dead done more than Spielberg, with his Holocaust Project, to honor and preserve the memories of the survivors?"[52] Some of Spielberg's most famous fans include film legends Ingmar Bergman,[53] and Terry Gilliam (although he has criticised some of Spielberg's more recent work).[54] The late French filmmaker François Truffaut admired his work and took a role in Spielberg's film Close Encounters of the Third Kind.

An episode in the sixth season of South Park satirizes Spielberg and Lucas for their revisions of previous films, such as E.T. and the Star Wars series. In the commentary for this episode, Parker and Stone, the makers of South Park, indicate that the films are being revised to make them more politically correct and to make money, disregarding the original work of art

Notes for CRAIG KENNETH (JAMES BROLIN) BRUDERLIN:

James Brolin (born July 18, 1940) is a two-time Golden Globe Award-winning and Emmy Award-winning American television, film, character actor, producer, and director, primarily for his roles in soap operas, movies, sitcoms and television.

The eldest of two brothers and two sisters, Brolin was born Craig Kenneth Bruderlin[1] in Los Angeles, California to Henry Bruderlin, a building contractor, and Helen Sue (née Mansur), a homemaker.[2] The family settled in Westwood after his birth. As a young child, he was apparently more interested in animals and airplanes, than he was in acting. When young Bruderlin was 10 in 1950, he began building model airplanes and was taught to fly them. As a teenaged moviegoer in the mid-1950s he was particularly fascinated with actor James Dean. When his parents invited a director over to his family's house for dinner before auditioning, he met another fellow actor and classmate, Ryan O'Neal, who was about a year younger than Brolin, and the two clicked. However, Bruderlin's own acting exposed his stifling shyness. His assurance grew when O'Neal invited him to a casting agency. Brolin graduated in 1958, and his family was already encouraging him to become an actor like O'Neal.

Prior to taking acting classes in school, Brolin started out as a character actor on an episode of Bus Stop in 1961. The part led to parts in other television productions such as Voyage to the Bottom of the Sea, Margie, Love, American Style, Twelve O'Clock High and The Long, Hot Summer. He made 3 guest appearances on the popular 1960s series Batman, alongside Adam West and Burt Ward, as well as roles in The Virginian, and Owen Marshall: Counselor at Law alongside Arthur Hill and Lee Majors. He also had a recurring role on the short-lived television series The Monroes.

At the age of 20 he changed his last name from "Bruderlin" to "Brolin" to become James Brolin. He accepted a contract with 20th Century Fox. While in school struggling to make it big, he met future young actor Clint Eastwood. Brolin also had small roles in several movies including Take Her, She's Mine (1963), Dear Brigitte (1965), Fantastic Voyage (1966). The following year, his first big role was in The Cape Town Affair (1967), but it did not receive any success at the box office. Brolin was ultimately fired by 20th Century Fox.

# [edit] Film work

During the 1970s, the 6 ft 4 inch Brolin began appearing in leading roles in films, including Skyjacked (1972), and Westworld (1973). By the mid-1970s, he was a regular leading man in films, starring in Gable and Lombard (1976), The Car (1977), Capricorn One (1978), High Risk (1981), and The Amityville Horror (1979). When Roger Moore expressed his desire to leave the role of James Bond, Brolin screen tested for the role in the next film Octopussy (1983). Ultimately, however, Moore decided to continue in the series.

In 1985, Brolin parodied his near-hiring as James Bond in the film Pee-Wee's Big Adventure. In a film within the film, he merged the characters of Bond and Pee-Wee Herman, the "real" version of whom was played by Paul Reubens. He is referred to as "PW" and the role of Pee-Wee Herman's girlfriend "Dottie" is played by Morgan Fairchild.

### [edit] Television roles

Brolin has starred in three television series in a career which has spanned four decades. He became widely-known for his roles as Robert Young's, youthful skilled and professional physician, Dr. Steven Kiley on Marcus Welby, M.D. (1969–1976), Peter McDermott on Hotel (1983–1988), and Lt. Col. Bill "Raven" Kelly on Pensacola: Wings of Gold (1997–2000). He also had a recurring role as Governor and presidential candidate Robert Ritchie in The West Wing.

In 1968, Brolin transferred to Universal Studios, where he auditioned for a co-starring role opposite longtime actor Robert Young in the popular medical drama Marcus Welby, M.D.. The series was one of the top-rated television shows of the day. Brolin won the role of Dr. Steven Kiley, a young doctor working with another more experienced doctor, and the chemistry between Young & Brolin clicked, and even came to attractive young women on medical terms, throughout the show's run. In its first season in 1970, Brolin won the Emmy Award for Outstanding Performance by an Actor in a Supporting Role, and was subsequently nominated three more times. He was also nominated for Golden Globes three times for Best Supporting Actor, and won twice between 1971 and 1973.

In 1983, Brolin returned to television to star in another popular series. He teamed up with producer Aaron Spelling for the pilot episode of a prime-time soap opera, Hotel, for ABC. On this show, he played Peter MacDermott, a hotel manager who tried to help everybody solve their own problems and to let love in his own life at the same time. Co-starring on the show was an unfamiliar actress, Shari Belafonte as Peter's receptionist, Julie Gillette, familiar actress,

Connie Sellecca, as Brolin's promotions manager and later girlfriend, Christine Francis, and the late Nathan Cook as Billy Griffin, an ex-con who later became Peter's best friend. Together, they each had a wonderful chemistry with Brolin, on the set. As with Marcus Welby, this show was a ratings winner. In his first year, Brolin was nominated twice for Golden Globes between 1983 and 1984 for Best Performance By an Actor in a TV Series, but didn't win. He would also serve as a director on the show, giving him more input into the direction of the series. On one episode of Hotel, he even invited his future wife Jan Smithers to guest-star on the show as the writers suggested that they developed a storyline for them, as Brolin was going through a difficult divorce. By 1988, after 5 seasons, Hotel was about to close its doors for good and the show was cancelled. That same year, his co-star, Cook had died of an allergic reaction to penicillin, and Brolin among the rest of his cast attended his funeral.

Sellecca said of Brolin's on-screen chemistry with him on Hotel, "I remember instantly feeling comfortable with Jim, and that's the thing that Jim has is to women, most women, they need to feel safe, and Jim gets that." She also said, "To have him in a different role and have that confidence, it was a wonderful experience." The 1995 death of Brolin's first wife, Jane, had drawn the relationship closer between the actor himself & Sellecca, as Connie was one of the people to find out about this.

As the new decade approached, Brolin starred in both Angel Falls for CBS and Extreme for ABC, although neither matched the popularity of his earlier series.

In 1997, Brolin's luck changed with the syndicated television series Pensacola: Wings of Gold. He played the role of Lt. Col. Bill "Raven" Kelly, whose job was to teach young marines in a special unit, before being promoted to work with a group of talented Marine fighter pilots. Brolin served as an executive producer and director on the series. In 2000, however, the show was cancelled after 66 episodes due to low ratings.

### [edit] Recent work

In late 2003, he was supposed to play Ronald Reagan in the TV movie The Reagans. After creative differences, bad scripts, and high rising costs, CBS decided to scrap The Reagans, but then chose to move it to cable channel Showtime, also owned by Viacom. Brolin was nominated for another Emmy Award, making it his fifth Emmy nomination and a Golden Globe making it also his fifth, although he didn't win. He co-starred with Jason Lee and Selma Blair in the comedy movie A Guy Thing (2003), and made two films in 2005, The Alibi and The American Standards.

In 2002, Brolin played Governor Robert Ritchie of Florida, the Republican opponent of President Jed Bartlet on the TV series The West Wing. In Bartlet's words, he'd "turned being unengaged into a Zen-like thing," and seemed to enjoy it. The character seemed to be a parody of real-life President George W. Bush, whose brother, John Ellis "Jeb" Bush, was the Governor of Florida at the time.

In 2006, Brolin played the Governor of Maine, who in order to get re-elected, opposes the legalization of gay marriage, in the A&E Network movie Wedding Wars.

### [edit] Hobbies

James has 12 hobbies: watching movies, riding horses, sailing, fishing, farming, playing guitar, photography, auto racing, petting animals, spending time with his family and riding motorcycles.[citation needed] According to an A&E Biography, it was mentioned that Brolin also did a lot of flying in real-life, and on Pensacola: Wings of Gold.

### [edit] Quotes

James on winning his first Emmy Award in 1970 for Best Supporting Actor in a Drama Series: "Well, you start these shows out with a bang, don't you? Well, I ... I had no speech. I ... started to write one and my wife came in and asked me, what I was doing. I said I was writing a speech. And she said, "What for? You haven't got a chance in hell!' But here I am. Geez!" (Source: A&EBiography.com)

James: "I think you can have a whole terrific, smart career as a second and third banana and work more and have much less risk than the lead guy. But I like being the lead guy." (Source: A&EBiography.com)

James as a director: "One of the things I love about directing is I love actors, because no matter how complex they are, once you get down to working and talking to them and the toughest guy will want you to open them up and he wants to show you stuff he was afraid to show anybody before." #### [edit] Personal life

Brolin resides in Malibu, California with his wife, Barbra Streisand. He has been married three times. In 1966, he married Jane Cameron Agee, an aspiring actress at Twentieth Century Fox. The couple had 2 children, Josh Brolin (b. February 12, 1968), and Jesse (b. 1972). They were divorced in 1984, after 18 years of marriage. Jane died in a car accident on February 13, 1995, one day after son Josh's 27th birthday.

In 1985, he met Jan Smithers, an actress, on the set of Hotel, and they married in 1986. The couple had a daughter (Molly Elizabeth, born 1987). Jan Smithers filed for divorce from Brolin in 1995, a few weeks after the death of his first wife, Jane. In 1996, he met the singer and actress Barbra Streisand through a friend, and the two were married on July 1, 1998.

Brolin is a Democrat and supported John Kerry in the 2004 election.

Notes for KARIN JAN SMITHERS:

Karin Jan Smithers (born July 3, 1949) is an American television and film actress.

Smithers grew up in Woodland Hills, California. She attended William Howard Taft High School in Woodland Hills. She played the character Bailey Quarters on the popular television series WKRP in Cincinnati. She first reached the public eye as a teenager, when she was featured on the cover of a 1966 issue of Newsweek, seated on a motorcycle[1]. As a result of that exposure, she landed some commercial modeling work while pursuing studies at the California Institute of the Arts.

As a teen, Smithers was involved in a car accident which left a permanent scar on her chin. To avoid another car that had run a stop sign, Jan swerved and hit a telephone pole. The impact smashed her face into the steering wheel, causing the injury. This scar cost her some roles and, according to Jan, made her feel insecure about her looks.

From 1987 through 1995 she was married to actor James Brolin. They had one daughter together. Although she had been living in Halifax, Nova Scotia, Canada and had retired from show business, she is now living in Ojai, California, and is reported to be considering a return to acting.[citation needed]

In 2001 Jan appeared on "Entertainment Tonight" specifically to quash the rumor that Barbra Streisand had stolen Brolin away from her. She said that she and Brolin had broken up years before Brolin met Streisand.

Notes for BARBARA JOAN (BARBRA) STREISAND:

Barbra Streisand (pronounced STRY-sand, IPA: /'stra?sænd/; born April 24, 1942) is an American singer and actress. She has also achieved some notability as a composer, political activist, film producer and director. She has won Oscars

for Best Actress and Best Original Song as well as multiple Emmy Awards, Grammy Awards, and Golden Globe Awards.

She is considered one of the most commercially and critically successful female entertainers in modern entertainment history and one of the best selling solo recording artists in the US, with RIAA-certified shipments of over 71 million albums. Because of that, she's the #1 female solo artist in the USA.

She was born Barbara Joan Streisand in Williamsburg, Brooklyn, to Jewish American parents. Her father, Emanuel Streisand, a grammar school teacher, died when she was 15 months old; she had a turbulent relationship with her stepfather, Louis Kind. She has a half-sister from her mother's second marriage, Roslyn Kind, who was also a performer.

Her mother, Diana, a school secretary,[2] did not encourage her daughter to pursue a show business career, opining that Barbara was not attractive enough, and encouraged Barbara to learn to type. Streisand attended Erasmus Hall High School,[3] where she graduated fourth in her class in 1959, and where she sang in the school choir with Neil Diamond. She was also friendly there with future World Chess Champion Bobby Fischer. She never attended college.

### [edit] Early singing, theater, and television career

After a music competition, Streisand became a nightclub singer while in her teens. She originally wanted to be an actress and appeared in a number of Off-Off-Broadway productions, including one with then-aspiring actress Joan Rivers, but when her boyfriend Barry Dennen helped her create a club act — first performed in a gay bar in Manhattan's Greenwich Village in 1960; she achieved success as a singer. It was at this time that she shortened her first name to Barbra to make it more distinctive.[citation needed]

In 1962 Streisand first appeared on Broadway, in the small but star-making role of Miss Marmelstein in the musical I Can Get It for You Wholesale. She also signed her first recording contract that year with Columbia Records.[citation needed]

Her first album, The Barbra Streisand Album, won two Grammy Awards in 1963. Her recording success continued, and at one time Streisand's first three albums appeared simultaneously on Billboard's pop albums Top Ten - an unusual feat considering it was at a time when rock and roll and The Beatles dominated the charts.[citation needed]

One notable TV special was a documentation of her 1967 free concert in New York's Central Park, at which she sang to a crowd of some 135,000 people.[citation needed]

### [edit] Singing career

Streisand has recorded more than 60 albums, almost all with the Columbia Records label. Streisand has stamped nearly every song she has sung with her unique style of interpretation. Her early works in the 1960s (her debut, The Second Barbra Streisand Album, The Third Album, My Name Is Barbra, etc.) are considered classic renditions of theatre and nightclub standards, including her version of "Happy Days Are Here Again". Beginning with My Name Is Barbra, her albums were often medley-filled keepsakes of her television specials.

Starting in 1969, Streisand tackled contemporary songwriters, but like many "talented" singers of the day, she found herself a fish out of water in attempts to tackle rock. But her vocal talents prevailed, and she gained newfound success with the pop and ballad-oriented Richard Perry-produced album Stoney End in 1971. The title track, written by Laura Nyro, was a big hit for Streisand.

During the 1970s, she was also highly prominent in the pop charts, with number-one records like "The Way We Were", "Evergreen", "No More Tears (Enough Is Enough)" (with Donna Summer) and "Woman in Love"; some of these came from soundtrack records to her films.

As the 1970s ended, Streisand was named the most successful female singer in the U.S. - only Elvis Presley and The Beatles had sold more albums.[4] In 1982, New York Times music critic Stephen Holden wrote that Streisand was "the most influential mainstream American pop singer since Frank Sinatra."[citation needed]

Streisand returned to her musical-theater roots with 1985's The Broadway Album, which was unexpectedly successful, holding the coveted #1 Billboard position for 3 straight weeks, and being certified 4x Platinum. The album featured songs reworked by Stephen Sondheim especially for this recording, was critically acclaimed, nominated as Album of the Year and landed Streisand her 8th Grammy as Best Female Vocalist.

In 1991, a four-disc box set, Just for the Record, was released, spanning Streisand's entire career. It featured over 70 tracks, including live material, greatest hits, and rarities, from her early recordings up to 1991.

Streisand's concert fundraising events helped propel former President Bill Clinton into the spotlight and into office.[5] Streisand later introduced Clinton at his inauguration in 1992. Streisand's music career, however, was on hold. A tour was suggested, and she debated it for two years because of her stage fright. A year later, Streisand landed another #1 Back to Broadway. This album included the duet medley I Have A Love / One Hand, One Heart with the legendary Johnny Mathis whom Streisand said is one of her favorite singers.

In September 1993, Streisand made global news, announcing her first public concert tour in 27 years. Tickets to the limited tour were sold out in under one hour. Streisand also hit the cover of major magazines, in anticipation of what Time magazine named "The Music Event of the Century". The tour was one of the biggest all-media merchandise parlays in history. Ticket prices ranged from \$50 to \$1,500 - making Streisand the highest paid concert performer in history. Barbra Streisand: The Concert went on to be the top grossing concert of the year, earned five Emmy Awards and the Peabody Award, and the taped broadcast on HBO is, to date, the highest rated concert special in HBO's 30 year history.

On New Year's Eve 1999, she returned to the concert stage, giving the highest grossing single concert in Las Vegas history to date. At the end of the last millennium, she was the number one female singer in the US, with at least two #1 albums in each decade since she began performing.

Her most recent albums have been Christmas Memories (2001), a collection of somber holiday songs, and The Movie Album (2003), featuring famous movie themes and backed by a large symphony orchestra. Guilty Pleasures (called Guilty Too in the UK), a collaboration with Barry Gibb and a sequel album to their previous Guilty, was released worldwide in 2005.

In February 2006, Streisand recorded the song Smile alongside Tony Bennett at Streisand's Malibu home. The song is included on Tony Bennett's 80th Birthday Album, Duets. In September 2006, the pair filmed a live performance of the song for a special directed by Rob Marshall entitled Tony Bennett: An American Classic. The special aired on NBC Television November 21, 2006, and was released on DVD the same day. Streisand's duet with Bennett opens the special.

In advance of four concerts (two each in Los Angeles and New York) in September 2000, Streisand announced she was retiring from future paying public concerts. Her performance of the song People was broadcast on the Internet via America Online.

In 2006, Streisand came out of retirement and announced her intent to tour again, in an effort to raise money and awareness for multiple issues. After four days of rehearsal at the Sovereign Bank Arena in Trenton, New Jersey, the tour began on October 4 at the Wachovia Center in Philadelphia and concluded at Staples Center in Los Angeles on November 20, 2006. Special guests II Divo were interwoven throughout the show. On stage closing night, Streisand hinted that six more concerts may follow on foreign soil. The show was known as Streisand: The Tour.

On October 9, 2006, Streisand performed a concert at the Madison Square Garden, featuring a skit that made fun of President George W. Bush. When one heckler continued to yell repeated taunts during and long after the skit had ended, Streisand responded by shouting "Shut the fuck up!" She later apologized, but added that "The artist's role is to disturb."[6] Ultimately, Streisand endured negative reaction to the sketch at only two out of her twenty concert dates. It was thought that an audience member in Fort Lauderdale threw liquid from a cup at her because of the skit, but the incident was found to be non-political.[7]

Streisand's 20-concert tour set record box office numbers. At the age of 64, well past the prime of most performers, she grossed \$92,457,062 and set house gross records in 14 of the 16 arenas played on the tour. She set the third place record for her October 9, 2006 show at Madison Square Garden, the first and second place records of which are held by her two shows in September 2000. She set the second place record at the MGM Grand Garden Arena, with her December 31, 1999 show being the house record and the highest grossing concert of all time. This led many people to openly criticize Streisand for price gouging, as many tickets sold upwards of 1,000 dollars.

A collection of performances culled from different stops on this tour, Live in Concert 2006, debuted at #7 on the Billboard 200, making it Streisand's 29th Top 10 album.[8] In the summer of 2007, Streisand gave concerts for the first time in continental Europe. The first concert took place in Zürich (June 18), then Vienna (June 22), Paris (June 26), Berlin (June 30), Stockholm (July 4, cancelled), Manchester (July 10) and Celbridge, near Dublin (July 14), followed by three concerts in London (July 18, 22 & 25), the only European city where Streisand had performed before 2007. Tickets for the London dates cost between £100.00 and £1,500.00 and for the Ireland date between €118.00 and €500.00.[citation needed]

She has sold 143 million records worldwide, making her the #6 best selling female of all-time behind Madonna, Cher, Mariah Carey, Céline Dion, and Whitney Houston.[citation needed]

She doesn't appear in the list of Forbes as one of the richest women in the world, because she doesn't want to show her salary to anyone. It's estimated that her fortune is \$300 million or more

Her first film was a reprise of her Broadway hit, Funny Girl (1968), an artistic and commercial success, for which she won the 1968 Academy Award for Best Actress, sharing it with Katharine Hepburn (The Lion in Winter), the first time there was a tie in this Oscar category. Her next two movies were also based on musicals, Jerry Herman's Hello, Dolly! (1969) and Alan Jay Lerner's and Burton Lane's On a Clear Day You Can See Forever (1970), while her fourth film was based on the Broadway play The Owl and the Pussycat (film) (1970).

She also starred in the original screwball comedies, including What's Up, Doc? (1972), with Ryan O'Neal, and For Pete's Sake (1974), and the drama The Way We Were (1973) with Robert Redford. Her second Academy Award was for Best Original Song as composer of the song "Evergreen", from A Star Is Born (1976); this was the first time a woman had received this award.

Along with Paul Newman and Sidney Poitier, Streisand formed First Artists Production Company in 1969 so the actors could secure properties and develop movie projects for themselves. Streisand's initial outing with First Artists was the personal Up the Sandbox (1972).

In 1970, she had a topless scene in The Owl and the Pussycat. She regretted the move and requested that director Herbert Ross delete the scene from the movie. Years later, High Society magazine obtained the original negative from the film, which included the topless scene. When they published the photos of her bare breasts, Streisand took action to remove the magazine from the stands.[citation needed] The Owl and the Pussycat is also notable for being the first Hollywood film in which a major Hollywood star (Streisand) uttered the word "fuck."[citation needed]

From a period beginning in 1969 and ending in 1980, Streisand appeared in the annual motion picture exhibitors poll of Top 10 Box Office attractions a total of 10 times, often as the only woman on the list. But after the disappointment of All Night Long in 1981, Streisand's film output decreased considerably. She has only acted in five films since.

Streisand produced a number of her own films, setting up Barwood Films in 1972. For Yentl (1983), she was producer, director, writer, and star, an experience she repeated for The Prince of Tides (1991). Steven Spielberg called Yentl a masterpiece, and both won critical acclaim. There was controversy when Yentl received five Academy Award nominations but none for the major categories of Best Picture, Actress, or Director.[9] Prince of Tides received even more nominations, including Best Picture, but the director was not nominated.

In 2004, Streisand made a return to film acting, after an eight-year hiatus, in the comedy Meet the Fockers (a sequel to Meet the Parents), playing opposite Dustin Hoffman, Ben Stiller, Blythe Danner and Robert De Niro. But Streisand has since said that she does not have an interest in doing another film.[citation needed]

#### [edit] Politics

Streisand has long been an active supporter of the Democratic Party and many of its causes, such as working against global warming, supporting gun control (she executive-produced the film The Long Island Incident, about a mass shooting on the Long Island Railroad), getting more useful aid for victims of Hurricane Katrina, and questioning the motives behind the 2003 invasion of Iraq. She also strongly supports women's reproductive rights. Barbra Streisand performed both at Lyndon B. Johnson's (1965) and Bill Clinton's (1993) inauguration galas. On November 27, 2007, Streisand endorsed 2008 presidential candidate Senator Hillary Rodham Clinton.[10]

#### [edit] SLAPP lawsuit

Streisand sued Kenneth Adelman, an aerial photographer who displayed a photo of her Malibu home (amongst photos of the entire California coast) on the website of the California Coastal Records Project. Her suit was dismissed under the anti-SLAPP provisions of California law. Streisand v. Adelman Et al, in California Superior Court; Case SC077257 [11][12] The publicity generated by her efforts to suppress the photograph has given rise to the term Streisand effect.

#### Personal life

Barbra Streisand has been married twice. Her first husband was actor Elliott Gould to whom she was married from 1963 to 1971. They have one child, Jason Gould. Her second husband is actor James Brolin, whom she married on July 1, 1998. The wedding was reported regularly in the celebrity gossip media. While they have no children together, Brolin has two children from his first marriage and one child from his second marriage. Both of her husbands starred in the 1970s conspiracy thriller Capricorn One.

Streisand allegedly dated Ryan O'Neal, Tom Smothers, Warren Beatty, Jon Voight, former Prime Minister of Canada Pierre Trudeau, producer Jon Peters, Omar Sharif, Don Johnson, Steve McQueen, Kris Kristofferson, Andre Agassi, and news anchor Peter Jennings. Peters' daughters, Caleigh Peters and Skye Peters, are her goddaughters.

On a Season 8 episode of Friends, Brolin is mentioned in the script. In the same episode, Gould appears on the show as Ross and Monica's father.

Streisand's iconic status has been parodied on the sketch comedy show Saturday Night Live in the recurring skit Coffee Talk where character Linda Richman, played by Mike Myers, hosts a talk show dedicated to, among other things, the adoration of Streisand. Streisand, in turn, made an unannounced guest appearance on the show, surprising Myers and guests, Madonna, and Roseanne Barr.

Streisand has been repeatedly satirized in the animated series South Park, most notably the episode "Mecha-Streisand", where she is portrayed as self-important and turns into a gigantic robotic dinosaur in order to conquer the universe, before being defeated by Robert Smith of The Cure. On another occasion, the Halloween episode "Spookyfish" was promoted for a week as being done in "Spooky-Vision", which involved Streisand's face seen at times during the episode in the four corners of the screen. At the end of the feature film South Park: Bigger, Longer and Uncut, her name is used as a powerful curse word, a gag repeated in the episode "Osama bin Laden Has Farty Pants".

Streisand is the favorite of the character Howard Brackett, played by Kevin Kline, in the film In & Out, who finally admits to being gay while standing at the altar. His unfortunate bride-to-be, played by Joan Cusack, cries out in frustration to family and friends present, "Do you know how many times I've had to sit through Funny Lady?" In an earlier scene, Howard is taunted by a friend during an argument at a bar with a jeering, "The studio thought that Barbra was too ol-l-ld to play Yentl." Barbra's signature tune, "People", is played by a school orchestra in honor of teacher Howard as the story wraps. This and similar references refer to her popularity among gay men.

Streisand is mentioned many times in Fran Drescher's The Nanny, where Fran Drescher played Fran Fine who, along with her entire family, is obsessed with the performer.

In 1993 Robin Williams' Mrs. Doubtfire, while trying different looks to apply to the Mrs. Doubtfire character, Williams uses a wig "a la Streisand" and sings some lines from "Don't Rain On My Parade", but discarded the idea.

Streisand is referenced in at least two episodes of Friends. In The One Where Chandler Can't Remember Which Sister, Monica names a sandwich at her 50's-styled restaurant after Barbra. A soup is also named after Barbra's movie Yentl. Meanwhile, in The One After 'I Do', Phoebe pretends she is pregnant with James Brolin's baby, to which Chandler Bing responds "[A]s in Barbra Streisand's husband, James Brolin?"

Streisand is referenced in at least three episodes of The Simpsons. Outside Springfield Elementary School, announcing Lisa's jazz concert, is an advertisement for a Streisand concert in the same venue for the following day, with tickets still on sale. In another episode, after Marge undergoes therapy, she informs the therapist that whenever she hears the wind blow, she'll hear it saying "Lowenstein", Streisand's therapist character in The Prince of Tides, despite Marge's therapist having a completely different name. Another reference comes in Sleeping with the Enemy when Bart exclaims after seeing Lisa make a snow-angel in a cake on the kitchen table, "At least she's not singing Streisand".

In The In-Laws, Michael Douglas's character borrows Streisand's jet, and in the bathroom "The Way We Were" is playing on the speaker system and Albert Brooks finds a large drawer full of nail polish, referencing her signature long fingernails.

In the movie Fear and Loathing in Las Vegas a teenage runaway (played by Christina Ricci) paints images of Streisand while being administered large amounts of LSD by Hunter Thompson's Samoan attorney.

In the Broadway Musical Spamalot, the song "You can't succeed on Broadway" references lines from "People" and "Papa, Can You Hear Me?".

In the internet cartoon and subsequent movie Queer Duck, the character is obsessed with Streisand. In the film he undergoes Christian-based conversion therapy to be made straight, and only Barbra's magic nose can return him to his gayness.

In a "Family Guy" episode, where Peter is a bartender, Lois does a cabaret act and sings "Don't Rain On My Parade," only slowed down and jazzier, as an act of defiance to Peter.

In Chicken Little, Chicken's best friend Runt's mom says, after she thinks he is lying about seeing an alien spaceship, "Don't make me take away your Streisand collection!" and Runt returns with, "Mother, you leave Barbra out of this!"

### Notes for MARION (JOHN WAYNE) MICHAEL MORRISON:

Wayne, John (1907-1979), American motion-picture actor, beloved as the archetype of rugged, honest American manhood, and a Hollywood star for 40 years. He was born Marion Michael Morrison in Winterset, Iowa. Wayne was a star athlete at the University of Southern California when he began playing small roles in films. In 1929 he was cast

in his first leading role, in The Big Trail (1930). Thus began one of the most phenomenal careers in film history. After appearing in routine Westerns and action films for about ten years, Wayne gained prominence almost overnight when he was cast by director John Ford in the lead role of the ground-breaking Western Stagecoach (1939). Soon he was in great demand as a leading man, and he was continuously cast until the mid-1970s, usually as a tough, taciturn, idealistic cowboy or military man.

Among the most memorable of Wayne's more than 250 films are They Were Expendable (1945), Fort Apache (1948), She Wore a Yellow Ribbon (1949), Rio Grande (1950), The Quiet Man (1952), and The Searchers (1956), all directed by John Ford; Red River (1948), Rio Bravo (1959), Hatari! (1962), and Rio Lobo (1970), all directed by Howard Hawks; The Alamo (1960) and The Green Berets (1968), both of which Wayne produced, directed, and starred in and which clearly convey his conservative philosophy; and True Grit (1969), in which he portrayed Rooster Cogburn, a performance that earned him an Academy Award for best actor (and which he reprised in the 1975 film Rooster Cogburn, costarring Katharine Hepburn).

Wayne's other notable films include Sands of Iwo Jima (1949), Hondo (1953), The High and the Mighty (1954), Blood Alley (1955), The Comancheros (1961), McLintock (1963), and his final picture, The Shootist (1976). Wayne was posthumously awarded a Congressional Gold Medal, the highest civilian honor granted by the United States Congress.

His son Michael, who headed Wayne's own production company, Batjac Productions, produced most of his father's films beginning in 1963. His sons Patrick Wayne and John Ethan Wayne both became motion-picture actors.

John Wayne (May 26, 1907 - June 11, 1979), called "Duke", was an American actor whose career spanned the evolutionary phase of American cinema, appearing in silent movies and "talkies" alike.

He was born Marion Robert Morrison, which became Marion Michael Morrison when his parents decided to name their next son Robert. He was born in Winterset, Iowa, and his family moved to Glendale, California in 1911. It was neighbours in Glendale who started calling him "Big Duke", because he never went anywhere without his Airedale dog, who was Little Duke. He preferred "Duke" to "Marion", and the name stuck for the rest of his life.

His first starring role was in the movie The Big Trail; it was the director of that movie, Raoul Walsh, who gave him the stage name "John Wayne", after Revolutionary War general "Mad Anthony" Wayne.

He appeared in many strong masculine ("macho") roles in western films and war films, but he also had a down-toearth sense of humour which allowed him to appear in a pink bunny suit for an episode of Rowan and Martin's Laugh-In, as well as in comedy movies. According to the Internet Movie Database Wayne played the male lead in 142 of his film appearances, an as yet unsurpassed record. He had a long collaboration with director John Ford.

Despite his prolific output John Wayne won only a single Best Leading Actor Oscar, for the 1969 movie True Grit. He received a nomination for the Best Leading Actor in Sands of Iwo Jima, and as producer for Best Picture for The Alamo.

John Wayne died of lung cancer on June 11, 1979 and was interred in the Pacific View Memorial Park cemetery in Corona del Mar, Orange County, California. Some trace his cancer back to his work in The Conqueror. filmed about 100 mi downwind of Nevada nuclear-weapons test sites.

There is an airport named after him, John Wayne Airport, in Orange County, California.

James Todd Spader (born February 7, 1960), who is known to prefer being called "Jimmy",[1] is a three-time Emmywinning and Golden Globe-nominated[2] American actor. He is perhaps best known for his eccentric roles in movies such as sex, lies, and videotape (for which he won the Best Actor award Cannes Film Festival),[2] Stargate, and Secretary, and the television series Boston Legal and The Practice.

#### Early life

Spader was born in Boston, Massachusetts, the son of teachers Jean and Todd Spader.[3] He attended The Pike School (where his mother taught art) and lived at Brooks School (where his father taught) in North Andover, Massachusetts. The Spader family lived on the Brooks School campus.[4] Spader later attended Phillips Academy. Spader dropped out of school in the eleventh grade to pursue acting at the Michael Chekhov School in New York City.[4] Before becoming a full-time actor, Spader did a variety of jobs including being a yoga instructor, busboy, truck driver, stable boy, and railroad-car loader.[4]

#### [edit] Career

Spader stars as the popular lead character Alan Shore in the TV series Boston Legal, where he has reprised his role from the TV series The Practice. Spader won the Outstanding Lead Actor in a Drama Series Emmy Award for his portrayal of Alan Shore in 2004 on The Practice and won it again in 2005 for Boston Legal.[2] Spader has become one of the few actors to win consecutive Emmy Awards for playing the same character on two different series (another being co-star William Shatner as Denny Crane). Spader won the Satellite Award for Best Actor in a Series, Comedy or Musical for Boston Legal in 2006 and took home his third Emmy Award for Outstanding Lead Actor in a Drama Series in 2007.[2]

In October 2006, Spader narrated China Revealed, the first episode of Discovery Channel's documentary series Discovery Atlas. He has also done the voice-over in several television commercials for Acura.[5]

### [edit] Personal life

Spader met his wife, Victoria Kheel, a decorator, while working in a yoga studio after he moved to New York in the early 1980s. They married in 1987 and had two sons, Sebastian and Elijah. Spader and Kheel divorced in 2004. James Spader currently has plans to marry his girlfriend, Leslie Stefanson.[6]

Spader loves to cook, has very poor eyesight, and usually points out that even though his characters can be sleazy at times, he is actually a nice, friendly guy in real life.[1]

Catherine Elizabeth "Kate" Middleton (born 9 January 1982) is the fiancée of Prince William of Wales. Since their relationship began, Middleton has received widespread media attention and there was much speculation that they would eventually marry. On 16 November 2010, the office of the Prince of Wales at Clarence House announced their engagement. On 23 November, it was announced the marriage would take place on 29 April 2011 at Westminster Abbey.

Middleton grew up in Berkshire and after attending Marlborough College, went to the University of St Andrews, where she met Prince William, also studying there, in 2001. They started a relationship, followed by media attention, triggering complaints by Middleton that the media were harassing her. In April 2007, the press reported that William and Middleton had split up. They continued to be friends, and later in 2007 they reunited. Since then, Middleton has attended many high-profile royal events. She has been admired for her fashion sense and has been placed on numerous "best dressed" lists.

### Early life

Middleton was born at Royal Berkshire Hospital in Reading, Berkshire, the first of three children of Michael Francis Middleton (born 1949), a flight dispatcher in 1980 and an airline officer in 1982 for British Airways, and Carole Elizabeth (born 1955, née Goldsmith), a flight attendant. Michael and Carole were married on 21 June 1980 at the Parish Church of Dorney, Buckinghamshire.[1][2] In 1987 Michael and Carole Middleton founded Party Pieces, a mail order company that sells party supplies and decorations.[3] They have since become millionaires.[4]

Middleton was raised in Bucklebury, Berkshire.[5] She is of English descent, but with a few distant Scottish and French Hugenot ancestors.[1][original research?] Her paternal family came from Leeds, West Yorkshire, and her great-grandmother Olivia was a member of the Lupton family, who were active for generations in Leeds in commercial and municipal work.[4] Carole Middleton's maternal family, the Harrisons, were working class labourers and miners from County Durham.[6] Middleton has two siblings, Philippa "Pippa" Charlotte[7] and James William.[8] Pippa Middleton, a graduate of the University of Edinburgh, has received press coverage since her sister became famous, with focus on her relationships and lifestyle.[9]

### Education

Middleton was educated at St. Andrew's School in the village of Pangbourne in Berkshire in South East England, and Marlborough College, a co-educational independent school in the market town of Marlborough in Wiltshire in South West England,[10] followed by the University of St Andrews in the town of St Andrews in Fife, where she met Prince William, and graduated with a 2:1 (Hons) in the History of Art.[11]

### Relationship with Prince William

Middleton's unsubstantiated status as the girlfriend of Prince William brought her widespread media coverage in the UK and abroad, and she was often photographed on her daily outings. On 17 October 2005, she complained through her lawyer about harassment from the media, stating that she had done nothing significant to warrant such publicity.[12]

In February 2006, it was announced that Middleton would receive her own 24-hour security detail supplied by the Royalty and Diplomatic Protection Department. This fueled further speculation that she and Prince William would soon be engaged, since she would not, otherwise, be entitled to this service. No engagement occurred, and Middleton was not granted an allowance to fund this security. Media attention increased around the time of Middleton's 25th birthday in January 2007, prompting warnings from both Prince Charles and Prince William and from Middleton's lawyers, who threatened legal action. Two newspaper groups, News International, which publishes The Times and The Sun, and the Guardian Media Group, publishers of The Guardian, decided to refrain from publishing paparazzi photographs of her.[13]

Middleton attended at least one event as an official royal guest, Prince William's Passing Out Parade at the Royal Military Academy Sandhurst on 15 December 2006.[14]

### Breakup and reconciliation

The Sun newspaper broke a "world exclusive" suggesting that Prince William and Kate Middleton had split up.[15] Other media outlets such as the BBC confirmed the story as the day progressed. The couple decided to break up during a holiday in the Swiss resort of Zermatt.[16][17]

Clarence House made only one comment about the relationship's end, according to The Times, stating, "We don't comment on Prince William's private life."[18] Newspapers speculated about the reasons for the split, although these reports relied on anonymous sources. The original report in The Sun quoted a "close friend of the couple" as saying that Middleton felt William had not been paying her enough attention. The paper highlighted reports that William had been spending time with other young women, and said the Prince, aged 24 at the time of the split, felt he was too young to marry.[19]

A report in the Daily Mail blamed a desire by royal courtiers not to "hurry along" a marriage announcement, and William's desire to enjoy his bachelor status within his Army career. The Mail also suggested that William's friend Guy Pelly encouraged the Prince to take a "careless approach" to relationships. The same article suggested that Middleton had "expected too much" in wanting William to demonstrate his commitment to her.[20]

In June 2007, Middleton and Prince William insisted they were "just good friends" following reports of a reconciliation.[21] Middleton and her family attended the Concert for Diana at Wembley Stadium; she and William sat two rows apart.[22] The couple were subsequently seen together in public on a number of occasions, and several news sources, including the BBC and the Daily Mail, stated that they had "rekindled their relationship."[23] Middleton also joined William and Charles on a deerstalking expedition at Balmoral[24] and attended the wedding of William's cousin, Peter Phillips, even though William, due to a prior commitment, did not. In April 2008, Middleton accompanied Prince William when he was awarded his RAF wings at the Royal Air Force College Cranwell.[25] On 16 June 2008, Middleton attended William's investiture into the Order of the Garter along with the Royal Family.

### Engagement and possible titles

Main article: Wedding of Prince William of Wales and Kate Middleton

On 16 November 2010, Clarence House announced that the two are to marry in 2011.[26][27] The couple became engaged in October 2010 in Kenya, East Africa, during a 10-day trip to the Lewa Wildlife Conservancy to celebrate William's passing his RAF helicopter search and rescue course.[28][29] They are to marry in Westminister Abbey on 29 April 2011.[30] It is customary for royal men to receive a dukedom when they marry – the suggested dukedoms are the Dukedom of Clarence, Dukedom of Cambridge or Dukedom of Sussex; Kendal, Avondale, and Strathearn have all also been mooted. As the wife of a royal duke and prince, Middleton would assume the courtesy title of duchess as well as the style of Her Royal Highness.[31]

In Letters Patent dated 21 August 1996 (shortly after the divorce of the Prince and Princess of Wales) it was acknowledged that by "convention the wife of the son of a sovereign of these Realms the wife of a son of a son of a Sovereign and the wife of the eldest living son of the eldest son of the Prince of Wales is entitled to the style title or attribute of Royal Highness".[32] If William were not given a title then, after the wedding, Middleton would, by convention (unless explicitly vetoed by the Queen), be known as Her Royal Highness, Princess William of Wales[33] taking her husband's first name on marriage (as with Princess Michael of Kent).[34] If however William is given a title, she would be known as "Her Royal Highness the Duchess [or other rank if appropriate] of N". Middleton's engagement to Prince William clears the way for future roles as Princess of Wales and possibly Queen consort if and when William becomes heir and eventually king.

### 2006-present

In November 2006 Middleton accepted a position as an assistant accessories buyer with clothing chain Jigsaw.[35]

In September 2007 it was reported that Middleton was planning to give up her job as an accessories buyer to become a professional photographer. Some months later, it was announced that she intended to take private classes with internationally renowned photographer Mario Testino, who had taken several well-known photographs of Diana, Princess of Wales, and her sons. Middleton and Testino apparently were introduced by Prince William. Testino later denied that Middleton was going to be working for him or had ever worked for him.[36] In December 2007, it was also reported that Middleton had moved in with Prince William at Clarence House, the residence of the Prince of Wales in London.[37] Clarence House later denied this.[38]

On 17 May 2008, Middleton attended the wedding of Prince William's cousin Peter Phillips to Autumn Kelly, which the prince missed attending.[39] On 19 July 2008, Middleton attended the wedding of Lady Rose Windsor and George Gilman. Prince William was away on military operations.

On 28 February 2010, The Times reported that Middleton was pursuing an invasion of privacy suit against photographer Niraj Tanna who took pictures of her over Christmas, [40] although they were never published in Britain. Middleton has not pursued the claim against the photographer as of September 2010.

# Fashion icon

Middleton has been featured in several best-dressed lists and was selected by The Daily Telegraph as the "Most Promising Newcomer" in its 2006 list of style winners and losers.[41] Tatler placed her at #8 on its yearly listing of the top ten style icons in 2007.[42] She was also featured in People Magazine's 2007 and 2010 best-dressed lists.[43] Middleton was named as one of Richard Blackwell's ten "Fabulous Fashion Independents" of 2007.[44] In June 2008 Style.com selected Middleton as its monthly beauty icon.[45] In July 2008 Middleton was included in Vanity Fair's international best-dressed list.[46]

# Notes for TERI LYNN HATCHER:

Teri Lynn Hatcher (born 8 December 1964, Palo Alto) is an award-winning American actress best known for her role as Lois Lane in the American television series Lois & Clark: The New Adventures of Superman and Susan Mayer in the American television series Desperate Housewives.

She gained attention for her role as Lois Lane in Lois & Clark: The New Adventures of Superman, with Dean Cain as Superman/Clark Kent. Hatcher is also well-known for portraying Susan Mayer, in Desperate Housewives, an accident-prone divorcee. She is also a "Bond Girl", having played Paris Carver in Tomorrow Never Dies in 1997.

Hatcher was born in Palo Alto, California, the daughter of Esther (née Beshur), a computer programmer who worked for Lockheed Martin, and Owen W. Hatcher, a nuclear physicist and electrical engineer.[1][2] Hatcher's father was of Welsh and distant Choctaw Native American descent, and her mother had French, German, and Syrian ancestry.[2] Hatcher grew up in Sunnyvale, California.[2] An only child, she attended Mango Junior High (now Sunnyvale Middle School), Fremont High School in Sunnyvale and De Anza College in Cupertino.

In March 2006, Hatcher revealed to Vanity Fair that she was sexually abused from the age of five by Richard Hayes Stone, an uncle by marriage who was later divorced by Hatcher's aunt. Her parents, she said, were unaware of the abuse at the time. In 2002, she assisted Santa Clara County prosecutors in indicting Stone for a more recent molestation that led his female victim to commit suicide at the age of fourteen.[2] Stone pleaded guilty to four counts of child molestation and was sentenced to 14 years in prison.[3] In an interview appearing in Vanity Fair, Hatcher said she told the prosecutors about her own abuse because she was haunted by thoughts of the 14-year-old girl who shot herself, and feared Stone might escape conviction.

### [edit] Career

Hatcher began her performing career as a young girl taking ballet lessons at the San Juan Girls' Ballet Studio in downtown Los Altos, California.[2] She later studied acting at the American Conservatory Theater. One of her early

jobs (in 1984) was as a cheerleader with the San Francisco 49ers. During this time, she also appeared as one of the mermaids on the show The Love Boat in its final season

Hatcher landed a co-starring role in 1993, opposite Dean Cain in Lois and Clark.[2] Her role proved to be the best move to gain the attention of audiences, and the one role she had most fallen in love with. While probably most noted for playing what is widely regarded as the best Lois Lane portrayal to date[citation needed] in the TV series Lois and Clark: The New Adventures of Superman (1993-1997), Hatcher has also appeared in such feature films as Spy Kids (2001), the 1997 James Bond film Tomorrow Never Dies, Dead in the Water (1991), 2 Days in the Valley (1996), The Cool Surface (1994) and Heaven's Prisoners (1996). The last two films featured Hatcher's only on-screen nude scenes, but neither did well at the box office. ABC had cancelled Lois & Clark in 1997, and Hatcher was very disappointed about the show's demise. She was also desperate in looking for work.[citation needed] She has made a guest appearance in Star Trek: The Next Generation and had a recurring role on MacGyver as Penny Parker, a naïve, high-strung, young woman who always seemed to get into trouble.

She also had a guest appearance in an episode of Seinfeld, in which her character, Sidra, broke up with Jerry because she found out Jerry was trying to have Elaine surreptitiously determine whether Sidra had breast implants. In one of the more memorable lines in the show, she declared, "Oh, and by the way: they're real, and they're spectacular." Hatcher has also appeared in a series of popular Radio Shack television commercials alongside NFL Hall of Famer Howie Long. The pair remain close friends, and together have bought farm land on the outside of Los Angeles, with the intent of eventually raising endangered species. Hatcher said her plan to do so came about after reading an article featuring the world's top 25 endangered species.[citation needed]

She hosted Saturday Night Live in 1996. Hatcher beat out four other actresses for the lead role on ABC's Desperate Housewives, on which she stars as single mother Susan Mayer, a role for which she won the Best Actress in a Musical or Comedy Golden Globe Award in January 2005.[2] In 2005, Hatcher also won the Screen Actors Guild (SAG) award in the same category. In July 2005, she was nominated for an Emmy Award as Best Actress in a Comedy Series for the same role, along with co-stars Marcia Cross and Felicity Huffman, who won the award.

As of April 2006, Hatcher is one of the highest paid television actresses in the United States. She reportedly earns \$285,000 per episode of Desperate Housewives. In May 2006, she released her first book, Burnt Toast: And Other Philosophies of Life.[2] In conjunction with the book, she has also launched a line of apparel and merchandise. Furthermore she is prominently featured in an international campaign for Repeat Cashmere.

### [edit] Personal life

Between 1985 and 1988, she had a relationship with her MacGyver costar Richard Dean Anderson. Hatcher married Marcus Leithold on June 4, 1988; they divorced the following year. On May 27, 1994, she married actor Jon Tenney; they had a daughter, Emerson Rose, in November 10, 1997, and divorced in March 2003. It has also been reported that Hatcher had a brief relationship with 7'0" former NBA player John Salley in 2005.[citation needed] Hatcher has also been dating Stephen Kay, who played Reginald, the Quartermaines' butler, on General Hospital.[4]Since then she and Stephen have broken up.

In June 2007, Hatcher appeared on the Paul O'Grady show where she revealed that she writes a column in FHM.

Notes for JONATHAN F. W. TENNEY: Jonathan F. W. Tenney (born December 16, 1961) is an American actor.

Tenney was born in Princeton, New Jersey to a psychiatrist mother and a research physicist father.[1] He received his B.A. degree from Vassar College, where he majored in drama and philosophy. He then studied at Juilliard, after which he made his professional debut starring in a touring production of The Real Thing directed by Mike Nichols. This led to his working steadily on and off-Broadway, as well as in regional theater. His New York City stage credits include Biloxi Blues, The Substance of Fire, and The Heiress.

Tenney's work in television includes a lead role in the short-lived Steven Bochco series Brooklyn South and guest appearances on Will & Grace, Murphy Brown, Spenser: for Hire, and Get Real. He currently co-stars as Kyra Sedgwick's love interest on the TNT crime drama The Closer. Tenney has appeared in small roles in such films as Tombstone, Nixon, and Music from Another Room.

He was married to actress Teri Hatcher from 1994 to 2003. They have one daughter, Emerson Rose Tenney, born in November 1997.

Norma grew up in Mitcheltown, Te Aro, Wellington and lived in an home next to the old schoolhouse at the very end of the now famous street Holloway Rd.

Norma was a sickly child had skinny legs but, even then, had an artistic flair. Because of her poor health, she left school early to become a dancer in the hope that the physical exercise of dance would contribute to better health. She trained in ballet and dance with the Dorothy daniels Dance Studio in Wellington and progressed with distiction through the grades until she qualified in grade 8 performance, the pinnacle of dancing achievement. Norma appeared in numerous stage productions for a number of years. She travelled extensively throughout NZ.

She won awards for her performance and very soon after she left school (at an early age) and began "treading the boards". She toured extensively and performed in countless productions in a stage career that spanned almost 20 years. Norma had a particular and somewhat cheeky character that could conjure fantasy and she put this into her performance and it became a mainstay of her character throughout life.

In her early twenties she met Edwin (Eddie) Lister Handricks. They met on stage during a performance of "The Boyfriend" – got engaged during a performance of "The Girlfriend" and were married, without a hint of irony, during the performance run of "The Merry Widow". Eddie located and purchased their first home, 9 Farringdon St, Glen Innes, and not too soon after their first child and son, Ian Lister handricks was born in the front room of the new house. Their second child and daughterr Lynette followed a couple of years later and eventually after a number of miscarriages and battles with aenemia, a third child, Glenn, was born

Norma always took great care of her appearance, and was considered by most to be up with the latest fashions – how we came to live in an olive green house, with lime green lounge suite, alternating pastel pink and blue kitchen cupboard doors and khaki floor tiles – obviously had nothing to do with Mum's colour sense! The family grew and all three children married and produced in all eight grandchildren. She doted on them all and they were always guaranteed of her exquisitely wrapped gifts at birthdays and xmas. The first grandchild and only grandson was Daniel Logan Handricks, Ian's son.

Norma's second great career was dressmaking and in particular, costume, fairy and fantasy outfits. She had a special talent here and her children were guinea pigs for her early endeavours. Every year they were decked out in costumes for xmas functions and parties as either scullery maids, cooks, quasimodo, witches – you name it she could create it! Norma started her own business, "Wandering Star", making and supplying the fairy shop with all manner of costumes, wings, wands and paraphenalia.

The urge to dance never left Norma. She began again later in life performing ballet in recital and retained her poise and fascination with this art to the end. Through dance and an enduring friendship of more than 50 years ago, she met Pauline Chamberlain. Pauline also shared the passion of dance - and even tried, it may noted - without success - to teach Norma's son, Ian, how to ballroom dance. In her later years Norma continued to sew and craft her fabulous creations – and enjoyed nothing more than a cup of tea and chocolate maccaroon. She had a ethreal spirit, enjoyed doing cryptic crosswords, taught her children to have a sense of fun and to approach situations with a lighthearted and humorous demeanor.

Norma's marriage to Eddie was not a happy one. Eddie was a difficult man who had a temper, was short-fused and was somewhat disengaged with the family. Although they were married for almost 60 years, Norma asked Eddie to leave after 53 years of them being together. It was an acrimonious split and they really never engaged in dialogue much after that time. Norma moved into an apartment and fared for herself (with Ian and Lynette's support) to the end.

In July 2011 Norma was advised that she was suffering from terminal Leukemia and that she would only have a limited time left. She passed away at St Andrew's Hospital, Glendowie, Auckland on 11 Dec 2011 in her 82nd year. Her funeral was held at St Paul's Church, St Heliers and she was laid to rest at Purewa Cemetery, in Meadowbank, Auckland.

### Notes for EDWIN (EDDIE) LISTER HANDRICKS:

Edwin was born in Gisborne and got his middle name, "Lister" from the name of the hospital (a former brothel) in Gisborne where he was born. Ruby, his mother, was suffering from perotonitis at the time of his birth and in thanks for the staff at the hospital managing to save both mother and child, Ruby name him "Lister". Ian, Eddie's son, also was named Lister.

Edwin attended Seddon Memorial Technical College and later completed an apprentiship as an electrician. He served during World War II in the Air Force as a ground technician and has had a life long interest in the theatre, especially as electrical back-stage crew with His Majesty's Theatre in Auckland and a number of other theatres throughout NZ. He started his electrical career with ECC (Electrical Construction Co.) and later went onto join the Auckland Electric Power Board becoming Chief Inspector for a number of years. After Norma and he married they moved to thier first home at 9 Farringdon St, Glen Innes where the three childreen were raised. They then moved to 9 Dale Cres, Pakuranga and onto Prince Regent Dr, Howick. They then moved to Papamoa. Eddie was an active member of the Institute of Electricians (and for a time President of the Institute) and had a pivitol role in the writing of the electrical wiring regulations. In his retirement he was a Taxi driver.

Eddie was a heavy smoker all his life and this affected his health. In later years he suffered from poor circulation and was admitted to hospital to undergo a triple A bypass operation, arteialgram and other procedures. Unfortunately he had his right leg amputated and in his last weeks the other leg was considered for amputation - however on the 1st May 2011 he passed away before this operation happened.

Eddie was a diificult man to live with. He had a temper and could be gruff and moody. He found it difficult to engage with his children and grandchildren. 3 years before he pased away, he and Norma split and went their separate ways. Eddie moved from boarding house to B&B and finally settled in a Presbyterian Home for the elderly. The two of them never really had much dialogue after the split. It was a difficult and often unhappy marriage.

In his earlier years, Eddie had and excellent head for mathematics and would hold an argument firmly. In later years he was forgetful, cranky, argumentative and sarcastic. He slept in late most weekends and was known to doze off frequently during stage performances at the theatre. Never successful with vehicles, virtually every car he owned broke down, cost a fortune to keep on the road or were grossly underpowered for the tasks required of them - he pulled

a 10' 6" caravan, the five members of the family and the luggage around New Zealand with a side-valve 1952 10 HP Hillman Minx car!

He was certainly a character and possessed a somewhat skewed sense of humour. He was never really happy with his life and unfortunately left a legacy of unhappiness with his family.

Wynonna Ellen Judd (born May 30, 1964) is an American country music singer. Born Christina Claire Ciminella[1], she is frequently referred to by the single name Wynonna (IPA: /wa?.'no?.n?/), a name she took from the lyric, "Don't forget Winona" from the song "Route 66".[2]

Wynonna made her debut as the lead singer of the 1980s country music duo The Judds, of which her mother Naomi Judd was also a member. Between 1983 and 1991, The Judds charted twenty-three hit singles on the U.S. Billboard Hot Country Singles charts (including fourteen Number Ones), in addition to recording eight studio albums plus two Greatest Hits compilations. After a bout of hepatitis forced Naomi to retire, Wynonna embarked on a solo career.

Wynonna made her solo debut in 1991 with the release of her eponymous debut album, which produced three straight Number One singles and was certified 5x platinum in the United States for sales of over five million. Since then, Wynonna has charted nineteen singles on the U.S. Billboard country charts, of which four have reached Number One.

[edit] Personal life

Judd was born in Ashland, Kentucky, at King's Daughter Medical Center. Her given name at birth was Christina Claire Ciminella. She was given the last name Ciminella, after her sister Ashley's father Michael. Her biological father was Charles Jordan, who died in 2000.

Her immediate family consists of her mother, Naomi Judd, half-sister Ashley Judd, son Elijah Judd (born December 23, 1994), daughter Grace Pauline (born June 21, 1996), and her second husband and former bodyguard, D. R. Roach (married November 22, 2003). [1] Her first husband is Arch Kelly III, the father of her two children. Wynonna Judd created a storm of controversy among conservative Christians when she announced her pregnancy with first-born Elijah, as she was not married at the time. Judd spoke openly about her feelings about the institution of marriage, stating that she did not feel the need to be married to have a child. Judd and Kelly did marry shortly after she delivered the baby, but divorced in 1998.

Wynonna filed for divorce from her second husband Roach on March 27, 2007 after his arrest for sexual assault of a child under the age of 13.

#### [edit] The Judds

Before launching her solo career, Wynonna sang with her mother as part of one of the most successful and celebrated country music duos. Together, they were known as The Judds. Wynonna is an active and vocal member of the Recording Artists' Coalition, an American music industry organization that represents recording artists, and attempts to defend their rights and interests. Some of her achievements include 20 number-one singles, multiple gold, platinum, and multi-platinum albums, multiple Grammy awards and a performance at Super Bowl XXVIII in 1994. In 2000 she shared the stage with rock band Phish.

#### [edit] Solo career

In November 2003, Wynonna appeared on an episode of The Oprah Winfrey Show discussing what she described as a "severe" dependency on food. She had been working with the show in an effort to lose a significant amount of weight and get to the root of her dependency. In September 2005 Wynonna made a second appearance on the show, discussing how she had lost some weight (but had yet to reach her goal weight); had patched up broken relationships with her mother, and with the man she considered "her dad", Michael Ciminella, from whom she had been estranged for almost a decade. Both Naomi and Michael visited Wynonna at the Shades of Hope rehab center in Buffalo Gap, Texas during a family visit, where Wynonna, 42, was being treated for food addiction. In September 2005, in an interview for The Insider, Wynonna also talked about being sexually assaulted by an acquaintance when she was younger.

Wynonna published her memoir, Coming Home to Myself, in September 2005. It became a New York Times Bestseller.

She co-hosted the fourth season of the USA Network series Nashville Star with Cowboy Troy.

On October 10, 2006 Wynonna released her first Christmas album, A Classic Christmas, as a solo artist. The single that was released, Santa Claus Is Coming to Town, peaked at number three on the AC charts.

In April, 2007 Wynonna was back in the studio with longtime producers Brent Maher and Don Potter to record a follow up to 2003's "What The World Needs Now Is Love".

Wynonna has recently appearing on an album with Ann Wilson and several other artists called "Hope And Glory". It was released on September 11, 2007.

#### [edit] Other accomplishments

Although she is associated with the country genre, she has also ventured into other music genres by allowing her cover version of "I Want To Know What Love Is" to be released as a dance track, where it peaked at number 12 on Billboard Radio Monitor's Hot Dance Airplay chart in 2005.

In 2001, Judd joined Huey Lewis for a duet on the album Plan B with the song "I'm Not in Love Yet".

In 2005, Judd took a role in acting playing Cynthia on the ABC series Hope & Faith episode "Wife Swap".

Notes for Edward Charles Vane-Tempest-Stewart:

Edward Charles Stewart Robert "Robin" Vane-Tempest-Stewart, 8th Marquess of Londonderry, DL (18 November 1902 – 17 October 1955) was an Irish peer and politician.

Educated at Eton College he was the only son of Charles Stewart Henry Vane-Tempest-Stewart, 7th Marquess of Londonderry and Edith Helen Chaplin.

He worked as honorary attaché to the British Embassy in Rome and as a director of Londonderry Collieries, the family's coal mining company. A keen football fan, he was first a director, and then later chairman of Arsenal Football Club from 1939 to 1946.

A portrait of him painted in 1911 as a pageboy at the coronation of King Edward VII by Philip de Laszlo hangs at Mount Stewart, County Down, the Londonderry ancestral seat in Northern Ireland.

Known formally by his courtesy title Viscount Castlereagh and as Robin by friends and family, he was an accomplished public speaker and was Unionist MP for County Down in the British House of Commons between 1931 and 1945. He succeeded his father as Marquess of Londonderry in 1949.

He was married in 1931 to Romaine Combe (d. 1951), daughter of Major Boyce Combe, of Farnham, Surrey, and had issue:

Lady Jane Antonia Frances Vane-Tempest-Stewart (b. 1932), who married Max Rayne, Baron Rayne in 1965, and has issue.

Lady Annabel Vane-Tempest-Stewart (b. 1934).

Alexander Charles Robert Vane-Tempest-Stewart, 9th Marquess of Londonderry (b. 1937).

Lord Londonderry was a celebrated host and practical joker, apparently once decorating the Christmas tree at Wynyard with condoms to startle a visiting cleric. He was also an attentive husband and devoted father to his children, entertaining them with stories and tales for hours on end. Also regarded as slightly eccentric, on one occasion Lord Londonderry had taken to his bed after a few drinks too many, when Mrs Billy Graham, wife of the evangelist, came to call. Although informed that His Lordship was "indisposed", Mrs Graham insisted upon immediate admission to his bedroom, having "come all the way on Billy's account". She was duly announced. Lord Londonderry threw aside the bed-sheets and shouted, "Get in."[1]

But he had an awkward and distant relationship with his parents, especially his father. The two men took opposite sympathies during industrial disputes over the family coal mines and most notably during the general strike in 1926. When he was married to Romaine, a brewer's daughter, his family viewed the union with disdain. It was a very happy marriage by all accounts, but tragedy struck when Lady Londonderry died from cancer and Lord Londonderry plunged into depression and alcoholism.

"Daddy changed, literally overnight, into a complete drunk," she (Lady Annabel Goldsmith) remembers. "It was awful. He would collapse while making speeches to the cricket club, that kind of thing. He was on the bottle night and day."[2]

Lord Londonderry died from liver failure on 17 October 1955 aged 52. He was buried alongside his wife at Wynyard Park and both were later reinterred in the Londonderry family vault at St. Mary's Church, Long Newton, County Durham.

Notes for ENID DIANA ELIZABETH RIGG: Dame Diana Rigg, DBE (born July 20, 1938) is a British actress. Rigg was born Enid Diana Elizabeth Rigg in the South Yorkshire town of Doncaster to Beryl Helliwell and Louis Rigg, a newspaperman who had been born in Yorkshire. She lived in India between the ages of two and eight and then went to school at Fulneck in Leeds.

She is particularly known for her role in the British 1960s television series The Avengers, where she played the sexy secret agent Emma Peel. Her career in film, television and the theatre has been wide-ranging, including roles in the Royal Shakespeare Company between 1959 and 1964. Her professional debut was in The Caucasian Chalk Circle in 1955.

Rigg tried out for the role of Emma Peel in the Avengers on a whim, without ever having seen the program. Though she was hugely successful in the role, she did not like the lack of privacy television brought. She also didn't like the way she was treated by ITV-- after a dozen episodes, she discovered that she was being paid less than the cameraman. For the second season, she held out for a raise in pay (from 90 to 180 pounds a week), but there was still no question of her staying for a third year. Patrick Macnee, her costar on the series, noted that Rigg had later told him that she considered him and her driver to be her only friends on the set. [1]

After leaving The Avengers she returned to the stage, including playing two Tom Stoppard leads, Ruth Carson in Night and Day and Dorothy Moore in Jumpers. A nude scene with Australian-born actor Keith Michell in Abelard and Heloise led to a notorious description of her as "built like a brick basilica with too few flying buttresses," by the acerbic Serbian-American critic John Simon. In 1986, she took a leading role in the West End production of Stephen Sondheim's musical Follies.

On the big screen, she became a Bond girl in On Her Majesty's Secret Service (1969), playing Tracy Bond. Her character, to date, is the only girl to officially marry James Bond. Her other films include The Assassination Bureau (1969), The Hospital (1971), Theatre of Blood (1973), and A Little Night Music (1977).

She lived with Philip Saville for some time but would not marry him (and he was married already). She did marry Menachem Gueffen, an Israeli painter, from 1973-1976, and Archibald Stirling, a theatrical producer, former officer in the Scots Guards, and a member of one of Scotland's grandest families, from 1982-1990. By Stirling she has a daughter, Rachael Atlanta Stirling, who was born in 1977, and is also an actress.

Dame Diana was made CBE in 1987 and appointed Dame Commander of the Order of the British Empire DBE in 1994.

In the 1990s she had triumphs with roles at the Almeida Theatre in Islington (north London), including Medea in 1993, Mother Courage in 1995, and Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf? in 1996. On television, she has appeared as "Mrs. Danvers" in Rebecca and as the amateur detective "Mrs. Bradley" in a series of mysteries.

From 1989 until 2003 she hosted the PBS television series Mystery!, taking over from Vincent Price, her co-star from Theatre of Blood.

In the 1980s, after reading stinging reviews of a stage performance she had given, Rigg was inspired to collect the worst theatrical reviews she could find into a tongue-in-cheek (and best-selling) compilation entitled No Turn Unstoned.

Josh J. Brolin (born February 12, 1968) is an American film and television actor.

Josh Brolin started his career in TV movies and guest spots on TV shows before getting a more notable role as Brand Walsh in the Richard Donner-directed movie The Goonies (1985). He was then offered the role of Tom Hanson in the series 21 Jump Street but turned it down to star in the series Private Eye (1987), which lasted half a season. The role of Hanson later went to Johnny Depp. However, Josh guest starred in Jump Street in a season one episode. He is perhaps best known for his role as Jimmy (or James) Wild Bill Hickok in the ABC western TV series The Young Riders, which lasted three seasons (1989-92). Although an ensemble piece, Josh's character increasingly received significantly more screentime than his co-stars.

Two other TV series he was involved in include the Aaron Spelling production Winnetka Road (1994) and Mister Sterling (2003). Both series were canned after only a few episodes. His extensive film work consists mainly of supporting, bad-guy roles. He has done extensive theatre work in Rochester, New York and has appeared alongside mentor and friend Anthony Zerbe. Diane Lane (born January 22, 1965) is an Academy Award-nominated American actress.

Lane was born in New York City, the daughter of Colleen Farrington, a night club singer and Playboy centerfold who was also known as "Colleen Price", and Burton Eugene Lane, a drama coach who also worked as a cab driver.[1][2] Lane's maternal grandmother, Agnes Scott, was a Pentecostal preacher, and Lane was influenced by the theatricality of her grandmother's sermons.[2][3][4] Lane was raised by her father after her parents divorced while she was still a baby.[2]

# [edit] Career

Lane began acting professionally at the age of six at the La Mama Experimental Theatre in New York, where she appeared in acclaimed productions of Medea and The Cherry Orchard, among others.[2] At thirteen, she made her film debut opposite Sir Laurence Olivier in A Little Romance, and at fourteen was featured on the cover of Time.[5][2]

One of few child actors to make a successful transition into adult roles, Lane made a hit with audiences in the backto-back cult films The Outsiders and Rumble Fish, and for a time was designated a member of the so-called "Brat pack". However the two films that could have catapulted her to star status, Streets of Fire and The Cotton Club, were both box office flops and her career languished as a result. It was not until 1989's popular and critically acclaimed TV mini-series Lonesome Dove that Lane made another big impression on a sizable audience. She was nominated for an Emmy Award for the role. Lane won further praise for her role in 1999's A Walk on the Moon, opposite Viggo Mortensen.[2]

In 2002, Lane was nominated for an Academy Award for Best Actress for her performance in Unfaithful, and was honored for her work in that film by The New York and The National Society of Film Critics. She followed that film up with Under the Tuscan Sun (2003), based on the best-selling book by Frances Mayes.[2]

She ranked at #79 on VH1's 100 Greatest Kid Stars.

#### Notes for CORNELIUS CRANE (CHEVY) CHASE:

Cornelius Crane "Chevy" Chase (born October 8, 1943) is an American Emmy Award-winning comedian, writer, and television and film actor. Born into a prominent family, Chase quickly became a key cast member in the inaugural season of Saturday Night Live, where his Weekend Update skit quickly became a staple of the show. Chase is also well known for his portrayal of the character Clark Griswold in four National Lampoon's Vacation films. In addition to his numerous movie roles, he has hosted the Academy Awards twice (1987 and 1988) and briefly had his own late-night talk show, The Chevy Chase Show.

#### Early life

Family

Chase was born in Lower Manhattan, New York City. His father, Edward Tinsley "Ned" Chase, was a prominent Manhattan book editor and magazine writer. His mother, Cathalene Parker (née Browning), a concert pianist and librettist, was the daughter of Miles Browning, who served a critical role at the Battle of Midway in World War II; she was adopted as a child by Cornelius Vanderbilt Crane, and took the name Cathalene Crane. Chase's maternal grandmother was an opera singer who performed several times at Carnegie Hall. Chase is a fourteenth-generation New Yorker, and was listed in the Social Register at an early age. His mother's ancestors arrived in Manhattan starting in 1624. Among his ancestors are New York City mayors Stephanus Van Cortlandt and John Johnstone; John Morin Scott, General of the New York Militia during the American Revolution; Anne Hutchinson, dissident Puritan preacher and healer; and Mayflower pilgrim leader William Brewster. Chase's paternal grandfather was artist/illustrator Edward Leigh Chase, and his great-uncle was painter/teacher Frank Swift Chase.

Chase was named for his adoptive grandfather Cornelius, who lived at Castle Hill, Ipswich, Massachusetts, which was later used in the filming of The Witches of Eastwick.

The name Chevy was a nickname bestowed by his grandmother, derived from the medieval English Ballad of Chevy Chase. As a descendant of the Scottish Clan Douglas, the name "Chevy" seemed appropriate to her.[1]

Chase's parents divorced when he was four; his father remarried into the Folgers coffee family, and his mother was remarried twice. Both his parents died in 2005. His mother, who later married Juilliard professor and composer Lawrence Widdoes, is buried at the Artists' Cemetery in Woodstock, New York. Chase has stated that he grew up in an upper middle class environment and that his maternal grandfather did not bequeath any assets to Chase's mother when his maternal grandfather died.[2] He made recent claims that he was abused as a child by his mother and stepfather, John Cederquist.[3] Chase discussed on the Howard Stern Show one instance in which his his stepfather locked him in a cellar for a week while he was suspended from school for brandishing a knife when another student attacked him.[2] Chase also stated that his mother would, at times, slap him in the face repeatedly while Chase slept.[2]

#### Schooling and music

Chase was expelled from private schools like New York City's Dalton School and Phillips Exeter Academy in New Hampshire.[citation needed] He did well at the Stockbridge School in Stockbridge, Massachusetts, and attended Riverdale Country School in The Bronx. He was valedictorian of his senior class and entered Haverford College, but was expelled (or 'separated') from it after one semester.[citation needed] He then transferred to Bard College in Annandale-on-Hudson, New York, where he studied a pre-med curriculum, dated actress Blythe Danner for several years, and graduated in 1967 with a bachelor of arts degree in English.

Chase did not enter medical school, which meant he would be subject to the military draft only months before the Tet Offensive, at a time when public support was dwindling for the escalating ground war in which U.S. troops were involved. Chase was not drafted; when Chase appeared in January 1989 as the first guest of the just-launched late-night Pat Sajak Show, he revealed why: he had convinced his draft board he deserved a 4-F classification by "falsely claiming, among other things, that he had homosexual tendencies."[4]

Instead Chase played drums for a time with the college band The Leather Canary, headed by school friends Walter Becker and Donald Fagen. At the time, Chase called the group "a bad jazz band", but Becker and Fagen went on to success after they changed their band's name to Steely Dan. Chase is gifted with absolute pitch.[1] He played drums and keyboards for a rock band called Chamaeleon Church, which recorded one album for MGM Records before disbanding in 1969. Before becoming famous as a writer, actor and comedian, Chase worked in many jobs including as a cab driver, truck driver, motorcycle messenger, construction worker, waiter, busboy, fruit picker, produce manager of a supermarket, audio engineer, salesman in a wine store, and a theater usher.

Early career

Chase began to branch out into comedy (he cited Ernie Kovacs as one of his biggest influences), making it a full time career by 1973, when Chase became a cast member of The National Lampoon Radio Hour, a syndicated satirical series aired on Sunday nights. (prior to this, he had been in an early underground comedy ensemble called Channel One which he co-founded in 1967, he had written a one-page spoof on Mission: Impossible for Mad Magazine in 1970 and was a writer for the short lived Smothers Brothers TV show comeback in the early 1970s among other things) The Lampoon Radio Hour also featured John Belushi, another future "Not-Ready-For-Prime Time Player" on NBC's Saturday Night. The two also appeared at this time in National Lampoon's off-Broadway production of Lemmings, a sketch and musical send-up of popular youth culture (in which Chase also played the drums during the musical numbers). He appeared in theaters in The Groove Tube which was directed by another co-founder of the aforementioned Channel One comedy group, Ken Shapiro which featured several Channel One sketches.

#### Saturday Night Live

Chevy Chase was one of the original cast members of Saturday Night Live (SNL), NBC's late-night comedy television show. During the full first season, he introduced every show except one by saying, "Live from New York, it's Saturday Night!" The remark was often preceded by a pratfall, known as "The Fall of the Week." Chase has since become known as a genius of physical comedy. In one comedy sketch, he mimicked a real-life incident in which President Gerald Ford accidentally tripped while disembarking from Air Force One in Salzburg, Austria.[5][6] This portrayal of President Ford as a bumbling klutz became a favorite device of Chase and helped form the popular concept of Ford as being a clumsy man.[7] In later years, Chase met and became friendly with President Ford.[8][9] Chase's physical stunts led to at least one self-injury. During a skit in the second season of SNL, the comedian was injured when he fell on an unpadded podium and bruised a testicle. This injury forced him to broadcast two of the show's segments live from his hospital bed. Chase was the original anchor for the Weekend Update segment of SNL, and his catchphrase introduction-"I'm Chevy Chase... and you're not"-became well known. His trademark conclusion-"Good night, and have a pleasant tomorrow"-was later resurrected by Tina Fey. Chase also wrote comedy material for Weekend Update. For example, he wrote and performed "The News For The Hard Of Hearing." In this skit, Chase would read the top story of the day, aided by Garrett Morris, who would repeat the story by loudly shouting it. Chase claimed that his version of Weekend Update would later be the inspiration for shows such as The Daily Show and The Colbert Report.[10] Weekend Update was later revived by The Chevy Chase Show,[11] a short-lived late-night talk-show produced by Chase and broadcast by Fox Broadcasting Company. Chase also performed a recurring gag as Landshark. His racially-charged "word association" skit opposite Richard Pryor from SNL's first season is frequently cited by television critics as one of the funniest (and most daring) skits in the show's history.

In a 1975 New York magazine cover story which called him "The funniest man in America", NBC executives referred to Chase as "The first real potential successor to Johnny Carson" and claimed he would begin guest-hosting The Tonight Show Starring Johnny Carson within six months of the article. Chase actually never did guest host the Tonight Show during his early peak years of success, and in fact, did not even appear on the program until 1978, when he was promoting a prime time special for NBC (his whirlwind success even got to the point where he was labelled "the next Cary Grant", a label to which he took exception). He was the first breakout star of SNL, largely because he was the only cast member who identified himself by name in every episode of the first season, in the "Update" sketches, which helped his immediate visibility. (The opening credits in the first few episodes only showed the names of the cast members on the same title card without their faces and without being introduced by Don Pardo by name). Chase was committed contractually to Saturday Night Live for only one year as a writer, not an SNL cast member. He had signed a one year writing contract and became a cast member during rehearsals just before the show's premiere. Nonetheless, he received two Emmy Awards and a Golden Globe Award for his comedy writing and live comic acting.

#### Leaving SNL

Chase was the first member of the original SNL cast to leave the show in 1976. After leaving SNL, Chase moved to Los Angeles and married his girlfriend, Jacqueline Carlin. Chase continued to make the cameo appearance here and there as the second season wound down; one of the more memorable ones was when he appeared on "Jeopardy 1999", a sketch in which the popular game show was set in the future (at that time, 1976) and hosted by Steve Martin, who was that week's SNL host. Chase was eventually replaced by Bill Murray.

Chase hosted SNL nine times after he left, most recently in 1997. Although Chase has not hosted the show since then, he appeared on the show's twenty-fifth anniversary special in 1999 and was interviewed for a 2005 NBC special on

SNL's first five years. He also has made four cameo appearances: once in a Caddyshack skit (featuring Bill Murray), the October 25, 1997 episode with guest host Chris Farley, as the Land Shark in Weekend Update during the October 6, 2001 episode, and again on Weekend Update, delivering a political news/commentary, on the October 6, 2007 episode.

As of 2008, Chase admits that leaving SNL so soon was the biggest mistake of his career.

## Film career

Chase's early film roles included Tunnel Vision, Foul Play, and Oh Heavenly Dog. The role of Eric 'Otter' Stratton in National Lampoon's Animal House was originally written with Chase in mind, but he turned the role down to work on Foul Play.[2] Chase said in an interview that he chose to do Foul Play so he could do "real acting" for the first time in his career instead of just doing "schtick".[12] The role went to Tim Matheson instead. Chase followed Foul Play with the successful Harold Ramis comedy Caddyshack, in 1980. That same year, he also starred with Goldie Hawn in Neil Simon's Seems Like Old Times.

Chase narrowly escaped death by electrocution during the filming of Modern Problems in 1980. During a sequence in which Chase's character wears 'landing lights' as he dreams that he is an airplane, the current in the lights shortcircuited and arced through Chase's arm, back, and neck muscles. The near-death episode caused Chase to experience a period of deep depression, as his marriage to Jacqueline had ended just prior to the start of filming. Chase continued his film career in 1983's National Lampoon's Vacation, directed by Ramis and written by John Hughes. He married Jayni Luke in 1983, and in 1985, he starred in Fletch, the first of two films based on Gregory Mcdonald's Fletch books. Chase joined SNL veterans Steve Martin and Martin Short in the Lorne Michaels-produced comedy ¡Three Amigos! in 1986, admitting in an interview that making ¡Three Amigos! was the most fun he has had on a film. The trio hosted SNL that year, the only time the show has had three hosts on one show.

At the height of his career in the late 1980s, Chase earned around \$7 million per film and was a highly visible celebrity. He appeared alongside Paul Simon, one of his best friends, in Simon's 1986 second video for "You Can Call Me Al", in which he lip-syncs all of Simon's lyrics. Chase hosted the Academy Awards in 1987 and 1988, signing on to the proceedings in 1987 with the opener, "Good evening, Hollywood phonies!" Chase filmed a sequel to Vacation, 1985's National Lampoon's European Vacation and then a third, National Lampoon's Christmas Vacation, in 1989, which, thanks to its holiday theme, has become his most durable film, airing on NBC every December. He played saxophone onstage at Simon's free concert at the Great Lawn in Central Park in the summer of 1991. Later in 1991, he helped record and appeared in the music video "Voices That Care" to entertain and support U.S. troops involved in Operation Desert Storm, and supported the International Red Cross.

#### Later work

In 1980, Chase released a self-titled record album with cover versions of songs by Randy Newman, Barry White, Bob Marley, the Beatles, Donna Summer, Tennessee Ernie Ford, The Troggs, and the Sugarhill Gang. The album was coproduced by Chase and Tom Scott. Among "short people" Chase names in his version of Newman's "Short People" is his friend Paul Simon, who features Chase in the video of "You Can Call Me Al". The Beatles' "Let It Be" is recorded a la Alvin and the Chipmunks.

Chase's career took a downturn in the late 1980s. Few of Chase's subsequent films have been able to duplicate the critical or commercial success of his early career. As fellow SNL personality Paul Shaffer later joked, "You made us laugh so much. And then inexplicably stopped in about 1978."[13] In fact, Chase's film successes, Caddyshack, Fletch, and National Lampoon's Vacation, all were products of the 1980s. Chase had three consecutive film flops from his later period: 1991's Razzie award-nominated Nothing But Trouble, 1992's Memoirs of an Invisible Man, and 1994's Cops and Robbersons. The three releases grossed \$34 million in the U.S., combined. Even the durable Vacation series ground to a halt, following 1997's Vegas Vacation installment, the only one without the National Lampoon imprimatur. Some of the more recent movies starring Chase (e.g., Vacuums, Rent-a-Husband, Goose!) have not been released in the United States.

In September 1993, Chase hosted The Chevy Chase Show, a weeknight talk show, for the Fox Broadcasting Company. The show was cancelled by FOX after only six weeks. Chase later appeared in a commercial for Doritos, airing during

the Super Bowl, in which he made humorous reference to the show. He was Hasty Pudding's 1993 Man Of The Year, and received a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame in 1994. He starred with Farrah Fawcett in Man of the House, which immortalized the YMCA Indian Guides program in 1995, and received Harvard Lampoon's Lifetime Achievement Award in 1996.

In 1998, Chase was offered the lead role of Lester Burnham in the Academy Award-winning drama, American Beauty, but he turned it down, fearing that it would tarnish his family-friendly image. The role went on to win Kevin Spacey the Academy Award for Best Actor.

He was roasted by the Friars Club in 2002. Chase was visibly upset by the tone of his fellow comedians, who were unmerciful in their skewering of Chase's slumping career. The roast was televised in 2002, but has not been repeated, nor has it been made available on DVD like similar Comedy Central roasts. In 2005, Chase was the keynote speaker at Princeton University's Class Day, part of commencement activities for the graduating class of 2005. Though he mentioned that he "left his written speech on the corner of the bathtub at home", he spoke for about 15 minutes about sense of humor and the perspective on life that it creates, while also proclaiming, "I strapped my dong down this morning", and discussing deleted scenes from the movie Dirty Work. Chase returned to mainstream movie-making in 2006, co-starring with Tim Allen and Courteney Cox in the comedy Zoom.

Chase returned for a series of cameos on SNL's Weekend Update segment for the Fall 2007 season, saying "it's a perfect political year" for him "to get in there and raise a little heck." His first appearance on the segment was on the October 6, 2007 episode.

Chase is an active environmentalist and charity fundraiser. He raised money and campaigned for Bill Clinton in the 1990s and John Kerry in the 2004 Presidential Election. Chase has harshly criticized President George W. Bush with comments like, "This guy in office is an uneducated, real lying schmuck... and we still couldn't beat him with a bore like Kerry." In the same speech he allegedly stunned the crowd at a People For the American Way benefit at the Kennedy Center, referring to the President as a "dumb fuck". Several Bush detractors present at the event distanced themselves from Chase's comments, with Norman Lear remarking, "he'll live with it, I won't."[14]

Chase guest-starred as an anti-Semitic murder suspect in "In Vino Veritas", the November 3, 2006 episode of Law & Order, which was apparently inspired by actor/director Mel Gibson's notorious arrest for drunk driving in 2006. Chase himself was arrested for drunk driving in 1995 with a blood alcohol level of more than double the legal limit.

Chase guest-starred in the ABC drama series Brothers & Sisters in two episodes as a former love interest of Sally Field's character. On September 18, 2008, he made his first in-studio appearance on the Howard Stern Show. Most recently, Chase appeared as villainous software magnate Ted Roark on the NBC spy-comedy Chuck.

#### Personal life

Chase had a long running feud with Howard Stern, prompted by Stern calling Chase's home and speaking with his housekeeper on the air.[citation needed] After experiencing continued harassment from Stern fans at public events, Chase initiated ending their feud.[citation needed] On September 18, 2008, Chase appeared on Howard Stern's show on Sirius XM Radio. Chase was a guest and gave a raucous toast at the wedding of Howard Stern and Beth Ostrosky on October 3, 2008.[15]

Chase is the father of three girls, Cydney Cathalene (born January 4, 1983), Caley Leigh (born January 19, 1985), and Emily Evelyn (born September 29, 1988). He lives with his wife, Jayni (née Luke), in Bedford, New York. He took part in Amnesty International's The Secret Policeman's Ball in 2006.

Chase is an avid fan of jazz music, recently manifested when he hosted the 2007 Newport Jazz Festival in Newport, Rhode Island.

Chase is a registered Democrat, and is an outspoken liberal. He endorsed President Barack Obama on his appearance on The Howard Stern Show on September 18, 2008.

Ian was born at home, 9 Farringdon St., Glen Innes, Auckland on the 6th july 1955. He attended Glen Innes Primary and Intermediate Schools and the onto Selwyn College where he completed 5 years of study towards entry to Auckland University. He began study towards a Bachelor of Engineering Degree. He taught music both privately and nightschool classes at Edgewater College, was for many years, a Flyman and Stage Hand at His Majesty's Theatre, apprentice baker at Klisser's Farmhouse Bakery but in 1973 he joined Hirst Contact Lens as a contact lens technician. He has been with that company ever since.

In 1977 Ian met Jocelyn and they were engaged very soon after. The marriage was planned for New Years' Eve, but had to be postponed because Ian contracted Encephalitis on Christmas Eve. The wedding took place in Feb 1978 in Dargaville Anglican Church and was well supported by the extended family.

Ian began 40 years ago as a contact lens technician after a period of study towards an engineering degree majoring in mathematics and physics. He concentrated on lens design, mathematics of lens design, developing production and marketing methods for the laboratory and eventually computerisation of the design and production of contact lenses. Ian completed a number of advanced management, sales and marketing courses in New Zealand and the United Kingdom.

In 1979 he moved to the United Kingdom to establish and develop a large research, development and production company that introduced leading edge CNC (Computer Numerically Controlled) machining equipment for contact lens manufacture. He headed both the Computer Development Team and the International Sales and Marketing force. During this period Ian traveled extensively selling, establishing new businesses and developing and servicing computer-based technology. A number of his inventions for the optical industry were awarded patents, many of his lens constructions are now industry standard designs.

While in the UK, Ian developed Practice Management software for Optometry and designed, built and established a number of pioneering lens production laboratories throughout Europe, USA and Asia.

In 1989 Ian returned to New Zealand on an invitation to rejoin the Hirstlens group and immediately prepared a business plan for the future of the company. In 1990 he purchased the company expanded it rapidly and began the development of Beyond Imagination, a high technology unit for advancing photo-digital imaging as a business concept. During this period, Ian masterminded a substantial improvement in the marketing and promotion of contact lenses via innovative exhibitions.

In 1993 Ian designed and patented a highly successful bifocal contact lens and was a key member of the engineering team that built the tooling and multi-axis lathing systems to produce the lens. This development attracted international press and television coverage.

The bifocal design and subsequent engineering design was awarded a Foundation for Research, Science and Technology grant.

On 18th March 2012 Ian was awarded an Honorary Membership of the Cornea and Contact lens Society in recognition of outstanding contribution to contact lens practice in New Zealand. It was given for his contribution in original lens design, patents, manufacturing inventions, substantial contributions to the mathematics of optical design, clinical contributions in lens design for astigmatism, keratoconus, post-natal aphakia, bifocal and multifocal contact lenses, production methodology, the development of groundbreaking CNC manufacturing optics, surface engineering, materials research, robotics, practice management software and for the introduction of computers into the whole New Zealand optometry market.

In 1994 he began work on innovative software and business model for a photographic restoration system called Photopages (later PhotoWonder). He has managed the engineering, development, sales and marketing teams of this project since its inception. During 1999 Ian developed the franchise in the United Kingdom and completed the franchise package including authoring the manuals and support marketing material.

The growth of the photo restoration business was rapid and in 2002 a landmark sales and distribution agreement was signed with Creekside LLC in USA. Ian established large computer studios in New Zealand, China and India using his software and techniques to service the growing market developing in the USA. Walgreens, Walmart, CVS, Albertsons, Best Buy and many other major chains now use this photo restoration service exclusively. Further distribution agreements were completed for Japan, Asia and Europe and PhotoWonder is now the world's largest photo restoration company.

In 2003, Ian began work on Tooth-pix, a professional imaging service providing a comprehensive yet simple method for dental photos to be altered to show predictive outcomes for cosmetic surgery. Ian pioneered the manipulation software and techniques for Tooth-pix and has worked closely with key dentists in NZ to develop a professional on-line interface for all dentistry.

2004 saw the release of Ian's unique real estate system, Realty-Pix. Similar to Tooth-pix, it provides the opportunity for property buyers to explore the potential of a property prior to investment, encouragement for vendors to better prepare the property for sale and can inexpensively explore make-over options when considering planned home improvements. Ian has worked closely with key people within the real estate industry to advance the use of more effective marketing techniques.

Ian also is actively involved with and collaborates in developing complete business solutions, designing and building comprehensive internet and engineering complex software solutions for a wide range of commercial disciplines. These have included web-sites for publishing houses, software for asset management systems, high profile sites for automotive dealerships and real estate listing sites. In 2009 he developed a complete business plan and infrastructure to support real estate sales by lawyers.

Ian is now a director of Alexander & Co., a leading surveying company in New Zealand specializing in building enclosures and providing market leading solutions, advice and assistance in all aspects of building surveying, dispute resolution, cladding design, architecture, maintenance planning and building restoration. He is also a consultant with company providing management services.

Since 1979, the countess has been an extra lady-in-waiting to The Princess Royal.

Notes for THOMAS PATRICK JOHN (PATRICK LICHFIELD) ANSON:

Thomas Patrick John Anson, 5th Earl of Lichfield (25 April 1939 – 11 November 2005) was a British photographer and a first cousin once removed of Queen Elizabeth II, his mother Anne Bowes-Lyon (1917–1980) having been a niece of the late Queen Mother. He inherited the Earldom of Lichfield from his paternal grandfather. In his professional practice he was known as Patrick Lichfield.

Lord Lichfield was educated at Harrow and Sandhurst, and joined the Grenadier Guards in 1959. On leaving the Army in 1962, he began to work as a photographer's assistant, and built up his own reputation, partly as a result of having access to the Royal Family. He was selected to take the official photographs of the wedding of the Prince and Princess of Wales in 1981, and subsequently became one of the UK's best-known photographers. From 1999 onwards he was a pioneer of digital photography at a professional standard. He was chosen by the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh to take the official pictures of her Golden Jubilee in 2002. His estate was Shugborough Hall, near Cannock Chase in Staffordshire. Nearby is Milford Hall, the estate of the Levett-Haszard family, who are related to the Ansons and who sit on the board of Shugborough.

In 1975 he married Lady Leonora Grosvenor, elder daughter of the 5th Duke of Westminster, but they divorced in 1986. They had one son, Thomas, now 6th Earl of Lichfield, and two daughters, Rose and Eloise.

His most recent partner was the biographer, Lady Annunziata Asquith

On 10 November 2005, Lichfield suffered a major stroke, and died the following day (Remembrance Day) at the John Radcliffe Hospital in Oxford, aged 66.

Lichfield's funeral was held on 21 November at St. Michael and All Angels Church, Colwich, Staffordshire

Lord Bowmont was educated at Eton College and the University of Newcastle upon Tyne. He attended the Royal Military Academy Sandhurst, passed out in December 2004, and is currently serving with the Blues and Royals in Windsor.

In February 2003, Lord Bowmont, heir to a  $\pm$ 70 million fortune, was caught travelling on the Tyne and Wear Metro without paying the  $\pm$ 1 fare. # Notes for GERALD CAVENDISH GROSVENOR:

Major-General Gerald Cavendish Grosvenor, 6th Duke of Westminster, KG, OBE, TD, DL (born 22 December 1951 in Omagh, County Tyrone, Northern Ireland), is the son of Robert George Grosvenor, 5th Duke of Westminster, and his wife Hon. Viola Maud Lyttelton. In 2005, he became Chancellor of the University of Chester.

The richest aristocrat in the United Kingdom, the Duke topped the Sunday Times Rich List as Britain's wealthiest individual for many years and was surpassed only in 2004 by Russian billionaire Roman Abramovich. The Duke was 3rd in the Sunday Times Rich List 2007, behind Roman Abramovich and the Indian-born industrialist, Lakshmi Mittal, who currently holds first place. An estimated fortune of £7 billion (\$14 billion) is derived largely from property in central London, where he owns approximately 300 acres (1.2 km<sup>2</sup>) of the most exclusive commercial and residential property in Mayfair and Belgravia (including the land on which the US Embassy stands, in Grosvenor Square), as well as estates in Lancashire, Cheshire (Eaton Hall) and Scotland. In addition to managing its traditional holdings, the Duke's property company, the Grosvenor Group, is an active property developer with interests around the world. It is the main developer of The Paradise Project in Liverpool. The Duke is also president of a number of charities including The Institution of Environmental Sciences.

After leaving Harrow school with a single O-level, the Duke failed the entrance examination to the Royal Military Academy at Sandhurst [1]. The Duke joined the Territorial Army in 1970 as a trooper. After long service and becoming an officer, including commanding 'C' squadron (The Cheshire Yeomanry) and his regiment, The Queen's Own Yeomanry, he became Honorary Colonel-in-Chief of several regiments, including The Royal Mercian and Lancastrian Yeomanry, 7th Regt. Army Air Corps, and the Canadian Royal Westminster Regiment and Colonel Commandant Yeomanry, Royal Armoured Corps. In 2004 he was appointed to the new post of Assistant Chief of Defence Staff (Reserves and Cadets) with promotion to the rank of Major General. He was the first reservist holding such rank since the 1930s, but it was said that he 'privately never kidded himself that he would have achieved such seniority but for his wealth and social status'.[1] In 2007, following statements that he was a serial user of prostitutes to whom he had boasted about military matters [2], he was succeeded in this post by Maj Gen Simon Lalor.

The Duke married Natalia Ayesha Phillips, the daughter of Lt.-Col. Harold Pedro Joseph Phillips and his wife Georgina Wernher, in 1978. The Duchess is a direct descendant of the Russian poet Alexander S. Pushkin, and therefore of his ancestor Ibrahim Hannibal. The Duchess' older sister is Alexandra Hamilton, Duchess of Abercorn, wife of James Hamilton, 5th Duke of Abercorn. The Duchess is also a descendant of Princess Augusta Charlotte of Wales and as a result their four children are in the Line of succession to the British Throne:

Notes for HUGH RICHARD LOUIS GROSVENOR:

Hugh Richard Louis Grosvenor, Earl Grosvenor (born 29 January 1991) is the third of four children and the only son of the 6th Duke of Westminster, the richest aristocrat in the United Kingdom according to the Sunday Times Rich List, and the Duchess of Westminster (formerly Natalia Phillips). Through his mother, Lord Grosvenor is 647th in line to the British throne, as she is a descendant of Princess Augusta Charlotte of Wales (eldest daughter of Frederick, Prince of Wales and a granddaughter of King George II), and also a descendant of Alexandr Pushkin and therefore, of Peter the Great's African protégé, Abram Petrovich Gannibal.

Earl Grosvenor is the only heir to the dukedom of Westminster, and as such, stands to inherit most of the vast Grosvenor fortune based on property in London. There are heirs (the Earl of Wilton and his heirs) to the subsidiary titles such as the marquessate of Westminster.

Notes for ANNABEL VANE-TEMPEST-STEWART:

Lady Annabel Goldsmith (born 11 June 1934) is an English socialite and the eponym for a celebrated London nightclub of the late 20th century, Annabel's.[1] She was first married for two decades to entrepreneur Mark Birley, the creator of Annabel's, which she helped make a glamorous success as her husband's inaugural members-only Mayfair club. Known in London as a society hostess, during the 1960s and the 1970s, she gained notoriety in gossip columns for her extramarital affair with Anglo-French financier Sir James Goldsmith, who later became her second husband. A descendant and heiress of the Londonderry family, her primary occupation has been as a mother of six children whose births span 25 years. She is also an author and founder of the Democracy Movement, a Eurosceptic pressure group. Her son Zac Goldsmith is the Conservative prospective parliamentary candidate for Richmond Park.

#### [edit] Background and Image

The second of three children, Lady Annabel was born in London as Annabel Vane-Tempest-Stewart to the 8th Marquess of Londonderry and Romaine Combe, who was the daughter of Major Boyce Combe from a middle-class family in Surrey. Her mother died of cancer in 1951, but the illness was kept a secret by her parents. She later said, "Cancer was such a taboo then - Mummy didn't even tell her sisters."[2] Subsequently, her father became a chronic alcoholic and died from liver failure at 52 on 17 October 1955. "My father was a really wonderful man but after my mother died, we couldn't talk to him as we had done before. He couldn't face life without her and he turned into Jekyll and Hyde almost overnight," she explained.[3]

She was named after her mother's favourite song, "Miss Annabel Lee", and grew up as a country child at her family's former estates of Mount Stewart, Wynyard Park, and the Londonderry House.[1] She was educated at Southover Manor School in Sussex and Cuffy's Tutorial College in Oxford. Awkward and shy, in her youth, she was an avid reader, equestrian,[4] and a Girl Guide for the Bullfinch Patrol.[5] She transformed from an unconfident and self-described "skinny, gauche young girl"[1] into a socialite during the 1950s and 1960s.[5] As part of the London social circle, she is known for her sense of humour, down-to-earth personality, and love of children and dogs.[5][3] Though never a drinker, she chain smoked until the age of 40.[5]

# [edit] Family

Lady Annabel is the mother of Rupert, Robin and India Jane Birley plus Jemima, Zac and Ben Goldsmith. She has referred to herself as "an incredible mother, rather a good mistress, but not a very good wife".[4] With six children and five miscarriages,[5] her primary vocation was motherhood, which prompted her to say: "I'm not judgmental about women who work, but I was so besotted with my children I never wanted them out of my sight."[6] She was also considered a mother figure by her nieces, Ladies Cosima and Sophia Vane-Tempest-Stewart,[4] and the late Princess Diana.[1] As the wife and ex-wife of two unfaithful men, she explained her marriage philosophy to the Times in 1987: "I can never understand the wives who really mind, the wives who set such store by fidelity. How extraordinary, and how mad they are. Because, surely, if the man goes out and he comes back, it's not actually doing any harm."[7]

# [edit] Annabel's and the Birleys

On 10 March 1954, at the age of 19, she married businessman Mark Birley at the Caxton Hall register office in London. Birley famously paid tribute to her by naming in her honour his renowned nightclub, Annabel's, which opened on 4 June 1963 and was run by Birley for more than forty years. During the 1960s, Lady Annabel was a constant presence at Annabel's, known as one of the grandest nightclubs of the sixties and seventies, where she entertained guests ranging from Ted and Robert F. Kennedy to Frank Sinatra, Prince Charles, Richard Nixon, and Muhammad Ali.[8][1] "I used to be there every night, even when I had three small children to take to school the next day. It was like a second home to me," she recalled.[9]

She raised her three children with Birley at Pelham cottage. Her eldest son Rupert, who was born on 20 August 1955, studied at Eton College and Christ Church, Oxford. In 1986, he disappeared off the coast of Togo in West Africa,[10] where he was presumed drowned.[11] "There really is nothing worse than losing a child - and there is something special about your first-born," she said, adding that, "Because I was so young when Rupert was born ... we were more like good friends than mother and son."[2] Her second son Robin (b. 19 February 1958) is a businessman, whose face was disfigured as a child when he was mauled by a tigress at John Aspinall's private zoo. Having let him go near the pregnant tigress, Lady Annabel said, "It was my own fault. I was, am, angry with myself."[2] Her first daughter India Jane (b. 14 January 1961), the granddaughter of society portrait painter Sir Oswald Birley, is an artist.

The Birleys separated in 1972 and later divorced in 1975 after the birth of her second child with James Goldsmith.[12] "Our breakup was because of Mark's infidelities, not because I fell in love with Jimmy," she told Vanity Fair writer Maureen Orth after Birley's death. Revealing that Birley had numerous other girlfriends from the beginning of their relationship,[13] she added: "I think he was absolutely incapable of being faithful. He was a serial adulterer. Like a butterfly, he had to seduce every woman.[14] Despite their divorce, the two remained best friends and soulmates, talking to each other everyday and holidaying together until Birley's death in August 2007.[13][8] Birley referred to them as "the true loves of each other's lives".[4]

#### [edit] Goldsmith affair and remarriage

In 1964, she embarked on a decade-long extramarital affair with the entrepreneur Sir James Goldsmith. Attracted by his flashiness, she said, she was "Mad about Jimmy. Loved Mark desperately."[15] Though both she and Goldsmith, who was then married to his second wife Ginette Lery, believed that the affair would be a passing fling, it soon gained her notoriety in London's gossip columns as a modern British mistress. For years, she repeatedly refused Goldsmith's suggestion of starting a family, stating, "I didn't want to hurt Mark any more than I had."[15] She was eventually coaxed into having his children by their mutual friend John Aspinall, an estranged former friend of Mark Birley who introduced her to Goldsmith.[16]

While still legally married to Birley, she gave birth to Jemima (b. 30 January 1974) and Zac Goldsmith (b. 20 January 1975), who is the husband of writer Sheherazade Ventura-Bentley.[12] Her last child Ben Goldsmith was born on 28 October 1980 at 46, after two consecutive miscarriages. The children were raised in Ormeley Lodge in Ham, London. The half-Jewish and half-Catholic Goldsmith was an occasional presence in their lives as he divided time between three families.[17][18] In 1978, Goldsmith and Lady Annabel married solely to legitimize their children.[4] "We didn't marry as a great act of passion. More to make sure that the children's name would be Goldsmith when they went to school," she explained.[19]

Goldsmith moved to New York with his new mistress Laure Boulay, Comtesse de la Meurthe in 1981 and spent the last years of his life mostly in France and Mexico. He became known for quoting Sacha Guitry's words, "If you marry your mistress you create a job vacancy." Often wrongly credited with the quote, Goldsmith admitted, "I quoted him at dinner, and it was pinned on me. I don't mind. ... I just don't want to claim what's not mine."[20] On his infidelities, Lady Annabel revealed that, despite her aversion to any form of confrontation,[21] "I did feel jealous. I used to scream at him."[15] In 1997, she and her youngest three children inherited a portion of Goldsmith's wealth, estimated varyingly at £1.6[22] or between \$1.7-\$2.4[23] billion.

# [edit] Present

She resides in Ormeley Lodge, a 6-acre (24,000 m2) Georgian mansion on the edge of Richmond Park, with two Grand Basset Griffon Vendeens, Daisy and Lily,[24] and three Norfolk terriers, Barney, Boris and Bindy.[25] In 2003, she remarked on her children's varied marital patterns by observing, "All my children with James marry young and breed, and my children with Mark do the opposite."[13] She has nine grandchildren, including Robin Birley's illegitimate daughter Maud.[12] She spends part of each year at her 250-acre (1.0 km2) organic farm in the hills above Marbella[26] and has a 1930s holiday home by the seaside in Bognor Regis, West Sussex.[27][28] Asked about her regrets in life, in 2004, she confessed wishing that she had, instead of marrying twice, been "a one-man woman".[6][29] "I wouldn't recommend anyone to do what I've done. To marry someone and grow old with them must be much better," she said.[15]

# [edit] Activism and philanthropy

Lady Annabel is president of the Richmond Park branch of The Royal Society of St George, a patriotic outreach society aimed to motivate youth.[30] She is a donor and supporter of the Countryside Alliance,[31] an environmental charity called The Soil Association, and African Solutions to African Problems (ASAP), which works to mitigate the impact of HIV/AIDS on orphans and vulnerable children in South Africa.[32] As an animal lover, she is also one of the patrons of the Dogs Trust[33] and a supporter of the Battersea Dogs & Cats Home,[34] along with being Vice President of the British Show Pony Society.[35] She had early interest in journalism but had to decline a low-level position at the Daily Mail at age 19 to get married instead.[4] She has since contributed opinion editorials to national

newspapers such as the Sunday Times,[36] the Daily Telegraph and Sunday Telegraph,[26][37] among others.[38] [39]

Inspired by Hungarian Premier Imre Nagy's radio address during the Hungarian Revolution, in November 1956, she and Mark Birley volunteered with the Save the Children organization in Vienna. She organized charitable donations and traveled daily to look after refugees who crossed the Austrian border into the frontier town of Andau.[4] In May 1997, she campaigned with her second husband in Putney, the constituency unsuccessfully contested by Goldsmith for his Referendum Party.[26][40] She continued to support her husband's ideas, like the single currency referendum, after his death as part of the Referendum Movement, which was headed by Paul Sykes and Lord McAlpine and of which she became honorary President.[36][41]

In January 1999, she launched the Democracy Movement, of which she was President[26] and her son Robin was chairman until 2004.[42] Starting from 12 January 2001, the organization launched a £500,000 advertising and leafleting campaign to expose the parliamentary votes of pro-Brussels candidates in 120 "target" seats before the May general elections.[43] The Democracy Movement released two million pamphlets carrying gloom-ridden headlines about a European state and published full page local newspaper advertisements in the constituencies of 70 Labour MPs, 35 Liberal Democrats, six Conservatives and three Scottish National Party candidates.[44] Describing the campaign as an effort "in memory of Jimmy", she said:

"I'm not anti-European - my husband was half European and my children are a quarter French. I just don't want to be governed by Brussels, and I don't think people want to give up their sovereignty. Jimmy used to describe it as sitting at the top of the mountain watching a train crash - that was like us heading for the European superstate.[45] "

On 17 December 2007, she testified at the inquest into the death of Diana, Princess of Wales, where she refuted the perception that the princess was in love with and/or pregnant by Dodi Al Fayed.[46][47] "She was in love with Hasnat Khan. I felt she was still on the rebound from Hasnat Khan... She might have been having a wonderful time with him, I'm sure, but I thought her remark that she needed marriage like a rash meant that she was not serious about it," Lady Annabel told the jury.[48] She also participated in a demonstration outside Downing Street in November 2007 to protest President Pervez Musharraf's imposition of a state of emergency in Pakistan.[49]

#### [edit] Books

In March 2004, Weidenfeld & Nicolson published her memoirs Annabel: An Unconventional Life, which recounted her life from a pre-World War II aristocratic childhood and her glamorous social circle of the 1960s to her current status as an active grandmother.[6] The book was serialized in The Mail on Sunday.[50] On the promotion tour, she gave numerous interviews and participated in a discussion with historian Andrew Roberts at the annual Cheltenham Festival of Literature in April 2004.[51] A Daily Telegraph profile observed that, "What seems to have kept Annabel afloat is her almost naive ability to let bygones be bygones".[21] Claudia FitzHerbert's review in the same newspaper denounced the autobiography as "woodenly hilarious" and "disappointingly vague".[52]

David Chapman, reviewing the book for the Newsquest Media Group Newspapers, concluded, "This is a decidedly funny memoir that includes the scrapes and japes of nob culture."[53] Lorne Jackson of the Sunday Mercury was totally dismissive of what she called "a dull memoir", stating: "This could have all been explained in one page, possibly two if the type was particularly large."[54] The Sunday Times commented that, "Annabel comes across as a decent woman ... but her writing is flat, with a few too many clumsy constructions, and her story lacks drama, even when terrible things happen to her."[55] Biographer Selena Hastings called it "a well-ordered, decently written book,"[56] while the Evening Standard wrote, "Goldsmith herself comes across as fun and warm, a good sport, if sometimes strangely submissive and a little overfond of her own breasts."[57] Annabel became a No.1 London bestseller for non-fiction.[58] Nationally, the memoirs reached the top ten non-fiction bestsellers in England, fluctuating from No. 7[59] to No. 4[60] and then No. 6.[61][62]

She followed her autobiography, two years later in September 2006, by ghost-writing her pet Copper's autobiography in the name of Copper: A Dog's Life. Her daughter India Jane illustrated the book. Copper was originally bought by the Goldsmiths as a reward to their daughter Jemima for passing her Common Entrance Examination, but he remained in Lady Annabel's care for most of his life and had an adventurous time in Richmond. "Amid tough competition, he was probably the greatest character I ever knew," she told The Daily Telegraph.[59] The mongrel, who died in 1998,

was famed for traveling by bus, chasing joggers and visiting a Richmond pub, the Dysart Arms. Upon the release of the book, Lady Annabel declared, "My late husband and Copper had a lot in common," and then elaborated that, "Jimmy was not at all a doggy person, yet he was intrigued by Copper. I think he recognised that same free spirit in him. They certainly both had an eye for the ladies!"[63]

Her literary efforts originated after the experience, according to her, of a life-defining moment on 29 December 2000.[2] She, her son Benjamin, daughter Jemima and her two sons, plus her niece Lady Cosima Somerset and her two children were traveling to Kenya, when a passenger on their British Airways plane stormed into the cockpit and tried to seize the controls.[64] The flight to Nairobi became temporarily disengaged and the jumbo was knocked off course, abruptly diving and plunging 17,000 feet (5,200 m) below. "Nobody on that plane thought, 'am I going to die?" she later recalled. "They all thought, 'we are going to die'. It was horrible, horrible."[2] This near-death incident has been credited by Lady Annabel as the catalyst for her writings. "I had always thought that I would write a book," she claimed, "but writing my memoirs didn't really come into my head until after that flight." In the introduction to Annabel, she wrote:

"Shortly after the accident, with an awareness of how close my children and their children came to being denied their future, an understanding of the fragility of my own hold on life and a profound appreciation for my own past, I decided to write this book.[4] "

Her third book, A Memoir, is set for a UK release on 10 September 2009.[65] To be published once again by Weidenfeld & Nicolson, according to a promotional blurb, the book is comprised of "intimate and perceptive essays [and] pen-portraits of some of the extraordinary figures that entered the Birley and Goldsmith circles - among them, Lord Lambton, Patrick Plunket, John Aspinall, Geoffrey Keating, Lord Lucan, Dominic Elwes and Claus von Bulow.

# Notes for JAMES GOLDSMITH:

Sir James Michael Goldsmith (26 February 1933, Paris, France - 18 July 1997, Benahavis, Spain) was an Anglo-French billionaire financier.[1] Towards the end of his life, he became a magazine publisher and a politician. In 1994, he was elected to represent France as a Member of the European Parliament and he subsequently founded the shortlived eurosceptic Referendum Party in Britain. He was known for his polyamorous romantic relationships and for the various children he fathered with his wives and girlfriends.

#### Life

Born in Paris, Goldsmith was the son of luxury hotel owner and former Conservative Member of Parliament (MP) Major Frank Goldsmith and his French wife Marcelle Moullier, and younger brother of environmental campaigner Edward Goldsmith. Goldsmith attended Eton, but dropped out in 1949. Two years later Goldsmith joined the army after his father had paid off gambling debts he had incurred[2] Goldsmith was married three times, and was claimed to have coined the phrase: "When you marry your mistress, you create a job vacancy." However, the phrase was coined by Sacha Guitry[3].

His first wife, whom he married when 20, was the Bolivian heiress Maria Isabel Patiño, 18-year-old daughter of tin magnate Antenor Patiño and the 3rd Duchess of Dúrcal, of the Spanish royal family. When Goldsmith proposed the marriage to Antenor Patiño, Patiño is alleged to have said, "We are not in the habit of marrying Jews", to which Goldsmith is reported to have replied, "Well, I am not in the habit of marrying [Red] Indians."[4]. This story if true is typical of Goldsmith's humour. With the heiress pregnant and the Patiños insisting the pair separate, the couple eloped in January 1954. The marriage was brief. Rendered comatose by a cerebral hemorrhage in her seventh month of pregnancy, Maria Isabel Patiño de Goldsmith died in May 1954; her only child, Isabel, was delivered by Caesarian section.

Goldsmith's second wife was Ginette Lery, with whom he had a son, Manes, and daughter, Alix. In 1978, he married for the third time; his new wife was his mistress Lady Annabel Vane-Tempest-Stewart, daughter of the 8th Marquess of Londonderry; the couple had three children, Jemima (born in 1974), Zacharias (born in 1975) and Benjamin (born in 1980) who in 2003 married heiress Kate Emma Rothschild (b. 1982), daughter of the late Amschel Rothschild and his wife Anita Guinness of the Guinness Brewery family.

After his third marriage, Goldsmith embarked on an affair with an aristocratic Frenchwoman, Laure Boulay de la Meurthe, with whom he had two more children. He treated de la Meurthe as his wife and introduced her as such during the last years of his life. Goldsmith died at 64 of a heart attack brought about by pancreatic cancer. Goldsmith's estate has provided finance for the JMG Foundation[5] which supports a diverse range of non-governmental organisations campaigning against GMO foodstuffs.

#### [edit] Business

Goldsmith's father Frank changed the family name from the German Goldschmidt to the English Goldsmith. The Goldschmidts, like their neighbors and relatives the Rothschilds, had been prosperous merchant bankers in Frankfurt, Germany since the 16th century. James' grandfather Adolph came to London as a multi-millionaire in 1895.[4]

During the 50s and 60s Goldsmith's involvement in finance, in his early years was more as a gambler than an industrialist, brought him several times close to bankruptcy.[6] His successes included winning the British franchise for Alka-Seltzer and introducing low-cost generic drugs to the UK. He was a greenmail corporate raider and asset stripper. With the financial backing of Sir Isaac Wolfson[7], he acquired diverse food companies quoted on the London Stock Exchange as Cavenham Foods. This included Bovril - acquisition of which he financed by selling its assets in South America and elsewhere.[7] As journalists began to question his techniques of dealing with the funds and assets of publicly-quoted companies, Goldsmith began dealing through private companies registered in the UK and abroad. These included the French company Générale Occidentale and Hong Kong and then Cayman-registered General Oriental Investments. During the 60s and 70s Goldsmith had backing by the finance company Slater, Walker, run by Jim Slater. When Slater, Walker crashed and had to be rescued by the Bank of England in 1975, eyebrows rose when it was handed to Goldsmith for its final dismemberment through his private companies.[8]

Goldsmith was knighted in the 1976 resignation honours - the so-called "Lavender List" - of Prime Minister Harold Wilson. In 1986 Goldsmith's companies reportedly made \$90 million from an attempted hostile takeover of the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company. In addition, from 1983 until 1988, Goldsmith, via takeovers in America, built a private holding company, Cavenham Forest Industries, which became one of the largest private owners of timberland and one of the top-five timber-holding companies of any type in America.

Goldsmith identified a quirk in American accounting whereby companies with substantial timberland holdings would often carry them on their balance sheets at a US \$1 valuation (as the result of years of depreciation). Goldsmith, a reader of financial statements, realised that in many instances the underlying value of the timberland assets alone, carried at nearly zero value, was worth the target company's market capitalisation. With this insight, Goldsmith began raids that left him with a holding company with huge tracts of timberland acquired at virtually no net cost.

Goldsmith retired to Mexico in 1987, having anticipated the market crash that year and liquidated assets. However he continued corporate raiding, including an attempt on British-American Tobacco in 1989 (for which he joined Kerry Packer and Jacob Rothschild). He also swapped his American timber assets for a 49.9 percent stake in Newmont Mining and remained on the board of Newmont until he liquidated his stake through open-market trades in 1993. He was precluded by the original purchase of Newmont from trying to take over the company.

In 1990, Goldsmith also began a lower-profile, but also profitable, global "private equity style" investment operation. By 1994 executives working in his employ in Hong Kong had built a substantial position in the intermediation of global strategic raw-material flows. Studies of public filings have found signs of the same Goldsmith-backed Hong Kong-based team taking stakes in operations as diverse as Soviet strategic ports in Vladivostok and Vostochny, and in Zee TV, India's dominant private television broadcaster later sold to Rupert Murdoch. A large Hong Kong-linked and Goldsmith-funded stake in one of the world's largest nickel operations, INCO Indonesia, was also disclosed in the 1990s, showing Goldsmith's ability to position capital before a trend became obvious to others. The Group was also a major backer of the Hong Kong based and Singapore listed major raw material player Noble Group, with low-profile long-time Goldmsith protege Tobias Brown serving for many years as the company's non-executive Chairman.

#### [edit] Goldsmith and the media

Goldsmith is known for his legal attack on the magazine, Private Eye, which referred to him as "Sir Jams" and in Goldsmith's Referendum Party period as "Sir Jams Fishpaste". In 1976 he issued more than 60 libel writs against

Private Eye and its distributors, nearly bankrupting the magazine and almost imprisoning its editor Richard Ingrams. This story is detailed in Ingrams' book Goldenballs! The publisher of the magazine was Anthony Blond, an old friend; Blond and Goldsmith themselves remained on good terms. Goldsmith also pursued vendettas against other journalists who queried his methods, including Barbara Conway who wrote the Scrutineer column in the City pages of the Daily Telegraph. In November 1977, Goldsmith made a notorious appearance on The Money Programme on BBC television when he accused the programme of making up lies about him and stormed off the set.[9]

In 1977 Goldsmith bought the French weekly L'Express and between 1979 and 1981 published the UK news magazine NOW! which failed to survive.[10] Oliver Stone's 1987 film Wall Street featured a British billionaire financier, Sir Laurence Wildman. This character is believed to have been modeled on Goldsmith.[citation needed]

# [edit] Politics

Goldsmith, like his friends Lord Lucan and John Aspinall, believed Britain had been victim of a socialist conspiracy and that communists had infiltrated the Labour party and the media.[11] In the mid-1990s, Goldsmith was a financial backer of a Euro-sceptic think tank, the European Foundation. In 1994 he became an elected member of the European Parliament representing France, associating himself with a right-wing coalition. L'Autre Europe. Goldsmith founded and funded the Referendum Party in the UK, on the lines as L'Autre Europe, which stood candidates in the 1997 general election. Goldsmith mailed five million homes with a VHS tape expressing his ideas. It has been suggested he planned to broadcast during the election from his offshore pirate Referendum Radio station.[12]

In the 1997 election, Goldsmith stood for his party in the London constituency of Putney, against Tory minister David Mellor. Goldsmith stood no chance of victory, but the declaration made one a memorable moment - Mellor lost his seat to the Labour candidate and was taunted by Goldsmith who clapped his hands slowly and chanted "out, out, out!" along with other candidates. Goldsmith's electoral performance was however feeble; the 1518 votes did not deny victory to Mellor, who lost by 2976 votes; moreover they amounted to under 5% of those voting and were not sufficient for Goldsmith to retain his candidate's deposit of £500.[13] Mellor correctly predicted that the Referendum Party was "dead in the water", and it effectively died with Goldsmith who passed on two months after the election. The seat was regained by the Conservatives in the 2005 General Election. Tony Blair said: "He was an extraordinary character and though I didn't always agree with his political views, obviously, he was an amazing and interesting, fascinating man." [14] Margaret Thatcher stated, "Jimmy was a great man, larger than life".

Alexander Charles Robert Vane-Tempest-Stewart, 9th Marquess of Londonderry (born 7 September 1937) is a British nobleman.

He is the son of Robin Vane-Tempest-Stewart, 8th Marquess of Londonderry (1902-1955) and his wife, the former Romaine Combe (died 1951).

When his father died in 1955, he became Marquess of Londonderry at the age of 18. He renovated the family estate, Wynyard Park, County Durham, which Nicholas Pevsner has described as "the most splendid 19th century mansion house in the county." Wynyard was sold by Lord Londonderry in 1987 and is now owned by the property developer Sir John Hall.

While he was a student, Lord Londonderry ran a jazz band called the Eton Five. His first wife, whom he married in 1958, was Nicolette Elaine Katherine Harrison, daughter of Michael Harrison, a stockbroker, and his Latvian-born wife Baroness Maria Koskull.[1]

Lady Londonderry gave birth to two daughters, Lady Sophia (b. 23 February 1959) and Lady Cosima (b. 25 December 1961) and a son, James, styled Viscount Castlereagh. However, Lord Londonderry later proved the boy was not his biological child but that of the singer Georgie Fame, and the Londonderrys divorced in 1971. Lady Cosima later claimed that her biological father was actually Robin Douglas-Home, nephew of Sir Alec Douglas-Home, the former Prime Minister [2]. Nicolette wed Georgie Fame [3] in 1972, and they had another son together, Tristan. She committed suicide on 13 August 1993 by jumping off Clifton Suspension Bridge.

His second wife was Doreen Patricia Wells, former principal dancer at the Royal Ballet, whom he married in 1972. They had two sons, Frederick Aubrey Vane-Tempest-Stewart, Viscount Castlereagh (born 6 September 1972) and Lord Reginald Alexander Vane-Tempest-Stewart (b. 1977).

## Notes for JAMES DAVID GRAHAM NIVEN:

David Niven (March 1, 1910 – July 29, 1983)[1][2] was an Academy Award-winning English actor.

James David Graham Niven was born in London, England, the son of William Edward Graham Niven and French/British Henrietta Julia Degacher, born in Wales, the daughter of army officer William Degacher (who changed his original name of Hitchcock to his mother's maiden name of Degacher in 1874 [3]) and Julia Caroline, the daughter of Lieutenant General James Webber Smith[4]. He was named David for his birth on St. David's Day. Although he often used to claim that he was born in Kirriemuir, Angus, Scotland in 1909, it was only after his birth certificate was checked after his death that this was found to be incorrect. [5]

His father was killed during the Gallipoli Campaign in 1915 and his mother remarried Sir Thomas Comyn-Platt. In his biography, NIV: The Authorized Biography of David Niven, Graham Lord suggests that Comyn-Platt had actually been conducting an affair with Niven's mother for some time prior to her husband's death, and that Sir Thomas may well have been Niven's biological father, a supposition not without some support from her children.

## [edit] Early military service

After attending Stowe as a boy, Niven trained at the Royal Military Academy, Sandhurst, which gave him the "officer and gentleman" bearing that was to be his trademark. Although he had done well at Sandhurst, Niven did not enjoy his time in the regular Army, in part because he was not accepted for the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders on which he had set his heart. He served for two years in Malta and two years in Dover with the Highland Light Infantry. While on Malta, he became acquainted and friendly with Captain Roy Urquhart, who would later lead the British 1st Airborne Division in the ill-fated Operation Market-Garden.

Niven grew tired of the peacetime Army and saw no opportunity for promotion or advancement. As he related in his memoirs, his ultimate decision to resign came after a lengthy lecture on machine guns, which was interfering with his plans for dinner with a particularly attractive young lady. At the end of the speech, the major general giving the lecture asked if there were any questions. Showing the typical rebelliousness of his early years, Niven stated that he felt compelled to ask, "Could you tell me the time, sir? I have to catch a train."[6]

After being placed under close arrest for this act of insubordination, Niven claims to have finished a bottle of whisky with the officer who was guarding him and, with the connivance of the latter, escaped from a first floor window. En route across the Atlantic, Niven sent a telegram resigning his commission. Niven relocated to New York, where he began an unsuccessful career in whisky sales and horse rodeo promotion in Atlantic City. After subsequent detours to Bermuda and Cuba, he finally arrived in Hollywood in the summer of 1934.

#### [edit] Early film career

Niven arrived in Hollywood, armed with nothing more than a letter of introduction addressed to Fred Astaire. It is speculated that as Fred's sister Adele had recently married into the English aristocracy, that the letter came from her and her husband Lord Charles Cavendish. From this first meeting, Niven went on to develop a close friendship with Astaire that would last until Niven's death. As a friend of Astaire, Niven was able to break into movie work. He first worked as an extra in westerns, then had a walk-on part in the 1935 version of Mutiny On The Bounty. He then landed a longterm contract as a supporting player with independent film producer Samuel Goldwyn, which firmly established his career and enabled him to become a leading man in many films. Given his privileged English upbringing, Niven had no problems infiltrating what became known as the Hollywood Raj, a select group of British actors who had made Hollywood their home. Other members of the group, included Boris Karloff, Stan Laurel, Basil Rathbone, Ronald Colman and their self appointed leader C Aubrey Smith, who came to adore Niven like a son. One of his first major roles was in The Charge of the Light Brigade in 1936, in which he starred alongside one of his closest friends Errol Flynn. A year later he starred as Capt. Fritz von Tarlenheim in 1937's The Prisoner of Zenda with C Aubrey Smith and Ronald Colman. However, not wanting to be typecast as a 'swashbuckler' as Flynn had been, Niven also made films in a light hearted vein such as the 1939 RKO comedy Bachelor Mother with Ginger Rogers, and Raffles also 1939, in which he played a gentleman thief.

## [edit] World War II service

After Great Britain declared war in 1939, Niven was one of the first British actors to return to England. He rejoined the British Army. First serving with the Rifle Brigade, Niven was assigned to a motor training battalion. Niven later interviewed for a position with the British Commandos, and was assigned to a training area near Lochailort Castle in the Western Highlands of Scotland. Niven would later claim credit for introducing British hero Robert Laycock to the Commandos. Working with the Army Film Unit, he also took part in the deception campaign, using a minor actor M.E. Clifton James, a Montgomery lookalike, to convince the Germans that the D-Day landings would be made in the Mediterranean. Promoted to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel by General Frederick E. Morgan and assigned as a liaison officer between the British Second Army and the First United States Army, Niven took part in the Normandy landings, arriving several days after D-Day. He acted in two films during the war, both of strong propaganda value: The First of the Few (1942) and The Way Ahead (1944). During his war service, his batman was Private Peter Ustinov.

Niven remained politely, but firmly, close-mouthed about the war, despite public interest in celebrities in combat and a reputation for telling good stories over and over again. He said once: "I will, however, tell you just one thing about the war, my first story and my last. I was asked by some American friends to search out the grave of their son near

Bastogne. I found it where they told me I would, but it was among 27,000 others, and I told myself that here, Niven, were 27,000 reasons why you should keep your mouth shut after the war." Niven also had special scorn for the newspaper columnists covering the war who typed out self-glorifying and excessively florid prose about their meager wartime experiences. Niven stated, "Anyone who says a bullet sings past, hums past, flies, pings, or whines past, has never heard one - they go crack."[6] One story has surfaced: about to lead his men into a battle with an expectation of heavy casualties, Niven supposedly eased their nervousness by telling them, "It's all very well for you chaps, but I'll have to do this all over again in Hollywood with Errol Flynn!"

He did, however, finally open up about his war experience in his 1971 autobiography, The Moon's A Balloon, mentioning his private conversations with Winston Churchill, the bombings, and what it was like entering a nearly completely destroyed Germany with the occupation forces. Niven stated that he first met Churchill during a dinner party at in February 1940 when Churchill singled him out from the crowd and stated, "Young man, you did a fine thing to give up your film career to fight for your country. Mark you, had you not done so - it would have been despicable."[6]

In spite of a six year virtual absence from the screen, he came second in the 1945 Popularity Poll of British film stars. On his return to Hollywood after the war, he was made a Legionnaire of the Legion of Merit, the highest American order that can be earned by a foreigner. This was presented to Lt. Col. David Niven by Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

## [edit] Resumption of acting career

He resumed his career after the war, with films such as A Matter of Life and Death (1946), Around the World in Eighty Days (1956) (as Phileas Fogg), The Guns Of Navarone (1961), and The Pink Panther (1963).

The same year as he hosted the show with Jack Lemmon and Bob Hope, Niven won the Academy Award for Best Actor for his performance in Separate Tables (1958). Niven had a long and complex relationship with Samuel Goldwyn, who had first given him his start, but whom Niven believed had been treating him unfairly. Despite their long business history, Niven and Goldwyn went through an eight year estrangement in which Niven was essentially blacklisted from the movie industry after demanding greater compensation for his work. After winning the Academy Award, Niven received a telephone call from Goldwyn with the invitation that he should come to his home. Niven claimed that he was in Goldwyn's drawing room when he noticed a picture of him in uniform that he had sent to Goldwyn from England during World War II. He claimed that in happier times with Goldwyn, he had observed this same picture sitting on top of Goldwyn's piano. Now years later, the picture was still in the exact same spot. Niven claimed that as he was looking at the picture, Goldwyn's wife, Francis, approached him and said, "Sam never took it down."[6]

David Niven had been Ian Fleming's preference for the part of James Bond.[7] EON Productions, however, chose Sean Connery. But in 1967, he starred with Deborah Kerr and Barbara Bouchet in the James Bond satire, Casino Royale. In a documentary included with the U.S. DVD of the 1967 release of Casino Royale, Charles K. Feldman states that Ian Fleming had written the book with David Niven in mind, and therefore sent a copy of the book to Niven. Niven is mentioned by name in the text of one of Fleming's James Bond novels. In On Her Majesty's Secret Service, Bond visits a posh ski resort and is told that David Niven is a frequent visitor. "David" is the name of a pet cormorant in You Only Live Twice, after Fleming's friendship with Niven.

Late in life, he gained critical acclaim for his memoirs of his boyhood and acting career, The Moon's A Balloon (1971) and Bring On the Empty Horses (1975). Although it has since come to light that despite Niven's frequent recounting of anecdotes about Hollywood in a manner that suggested that he had been personally involved at the time, in many cases he had not in fact been a witness to them and he was merely embroidering stories he had heard at third hand.[5]

## [edit] Marriages

After a whirlwind two-week romance in 1940, Niven married Primula Susan Rollo (1918, London - May 21, 1946, Beverly Hills, California), the aristocratic daughter of a British lawyer. The couple had two sons, David Jr. and Jamie. Primula died at age 28, only six weeks after moving to America, of a fractured skull and brain lacerations from an accidental fall in the home of Tyrone Power. While playing hide and seek, she walked through a door believing it led to a closet. Instead, it led to a stone staircase to the basement. Niven recalled this as the darkest period of his life, years

afterwards thanking his friends for their patience and forbearance during this time. He later claimed to have been so grief stricken that he thought for a while he went mad. He eventually rallied and returned to film making.

Niven met Hjördis Paulina Tersmeden (née Genberg, 1921–1997), a divorced Swedish fashion model and frustrated actress, in 1948. The moment of his meeting her was recounted by Niven in what might be a classic example of his writing style:

I had never seen anything so beautiful in my life - tall, slim, auburn hair, uptilted nose, lovely mouth and the most enormous grey eyes I had ever seen. It really happened the way it does when written by the worst lady novelists...I goggled. I had difficulty swallowing and had champagne in my knees.[6]

They married ten days later.

In October of 1951, while pheasant shooting with friends in New England, Hjördis was shot in the face, neck and chest by two of Niven's companions. While convalescing in the Blackstone Hotel in New York, Niven and Hjördis were next door neighbours with Audrey Hepburn, who made her debut on Broadway that season. In 1960, while filming Please Don't Eat the Daisies with Doris Day, Niven and Hjördis separated for a few weeks, though they later reconciled.

They had two adopted daughters, Kristin and Fiona, one of whom has long been rumored to be Niven's child by another fashion model, Mona Gunnarson.[citation needed] The marriage was as tumultuous as Niven's previous marriage had been happy. Thwarted from pursuing an acting career, Hjördis was reported as having affairs with other men and became an alcoholic.

## [edit] Death

In February 1983, using a false name to avoid publicity, Niven was hospitalised for ten days for treatment, ostensibly for a digestive problem. Afterwards, he returned to his chalet at Chateau d'Oex in Switzerland, where his condition continued to decline. He refused to return to the hospital, and his family supported his decision. Niven died in Switzerland on July 29, 1983 of motor neurone disease (Lou Gehrig's Disease) at age 73. Bitter, estranged, and plagued by depression, Niven's wife Hjördis showed up drunk at the funeral, having been convinced to attend by family friend Rainier III of Monaco.[citation needed]

Niven died on the same day as Raymond Massey, his co-star in The Prisoner of Zenda and A Matter Of Life And Death. Niven had just completed work on Trail of the Pink Panther and Curse of the Pink Panther. He was incomprehensible at times during the filming of both movies, and his voice was dubbed over in post-production by impressionist Rich Little, a fact that Niven later learned through a gossip column.

## Notes for SIR DAVID PARADINE FROST:

Sir David Paradine Frost OBE (born April 17, 1939) is a British television presenter. He was born at Tenterden, Kent, the son of a Methodist minister and attended Gillingham Preparatory School and then Wellingborough Grammar School. He obtained a degree at Gonville & Caius College, Cambridge.

From early on, Frost allegedly declared his ambition to become a TV personality, despite attending Cambridge. Frost's well-known ability to network with the right people was in evidence there, where he edited the literary magazine Granta and was the secretary of the Footlights comedy troupe, which included people of note such as Peter Cook and John Bird.

After leaving university, he became a trainee at Associated-Rediffusion and worked for Anglia Television. At the same time, he kept up his cabaret performances.

After several others declined the role (including Peter Cook, John Bird, and Brian Redhead), he was chosen by writer and producer Ned Sherrin to compere a pioneering satirical programme called That Was The Week That Was. This caught the wave of the satire boom in 1960 Britain and became enormously popular as well as influential, although it often riled politicians.

Frost also fronted many programmes imitating the success of TW3, most notably The Frost Report (1966-7). On ITV's The Frost Programme, he interviewed a number of controversial characters such as Sir Oswald Mosley and Rhodesian premier Ian Smith (he accused Smith of denying promotion to black members of Rhodesia's army, navy and air force, only to be told by Smith that landlocked Rhodesia didn't have a navy).

In the late 1960s, a moving tribute to recently-assassinated President John F. Kennedy on That Was The Week That Was saw Frost's fame spread to the USA. LP recordings of TW3 became best sellers and so began an intensely busy period for Frost, including his practically commuting across the Atlantic (mostly by Concorde). His Frost on America show featured guests such as Jack Benny, Tennessee Williams and, in 1977, Richard Nixon.

He is perhaps best known to most ordinary people in the UK for presenting various panel games, including Through the Keyhole, which featured house expert Loyd Grossman and, more recently, Catherine Gee. After transferring from ITV, his Sunday morning interview program Breakfast With Frost ran on the BBC from January 1993 until May 29, 2005.

Frost has had numerous critics throughout his career. Satirist and contemporary Peter Cook disliked him, perhaps because he stole his Beyond The Fringe act impersonating UK Prime Minister Harold Macmillan (whilst Cook was performing the act at one theatre, Frost was performing exactly the same act at another). Though Frost demonstrated a great deal of respect for Cook, Cook was critical of Frost's career, feeling he had done little more than stolen Cook's early image. Cook often claimed, tongue-in-cheek, that the biggest mistake he ever made was saving Frost from drowning in a swimming pool. Further borrowing of comedy material from others caused Beyond The Fringe performer Jonathan Miller to dub Frost "the bubonic plagiarist". For these reasons and others, the satirical magazine Private Eye has been a persistent critic of Frost, particularly during the 1970s.

In addition, Frost's interview style of late has been described as sycophantic, and markedly different to his performance in the 1960s and 1970s which almost bordered on verbal bullying – it was from such fiery encounters that the phrase 'trial by television' was popularised.

Frost has been instrumental in starting up two important TV franchises: LWT in 1967, and as one of the Famous Five who launched TV-am in 1982. He owns a production company called Paradine Productions, after his middle name.

Frost is the only person to have interviewed all of the past six British prime ministers and the past seven US presidents (Larry King has also interviewed all US presidents starting with Richard Nixon). He was also the last person to interview HIM Mohammad Reza Shah, the Shah of Iran.

#### Notes for JULIAN MILES (JOOLS) HOLLAND:

Julian Miles "Jools" Holland OBE, DL (born 24 January 1958) is an English pianist, bandleader and television presenter. His work has involved him with many of the biggest names in the contemporary rock and popular music industry.

Born in Blackheath, London, Holland was a founding member of the band Squeeze which formed in March 1974. Holland played the keyboard with the group until after the band produced its third album in 1980 when Holland left to forge a solo career. During performances with Squeeze, he was regularly seen smoking Cuban cigars.

Holland had begun issuing solo records in 1978, his first EP being Boogie Woogie '78. He continued his solo career through the early 1980s, releasing an album and several singles between 1981 and 1984. He branched out into TV, co-presenting the Newcastle-based TV music show The Tube with Paula Yates. Holland achieved notoriety by inadvertently using the phrase "groovy fuckers" in a live, early evening TV trailer for the show, causing it to be suspended for three weeks. He later referred back to this in his sitcom "The Groovy Fellers" with Rowland Rivron.

In 1985, Squeeze (which had continued in Holland's absence through to 1982) unexpectedly re-grouped. Holland was once again the keyboard player for the band until 1990. At that point, he again departed Squeeze on amicable terms to resume his solo career as both a musician and a TV host.

In 1987, Holland formed The Jools Holland Big Band which consisted of himself and Gilson Lavis from Squeeze. This gradually became his 18-piece Rhythm & Blues Orchestra.[1]

Between 1988 and 1990 he performed and co-hosted along with David Sanborn during the two seasons of the acclaimed music performance program Sunday Night on NBC late-night television.[2]

Jools plays a sit-in session with The The on a track called "Uncertain Smile".

Since 1992 he has presented the eclectic music programme Later with Jools Holland, plus an annual New Year's Eve "Hootenanny", and has shaken off his "bad boy" image to become a respected musician.

In 1996 Holland signed a record deal with Warner Bros. Records.[1]

Singers Sam Brown and Ruby Turner often join his touring band, The Rhythm And Blues Orchestra.

Holland is a fan of the cult 1960s TV series The Prisoner. He owns some of the costumes and props from the series, and occasionally appears wearing the trademark brown-with-white-pipe blazer featured in the series. Holland lives in the Westcombe Park area of Blackheath in south-east London, where he has had his studio built to his own design, heavily inspired by Portmeirion, the setting for The Prisoner.

In 1987 Jools Holland demonstrated his love of the series and starred in a spoof documentary, The Laughing Prisoner, with Stephen Fry, Terence Alexander and Hugh Laurie. Much of it was shot on location in Portmeirion, with archive footage of Patrick McGoohan, and featuring musical numbers from Siouxsie & the Banshees, Magnum and XTC. Holland himself also performed a number towards the end of the programme. Also appearing was Stanley Unwin.

He was also one of the interviewers for The Beatles Anthology TV project. Although he wasn't supposed to be seen or heard during the programme, on a couple of occasions his presence is detectable. For example, he is in the boat that Paul McCartney was steering.

Holland appeared in the 1997 film Spiceworld as a musical director.

He received an OBE in 2003 in the Queen's Birthday Honours list, for services to the British music industry as a television presenter and musician. He is also a published author and appears regularly on television shows besides his own and contributes to radio shows. In 2004, he collaborated with Tom Jones on an album of traditional R&B music. In January 2005 Jools and his band performed with Eric Clapton as the headline act of the Tsunami relief concert in Cardiff's Millennium Stadium.

On 29 August 2005 Holland married his girlfriend of fifteen years, Christabel McEwen, the former wife of Edward Lambton, 7th Earl of Durham. The wedding at St James's Church, Cooling near Rochester, was attended by stars including Ringo Starr, Robbie Coltrane and Stephen Fry. Other guests included comedians Lenny Henry and his wife Dawn French, Jennifer Saunders and her husband Adrian Edmondson, film director Tim Pope with girlfriend actress Victoria Scarborough, and singer Lulu.

In September 2006 he was appointed a Deputy Lieutenant for Kent.

In December 2006, Jools appeared at Capital Gold Legends Live, a series of up-close-and-personal gigs hosted by the national radio station Capital Gold.

Holland is also a Hammond organ player, and was seen demonstrating his skills to Jo Brand in the BBC documentary series Play It Again.

He is also well known for his charity work.[citation needed] For example in June 2006 he performed in Southend for HIV / AIDS charity Mildmay[3] and in early 2007 he performed at Wells and Rochester Cathedrals to raise money for maintaining cathedral buildings.[4]

He is also patron of the Drake Music Project[5] - and has raised many thousands for the charity.

#### Notes for BRITNEY JEAN SPEARS:

Britney Jean Spears-Federline (born December 2, 1981) is an American pop singer, songwriter and dancer, most popular in 1999 and the first half of the 2000s. Her career encompasses chart-topping records, high-profile advertising, and forays into acting and reality television. She remains very popular throughout the world despite some controversy surrounding the perceived sexual nature of her music and image.

Spears is married to dancer Kevin Federline.

Born to Jamie Spears, a building contractor, and Lynne Bridges, a grade school teacher, in McComb, Mississippi and raised in Kentwood, Louisiana, Spears performed in local dance revues and church choirs as a young girl, and was auditioning for the Disney Channel's New Mickey Mouse Club by the time she was eight. Although she was too young to join the series at that time, a producer on the show introduced her to a New York agent; she subsequently spent three summers at the Professional Performing Arts School Center and also appeared in a number of off-Broadway productions, including 1991's pop hit Ruthless! In [1992, she landed a spot on Star Search and although she won the first round, she was beaten by another contestant in the second.

Spears then returned to the Disney Channel for a spot on the New Mickey Mouse Club and was accepted. She was featured for two years between the ages of eleven and thirteen during the 1993 and 1994 seasons. Others on the show included Justin Timberlake and Joshua Chasez (who later became members of the pop group \*NSYNC), Keri Russell (star of the TV show Felicity), fellow pop singer Christina Aguilera, and actor Ryan Gosling.

Before long, Spears had recorded a demo tape, which eventually landed in the hands of a Jive Records executive. She was quickly signed to their label and began touring American venues for a series of concerts sponsored by U.S. teen magazines before joining \*NSYNC and becoming their opening act. It was at this time that Spears became romantically involved with Timberlake

By late 1998, Spears' debut single "...Baby One More Time" was beginning to impact radio stations and MTV. Led by a music video that featured the 5'4" brown-eyed bottle blonde dressed as a racy schoolgirl, among other bellybaring outfits that would soon become her trademark, the song became an international success, earning Platinum sales and going to number one in the U.S., as well as the United Kingdom, Canada and Australia, among many other countries. Her debut album of the same name, ...Baby One More Time, topped the LP charts in Canada and the U.S. for six nonconsecutive weeks. Within a year of the record's release, the album had become the best-selling LP by a teenager in history, spawned two U.S. top ten hits (in "...Baby" and "(You Drive Me) Crazy") and shipped over ten million copies in the U.S. alone; it would go on to ship another four million copies on top of this.

In April of 1999, she was featured on the cover of Rolling Stone magazine. The sexually suggestive Lolita-themed photo spread began a whirlwind of rumors that the still-seventeen-year-old had gotten breast implants. These claims were denied by Spears' camp, and seemed to have little impact on the young starlet's rising popularity.

That summer, she kicked off her first headlining tour, titled the ...Baby One More Time Tour. By late 1999, Britney Spears had become one of the year's biggest stars, a claim backed-up in the amount of award nominations she received that season. In December, she took home four Billboard Music Awards, including Female Artist of the Year, and the next month won for Favorite Pop/Rock New Artist at the American Music Awards.

At the Grammys held in February 2000, Spears received two nominations, including one for Best New Artist. She performed her signature song "...Baby One More Time" and her then-current single, the top twenty hit "From the Bottom of My Broken Heart" at the show, but went home empty-handed, losing the aforementioned award to fellow ex-mouseketeer Christina Aguilera.

After the short-lived Crazy 2K Tour and just two months after her debut began to die down in steam, Spears was ready to release the lead single off her sophomore effort. "Oops!... I Did It Again" broke a record for most radio station adds in a single day [1] and quickly became a U.S. top ten hit and number one single in other countries, including the U.K. and Australia.

Released in May 2000, Oops!... I Did It Again also debuted at number one in the U.S. and Canada, and was a similarly huge hit like her debut. It sold over 1.3 million units during its first week in the U.S., making it the fastest-selling album by a female artist in history. Within a year of release, it had shipped over nine million copies in the U.S. alone (and would go on to ship another million on top of that).

That summer was another busy one for Spears, as she kicked off her first world tour (titled the Oops!... I Did It Again World Tour) and also became an author after co-writing the novel Britney Spears' Heart-to-Heart with her mother Lynne. At the annual MTV Video Music Awards, she gave a performance of "Oops!... I Did It Again" and The Rolling Stones' classic hit, "(I Can't Get No) Satisfaction". During her performance, she ripped off a black suit to reveal a provocative nude-colored and crystal-adorned stage costume that caused quite a bit of controversy, seeing as the singer was only eighteen at the time.

Through the year, the top thirty "Lucky" and top twenty "Stronger" kept Spears on the charts. In late 2000, she won two Billboard Music Awards (one of which honored her for breaking the record for one week album sales by a female artist). Then, in early 2001, she hosted the American Music Awards, performed "Stronger" at the ceremony and was also nominated twice. At the Grammys, one of her two nominations was for Oops!... I Did It Again in the category of Best Pop Vocal Album. Again, however, she did not win.

In early 2001, she struck a \$7-8 million USD promotional deal with the soft drink giant Pepsi; her first commercial for them premiered during the 2001 Academy Awards. She then released the follow-up novel to Britney Spears' Heart-to-Heart, with this one being entitled A Mother's Gift.

In September 2001, Spears again performed at the MTV Video Music Awards. This time around, she was dressed in a typically revealing outfit, drenched in 'sweat' and on a jungle stage environment. She gave a performace of her new single "I'm a Slave 4 U" and danced around the stage with an albino snake. Along with another blitz of media attention, she was also criticized by the PETA organization for her use of animals (both the snake and four cheetahs) as a part of her performance.

In November 2001, she released her third album, Britney. It debuted at number one on both the U.S. and Canadian charts, selling over 740,000 units during its first week in the U.S. This made her the only female artist in SoundScan history to have her first three albums debut at number one. Over four million copies of the record have been sold in

the U.S. alone [2], and while this is by no means low, these figures can not compare to the sales of her first two albums. Britney also failed to spawn any U.S. top ten hits; in fact, the only successful single released from the album was "I'm a Slave 4 U", which reached the top thirty. This album is also notable for being the first of which Spears really began to take some creative control; she co-wrote five of the album's tracks. At the same time the album was released, Spears set off on her next world tour: the Dream Within a Dream Tour.

In 2002, Spears starred in a movie, Crossroads, which reached number two in its first week at the box-office charts, but quickly dropped from sight. Songs from the album Britney appeared in the film. Spears' performance was poorly received by critics, and she netted herself a Razzie Award for Worst Actress, tied with Madonna. One of the tracks from Britney, "I'm Not a Girl, Not Yet a Woman", also won the Worst Original Song award, and in 2005 Spears was again 'honored' by the Golden Raspberry judges when she was proclaimed Worst Supporting Actress for her cameo role in the documentary Fahrenheit 9/11, which showed her response to a CNN interview question by Tucker Carlson, regarding her political views during the then-impending 2003 invasion of Iraq.

On another sour note, Spears' five-year relationship with Justin Timberlake ended at this time. The break-up became a very publicized event on the news and in the tabloids, with rumors swirling that Britney had been unfaithful.

In June 2002, Spears branched out as a restaurateur with the opening of a New York City eatery, NYLA; but the venture was not a success, and the restaurant closed in 2003. A couple of months later, she took a break from the spotlight, and in 2003 many music industry critics speculated her career was in decline. That same year, Spears was nominated for two Grammys yet again, including Best Pop Vocal Album for Britney.

It would not be until August 2003 that Spears truly resurfaced on the music scene. That month, she appeared in perhaps her most controversial performance to-date with her idol Madonna, pop contemporary Christina Aguilera and rapper Missy Elliott. Spears and Aguilera performed Madonna's classic hit "Like a Virgin", danced suggestively and then each locked lips with the pop icon. In particuliar, the kiss between Madonna and Spears launched a huge media coverage that would last for months.

In November 2003, In the Zone was released. Jettisoning the Max Martin-produced synth-pop of her earlier releases, the album took in lesser-known producers such as RedZone, as well as such big names as Moby and R. Kelly. Spears co-wrote eight of the album's thirteen songs and also helped with producing for the first time. Zone rose straight to the top of the U.S. charts in its debut week, making Spears the only female in music history to have her first four albums debut at number one. The record has sold three million copies in the U.S. alone [3] and spawned the international number one and U.S. top ten hit "Toxic". The single struck gold not only commercially, but also critically as it helped Spears win her first Grammy in the category of Best Dance Recording.

On January 3, 2004, Spears married her childhood friend Jason Allen Alexander at The Little White Wedding Chapel on the Las Vegas Strip in Las Vegas, Nevada. An annulment was promptly arranged and was granted on January 5, ending their fifty-five hour marriage.

In March, Spears embarked on her fourth world tour, The Onyx Hotel Tour, which grossed over \$34 million USD and was seen by over 600,000 fans in North America and Europe. In June, she cancelled the remaining dates of her tour after reportedly injuring her knee during the filming of the video for her single "Outrageous". That same month, Spears, 22, announced her engagement to dancer Kevin Federline, 26. Federline was formerly in a relationship with actress Shar Jackson, with whom he has two children.

On the night of September 18, 2004, Spears married Federline before twenty-seven guests in a private, nondenominational ceremony at a residence in Studio City, California. Spears wore a strapless, white gown by Monique Lhuillier and Federline wore a black tux. The wedding party donned sweatsuits after the ceremony and ventured out to an L.A. nightclub for an afterparty of drinking, dancing and full-on partying until after 2 a.m. The legitimacy of the marriage was initially questioned, but on November 18, 2004 a representative of the Los Angeles County registrar's office confirmed Spears and Federline had successfully filed their marriage license with the county within ten days of their ceremony and were therefore legally married.

During the latter half of 2004, Spears announced she would be taking another career break in order to start a family. Though she stopped making many public appearances, the 'Britney Spears industry' seemed to continue running itself.

In September 2004, she released her first fragrance, "Curious" (a floral scent with vanilla and musk), for which she earned a reported \$12 million USD. The fragrance had the biggest debut in sales in history from Elizabeth Arden, breaking the record for first-week gross for a perfume; after one year of sales, the product has netted more than \$100 million USD. [4] In addition, the perfume ended up as the number one fragrance of 2004 in department stores, and in 2005, "Curious" was honored by the Fragrance Foundation, naming it Best Women's Fragrance. Following the success of "Curious", Spears released her next Elizabeth Arden fragrance, "Fantasy" (a fruity scent with flowers and cupcake), in September 2005.

In late 2004, Spears released her first hits collection: Greatest Hits: My Prerogative. The album debuted at number four on the U.S. charts (becoming Spears' first album to not debut at number one domestically), selling over 255,000 copies in its first week of release; since hitting shelves, the set has sold over a million copies in the States alone. The collection includes all of her biggest hits, such as "...Baby One More Time", "Oops!... I Did It Again" and "Toxic", as well as two new songs and a cover of Bobby Brown's "My Prerogative", which was featured as the lead single. A second single entitled "Do Somethin" was released in early 2005.

During the spring of 2005, Spears' reality show with husband Kevin Federline, entitled Britney and Kevin: Chaotic, premiered on UPN in the U.S. In total, the series included five episodes. Both Spears and Federline were credited as executive producers. Chaotic was panned by most critics, and ratings were not as high as expected.

On September 14, 2005, 6lb. 11oz. baby boy Sean Preston Federline was born in the Santa Monica UCLA Medical Center in Santa Monica, California by an elective caesarean section.

In late 2005, Spears released a remix album entitled B in the Mix: The Remixes. Lacking promotion, the album debuted at number 134 in the U.S. and sold less than 15,000 copies in its first week of release.

Spears' success has rested on a mixed fanbase. Some parents of young daughters have ambivalent or even negative feelings towards Britney Spears. To many critics, the singer has combined a very raunchy public image with a major marketing "play" for the hearts, minds and pockets of prepubescent girls, often as young as seven or eight. The sexualization of such girls is arguably a trend that is visible elsewhere in popular culture, for example in the film and fashion industries.

This has raised the question of how fast girls or young teens should move from childhood towards an early emotional adolescence. Some parents may worry that Britney Spears provides an unsuitable role model for their daughters' lives and career plans.

In October 2003, Maryland First Lady Kendel Ehrlich, the wife of Governor Robert Ehrlich, was criticized for saying she would like to "shoot Britney Spears" in an address to a domestic violence conference. After her comments made national headlines, she was compelled to apologize.

The sexualized public image of Britney Spears once again became a topic of debate as a result of her 2003 semi-nude photo spread for the men's magazine, Esquire. Prompted by this, Playboy reportedly offered the star over a million USD to pose nude for their magazine. Spears has publicly declined the offer. [5]

One of the more common criticisms linked with Spears is that of lip-synching. Most critics and musicians (at least in public) express a negative view on this way of performing, arguing that live entertainment should literally be what it suggests, singing included. Some argue that Spears, like other performers, can't practically sing while being engaged in complicated and demanding dance moves. Also, some see it as little different than lip-synching in music videos, which is standard. Also, defenders will distinguish between lip-synching to one's own pre-recorded music (which is widely conceded) and lip-synching to music sung entirely by others (which is denied and disputed). [6]

The 2004 Onyx Hotel Tour brought new criticism. While Spears and her on-stage dancers performed her songs "Touch of My Hand" and "Breathe on Me", they were seemingly nude and were performing explicit routines simulating gay sex, orgies and masturbation. Given that some underage fans were in the audience, there was some outrage at the lack of subtlety of the performances, and there were reports of adult chaperones angrily storming out with children they brought to the concert.

While young girls seldom address this debate in the same terms as their parents, many are divided on whether they consider Britney Spears appealing, especially in the light of more recent developments in her career. For her part, Spears has responded to their concerns by stating she is "not their babysitter. It's the parents' responsibility. If you don't like it, turn the T.V. off. The only person I want to be a role model is to my sister, Jamie Lynn." (From ABC's Primetime interview with Diane Sawyer).

The criticisms leveled against Spears are similar to those Madonna received at the start of her career. Indeed, Madonna's early fans belonged to a similar demographic to Spears' current fanbase. Spears' show-stealing kiss with Madonna at the 2003 MTV Video Music Awards received much media attention, as have her recent marriages. Her provocative image and, ironically, seemingly down-to-earth personality have both equally contributed to her success. Many have compared Spears to a young Madonna.

In common with a number of other popular female figures in show business, Britney Spears' private life has attracted considerable media attention. Indeed, some people feel she has courted it by cultivating, in her early years at least, a chaste, God-fearing and "wholesome" image somewhat at odds, not only with the traditional pressures, temptations and opportunities of "pop 'n' roll", but with the increasingly sexualized content of her own songs. Regardless of where the responsibility for the gossip industry surrounding the pop star lies, Spears' public response has been to repeatedly express regret and resentment at the intrusive media coverage.

# Career achievements

According to the VH1 special "The Fabulous Life Of... Britney & Kevin" and TIME, Spears has sold over seventysix million records worldwide.

Having thirty-one million RIAA-certified albums in the U.S., Spears ranks as the eighth best-selling female artist in American Music history. [7]

Only female artist in SoundScan history to have her first three albums debut at number one on the Billboard 200 chart. She then broke her own record when her fourth album debuted at number one.

In the U.S., Spears, Madonna, Céline Dion, Mariah Carey, Whitney Houston, Shania Twain and the Dixie Chicks are the only female artists with multiple diamond (shipped over ten million copies) albums (Spears has two: ...Baby One More Time and Oops!... I Did It Again).

Artist with the most retired videos on TRL U.S. with a total of fifteen.

Broke the record for youngest artist (at age seventeen) to have his or her first single ("...Baby One More Time") reach number one on the Billboard Hot 100 but this record is now broken by Chris Brown's "Run It!" at 16.

Broke the record for youngest artist (at age seventeen) to have his or her first single ("...Baby One More Time") and first album (...Baby One More Time) simultaneously reach number one on the Billboard charts.

...Baby One More Time is the best-selling album by a teenager in history.

"...Baby One More Time" is the twenty-fourth best-selling single of all time in the U.K.

Holds the record for biggest first-week album sales by a female artist in history (1.3 million copies) for Oops!... I Did It Again.

Broke the record in the U.K. for biggest first-week sales for a greatest hits compilation by a female artist (115,341 copies) with Greatest Hits: My Prerogative.

Has grossed over \$145 million USD from tour ticket sales.

Broke the record for first-week gross for a fragrance with "Curious". "Curious" also went on to become the biggest-selling fragrance of 2004. To-date, "Curious" has grossed over \$100 million USD worldwide.

Has grossed over \$30 million USD in merchandise from her tours.

Has topped Yahoo!'s annual list of the most-searched names three times in the past four years. [8]

Trivia

Britney's younger sister, Jamie Lynn Spears, is currently starting a career as an entertainer in the Nickelodeon shows All That and Zoey 101; Britney herself wrote the theme song "Follow Me" for Zoey 101, though it is sung by Jamie Lynn. Zoey 101 drew record numbers with the premiere of the show which gave the kids channel 1.6 million viewers age 9-14 — its biggest viewership in that demographic for a premiere in eight years. Her older brother, Bryan Spears, is one of her co-managers. Britney's parents, Jamie and Lynne, have divorced.

One of Spears' best friends, Jenny, was in the unsuccessful girl-group Innosense. Spears was also a member of the group, but she left and debuted as a solo artist before the band released their first record. One of Spears' closest friends is Felicia Culotta, her assistant.

Is an accomplished gymnast (she did a backflip for the "...Baby One More Time" video and several for the New Mickey Mouse Club).

In 2001, her supposed death in a car crash was announced on the radio by two Texas DJs as a joke; the radio station was subsequently sued.

Spears publicly declared that she was a virgin early in her career and would like to remain one until marriage, but after her split from Justin Timberlake, he revealed that this was no longer true. Spears has been quoted as saying, "I thought he was the one".

In 2002, Forbes named Spears the most powerful celebrity in the world.

For the film Chicago, producer Harvey Weinstein wanted Spears for the role that eventually went to Lucy Liu. Spears was also offered a role in Scary Movie, but was forced to turn it down, due to concert scheduling. She was considered for the part of Allie Hamilton in The Notebook, but was beat out by Rachel McAdams.

Is a good friend of Sarah Michelle Gellar and was asked to appear in the Buffy the Vampire Slayer episode "I Was Made to Love You". She could not appear due to scheduling conflicts, and the role eventually went to Shonda Farr who also did a voice in the Britney's Dance Beat video game.

Topped FHM magazine's 2004 U.S. and world polls for sexiest woman.

In May 2004 Spears had a Hebrew tattoo (מהש) inked into the nape of her neck. She was under the impression that it meant "new era", while a more scholarly reading would be "protection". A source said, "She's taken Kabbalah pretty seriously and this was a big deal for her." This echoes a similar incident in 2003 when Spears was informed by her friend, actress Taryn Manning, that her hip tattoo (the Japanese Kanji character 奇) read "strange" rather than "mysterious" (see Wiktionary).

Her numerous other tattoos include pink dice on her forearm. Her husband, Kevin Federline, has tattooed blue dice. She also has a butterfly tattoo.

Cites Marilyn Monroe as one of her idols.

Has hosted Saturday Night Live twice and been a musical guest three times. Spears also had a notable guest appearance with former cast member, Will Ferrell, in 2003.

Spears consults psychics to find out if her husband is cheating.[9]

She publicly declared her belief in blind obedience to the President, as reported in an interview on Crossfire and featured in the film Fahrenheit 9/11 by Michael Moore: "Honestly, I think we should just trust our president in every decision that he makes and we should just support that, you know, and be faithful in what happens." [10]. Ironically, Spears and Federline were later photographed coming out of a showing of the Moore documentary in Los Angeles, although it is not known whether Spears was simply viewing the film for legal reasons or because of a possible change of opinion regarding Bush and/or the Second Iraq War.

Has a character modelled after her on Fairly Odd Parents: Britney-Britney A.K.A. "The Platinum Princess."

Penelope Ann Miller (January 13, 1964), sometimes credited as Penelope Miller, is an American actress. She starred in several major Hollywood films during the 1990s, and has continued appearing in supporting roles in both film and television.

Miller was born Penelope Andrea Miller in Los Angeles, California, the middle daughter of TV actor and producer Mark Miller and costume designer and publicist Beatrice Ammidown; Miller's mother was the Goddaughter of Aristotle Onassis, and also edited Harper's Bazaar.[1] Miller has two sisters, Marisa and Savannah. Miller moved to New York City to study theater after graduating from high school.

Miller's film debut came in 1987 in Adventures in Babysitting, while in 1988 her role as Emily in Our Town garnered her a Tony award nomination. In 1990 she played Paula in the Oscar-nominated Awakenings, starring Robert De Niro and Robin Williams. She has appeared in a number of TV and theatrical movies subsequently, notably as Edna Purviance in Chaplin in 1992 and as Gail in Carlito's Way in 1993. She appeared alongside Arnold Schwarzenegger in Kindergarten Cop. Just prior to this she had a role in the Gary Sinise directed film Miles from Home. She took the lead role in the big-budget creature feature The Relic (1997) as Dr. Margo Green.

In 2002, she was in the film Dead in a Heartbeat and starred in a two-part episode of the A&E TV series A Nero Wolfe Mystery (Motherhunt). Her 2005 movie Funny Money was the top movie at the Sarasota Film Festival. She appeared in the Fox series Vanished for six episodes, playing the ex-wife of a U.S. Senator whose wife has mysteriously disappeared, and will appear in the upcoming film Blonde Ambition. She also played Fran on Desperate Housewives.

Most recently, she appeared in the horror film The Messengers, co-starring Dylan McDermott and Kristen Stewart. The film was produced in part by director Sam Raimi's production company, Ghost House Pictures.

In 1994, she married actor Will Arnett; they divorced in 1995. In 2000, she married James Huggins and had her first child, Eloisa May. That same year, she played teacher/therapist Mary Kay Letourneau in the TV movie, All-American Girl: The Mary Kay Letourneau Story.

## Notes for WILLIAM "WILL" EMERSON ARNETT:

William "Will" Emerson Arnett (born May 5, 1970) (pronounced [???'n?t]) is an Emmy Award-nominated Canadian-American actor known for his role as George Oscar "G.O.B." Bluth II (pronounced Job, like the biblical figure[1]) on the FOX comedy Arrested Development. Since his success on Arrested Development, Arnett has landed major film roles. He recently played a supporting role in the comedy film Blades of Glory and the antagonist in Hot Rod. He played the starring role in 2006's Let's Go To Prison. Arnett has also done work as a voiceover artist for commercials, films, and television programs.

Arnett was born in Toronto[1] to Alexandra and E. James Arnett, a corporate lawyer, and brewer among many other occupations.[2][3] In Toronto, he attended French-speaking schools.[4] He still speaks French, but has stated that he is not currently fluent in the language.[5] He graduated from Leaside High School and briefly attended Lakefield College School in Lakefield, Ontario.[6] He attended Concordia University in Montreal for a semester, but dropped out. When he was a teenager, Arnett's mother encouraged him to pursue an acting career and he began to audition for commercials in Toronto. He decided that he really enjoyed acting and that it was something that he wanted to do with his life. At age 20, in 1990, Arnett moved from Toronto to New York in order to study acting at the Lee Strasberg Theatre and Film Institute.[7] He began appearing in plays in New York and his first acting role was in the Felicity Huffman independent film Erie, which was filmed on the Erie Canal.

In February of 1996, Will Arnett began acting in television pilots. His first was a pilot with Kevin Pollak and his wife, Lucy Webb, for CBS, that was not picked up."[8] The pilot was The Underworld which revolved around "The head of an organized crime family [who] hounds an ex-con who only wants to go straight."[9] After the show was not picked up, he appeared in the movie Southie, which was directed by Arnett's friend Dave McLaughlin. In 1999, Arnett was cast in another pilot for The Mike O'Malley Show on NBC. Arnett was a regular on the series, playing the protagonist's friend Jimmy. The show was picked up, but it was canceled after only two episodes.[8] Arnett has referred to 2000, the year after that show was cancelled, as "the darkest year of [his] life" and he admits that he "didn't get a lot of work" and "drank those years away."[8] Arnett considers the summer of 2000 to have been a turning point for him because a friend helped pull him out of his battle with alcoholism and he began to get his career back on track.

In 2001, Arnett was cast in another television pilot, Loomis, for CBS. The pilot starred comedian Cheri Oteri as a local news reporter, and Arnett played her slacker brother. The pilot was not picked up. In 2002, Arnett was once again cast in a fourth television pilot. This pilot was for the CBS sitcom Still Standing; but even though the show was picked up and ran for many years, his character was cut from the series after the pilot.[1] Arnett became so frustrated, after his fourth failed pilot, that he "swore off pilots"[1] altogether, until his agent persuaded him to audition for the pilot for Arrested Development.

In 2003, Will Arnett finally found success in television when he was cast in the role of George Oscar "G.O.B." Bluth II in the Fox comedy series Arrested Development. Arnett's character was one of the show's most popular and he was nominated for an Emmy for his role."[10] The show was canceled due to low ratings, despite its critical acclaim and cult following. His favorite episodes of the show are "Pier Pressure" and "Afternoon Delight."[11]

Due to his work on Arrested Development and the fact that he was no longer tied down to the series after its cancellation, Arnett began being cast in large roles in a number of films. Although he worked largely as a dramatic actor in films before Arrested Development, the roles that he has taken since have been mostly comedic, often playing smug bad guys. Despite the fact that Arnett has emerged as a comedic actor, Arnett "never considered himself a comic" and considers himself an "actor first." [12]

Arnett's first major starring role was in Let's Go to Prison, a comedy film directed by Bob Odenkirk. The film was made on a small budget of \$4 million.[13]. It made over \$4 million at the box office and over \$13 million in rentals, making it a minor success.[14] Arnett's most recent film was Blades of Glory, an ice skating comedy in which Arnett and his wife Amy Poehler played supporting roles to Will Ferrell. The film was number one at the box office during its first two weeks[15] and has grossed approximately \$118 million domestically

Arnett recently appeared as a guest star on King of The Hill and 30 Rock. In 30 Rock, he played Devon Banks, a scheming network executive who plays a rival to Alec Baldwin's character Jack Donaghy. He also has recently finished filming supporting roles in Spring Breakdown, Hot Rod, The Comebacks, and On Broadway. In On Broadway, he once again works with director Dave McLaughlin who is a close friend of Arnett's and gave him one of his first movie roles in Southie.[4]

Arnett's next starring role will be in the comedy The Brothers Solomon, in which he once again teams up with director Bob Odenkirk and stars opposite Saturday Night Live's Will Forte. He recently finished filming a major supporting role in the upcoming basketball comedy Semi-Pro, his second film with Will Ferrell.[17] Arnett's next movie role will be in Ye Olde Times, along with Jack Black, which will commence filming this September.[18]

Will Arnett is signed on to many new projects in which he will play starring roles. He is signed on to Jeff the Demon for New Line Cinema, in which he will play a demon who is summoned by a pair of high school losers.[19] He is also signed on to the lead role in The Ambassador for DreamWorks and Paramount Pictures, in which he will play "a former U.S. vice president's privileged son, who is assigned an ambassadorship in Europe, where he quickly becomes the quintessential ugly American." Arnett is also signed on for the lead roles in the projects Dad Can't Lose, Get 'Em Wet, and Most Likely to Succeed.[19] Arnett was originally attached to play the lead role of David Miller in the film We're the Millers, but he had to pass on the project due to "scheduling reasons" and the part went to Steve Buscemi.[22] Arnett has also stated in an interview that he's "working with Mitch [Hurwitz] on something right now"[13], but the details of the project have not yet been revealed. Arnett has also stated in interviews that he is not sure that he would return to television for another series anytime soon

Will Arnett has a distinctive gravelly voice and has also done voice-over work for CBS TV promos, film trailers, and numerous advertisements, including Lamisil medication. Perhaps most recognizable is Arnett's voice saying, "It's not more than you need, just more than you're used to" in ads for GMC trucks.[23]

Arnett has also lent his voice to a number of television shows and commercials. In 2006, Arnett lent his voice to the character Duncan Schiesst for the Comedy Central animated program Freak Show, which was created by and also stars the voice of his former Arrested Development co-star David Cross. Recently, Arnett took the role of announcer for the faux trailer "Don't" in the movie Grindhouse. He will also be lending his voice to the upcoming films Horton Hears a Who!, and Cloudy with a Chance of Meatballs

Arnett has a pair of twin sisters who are three years older and a brother younger by nine years.[25] His father James Arnett was corporate lawyer and became the president and CEO of Molson Breweries in 1997, until he stepped down in 2000.[26] James had previously worked as a director for the company[27] and he attended Harvard Law School.[28]

In 1994, Arnett married actress Penelope Ann Miller, and they divorced in 1995.[4] Arnett dated actress Missy Yager, whom he lived with for four years. They starred on The Mike O'Malley Show together and broke up around the time that the show began.[8]

Arnett began dating comedic actress Amy Poehler in 2000; the couple moved to New York in 2001 when she became a featured player on NBC's Saturday Night Live.[8] On August 29, 2003, Arnett and Poehler married.[4] Poehler appeared in four episodes of Arrested Development in 2004 and 2005. She played a woman who his character Gob marries during a drunken night of increasingly outrageous dares. Arnett and Poehler starred alongside each other in the film Blades of Glory and they will star together in the upcoming films On Broadway, Spring Breakdown, Horton Hears a Who!, and Cloudy with a Chance of Meatballs.[24] He and Amy have a dog, Puzzle.[11]

Arnett lists Steve Martin and Chevy Chase as his two biggest comedic influences. [11] His favorite band is Built to Spill, his favorite movie is Shaun of the Dead, and his favorite television show is The Office.[11] Will grew up watching hockey in Canada, and is an avid Toronto Maple Leafs supporter.[29] Arnett also does charity work in his spare time
